An online poll of Idyllwild residents revealed confusion over facts and growing opposition to planned installation of pickleball courts at the Idyllwild County Park.

As background, on Thursday, Nov. 3, the Riverside County Park District Ad-

visory Commission authorized building the courts in a yet-to-be-determined location at the county park in Idyllwild. Legion signs warming center agreement with county

Idyllwild warming facility returns to original home

In January 2016, the Community Action Partnership and County Health Department moved the Idyllwild Warming Center from the American Legion to Town Hall.

On Friday, Dec. 9, Danny Richardson, Legion Post 800 commander, signed an agreement with CAP and the county to return the center to the Legion. In its most recent press release, CAP lists the Legion, along with "Idyllwild Town Center" (Town Hall), as Hill warming centers. But Town Hall status as a warming center after the first of the year is uncertain because of a new County Service Area 36 recreation manager and the possible sale of Town

Under the agreement, the Legion can self-activate the warming center based on specific temperature parameters and needs. Notification of the center's activation would be distributed by the Legion, Mountain Disaster Preparedness and CAP. CAP also will provide signs indicating "Warming Center." Richardson and the Legion board also suggested attaching a "Warming Center Open" notification

Circle, and on Legion signs and marquees throughout the village.

Mary Morse, Hill resident and 3rd District CAP commissioner, suggested also notifying the Idyllwild HELP Center of warming center activation. Legion Board Member Barney Brause suggested WNKI could also be used to notify of warming center activa-

One of the advantages of having the Legion host the warming center is that it could be open at night, which Town Hall could not be. "One of the officers of the post would stay here all night if necessary," said Richardson.

As is the case with all CAP-supported warming centers, the Legion will determine the hours it will be open to the public. CAP's intention, according to its announcement, is "to help sustain warming centers as drop-in sites for vulnerable individuals, seniors, the disabled and others in need of temporary relief from extreme weather."

Under the agreement, much as it was from 2011 to 2015, the Legion would provide space and monitor the center during activation, provide sign-in sheets for each day the cen-


to be attached to the Le- ter would be open, distribgion banner over North ute information regarding available community resources, distribute snacks and water to center participants, network with CAP for any needed assistance and share warming center "impact stories and photos." Richardson also noted that the door to the bar area that adjoins the designated warming center area would be locked during ac-

> CAP would provide training on warming center criteria, activation notifications, and snacks, water and all materials needed to run a warming center and provide technical assistance, as needed.

> Richardson signed on Dec. 9. CAP Executive Director Brenda Salas Freeman signed for CAP.

> Jose Arballo Jr., senior public information officer for Riverside Health System, noted having more than one warming center in Idyllwild is good for residents.

Legion board members aired their frustration with Arballo and CAP representative Olga Sanchez about the way the warming center was moved from the Legion to Town Hall in January 2016. It was unclear at the meeting what had prompted the move. Arballo said one person objected

Said Morse in her capacity as CAP commissioner, "I want to make sure that this kind of disconnect does not occur again and that communication between CAP and the community is better." Morse suggested she could act as official liaison.

Scavarda to head HUSD next year

The new president of the Hemet Unified School District Board of Trustees is Vic Scavarda who represents Idyllwild and the other Hill neighborhoods. He was selected at HUSD's Dec. 6 board meeting.

"I feel good about being Board President at this time because I am excited about the direction the District is taking. I can hardly wait to see what happens next," Scarvarda wrote in an email when asked how he felt about his elevation to president.

Just four years ago, he was still on the Idyllwild School faculty and now he heads the whole district, with more than 20,000 students.

"It is a bit of a shift to go from working in a small school to being involved with an entire District, but I find it interesting to be able to see the 'big picture," he wrote. "It helps me appreciate all the talents and services that come together to make everything work."

During his one-year term, the board will have to oversee the negotiation of new contracts with its two employee associations — Hemet Teachers Association and the California School Employees Association.

Scavarda will be working closely with new Superintendent Christi Barrett on all the districtwide issues.

These initial steps have been positive and Scavarda has several other goals, too. He will continue to watch out for the smaller schools in the district, such as Idyllwild and the Anza schools.

"I am looking forward to collaborating with all my fellow Board members in working to ensure that our students in Idyllwild, Anza and Cottonwood have the same

educational opportunities as the students in the Hemet Valley," he acknowledged. "... Given that we have the smallest population in a district that covers 750 square miles, it continues to be quite a challenge, and will not be resolved overnight. We need to keep trying."

Expressing his optimism for the coming 12 months, Scavarda added, "I want to recognize that our new Superintendent has made good progress towards building an atmosphere of trust and cooperation among all members of the District, so it's a great time to be on the Board with this positive momentum."

San Jacinto losing interest in JPA with IFPD

City chooses to continue contract with county for another year

The future of a joint power authority for the Idyllwild Fire Protection District to provide fire and emergency medical services to the city of San Jacinto appears to be changing.

At a regular meeting of the city's council last week, City Manager Tim Hults was authorized to hire a contractor to evaluate the city's future options for delivery of fire services. The options to be considered include creating its own fire department, a JPA with large municipal agencies, contract with another agency or continue to contract with the Riverside County. The results are expected in March or April.

One reason Hults recommended that the city assess its fire service options was the anticipated time to resolve the litigation, which the city initiated, to validate the authority of the JPA. (See accompanying story.)

"With the Idyllwild San Jacinto Fire JPA subject to litigation, which could take several years to complete, it is appropriate to explore what options may be available for fire service delivery," he told the council.

Following approval to hire a consultant, the council authorized Hults to extend the existing contract for county fire service through June 2018. Next year's costs will be about \$3.4 million, about \$50,000 more than the current year.

Hults told the council, "Staff reached out to the county fire chief and asked if the county would be willing to extend the current contract for another year. County Fire has not objected to an extension and has provided a quote for services for next fiscal year."

Later, council members were very complimentary of the Riverside County Fire Department's work and cooperation.

"We'd be honored to serve you for a year or forever," county Fire Chief John Hawkins told the council.

