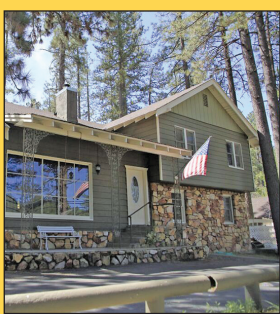

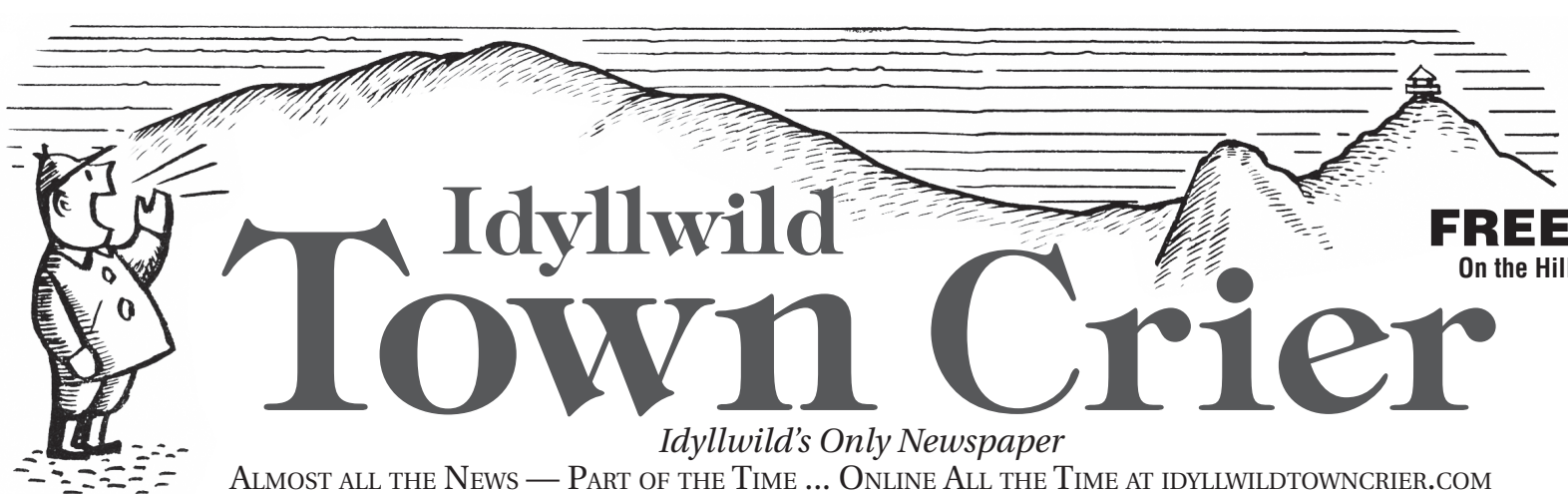

Wet winter mitigates drought

Hearty grasses could bring fires to stressed forests

The National Interagency Fire Center issued its outlook for the summer 2018 fire season on Monday, declaring that drought conditions have improved in most areas. The seasonal forecast for the Southern California region is normal from May through June. Southern Arizona has an above-normal fire potential this month and next. In July and August, fire professionals will pay close attention to Northern California and Nevada.

The heavy precipitation this winter has helped most areas recover from severe drought conditions,

However, Ed Delgado, the Fire Center's program manager for predictive services, said this is a double-edge sword for Southern California.

The winter's voluminous rain has produced a substantial crop of fine fuels (grass). This is especially noticeable in the lower elevations of Southern California.

"There is a lot of organic plant growth which adds to the fuel level," Delgado responded.

But the drought has left the timber areas extremely damaged, he added. Trees are still suffering from lack of moisture and many have died.

"The [lower] fine fuels can carry fire into the timber," Delgado said. "In Southern California, we've had five to six years of very extreme dry conditions. A lot of mortality has occurred in the timber areas."

The grass crop has the potential to carry the fire into the stressed forests.

"It's not a huge risk, but it depends on how things develop in the next months. An increase in summer temperatures could change the situation in the later summer months," Delgado added.

This weekend, two fires occurred in Riverside County. The Opera Fire near the city of Riverside was 1,350 acres and was 75 percent contained as of Monday morning. The second fire, the Jameson Fire, was near Corona in Temescal Valley on 12 acres and is fully contained.

Caltrans to add rumble strips on 243

Up to 30-minute delays expected

(This is from a press release Caltrans issued recently.)

The California Department of Transportation, Caltrans and VAP Construction of La Mirada will begin work to add a centerline rumble strip on Highway 243 near Idyllwild and Mountain Center.

The construction area will be in two locations. The project limits are from 0.7 miles north of Highway 74 to Saunders Meadow Road and from 0.3 miles north of Marion Ridge Drive to 0.7 miles south of Lincoln Street in Banning.

The \$1-million construction plan was identified as a necessary safety project to enhance motorists' awareness and help avoid cross-over type collisions. This project will require varying lengths of full directional closures for the safety of workers and motorists on Highway 243, which is a two-lane, mountainous highway with narrow shoulders.

Work will begin Monday, May 8, with moving-lane closures and flagging operations. One direction of traffic may be delayed for up to 30 minutes while crews grind the pavement and place the rumble strip.

Work hours are from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. Allow extra time for your commute. The project is expected to be completed in July 2017, weather dependent.

Follow all directions given by Caltrans, California Highway Patrol and the traffic flagging crews.

