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
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
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
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Fire financials on track for first half of fiscal year

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The Idyllwild Fire Protection District's first-quarter budget ended in a deficit, but this is typical for the first quarter of the fiscal year, according to Monday's finance committee report. IFPD does not begin to receive property tax revenue from the county until mid-December.

Revenues have been slightly more than \$400,000 in the first quarter, of which about 87 percent has been derived from ambulance services and reimbursement for mutual-aid fire support (fires off the Hill).

For the first quarter, IFPD's expenses have been about \$480,000, of which nearly 80 percent has been salaries and benefits. Some of those costs are attributable to sending crews to fires off the Hill.

However, one employee's overtime is noteworthy. In regular overtime pay (exclusive of overtime for non-district fires), Battalion Chief Mark LaMont has earned nearly \$13,400 in the first quarter. This is more than the total overtime for the rest of the department.

Including the mutual-aid (non-district fires) overtime, LaMont's total overtime during these three months has been almost \$27,750, or 135 percent of his regular pay of \$20,750 for the period. The rest of the staff has earned about \$25,000 in all from time at mutual-aid fires.

Legal costs have been about \$10,700, less than 20 percent of the budget for fiscal year 2016-17. Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said he expects no surprises and the legal costs are back to normal in the near term. IFPD is in an ongoing legal battle with former Capt. James Reyes.

While the finance committee did not have complete financial reports, Reitz told Committee Chair Calvin Gogerty that the accounting consultant Rob Dennis had been working to bring the new system up-to-date for use this fall.

"Our hope was he would be ready for the October financial meeting and have the first quarter done. He is very close," Reitz said.

And Commissioner Nancy Layton, also a member of the committee, said they are still looking for two more members.

Attention Idyllwild Water District voters

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Forest Service releases May Valley draft decision

The U.S. Forest Service has announced a draft decision for its May Valley non-motorized trails project. A draft environmental assessment was released for comment and review in June.

San Jacinto District Ranger Arturo Delgado decided to implement Alternative 2, with modifications, from the "May Valley Non-motorized Trails Environmental Assessment." In choosing Alternative 2, Delgado made some modifications. Alternative 2 and its modifications are described in the accompanying box.

"Once we're final, we'll move forward with implementation," said John Ladley, supervisory natural resource specialist on the San Jacinto Ranger District. "Bringing the trails up to standard will be a phased approach."

Since the draft Environmental Assessment was released for review in June, the district received about 72 letters with comments. Based on these, Delgado made adjustments to the original proposed action. For example, based on concerns over trespassing in areas where the trails are near private property, "This decision reduces impacts on those parties by: rerouting some trails away from private property boundaries; not adopting some other routes adjacent to the communities," and several other modifications.

Proposal

The proposed project adopts about 22 miles of existing trails and roads into the National Forest Transportation System, constructs about 2.5 miles of new trails, rehabilitates about 10.5 miles of unauthorized routes, reroutes some segments of existing trails, improves trail crossings at streams, and constructs two new trailheads, within the approximately 5,500-acre project area.

The northern portion of the project is zoned as "Back Country." The southeastern portion of the project area is zoned as "Back Country (Motorized Use Restricted)." Both zones are suitable for non-motorized travel on forest system roads and trails. The management intent for both areas is to retain the natural character of the zone and limit the level and type of development.

Objections

Last week, the Forest Service circulated this draft de-

cision. Objections will only be accepted from those who submitted project-specific written comments during scoping or the draft EA comment periods. Issues raised in objections must be based on previously submitted comments unless based on new information arising after the designated comment period(s).

The Forest Service has stressed that objections must be submitted within 45 days following the publication of the legal notice in the Idyllwild Town Crier, which was Oct. 20. The date of the legal notice is the exclusive means for calculating the time to file an objection. Those wishing to object should not rely upon dates or timeframes provided by any other source. It is the objector's responsibility to ensure evidence of timely receipt (36 CFR 218.9).

Objections must be submitted to the reviewing officer: Forest Supervisor Jody Noiron, San Bernardino National Forest, USDA Forest Service, Attn: May Valley Non-Motorized Trails Project, 602 South Tippecanoe Ave., San Bernardino, CA 92408. Objections may be submitted via mail, fax to 909-383-5770 or hand delivered during business hours (Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.). Objections may also be submitted electronically to: comments-pacificsouthwest-san-bernardino@usda.gov with Subject: May Valley Non-Motorized Trails.

Objections must (36 CFR 218.8(d)): 1) include name, address and telephone number; 2) include signature or other verification of authorship; 3) identify a single lead objector when applicable; 4) include project name, responsible official's name and title, and name of affected national forest(s) and/or ranger district(s); 5) include reasons for, and suggested remedies to resolve, your objections; and, 6) include a description of the connection between your objections and your prior comments. Incorporate documents by reference only as provided for at 36 CFR 218.8(b).

Final on the 3rd District debates

On Oct. 6, Supv. Chuck Washington and Hemet Council member Shellie Mine, candidates for the Riverside County 3rd District supervisor's seat, were in Idyllwild to share their views and vision for the Hill and the county.

The members of the audience posed all of the questions to the candidates. The questions were Hill-centric. The candidates were candid and prepared sound bites were not the tone of the evening.

This is the third part of the questions and the candidates' responses.

Rather than repeat the questions in the order asked, they have been organized by subject so that the totality of the responses can be together rather than separated and disparate.

State Fire Fee and County Fire Department costs

Q. Although a state "program," how do you feel about the Fire Prevention Fee? If it were up to you, would you abolish it?

CW: I have no jurisdiction over the fire fee. But I would send a letter to the governor to abolish it.

SM: Fee is unnecessary and should be a local fee.

Q. Given the state of the county budget and decreasing reserves, what are you proposing to do to get control of the annually recurring budget overruns with the sheriff's and fire departments?

CW: The fire department is not operating in a deficit state. The departments with challenges now are the sheriff and district attorney. Out of respect, I wasn't on the board in 2012 when it voted substantial pay raises. I'm left with the pieces as it crumbles.

Part of the county deficit is the \$40 million increase from a lawsuit for the health care of individuals incarcerated in our jails.

When I look at the projections, I see light at the end of the tunnel. In two or three years, it will be a lot better and we'll still have \$150 to \$175 million in reserves, which will begin to climb.

SM: It's not good enough to sit around. We need performance audits of the sheriff and fire and every other department. Going forward in 10 or 20 or 30 years, need to rein things in and decrease county employees. County citizens will need to decrease the unfunded liabilities.

Q: In a follow-up question, Washington was asked: Please clarify your statement that county fire is not a deficit budget when county fire submitted a \$30-million budget overrun in April 2016?

CW: The county fire chief's budget was balanced. They are not asking for more money. Perhaps [Idyllwild Fire] Chief [Patrick] Reitz has a different opinion.

[In the County's initial 2016-17 budget document, the county executive's staff described the county fire department's request as, "The fire department reports that its previously projected deficit of \$1.3 million has been fully reduced and the department is on target to bring in its budget within its net county cost allocated for FY 15/16."]

Campaign Financing

Q. Please identify your single largest contributor to each of your campaigns by name and approximate dollar amount?

CW: I have more than 300 pages of donors identified. But two accountants from Hemet each gave \$25,000 — Todd and Michael Foutz.

SM: My largest donor is Wayne Minor. Including the primary election, he has contributed \$85,000.

Q. To Supv. Washington, please disclose for the au-

dience approximately how much money each of the Cal Fire/Riverside County firefighters' unions and sheriff's employees' unions have contributed to your campaign?

CW: The firefighters have given \$4,000 and the Riverside Sheriffs' Association has contributed \$25,000. That is significantly less than the \$68,000 they gave to my opponent as in-kind contributions in the primary.

The Hemet police have promised \$5,000 but I haven't seen the check.

Miscellaneous

Q. [For Supv. Washington]: How can we get sheriff deputies' presence up here?

CW: Look at the data. One deputy is always dedicated to the Hill. This is a very large area. I've complained long and loud about the level of service provided to the unincorporated areas versus the cities in the county. I'm a strong advocate of public safety and fire.

SM: While you did not support the latest budget cuts, you did support the three previous cuts. I added funding and positions to the Hemet city police.

CW: I am willing to use and spend reserves on [deputy] staffing. I'll fight for and deny the RSA contribution affected my vote.

Last week, after an initial report of an armed robbery, there was no armed robbery. The deputy would have been here, but an explosion in Sage deflected him.

Q. [For Councilmember Milne]: Hemet has run a budget deficit since you have been on the council. How do you think you will be able to run a whole district?

SM: When I got on the council, there was a \$5-million deficit; now it's \$250,000. Hemet had a lot of problems before I got involved. It is a full-service city and shouldn't be.

One other issue is the need to reduce retirement liabilities, which was a problem long before I got on the council, and still is.

CW: Ms. Milne has been on the council for not quite four years. But she only reversed the \$5-million deficit with the help of former Temecula staff — Shawn Nelson and Gary Thornhill.

SM: Yes, and a lot from Ron Bradley, the Temecula and Murrieta former city manager, who without my vote would not have been approved. Ron Bradley has got-

ten us Shawn Nelson and Gary Thornhill.

Q. What can be done about the cost and time it takes for one to get a building permit? It takes months even for a simple garage and a certificate of compliance.

SM: This is very simple. I've seen both sides and we need to stop deposit agencies. That is absolute extortion. Those who pay move to the front of the line.

We need a level playing field and need to privatize these departments. Then, they have to perform to keep a contract and to keep customers happy. Too many complaints and they lose the contract.