For the record: Sirkin's '15,000 people' response

Lately, there has been a bit of a dispute — in our "Readers Write" (letters to the editor) column — as to a certain "15,000 people" response given by Victor Sirkin at the Idyllwild Water District forum for directorship candidates this past Nov. 10. Sirkin has since been sworn in as a director of IWD.

In the TC story of Dec. 1, Sirkin's response to the moderator's question was summarized only was not within quotation marks. A reporter covering an event such as the forum is neither a certified court reporter nor a shorthand stenographer. He cannot possibly take down everything people say word-forword. He can only listen attentively and write as quickly as possible, hoping to capture just the gist of what is said. Of course, some efforts to do so are more successful than oth-

Occasionally, we make an audio recording of an event, but that is not so we can transcribe the entire thing word-for-word. A 90-minute recording would likely take a person much of two days to transcribe, and we would not have room in the paper to publish it all, anyway.

However, when we do have an audio recording, we can examine it later to resolve a particular controversy, such as Sirkin's "15,000 people" response.

So here, in its entirety, is Sirkin's response, word for word. It is not precisely as we reported it on Dec. 1, but, as stated above, his response was not in quotes because we cannot possibly achieve an exact transcription of everything said at meetings and forums. But on the recording, every word of Sirkin's response is clear; there are no am-

Funding for the courts is to come from two sources — \$25,000 from the Park and Open Space District and \$20,000 from several ICC donors.

ICC's involvement with pickleball was initially gratuitous. Pine Cove resident and sports enthusiast Barry Wallace proposed to ICC to allow already-constructed tennis courts on the ICC site to be used occasionally as pickleball courts with Wallace providing the expertise to construct provisional courts. ICC acquiesced. "My goal from the very beginning was to support a game that many on the Hill could play," said Wallace. "I put the courts in on an existing tennis court knowing that plans for ICC construction would remove those courts."

Noting that the provisional courts on the ICC site had attracted 30 to 50 players on a regular basis and that ICC construction would remove those courts, Wallace proposed to CSA 36 recreation, currently managed by the Park and Open Space District, to have permanent courts installed at the county park site.

With the Nov. 3 approval of the courts by the commission, public controversy began to grow. Few residents had attended the CSA 36 meetings at which the courts had been discussed and approved.

Idyllwild resident Charles Phelan started an online poll regarding the courts since many, like Phelan, who walk their dogs in the county park, had not heard that pickleball courts had been considered and approved for installation at the county park. "I put the poll out there because no one I had talked to knew about the courts," said Phelan. "I thought, 'hold on a minute,' let's just find out the facts."

The poll revealed confusion and misunderstanding about the process and underlying facts.

On Monday, Dec. 12, in response to Town Crier inquiries, Brown offered clarification as to the current status of the project and facts at this point:

- "The plan is still in the very early stages. As such, the exact location [at the county park] has yet to be determined. Once the project is farther along, [a plan for] community involvement will be determined."
- "All projects undergo a review as required by CEQA." The California Environmental Quality Act is a statute that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those impacts, if feasible."
- "The area [some thought was being graded in preparation

for court installation] is being cleaned up in the normal course of business, and is not related to the project in any way. That area [near the creek where large logs are stacked] is not being cleared in prep for pickleball courts."

 "Til look into the 'meadow' questions."

What Brown was referring to regarding the "meadow" questions was whether any particular area at the county park had ever been designated as an environmentally or archeologically sensitive meadow wetlands area by an environmental impact report. Also, whether that area has been mapped and specifically demarked as an area on which recreational activity should be limited because of potential for environmental degradation. And even if no existing report had yet indentified a specific area of potential wetlands sensitivity, would the planned CEQA study do so and would the meadow then be clearly delineated?

Some who use the park view current "mow" lines as meadow borders. Park personnel and Brown confirm those mow lines are completely arbitrary. In the past, the area referred to as the "meadow" has been totally mowed. Festivals also have been held in the county park, including a Bluegrass Festival and a Timberfest that ran for nearly 10 years in the 1990s.

As Phelan and others have noted, if the meadow is an environmentally sensitive area, it should be clearly demarked. Also, Phelan and others believe the county should clearly designate the sites where the courts could be installed and allow a public comment period prior to proceeding.

Brown indicated those community concerns would be considered, an environmental impact report undertaken, meadow boundaries defined if it is identified as environmentally or archeologically sensitive, and a public comment period and/or meeting held prior

to any pickleball court construc-

Wallace said, "I'm hopeful we can make something happen [for Hill pickleball players] without stepping on anyone's toes. We'll just have to wait and see."

In referring to a letter to the editor from Peter Davison, Wallace said, "The person got the wrong information. If the facts were as he said, I would be against it [construction of the courts]." In his letter, Davison stated he had been told by a worker at county park that ICC was "dumping" the courts on the county park, the parking lot would be enlarged into the meadow, fencing and paving around the entire meadow would be undertaken and that an existing pathway through the area and adjoining woods was scheduled to be paved. Davison said later the worker was a bulldozer operator.

Brown clarified that the proposed courts have nothing to do with ICC, and that paving and fencing, as Davison had written, is not planned. "We rely on volunteers at the park and it's possible someone gave Mr. Davison the wrong information," she noted.

She also stressed that the only reason her agency was considering the courts was at the request of community members. "The whole reason we were even looking at this is based on the community's request and because we were told that Town Hall would not be an appropriate site for the courts."

Brown also emphasized that the CEQA process would address all meadow wetland concerns including trees, animals, species and ecologically sensitive areas in proximity to the proposed project.

When asked if pickleball would return at any time in the future to the ICC site, Spokesperson Chris Trout said, "No. In none of the four phases would there be room." Construction of the buildings and parking will consume most of the flat land needed for courts of any sort.

IWD does not intend to store recycled water in Pine Cove

Foster Lake not a destination for the reclaimed water

Recycled water from the Idyllwild Water District's proposed plant will not be pumped and stored at its Foster Lake facility, acting board President John Cook wrote in an email Dec. 12.

"Neither current regulations nor science allow for recycled water recharge in a fractured rock zone so it is not possible to fill the Foster Lake reservoir with recycled water," he said in response to a question regarding IWD's purchase of two tax parcels near Foster Lake on Highway 243.