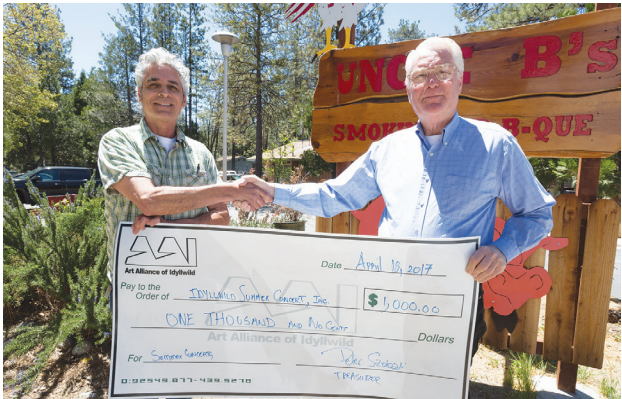

Fire reported behind Idyllwild Arts

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A couple of Saturdays ago, Jack drove to Menifee to buy a trailer for hauling newspapers up from the desert. The newspapers put too much strain on his Subaru Forester's weight capacity. The trailer relieves this.

I stayed on the Hill but not, as I usually might, at home. I got dressed and drove out to Pinyon to meet Bob Ferguson and his wife at his art studio. I expected an expansive property for this fine artist but it was beautifully humble, as the couple are themselves.

Bob restored the 100-year-old home and its Cattleman's Bunkhouse (right), as well as cleaned the grounds and planted beautiful natural vegetation.

The views, especially of the Santa Rosas, are breathtaking. His wife told me she returns there from San Diego and finds outside in the evening — many times with its clear skies, bright stars and quietness — stunning.

It is no wonder that some people love to live in the high desert. Bob often paints in the outdoors, taking days to craft an impressionistic, plein-air piece.

The studio also houses, in all its simpleness, the couple. Bob added skylights, releasing the darkness and bringing much light into the studio and part-time home.

Bob's boundless energy adds to that lightness. I left Indio Avenue in Pinyon reluctantly.

I eased my way back on Highway 74 headed back toward Paradise Corners, considering whether to stop at the cafe for lunch or stop by my daughter's house in Thomas Mountain Village. I came around the curve and glanced over to the left at the cafe. The place was packed.

I tried to see if a band was playing but then thought better of peering that way again, considering this was the 74/371 intersection on a Saturday and doing so is risky. I already had experienced a potential head-on with a motorcycle crossing double-yellow lines to pass an RV on my way out to Pinyon.

As I looked back at the highway, I saw some hitchhikers up ahead. There were two PCT hikers, I thought. I may have missed them if I hadn't looked back in front of me.

Barely having enough time to pull over at the next dirt turn-out, I flipped on the right turn signal and eased in. In the rearview mirror, I saw three people headed my way.

Uh oh, I remembered. My car was packed with crap — odds and ends from both home and work. Cleaning it out has been a priority but getting around to it hasn't been.

The lady from Washington and the couple from Canada didn't care. They had been on the trail for two weeks and would ride on the top of the car if they had to.

Packs, people and trekking poles stuffed comfortably in the crannies of my car and we were off.

For the next 30 minutes or so, the four of us enjoyed wonderful talks about trail life and Idyllwild life.

I took them to the state park so they knew where it was. We stopped off at Nomad Ventures to pick up PCT discount brochures. Then we stopped at the post office where we parted company.

I parked my car to check my mail. They were hooking up with other PCT hiker friends when I heard one of them say, "We got a ride with Becky who owns the Town Crier. We couldn't have had a better tour guide." I realized I had never asked their names.

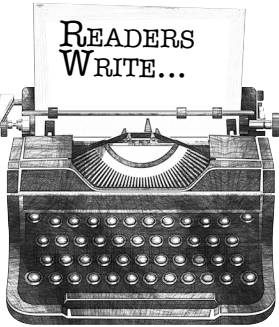
Start with healthcare issues where they count

EDITOR:

Ron West's comments on the medical system reflect several misunderstandings.

1. You can't "reduce pay to physicians." They are not, for the most part, anyone's employees. They are independent business people. If you cut reimbursement from programs such as Medicare or Medicaid (or private insurance, for that matter) they are not required to accept those payments or treat those patients.

2. Hospitals are not "grossly overpaid." The overhead of maintaining a large corps of highly trained people on duty 24 hours a day and doing all the other things required to run a hospital is spread among charges for all the services and materials. Yes, sometimes it results in absurdities like a \$50 aspirin charge, but it wasn't really just an aspirin; you paid part of the hospital's overhead for having nurses and doctors and respiratory therapists and physical therapists and a bed ready when you needed them. And, the reality is that your insurer didn't pay \$50 just because that's what was billed.



3. Ironically, Ron wasn't "entirely sold" on the one sound suggestion, which is eliminating the insurance company middlemen. Medicare does very well without insurance companies, and processes the average claim faster and for far lower overhead than any insurance company. Medicare uses intermediary companies to handle the mechanics of processing and auditing claims. They are not, however, the insurers.

In order to solve the problem, you first have to really understand it. The biggest problem points are insurers and pharmaceutical companies. Start there.

Our Mountain Community Patrol was called out to help with some roads in Fern Valley that were impassable. The invaders ignored them and slid into resident's yards, cars and trees anyway. There were a lot of problems with tourists parking four deep at the Nature Center. One group started up their barbecue in the yard of a Fern Valley home. Trash abounded. They brought their own food, didn't patronize our restaurants and left their trash. I really hate the dirty disposable diapers."

"I pointed out the No Trespassing sign and asked them to leave. When I again asked them to leave, they told me to get f---ed."

Did these quotes come from 2017? 2016? 2015? Nope. They are from the Town Crier's "Readers Write" archives of 2008 and 2009.

Some folk on the Hill have become aware of the recreational snow visitor situation only during the last winter or two. However, the problem has been growing for years. Not coincidentally, so has the population in areas surrounding us.

