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Idyllwild Fire anticipates small increases for next budget

In an informal meeting, two members of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's Finance Committee discussed with staff the status of the current-year budget and progress on preparation of the fiscal 2017-18 budget last week.

After three-quarters of this fiscal year is completed, expenditures have exceeded revenue by only \$4,300. IFPD has received 60 percent of its estimated property-tax revenue and expects the final 40 percent in the next two months, which should generate a positive net income at the end of the fiscal year.

For next fiscal year, which begins July 1, IFPD projects revenue will grow about 4.6 percent and expenses will grow about 4.4 percent, according to Battalion

Chief Mark LaMont who presented the draft budget.

While property taxes may increase 3.3 percent, revenue from ambulance service is projected to grow from \$380,000 this year to \$445,000 next year, a 16.8-percent increase. But the third major revenue source, mutual aid, is not projected to grow more than \$6,000.

While salaries are projected to increase about \$70,000 to \$1.1 million, the benefits category will increase about \$67,000 or 13 percent. This is primarily for unfunded retiree health-care benefits for CalPERS.

The salary growth is consistent with the IFPD's agreement with the Career Firefighters Association, LaMont said. It also reflects that IFPD filled several vacancies this year and the anticipated retirement of Capt. Jack Peckham later this

spring.

The rest of the budget is stable with small decreases anticipated. Major repairs were completed on the ambulance fleet and one of the engines this year so maintenance costs should decline, he added.

A separate capital budget was not included, but IFPD does expect that all of the financial payments for brush engine 621 and the squad will be by completed next year.

Commissioner Jerry Buchanan, a member of the finance committee, said, "It looks like a well-balanced budget. You'll continue to revise it, and we'll adopt a preliminary budget in May or June."

This draft will be presented to the full commission at its April 25 meeting for comments before a preliminary budget is brought forward for approval.

Indivisibles learn how to be journalists and speak as a group

Two women from the desert area were the guest speakers at last week's Idyllwild Indivisible meeting: Maggie Downs, a journalist, and Joy Silver, an LGBT and aging consultant, as well as organizer of Courageous Resistance.

Downs encouraged the attendees to become citizen journalists during the age of President Trump. She has spent more than 14 years as a journalist with daily papers such as the New York Times, the Washington Post and the Cincinnati Inquirer, as well as a columnist and blogger.

"I feel it is more important now than ever before to carry the torch and all be journalists," Downs began. "Approach your opposition like a journalist working a beat."

This was her first suggestion — find a beat. "Find something to be passionate about and make that your goal. Read a lot of articles on both sides of the issue," she urged people.

She offered 10 more tips for becoming a citizen journalist in today's environment. She discussed how to collect information and how to use it or

disseminate it. Collecting news and understanding it involves greeting sources skeptically, demanding answers from officials, asking questions and listening to everyone's positions.

When sharing this information or news, she urged one to be accurate and to be clear. But, also, she said her success has come from advice that an early mentor shared with her. "Elevate the voices not being heard," she said. "Those who are loudest have an agenda. Find those who aren't being heard and lift them up."

The method for making the vital point is storytelling, not simply facts, but the consequence of actions on people.

Silver, originally from New York, has been an activist in the LGBT community since the 1980s.

Her advice, based on her experience, was "working together makes things happen. Bring many people together to have an impact." That is one goal of the Courageous Resistance movement, bringing similar minds together and collectively an action will evolve.

While bringing people together is an important step, it should not be replaced with political purity, she admonished. "That

hinders and stops progressive change," she stated.

She also made the same point as Downs about finding the subject that creates and feeds your passions. "You can't do everything. Learn to focus on a goal and become relentless in its pursuit," she advised.

The two speakers

were followed by Carmen Ginter, a member of Idyllwild Indivisibles, who was recruiting people to join her subgroup working on immigration issues, such as Senate Bill 54, establishing California as a sanctuary state.

Prescription drug 'Take-Back' day

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department is partnering with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration in a nationwide prescription drug "Take-Back" day. The event is from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, April 29. The program allows members of the public to drop off potentially dangerous, expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs for destruction at any of the several sheriff's stations throughout the county.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to misuse and abuse. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

Also, many Americans don't know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them down the toilet or throwing them away — both potential safety and health hazards.

