Brewpub receives environmental award

The Idyllwild Brewpub was honored at last week's Riverside County Board of Supervisors meeting.

At the beginning of the May 2 meeting, Hans Kernkamp, general manager-chief engineer of the county's Department of Waste Resources, announced the Sustainability Awards for each supervisorial district.

"It was a very proud moment after such a long time," said Lori Ferro, co-owner of the brewpub with her husband Frank. And Head Brewer Don Put said, "I'm proud of what we accomplished and feeling fortunate to have been a part of it."

The Idyllwild Brewpub was the award recipient for the 3rd District. It was also the smallest organization and the only private entity honored at the ceremony. The University of California, Riverside, was the 1st District honoree and the Morongo Band of Indians received recognition for its work in the 5th District.

"Idyllwild Brewpub implements many environmentally responsible practices," said Corinne Awad, DWR public affairs coordinator. "To reduce food waste, Idyllwild Brewpub donates spent grains to local ranchers for cattle feed. ... [To be energy efficient] they have a solar system, which powers the whole brewpub and the LED lighting used exclusively inside and outside."

DWR has given the Sustainability Award for several years. The award focuses on how the organization employs innovative methods to reduce waste. Examples can be how they use renewable resources or other sustainable practices to change or modify overall consumption.

These include, but are not limited to, composting, energy technology, renewable energy, and the practice and awareness of how materials are being used, processed and consumed.

Despite this recognition, two Idyllwild residents do not share the same perspective of the brewpub's initiatives to protect the environment. However, the Regional Water Quality Control Board does not share those fears based on its evaluation of the brewery.

At several Idyllwild Water District meetings and in a letter to state Water Control Board officials, Sue Nash and Tom Paulek have expressed their concern that the brewpub's may pollute Strawberry Creek with brewery discharges.

Also, they have objected to the brewery's

use of IWD's sewer system. In one objection, they point out that the brewery used the sewer system for discharges from October 2016 to the present without a proper permit, specified by the 2016 agreement between the brewpub and IWD.

Nash and Paulek allege that the discharge violates IWD's permit for the waste treatment plant facility, too.

IWD General Manager Jack Hoagland acknowledged that a permit should have been issued in October and he issued one in February. This requires compliance with the 2016 agreement that includes several stipulations on the biochemical composition of the discharge, volume and timing of release.

Nash and Paulek do not consider this permit satisfactory and want an environmental study, which complies with the California Environmental Quality Act. If the permit is in abeyance until the study is done, the brewpub will likely have to close since they would not have permission to use the district's sewer.

When asked why they waited until the brewpub opened to express their concerns about the environmental threats and adequacy of the administrative process, Nash replied that they were not aware of the brewpub until this fall and then researched the permitting process.

They also have written to the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board expressing concern for the IWD's failure to revoke the brewpub permit or to perform the

CEQA analysis on the waste-treatment plant, now that it also serves the brewery.

On April 20, the Santa Ana RWQCB staff rejected Nash and Paulek's request. "[A]s a percentage of the total waste treated by the water district, the maximum contribution of the brewery would be a fraction of 1 percent. This does not constitute a major new industrial discharge or change in the character of the waste sufficient to require an amendment to the existing order.

"Monitoring reports submitted by the water district since [November 2016] demonstrate compliance with their effluent limits without a change in the treatment process."

The RWQCB stressed that it continues to believe the IWD treatment facility is capable of handling the discharge from the brewery and they will continue to monitor the sampling reports for any changes.

In response to these concerns, nearly 400 people have signed a letter supporting the environmental actions at the brewery. The letter address the brewpub's economic benefits to the Hill, but also states that the signer "[is] confident that the County of Riverside, Idyllwild Water District and other regulatory entities have ensured that the Brewpub will be operating in full compliance with all laws and existing regulatory requirements, protecting our community's environmental resources."

New proposed state regs cover medical marijuana

Will conflict with Riverside County ordinance

The three California agencies that will regulate the state medical-marijuana industry released their proposed rules for the state system recently, and it appears some of the proposed regulations will conflict with existing Riverside County ordinances.

Counties may enact laws that modify or supersede certain aspects of state regulations.

In Riverside County, under Ordinance 348 adopted in October 2006, all medical-marijuana dispensaries remain prohibited in unincorporated areas of the county, including all Hill communities at this point in time. In section 3.4, that prohibition is specified: "In no event shall a medical marijuana dispensary or marijuana cultivation, as the terms are defined in See Marijuana, page A8

Public speaks out at IWD workshop

About a dozen people attended the Idyllwild Water District's Special Workshop Wednesday. The board called the workshop in an effort to learn more about the community's assessment of the district and its desire for the future.

Beginning the meeting, President Dr. Charles Schelly invited feedback from the public: "The purpose is to obtain community input on anything and everything in Idyllwild Water. How can we improve? And what are we doing well?"

Afterwards, he opined, "I was pleased that we received new input from some individuals that we haven't heard from before. Their ideas and suggestions help us have a broader perspective of the issues that are important to our water district."

The first comment recommended a return to the former billing structure for water. Idyllwild customers paid a base rate, but did not pay for water consumed until they exceeded 3,740 gallons. As of September 2014, the district lowered the volume of water for which no usage charge would be applied to

1,870 gallons.

He argued that by increasing the amount of water residents could use without charge, IWD would be able to sell more total water.

More importantly, since he has to pay directly for greater water usage, it has constrained the amount of water he and his family can use for their yard planting. "We can't water the yard much because it costs too much."

Conservation was the reason for lowering the amount of water before a usage charge was applied. Since the lower amount became policy, IWD's usage in September 2014 was 8.9-million gallons. Two years later, in year five of the drought, usage was 7.3-million gallons, almost 20 percent less.