Banning, the desert cities, Hemet, in fact all of Riverside County's growth projections are robust and impressive. According to the Southern California Association of Governments, the San Gorgonio Pass communities are projected to more than double in size between 2000 and 2020. The Coachella Valley's unincorporated areas alone should more than double between 2005 and 2030.

From 2005 to 2035, Riverside County projects growth of 72 percent. Hemet's contribution is 61 percent and San Jacinto's is a stunning 230 percent.

For those who live in these areas, Idyllwild offers the nearest snow. It's understandable that they are drawn to us. The problem is that our quiet residential community is not prepared for the surges we have recently seen.

And, by every appearance, our recreational snow visitor problem will not go away. Does anyone else see irony in the fact that we have a fort in the middle of town?

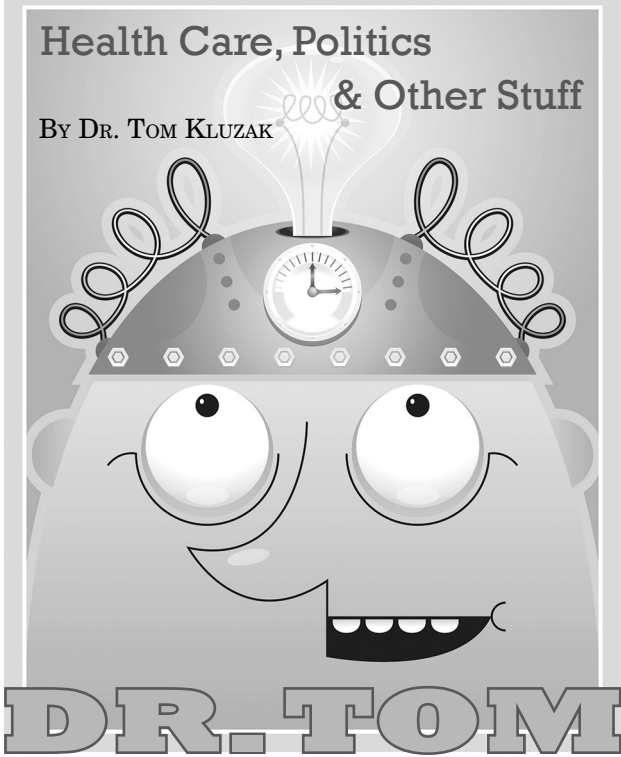

The fate of our healthcare dollars, now and in the future ...

Medical care in the U.S. is so much more expensive than every other country. How can we fix that? A dollar in U.S. medical spending looks like this: 31 cents goes to hospitals, 20 cents to doctors and clinical services, other personnel get 15 cents, prescription drugs account for 10 cents, nursing care and home health care about 8 cents (numbers are from 2010, rounded). Drug costs are now higher.

A letter to the editor a few weeks ago mentioned the necessity of oversight and I couldn't agree more. A recurring theme becomes obvious: This is best carried out in a single system, such as improved Medicare for all.

Medicare fraud is already investigated by the FBI, pretty good oversight indeed. The letter also mentioned cutting physician salaries. While there are some physicians who are overpaid, cutting across the board would not go very far in lowering overall costs. There are also many reasons why physician income will remain high, which I will discuss at another time, if requested.

Likewise, the much-praised tort reform would do little to bring down medical costs, even if some form of it is desirable for other reasons. The approach to these complex issues is, again, best undertaken if there is a single-payer healthcare system.

Drugs cost more than we would like. Why? Because the manufacturers can charge whatever they want. A CEO making \$43 million is just the tip of the iceberg. By the way, that is about \$17,200 per hour. Then there is \$84,000 for the drug to cure hepatitis C, at a time when pharma companies spend more on marketing and administration than research and development.

Other companies in the medical marketplace have similar balance sheets. For example, the CEO of Centene Corporation, which provides Medicaid services to several states, received more than \$40 million in a recent year. The 11 top insurance company CEOs made a total of \$200 million. Obviously, some people are making a killing making people well.

These examples help point to the real fat, that is, administration and overhead. Since 1970, the number of physicians has grown by 240 percent while the number of administrators has grown by over 3,000 percent. Administrative costs in the U.S. were more than \$3,000 per capita in 2014 but under \$900 in Canada.

Physicians for a National Health Program believes the solution, a single-payer system, would increase costs by \$326 billion to cover everyone, but decrease costs by \$569 billion, a net savings of \$243 billion, by decreasing administrative and insurance costs, and lowering drug and device costs through negotiations. Everybody covered better, for less money.

In the meantime, please don't get fooled into some silly proposals, like offering insurance policies across state lines, or choosing your own less-expensive plan. Insurance companies make money by denying care; we have all experienced the crazy and expensive ways they go about this. And the only way that choosing your plan makes sense is if you get to choose the diseases you will develop in the future.

Next time: the business case for single-payer healthcare.

IFPD budget in good shape

Commission performs autopsy on Measure W's defeat

At its April 26 meeting, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission addressed a wide variety of issues. A preliminary presentation of next year's budget was followed by a long discussion of what the commission should do in the aftermath of the defeat of Measure W, the proposal to increase parcel fees, a review of administrative policies and finally, the approval of a new memorandum of understanding with the volunteer company.

After three-quarters of the current fiscal year (which ends June 30) have passed, expenses are only \$4,300 greater than revenues. This situation should be alleviated during the final quarter when about 40 percent of property taxes are received.

Also, Battalion Chief Mark LaMont reported that payments (up to \$90,000) for the Ground Emergency Medical Team reimbursements, may also be received before July 1. These payments are for fiscal years 2010-11 and 2012-13.