The service is free and anonymous with no questions asked. Drop off prescription drugs that day at Hemet Sheriff's Station, 43950 Acacia Ave., Suite B, Hemet.

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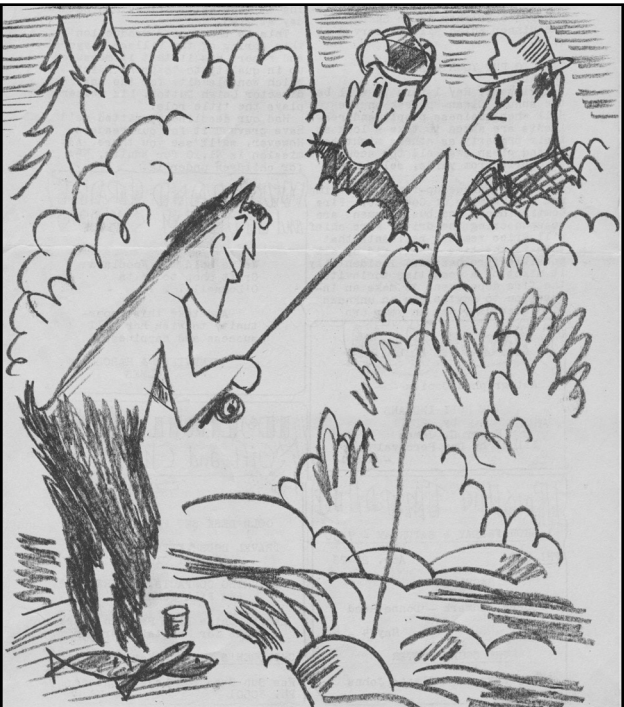

Who Believes in Climate Change?

Just a bunch of tree-hugging, liberal snowflakes, right?

Well, maybe not. Groups like ConservAmerica and RepublicEn, and religious groups like the Catholic Climate Covenant, recognize the urgent need to address climate change. Pope Francis said there has “never been such a clear need for science” to guide human actions to safeguard the future of the planet.

About 97 percent of climate scientists agree that climate change is real and human-caused. If 97 percent of the architects said your house was in danger of collapsing, would you want your grandchildren to live in it?

Imagine how heartbroken we'd be if Idyllwild became uninhabitable due to lack of water. Imagine how scared we'd be if we were joining a mass exodus of environmental refugees, all competing for dwindling resources.

If it's Really that Serious ...

Won't world leaders fix it? Sadly, there's been a lot of talk, but not nearly enough accomplished. The last three years were the warmest on record. The U.N. warned that unless nations ramp up their carbon-reduction pledges before 2020, it will be nearly impossible to keep warming to 2 degrees — the limit scientists estimate to be safe.

Legislators want a March presidential primary

Last week, California Secretary of State Alex Padilla testified in support of moving the California presidential primary back to the third Tuesday of March.

Like a child seeking attention, California has been yo-yoing its presidential primary between June and earlier months in order to gain a stronger voice in the choice of the presidential candidates.

“SB 568 will help make California relevant again in the selection process of our next president. In 2016, the two candidates had nearly sewn up their party's nomination by the time our state's primary election was held in June,” said Assembly Speaker pro Tempore Kevin Mullin. “As the world's sixth largest economy with the nation's largest population, it's absurd that California had no real say in who the presidential candidates would be.”

In 2016, the state primary was in June, but both parties had essentially identified who would be their candidates through the earlier primaries. Donald Trump defeated a cadre of more than a dozen other Republicans for the party's nomination and Hillary Clinton struggled with the challenge of Sen. Bernie Sanders, but her nomination was seldom in doubt.

“Too often, California votes too late to impact and influence the presidential nominating process,” Alex Padilla said in a press release. “Too often, California is relegated to serving as the nation's political ATM. California is the largest and most diverse state in the nation and we deserve our commensurate voice in the nomination of presidential candidates. SB 568 gives power to the California voters by putting our presidential primary in prime time.”