CW: She and I are in agreement. The county process is a mess. Improving it is very high priority. But I'm not sure about this option. It sounds a lot like "pay to play."

One option is to fast track a project if it's deemed to generate enough new jobs. But I know of one fast-track project that has been five years in the process. I'd hate to see it not fast track.

I'm committed to changing this. Every department head and the CEO knows, if it takes another four years, I guarantee change.

Q. [To Supv. Washington]: Did you switch your party registration from Republican to Democrat before or after you decided to lobby for supervisor appointment?

CW: I did switch my party.

Proposition 64 would legalize recreational use of marijuana

Proposition 64 proposes to legalize growing, possession and use of recreational marijuana for persons 21 years or older, subject to certain restrictions.

A “yes” vote would authorize new sales and cultivation taxes, and require licenses for businesses selling and dispensing marijuana for recreational use. A “yes” vote would also affect how use of currently legal medical marijuana is taxed and regulated.

Cities and counties would be able to enact more regulations, restricting where marijuana businesses could be located or completely banning sales of marijuana within their jurisdictions.

Under the measure, smoking marijuana would be permitted in private homes or at businesses licensed for on-site marijuana sale or consumption. Smoking marijuana would remain illegal while driving a vehicle, anywhere smoking tobacco is prohibited and in any other public places.

Possession of up to 28.5 grams (about 1 ounce) of marijuana and 8 grams of concentrated marijuana (such as hash) would be permitted. Possession of any amount would be

illegal on the grounds of a school, day care center or youth center where children are present.

Growing of up to six marijuana plants and keeping those plants within a private home would be permitted. Growing in an area that is open and unlocked, and/or visible from a public place would be illegal.

Legal purchase of marijuana for recreational use would be authorized at state-licensed businesses or through their delivery services. Those businesses could not be located within 600 feet of a school, day care or youth center. Also, businesses licensed to sell or distribute marijuana could not sell tobacco or alcohol. Also, licensed businesses could not allow marijuana consumption on their premises if “within the sight of individuals under the age of 21 or visible from a public place.”

“Giving away,” as opposed to sale, of up to 28.5 grams of marijuana or 8 grams of concentrated marijuana by private persons 21 or older to other adults would be permitted under the measure. Providing marijuana to minors under age 21 for non-medical use would be strictly prohibited.

Prop 64 would create two new excise taxes on recreational marijuana — one

would be a “cultivation” tax of \$9.25 per ounce of marijuana flowers and \$2.75 per ounce for leaves with certain exceptions for growing and sales of medical marijuana; the other would be a 15-percent tax on each retail sale of marijuana. Taxes would be adjusted for inflation beginning in 2020. Local governments could levy more taxes.

The non-partisan California Legislative Analyst’s Office estimates potential tax revenues (new state retail and excise taxes) of from hundreds of millions of dollars to more than \$1 billion annually were this measure to pass. Tax revenues would be deposited in a special state account (the California Marijuana Tax Fund), and distributed first to cover costs of administering and enforcing the measure, and afterward to fund drug research, treatment and enforcement, as well as certain youth, and health and safety programs.

Among the programs funded by taxes are: grants to local health departments and community-based non-profits to support “job placement, mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, to lower or remove to legal barriers to the reentry of prisoners whose sentences have been

reduced as a result of the measure, and medical care for communities disproportionately affected by past federal and state drug policies.” In addition, funds would be directed to youth programs including drug education, prevention and treatment, and to correct and alleviate environmental damage from illegal marijuana growing.

The measure would also establish packaging, labeling, advertising and marketing standards for selling recreational marijuana.

If Prop 64 is approved, individuals already serving sentences for activities made legal under the new law would be eligible for resentencing as well as consequent destruction of records for prior marijuana convictions.

Polls indicate a majority of California voters are leaning toward passage of the measure. Similar measures are on the November ballot in eight other states (Nevada, Maine, Massachusetts and Arizona for legal use of recreational marijuana, and in Florida, Arkansas, Montana and North Dakota for medical marijuana use.)

Supporters have greatly out-raised opponents \$18 million to \$2 million. Supporting organizations include the California Dem-

ocratic, Green, and Peace and Freedom parties, ACLU, California NAACP, United Farm Workers and California Nurses Association. Supporting individuals include Lt. Gov. Gavin Newsome, Napster founder Sean Parker and 2016 presidential candidate and former New Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson.

Supporters argue that Prop 64: has specific safeguards that protect children while allowing responsible adult use of recreational marijuana. It would generate significant tax revenue and decrease law enforcement costs for prosecution of marijuana offenses, as well as provide funding for after-school programs, drug prevention education and drug/alcohol addiction treatment, as well as law enforcement training and research on impaired driving and other programs. It would prevent lawmakers from using generated funds for pet projects by earmarking them for specific uses; and would decrease black market and drug cartel activity relating to marijuana sales.

Opponents include the California Republican and Libertarian parties, California Police Chiefs Association, California Hospital Association, California Association of Highway

Patrolmen, California District Attorneys Association and California State Sheriffs’ Association. Opposing individuals include U.S. Sen. Dianne Feinstein and multiple county sheriffs.

Opponents argue that passage would result in more highway fatalities and more impaired driving. Passage also would negatively affect underprivileged neighborhoods and allow advertising of recreational marijuana businesses and sales, where those advertisements would be able to be read and viewed by anyone under age 21.

Under current federal law, marijuana use, either recreational or medical, is illegal. Currently, however, the U.S. Department of Justice chooses not to prosecute most marijuana users and businesses that follow their state and local marijuana laws and are consistent with federal priorities that include preventing minors from using marijuana and preventing marijuana from being taken across state lines. It remains to be seen what a new administration’s policy would be on federal regulation of marijuana sales in states with approved marijuana sale statutes.

Dr. Raul Ruiz runs for re-election to CD 36

Congressman Dr. Raul Ruiz (D) is running for a third term to represent Congressional District 36. In 2012, he defeated Republican incumbent Mary Bono. In 2014, he defeated Republican challenger Brian Nestande. In each election, Ruiz won with over 52 percent of the vote.

As an incumbent running in a presidential election year with a significant fundraising edge over 2016 Republican challenger state Sen. Jeff Stone (\$2.5 million to \$323,000), Ruiz appears poised to win re-election.

Ruiz, an emergency-room physician prior to election to Congress, has deep roots in the Coachella Valley. The son of farm workers, Ruiz was raised in the valley. He worked his way through college, attending UCLA and Harvard, where he earned three graduate degrees — a medical degree as well as degrees from the Kennedy School of Government and the School of Public Health. He was the first Latino to earn three graduate degrees from Harvard.

On the issues, Ruiz, based on his Congressional voting record, is viewed as a centrist, who is slightly left of center. A Congressional Quarterly analysis of Ruiz's first year in office showed that he voted against President Obama 41 percent of the time and against House Democrats 23 percent of the time.

In interview, Ruiz cited jobs and national security as the most important issues facing the district.

On jobs, Ruiz favors assisting small businesses by decreasing taxes and business regulation. He was instrumental in securing a Small Business Administration office for the Coachella Valley. He also secured \$1 million in federal funds to support local small businesses. "The very first bill I introduced as a member of Congress was the SelectUSA Authorization Act of 2013, which would

provide incentives for global companies and investors to create jobs in the 36th District and across the United States," noted Ruiz. "I am also proud to be a member of the bipartisan Small Business Caucus, which focuses on bringing Democrats and Republicans together to support small-business growth and development."

On national security, Ruiz has voted to fund the military and, as opposed to opponent Stone, believes the Iran nuclear deal has made the world safer. He believes 24/7 monitoring and current inspection protocols are adequate. He cites a recent statement by the new chief of the

Israeli Defense Forces, Gen. Gadi Eisenkot, in which the general stated the Iran deal has removed the most serious danger to Israel's existence for the foreseeable future and greatly reduced the threat over the longer term.

With regard to terrorism, Ruiz supports measures to prevent transportation of goods, money and information that feeds recruitment for and growth of terrorism, both international and domestic. "We must collaborate with other nations in the fight against terrorism," he said. He believes it is both wrong and counterproductive to denigrate Muslims in the U.S. and that doing so helps to curtail the flow of vital information necessary to detect and stop terrorist acts within the United States.

In Syria and Iraq, he stated the U.S. must work toward a diplomatic solution to defeat ISIS. He supports airstrikes and a no-fly zone but opposes boots on the ground. "We must work with all stakeholders to reach a diplomatic solution," he said.

With regard to the Affordable Care Act, he acknowledged that premiums will rise next year but also noted that subsidies are set to increase. He said he would continue to press for improvements to the ACA while maintaining coverage for millions of the newly insured.

"The reasons premiums are going up is that health-care costs are out of control," he said. He supports allowing Medicare to negotiate drug prices. He also supports making more information regarding pricing for health procedures available to consumers. "Consumers should know how much certain operations and procedures will cost, and have conversations with their doctors prior to operations." In July, Ruiz introduced H.R. 5772, the BENES Act of 2016, that would establish a system to educate individuals approaching Medicare eligibility to simplify and modernize the eligibility enrollment process, and to provide for complaints and requests of Medicare beneficiaries

Final decision on May Valley Non-motorized trails Actions and modifications of Alternative 2

May Valley Non-motorized Trails Environmental Assessment Alternative 2 proposed actions:

- Incorporate 3.7 miles of existing authorized forest system trails;
- Adopt 23.3 miles of presently unauthorized trails;
- Reroute and construct 2.2 miles of new trail; and
- Rehabilitate (remove and restore to natural vegetative state) 12.1 miles of unauthorized trails.