Also, outstanding mutual-aid reimbursements totaling about \$130,000 may also arrive in the district coffers before the end of the fiscal year.

"Things are coming together to meet the budget at the end of the year and we should end the year within the budget," reported Commissioner Jerry Buchanan, treasurer and a member of the finance committee.

After hearing about the current fiscal year, the commission listened to LaMont's presentation of the preliminary budget for fiscal year 2017-18. He estimated a 4-percent increase in revenues, without the special payments that may occur before or just after the year begins, and a 3.8-percent growth in costs. These are mostly in salary and benefits.

A full-staffing cadre, raises pursuant to the agreed MOU with the career firefighters and substantial increases in the Cal PERS payments for retiree healthcare dominate the expense increases.

Next year, IFPD will make its final payment on Brush Engine 621. Since it was purchased in 2007, the annual payment has been \$62,000. As LaMont noted, this is about equal to the increase for Cal PERS' added costs.

Also next year, IFPD expects no increase for workers' compensation, which it obtains through the Special District Risk Management Authority. In a recent letter to IFPD, SDRMA also said the total insurance costs will drop nearly \$1,400 in fiscal year 2017-18.

Buchanan anticipates a review of the tentative fiscal year 2017-18 budget at the May 23 meeting and approval of the final budget at the June commission meeting.

Buchanan asked the commission to appoint an alternate member to the finance committee because Commissioner Jeannine Charles-Stigall, who will continue as regular member, still has to spend more time off the Hill. President Rhonda Andrewson and Commissioner Henry Sawicki were

both appointed alternates.

Following the budgets' discussion, the commission examined the campaign to obtain passage of Measure W, which would have doubled the current \$65 per parcel or unit fee to a \$130 fee for all parcels and explored possible future steps.

Although 56.7-percent (838) of voters supported the measure, as a general tax measure, it required approval from two-thirds of the voters; consequently, it did not pass.

Sawicki, who joined the commission last month, said he voted for the measure and wondered what could be done next. "I was heartened, even in defeat, about how close it was [to passage]," he said.

He expressed concern that emergencies are not predictable and, without ample reserves, IFPD was risking a significant financial crisis if a major event damaged the vehicles or the building.

The other commission members discussed the October public meetings, which were held to explain the measure and how the funds would be used. But they expressed disappointment in the low attendance.

LaMont felt that if IFPD could speak to more voters, "... it would help, if we reached more people, to move from about 60 percent to 66 percent ... I truly think people voted 'No' because of lack of understanding."

However, Finance Committee Chair Calvin Gogerty argued that it was not just lack of turnout. Ninety percent of the registered voters in IFPD cast a ballot. "To win, we have to turn some 'Nos' to 'Yeses', not just gener-

ate turnout."

Andrewson and Buchanan also felt the measure was hurt because there were so many propositions on the ballot. LaMont also felt some voters confused Measure W with the state's \$135 Fire Prevention Fee.

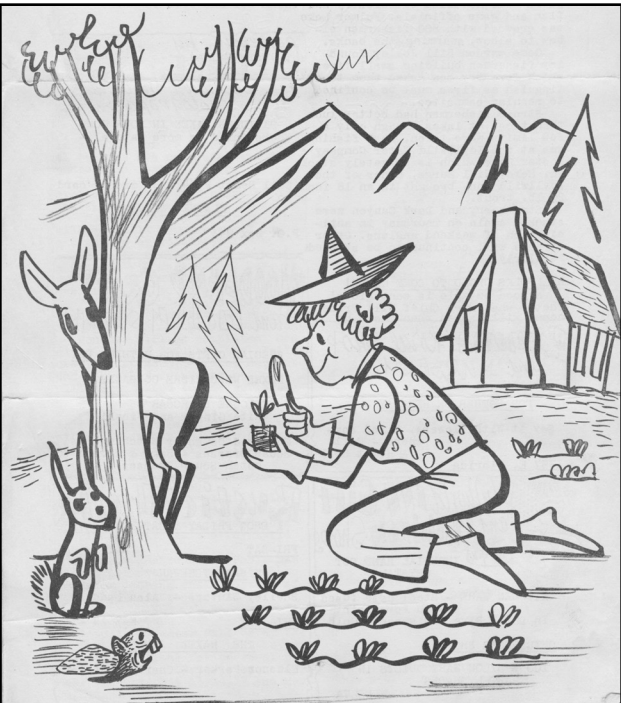
The commissioners expressed the desire to resurrect a revenue measure and want to explore the possibility of putting it to voters in an election other than a November presidential ballot. They also will look into the possibility of creating focus groups to get feedback from voters about how to obtain more support or why voters opposed it.

After the money and finance topics, the commission reviewed nine current board policies. Most were approved with minor changes. The purchasing policy will be revised and returned to the commission for approval.

As of the meeting, IFPD has inspected 2,538 residential properties, representing about 68 percent within the district. Of the properties inspected, inspectors failed nearly a quarter of them. Second inspections of these properties will occur this month.

Only failed notices will be mailed. LaMont stressed that if a property owner received no information, the property passed its inspection.