Cook added that the parcels were acquired to gain hydrologic data for Lily Creek.

The question about the purpose of the parcels arose during the IWD's special meeting last Friday. Several members of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association spoke to the board and delivered a letter, which they had sent to Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington, regarding their concerns about possible threats to Pine Cove's water sources if IWD deposited recycled water in Foster Lake.

Cook said this was a misunderstanding. The recycled water project would terminate at water storage tank on Idyllwild Pines Camp. No water would be transported to Foster Lake, he said.

"It's just for irrigation to Idyllwild Pines," Cook told

the audience.

Cook's response did not explain why former General Manager Tom Lynch said the two purchased tax parcels were for the recycled water project. In IWD's November 2015 letter to the county, Lynch wrote, "The properties are proximate to the Dutch Flat area and are ideally suited for monitoring wells. This would be a valuable asset to the District as it moves into its recycled water proj-

The board, including Cook, voted on a resolution approving the request to purchase the properties. The minutes of the meeting confirm their acquisition "... would be a valuable asset to the District as it moves into its recycled water project."

"Yes, the PCPOA and others have misunderstood the recycled water project," he wrote.

Further, the two properties are not proximate to Lily Creek, which exits Foster Lake at least a quarter-mile east and crosses Highway 243 even further east near Cedar Glen and the Nature Center.

Regardless of the true intention to acquire the properties, Cook on behalf of the current board, has stated no recycled water will be pumped beyond Idyllwild Pines.

Then Cook added that, years after approving the project, IWD's board should "... complete a business plan for the proposed project and a cost benefit analysis.

Hill voters often differ on political choices

The Idyllwild voting precinct was the only Hill precinct where the majority of voters supported Democratic Presidential candidate Hillary Clinton.

In Pine Cove, Clinton did out poll Republican Donald Trump by one vote; however, with almost 40 votes cast for minor candidates, Clinton received only 45 percent of the votes there.

Garner Valley voters overwhelmingly favored Trump. He garnered two-thirds of the votes cast and more than twice Clinton's votes — 192 to 72. Mountain Center voters also cast a plurality of their votes for Trump.

Clinton captured a slight majority of Riverside County votes — 50.1 percent. But the 3rd Supervisorial District was the only one that supported Trump.

Throughout the state, Clinton nearly doubled the number of votes for Trump.

Chuck Washington, Riverside County 3rd District supervisor, won election to a full four-year term with 58.6 percent of the total vote. On the Hill, Idyllwild and Mountain Center precincts cast more than 60 percent of votes for him. And even a majority of Pine Cove and Garner Valley voters preferred Washington to his challenger Shellie Milne.

In the race for the U.S. House of Representatives District 36 seat, Democratic incumbent Dr. Raul Ruiz easily defeated his opponent, Republican Jeff Stone, for his third term.

Ruiz collected 144,000 votes (62 percent) to State Sen. Stone's 88,000 votes. On the Hill, Ruiz received a majority of votes from all four precincts, but his percentages were all less than the districtwide result.

At the local level, "Yes" votes for the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's proposal to increase parcel fees — Measure W — were a majority of the votes cast. In a very large turnout, 838 voters or 56.7 percent agreed with the idea. However, the measure failed to get the required 66.7 percent of ballots cast.

Local votes for the propositions varied. For example, Proposition 62, which was the repeal of the death penalty, was defeated statewide and opposed in the county and in all the Hill precincts.

But votes for several of the other numerous state propositions were not consistent with the rest of the county or the state. For example, Proposition 53, which would require voter approval for all state bonds exceeding \$2 billion, was narrowly defeated statewide. Fifty-six percent of county voters favored it.

On the Hill, Idyllwild voters opposed it while Pine Cove voters narrowly supported it: 239 for it and 228 opposed.

Proposition 60, which would have required adult film actors to use condoms, was defeated at the state level, although Riverside County voters supported it. But on the Hill, only Mountain Center voters thought condoms were necessary for actors.

Turnout on the Hill was outstanding. Mountain Center, Pine Cove and Idyllwild all had 90 percent or more of registered voters casting a ballot. Garner Valley's turnout was close at 88 percent. For Riverside County and throughout the whole state, turnout equaled 75 percent, not matching the local interest in this election.



Volunteers observe two bald eagles at Lake Hemet

Two permanent residents of Lake Hemet were counted in the 2016-17 census. The local pair of bald eagles, whose permanent nest is near Lake Hemet, was easily seen in Saturday's bald eagle, one-hour count.



During Saturday's count, 11 bald eagles were spotted at four different lakes in the region. Bald eagles are usually found close to water because their diet is primarily made up of fish and ducks.

In Southern California, seven adult eagles and four juveniles were observed. "Bald eagles acquire the full white head and tail in their fifth year. Until then, they have different plumages of brown and white," wrote Robin Eliason, wildlife biologist for the U.S. Forest Service's Mountaintop Ranger District in the San Bernardino National Forest.

Besides the two adults at Lake Hemet, two were seen at both the Lake Perris State Recreation Area and Lake Arrowhead. The seventh adult and all the juvenile eagles were spotted at Big Bear Lake.

More than 100 volunteers participated in the count, including 15 at Lake Hemet.

The next bald eagle count will be Saturday, Jan. 14. The Forest Service also will conduct counts in February and March.

Lake Hemet participants should plan to meet at the Lake Hemet Market at 8:30 a.m. for orientation. Contact Ann Bowers (via email at annbowers@fs.fed.us or call 909-382-2935) for more information, biologist for the San Jacinto Ranger District.





alternate site after the first of the year," said Dahleen. "There are a number of possibilities, but nothing offers what the [ICC] site can provide. The most likely alternative would be the state park [where the series had been held prior to its move to the ICC site. It

Commission OKs ICC plan

On Wednesday, Dec. 7, the Riverside County Planning Commission approved the conditional use permit for the Idyllwild Community Center site. The commission vote was unanimous, although it did add one more condition to the CUP.

After several months of delay and unexpected postponements, the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board, led by President Janice Lyle, has obtained the approval for its development plans of the Butterfield Commons on Strawberry Creek.

