Mountain lion kills family pet

11-year-old devastated

Tragedy struck a Pine Cove family last week. Me-Me, the family Chihuahua, was in the backyard about 7 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 2, when her family heard her barking and crying.

Rushing out, Tony Garlock and his daughter, Rosa, saw a mountain lion standing in the yard over Me-Me.

The lion ran away, while Garlock quickly ran and picked up the dog. Their neighbor arrived on the scene and offered to drive Garlock to the Banning animal hospital. He quickly accepted.

Rosa, crying, asked if she could come, too. They agreed and the three raced off with Rosa holding Me-Me.

But when they arrived at the hospital, it was already too late to help Me-Me, according to the veterinarian. She had died in Rosa's arms during the trip.

Me-Me was 7 years old and the mother figure in the family, Garlock said. "She was very special to us and cared for Rosa," he added.

This week, they buried the See Mountain lion, page 24

How much of your 1-percent property tax goes to fire protection?

The Town Crier now has obtained the actual number of taxable parcels within each of Idyllwild Fire Protection District's 21 tax rate areas, so we now can calculate the average percentage for each taxable parcel within the district.

For parcels within IFPD, an average of 15.56 percent of the property tax goes to fire protection, compared with about 6 percent for parcels in Pine Cove, Mountain Center and Zone 3.

Those parcels within IFPD also pay IFPD's separate "parcel fee tax" of \$65 for improved properties and \$32.50 for vacant parcels. Parcel fees for both improved

and vacant properties within IFPD will increase to \$130 should Measure W pass this week.

Idyllwild Fire currently receives about \$1.2 million in property taxes from the county. IFPD bills parcel owners about \$212,000 additionally in parcel fee taxes.

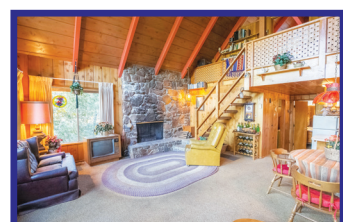

Injury crash in Idyllwild

One injury crash on Hill roads took place over the last week. At 6:20 p.m. Friday, Nov. 4, Dixie Harlow, 84, of Idyllwild, was driving her 2013 silver Saturn Vue southbound on Highway 243 when she made a left turn onto Saunders Meadow Road.

At the same time, Robert Rogers, 83, and also from Idyllwild, was driving his 2016 silver Jeep Wrangler northbound on Highway 243 just south of Saunders Meadow Road. Because of Harlow's turn in front of his vehicle, Rogers' vehicle crashed into the side of Harlow's Vue.

According to Darren Meyer, California Highway Patrol public information officer, neither vehicle was travelling at a high rate of speed, so damage to vehicles was minor.

Both vehicles had passengers. In Harlow's vehicle was Gerald Harlow, 64. And in Rogers' vehicle was Genosia Rogers, 84. Genosia Rogers was transported to Eisenhower Medical Center in Rancho Mirage complaining of pain. No other individuals required transport and no other vehicles were involved in the collision.

She was visiting her aunt, Winnie Wood, in Fern Valley, and wanted to stop by and talk to me.

After our conversation, she posed with me for a photo that I kept in that office until I retired. It is somewhere at home. I must find it again.

It was not an "official" visit — after all, she was retired — but the former U.S. attorney general did come to talk about a particular subject with me. No, it wasn't the subject of the Branch Davidian's in Waco, Texas, or the Elian Gonzalez case, or any of the other controversies that racked her two years in DC.

She thought the Idyllwild Transfer Station was the cleanest "dump" she had ever seen.

When she visited Winnie and her friend Dot Lewis' house, Janet often spent hours raking the yard and then helping them haul leaves and pine needles to the "dump."

We had a lovely little chat about the "dump" and Idyllwild.

I remember that little visit with fondness, even though my extremely conservative photographer at the time almost refused to take the pic.

She already showed signs of the Parkinson's disease that took her life last Monday, but she was a soldier, helping her favorite aunt and our beloved Dot, both former Women's Airforce Service pilots in World War II, clean their yard.

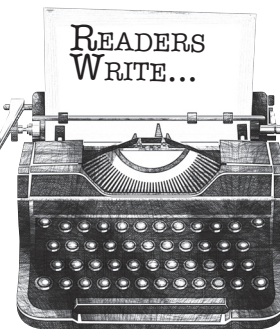

Riverside County now a Democratic domain

In the final report of registered voters prior to the Nov. 8, presidential election, Democrats have the greatest number of Riverside County registered voters with a party affiliation. As of Oct. 31, 388,859 Riverside County residents are registered as Democrats compared to 366,743 registered Republicans.