Despite a large turnout for the June primary in 2016, Padilla was disappointed. “If it was just up to me, let's

make California right after Iowa, or New Hampshire,” he said in an interview with the San Diego Union Tribune, “If California would be consistently third, then California would be consistently very much paid attention to in the primary by both parties.”

This is not the first effort to bring California to the front of the presidential race. In 1996, the state's presidential primary was in March. Nine other states had already held their primaries and 13 other states held their primaries on the same day, according to the report from the Senate Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments.

In 2008, the California primary was in February for presidential race as well as state and local offices. This was deemed too early and the primaries were returned to the first Tuesday in June.

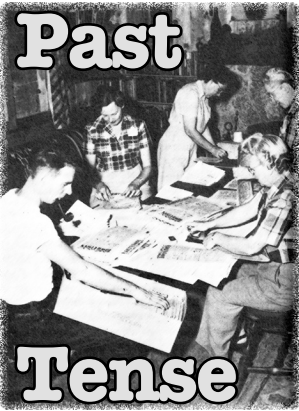
The bill's sponsor, Sen. Ricardo Lara (D-Bell Gardens), said “The goal of Senate Bill 568 is to move California's presidential primary election to third after Iowa and New Hampshire. Specifically, SB 568 calls for the California presidential primary to be held on the third Tuesday in March and authorizes the governor to move it even earlier if other states move up their primary elections.”

SB 568 would also move up primary elections in statewide office and legislative races, eliminating potential voter confusion from multiple election dates.

Also last week, Padilla announced his support for Assembly Bill 668, the Voting Modernization Bond Act of 2018, which seeks \$450 million to improve California's voting systems. The funding would update aging equipment and also modernize how the state conducts elections to improve the voting experience.

In March, the Legislative Analyst's Office asked the Legislature to consider one-time funding to replace aging voting systems.

IWD proceeding with pipeline project; foregoes well project

The Idyllwild Water District is tentatively moving forward on a project to replace pipelines from Bicknell and Reed lanes along Marian View Drive and also Cedar Street.

At the request of Director Steve Kunkle at last week's meeting, the board postponed a decision on awarding a contract to Albert A. Webb and Associates, who designed the project, for assistance on reviewing and managing the bidding process. The intent of the postponement, which should not affect the availability of grant funding, is to get some thoughts about the project from former employees.

But the project to rehabilitate the horizontal wells above Foster Lake has been abandoned. This project was to be completed with grant funds from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The grant was awarded in August 2015 and the project had to be completed by this August. In January 2017, when Interim General Manager Jack Hoagland started at IWD, little useful work had been done. Less than a

year to design, bid and complete the work is insufficient, he told the board.

"I found no evidence of any work done on the project," he told the board. "[The former general manager] may have talked to some people, but that's not apparent."

While the district does get some production from these wells, Hoagland recommended that the work could improve their capacity.

He has spoken to the U.S.D.A. representative who said IWD was not the only agency in the situation of being unable to spend the funds within the time period; however, there are several other grant programs for which IWD might be eligible and apply for funding.

The board also approved a new conflict-of-interest policy and set June 21 as the date for a public hearing on the standby water and sewer fees. These are imposed on lots within the district that do not have meters. Lots within the sewer district but not connected to the system also are charged a standby fee.

The amount has not changed in decades, \$30 per acre or portion, and the funds are used to defray capital investments to maintain the system. Current users pay for these costs in monthly bills. Future customers will bene-

fit from this investment and their standby fees are a portion of their share of the capital investment to maintain the system.

The board also approved a resolution requesting the Riverside County Registrar of Voters to conduct an election for four directors in August.

The terms of directors Vic Sirkin and Geoffrey Caine expire in December. They replaced former directors Mike Freitas and John Cook, who were re-elected in 2013, and would have had to stand for re-election if they wished to continue on the board.

Directors Charles Schelly and Peter Szabadi replaced former directors Jim Billman and June Rockwell, who were elected in 2015. These terms expire in December 2019. But since an election occurs before the terms expire, the replacements must stand for election for the remaining two years of the term.

IWD's water production in March was 700,000 gallons less than in February and about 200,000 gallons less than a year ago. For the first three months of 2017, production is about 300,000 gallons less than the first quarter of 2016.

planned but not started this year.