The county board of supervisors must also approve the amended CUP and that is expected to be on the board's agenda after New Years.

In anticipation of the board's concurrence, the SJMCC board has already requested bids for a general contractor to manage the construction of this phase. If the group receives board approval, it can quickly begin work on the site development and amphitheater.

Presenting the plan to the commission, Principal Planner Larry Ross recommended that the commission adopt the mitigated negative declaration and approve the CUP.

Ross described the project and the SJMCC's plans to develop the site in four phases. The first phase — site development with parking and an amphitheater — is fully funded, Lyle told the commission. (See accompanying story regarding funds for Phase 2.)

When Lyle addressed the commission, she said the project "... would provide the youth with recreational opportunity and seniors with recreation mixed with music concerts, art exhibits and community events. The town has expressed its wishes."

Among the numerous local residents attending the meeting in support of the project was Pete Capparelli, who said, "We finally have the opportunity to have a community center and recreation in Idyllwild. The last building for this purpose was built in 1946, and just about everything is substandard now. We're at the 99-yard line and hope you'll support us."

However, the local support was not unanimous. Ann Dunham, Sue Nash and Tom Paulek all spoke

solemnly and grimly in opposition to the plan's approval. Nash was direct with the commission: "I'm opposed to the project."

Dunham, who lives across Strawberry Creek, was concerned that the noise from the amphitheater's concerts would be highly disturbing and disruptive. Because of the noise, her daughter Catherine felt the amphitheater was not a contribution to the community. In response, Ruthanne Taylor Berger, the 3rd District representative on the commission, added a new condition requiring additional landscaping along the creek to create a greater noise buffer for residents on the other side of Strawberry Creek

Also, Dunham mentioned the water limitations in Idyllwild, especially having to request

a glass of water at local restaurants.

Ross had told the commission, "The project is designed to avoid impacts to the creek."

Nash and Paulek raised issues regarding the legality of the county's approval and review process, public input and several environmental challenges, especially about the availability of water. She argued that the Idyllwild Water District could not issue any will-serve letters for the project because it is currently in Stage 2 water emergency. However, she did not acknowledge that the property already has a water meter on the site.

Earlier, Ross had informed the commission that each of the four construction phases were separate and would require new will-serve letters at that time.

Paulek criticized the commission process and said, "This epitomized Riverside County's faulty implementation of the [California Environmental Quality Act] and lack of transparency."

In response, the commission's legal counsel stated that the county process is different from other jurisdictions, but meets the CEQA requirements.

After the commission vote, Lyle said, "I'm really happy and very pleased."

The 5-acre site was a gift to the SJMCC from Loie and Dave Butterfield in 2008. The Butterfields subsequently pledged \$2 million toward the development of the site and the amphitheater.

other donations, according to Janice Lyle, SJMCC president.

She estimates that the group has about \$400,000 in reserve for phase 2, which is the community center building, including meeting rooms, a kitchen and deck.

Chuck "Supervisor Washington has been a dedicated and enthusiastic supporter of the Idyllwild Community Center project. He believes that the best way to provide recreation on the Hill is by helping to make the ICC building a reality," she said in a email. "We are so grateful for his recommendation to use CDBG funds to make the phase 2 building possible.

"These funds will be combined with the money raised by the community in the 'I'm Helping!' campaign," she added. "Approval of this grant at the Board of Supervisor's meeting this week will mean that the time table for completion of the ICC building can be short-

ened. What a Christmas gift for Idyllwild!"

The supervisors amended the county's 2016-17 One-Year Action Plan for the CBDG funding, which is managed by the county's Economic Development Agency.

EDA staff recommended approval of the addition of the ICC project to the plan, "The ... projects ... have been determined by staff to be eligible activities that meet a National Objective of the CDBG program," staff wrote.

The funds will be used for phase 2, which EDA described this way: "The Idyllwild Community Center will use CDBG funds for costs associated with the development of the facility. The 8,000-square-foot ity is the second phase of improvements to the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center site and will include activities area, outdoor deck, a lobby/gallery, and other amenities.'

Stone Creek prescribed burn project

Cal Fire, in cooperation with California State Parks, will be conducting a prescribed burn of brush and slash piles in the Mt. San Jacinto State Park off Highway

The project was to begin Tuesday, Dec. 13, and continue throughout the week, weather permitting. The final burn date will be determined by permissive burn day availability and weather.

Residents in the Idyllwild and Pine Cove area or anyone traveling on Highway 243 may see smoke from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the days of the burn. In the unlikely event you smell smoke, Riverside County officials urge you to take precautions to reduce any harmful health effects by limiting outdoor activities.

This burn is being conducted as part of the Cal Fire Vegetation Management Program, and is intended to reduce hazardous vegetation and wildland fuels in an area considered to be at high risk for large and damaging wildfires. Prescribed burns are done to help reduce the wildfire risk and promote biodiversity through the development of young trees, shrubs and grasses in a fire-dependent ecosystem.

The prescribed burn was planned and coordinated with the South Coast Air Quality Management District and the California Air Resources Board in order to minimize the smoke impacts on surrounding communities. The burn is dependent on weather and air-quality conditions that are favorable for smoke dispersal. If the conditions are not as desired, the burn will be rescheduled.

Forecasters: No end to drought this winter

Despite the relatively normal fall rainfall, the National Weather Service's latest long-range forecast is pessimistic regarding a wet winter and the end of the five-year drought, which is expected to enter its sixth year next spring.

On Dec. 8, NWS issued its winter forecast that said, "Given the current conditions and the mod-

el forecasts, the forecaster consensus also favors the continuation of weak La Niña conditions through [December, January, February] ... 2016-17."

La Niña conditions typically bring below-average rainfall and warmer temperatures to Southern California. It is possible that more neutral conditions will form later in winter, NWS added.

However, the interagency, the Southern California Geographic

Area Coordination Center's Predictive Services Unit's forecast is less optimistic: "The deficits in precipitation may be most acute during January and February which is ordinarily the wettest part of the year. Should this come to fruition, this would mark the 6th season in a row of below normal precipitation during the height of the 'rainy season'"

Legion signs warming center agreement with county

Idyllwild warming facility returns to original home

In January 2016, the Community Action Partnership and County Health Department moved the Idyllwild Warming Center from the American Legion to Town Hall.