The total number of registered voters has grown from 910,000 to more than 1,021,000, a 12-percent increase since May.

Since the June primary, Democrats have increased their supporters by 52,000 voters (15 percent) to take a lead. Republicans have recorded an increase of 20,000 voters or 5 percent during the same period.

On May 23, there were 10,000 more registered Republicans than Democrats in the county. Five months later, after a summer of Donald Trump's campaigning, there are 22,000 more Democratic voters than

Republican.

The American Independent Party, while significantly smaller than the two major political parties, experienced a 16-percent increase to nearly 32,000 supporters.

Voters choosing No Party Preference totaled nearly 215,000, a 32,000-voter increase, or 17 percent.

Within Supervisor District 3, Republicans have maintained their registration dominance.

Since May, the number of registered Republicans has increased about 7,000 to a total of 92,224, nearly a quarter of the county total. Democratic registration kept pace with a 6,730 voter increase to a total of 63,528 registered party members.

The number of District 3 voters with No Party Preference increased from 41,530 to 49,641, nearly a 20-percent growth.

Of the more than 1 million registered voters in River-

side County, almost 75 percent (726,039) have requested vote-by-mail ballots. As of the morning of election day, 45 percent (332,288) had already been returned.

Turnout appears to be high throughout the country, including Idyllwild. When the Town Hall precinct opened at 7 a.m., almost 25 voters were waiting to cast a ballot or submit one. The

precinct captain acknowledged this appears to be the most voters this early in the past 10 years.

Statewide, the total number of registered voters for the presidential election is 19.4 million, a 1.4 million (8 percent) voter increase since the primary election in early June.

Checking for ID theft of a child

The Federal Trade Commission advises: Any parent or guardian of a child knows the milestones that come with turning 16 – learning to drive, maybe dating, or thinking about college. But now, there's one more: checking their credit report.

But my kids don't have a credit card, house or car. Why should I check their credit report?

Because somebody else could be using your child's personal information. Once a child's — or anyone's — Social Security number is stolen, it can be used by identity thieves.

Checking to see if your child has a credit history, and then thoroughly reviewing it when they turn 16, can help you spot signs of identity theft. If you find false or inaccurate information, you'll have time to correct it before your child applies for a job, a loan for college or a car, or tries to get a credit card or a place to live.

Generally, children won't have credit reports unless someone is using their information for fraud.

What if my child has a credit report with incorrect or false information? Visit IdentityTheft.gov/child to report the problem and follow the steps outlined to resolve it.

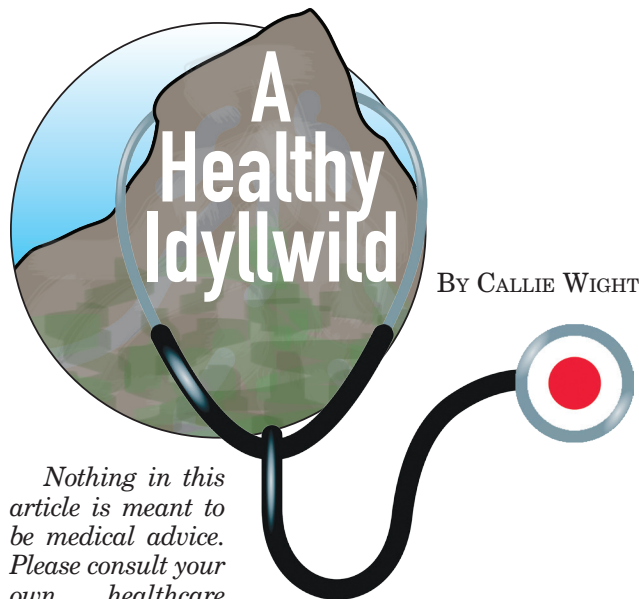
This year's contest invites entrants to share their favorite hunting memory.

It turns out that dietary sugar is the big problem. Dietary sugar contributes to obesity (body-fat accumulation). Obesity is at the root of many health-related evils. Current medical research is substantiating this.

In fact, the leading edge in research suggests that the root causes of obesity are quite complicated and not due only to caloric intake outstripping caloric output.

