County executive not worried about budget

Board split on urgency to address deficits

The budget problems hanging over Riverside County are not disconcerting the board. County Executive Officer Jay Orr told the supervisors in his presentation last week, "This is not the time to panic."

At the close of the 90-minute budget review, President John Tavaglione (2nd District) repeated Orr's admonition: "We don't want to panic, but in the hallways we hear it. We've been through this before ... we'll make it work."

Nevertheless, Orr painted a bleak picture for the next couple of fiscal years. His staff feels revenue may be as much as \$8 million below initial estimates, the Fire Department's costs will increase because of the new labor contract and the In-Home Supportive Services costs (nearly \$45 million) will be shifted from the state to the county.

"The year-to-date results indicate revenues are trending down," said Paul MacDonald, finance of-

ficer. "But there is greater concern about substantial cost increases in future years coming from Sacramento ... Balancing the fiscal year 2017-18 budget without substantial costs will be challenging."

Yet, Orr did not recommend any adjustments to this year's or the next year's budget plans. "If the next two years are worse, why are we waiting six more months to fix it?" asked Supervisor Kevin Jeffries (1st District).

KPMG, the consultant hired two years ago to help devise budget savings and introduce more efficient procedures, is working with the county. Orr anticipates some preliminary results can be announced in the next few months. Currently, KPMG is testing an alternative staffing plan with the Sheriff's Department. If successful, it may save the county several million dollars.

Until these types of savings become concrete, Orr is projecting significant demands on the next few budgets, which could become worse depending upon how Con-

gress repeals or replaces the Affordable Care Act.

Orr stressed that going forward, the Executive Office needs "... everybody to row in the same boat together." The future direction, he added, is finding new efficiencies.

For example, Orr is scheduling a discussion of alternatives for how the Fire Department will handle another \$11 million needed for fiscal 2017-18.

"This calls for a discussion by the board of fire resources and how we provide fire service. These costs simply need to be absorbed," he said. "I've asked fire to come back to the Executive Office with solutions and scenarios so they can be presented to the board in March."

Other costs that shortly will confront the county are staffing to open the new East County Detention Center, which has been deferred in past budgets, and CalPERS, which has lowered its rate of investment, causing local governments to increase their contributions.

Orr warned the supervisors that applying best-management

practices may create "... painful discussions. Should we contract out, should we eliminate or should we re-evaluate our commitment to a service?"

Both 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington and Jeffries were concerned about the effect these future funding changes will have on the unincorporated areas of the county.

"A very small percentage of overall population of the county will feel the worst. They are already feeling it with reduction in the Sheriff's Department and Fire next. Chipping away at Code [Enforcement] and Animal Services can't be far behind," Jeffries said.

Washington's comments also focused on the impacts to the 3rd District, including the Hill. "My constituents and I share a concern about public safety and impact to the region," he said. "I don't see a list with solutions to that problem. What I see in front of us is worsening of that problem. The containment of costs can't all be on the shoulders of staffing."

The Idyllwild Arts Academy Jazz Combo returned to the top of the podium, taking first place in the 49th Berklee High School Jazz Festival, small combo, (S-4) smaller-school category. Once again, two IAA musicians were honored in the highest individual award categories — Owen Zorn, bass, for Superior Musicianship, and Sumi Onoe, piano, for Outstanding Musicianship.

Paul Carman, jazz studies faculty, took a drummer-less sextet to Berklee — Mark Beebe, alto sax, 10th grade; Moe Fienberg, trumpet, 11th grade; Quincy Ryan, guitar, 12th grade; Bella Hartmann, bass, 12th grade; Owen Zorn, bass,

12th grade; and Sumi Onoe, piano, 12th grade.

"It was absolutely amazing to come in first place at a prestigious competition like this without a drummer," said Carman. "The students played as well or better than I have ever heard them. I could hear the judges behind me gasping and commenting with things like 'Wow!'"

Carman noted these results were especially astounding given that the group arrived in Boston at 9 a.m., went to the hotel, got two hours of sleep and then played in competition at 1 p.m. The sextet played "Ecaroh" by Horace Silver, "Gabriela Rise" by Russell Frantz and "O.P." by Charles Mingus.