The last major topic was the review of the revised MOU between IFPD and the Idyllwild Volunteer Fire Company. LaMont explained that the major changes would allow for a tiered membership. The company and IFPD benefits from the

Injured climber hoisted off Tahquitz Rock Sunday

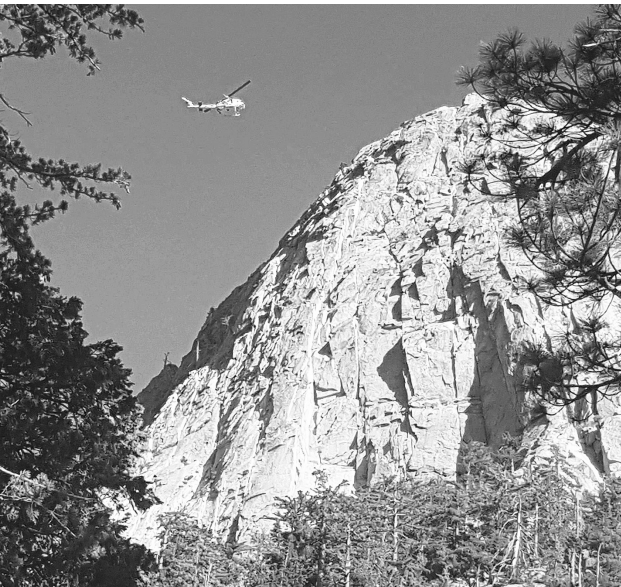

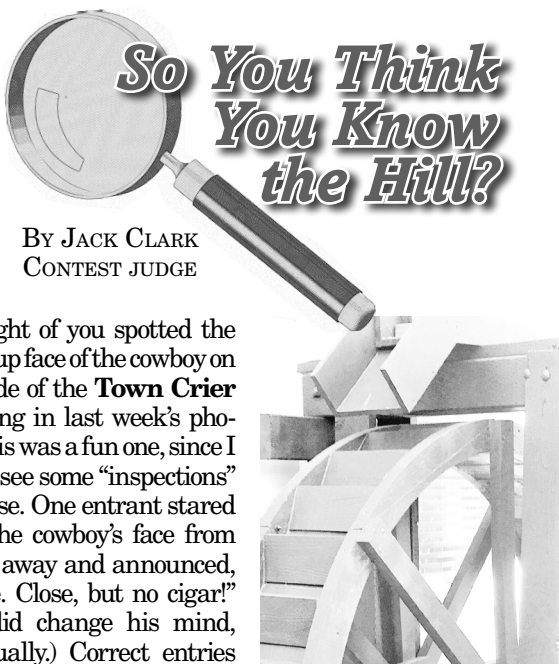

Julia Romero to be released from rehabilitation

Family needs support

Idyllwild resident Julia Romero, 17, was severely injured in a head-on, hit-and-run automobile crash on Friday, March 31. The other driver also was arrested for DUI. Prior to the crash Julia was an honors student at Hemet High School and a star runner on the girls track team.

Julia is finishing rehabilitation at Totally Kids Rehabilitation Hospital in Loma Linda and will be discharged in another week or so, according to her mother Elizabeth Romero. And Julia has a fixed goal. “She is eager to go back to school,” her mother noted. “Her AP testing begins on May 2 and she has four. She’s worked so hard for this all semester long. She is determined to

take these tests.”

But there are barriers. Julia is in a wheelchair and can’t put weight on her injured legs. The Romero home will need ramps built so Julia can get into the house. She will also need other medical equipment to assist her in taking care of her basic needs.

And because Julia will continue to need outpatient physical therapy, Elizabeth is trying to secure a rental car that can comfortably accommodate Julia to and from medical appointments. Also, during the last month, Elizabeth has been at Julia’s bedside and unable to work, therefore missing the income from that period.

Despite her injuries and operations, Julia is upbeat, according to her mother. “Julia is now in better spirits,” said Elizabeth. “She is smiling and laughing again. I want to thank everyone for their prayers and support.”

Because Elizabeth has been out of work for the last month, money is needed for everyday necessities of

rent, utilities and restocking the house with food after a month lived in hospitals.

The online Go Fund Me campaign is still open. Only \$5,535 has been raised out of the \$15,000 goal. The campaign’s goal was recently raised to help fund Julia’s in-patient physical therapy, transition from hospital to home, as well as continued out-patient therapy and crash-related medical care.

Before the car crash, Julia had hoped to parlay her honors student record, AP scores and track achievements into a college scholarship.

The family is hoping continued community support will help Julia achieve her goals in spite of her injuries and trauma.

Repeal of Affordable Care would increase health insurance costs

In the tailwinds of Washington’s debate over repealing or replacing the Affordable Care Act, Covered California examined how these possible changes may affect premiums for health insurance in California.

Not only would repealing the ACA increase costs to individuals insured through Covered California, but the private insurance market also will feel the effects of these changes.

With no changes — neither the cost-sharing reduction (insurance subsidies for individuals and insurers) nor the enforcement of the individual mandate would be eliminated or altered — Covered Cal expects its total coverage to continue to grow, which would continue to reduce the number of uninsured Californians.

The premium increase in 2018 without any changes in the ACA was estimated to be 9 percent. Two percent of that is the result of the expiration of a tax holiday for insurers and the balance for increasing medical costs. About half the insured would receive subsidies.

However, eliminating the two major provisions of the ACA would likely create a premium-rate increase of an-

other 30 percent in 2018. This could also raise the Silver Plan premiums another 16 percent to offset the loss of the cost-sharing reductions. The total increase from 2017 approaches 50 percent for Silver Plan enrollees.

Premium increases of this magnitude would likely result in some individuals again foregoing health-insurance coverage. The study estimated that the uninsured population would increase by 300,000 people.

If the cost-sharing reductions continued, but the requirement of individuals to obtain insurance was revoked, premiums also would increase. That’s because with fewer healthy individuals as members of the health pools, the cost to insurers would increase, resulting in higher premiums — perhaps about 17 percent higher than the base with no changes.

“Stopping the funding of CSR reimbursements, or even leaving the payments up in the air, would mean carriers would raise their prices to account for the uncertainty — costing the federal government billions in higher subsidy payments,” said Peter V. Lee, executive director of Covered California, in the press release announcing the study. “Even more important is the enforcement of the penalty, which boosts enrollment, builds a healthier pool of consumers and lowers premiums for everyone.”