On Friday, Dec. 9, Danny Richardson, Legion Post 800 commander, signed an agreement with CAP and the county to return the center to the Legion. In its most recent press release, CAP lists the Legion, along with "Idyllwild Town Center" (Town Hall), as Hill warming centers. But Town Hall status as a warming center after the first of the year is uncertain because of a new County Service Area 36 recreation manager and the possible sale of Town

Under the agreement, the Legion can self-activate the warming center based on specific temperature parameters and needs. Notification of the center's activation would be distributed by the Legion, Mountain Disaster Preparedness and CAP. CAP also will provide signs indicating "Warming Center." Richardson and the Legion board also suggested attaching a "Warming Center Open" notification

Mary Morse, Hill resident and 3rd District CAP commissioner, suggested also notifying the Idyllwild HELP Center of warming center activation. Legion Board Member Barney Brause suggested WNKI could also be used to notify of warming center activa-

One of the advantages of having the Legion host the warming center is that it could be open at night, which Town Hall could not be. "One of the officers of the post would stay here all night if necessary," said Richardson.

As is the case with all CAP-supported warming centers, the Legion will determine the hours it will be open to the public. CAP's intention, according to its announcement, is "to help sustain warming centers as drop-in sites for vulnerable individuals, seniors, the disabled and others in need of temporary relief from extreme weather."

Under the agreement, much as it was from 2011 to 2015, the Legion would provide space and monitor the center during activation, provide sign-in sheets for each day the cen-


gion banner over North ute information regarding available community resources, distribute snacks and water to center participants, network with CAP for any needed assistance and share warming center "impact stories and photos." Richardson also noted that the door to the bar area that adjoins the designated warming center area would be locked during ac-

> CAP would provide training on warming center criteria, activation notifications, and snacks, water and all materials needed to run a warming center and provide technical assistance, as needed.

> Richardson signed on Dec. 9. CAP Executive Director Brenda Salas Freeman signed for CAP.

The new president of the Hemet Unified School District Board of Trustees is Vic Scavarda who represents Idyllwild and the other Hill neighborhoods. He was selected at HUSD's Dec. 6 board meeting.

"I feel good about being Board President at this time because I am excited about the direction the District is taking. I can hardly wait to see what happens next," Scarvarda wrote in an email when asked how he felt about his elevation to president.

Just four years ago, he was still on the Idyllwild School faculty and now he heads the whole district, with more than 20,000 students.

"It is a bit of a shift to go from working in a small school to being involved with an entire District, but I find it interesting to be able to see the 'big picture," he wrote. "It helps me appreciate all the talents and services that come together to make everything work."

During his one-year term, the board will have to oversee the negotiation of new contracts with its two employee associations — Hemet Teachers Association and the California School Employees Association.

Scavarda will be working closely with new Superintendent Christi Barrett on all the districtwide issues.

These initial steps have been positive and Scavarda has several other goals, too. He will continue to watch out for the smaller schools in the district, such as Idyllwild and the Anza schools.

"I am looking forward to collaborating with all my fellow Board members in working to ensure that our students in Idyllwild, Anza and Cottonwood have the same

San Jacinto losing interest in JPA with IFPD

City chooses to continue contract with county for another year

The future of a joint power authority for the Idyllwild Fire Protection District to provide fire and emergency medical services to the city of San Jacinto appears to be changing.

At a regular meeting of the city's council last week, City Manager Tim Hults was authorized to hire a contractor to evaluate the city's future options for delivery of fire services. The options to be considered include creating its own fire department, a JPA with large municipal agencies, contract with another agency or continue to contract with the Riverside County. The results are expected in March or April.

One reason Hults recommended that the city assess its fire service options was the anticipated time to resolve the litigation, which the city initiated, to validate the authority of the JPA. (See accompanying story.)

ry.)
"With the Idyllwild San Jacinto Fire JPA subject to litigation, which could take several years to complete, it is appropriate to explore what options may be available for fire service delivery," he told the council.

Following approval to hire a consultant, the council authorized Hults to extend the existing contract for county fire service through June 2018. Next year's costs will be about \$3.4 million, about \$50,000 more than the current year.

Hults told the council, "Staff reached out to the county fire chief and asked if the county would be willing to extend the current contract for another year. County Fire has not objected to an extension and has provided a quote for services for next fiscal year."

Later, council members were very complimentary of the Riverside County Fire Department's work and cooperation.

"We'd be honored to serve you for a year or forever," county Fire Chief John Hawkins told the council.

For the record: Sirkin's '15,000 people' response

Lately, there has been a bit of a dispute — in our "Readers Write" (letters to the editor) column — as to a certain "15,000 people" response given by Victor Sirkin at the Idyllwild Water District forum for directorship candidates this past Nov. 10. Sirkin has since been sworn in as a director of IWD.

In the TC story of Dec. 1, Sirkin's response to the moderator's question was summarized only was not within quotation marks. A reporter covering an event such as the forum is neither a certified court reporter nor a shorthand stenographer. He cannot possibly take down everything people say word-forword. He can only listen attentively and write as quickly as possible, hoping to capture just the gist of what is said. Of course, some efforts to do so are more successful than oth-

Funding for the courts is to come from two sources — \$25,000 from the Park and Open Space District and \$20,000 from several ICC donors.

ICC's involvement with pickleball was initially gratuitous. Pine Cove resident and sports enthusiast Barry Wallace proposed to ICC to allow already-constructed tennis courts on the ICC site to be used occasionally as pickleball courts with Wallace providing the expertise to construct provisional courts. ICC acquiesced. "My goal from the very beginning was to support a game that many on the Hill could play," said Wallace. "I put the courts in on an existing tennis court knowing that plans for ICC construction would remove those courts."

Noting that the provisional courts on the ICC site had attracted 30 to 50 players on a regular basis and that ICC construction would remove those courts, Wallace proposed to CSA 36 recreation, currently managed by the Park and Open Space District, to have permanent courts installed at the county park site.