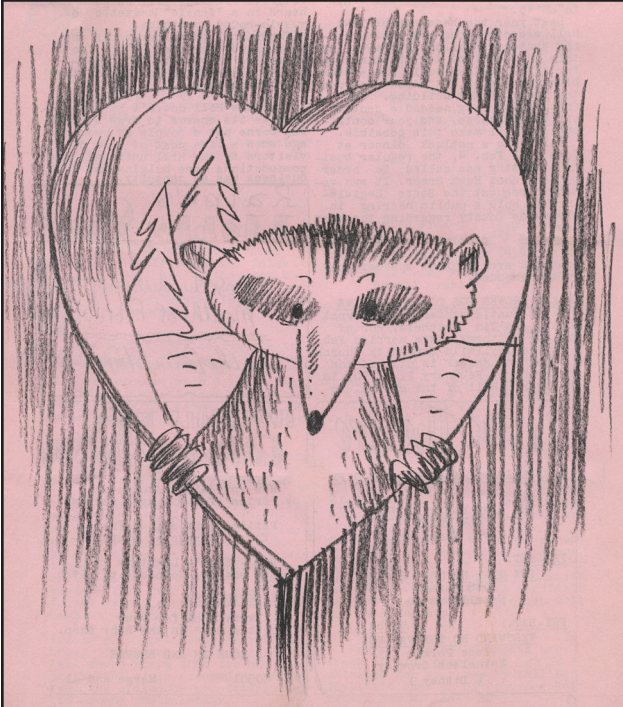

Propane residential delivery prices rise slightly

National average at \$2.46 per gallon

Editor's note: We will do an end-of-winter price survey and ask cooperating companies for best estimate over-views of the season to come.

Mid-winter propane “spot” prices rose slightly from last month but are considerably higher, 123 percent higher, than the same time last year. Spot prices are those at point-of-production. A common national reference standard is the spot price at the Mont Belvieu, Texas, terminal, where this week it is \$0.814 per gallon. Last year, same date, the spot price was \$0.365 per gallon. In theory, anyone could walk in to the Mont Belvieu terminal and buy propane for the daily spot price.

The variance between “spot” and “delivery” price includes costs of transportation to regional storage facilities and distribution costs from local storage to point-of-use by end-consumers. Distribution costs also include costs of in-place safety programs and measures, as well as taxes and government fees from local, state and federal regulations.

Residential propane delivery prices vary widely nationally. This week, the national home delivery price is \$2.46 per gallon. Regionally, the lower Atlantic region is paying the most per gallon at an average of \$3.20; the Midwest is paying the least at an average of \$1.83 per gallon; and the West is near the national average at \$2.56 per gallon.

Propane pricing is not government regulated, meaning that propane delivery companies can charge whatever the market will bear. On the Hill, those prices can vary widely. Some users are paying around \$2 per gallon while others may be paying nearly twice as much. It is in the consumer's interest to shop — not just for best price per gallon, but to understand other associated charges and fees.

Because prices can be negotiated, it is important to know what questions to ask, in addition to price-per-gallon, before contracting with or changing a local supplier — questions such as:

- What is the price per gallon (ppg) for new-user “first fill” as opposed to ppg for existing customers?
- What is the difference in ppg if tank is owned by the customer instead of leased from the propane provider (ppg for customer-owned tank can be significantly lower)?
- Does the propane provider sell tanks and if so, what is the cost, for either new or refurbished tanks?
- What does the provider charge for annual tank rentals (those fees can vary widely among area providers)?
- Does the provider have large-capacity propane storage facilities either on the Hill or at the bottom of the Hill (if a company has storage facilities, it is better able to keep customer ppg relatively stable when refinery spot prices are spiking)?
- What are the policy differences and additional charges for being on a fill-as-needed route as opposed to fill-on-demand from customer who has elected to call in when they need a fill?
- And lastly, what charges are there, if any, for emergency fills if, for any reason, the propane tank becomes empty?