According to the study, California has about 2.4 million individuals in this market, with 1.3 million getting their insurance through Covered California and 1.1 million purchasing directly from insurers “off exchange.”

Covered California contracted with PricewaterhouseCoopers for the analysis of the 2018 health insurance market for size and potential premiums. Although federal legislators failed in the attempt to repeal or revise the ACA in March, talks about changes continue and this is creating uncertainty in the health insurance marketplace.

The proposed rates for 2018 have to be submitted by June and preliminary proposals are due May 1 to the California Department of Insurance.

With the market uncertainty unlikely to be resolved soon, California’s Insurance Commissioner Dave Jones announced last week that he has authorized health insurers filing rates with the Department of Insurance to file two sets of rates.

Despite the likelihood that health insurers will have to increase rates due to Trump administration actions, Jones encouraged health insurers to file a second set of rates premised on continued enforcement of the ACA.

Trump wants more public input in national monument designation

Last week, President Donald Trump signed an executive order directing Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke to review all national monuments established since January 1996 and greater than 100,000 acres.

The president has the authority, pursuant to the 1906 Antiquities Act, to protect and preserve public lands through the designation of national monument status.

Trump prepared and signed the EO after many congressmen expressed concern that designation

of national monuments occurs with little public and local involvement.

“We’re returning power back to the people ... Today I’m signing a new executive order to end another egregious abuse of federal power, and to give that power back to the states, and to the people where it belongs,” Trump said at the signing ceremony.

About two dozen monuments will be reviewed, including six California monuments, of which two are in the Southern California desert. In February 2016, President Barack Obama designated three new national monuments — Mojave Trails National Monument, Castle Mountains National Monument and the Sand to Snow National Monument, which is in Riverside County.

The Castle Mountain National Monument is 20,920 acres and below the threshold for review.

The Sand to Snow National Monument connects the San Bernardino National Forest and Joshua Tree National Park. It encompasses about 154,000 acres, of which about 100,000 acres have already been designated as Congressional wilderness areas.

The Mojave Trails National Monument, encompassing nearly 1.6 million acres, of which more than

350,000 is already wilderness designated, is the largest of the three.

“This executive order does not remove any monuments. And this executive order does not weaken any environmental protections on any public lands,” Zinke stressed.

The EO directs Zinke to examine whether the designation was made without adequate public outreach and coordination with “relevant stakeholders.” A final report is due by the end of August.

The designation of the two California monuments actually occurred after six years of study and efforts from U.S. Senator Dianne

Feinstein (D-CA).

She had advocated protection for these lands for several years and had introduced legislation several times, including in 2015. In the absence of congressional action, Feinstein wrote Obama in the summer of 2015 requesting him to use the Antiquities Act authorities to designate the three monuments, which he did Feb. 12, 2016.

The Friends of the Desert Mountains has declared the Trump review “an unprecedented attack on our national monuments.”

After the enactment of the Antiquities Act in 1906, President Theodore Roosevelt used the authority to establish several new national monuments, including the Grand Canyon and Olympic National Park in Washington.

This is not the first time a president has had the secretary of interior review national monument designations made by a previous president. In 2001, President George Bush’s Interior Secretary Gale Norton reviewed several designations, which President William Clinton made. These were not changed following the review.

Jodie Gray stressed that staying behind, after being told to evacuate, takes resources away from fighting a fire. First responders must then monitor an occupied residence and do their best to protect its residents, even at the expense of carrying out their primary fire-fighting mission. “If you refuse to leave, you divert resources and put our lives at risk,” said Gray.

IFFPD Battalion Chief Mark LaMont reminded residents that the best way to protect their homes and assist firefighters is to abate property, eliminate fire fuels and create defensible space. “We’re concerned, with increased winter precipitation, of greater fire potential than in previous years, especially because of light grassy fuels,” said LaMont. Echoing Gray, LaMont emphasized that an evacuation order is not a suggestion. “Hours of complex analyses have been poured into that decision before the order is made,” he said.

County Emergency Services Coordinator Jerry Hagen reminded attendees that the county’s Early Warning Notification System’s automated calls go only to landlines. Residents without landlines must register their cell phones. After completing and submitting the form, it will take up to 60 days for the cell phones to be in the system and part

of emergency notifications. Visit <http://countyofriverside.us/Residents/Emergencies/EarlyWarningNotificationSystem.aspx> to register.

Hagen stressed that evacuation down dirt roads or truck trails complicates fire-fighting response. “Response agencies will be moving equipment on the major highways,” said Hagen. “Go where you’re told. There should be no driving down Bee Canyon. You’re driving on unburned fuel that you could ignite.”

In answer to an audience question regarding people who have no transportation, Hagen said, “The first line of defense is to develop a plan. Have your plan be ‘three deep,’ meaning three on-Hill people you can call or reach out to for assistance.”

Said LaMont, “If you can’t get out on your own, come into the [IFFPD] sta-

tion and put your name on our list.”

Responders stressed the importance of having a full tank of gas at all times, a 10-day supply of important medications and copies of important prescriptions. Red Cross representative Ernie Calderon said Red Cross shelter officials could get prescriptions filled within hours for shelter attendees, if they have prescription copies.

In answer to a question whether evacuation is mandatory, RCSD Lt. Chad Bianco noted residents can’t be forced to leave. But that refusal only extends to able-bodied adults. “Adults can’t make that decision for minor children or people with functional needs,” said Bianco. “Minor children and functional-needs individuals would be evacuated by officials. If you are told to go, you should

go. Sometimes we care more about your life than you do.”