The sewer program is expected to produce \$750,000 in revenue and cost \$560,000 to operate. No changes to the sewer-rate structure are being proposed.

Hoagland's capital program for the sewer district is estimated to cost \$170,000, resulting in a total net income of \$23,000 for this program.

The major sewer project (\$135,000) will be to video portions of the internal pipeline system and start maintenance.

Although the board had little comment on the proposed budget, re-structuring of the water-rate charges generated a long discussion.

The proposed water-rate structure would provide every customer with 300 cubic feet (nearly 2,250 gallons)

of pre-paid water. The next 2,250 gallons would be charged \$18.93 and then \$89.90 for the next 6,750 gallons. Usage beyond that level would be charged \$.013 per gallon.

The current rate structure provides more prepaid water to meters larger than 5/8- inches, although only 21 of the 1,460 residential meters exceed that size. The current monthly base rate for the preponderance of customers is \$28.70. This would be raised \$1 to \$29.70 with an additional 375 gallons.

For residences with a ¾-inch meter, the monthly base fee would be reduced from \$43.04 to \$40.35. But the prepaid water would be reduced from 2,805 gallons to 2,250 gallons. A customer with a 1-inch meter currently pays \$83.19 per month and receives a base of 5,425 gallons prepaid. This monthly fee would be reduced \$22 and the prepaid volume reduced 3,200 gallons to the 2,250-gallon

amount granted to the other meter owners.

All customers pay the same per-gallon amount for any usage greater than 2,250 gallons per month.

A similar approach was applied to commercial customers, also. The monthly base rate would be reduced and the prepaid usage eliminated. Commercial customers will pay for every gallon consumed.

A higher rate for larger meters is justified because they impose a responsibility on the district to have more water available for the customers. Thus, greater storage, more wells and bigger pipes will impose capital costs on the district over time, according to Hoagland.

However, Director Vic Sirkin argued that these costs should be reflected in the cost of connecting to the water system; usage fees should not depend upon the size of the meter. Marge Muir, local re-

al-estate broker in the audience, agreed with Sirkin.

In Sirkin's opinion, the larger, especially the 1-inch meters, are becoming more common in order to comply with state law requiring sprinkler systems in newly constructed homes. However, these owners essentially use the same volume of water, (unless there is a fire); yet, their monthly base fee is twice the homeowner with a 5/8-inch meter.

"We're penalizing in perpetuity a homeowner who has no intention to use more water. And the investments to guarantee the greater capacity demand can benefit their neighbor," Sirkin opined.

Directors Peter Szabadi and Geoffrey Caine asked Hoagland to calculate what a single monthly fee would be in order to maintain the current revenue level.

County Executive Officer Jay Orr to retire at the end of August

Riverside County Executive Officer Jay Orr will retire Aug. 31, five years after taking over as the county's top administrator.

Orr helped navigate Riverside County through the tail-end of the nation's worst recession in more than half a century, and into a slow recovery beset by new and unexpected fiscal challenges. He marked his tenure by raising wellness and health care to the forefront of the county's agenda and leaves after 34 years in public service, having held positions in Riverside County that include assistant district attorney, code enforcement director and deputy public defender.

Orr said he wants to spend more time with family, pursue new challenges and enjoy hobbies that include playing guitar, collecting pens and golf.

"I've had a dream career," he said. "I have been a

prosecutor, defense attorney, teacher, attended the U.S. Naval Academy and more. How many people get to serve our community in so many different ways?"

Orr notified the Board of Supervisors on April 18 and thanked them for their trust and support during his tenure. His platform as executive officer included increasing county efficiency through technology, improving wellness and health care countywide, and spurring economic development.

Board of Supervisors Chairman John Tavaglione praised the leadership and stability Orr brought the county at the end of the recession and during the subsequent slow recovery.

"At the same time, he introduced innovative and cost-saving ideas that will place county agencies on solid financial footing for decades," Tavaglione said. "Our board wishes Jay nothing but the best as he enters the next and exciting chapter of his professional

career."