With the Nov. 3 approval of the courts by the commission, public controversy began to grow. Few residents had attended the CSA 36 meetings at which the courts had been discussed and approved.

Idyllwild resident Charles Phelan started an online poll regarding the courts since many, like Phelan, who walk their dogs in the county park, had not heard that pickleball courts had been considered and approved for installation at the county park. "I put the poll out there because no one I had talked to knew about the courts," said Phelan. "I thought, 'hold on a minute,' let's just find out the facts."

The poll revealed confusion and misunderstanding about the process and underlying facts.

On Monday, Dec. 12, in response to Town Crier inquiries, Brown offered clarification as to the current status of the project and facts at this point:

- "The plan is still in the very early stages. As such, the exact location [at the county park] has yet to be determined. Once the project is farther along, [a plan for] community involvement will be determined."
- "All projects undergo a review as required by CEQA." The California Environmental Quality Act is a statute that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those impacts, if feasible."
- "The area [some thought was being graded in preparation

for court installation] is being cleaned up in the normal course of business, and is not related to the project in any way. That area [near the creek where large logs are stacked] is not being cleared in prep for pickleball courts."

 "Til look into the 'meadow' questions."

What Brown was referring to regarding the "meadow" questions was whether any particular area at the county park had ever been designated as an environmentally or archeologically sensitive meadow wetlands area by an environmental impact report. Also, whether that area has been mapped and specifically demarked as an area on which recreational activity should be limited because of potential for environmental degradation. And even if no existing report had yet indentified a specific area of potential wetlands sensitivity, would the planned CEQA study do so and would the meadow then be clearly delineated?

Some who use the park view current "mow" lines as meadow borders. Park personnel and Brown confirm those mow lines are completely arbitrary. In the past, the area referred to as the "meadow" has been totally mowed. Festivals also have been held in the county park, including a Bluegrass Festival and a Timberfest that ran for nearly 10 years in the 1990s.

As Phelan and others have noted, if the meadow is an environmentally sensitive area, it should be clearly demarked. Also, Phelan and others believe the county should clearly designate the sites where the courts could be installed and allow a public comment period prior to proceeding.

Brown indicated those community concerns would be considered, an environmental impact report undertaken, meadow boundaries defined if it is identified as environmentally or archeologically sensitive, and a public comment period and/or meeting held prior

to any pickleball court construc-

Wallace said, "I'm hopeful we can make something happen [for Hill pickleball players] without stepping on anyone's toes. We'll just have to wait and see."

In referring to a letter to the editor from Peter Davison, Wallace said, "The person got the wrong information. If the facts were as he said, I would be against it [construction of the courts]." In his letter, Davison stated he had been told by a worker at county park that ICC was "dumping" the courts on the county park, the parking lot would be enlarged into the meadow, fencing and paving around the entire meadow would be undertaken and that an existing pathway through the area and adjoining woods was scheduled to be paved. Davison said later the worker was a bulldozer operator.

Brown clarified that the proposed courts have nothing to do with ICC, and that paving and fencing, as Davison had written, is not planned. "We rely on volunteers at the park and it's possible someone gave Mr. Davison the wrong information," she noted.

She also stressed that the only reason her agency was considering the courts was at the request of community members. "The whole reason we were even looking at this is based on the community's request and because we were told that Town Hall would not be an appropriate site for the courts."

Brown also emphasized that the CEQA process would address all meadow wetland concerns including trees, animals, species and ecologically sensitive areas in proximity to the proposed project.

When asked if pickleball would return at any time in the future to the ICC site, Spokesperson Chris Trout said, "No. In none of the four phases would there be room." Construction of the buildings and parking will consume most of the flat land needed for courts of any sort.

IWD does not intend to store recycled water in Pine Cove

Foster Lake not a destination for the reclaimed water

Recycled water from the Idyllwild Water District's proposed plant will not be pumped and stored at its Foster Lake facility, acting board President John Cook wrote in an email Dec. 12.

"Neither current regulations nor science allow for recycled water recharge in a fractured rock zone so it is not possible to fill the Foster Lake reservoir with recycled water," he said in response to a question regarding IWD's purchase of two tax parcels near Foster Lake on Highway 243.

Cook added that the parcels were acquired to gain hydrologic data for Lily Creek.

The question about the purpose of the parcels arose during the IWD's special meeting last Friday. Several members of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association spoke to the board and delivered a letter, which they had sent to Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington, regarding their concerns about possible threats to Pine Cove's water sources if IWD deposited recycled water in Foster Lake.

Cook said this was a misunderstanding. The recycled water project would terminate at water storage tank on Idyllwild Pines Camp. No water would be transported to Foster Lake, he said.

"It's just for irrigation to Idyllwild Pines," Cook told

the audience.

Cook's response did not explain why former General Manager Tom Lynch said the two purchased tax parcels were for the recycled water project. In IWD's November 2015 letter to the county, Lynch wrote, "The properties are proximate to the Dutch Flat area and are ideally suited for monitoring wells. This would be a valuable asset to the District as it moves into its recycled water proj-

The board, including Cook, voted on a resolution approving the request to purchase the properties. The minutes of the meeting confirm their acquisition "... would be a valuable asset to the District as it moves into its recycled water project."

"Yes, the PCPOA and others have misunderstood the recycled water project," he wrote.

Further, the two properties are not proximate to Lily Creek, which exits Foster Lake at least a quarter-mile east and crosses Highway 243 even further east near Cedar Glen and the Nature Center.

Regardless of the true intention to acquire the properties, Cook on behalf of the current board, has stated no recycled water will be pumped beyond Idyllwild Pines.

Then Cook added that, years after approving the project, IWD's board should "... complete a business plan for the proposed project and a cost benefit analysis.

I am really excited about the incredible and talented person the Board has unanimously selected as its General Manager. He will bring the needed knowledgeable, experienced professional leadership our community greatly need & He will need time to become familiar of our systems and community. I hope you and the community give him the necessary start up time.

After about 46 years in various public service positions, I am again looking forward to retirement in the beautiful home we call Idyllwild. The freedom from the many many meetings will bring peace and serenity to me and my family and friends.