In answer to a question about vandalism of evacuated properties, Bianco said, “Once evacuation has been called, our department has no personnel problems. We take a proactive role in keeping your property safe.”

Calderon noted that only service dogs could be taken into Red Cross shelters, but that all attempts are made to locate temporary animal shelters next to Red Cross shelters.

The overriding message from all responders was simple and direct: leave when you are told to and only on the roads you are instructed to take. To do otherwise will threaten first responders and negatively affect the job they are charged with doing.

The Water Protectors at Standing Rock captured world attention through their peaceful resistance. Tens of thousands of activists traveled from all over to stand in solidarity with the water protectors protesting the construction of the \$3.7 billion Dakota Access Pipeline, proposed to transport fracked oil from North Dakota’s Bakken oil fields through sovereign land, and under the Missouri River, the water source for the Standing Rock Reservation and 17 million people downstream.

“Awake, A Dream From Standing Rock” is a collaboration between indigenous filmmakers Director Myron Dewey and Executive Producer Doug Good Feather, and environmental, Oscar-nominated filmmakers Josh Fox and James Spione. The film was co-written by and features Floris White Bull. Raised in Standing Rock, Floris White Bull graduated Summa Cum Laude with degrees in Energy Technology and Native American Studies from Sitting Bull College and is currently pursuing a degree in Environmental Science.

The film shows for free from 2 to 4 p.m. and from 7 to 9 p.m. Thursday May 4, at Spirit Mountain Retreat who co-sponsors it with the Idyllwild Environmental Group. Popcorn will be served.

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Idyllwild Arts stages musical 'Sideshow' Steele and Bradley miss cut at New Orleans

Based on true story of conjoined twins Daisy and Violet Hilton

Daisy and Violet Hilton were conjoined twins, born in the U.K., who achieved extraordinary success as a singing and dancing act in the U.S. in vaudeville. As young girls, various caretaker/managers exploited them as sideshow freaks, physically abused them and kept them in penniless servitude.

When the sisters were 23, they sued their managers, gained freedom from their contract and were awarded \$100,000 in damages. The twins later found glamorous success on the vaudeville circuit. But as vaudeville faded and the twins aged, the sisters once again fell on hard times.

Idyllwild Arts Theatre Department presents "Sideshow," a multiple Tony Award-nominated musical based on the lives of the Hilton sisters. "Sideshow" has book and lyrics by Bill Russell with music by Henry Krieger, Grammy winner and Academy Award- and Golden Globe-nominee for "Dreamgirls." It is an important musical in the American musical theater lexicon, given its soaring and beautiful score and the emotional complexity of its characters and its challenging subject matter.

"Sideshow" is a large undertaking," said Director Heather Reba. "We have a cast of 23 students, and an orchestra of nine, eight of whom are music department students. Among the cast, 12 actors portray more than one character, with multiple costume and wig changes.

"The show involves dance production numbers, a nearly sung-through score [minimal dialogue], and specialty costumes and makeup to portray the different sideshow personalities. On top of these demands, our two leading actresses are literally joined at the hip for the entire performance, which makes for interesting staging, choreography and costuming challenges."

Reviewers of the original Broadway production and subsequent revivals have stressed the emotional depth of the show, especially the contrasting personalities of the sisters and their very different personal needs and goals.

Charles Isherwood of the New York Times captured the divergent dreams and longings of the sisters in the headline for his review "United by life, divided by dreams." Writing about the 2014 Broadway revival, Isherwood observed, "'Sideshow' invites us to do much more than come look at the freaks, as the electrifying opening number beckons. It asks us to step inside their skins and feel what it's like to be celebrated one moment, rejected the next, and to have the strange consolation of a companion who shares it all: the joy, the hope, and the frustration" — a companion who is never able to be separated from

the other.

The musical asks us to experience and question what is normal. "Diversity is a concept we struggle with in our culture," said Reba. "It is a constant battle to be kind to those who are different than we are and to tolerate those who threaten our image of a perfect society. It is more comfortable to surround oneself with what one knows, people who are of similar ilk, others who don't challenge our way of thinking. We gravitate toward the normal, but what is 'normal?'"

In today's politically and socially intemperate climate, the quest for an inclusive "normal" seems out of reach. The "other" remains the "other," and normal is defined by those with the agenda and power to do so.

"Sideshow" is probably more topical now than when it opened in 1997. Come see where you fit in: Do you recognize any part of yourself in the sideshow's freaks or are you a comfortably "normal" and distanced spectator intrigued by the sideshow's oddities.

Reba and Bonnie Carpenter's design concept makes you part of the sideshow the moment you enter the theater. You will have many ways to join in, be part of the sideshow and leave wondering what is "normal."

"Sideshow" opens at 7:30 p.m. Friday, May 5, at the IAF Theatre (Bowman) on the Idyllwild Arts Academy campus. It plays again at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, May 6, and at 2 p.m. Sunday, May 7. There is no charge for admission as is the case with most IAA entertainment events.

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Local author receives award, critical praise for new novel ‘The Sun Jumpers’

Ken Luber, one of the first American Film Institute fellows, is a writer and director with a long film and television career in Los Angeles. Since relocating to the Idyllwild area in 2003, Luber has continued to write. He has penned the novel “Match to the Heart,” a book of poetry “Everybody’s Shadow” and a baseball-based musical “I Played the Game” for which he wrote the book and lyrics. Saverio Rapezzi wrote the music. A new novel is in the works — “Falling from the Sky.”

Luber’s newest published novel, “The Sun Jumpers” (Dog Ear Publishing, 2017), won the Dog Ear Publishing Award for Literary Excellence in 2017. It is a young-adult, time-travel story with a twist — how primitive, Stone Age teenagers who are transported by shamanic magic to modern day Los Angeles teach a young, self-absorbed and socially isolated film director how to confront his shallow life and find a more meaningful path.