Orr pushed to consolidate the county's information technology functions, and will be leaving as the county strives to implement greater use of data-driven decisions aimed at streamlining operations and reducing costs. He also oversaw the financial rebound of what was then called the Riverside County Regional Medical Center, which had been losing \$1 million a week.

A timetable and process for choosing Orr's successor has not been established.

Orr earned a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the Ventura College of Law; his California Secondary Teaching Credential from the University of California, Santa Barbara Graduate School of Education; a Bachelor of Arts in political science at UCSB; and attended the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis.

Orr lives in Corona with his wife, and has three adult children.

Ruiz already filling coffers for 2018

The 2018 election is 18 months away, but Democratic Congressman Dr. Raul Ruiz already has \$1.3 million available to use. That is only \$300,000 less cash than he had in September 2016, six weeks away from the election. The total includes money left over from his 2016 campaign.

He has received about \$365,000 from individuals throughout the country. The largest contributions have included \$2,700 from people living in California and from as far away as Florida.

One Idyllwild contributor has given several \$15 and \$35 contributions to the congressman already this year.

and Robert Krieger, expressed general skepticism that this schedule would increase productivity. However, they asked questions and were open to the possibility of testing it later this year.

Jimenez proposed a six-month pilot test, which the board tabled pending more information, such as do any other government jurisdictions use the four-day work week and, if so, which ones.

Speaking for the Personnel Committee, Director Richard Schnetzer said, "Jim [Rees] and I had major differences and couldn't come to a conclusion. The committee brought it to everybody for review.

"I saw some benefits, but not being open on Friday for the public was a deterrent. I believe there will be less productivity in 10 hours. The last couple of hours are really tough and

especially in the low-winter temperatures."

Kreiger also expressed concern about the office being closed on Friday. Office Manager Jessica Priefer said that Fridays are not normally busier than other weekdays. Mailing the bi-monthly water bills is a stronger determinant of public visits than the actual day of the week.

Schnetzer did ask for more analysis of the potential for overtime on Fridays due to emergencies and also the frequency of public visits and calls on Friday compared to the other weekdays.

Jimenez stressed that the district should test the program, "I don't see a downside, but if we get complaints we can go back to the five days at eight hours."

The board did approve a contract with Bartel Associates for an actuarial valuation of its costs for retiree benefits, such as health care.

This valuation would be

the basis for calculating the district's annual payment.

In water business, Schnetzer noted, "There was a spike in the March production."

Total production in March was 3.7 million gallons, compared to 2.6 million gallons in March 2016. "People used a lot of water," replied Jimenez. "The were no real leaks, just a lot usage."

Of the total production, 8.2 percent was from wells and the rest from Tahquitz and Strawberry creeks.

The groundwater level of FVWD's wells is consid-

ered good, Jimenez reported. Although most groundwater levels decreased in March, the actual decline was no more than 2 inches.

Following a closed session on employee performance, Jimenez reported that the board approved a salary increase for the office manager and field staff. The board acknowledged that the salary structure was not comparable to other local and state water districts and the issue will be further discussed.

The 24th Jazz in Pines is coming

Lineups announced, planning complete

In less than four months, the sounds of music — and clapping, dancing, singing — will fill Strawberry Valley. The 24th-annual Jazz in the Pines starts Aug. 11 and ends Aug. 13.

Once again, the magic of jazz — America’s music — will excite the mountain and fill the town with visitors from throughout Southern California. These people, who return year after year to sit on the grassy hillside of Idyllwild Arts’ Holmes Amphitheatre or squeeze into Stephens Hall or bounce on the dance floor of the French

Quarter, will again be amazed at the bucolic nature of an international jazz festival.

“I’m excited about the final line-up,” said John Newman, chair of the Jazz Committee and director of Business Operations for the Idyllwild Arts Academy. “We have some of the same stalwarts, such as Yves Evans, Henry Franklin and Harry Pickens, and several new-and-young-comers.”

Opening the Holmes Amphitheatre on Saturday will be Frisson, an octet of recent Oberlin College graduates. “This is part of Marshall Hawkins’ and my recruiting to discover new talent, up and rising new musicians,” Newman said. “I love scouting for new talent.