Of those companies that will provide information to the Town Crier (Suburban and Ferrellgas historically have not), this week's propane pricing is as follows:

- AC Propane pricing is not available this week as owner Dave Castaldo is out of town. Most recent end-of-year pricing was \$2.39 per gallon and \$1.99 for customer-owned tank.
- Amerigas community pricing is up from \$1.99 per gallon to \$2.19 with no discount for customer-owned tank. Tank rental is \$40 per year
- Diamond Valley is at \$2.54 per gallon and \$2.34 for customer-owned tank. Tank rental is \$32.33 per year.
- SoCal Propane is at \$2.77 per gallon and \$2.47 for customer-owned tank with discounts per gallon for veterans and for customer referrals (Discount of 10 cents per gallon ongoing for veterans and 10 cents per gallon per season both for a customer who refers a new customer and also for the new customer. Tank rentals are \$70 per year for a 250-gallon tank and \$80 for a 500-gallon tank.

Village Market rolls out major remodel, merchandise revamp

New Village Market owner Jay McCormack knows groceries. And he knows turnarounds — taking an existing market and with careful analysis of its location's demographics, building a business that caters to and suits the community.

McCormack is in Idyllwild for the long haul. “I have a 10-year lease with options for an additional 20,” he said. And he brings solid knowledge of the grocery industry, having helmed nine Rio Ranch Markets in Riverside County.

“I have done complete remodels and turnarounds within 60 to 90 days,” said McCormack. “We’re replacing the floor at Village Market starting on Monday, Feb. 20, with a commercial-grade, wood-looking laminated floor product.”

McCormack will revamp existing product lines, but slowly, and only after getting a better sense of what the community of Idyllwild wants and would value. “We want to be a company that's involved in the community and that gives it a place where they'll feel comfortable and find quality, main-line products at reasonable prices,” said McCormack.

“Grocery stores are always a work in progress. If you don't innovate, you close. It will take us some time to get our pricing set. I imagine we'll have a grand opening within about 90 days.”

Rather than announce product lines at this point in time, McCormack said that would occur after getting a better idea of what the community wants. One thing they will be offering is a line of organic products, the scope of which is still to be determined. “I think within 30 days we'll have a good idea of what our future plans will be. We're going to try to help move some of the products that Sky Island had when it closed.”

McCormack knows marketing. When he opened Rio Ranch Market in Twentynine Palms, he was competing with a new Stater Bros. market many times the square footage of his store. But within a short time, having researched the community and its food needs, McCormack had tripled his store's income and was soon doing a third of the business the much larger Stater Bros. was doing.

“We're here to take care of the community,” he stressed. In short, McCormack and his family will be upgrading market products, dining and customer services. “We'll be announcing our specific plans as they unfold.”

Rio Ranch Market was founded in 1983 and eventually grew to nine locations — three in San Bernardino, and single stores in Riverside, Chino, Twentynine

Palms, Banning, Yucaipa and Highland, with a marketing plan geared to appeal to the growing Latino community, as well as the general population. McCormack has served as chairman of the California Grocers Association Board of Directors.

In Perris, McCormack partnered with the city's Redevelopment Agency, spending \$2 million to gut the prospective store's interior and remodel the inside. City officials worked with the company and provided redevelopment funds to pay for parking lot, exterior lighting and façade improvements to the mall that the supermarket would anchor.

Rio Ranch's marketing approach has been to position their stores as strong price competitors, matching Stater Bros. and Food 4 Less on main-line items, and with more aggressive and attractive prices on perishables. McCormack cautioned that he may not be able to duplicate the pricing models of off-Hill stores because he still has to pay to have it trucked up the Hill, but that his pricing, when determined, will be locally competitive and fair.



So, keep putting your voices out there.

A HEALTHY IDYLLWILD

Gentlemen, please do not neglect your prostates. Know the symptoms of problems and get your regular checkups. True enough, at least one check for prostate health is a cause for grimacing. But we all get prodded and poked by our favorite health-care providers, regardless of gender. So, buck up.

Here’s something to cheer you. An alternative meaning found on the Internet: “Pokémon, n.: A Rastafarian proctologist.”

What is the prostate?
A gland in the male reproductive system just below the bladder surrounding the tube (urethra) that empties the bladder through which one urinates; it produces a fluid that forms part of semen.