Of the 29.2 miles of trail comprising the proposed action:

- 9.6 miles would be class 2 trails, of which 9.2 miles would be adopted and 0.4 mile proposed as new construction.
- 19.6 miles would be class 3 trails, of which approximately 14.1 miles would be adopted.

The final decision makes the following modifications:

- Some routes proposed for adoption in Alternative 2 were not adopted. This includes trails 5 and 31, and a small portion of road 5S05A.
- Some routes that were proposed for adoption in Alternative 3 were adopted in this decision. They were analyzed for adoption in Alternative 3 of the EA. This includes trails 11, 19, 22 and 23b.
- One trailhead — the northern-most trailhead on the May Valley Road, just south of the forest boundary near Saunders Meadow — was proposed in Alternative 2, but is not adopted in this decision.

A month-long show at Idyllwild Arts

“Light is everything; everything that is seen anyway,” said Michael McEwen, designer and principal of McEwen Lighting Studio in Berkeley. McEwen mounts a month-long show of his work at the Parks Exhibition Center on the Idyllwild Arts Academy campus that opened Friday, Oct. 21.

And, in some way, even given his extraordinarily different career track, it has always been about light. He confesses to having, as a teenager, shot out streetlights to preserve the sanctity of moonlight. “I didn’t like artificial light coming through my bedroom window when I would have preferred moonlight,” remembered McEwen.

And it was not just any light, but the magic of primal fire, shifting, ebbing and flowing in a captivating intensity. “There is nothing quite like the intensity of a light filament,” said McEwen. “It is like fire with its reflection and refraction. We have always been drawn to the fire and the hearth. Light allows us to function in an environment.”

Now to McEwen’s career track, which, like refracted filament light, shifted and changed as he grew.

As a boy, he liked to take things apart and put them back together. “There were phases,” he remembered. “There was a guitar garage band phase. Then in my early 20s, a girlfriend who studied flamenco and ballet suggested I take dance classes.”

He did, and even though older than most who begin ballet, McEwen studied and had an eight-year career in ballet until an injury interrupted it at age 29. Then he went to the University of California, Davis, to study textiles.

He worked in creating art in two dimensions for five years until a photographic trip to a junk yard changed his career path and life. “I’ve always been a mechanic, interested in the refuse of society,” he said.

In taking photographs to transfer to silk screen, he became fascinated with refuse and castoffs of our industrial society. “There were 50 acres of scrap metal with 20-foot-high mountains of sewing machines, barbecues, aircraft lights and railroad parts — everything imaginable. I started putting lights together as an excuse to

hang out in salvage yards. But for me, light was critical from the beginning.”

McEwen’s designs are featured during his exhibition. The gallery hours for his show are from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday, and from noon to 5 p.m. Saturday.

“I design for the warmth and romance of the light, wrapped around and seen through the mechanical structure,” he said. “I like to create layers of transparency. I design and fabricate illuminated sculpture with veils of distortion. Transparent glass draws your eye into the structure and then distorts and refracts the light. I live for the mini nirvanas that come when an effect I’ve been chasing down is realized.”

There is no charge for admission to McEwen’s exhibition.

DJ Billy Sheppard provides the music and multiple local organizations provide the expanded food choices. ICC provides the games. Halloween, or All Hallows Eve, has evolved over the centuries to blend celebrations of harvests' end with a night to honor the dead, mixing ancient rituals of mysticism and magic. Trick or treat may have begun in Ireland, Scotland and Wales in the 16th century when people would go from house to house reciting verses in exchange for food. Revelers carried hollowed-out turnips carved with grotesque faces lit by candles meant to represent the spirits of the dead.



that related to their Medicare enrollment.

He notes, with satisfaction, that Congress finally authorized \$1.1 billion to fight the spread of the Zika virus. "I have always viewed the threat as far more serious than the current Republican congressional leadership," said Ruiz. "I was disappointed with the riders attached to the original bill. With the recent passage authorizing the \$1.1 billion, we need to learn from the experience of delaying passage. We should have been out in front of responding to a potential pandemic rather than being reactive."

He said he hopes election of a Democratic president, and appointment of new Supreme Court justices, will allow the overturn of Citizens United. "We need to have more transparency in where funds are coming from with super PACs and to have the names of key donors available for the public to view." To that effect, Ruiz introduced in July of this year the Campaign Spending Integrity Act.

Asked whether he would support public financing for political campaigns, Ruiz said, in principal, he would, depending on how the proposal or bill was drafted.

On gun control, Ruiz argues for a "common-sense" policy, including a ban on gun purchases by those on the federal "no-fly" list; universal background checks; closing of loopholes in sales at gun shows; and restricting possession by "high-risk" individuals, such as the mentally ill, violent offenders and criminals with prior illegal gun use records.

On immigration, Ruiz supports a path to citizenship for millions of undocumented individuals in the U.S. so long as they have been law-abiding, productive members of society. With regard to refugees from Syria, Ruiz would increase the flow for humanitarian reasons as long as entrants are properly vetted.

Ruiz is a member of the House Committee on Natural Resources and is the ranking member of the Subcommittee on Water, Power and Oceans. He also sits on the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs. As a Congressman, Ruiz has sponsored bills in the following areas: armed forces and national security (24%), health (21%), Native Americans (15%), government operations and politics (12%), public lands and natural resources (9%), labor and employment (9%), international affairs (6%) and commerce (6%).

What do Halloween, the 1st Amendment and a Vegetarian Bean Burrito with Salsa have in common?

Hope I piqued your curiosity.

I'll explain. Halloween is once again upon us. So JP, my guiding beacon and news editor, suggested I write about Halloween food like candied apples and such. So when I remind him about his initial offer for me to write about what I choose, I get the lost puppy-dog look, like his input isn't appreciated. That addresses "freedom of the press." My freedom is to say, "No, I don't wanna."

I had the luck, (luck?) to be born on Halloween. Kids can be so cruel in grade school about such things. Some adults find Halloween doesn't fit into their religious belief comfort zone.

Child obesity and diabetes is on the rise "bigly," so downing an entire shopping bag of sugar in a matter of a few days may be huge fun for many, but not the kind of thing a food writer can support or ignore. Candy companies and costume makers are the only winners. Let's not even get into this clown-costume debacle that threatens to ruin the

holiday for many.

So this year, I'm going to offer a totally unrelated topic that is healthful, fun and super easy. We are going to make vegetarian bean burritos with homemade salsa and fresh-cooked beans. If you can fill your kids up with that meal first, then maybe the candy will last a week or more.

Salsa

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 28-oz. can crushed tomatoes
- 1 8-oz. can whole pickled jalapeño peppers
- 1 bunch fresh cilantro
- 1 medium onion
- 1 lime
- 1 fresh jalapeño for extra heat, if desired

DIRECTIONS:

In a bowl, pour crushed tomatoes, then add all the juice from the can of jalapeños. (Don't touch your face or body with pepper juice on your hands.) Slice the stem off the jalapeños and discard, then slice the peppers in half the long way. Using a spoon tip, scoop out the seeds and discard. Finely dice the pepper and add to the bowl.

Finely dice the onion and add to the bowl. Cut the stems off the cilantro and discard, then dice up the leaves and add to the bowl. Squeeze in the juice of half of the lime (no seeds).

For extra heat, do the same with the fresh jalapeño or add some hot sauce. Mix well and taste for heat, add salt and pepper if desired. Feel free to customize.

Beans

INGREDIENTS:

- 2-lb bag of pinto beans — fresh from store, not old ones
- 1 good-sized onion (I like white, but brown will work)

DIRECTIONS:

You need a good-sized crockpot (5 qt. or larger) or you will have to make fewer beans. Beans are often ruined and people are afraid to make them. The usual reason is old

beans take too long to cook. The other main reason is people add salt too soon — it will make them tough.

Rinse beans well in a colander and remove any debris. Place in crockpot with the onion nicely diced. Add boiling water to beans and have the water be 2 inches above the beans. Turn the crockpot on high. Check in an hour and add water to maintain the 2 inches of liquid above the beans. You want that extra water; keep checking.

Bean juice is delicious. At the five-hour mark, check them for tenderness.

If they are soft enough, it's time to salt them. But, if they are not soft, let them keep cooking, even if it's for two or more hours. If the beans are older, they can take up to 20 hours. Usually not, however. When tender, add salt to taste. Make the juice a bit saltier than you think is right as the salt will cook into the beans. Let 'em cook another few hours. Don't jump the gun and salt too soon. Make sure they are tender first.

Some folk cook them overnight and it smells terrific. Just make sure you keep the water level above the beans. Start early in the morning or they will need to go overnight. I was a reluctant bean cooker until Pedro Anderson showed me the way.

This will make a lot of beans. You can freeze some or give some away. They are so much better than canned. Seriously.

Now it's time for dinner. Buy the tortillas of your choice. (I like the 10-inch flour ones, but they are all good.) If you are a vegetarian, make sure the ingredients have no lard.

Warm the tortillas on a pan or any way you choose — just don't burn them or dry them out. Add a pile of beans with a slotted spoon, some shredded cheese and perhaps some avocado. Pile on the salsa, then fold and enjoy. If you like, you can add some meat, but it doesn't need it. Be creative.

If you want to, invite JP over for dinner — just make sure you have craft beer.

If you're still hungry later, then raid the kids' candy bag. Happy Halloween! Boo!