The Sun Jumpers’ magic (a shell that allows them to translate and learn English), their native courage, and deep wisdom (often more profound than much they encounter in modern-day LA) help the teens learn from the modern world, teach their new friend and discover what they need to know to help their Stone Age tribe survive an increasingly hostile environment.

For Luber, the five-year experience of writing the novel was one of personal discovery. Luber had kept for many years a picture of young primitives as a possible story idea. “The picture may have come from an orange crate label but it was the inspiration for this novel,” he said. “I wanted to know who these people were, what teenagers were like, how they survived 10,000 years ago and how their skills might equip them to deal with the modern world.”

He noted there is likely a universal curiosity shared by young people — a vision quest or impulse for adventure that impels them to seek what is out there, find what’s on the other side and connect with someone who might have better tools or skills? “I don’t know why I was so attracted by this picture and these people. Maybe it was their loneliness and threats to their survival.”

Luber described how, as he wrote the book, the female character began to take over. “Yes, the characters talk and honestly, they lead you as you listen,” he said. “But you can’t let one character take over what had been the other character’s vision quest.” Originally, the female was the girlfriend of one of the boys and not supposed to go on the quest. “But she was the smartest of them all and eventually her boyfriend relented,” he said.

While living in Los Angeles, Luber wrote for the series “Knots Landing” and “Family,” had numerous screenplays optioned, directed for television including “The Tony Randall Show” and Mary Tyler Moore Productions, and acted and directed for theater. His feature film “Howzer” was shown at the USA Film Festival and at the New American Director Series at the Whitney Museum in New York City.

He is a native of Milwaukee, and is a member of the Writers Guild of America, the Directors Guild and the National Teachers Association. He holds a bache-

lor’s degree from Ripon College in Wisconsin, attended the University of Iowa’s Writers Workshop and, as previously mentioned, was one of the first 15 fellows of the prestigious American Film Institute.

“The Sun Jumpers” has garnered critical praise from numerous sources: Midwest Book Review calls it, “A witty yet moving tale of teenage love, the power of friendship, and how bravery and a willing heart can save an entire people. The Sun Jumpers clearly showcases author Ken Luber’s genuine flair for creating a consistently compelling, original, and memorable story populated by deftly crafted characters and replete with unexpected twists and turns.” Kirkus Reviews notes “[Luber] deals with some serious issues including modern-day bigotry, the sometimes-troubled relationships between parents and offspring, and the need to find and follow one’s own truth.” As an extra acknowledgement of the appropriateness of “Sun Jumpers” for teen readers, the Hemet Unified School District bought the book for its school libraries.

At www.kenluber.com, Luber writes, he has “two adult sons who continue to answer his emails, extend his musical awareness and remain uncritical of his stubborn support of often languishing sports teams.” For several years he has taught immigrant adults the English language and they in turn have taught him the glowing spirit of the human race.”

IAA Creative Writing chair next Spotlight speaker

The Associates of Idyllwild Arts Foundation continues its Spotlight on Leadership series highlighting the work of both academic and arts chairs. The series is part of IAA’s outreach to the wider Idyllwild community and is an attempt to build bridges of understanding between the town and the school.

The next speaker in the series is Creative Writing Chair Kim Henderson, now in her 10th year at IAA.

Henderson heads one of the smaller departments at IAA, currently with 12 writing majors. The magazine is handsomely orchestrated with a striking cover design by Omar Razo. Sections in the magazine are devoted to both creative writing and visual arts.

Of being chair of a small department, Henderson said, “You have the students for a number of years and really get to know them. It’s like a family. Our students are pretty dedicated, and in a small department, peer pressure to create good work is strong.

“I rarely feel like I’m coming to work. I’m coming to be with people who like writing and reading. In many ways, these students are like grad students except they’re much more open and willing to try things.”

Henderson speaks at 10 a.m. Monday, May 8, at the Fireside Room at Nelson Dining Hall on the IAA campus. The presentation is open to all and there is no charge to attend.



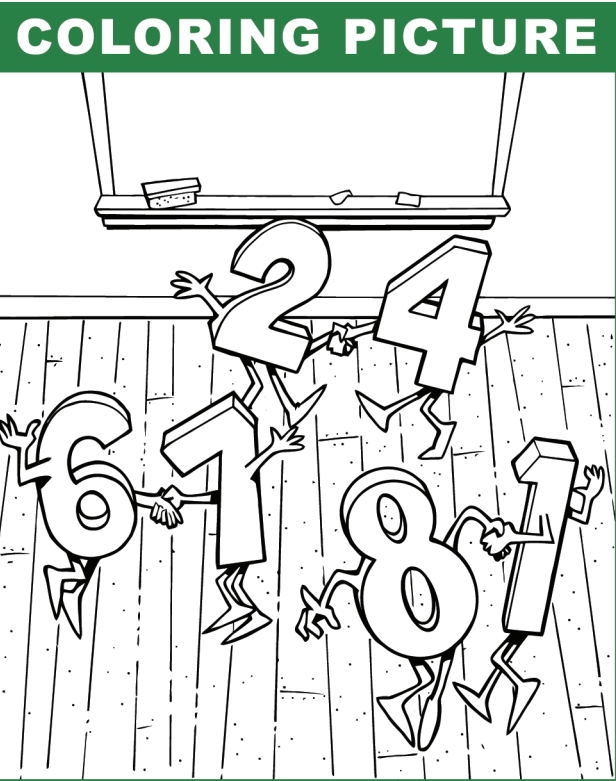