What is Benign Prostatic Hypertrophy (BPH)?
A benign (non-cancerous) condition in which an overgrowth of prostate tissue pushes against the urethra and the bladder, blocking the flow of urine.

What is prostate cancer?
Cancer that forms in the tissues of the prostate gland, usually occurring in older men, may be slow-growing and localized. Nevertheless, this cancer can spread. Only 3 percent of American men die of this cancer. Note: Not all medical groups agree on cancer screening recommendations. See websites listed above.

Your prostate naturally changes by enlarging with age; this in itself is not a health problem. Most changes are not cancerous. You may have an infection/inflammation or an enlarged prostate known as BPH. Both of these conditions, and prostate cancer, cause symptoms in the flow of urine.

So, if you notice these symptoms, you should consult your health-care provider: passing urine more often during day or night, feeling an urgency to urinate, less flow of urine or a burning feeling. Remember, most changes are not cancer.

Even though only 16 percent of American men are diagnosed with prostate cancer and only 3 percent of American men die of it, a cancer diagnosis is a major life event for most folks.

If you are diagnosed with prostate cancer and need to begin the decision-making process about what to do next, you and your family may wish to request information from your provider regarding the nature of your prostate cancer, what are the available approaches for managing the condition, and what are the benefits and harms of these approaches, including their likelihood of occurrence, as well as the likelihood of recurrence of the cancer itself.

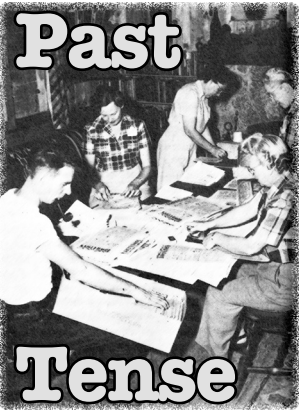
Perhaps ask about complementary/alternative medicine options. (For instance, acupuncture has been shown to be very effective in controlling nausea and vomiting resulting from chemotherapy).

Don’t forget to discuss how the various options might affect your quality of life. This is increasingly important to us as we age, with some of us opting out of certain treatment choices because of debilitating side effects.

Whatever management course you select, your overall care management goals with your family and health-care team might include achieving a well-organized process with an evidence-based protocol of periodic testing, adding in timely decision-making about any future treatment.

One more: “Rectitude, n.: The formal, dignified bearing adopted by proctologists.”

CSA 38 reviews project plans

Type 6 engine still coming to Pine Cove

No new actions were taken at the Feb. 8 meeting of the County Service Area 38 (Pine Cove) Advisory Committee.

The committee did review the status of several proposed acquisitions and projects — purchase of a wood chipper and masticator, the Type 6 engine, and constructing the shade cover and deck for Station 23.

Michael Franklin, principal development specialist for the Community Services Division in the county’s Economic Development Agency, said he is working with the county purchasing department to acquire the chipper.

He believes a request for bids will be issued before March. Riverside County Fire Division Chief Bill Weiser had some estimates for the cost of the chipper, and Franklin said these and other specifications were incorporated into the request for bids.

The purchase of the masticator, although it is estimated to cost less, will follow the chipper’s acquisition. Committee member Marge Muir confirmed that a process for using this equipment will be developed and implemented.

The new Type 6 engine being purchased for Pine Cove is moving forward, according to Cal Fire Moun-

tain Battalion Chief Chris Carrera. Committee President Jerry Holldber said he was told the engine might be available by the end of February, but may need to be equipped.

A committee, created to make recommendations on the future use of Squad 23 when the Type 6 engine is ready for use, has not met yet. Several members were planning to visit the station after the advisory committee meeting.

The shade cover for the fuel area behind the station on the Pine Cove Water District property is moving forward. Franklin expects that PCWD will manage this project and costs will be shared. However, he cautioned that before construction begins, an agreement between PCWD and CSA 38 may need the approval of the Riverside County Board of Supervisors.

“This is just one way to move forward, but it is likely to be more cost-efficient,” he stated.

The project to cover for the station’s deck from direct sun will be managed by the EDA project management office, according to Franklin. “It’s a separate project and close to construction start.”

At the beginning of the meeting, the committee reviewed its financial report through the end of November 2016. At that time, CSA 38 had \$730,000, but none of these projects or purchases had been completed.