How organizations are voting

ElectionInfo.org has created a helpful tool for voters — a spreadsheet chart that lists the 17 statewide propositions that will be on the Nov. 8, ballot, cross-referenced with 19 major nonprofit organizations' recommendations as to how to vote on them.

The organizations run from the Democratic Party, Peace and Freedom Party, California Labor Federation to the Republican Party, Chamber of Commerce and the California Tea Party.

Hot phones ...

Well, well, well. It seems that a certain presidential political campaign isn't the only thing that is self-implosioning. Sorry, I couldn't help myself.

Nearly 100 people who bought the Samsung Galaxy Note 7 have reported that the phones are overheating, causing skin burns and even catching on fire.

Consequently, Samsung and the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission have officially issued a recall of all Galaxy Note 7 phones sold before Sept. 15. The culprit for what happened appears to be a battery-related manufacturing problem.

A battery is made up of a positive electrode called a cathode and a negative electrode called an anode with both being connected by a liquid called the electrolyte allowing charged particles to move freely. The chemical reactions inside the battery generate electrical energy as electrons or ions flow from one electrode to the other.

Cell phones (just like laptops) use what is called a

lithium ion battery, a very compact, rechargeable battery. Lithium's atomic structure allows these batteries to store a lot of energy. This sounds great unless the battery gets overcharged or the separator between the electrodes is damaged.

Also, if there is a puncture of some kind, the ions would travel through the new path of least resistance, causing a short circuit.

A statistically small chance that this could happen exists for any lithium ion battery — especially with one that is poorly designed or installed. That includes hoverboards of which there have also been reports of some spontaneously combusting.

According to Samsung, the problem occurred because of a production error that put too much pressure on the battery inside some of the first phones to be manufactured. This error squeezed together the cathode and anode, which can cause the short circuit and produce excess heat.

I know what you may be thinking. Why is he piling on Samsung? After all, they did everything they were supposed to do once they were aware of the problem.

The purpose of this column is not to scare anyone away from buying Samsung products, but rather to give you insight as to how the problem arose and the specifics behind it.

I just got another recall for my Toyota Corolla but that won't keep me from buying a Toyota for my next car.

If I really wanted to scare you, I would include a link at the bottom to that famous scene from the movie "Law Abiding Citizen" (if curious, feel free to YouTube: "Law Abiding Citizen Cell Phone"). Now that you've seen it, all I have left to say is Happy Halloween!




Echolocation

How do you get around in the dark? You use your eyes, right? While large bats may rely on their eyes to find their way around in the dark, smaller bats depend more on echolocation. They send sound waves into their environment and listen to the echoes to determine where everything is.

Bats make sounds through their mouth, often at such a high frequency that humans cannot hear them. They wait for the echoes and use the timing and loudness of them to determine the location, size and type of things around them.

Through echolocation, small bats can move easily through total darkness. They can get to areas where other animals cannot and find food to eat late at night.

Jerry Holddber of Pine Cove was appointed to represent Riverside County Supervisorial District 3 on the county's Emergency Medical Care Committee.

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
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

were not in support of rescuing the 70-year old fixture.

According to Wilson, more than half the respondents would like to see Town Hall continued to be used for community purposes until a new venue is available.

The most frequent suggestion was to use the structure for "community events" and children's activities. More specifically, many respondents recommended or encouraged its future use as a "performing arts building for the two professional theater companies in need of a venue that could be shared." Plays and concerts were mentioned often in the surveys.

Another frequent suggestion was a location for dance classes — ballroom, line or children's.

A few people continue to want to see the traditional events, such as the Harvest Festival and the Quilt Show, return to Town Hall. And several parents are dependent on the afterschool program continuing.

Wilson has shared the survey documents with the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board, overseeing the new Idyllwild Community Center. Board President Janice Lyle said, "The SJMCC board, along with the Programs and Activities Committee, will review the surveys and include that input in their analysis of community desires as they plan future recreation programs."

Although four respondents were not supportive of maintaining the facility at any cost, this comment summarizes the prevalent sentiment and recognizes the changes needed to make it into a functional facility for local events:

"Our Town Hall has been our historical meeting hall since Ernie Maxwell's days. It would be a shame to toss out its aspect as part of mountain culture. It needs a makeover — the stage needs stairs on either side, a back room or basement for an offstage room for a scrim and most especially taking off that awful ceiling and replacing with great sound acoustical tiles."

And as another respondent said, "I cannot imagine not having the Town Hall involved in our community. We need it, it's part of Idyllwild."

his second season as a firefighter and a resident of San Jacinto; and Pablo Cerda, 23, also in his second season as a firefighter and a resident of Fountain Valley.

By 4 a.m., the Engine 57 crew had joined with four other Forest Service crews at the command post near Cabazon. They were then assigned to help with evacuations and protect homes in the Twin Pines area off of Highway 243. They eventually deployed to defend an octagonal house in the Twin Pines area. The terrain in the area was tricky, the roads narrow and the winds continued to grow in intensity, fueled by the fire's growing heat.

Wind and billowing smoke made flying tankers into the fire impossible in the early hours of the fire, leaving the ground crews to battle the blaze.

Soon, 50 mph winds, coupled with the rugged terrain, and plenty of dry brush and fire fuel had created a firestorm of extraordinary danger. Shortly after 7 a.m., radio communication with Engine 57 grew silent.

Three of the five member crew died at the house. Both Loutzenhiser and Cerda were transported to the Arrowhead Regional Medical Center but later died from their injuries.

For Idyllwild, small and close knit town that it is, the loss was deeply personal. It is a community where most people know their neighbors and many knew the Loutzenhiser family and other members of the Engine 57 crew.

"It's always been difficult each year since," said Maria Loutzenhiser, Mark's widow. "But for me, God and my faith have helped me and my family to get through. This community and its support have made such a difference.

"I've lived here all my life and the support of family and friends, the love and support from everywhere, has been so important. And the support of our fire family has been important — we've stayed in touch over the years. The prayers of the community have kept us going, and for that we will always be grateful."

No danger to Fern Valley Water budget and water

The Fern Valley Water District budget appears to be in fine shape after the first quarter of the fiscal year 2016-17, which began July 1. While revenues are \$200,000, or 19 percent of the projected total, that represents just two billing periods and no property tax revenue, which the county will begin to distribute to special districts in December.

Expenses have been \$282,000, including almost \$100,000 from the capital budget for the purchase of three new vehicles.

Water conditions are normal and General Manager Victor Jimenez reported that the groundwater level for the wells "... show minor increases and decreases in all wells."

Stream flow in Tahquitz Creek has been sufficient to enable FVWD to supplement its well production. Wells supplied about 50 percent this year and also in September 2015.

Total water production has declined the past two months, Jimenez reported. Cooler temperatures and less irrigation appear to have contributed to the lower water use, he said.

Jimenez has continued to monitor for potential leaks and reported none were found during September. He added that FVWD staff has "tested several customers' meters to dispel the theories of faulty meters as the reason for high bills."

In response to Jimenez's description of how the district handles unexpected high customer water use, board President Jim Rees said, "I'm glad the staff follows up and determines the cause."

"It's really unusual not to find a [customer's leak], but we want to make sure the problem is resolved and we did what we could to help," Jimenez replied. "We definitely reach out to the customers so that they can fix it as soon as possible."

A draft version of a new set of rules and regulations policies for FVWD was given to the committee, composed of directors Robert Krieger and Rees, for review.

scheduled. He said, "We're all very excited to get to this point [and] don't expect anything unusual nor does the planning staff." While the Riverside County Board of Supervisors must approve the commission's decision, Marsh expects construction to begin in early 2017.

According to the planning staff's findings, the project is consistent with the policies of the multi-purpose elements of the general plan and the RE-MAP. Further, "Strawberry Creek and the associated riparian [and] ravine areas will be completely avoided by the project activities." This includes the sensitive areas along the creek.

In addition, the staff highlighted that the current planning designation allows for commercial retail development, and the

proposed project will cause significantly less affect on the local environs.

"We aren't aware of any outstanding concern on the staff's part," said Janice Lyle, president of the SJMCC board, "This is a definite step forward."

If the planning commission grants it approval, Lyle said, the construction bids would be solicited, so that they can be poised to begin work once the supervisors take action, which she expects will be after New Year's.

The construction of the future community center and other facilities are part of the CUP revision, but will also depend upon the availability of water from the Idyllwild Water District and the fire department's concurrence, too.

Regarding the availability of water, Phayvanh Nanthavongdouangsy, the county planner, wrote, "potable water services and sanitary sewer services

[are] from Idyllwild Water District. Water availability in this area is limited; therefore to mitigate impacts to water services, each phase of the project (Phase I-Phase IV) will require a will-serve letter from the water district to proceed forward. ... prior to the issuance of a building permit. This will ensure that water is available to support that phase of the project and that impacts to water services is mitigated to a level that is less than significant."

One area, for which the county required additional mitigation, is the grove oak trees on the site. Inventory and mitigation plans were required to be prepared. While the planned development is designed to avoid negative effects on the oak trees, the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board has agreed, as part of the plan, to replace trees if necessary.

Fire financials on track for first half of fiscal year

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District's first-quarter budget ended in a deficit, but this is typical for the first quarter of the fiscal year, according to Monday's finance committee report. IFPD does not begin to receive property tax revenue from the county until mid-December.

Revenues have been slightly more than \$400,000 in the first quarter, of which about 87 percent has been derived from ambulance services and reimbursement for mutual-aid fire support (fires off the Hill).

For the first quarter, IFPD's expenses have been about \$480,000, of which nearly 80 percent has been salaries and benefits. Some of those costs are attributable to sending crews to fires off the Hill.