The four new novice directors have the opportunity to advance the professional management of the District providing they can resist the temptation to micromanage and can act independently of special interests. In the midst of a severe 5 year drought, is it really necessary to spend much time energy and money exploring for water so 473 vacant parcels can be served with water meters? Isn't the Board's primary obligation to provide safe reliable water production for those who now live here? I also hope that the "Pine Coulters" move on back to Pine Cove and let Idyllwild choose its own destiny. (This does not include the polite ladies from the Pine Cove Property Owners Ass'n.) Make wise decisions and do what is right for the community. Think longterm, not short-term," she told the board.

Hill voters often differ on political choices

The Idyllwild voting precinct was the only Hill precinct where the majority of voters supported Democratic Presidential candidate Hillary Clinton.

In Pine Cove, Clinton did out poll Republican Donald Trump by one vote; however, with almost 40 votes cast for minor candidates, Clinton received only 45 percent of the votes there.

Garner Valley voters overwhelmingly favored Trump. He garnered two-thirds of the votes cast and more than twice Clinton's votes — 192 to 72. Mountain Center voters also cast a plurality of their votes for Trump.

Clinton captured a slight majority of Riverside County votes — 50.1 percent. But the 3rd Supervisorial District was the only one that supported Trump.

Throughout the state, Clinton nearly doubled the number of votes for Trump.

Chuck Washington, Riverside County 3rd District supervisor, won election to a full four-year term with 58.6 percent of the total vote. On the Hill, Idyllwild and Mountain Center precincts cast more than 60 percent of votes for him. And even a majority of Pine Cove and Garner Valley voters preferred Washington to his challenger Shellie Milne.

In the race for the U.S. House of Representatives District 36 seat, Democratic incumbent Dr. Raul Ruiz easily defeated his opponent, Republican Jeff Stone, for his third term.

Ruiz collected 144,000 votes (62 percent) to State Sen. Stone's 88,000 votes. On the Hill, Ruiz received a majority of votes from all four precincts, but his percentages were all less than the districtwide result.

At the local level, "Yes" votes for the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's proposal to increase parcel fees — Measure W — were a majority of the votes cast. In a very large turnout, 838 voters or 56.7 percent agreed with the idea. However, the measure failed to get the required 66.7 percent of ballots cast.

Local votes for the propositions varied. For example, Proposition 62, which was the repeal of the death penalty, was defeated statewide and opposed in the county and in all the Hill precincts.

But votes for several of the other numerous state propositions were not consistent with the rest of the county or the state. For example, Proposition 53, which would require voter approval for all state bonds exceeding \$2 billion, was narrowly defeated statewide. Fifty-six percent of county voters favored it.

On the Hill, Idyllwild voters opposed it while Pine Cove voters narrowly supported it: 239 for it and 228 opposed.

Proposition 60, which would have required adult film actors to use condoms, was defeated at the state level, although Riverside County voters supported it. But on the Hill, only Mountain Center voters thought condoms were necessary for actors.

Turnout on the Hill was outstanding. Mountain Center, Pine Cove and Idyllwild all had 90 percent or more of registered voters casting a ballot. Garner Valley's turnout was close at 88 percent. For Riverside County and throughout the whole state, turnout equaled 75 percent, not matching the local interest in this election.







Volunteers observe two bald eagles at Lake Hemet

Two permanent residents of Lake Hemet were counted in the 2016-17 census. The local pair of bald eagles, whose permanent nest is near Lake Hemet, was easily seen in Saturday's bald eagle, one-hour count.

During Saturday's count, 11 bald eagles were spotted at four different lakes in the region. Bald eagles are usually found close to water because their diet is primarily made up of fish and ducks.

In Southern California, seven adult eagles and four juveniles were observed. "Bald eagles acquire the full white head and tail in their fifth year. Until then, they have different plumages of brown and white," wrote Robin Eliason, wildlife biologist for the U.S. Forest Service's Mountaintop Ranger District in the San Bernardino National Forest.

Besides the two adults at Lake Hemet, two were seen at both the Lake Perris State Recreation Area and Lake Arrowhead. The seventh adult and all the juvenile eagles were spotted at Big Bear Lake.

More than 100 volunteers participated in the count, including 15 at Lake Hemet.

The next bald eagle count will be Saturday, Jan. 14. The Forest Service also will conduct counts in February and March.

Lake Hemet participants should plan to meet at the Lake Hemet Market at 8:30 a.m. for orientation. Contact Ann Bowers (via email at annbowers@fs.fed.us or call 909-382-2935) for more information, biologist for the San Jacinto Ranger District.

Other counts that day within the San Bernardino National Forest will be at Big Bear Lake, Lake Arrowhead, Lake Gregory, Silverwood Lake State Recreation Area and Lake Perris State Recreation Area.

alternate site after the first of the year," said Dahleen. "There are a number of possibilities, but nothing offers what the [ICC] site can provide. The most likely alternative would be the state park [where the series had been held prior to its move to the ICC site.] It

would also be the most expedient since any other site would have to be approved by a variety of county agencies involving new costs, permits and additional time."

As of this writing, ISCS 2017 is in abeyance. Although Dahleen said he has no specific agreement with ICC regarding a return to the site in 2018, the Notice of Public Hear-

ing and Intent to Adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration announcing the Dec. 7 planning commission meeting, was quite specific regarding ISCS.

The "Request" section for the conditional use permit specified in part, "The project is to permit a community center that will be built in four phases. Phase 1 only include[s] the amphitheater for the Idyllwild Summer Concert Series, which is a sequence of eight [8] concerts on Thursday nights in June, July and August."

Said ICC spokesperson Chris Trout, "Of course we want Ken and his series to return to our site."



Commission OKs ICC plan

On Wednesday, Dec. 7, the Riverside County Planning Commission approved the conditional use permit for the Idyllwild Community Center site. The commission vote was unanimous, although it did add one more condition to the CUP.

After several months of delay and unexpected postponements, the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board, led by President Janice Lyle, has obtained the approval for its development plans of the Butterfield Commons on Strawberry Creek.