In response to Muir’s question, Franklin said the committee could be working on the fiscal year 2017-18 budget in March or April. At that point, a more current cash total would likely be available.

Pine Cove Water budget ‘in excellent shape,’ Holldber says

Water usage constant

At its first meeting of 2017, the Pine Cove Water District Board of Directors reviewed finances and held a closed session regarding a lease for use of the Rocky Point Communication site.

At the meeting, the board looked at both the December and January financials and saw its cash balance growing.

The \$203,00 balance [for December] is a little above normal,” General Manager Jerry Holldber told the board. And January’s cash grew 25 percent, totalling \$258,000.

“The January amount is excellent,” he continued. This includes a one-time \$20,000 payment from American Tower [for a Rocky Point lease adjustment].

For the first six months of fiscal year 2016-17, which ends June 30, PCWD’s income was 45 percent of the projected total or nearly \$390,000. Expenses totaled \$404,000. Reserves are sufficient to offset the deficit until the end of the fiscal year. Holldber added that the spring tax revenue would be higher and, “We’re in excellent shape.”

He also explained that January water bills were not based on actual reading of the meters. Because of the snow, staff was not able to read many meters. Only the

minimum payment of \$62 is being charged. Next month, a reading of use since November will be on the bill. But Holldber stressed that the tier levels will be doubled to account for two billing periods.

“We did not estimate,” Holldber told the board. “We’ll include an explanation in the next billing statement.”

December’s water usage fell 11 percent from December 2015’s usage. However, January 2017 usage was up 9 percent from January 2016.

Total 2016 usage was 31.9-million gallons, which was 188,000 gallons (0.6 percent) greater than 2015’s total of 31.7-million gallons. Most of that increase occurred between July and September.

Although the district’s static-well level still fell a foot, Holldber said the “recent moisture has not reached the well levels. Give it time and we’ll see them rise. It takes a while.”

He also announced that a recent inspection of storage tanks is completed and nothing unexpected was discovered.

“If weather permits, we’ll return to our previous procedure of draining one tank each year and doing any repairs ourselves,” he noted.

After a closed session regarding the Rocky Point property, Robert Hewitt, PCWD board president, announced that Holldber had been appointed negotiator for terms of a current lease.

Black History Month Concert at Idyllwild Arts

Gershwin's 'Rhapsody in Blue' is featured

Idyllwild Arts Academy honors Black History Month with a concert featuring the Idyllwild Arts Academy Orchestra and jazz faculty head Marshall Hawkins' Seahawk Modern Jazz Orchestra.

Black History Month is observed in the U.S., Canada and the United Kingdom for remembrance of important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. In 1976, as part of the country's bicentennial, the United States officially sanctioned the annual observance of Black History Month. President Gerald Ford urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often-neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

Featured at the Saturday, Feb. 18, IAA concert are two groundbreaking American musical compositions — William Grant Still's 1930 "Afro-American Symphony No. 1 in A flat," the first symphony written by an African-American and performed for a U.S. audience by a leading symphony orchestra. The Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra premiered Still's symphony in 1931. It is written for full orchestra, including celeste, harp and tenor banjo.

In each of four movements, Still uses quotes from black poet Paul Laurence Dunbar, one of the first African-American writers to establish an international reputation. The New York Times called Dunbar "a true singer of the people — white or black."

The final movement includes this non-dialect quote — "Be proud, my Race, in mind and soul, Thy name is writ on Glory's scroll, In characters of fire."

Just as groundbreaking, but probably more familiar to wider audiences, is George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue," premiered by Paul Whiteman's Palais Royal Or-

chestra on Feb. 12, 1924, at Aeolian Hall in Manhattan. It was intended to be a public introduction to a new form, symphonic jazz, and was part of Whiteman's educational offering, "An Experiment in Modern Music."

With Gershwin at the piano and important compos-

ers, including John Phillip Sousa and Sergei Rachmaninoff, in attendance, "Rhapsody" was enthusiastically received.