The group’s music draws heavily from jazz, but complements it with fusion, rock, R&B and electronic music. Matt DiBaise, the founder, said in a review, “Frisson’s eclectic music contains strong rhythmic foundations, singable melodies and rich harmonies that fuel spectac-

ular solos from its creative and talented members.”

Closing the afternoon will be Saturday’s headliner and well-known festival performer Charles McPherson. His quintet will bring the traditional sounds of jazz to the amphitheater.

In 2007, McPherson told the Town Crier, “Bebop, what is it? What does it mean?” he posed, and then answered. “It’s melodic, rhythmic and harmonic. It has a good representation of all music components. It’s structure and form.”

Accompanying McPherson will be several very popular and influential San Diego jazz titans — Gilbert Castellanos on trumpet, Randy Porter on piano, Rob Thorsen on bass and Richard Weller on drums.

In between the new and the legendary jazz musicians will be the acclaimed alumnus and clarinetist Evan Christopher, accompanied by several other IA alumni. Christopher also will be appearing in the historic Newport Jazz Festival in Rhode Island the previous week. The Robert Dove Quintet will follow Frisson on the Holmes Amphitheatre stage.

Both the French Quarter and Stephens Hall will offer familiar jazz. The performers included the always popular pianist Joshua White, vocalist Rose Mallet, and Forbits, led by Idyllwild’s Paul Carman, Chuck Alvarez and the inspiring Evans with her unique sense of humor.

Sunday brings another day of excitement and beautiful sounds. Evans and her gospel choir will open the main stage and a new group, the Russell Malone Quartet, will be Sunday’s closing headliner.

Other musicians making their inaugural appearance at the fest include singer Eric Kufs and Andre Thierry.

Tea amidst an acre of lilacs at their blooming best

Lilacs reach their peaks of bloom and fragrance based on weather conditions. And since weather conditions vary, scheduling annual lilac festivals can be tricky.

But this year, Gary Parton and his Idyllwild Garden Club associates are celebrating. The hundreds of lilac varietals at Parton’s AlpenGlow Gardens on Fern Valley Road will be at their peak on Saturday, April 29, for the annual Victorian Lilac Tea, Walk and Artist Exhibition.

Begun in 2009, the annual lilac festival attracts many off-Hill flower tourists, as well as loyal locals. Although the lilacs are the stars of the festival, the gente Victorian tea is a not-to-be-missed experience. What is important about the docent-guided garden tour is the information docents will provide — the history of varietals in the garden, their origins and other anecdotes that make them special.

Shuttle service (to help avoid parking congestion and prolonged walks to the entrance) is available from St. Hugh’s Episcopal Church parking lot at the base of Fern Valley Road on South Circle Drive.

Idyllwild Arts senior from Turkey has Berklee scholarship

Saxophonist to major in the business of music

When Arsel Kalemoglu came to Idyllwild Arts Academy four years ago at the age of 14, he spoke little English. A native of Antalya, Turkey, Arsel said he learned English “on the page” in Turkey but had little English conversational skill.

Now his American-accented English is fluent and he is on his way to Berklee College of Music in Boston on scholarship. He has been a jazz student at IAA, playing both alto and tenor sax. Sax teacher Paul Carman observed how much Arsel has grown as an instrumentalist while at IAA. But it is not saxophone Arsel will major in at Berklee, but in the business of music and music engineering.

Arsel’s story is typical of many of the foreign students who come to IAA with little conversational English skill but, through rigorous academic and arts training with supportive faculty, they graduate and attend prestigious colleges and universities throughout the U.S. This year,

32 countries are represented in the IAA student body.

Arsel had studied classical piano in Turkey since he was 5, played flute in orchestra and learned guitar on his own. But his jazz career began when his father and brother decided to learn to play saxophone. Arsel said it changed his life.

“One day my brother and father decided to play sax,” he said. “I was 11. I told them I wanted to play and they said, ‘No, Arsel, you’re too young.’ But eventually, they stopped and I continued to play. I took lessons and also played flute.”

On recommendation of a company that helped Turkish students find schools in the U.S., Arsel and family came to Idyllwild in the summer when he was 13 to look at IAA. “When we saw the school, we all became excited,” he remembered. “My family is very down-to-earth and the beauty of the mountain, this place, the music and the people made a deep impression.