However, one employee's overtime is noteworthy. In regular overtime pay (exclusive of overtime for non-district fires), Battalion Chief Mark LaMont has earned nearly \$13,400 in the first quarter. This is more than the total overtime for the rest of the department.

Including the mutual-aid (non-district fires) overtime, LaMont's total overtime during these three months has been almost \$27,750, or 135 percent of his regular pay of \$20,750 for the period. The rest of the staff has earned about \$25,000 in all from time at mutual-aid fires.

Legal costs have been about \$10,700, less than 20 percent of the budget for fiscal year 2016-17. Fire Chief Patrick Reitz said he expects no surprises and the legal costs are back to normal in the near term. IFPD is in an ongoing legal battle with former Capt. James Reyes.

While the finance committee did not have complete financial reports, Reitz told Committee Chair Calvin Gogerty that the accounting consultant Rob Dennis had been working to bring the new system up-to-date for use this fall.

"Our hope was he would be ready for the October financial meeting and have the first quarter done. He is very close," Reitz said.

And Commissioner Nancy Layton, also a member of the committee, said they are still looking for two more members.

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Forest Service releases May Valley draft decision

The U.S. Forest Service has announced a draft decision for its May Valley non-motorized trails project. A draft environmental assessment was released for comment and review in June.

San Jacinto District Ranger Arturo Delgado decided to implement Alternative 2, with modifications, from the "May Valley Non-motorized Trails Environmental Assessment." In choosing Alternative 2, Delgado made some modifications. Alternative 2 and its modifications are described in the accompanying box.

"Once we're final, we'll move forward with implementation," said John Ladley, supervisory natural resource specialist on the San Jacinto Ranger District. "Bringing the trails up to standard will be a phased approach."

Since the draft Environmental Assessment was released for review in June, the district received about 72 letters with comments. Based on these, Delgado made adjustments to the original proposed action. For example, based on concerns over trespassing in areas where the trails are near private property, "This decision reduces impacts on those parties by: rerouting some trails away from private property boundaries; not adopting some other routes adjacent to the communities," and several other modifications.

Proposal

The proposed project adopts about 22 miles of existing trails and roads into the National Forest Transportation System, constructs about 2.5 miles of new trails, rehabilitates about 10.5 miles of unauthorized routes, reroutes some segments of existing trails, improves trail crossings at streams, and constructs two new trailheads, within the approximately 5,500-acre project area.

The northern portion of the project is zoned as "Back Country." The southeastern portion of the project area is zoned as "Back Country (Motorized Use Restricted)." Both zones are suitable for non-motorized travel on forest system roads and trails. The management intent for both areas is to retain the natural character of the zone and limit the level and type of development.

Objections

Last week, the Forest Service circulated this draft de-

cision. Objections will only be accepted from those who submitted project-specific written comments during scoping or the draft EA comment periods. Issues raised in objections must be based on previously submitted comments unless based on new information arising after the designated comment period(s).

The Forest Service has stressed that objections must be submitted within 45 days following the publication of the legal notice in the Idyllwild Town Crier, which was Oct. 20. The date of the legal notice is the exclusive means for calculating the time to file an objection. Those wishing to object should not rely upon dates or timeframes provided by any other source. It is the objector's responsibility to ensure evidence of timely receipt (36 CFR 218.9).

Objections must be submitted to the reviewing officer: Forest Supervisor Jody Noiron, San Bernardino National Forest, USDA Forest Service, Attn: May Valley Non-Motorized Trails Project, 602 South Tippecanoe Ave., San Bernardino, CA 92408. Objections may be submitted via mail, fax to 909-383-5770 or hand delivered during business hours (Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.). Objections may also be submitted electronically to: comments-pacificsouthwest-san-bernardino@usda.gov with Subject: May Valley Non-Motorized Trails.

Objections must (36 CFR 218.8(d)): 1) include name, address and telephone number; 2) include signature or other verification of authorship; 3) identify a single lead objector when applicable; 4) include project name, responsible official's name and title, and name of affected national forest(s) and/or ranger district(s); 5) include reasons for, and suggested remedies to resolve, your objections; and, 6) include a description of the connection between your objections and your prior comments. Incorporate documents by reference only as provided for at 36 CFR 218.8(b).



Final on the 3rd District debates

On Oct. 6, Supv. Chuck Washington and Hemet Council member Shellie Mine, candidates for the Riverside County 3rd District supervisor's seat, were in Idyllwild to share their views and vision for the Hill and the county.

The members of the audience posed all of the questions to the candidates. The questions were Hill-centric. The candidates were candid and prepared sound bites were not the tone of the evening.

This is the third part of the questions and the candidates' responses.

Rather than repeat the questions in the order asked, they have been organized by subject so that the totality of the responses can be together rather than separated and disparate.

State Fire Fee and County Fire Department costs

Q. Although a state "program," how do you feel about the Fire Prevention Fee? If it were up to you, would you abolish it?

CW: I have no jurisdiction over the fire fee. But I would send a letter to the governor to abolish it.

SM: Fee is unnecessary and should be a local fee.

Q. Given the state of the county budget and decreasing reserves, what are you proposing to do to get control of the annually recurring budget overruns with the sheriff's and fire departments?

CW: The fire department is not operating in a deficit state. The departments with challenges now are the sheriff and district attorney. Out of respect, I wasn't on the board in 2012 when it voted substantial pay raises. I'm left with the pieces as it crumbles.

Part of the county deficit is the \$40 million increase from a lawsuit for the health care of individuals incarcerated in our jails.

When I look at the projections, I see light at the end of the tunnel. In two or three years, it will be a lot better and we'll still have \$150 to \$175 million in reserves, which will begin to climb.

SM: It's not good enough to sit around. We need performance audits of the sheriff and fire and every other department. Going forward in 10 or 20 or 30 years, need to rein things in and decrease county employees. County citizens will need to decrease the unfunded liabilities.

Q. In a follow-up question, Washington was asked: Please clarify your statement that county fire is not a deficit budget when county fire submitted a \$30-million budget overrun in April 2016?

CW: The county fire chief's budget was balanced. They are not asking for more money. Perhaps [Idyllwild Fire] Chief [Patrick] Reitz has a different opinion.

[In the County's initial 2016-17 budget document, the county executive's staff described the county fire department's request as, "The fire department reports that its previously projected deficit of \$1.3 million has been fully reduced and the department is on target to bring in its budget within its net county cost allocated for FY 15/16."]

Campaign Financing

Q. Please identify your single largest contributor to each of your campaigns by name and approximate dollar amount?

CW: I have more than 300 pages of donors identified. But two accountants from Hemet each gave \$25,000 — Todd and Michael Foutz.

SM: My largest donor is Wayne Minor. Including the primary election, he has contributed \$85,000.

Q. To Supv. Washington, please disclose for the au-

dience approximately how much money each of the Cal Fire/Riverside County firefighters' unions and sheriff's employees' unions have contributed to your campaign?

CW: The firefighters have given \$4,000 and the Riverside Sheriffs' Association has contributed \$25,000. That is significantly less than the \$68,000 they gave to my opponent as in-kind contributions in the primary.

The Hemet police have promised \$5,000 but I haven't seen the check.

Miscellaneous

Q. [For Supv. Washington]: How can we get sheriff deputies' presence up here?

CW: Look at the data. One deputy is always dedicated to the Hill. This is a very large area. I've complained long and loud about the level of service provided to the unincorporated areas versus the cities in the county. I'm a strong advocate of public safety and fire.

SM: While you did not support the latest budget cuts, you did support the three previous cuts. I added funding and positions to the Hemet city police.

CW: I am willing to use and spend reserves on [deputy] staffing. I'll fight for and deny the RSA contribution affected my vote.

Last week, after an initial report of an armed robbery, there was no armed robbery. The deputy would have been here, but an explosion in Sage deflected him.

Q. [For Councilmember Milne]: Hemet has run a budget deficit since you have been on the council. How do you think you will be able to run a whole district?

SM: When I got on the council, there was a \$5-million deficit; now it's \$250,000. Hemet had a lot of problems before I got involved. It is a full-service city and shouldn't be.

One other issue is the need to reduce retirement liabilities, which was a problem long before I got on the council, and still is.

CW: Ms. Milne has been on the council for not quite four years. But she only reversed the \$5-million deficit with the help of former Temecula staff — Shawn Nelson and Gary Thornhill.

SM: Yes, and a lot from Ron Bradley, the Temecula and Murrieta former city manager, who without my vote would not have been approved. Ron Bradley has got-

ten us Shawn Nelson and Gary Thornhill.

Q. What can be done about the cost and time it takes for one to get a building permit? It takes months even for a simple garage and a certificate of compliance.

SM: This is very simple. I've seen both sides and we need to stop deposit agencies. That is absolute extortion. Those who pay move to the front of the line.

We need a level playing field and need to privatize these departments. Then, they have to perform to keep a contract and to keep customers happy. Too many complaints and they lose the contract.

CW: She and I are in agreement. The county process is a mess. Improving it is very high priority. But I'm not sure about this option. It sounds a lot like "pay to play."

One option is to fast track a project if it's deemed to generate enough new jobs. But I know of one fast-track project that has been five years in the process. I'd hate to see it not fast track.

I'm committed to changing this. Every department head and the CEO knows, if it takes another four years, I guarantee change.

Q. [To Supv. Washington]: Did you switch your party registration from Republican to Democrat before or after you decided to lobby for supervisor appointment?

CW: I did switch my party.