Nevertheless, diet is the easiest and most immediately modifiable plank in our platform of healthy self-management.

November is National Diabetes Month. Understanding diabetes helps us focus on some problems associated with obesity (www.diabetes.org).

For instance, childhood onset of type 2 diabetes has been on the rise for years now (especially in teens) and for children, being overweight/obese is the primary risk factor. Compared to the world, the World Health Organization states that "The United States has the most obesity per capita ..." They also recommend that adults eat absolutely no more than 12 teaspoons of sugar/day, preferably no more than six. Sugary beverages (read: sodas) appear to be a major culprit in high-sugar consumption and the development of obesity, especially in the young.

Both diabetes and prediabetes (blood sugar level is higher than normal, but not high enough to be considered diabetes) lead to higher risk of early death, heart disease, stroke, kidney failure and worse. When these disorders occur in the young, it is quite possible that that person's life span will be shortened.

On the other hand, prediabetes is reversible through lifestyle changes. The earlier people are diagnosed with prediabetes, the more likely they can reverse it and prevent it worsening into type 2 diabetes.

One of the foremost means to prevent problems of high-blood sugar is to maintain a healthy weight. One of the first lines of treatment for high-blood sugar is to lose weight. Studies show that losing just 5 to 7 percent of your body weight can help prevent or delay the onset of type 2 diabetes. For a person who weighs 200 pounds, that's only 10 to 15 pounds.

Here's the crazy thing: You may have diabetes or prediabetes and have no noticeable symptoms at all. For instance, one in three American adults has prediabetes and the majority don't even realize it, while 25 percent of people with full-blown diabetes are not aware they have it either. On the other hand, you might notice blurry vision, feeling unusually thirsty or hungry, tiring easily and urinating frequently. Bear in mind, these symptoms can be due to many other factors, not necessarily serious health issues.

Prevention: Oh, here's a big surprise: Manage your weight; eat healthy (prize antioxidants, plant food, probiotics, nuts, soy and omega-3 fatty acids); stay active; and quit smoking. I'm beginning to sound like a broken record. Changes need to be permanent. This is your new forever lifestyle.

Coming: gluten-free diets; benefits of stretching.

Pickleball — it's a 'go'

At the recent County Service Area 36 Advisory Committee meeting, pickleball courts were discussed and provisionally approved, pending a final "go" authorization from the Riverside County Park District Advisory Commission. That authorization was given at a Thursday, Nov. 3, meeting of the commission, according to Kyla Brown, Riverside County Regional Park and Open Space District recreation bureau chief.

"Three courts will be installed at the county park, as a park district amenity," said Brown. She could not give a timeline for completion, since the project now moves into an environmental impact report process.

Asked to estimate time for approval, Brown demurred. She noted factors such as existing development where the courts will be built that could expedite the process. "We'll start the process and the planning relatively quickly," said Brown. The courts will be built to the left of the entrance kiosk, where picnic tables are located.

County parks has committed \$25,000 to the project while the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center (commonly referred to as Idyllwild Community Center) has committed \$20,000 from two donors. Brown believes the total cost to county parks can be kept below a level that would require another approval from the Board of Supervisors, which could add more delay to the project. "There are locals who have expressed a willingness to provide 'in kind' services to help with court construction that could reduce overall costs," said Brown.

Asked whether pickleball users would have to pay the current county park entry fee to play (\$6 day use, \$15 annual), Brown said she thought some agreement with ICC could be reached to help defray those entry costs, although there has not been much discussion at this point regarding potential entry fees for pickleball players.

For the uninitiated, pickleball was "invented" on Bainbridge Island near Seattle in 1965. It combines elements of tennis, badminton and ping-pong, and has gained followers internationally. It is played both indoors or outdoors on a badminton-sized court with a slightly modified tennis net. It is played as both doubles and singles with a paddle and a plastic ball with holes.

Rain has not dampened fire threat

Despite a relatively wet fall, Cal Fire's Predictive Services unit foresees significantly large fire threats into winter.

The report stressed that Southern California remains in drought conditions, which are unlikely to change this winter. Both Predictive Services and the National Weather Service consider the possibility of La Niña conditions to remain high.

NWS places the probability of La Niña conditions at 70 percent and is forecasting below-normal rainfall and above-average temperatures for Southern California through March.