“I could hardly wait until the next year when I could start. I was super-excited. I told everyone I was going to this art school on top of a mountain in California. It was life-changing.”

The first day at IAA was also life-changing. “I was so scared. I had so little English and was so scared to meet

Paul [Carman] and Marshall [Hawkins]. The first question Marshall asked me was ‘Do you know Miles Davis?’ I said, ‘No.’ I was so embarrassed. That night I studied and listened to Miles Davis’ music. That was the first night I really got into jazz. I always knew sax would be my instrument. I loved the sound of it. That moment when Marshall asked me about Miles Davis changed everything.”

In his four years at IAA, Arsel has become an excellent sax player, socially adept and a great ensemble member. He is known on campus as a very friendly and supportive guy. He was a member of the winning IAA septet at this year’s Berklee High School Jazz Festival.

This week, he is on his way to Reno, as part of the same IAA septet, to play in the Reno Jazz Festival at the University of Nevada.

This summer, Arsel plans to start in Greece and play sax throughout Europe, wherever the train, his feet, his talent and his smile can take him. “Maybe on the street, maybe in combos, maybe in gigs,” he said. “And I’ll remember every lesson with Paul, where I learned everything I could in each lesson. I am just so grateful to Paul and Marshall and the school.”

Max Hayman, a former Summer Program attendee, is coming back with his trio. Robert Dove, saxophonist, has appeared with other groups, such as Castellanos, but this year has his own quartet performing at the Holmes on Saturday. Tamir Hendelman, pianist, is also returning with his trio and so is the Singularity Project, headed by David Lynch, son of Idyllwild’s Mick Lynch.

At Stephens, jazz fans will hear local favorite pianist Harry Pickens, whom Hawkins will join. Another Idyllwild Arts alumnus, Lake Jirouek, returns to treat the audience to his unique mellifluous guitar tones.

“Working out of Los Angeles, he has his own trio,” Newman said. “We’re looking for a balance between the legends and the young talent, who is looking for a start.”

Jazz legend Henry Franklin and his quartet will close the day and 24th jazz fest Sunday.

The eclectic music performances from the popular band Diego Euphoria Brass Band will be heard at the French Quarter. A new group, led by Thierry, will introduce their zydeco style for accordion music in the afternoon, thus demonstrating the effort to offer a variety of jazz styles to the audience. But even with all of this talent, the prestigious festival still depends upon hundreds of volunteers.

“I’m delighted that everybody [on the Jazz Committee] is returning. These people are committed and dedicated and love it,” Newman said with pride. “These volunteers bring more volunteers. We could not do it without the support of the volunteers.”

Of course, the Patrons Dinner and Dance will again open the festival and Gilbert Hansen, bass guitarist, will provide the evening’s music. That will be Friday, Aug. 11. The Patrons Package will cost \$350 this year. Besides the dinner and tickets for both Saturday and Sunday, this year, it includes a patrons-only admission to the Seahawk Modern Jazz Orchestra performance Saturday evening in the William M. Lowman Concert Hall.

Tickets for Saturday and Sunday are currently available online at www.jazzinthepines.com and sales are 20 percent ahead of 2015, according to Newman. Ticket prices are \$70 each day or \$130 for a two-day admission until May 1, when they increase. After May 1, tickets will be available at the Idyllwild Pharmacy and the school’s retail shop on North Circle Drive near Cedar Street.

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
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ART'S CORNER

While it is usual for the Idyllwild Arts Academy to provide musical events in the spring of every year, the rather unusual presentations both during and after the Easter break in Lowman Concert Hall proved a worthy study in variant formats of programming, as well as their overall presentation. On consecutive Saturday evenings at the campus facility, two varying forms were in evidence, and the resultant effects (both visually and aurally) proved well enough to illustrate the true principles of sonic projection.

The evening of April 15 saw the realizations of two major keyboard pieces in performance by IA teacher Jeanette Louise Yaryan, and her performances of the Bach G Minor "English Suite," followed by the Beethoven F Minor "Appassionata" Sonata brought out all the necessary contrasts in the scores, as well as signalling Ms. Yaryan's personal approaches to the music.