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Proposition 64 would legalize recreational use of marijuana

Proposition 64 proposes to legalize growing, possession and use of recreational marijuana for persons 21 years or older, subject to certain restrictions.

A "yes" vote would authorize new sales and cultivation taxes, and require licenses for businesses selling and dispensing marijuana for recreational use. A "yes" vote would also affect how use of currently legal medical marijuana is taxed and regulated.

Cities and counties would be able to enact more regulations, restricting where marijuana businesses could be located or completely banning sales of marijuana within their jurisdictions.

Under the measure, smoking marijuana would be permitted in private homes or at businesses licensed for on-site marijuana sale or consumption. Smoking marijuana would remain illegal while driving a vehicle, anywhere smoking tobacco is prohibited and in any other public places.

Possession of up to 28.5 grams (about 1 ounce) of marijuana and 8 grams of concentrated marijuana (such as hash) would be permitted. Possession of any amount would be

illegal on the grounds of a school, day care center or youth center where children are present.

Growing of up to six marijuana plants and keeping those plants within a private home would be permitted. Growing in an area that is open and unlocked, and/or visible from a public place would be illegal.

Legal purchase of marijuana for recreational use would be authorized at state-licensed businesses or through their delivery services. Those businesses could not be located within 600 feet of a school, day care or youth center. Also, businesses licensed to sell or distribute marijuana could not sell tobacco or alcohol. Also, licensed businesses could not allow marijuana consumption on their premises if "within the sight of individuals under the age of 21 or visible from a public place."

"Giving away," as opposed to sale, of up to 28.5 grams of marijuana or 8 grams of concentrated marijuana by private persons 21 or older to other adults would be permitted under the measure. Providing marijuana to minors under age 21 for non-medical use would be strictly prohibited.

Prop 64 would create two new excise taxes on recreational marijuana — one

would be a "cultivation" tax of \$9.25 per ounce of marijuana flowers and \$2.75 per ounce for leaves with certain exceptions for growing and sales of medical marijuana; the other would be a 15-percent tax on each retail sale of marijuana. Taxes would be adjusted for inflation beginning in 2020. Local governments could levy more taxes.

The non-partisan California Legislative Analyst's Office estimates potential tax revenues (new state retail and excise taxes) of from hundreds of millions of dollars to more than \$1 billion annually were this measure to pass. Tax revenues would be deposited in a special state account (the California Marijuana Tax Fund), and distributed first to cover costs of administering and enforcing the measure, and afterward to fund drug research, treatment and enforcement, as well as certain youth, and health and safety programs.

Among the programs funded by taxes are: grants to local health departments and community-based non-profits to support "job placement, mental health treatment, substance use disorder treatment, to lower or remove to legal barriers to the reentry of prisoners whose sentences have been

reduced as a result of the measure, and medical care for communities disproportionately affected by past federal and state drug policies." In addition, funds would be directed to youth programs including drug education, prevention and treatment, and to correct and alleviate environmental damage from illegal marijuana growing.

The measure would also establish packaging, labeling, advertising and marketing standards for selling recreational marijuana.

If Prop 64 is approved, individuals already serving sentences for activities made legal under the new law would be eligible for resentencing as well as consequent destruction of records for prior marijuana convictions.

Polls indicate a majority of California voters are leaning toward passage of the measure. Similar measures are on the November ballot in eight other states (Nevada, Maine, Massachusetts and Arizona for legal use of recreational marijuana, and in Florida, Arkansas, Montana and North Dakota for medical marijuana use.)

Supporters have greatly out-raised opponents \$18 million to \$2 million. Supporting organizations include the California Dem-

ocratic, Green, and Peace and Freedom parties, ACLU, California NAACP, United Farm Workers and California Nurses Association. Supporting individuals include Lt. Gov. Gavin Newsome, Napster founder Sean Parker and 2016 presidential candidate and former New Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson.

Supporters argue that Prop 64: has specific safeguards that protect children while allowing responsible adult use of recreational marijuana. It would generate significant tax revenue and decrease law enforcement costs for prosecution of marijuana offenses, as well as provide funding for after-school programs, drug prevention education and drug/alcohol addiction treatment, as well as law enforcement training and research on impaired driving and other programs. It would prevent lawmakers from using generated funds for pet projects by earmarking them for specific uses; and would decrease black market and drug cartel activity relating to marijuana sales.

Opponents include the California Republican and Libertarian parties, California Police Chiefs Association, California Hospital Association, California Association of Highway

Patrolmen, California District Attorneys Association and California State Sheriffs' Association. Opposing individuals include U.S. Sen. Dianne Feinstein and multiple county sheriffs.

Opponents argue that passage would result in more highway fatalities and more impaired driving. Passage also would negatively affect underprivileged neighborhoods and allow advertising of recreational marijuana businesses and sales, where those advertisements would be able to be read and viewed by anyone under age 21.

Under current federal law, marijuana use, either recreational or medical, is illegal. Currently, however, the U.S. Department of Justice chooses not to prosecute most marijuana users and businesses that follow their state and local marijuana laws and are consistent with federal priorities that include preventing minors from using marijuana and preventing marijuana from being taken across state lines. It remains to be seen what a new administration's policy would be on federal regulation of marijuana sales in states with approved marijuana sale statutes.

Dr. Raul Ruiz runs for re-election to CD 36

As an incumbent running in a presidential election year with a significant fundraising edge over 2016 Republican challenger state Sen. Jeff Stone (\$2.5 million to \$323,000), Ruiz appears poised to win re-election.

Ruiz, an emergency-room physician prior to election to Congress, has deep roots in the Coachella Valley. The son of farm workers, Ruiz was raised in the valley. He worked his way through college, attending UCLA and Harvard, where he earned three graduate degrees — a medical degree as well as degrees from the Kennedy School of Government and the School of Public Health. He was the first Latino to earn three graduate degrees from Harvard.

On the issues, Ruiz, based on his Congressional voting record, is viewed as a centrist, who is slightly left of center. A Congressional Quarterly analysis of Ruiz's first year in office showed that he voted against President Obama 41 percent of the time and against House Democrats 23 percent of the time.

In interview, Ruiz cited jobs and national security as the most important issues facing the district.

On jobs, Ruiz favors assisting small businesses by decreasing taxes and business regulation. He was instrumental in securing a Small Business Administration office for the Coachella Valley. He also secured \$1 million in federal funds to support local small businesses. "The very first bill I introduced as a member of Congress was the SelectUSA Authorization Act of 2013, which would

provide incentives for global companies and investors to create jobs in the 36th District and across the United States," noted Ruiz. "I am also proud to be a member of the bipartisan Small Business Caucus, which focuses on bringing Democrats and Republicans together to support small-business growth and development."

On national security, Ruiz has voted to fund the military and, as opposed to opponent Stone, believes the Iran nuclear deal has made the world safer. He believes 24/7 monitoring and current inspection protocols are adequate. He cites a recent statement by the new chief of the

Israeli Defense Forces, Gen. Gadi Eisenkot, in which the general stated the Iran deal has removed the most serious danger to Israel's existence for the foreseeable future and greatly reduced the threat over the longer term.

With regard to terrorism, Ruiz supports measures to prevent transportation of goods, money and information that feeds recruitment for and growth of terrorism, both international and domestic. "We must collaborate with other nations in the fight against terrorism," he said. He believes it is both wrong and counterproductive to denigrate Muslims in the U.S. and that doing so helps to curtail the flow of vital information necessary to detect and stop terrorist acts within the United States.

In Syria and Iraq, he stated the U.S. must work toward a diplomatic solution to defeat ISIS. He supports airstrikes and a no-fly zone but opposes boots on the ground. "We must work with all stakeholders to reach a diplomatic solution," he said.

With regard to the Affordable Care Act, he acknowledged that premiums will rise next year but also noted that subsidies are set to increase. He said he would continue to press for improvements to the ACA while maintaining coverage for millions of the newly insured.

"The reasons premiums are going up is that health-care costs are out of control," he said. He supports allowing Medicare to negotiate drug prices. He also supports making more information regarding pricing for health procedures available to consumers. "Consumers should know how much certain operations and procedures will cost, and have conversations with their doctors prior to operations." In July, Ruiz introduced H.R. 5772, the BENES Act of 2016, that would establish a system to educate individuals approaching Medicare eligibility to simplify and modernize the eligibility enrollment process, and to provide for complaints and requests of Medicare beneficiaries

Final decision on May Valley Non-motorized trails Actions and modifications of Alternative 2

May Valley Non-motorized Trails Environmental Assessment Alternative 2 proposed actions:

- Incorporate 3.7 miles of existing authorized forest system trails;
- Adopt 23.3 miles of presently unauthorized trails;
- Reroute and construct 2.2 miles of new trail; and
- Rehabilitate (remove and restore to natural vegetative state) 12.1 miles of unauthorized trails.

Of the 29.2 miles of trail comprising the proposed action:

- 9.6 miles would be class 2 trails, of which 9.2 miles would be adopted and 0.4 mile proposed as new construction.
- 19.6 miles would be class 3 trails, of which approximately 14.1 miles would be adopted.

The final decision makes the following modifications:

- Some routes proposed for adoption in Alternative 2 were not adopted. This includes trails 5 and 31, and a small portion of road 5S05A.
- Some routes that were proposed for adoption in Alternative 3 were adopted in this decision. They were analyzed for adoption in Alternative 3 of the EA. This includes trails 11, 19, 22 and 23b.
- One trailhead — the northern-most trailhead on the May Valley Road, just south of the forest boundary near Saunders Meadow — was proposed in Alternative 2, but is not adopted in this decision.