"Across Southern California, although wetting rains have occurred a bit early this year, the increase in moisture will likely be offset by the possibility of a greater than average number of offshore wind events," they then concluded. "This will keep large fire potential above normal over much of Southern California into early December."

If so, below-average rainfall is the projection for winter — January and February are typically the wettest months — and early spring.

California legislature adopts variety of new laws

The state Legislature was very busy during 2016. Nearly 1,000 bills were passed and Gov. Jerry Brown signed about 900 into law.

Among the bills that did not receive legislative approval was Assembly Bill 385, which would have allowed state voters to decide whether to retain Daylight Saving Time. On Aug. 30, the bill failed to receive a majority vote for the third time. Assemblyman Kansen Chu (D – San Jose), who authored the bill, may resubmit in the 2017 Assembly session.

Bills that did pass the Legislature addressed a gamut of subjects; for example, bankruptcy, barbering, collectibles, California seeds, craft beer, education, healing arts, public utility commission, taxes, water projects and much more.

Some of the bills Brown did sign are summarized below:

Election reform

Senate Bill 450 offers counties the opportunity to move to an all mail-in-ballot election system. Starting Jan. 1, 2018, 14 (Calaveras, Inyo, Madera, Napa, Nevada, Orange, Sacramento, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Shasta, Sierra, Sutter and Tuolumne) of the state's 52 counties are authorized to conduct any election as an all-mail ballot election.

The secretary of state will evaluate the conduct of these elections and report to the Legislature. After Jan. 1, 2020, any county may conduct any election as an all-mailed ballot election.

Registered voters would automatically be sent a ballot 28 days before the election. Voters could return their ballot by mail, take it to a drop-off location or cast it in person at any vote center in their county.

Secretary of State Alex Padilla said after the bill's passage, "Why limit voting to one location on a single Tuesday?"

"Our current system of limiting voters to casting their ballot at a single location on a single day has failed, as our voter turnout rates have continued to decline toward record lows." Sen. Ben Allen, one of the bill's sponsors, said, "People lead increasingly complicated lives; we should provide them with maximum flexibility when it comes to voting."

Counties would be required to have one vote center for every 10,000 registered voters on election day. Starting 10 days before the election and through the Friday before election day, there must be one vote center for every 50,000 registered voters.

For this year's presidential election, the secretary of state reported last week that more than 1 million people registered to vote in Riverside County — the fourth largest number of registered voters in the state.

Private retirement

For workers without a retirement savings account, SB 1234 authorizes a procedure for them to build retirement savings.

Under the new law, workers who do not have a workplace retirement plan will automatically contribute 3 percent of wages to a new retirement account, the California Secure Choice Retirement Savings Trust. Workers can change their contribution levels at any time, or choose not to participate.

In 2012, the Legislature asked for a study to evaluate this type of program and SB 1234 is based on that work.

Use of cell phones while driving

State law already prohibits using a cell phone while driving, either to write, send or read a text-based message. Phones allowing for voice operation are exempt. This bill would prohibit a person from driving a motor

vehicle while holding and operating a handheld wireless telephone or a wireless electronic communication device, as defined.

The exception is granted if a device is mounted on a vehicle's windshield in the same manner a portable Global Positioning System, and only a single swipe or tap of the driver's finger is necessary to activate it.

Four-year college degrees

Brown has nudged the state college and university systems to encourage more students to complete degree requirements within four years. Today, many take five and six years to graduate.

SB 412 guarantees priority registration and academic advising to students who pledge to take 30 units per year.

According to the bill's sponsor, Sen. Steven M. Glazer (D - Orinda), "Many students at the California State University system want to finish in four years, but they need help in charting the path. This bill directs resources to students who likely need the most help and will

boost their chances of getting a bachelor's degree in four years."

Alcohol and beauty salons or barber shops

These establishments may now serve beer or wine without a license as part of a beauty salon or barber shop service if no extra charge or fee for the beer or wine is required.

Breathalyzers

Following a pilot program, the state may now require installing an ignition interlock device in cars of individuals convicted of driving under the influence. The device will prevent the car from starting if the driver's blood alcohol content is above the legal limit.

The new law enables the pilot program to run for another two years; starting Jan. 1, 2019, the pilot expands statewide.

The device costs between \$60 and \$80 per month, and installation costs between \$70 and \$150.

Desert Crisis Walk-In Center is located in a remodeled storefront at 2500 North Palm Canyon Drive, Suite A4, Palm Springs. The center will remain open 24 hours a day throughout the year. RI, International, a private provider of behavioral health programs, is operating the center under a contract with Riverside University Health System.