At the piano at the concert will be IAA music senior Sumi Onoe. She just won one of two top individual awards at the Berklee High School Jazz Festival in Boston. She is a gifted and versatile musician. Onoe said she is thrilled to be playing Gershwin's iconic piece with full orchestra. Originally orchestrated by Ferde Grofé for the 1924 premiere, Onoe and the IAA Orchestra, under the direction of Scott Hosfeld, will be playing Grofé's revised 1942 orchestration, the one most familiar to American audiences.

Idyllwild's own jazz legend Marshall Hawkins will be featuring many of his distinguished jazz friends at the concert, including vocalist Sherry Williams; pianist, arranger and conductor John Rodby; master drummer and singer Najite Agindotan, guitarist Bob Boss; Latin percussionist Roy Gonzales, tenor sax man Charles Owens; drummer Brett Sanders; and, of course, Hawkins himself on bass.

True to jazz tradition, Hawkins and Seahawk MoJO's section will be free form and flowing. It will include the music of Duke Ellington, Thelonious Monk and the late Daniel Jackson, renowned sax player, and San Diego gentleman of jazz. "Daniel's the only man I know who has an entire week dedicated to him by a major city [San Diego]," said Hawkins. "So it's especially meaningful that we'll also be featuring his student Alvin Paige [tenor sax] of the International Academy of Jazz, San Diego."

Hawkins said some of his MoJO musicians will be sitting in with the IAA Orchestra in their two pieces.

The concert is at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 18, in Lowman Concert Hall on the Idyllwild Arts campus. It is open to the public and admission is free.

IAA junior discusses the challenges of songwriting

The next speaker in the Idy Talks series is Au Jean Rhee, a junior in the Academy songwriting program. This year's Idyllwild Community Center Speaker Series is called Idy Talks, noting the pairing between ICC and Idyllwild Arts Academy.

Hailing from Seoul, Korea, Au Jean is a well-grounded musician and has the support of her family in pursuing this course of study. "I came here in the 10th grade and my mother was flexible with the idea," said Au Jean. "She is a classical music arts director, skilled in piano and writing. My father works in the social sciences but also plays guitar."

"I knew instinctively when I was around 10 that I'd do something similar to my mom. Plus, my family members on my mother's side are all artists — in architecture and in wood carving."

Au Jean discovered Idyllwild when a co-worker of her mother revealed she had graduated from the academy.

Au Jean plays piano and guitar, and writes both music and lyrics for her songs. Asked what comes first, music or lyric, Au Jean explained: "For me, it's melody or rhythm. I think melody is the most important." Asked to describe her style, she said she feels the most affinity with Britpop (British pop music) beginning with the Beatles. "That was the music that most influenced me."

Asked how she tells her story, how her lyrics unfold, she said, "I don't tell the story directly, in a linear timeframe or by events. For me, it is the feeling that moves me forward."

In pop music, one has choices — to write what the songwriter feels will sell or to write what is in the songwriter's interior life. "I write for myself," said Au Jean. Her lyrics

have some evocative conceptual pairings such as "the taste of your last name," and, "Thought I was drowning when I saw you, through the fogged window, in my unpleasantly soupy room."

But Au Jean is looking forward to broadening her professional base in college with courses in producing, the business of pop music and music marketing. "I'm also studying creative writing at Idyllwild Arts," she noted.

"I think I have an old-soul vibe," she said. "I like using old-style melodies and then adding modern elements. Songwriting as a major is tricky. That's why I'm also looking to mix music marketing, business and production."

Au Jean speaks at 6 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 23, at Silver Pines Lodge. There is a wine and cheese reception that precedes her talk at 5:30 p.m. Both are open and free to the public.

IN BRIEF

CDC recommends fewer shots

The Center for Disease Control now recommends that 11- to 12-year-olds receive two doses of human papillomavirus vaccine at least six months apart rather than the previously recommended three doses to protect against cancers caused by HPV infections. Teens and young adults who start the series later, at ages 15 to 26, will continue to need three doses of HPV vaccine.

CDC Director Tom Frieden said, "This recommendation will make it simpler for parents to get their children protected in time."


Generally, preteens receive HPV vaccine at the same time as whooping cough and meningitis vaccines. Adolescents ages 13 to 14 also are able to receive an HPV vaccination on the new two-dose schedule.