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Michael McEwen designs with light and water

A month-long show at Idyllwild Arts

“Light is everything; everything that is seen anyway,” said Michael McEwen, designer and principal of McEwen Lighting Studio in Berkeley. McEwen mounts a month-long show of his work at the Parks Exhibition Center on the Idyllwild Arts Academy campus that opened Friday, Oct. 21.

And, in some way, even given his extraordinarily different career track, it has always been about light. He confesses to having, as a teenager, shot out streetlights to preserve the sanctity of moonlight. “I didn’t like artificial light coming through my bedroom window when I would have preferred moonlight,” remembered McEwen.

And it was not just any light, but the magic of primal fire, shifting, ebbing and flowing in a captivating intensity. “There is nothing quite like the intensity of a light filament,” said McEwen. “It is like fire with its reflection and refraction. We have always been drawn to the fire and the hearth. Light allows us to function in an environment.”

Now to McEwen’s career track, which, like refracted filament light, shifted and changed as he grew.

As a boy, he liked to take things apart and put them back together. “There were phases,” he remembered. “There was a guitar garage band phase. Then in my early 20s, a girlfriend who studied flamenco and ballet suggested I take dance classes.”

He did, and even though older than most who begin ballet, McEwen studied and had an eight-year career in ballet until an injury interrupted it at age 29. Then he went to the University of California, Davis, to study textiles.

He worked in creating art in two dimensions for five years until a photographic trip to a junk yard changed his career path and life. “I’ve always been a mechanic, interested in the refuse of society,” he said.

In taking photographs to transfer to silk screen, he became fascinated with refuse and castoffs of our industrial society. “There were 50 acres of scrap metal with 20-foot-high mountains of sewing machines, barbecues, aircraft lights and railroad parts — everything imaginable. I started putting lights together as an excuse to

hang out in salvage yards. But for me, light was critical from the beginning.”

McEwen’s designs are featured during his exhibition. The gallery hours for his show are from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday, and from noon to 5 p.m. Saturday.

“I design for the warmth and romance of the light, wrapped around and seen through the mechanical structure,” he said. “I like to create layers of transparency. I design and fabricate illuminated sculpture with veils of distortion. Transparent glass draws your eye into the structure and then distorts and refracts the light. I live for the mini nirvanas that come when an effect I’ve been chasing down is realized.”

There is no charge for admission to McEwen’s exhibition.

As gusting winds blew leaves through the air and light filtered from the windows of homes casting shadows that caused us to look over our shoulders, we overcame our fears and continued onward with our treat-obsessed pursuits. It was the one festival night devoted to what is scary, what is unknown and what is hidden.

In Idyllwild, the community has created a Halloween with more fun than fright, with the exception of Kathy

Sacher Wilson's Idyllwild Haunted Hotel. There the fear is celebrated as the hotel's history of unexplained and macabre deaths is unreeled to daring customers brave enough to move through the hotel's darkened rooms. It opens from 7 to 9:30 p.m., Friday through Monday, at Town Hall.

The parade begins at 4:15 p.m. Monday, Oct. 31, at the top of North Circle, and costumed participants, both two- and four-footed, strut and amble down to the town square. Along the way, merchants on the parade route provide treats to young and old. The Candy Cupboard, near the town square, will provide hot cider for any feeling the chill

of the approaching night. Singer suggested parade watchers could also bring candy to give to those in the parade.

Then, carnival festivities begin at 5 p.m. in and around the area in front of the Fort and end at 8 p.m. Singer said the Idyllwild HELP Center this year conducts the costume contest for people, and ARF does the honors for the four-footed. DJ Billy Sheppard provides the music and multiple local organizations provide the expanded food choices. ICC provides the games. Arm-bands, \$5 each, are sold at the carnival entrance and allow participation in all carnival games.

The Idyllwild Outdoor Education Boosters Club is again providing the popular cake walk with separate tickets for participants.

Halloween, or All Hallows Eve, has evolved over the centuries to blend celebrations of harvests' end with a night to honor the dead, mixing ancient rituals of mysticism and magic. Trick or treat may have begun in Ireland, Scotland and Wales in the 16th century when people would go from house to house reciting verses in exchange for food. Revelers carried hollowed-out turnips carved with grotesque faces lit by candles meant to represent the spirits of the dead.



that related to their Medicare enrollment.

He notes, with satisfaction, that Congress finally authorized \$1.1 billion to fight the spread of the Zika virus. "I have always viewed the threat as far more serious than the current Republican congressional leadership," said Ruiz. "I was disappointed with the riders attached to the original bill. With the recent passage authorizing the \$1.1 billion, we need to learn from the experience of delaying passage. We should have been out in front of responding to a potential pandemic rather than being reactive."

He said he hopes election of a Democratic president, and appointment of new Supreme Court justices, will allow the overturn of Citizens United. "We need to have more transparency in where funds are coming from with super PACs and to have the names of key donors available for the public to view." To that effect, Ruiz introduced in July of this year the Campaign Spending Integrity Act.

Asked whether he would support public financing for political campaigns, Ruiz said, in principal, he would, depending on how the proposal or bill was drafted.

On gun control, Ruiz argues for a "common-sense" policy, including a ban on gun purchases by those on the federal "no-fly" list; universal background checks; closing of loopholes in sales at gun shows; and restricting possession by "high-risk" individuals, such as the mentally ill, violent offenders and criminals with prior illegal gun use records.

On immigration, Ruiz supports a path to citizenship for millions of undocumented individuals in the U.S. so long as they have been law-abiding, productive members of society. With regard to refugees from Syria, Ruiz would increase the flow for humanitarian reasons as long as entrants are properly vetted.

Ruiz is a member of the House Committee on Natural Resources and is the ranking member of the Subcommittee on Water, Power and Oceans. He also sits on the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs. As a Congressman, Ruiz has sponsored bills in the following areas: armed forces and national security (24%), health (21%), Native Americans (15%), government operations and politics (12%), public lands and natural resources (9%), labor and employment (9%), international affairs (6%) and commerce (6%).

What do Halloween, the 1st Amendment and a Vegetarian Bean Burrito with Salsa have in common?

Hope I piqued your curiosity.

I'll explain. Halloween is once again upon us. So JP, my guiding beacon and news editor, suggested I write about Halloween food like candied apples and such. So when I remind him about his initial offer for me to write about what I choose, I get the lost puppy-dog look, like his input isn't appreciated. That addresses "freedom of the press." My freedom is to say, "No, I don't wanna."

I had the luck, (luck?) to be born on Halloween. Kids can be so cruel in grade school about such things. Some adults find Halloween doesn't fit into their religious belief comfort zone.

Child obesity and diabetes is on the rise "bigly," so downing an entire shopping bag of sugar in a matter of a few days may be huge fun for many, but not the kind of thing a food writer can support or ignore. Candy companies and costume makers are the only winners. Let's not even get into this clown-costume debacle that threatens to ruin the

holiday for many.

So this year, I'm going to offer a totally unrelated topic that is healthful, fun and super easy. We are going to make vegetarian bean burritos with homemade salsa and fresh-cooked beans. If you can fill your kids up with that meal first, then maybe the candy will last a week or more.

Salsa

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 28-oz. can crushed tomatoes
- 1 8-oz. can whole pickled jalapeño peppers
- 1 bunch fresh cilantro
- 1 medium onion
- 1 lime
- 1 fresh jalapeño for extra heat, if desired

DIRECTIONS:

In a bowl, pour crushed tomatoes, then add all the juice from the can of jalapeños. (Don't touch your face or body with pepper juice on your hands.) Slice the stem off the jalapeños and discard, then slice the peppers in half the long way. Using a spoon tip, scoop out the seeds and discard. Finely dice the pepper and add to the bowl.

Finely dice the onion and add to the bowl. Cut the stems off the cilantro and discard, then dice up the leaves and add to the bowl. Squeeze in the juice of half of the lime (no seeds).

For extra heat, do the same with the fresh jalapeño or add some hot sauce. Mix well and taste for heat, add salt and pepper if desired. Feel free to customize.

Beans

INGREDIENTS:

- 2-lb bag of pinto beans — fresh from store, not old ones
- 1 good-sized onion (I like white, but brown will work)

DIRECTIONS:

You need a good-sized crockpot (5 qt. or larger) or you will have to make fewer beans. Beans are often ruined and people are afraid to make them. The usual reason is old

beans take too long to cook. The other main reason is people add salt too soon — it will make them tough.

Rinse beans well in a colander and remove any debris. Place in crockpot with the onion nicely diced. Add boiling water to beans and have the water be 2 inches above the beans. Turn the crockpot on high. Check in an hour and add water to maintain the 2 inches of liquid above the beans. You want that extra water; keep checking.

Bean juice is delicious. At the five-hour mark, check them for tenderness.

If they are soft enough, it's time to salt them. But, if they are not soft, let them keep cooking, even if it's for two or more hours. If the beans are older, they can take up to 20 hours. Usually not, however. When tender, add salt to taste. Make the juice a bit saltier than you think is right as the salt will cook into the beans. Let 'em cook another few hours. Don't jump the gun and salt too soon. Make sure they are tender first.

Some folk cook them overnight and it smells terrific. Just make sure you keep the water level above the beans. Start early in the morning or they will need to go overnight. I was a reluctant bean cooker until Pedro Anderson showed me the way.

This will make a lot of beans. You can freeze some or give some away. They are so much better than canned. Seriously.

Now it's time for dinner. Buy the tortillas of your choice. (I like the 10-inch flour ones, but they are all good.) If you are a vegetarian, make sure the ingredients have no lard.