Guests also may be referred to the walk-in center by mobile crisis teams or law enforcement. All visits and stays are voluntary. Length of stays cannot exceed 23 hours.

During that time, guests will participate in the development of individualized care plans that include recovery education, peer-to-peer support, mental health services, nutritional counseling, coordination and referral to community-based services.

Steve Steinberg, the director of RUHS Behavioral Health, said the center will help relieve pressure on local emergency departments that get overwhelmed by individuals brought in by law enforcement on involuntary psychiatric admissions known as a 5150.

CDC recommends fewer shots

The Center for Disease Control now recommends that 11- to 12-year-olds receive two doses of human papillomavirus vaccine at least six months apart rather than the previously recommended three doses to protect against cancers caused by HPV infections. Teens and young adults who start the series later, at ages 15 to 26, will continue to need three doses of HPV vaccine.

CDC Director Tom Frieden said, "This recommendation will make it simpler for parents to get their children protected in time."

Generally, preteens receive HPV vaccine at the same time as whooping cough and meningitis vaccines. Adolescents ages 13 to 14 also are able to receive an HPV vaccination on the new two-dose schedule.

Idyllwild Arts honors modern dance legend Bella Lewitzky

Lewitzky chaired ISOMATA contemporary dance program

Modern dance legend Bella Lewitzky, 1996 National Medal of Arts recipient, built a career that eschewed then-prevailing standards.

She crafted a dance career based in Southern California rather than in New York, the dance citadel of the period. She cofounded Dance Theatre in Los Angeles in 1946 as an interracial school and company that artistically fought religious fanaticism, bigotry, abuse of women and violent anti-Semitism.

Called to testify before the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1951, she refused to testify on constitutional grounds and afterward famously said, "I am a dancer, not a singer."

She was hailed by colleagues and in the dance world as a gifted performer, choreographer, educator and artistic director. She was known to be an accomplished public speaker, a quality that served her well since she was also a major social activist.

Born in 1916, Lewitzky formed her most successful company at the age of 50, in 1966, as the Lewitzky Dance Company. The company achieved international fame, touring in 30-week seasons. From 1954 until 1972, Lewitzky chaired the Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts contemporary dance program as principal teacher/choreographer during the institution's summer programs.

At the age of 80, Lewitzky announced that the 1996-1997 season of the Lewitzky Dance Company would be its last. At its final performance in May 1997, she said to the audience, "The arts are under threat more than ever

The Social Security Administration automatically sends that statement out to all benefit recipients each year.

Idyllwild resident Darien Martus considered for Grammy awards

Idyllwild resident Darien Martus, independent recording artist and member of the Recording Academy and American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, is under consideration for two Grammy awards — one for best pop vocal album, “Side Trip,” and a second for best pop duo performance, “Something Comes Along,” a gospel pop piece with collaboration from Paul Johannes, on alto and tenor sax.

Martus, with seven commercial album releases to his credit, writes both music and lyrics. His canvas is broad — with music in all styles (country, dance, gospel, folk, pop, rock) and for multiple musical platforms including musical scores for theater and concept pieces for pop albums.

His writing has been called “strikingly original” by the Los Angeles Times and “off-beat and intriguing” by Stage Raw in a review of his theater piece “Pockets.”

In interview, Martus talked about the importance of story and theme in lyric writing and in concept pieces. “I like themed albums,” he said, referencing how story and concept albums like “Tommy” by The Who, the later Beatle albums and Andrew Lloyd Weber’s “Jesus Christ Superstar” influenced his own development.

“People don’t do themed albums anymore,” he noted. “But I like a story rather than a couple of lines. I don’t care if it’s an old idea, it’s a good idea. I want music that has substance, shape and thoughts.”

Martus creates from his own history and musical integrity, and does not fashion his music to fit current

trends. “If I’m doing my own thing as an independent producer, why not do my own thing?” he stressed.

His Grammy-nominated album “Side Trip” was just that — a temporary detour from a symphonic rock opera he is creating — an opus that may take years to complete. And as sometimes happens in the creative process, the break he took from writing his opus pro-

vided some catchy creative songs that are now being considered for a Grammy.