The county board of supervisors must also approve the amended CUP and that is expected to be on the board's agenda after New Years.

In anticipation of the board's concurrence, the SJMCC board has already requested bids for a general contractor to manage the construction of this phase. If the group receives board approval, it can quickly begin work on the site development and amphitheater.

Presenting the plan to the commission, Principal Planner Larry Ross recommended that the commission adopt the mitigated negative declaration and approve the CUP.

Ross described the project and the SJMCC's plans to develop the site in four phases. The first phase — site development with parking and an amphitheater — is fully funded, Lyle told the commission. (See accompanying story regarding funds for Phase 2.)

When Lyle addressed the commission, she said the project "... would provide the youth with recreational opportunity and seniors with recreation mixed with music concerts, art exhibits and community events. The town has expressed its wishes."

Among the numerous local residents attending the meeting in support of the project was Pete Capparelli, who said, "We finally have the opportunity to have a community center and recreation in Idyllwild. The last building for this purpose was built in 1946, and just about everything is substandard now. We're at the 99-yard line and hope you'll support us."

However, the local support was not unanimous. Ann Dunham, Sue Nash and Tom Paulek all spoke

solemnly and grimly in opposition to the plan's approval. Nash was direct with the commission: "I'm opposed to the project."

Dunham, who lives across Strawberry Creek, was concerned that the noise from the amphitheater's concerts would be highly disturbing and disruptive. Because of the noise, her daughter Catherine felt the amphitheater was not a contribution to the community. In response, Ruthanne Taylor Berger, the 3rd District representative on the commission, added a new condition requiring additional landscaping along the creek to create a greater noise buffer for residents on the other side of Strawberry Creek

Also, Dunham mentioned the water limitations in Idyllwild, especially having to request

a glass of water at local restaurants.

Ross had told the commission, "The project is designed to avoid impacts to the creek."

Nash and Paulek raised issues regarding the legality of the county's approval and review process, public input and several environmental challenges, especially about the availability of water. She argued that the Idyllwild Water District could not issue any will-serve letters for the project because it is currently in Stage 2 water emergency. However, she did not acknowledge that the property already has a water meter on the site.

Earlier, Ross had informed the commission that each of the four construction phases were separate and would require new will-serve letters at that time.

Paulek criticized the commission process and said, "This epitomized Riverside County's faulty implementation of the [California Environmental Quality Act] and lack of transparency."

In response, the commission's legal counsel stated that the county process is different from other jurisdictions, but meets the CEQA requirements.

After the commission vote, Lyle said, "I'm really happy and very pleased."

The 5-acre site was a gift to the SJMCC from Loie and Dave Butterfield in 2008. The Butterfields subsequently pledged \$2 million toward the development of the site and the amphitheater.

other donations, according to Janice Lyle, SJMCC president.

She estimates that the group has about \$400,000 in reserve for phase 2, which is the community center building, including meeting rooms, a kitchen and deck.

Chuck "Supervisor Washington has been a dedicated and enthusiastic supporter of the Idyllwild Community Center project. He believes that the best way to provide recreation on the Hill is by helping to make the ICC building a reality," she said in a email. "We are so grateful for his recommendation to use CDBG funds to make the phase 2 building possible.

"These funds will be combined with the money raised by the community in the 'I'm Helping!' campaign," she added. "Approval of this grant at the Board of Supervisor's meeting this week will mean that the time table for completion of the ICC building can be short-

ened. What a Christmas gift for Idyllwild!"

The supervisors amended the county's 2016-17 One-Year Action Plan for the CBDG funding, which is managed by the county's Economic Development Agency.

EDA staff recommended approval of the addition of the ICC project to the plan, "The ... projects ... have been determined by staff to be eligible activities that meet a National Objective of the CDBG program," staff wrote.

The funds will be used for phase 2, which EDA described this way: "The Idyllwild Community Center will use CDBG funds for costs associated with the development of the facility. The 8,000-square-foot ity is the second phase of improvements to the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center site and will include activities area, outdoor deck, a lobby/gallery, and other amenities.'

Stone Creek prescribed burn project

Cal Fire, in cooperation with California State Parks, will be conducting a prescribed burn of brush and slash piles in the Mt. San Jacinto State Park off Highway 243.

The project was to begin Tuesday, Dec. 13, and continue throughout the week, weather permitting. The final burn date will be determined by permissive burn day availability and weather.

Residents in the Idyllwild and Pine Cove area or anyone traveling on Highway 243 may see smoke from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the days of the burn. In the unlikely event you smell smoke, Riverside County officials urge you to take precautions to reduce any harmful health effects by limiting outdoor activities.

This burn is being conducted as part of the Cal Fire Vegetation Management Program, and is intended to reduce hazardous vegetation and wildland fuels in an area considered to be at high risk for large and damaging wildfires. Prescribed burns are done to help reduce the wildfire risk and promote biodiversity through the development of young trees, shrubs and grasses in a fire-dependent ecosystem.

The prescribed burn was planned and coordinated with the South Coast Air Quality Management District and the California Air Resources Board in order to minimize the smoke impacts on surrounding communities. The burn is dependent on weather and air-quality conditions that are favorable for smoke dispersal. If the conditions are not as desired, the burn will be rescheduled

Forecasters: No end to drought this winter

Despite the relatively normal fall rainfall, the National Weather Service's latest long-range forecast is pessimistic regarding a wet winter and the end of the five-year drought, which is expected to enter its sixth year next spring.

On Dec. 8, NWS issued its winter forecast that said, "Given the current conditions and the mod-

el forecasts, the forecaster consensus also favors the continuation of weak La Niña conditions through [December, January, February] ... 2016-17."

La Niña conditions typically bring below-average rainfall and warmer temperatures to Southern California. It is possible that more neutral conditions will form later in winter, NWS added.

However, the interagency, the Southern California Geographic

Area Coordination Center's Predictive Services Unit's forecast is less optimistic: "The deficits in precipitation may be most acute during January and February which is ordinarily the wettest part of the year. Should this come to fruition, this would mark the 6th season in a row of below normal precipitation during the height of the 'rainy season'"