Warm the tortillas on a pan or any way you choose — just don't burn them or dry them out. Add a pile of beans with a slotted spoon, some shredded cheese and perhaps some avocado. Pile on the salsa, then fold and enjoy. If you like, you can add some meat, but it doesn't need it. Be creative.

If you want to, invite JP over for dinner — just make sure you have craft beer.

If you're still hungry later, then raid the kids' candy bag. Happy Halloween! Boo!





How organizations are voting

ElectionInfo.org has created a helpful tool for voters — a spreadsheet chart that lists the 17 statewide propositions that will be on the Nov. 8, ballot, cross-referenced with 19 major nonprofit organizations' recommendations as to how to vote on them.

The organizations run from the Democratic Party, Peace and Freedom Party, California Labor Federation to the Republican Party, Chamber of Commerce and the California Tea Party.

Hot phones ...

Well, well, well. It seems that a certain presidential political campaign isn't the only thing that is self-implosion. Sorry, I couldn't help myself.

Nearly 100 people who bought the Samsung Galaxy Note 7 have reported that the phones are overheating, causing skin burns and even catching on fire.

Consequently, Samsung and the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission have officially issued a recall of all Galaxy Note 7 phones sold before Sept. 15. The culprit for what happened appears to be a battery-related manufacturing problem.

A battery is made up of a positive electrode called a cathode and a negative electrode called an anode with both being connected by a liquid called the electrolyte allowing charged particles to move freely. The chemical reactions inside the battery generate electrical energy as electrons or ions flow from one electrode to the other.

Cell phones (just like laptops) use what is called a

lithium ion battery, a very compact, rechargeable battery. Lithium's atomic structure allows these batteries to store a lot of energy. This sounds great unless the battery gets overcharged or the separator between the electrodes is damaged.

Also, if there is a puncture of some kind, the ions would travel through the new path of least resistance, causing a short circuit.

A statistically small chance that this could happen exists for any lithium ion battery — especially with one that is poorly designed or installed. That includes hoverboards of which there have also been reports of some spontaneously combusting.

According to Samsung, the problem occurred because of a production error that put too much pressure on the battery inside some of the first phones to be manufactured. This error squeezed together the cathode and anode, which can cause the short circuit and produce excess heat.

I know what you may be thinking. Why is he piling on Samsung? After all, they did everything they were supposed to do once they were aware of the problem.

The purpose of this column is not to scare anyone away from buying Samsung products, but rather to give you insight as to how the problem arose and the specifics behind it.

I just got another recall for my Toyota Corolla but that won't keep me from buying a Toyota for my next car.

If I really wanted to scare you, I would include a link at the bottom to that famous scene from the movie "Law Abiding Citizen" (if curious, feel free to YouTube: "Law Abiding Citizen Cell Phone"). Now that you've seen it, all I have left to say is Happy Halloween!




Echolocation

How do you get around in the dark? You use your eyes, right? While large bats may rely on their eyes to find their way around in the dark, smaller bats depend more on echolocation. They send sound waves into their environment and listen to the echoes to determine where everything is.

Bats make sounds through their mouth, often at such a high frequency that humans cannot hear them. They wait for the echoes and use the timing and loudness of them to determine the location, size and type of things around them.

Through echolocation, small bats can move easily through total darkness. They can get to areas where other animals cannot and find food to eat late at night.

were not in support of rescuing the 70-year old fixture.

According to Wilson, more than half the respondents would like to see Town Hall continued to be used for community purposes until a new venue is available.

The most frequent suggestion was to use the structure for "community events" and children's activities. More specifically, many respondents recommended or encouraged its future use as a "performing arts building for the two professional theater companies in need of a venue that could be shared." Plays and concerts were mentioned often in the surveys.

Another frequent suggestion was a location for dance classes — ballroom, line or children's.

A few people continue to want to see the traditional events, such as the Harvest Festival and the Quilt Show, return to Town Hall. And several parents are dependent on the afterschool program continuing.

Wilson has shared the survey documents with the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board, overseeing the new Idyllwild Community Center. Board President Janice Lyle said, "The SJMCC board, along with the Programs and Activities Committee, will review the surveys and include that input in their analysis of community desires as they plan future recreation programs."

Although four respondents were not supportive of maintaining the facility at any cost, this comment summarizes the prevalent sentiment and recognizes the changes needed to make it into a functional facility for local events:

"Our Town Hall has been our historical meeting hall since Ernie Maxwell's days. It would be a shame to toss out its aspect as part of mountain culture. It needs a makeover — the stage needs stairs on either side, a back room or basement for an offstage room for a scrim and most especially taking off that awful ceiling and replacing with great sound acoustical tiles."

And as another respondent said, "I cannot imagine not having the Town Hall involved in our community. We need it, it's part of Idyllwild."

his second season as a firefighter and a resident of San Jacinto; and Pablo Cerda, 23, also in his second season as a firefighter and a resident of Fountain Valley.

By 4 a.m., the Engine 57 crew had joined with four other Forest Service crews at the command post near Cabazon. They were then assigned to help with evacuations and protect homes in the Twin Pines area off of Highway 243. They eventually deployed to defend an octagonal house in the Twin Pines area. The terrain in the area was tricky, the roads narrow and the winds continued to grow in intensity, fueled by the fire's growing heat.

Wind and billowing smoke made flying tankers into the fire impossible in the early hours of the fire, leaving the ground crews to battle the blaze.

Soon, 50 mph winds, coupled with the rugged terrain, and plenty of dry brush and fire fuel had created a firestorm of extraordinary danger. Shortly after 7 a.m., radio communication with Engine 57 grew silent.

Three of the five member crew died at the house. Both Loutzenhiser and Cerda were transported to the Arrowhead Regional Medical Center but later died from their injuries.

For Idyllwild, small and close knit town that it is, the loss was deeply personal. It is a community where most people know their neighbors and many knew the Loutzenhiser family and other members of the Engine 57 crew.

"It's always been difficult each year since," said Maria Loutzenhiser, Mark's widow. "But for me, God and my faith have helped me and my family to get through. This community and its support have made such a difference.

"I've lived here all my life and the support of family and friends, the love and support from everywhere, has been so important. And the support of our fire family has been important — we've stayed in touch over the years. The prayers of the community have kept us going, and for that we will always be grateful."

No danger to Fern Valley Water budget and water

The Fern Valley Water District budget appears to be in fine shape after the first quarter of the fiscal year 2016-17, which began July 1. While revenues are \$200,000, or 19 percent of the projected total, that represents just two billing periods and no property tax revenue, which the county will begin to distribute to special districts in December.

Expenses have been \$282,000, including almost \$100,000 from the capital budget for the purchase of three new vehicles.

Water conditions are normal and General Manager Victor Jimenez reported that the groundwater level for the wells "... show minor increases and decreases in all wells."

Stream flow in Tahquitz Creek has been sufficient to enable FVWD to supplement its well production. Wells supplied about 50 percent this year and also in September 2015.

Total water production has declined the past two months, Jimenez reported. Cooler temperatures and less irrigation appear to have contributed to the lower water use, he said.

Jimenez has continued to monitor for potential leaks and reported none were found during September. He added that FVWD staff has "tested several customers' meters to dispel the theories of faulty meters as the reason for high bills."

In response to Jimenez's description of how the district handles unexpected high customer water use, board President Jim Rees said, "I'm glad the staff follows up and determines the cause."

"It's really unusual not to find a [customer's leak], but we want to make sure the problem is resolved and we did what we could to help," Jimenez replied. "We definitely reach out to the customers so that they can fix it as soon as possible."

A draft version of a new set of rules and regulations policies for FVWD was given to the committee, composed of directors Robert Krieger and Rees, for review.

scheduled. He said, "We're all very excited to get to this point [and] don't expect anything unusual nor does the planning staff." While the Riverside County Board of Supervisors must approve the commission's decision, Marsh expects construction to begin in early 2017.

According to the planning staff's findings, the project is consistent with the policies of the multi-purpose elements of the general plan and the RE-MAP. Further, "Strawberry Creek and the associated riparian [and] ravine areas will be completely avoided by the project activities." This includes the sensitive areas along the creek.

In addition, the staff highlighted that the current planning designation allows for commercial retail development, and the

proposed project will cause significantly less affect on the local environs.

"We aren't aware of any outstanding concern on the staff's part," said Janice Lyle, president of the SJMCC board, "This is a definite step forward."

If the planning commission grants it approval, Lyle said, the construction bids would be solicited, so that they can be poised to begin work once the supervisors take action, which she expects will be after New Year's.

The construction of the future community center and other facilities are part of the CUP revision, but will also depend upon the availability of water from the Idyllwild Water District and the fire department's concurrence, too.

Regarding the availability of water, Phayvanh Nanthavongdouangsy, the county planner, wrote, "potable water services and sanitary sewer services

[are] from Idyllwild Water District. Water availability in this area is limited; therefore to mitigate impacts to water services, each phase of the project (Phase I-Phase IV) will require a will-serve letter from the water district to proceed forward. ... prior to the issuance of a building permit. This will ensure that water is available to support that phase of the project and that impacts to water services is mitigated to a level that is less than significant."

One area, for which the county required additional mitigation, is the grove oak trees on the site. Inventory and mitigation plans were required to be prepared. While the planned development is designed to avoid negative effects on the oak trees, the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board has agreed, as part of the plan, to replace trees if necessary.

However, the golden spotted oak borer, alone, has infested and killed nearly 200 trees on the site before any construction has begun.