Although only a full-time Idyllwild resident for the last year, Martus has had a cabin here since 1991. For many years, he was choir director at Palm Springs High School in Palm Springs. He wrote original theater pieces that were performed in the desert during his residency there and has won five Desert League Awards, including Best Original Musical for “The Incredibly Awesome Pied Piper.”

Originally from Detroit, Martus studied piano as a child and received a bachelor’s degree in music from Oakland University. After moving to Los Angeles, he worked in theater, film and television as a composer, arranger, musical director and pianist.

In 2000, he received a master’s degree in composition from the University of Redlands. In addition to his multiple theater awards in the desert, he received from the Bay Area Drama Critics an award for Outstanding Musical Score for his musical “Some Love.” His most recent performance piece, released as an album, “Pockets,” charted at number one on Amazon’s Hot New Releases.

From his Idyllwild-themed CD “We are Mountains,” come these words, “We are rocks, we are floods; We are bone and we are blood; We are rain and we are rivers; We are hearts and we are hands ... We are lost, we are home; We’re together, we’re alone; We are reaching for the heavens; We are standing alone.”

Idyllwild Arts actor next featured speaker

Idy Talks, co-presentation of Idyllwild Community Center and Idyllwild Arts

Idyllwild Arts Academy theater major Nicolas “Nico” Yasko is a young man with a work ethic and a mission. While only a junior, he has the mind and discipline, not to mention an abundance of talent, to accomplish whatever he begins.

Nico is the next presenter at the Idyllwild Community Center speaker series, co-presented with Idyllwild Arts, and now with a new moniker — Idy Talks. His talk is called “Speech and Performance” and will focus on his inspiration as an artist and when he decided to become an actor.

Many non-actors, even if devotees of live theater, may think acting is easy — more inspiration than hard-honed craft. But of all the performing arts disciplines, being an actor arguably requires the widest breadth of skill sets — an ability to inhabit and disappear in a role so that to the audience, the actor is not performing but is authentically “being” the character. That ease of “being” a character is accomplished through rigorous training — training made more demanding by the fact that working actors must also sing and dance at levels on a par with their acting chops.

Nico not only understands those layered demands, he earnestly articulates how seriously an actor must prepare to have any shot at a career. “I look at my life every day,” he mused. “There is so much uncertainty in this life. We have to make something of the time we have. I’m looking forward to the future and know that

I have to design it for myself.”

In interview, Nico is poised, confident and engaging. Juniors, even at a prestigious pre-professional training program such as is offered at IAA, are not necessarily expected to have a performing résumé. Nevertheless, when asked to provide one, and do it within time available to meet our paper’s deadline, Nico had one on this writer’s computer shortly after the interview.

Nico has no illusions about how difficult the challenges facing him as a performer will be. “Some may take a pass and choose a life and career that’s safe,”

he said. “But I believe we have to go after the thing we love. We have to love what we do and go after it with all the fervor we have.”

At the Nov. 17 presentation, Nico will give insights into his preparation for roles and discuss his acting process. And, even though young, he has a firm idea of what processes work for him as an actor and how to fully inhabit and disappear into a role. “The eyes are everything,” he noted. “The audience will know if you’re really in the scene.”

To say he is self-motivated is a bit of an understatement. The son of a U.S. Marine father, Nico was born in Japan and has lived many places both overseas and in the U.S. He has learned to adapt.

While living in Indio at age 13, he decided he needed a professional training program to pursue his dream of becoming an actor. He completed his own application to Idyllwild Arts, without assistance, and won a coveted place in the theater training program.

“I’ve always been an entertainer, at least that’s what my parents say,” Nico said, “but I always thought I’d have a career in computer science.” He recounted his personal epiphany in seventh grade in middle school in Indio. “I was playing this character, Archie, in Jason Robert Brown’s musical ‘13.’ The audience was hanging on every word. It was an incredible moment and it changed my life.”

Nico recently landed a role in a professional indie film that will shoot next year in Los Angeles. That role will help him acquire his Screen Actors Guild and Actors Equity cards.

He recently completed a leading role, Jason, in IAA’s production of “Medea” and will be featured in the upcoming new IAA musical “Welcome to Sleepy Hollow.”

Nico will talk about his role preparation process and feature several surprise guests, at 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 17, at Silver Pines Lodge. There is a wine and cheese reception at 5:30 p.m. Both the reception and presentation are free to the public.

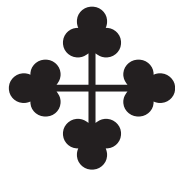