Unfortunately, the remainder of the program proved less interesting than advertised — the additions to her interpretation of the song "Strange Fruit" with the overlay of David Reid-Marr's visuals and Marshall Hawkins' bass

stylings were particularly unfruitful in the exposition of the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, and her concluding performance of Carl Vine's two-movement "Sonata (1990)" only further distanced the earlier and more solid interpretations. It also should be noted that during intermission, low-volume digital interference from the sound sources proved to be really distracting, at least to this listener.

April 22nd's orchestral offering proved more interesting, from the first offering of Bizet's "Entr'acte" from Act III of "Carmen" to the prize-winning excerpts for piano and violin soloists. In between, various smaller divisions of the orchestra essayed film composer Maria Newman's three-movement "Concerto Grosso" and her score for the 1911 short Mary Pickford vehicle "The Dream" (the latter with the actual film being projected) with requisite complimentary strings and wind sections.

But it was up to the actual solo performers, acting with director Scott Hosfeld, that defined the evening with a rousing first movement of the Saint-Saens G Minor Concerto by "Sunny" Liu, and even more professional in actuality, the performance of Zhengnan Wang in Ravel's "Tzigane," resulting in a breathtaking rendition of the score (in particular the introductory solo). No further interference from outside forces was in evidence, and the audience approval (from a more than three-quarter-full venue) was more than appreciative, as it deserved to be.

Breaking from the tradition of IdyTalks being given by junior or senior students at Idyllwild Arts, sophomore **Alex Bishop** gave the talk at Silver Pines Lodge on Thursday, April 20. The recipient of many awards, most recently for the best student poem from the Poetry Society of America, Alex impressed the audience with her poetry, presentation and maturity.

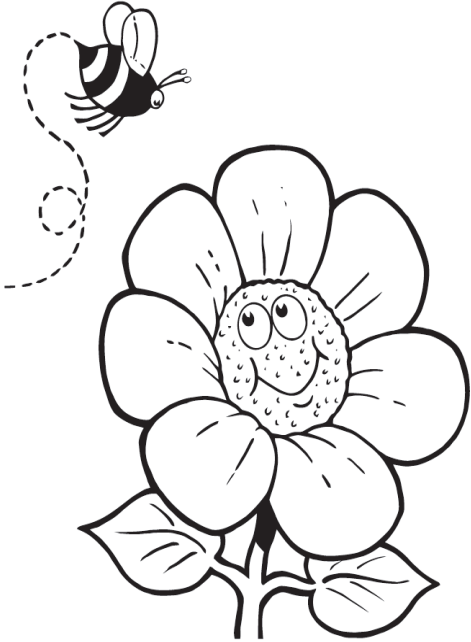

Steele 62nd in Texas; heads to New Orleans

Brendan Steele had his troubles at the Valero Texas Open in San Antonio this year. He recorded a 7-over-par 70-71-78-76 — 295 to finish in a tie for 62nd place, his lowest finish of the season. But the native Idyllwilder still hasn't missed a cut in 13 tournament starts in 2016-17, and has six top 20s, three top 10s and a win to his credit.

At San Antonio, Brendan's drives found only 55 percent of the fairways and he hit only 44 percent of the greens in regulation. He lost strokes both in Strokes Gained Tee to Green (his usually best category) and in SG Putting. But one category in which he gained strokes was SG Around the Green, in which he gained 2.460 strokes against the field (he scrambled well at 72.5 percent) and was 16th best in the field.

Brendan plays this week in the \$7.1 million Zurich Classic of New Orleans, which has a new format this year. He and good friend Keegan Bradley will team up for the entire tournament, playing foursomes (alternate shot) on Thursday and Saturday and four ball (best ball) on Friday and Sunday. There will be a Friday-night cut at 35 teams and ties. The winning tournament team will split the former, now combined, first- and second-place FedEx-Cup Points and prize money, and so on down the leaderboard.

Brendan and Keegan-tee off Thursday at 10:52 a.m. PDT and Friday at 5:39 a.m. PDT.