For the 12 months following September 2014, production was 6.4 million less than the 12 months before September 2014.

This was not the only comment about rates. Representing Idyllwild Arts Academy, Buzz Holmes implored the board to develop a rate structure that was easier for the whole community to understand.

"The kind of things we'd like to see from the board is stopping the arbitrary fee structure, for

example the use of EDUs [equivalent dwelling units], so we can really understand our obligation."

Of course, the age-old issue of consolidating the three Hill water districts — Fern Valley, Idyllwild and Pine Cove — was broached. Holmes encouraged the board to "reach across and work with the other districts. It's a mistake to embrace provincialism as our community grows."

Marge Muir, a local real estate agent, reminded the group that for many years, a Hill-wide water agency existed. It was only disbanded in December 2013. It had functioned, not without controversy, she said, since its creation June 1, 1976. Its last official meeting occurred March 3, 2010.

Sue Nash and husband Tom Paulek encouraged the board to improve its efforts to conduct business more transparently. They believe that approval of the memorandum of understanding between IWD and the Idyllwild Brewpub, and the permit issued in February were done without adequate public involvement and limited transparency.

She stressed that the brewery should only flush treated water into the

waste-water system.

"It's very important to involve the public in these water decisions," Paulek said. "I ask the board to work at getting people involved. This [workshop] is a good first step."

Preparing an environmental study, pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act, for most decisions, even when a negative determination is merited, would be the

appropriate process to incorporate public involvement, Paulek recommended.

In contrast, Laura Sherman, director of IAA Facilities Management, applauded the board and said, "There has been a lot of changes in the board. From my experience with the school for years, we have never had better relationships and communication. We're very encour-

aged."

Reba Coulter asked the board to consider putting financials online. Five years of budgets and financial statements are available at www.idyllwildwater.net/forms-and-reports/financials/. She also thought that the fee to pay a bill online was too steep.

BB gun prompts Idyllwild School lockdown

A man, possibly with a gun, was reported near the creek across from Idyllwild School at 2:45 p.m. according to a recorded messages sent out to Idyllwild School parents and guardians. The school was placed on lockdown as a precautionary measure by Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

At around 3:18 the lockdown was lifted after investigators found a toy BB gun along the 26000 block of Highway 243, close to Saunders Meadow Road. No arrests were made and no one was

questioned in connection.

At 2 p.m., there was a report called in claiming a man with a gun was walking on Highway 243, near the school, according to Deputy Mike Vasquez, public information officer for the Riverside County Sheriff's department. He said that as a precautionary measure the school was placed on lockdown.

At 2:59 p.m. Principal Matt Kraemer opened the doors to let parents into the school. Kraemer was putting together an organized dismissal.

A recorded message to parents at 3:18 pm. announced that the lockdown had been lifted and students were allowed to go home.

Spring rain, cold temps dampen May flowers

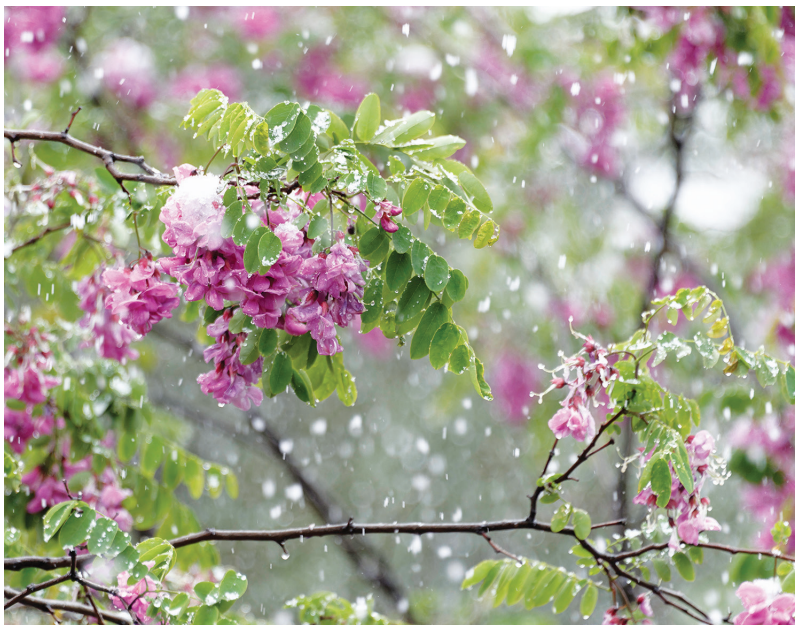

In the annual spring rains and snowstorms, more precipitation fell on the Hill this past weekend.

From Saturday through Sunday, the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station recorded 0.4 inches of rain, which brought the total since July 1 to 26.4 inches.

The Pine Cove weather station recorded 0.33 inches of rain and more than 2.5 inches of snow. Total rain since July 1 has been more than 37.5 inches and snowfall exceeds 63 inches.

For Idyllwild, the long-term average rainfall through the end of April is 24.8 inches and through the end of May, 25.5 inches. Keenwild has exceeded the annual average for the first time since 2011 when 29.4 inches were recorded there. The total this year is the

second-highest precipitation in the past decade.

Pine Cove has received an abundance of rain this year. The current total is nearly 50 percent more than the annual average. It is the most rain since 2005 when more than 40 inches drenched the Hill.

In May, the average precipitation has been 0.75 inches. This

weekend's storm was the fourth year in the past five years that rain and snow have pummeled the Hill in early May. Last year, about an inch fell between May 6 and 8. In 2015, more than 2 inches of rain and 5 inches of snow blanketed the ground during the first two weeks of May.

Chimney fire damages house on Strong Drive

Sunday afternoon, a chimney fire was reported at 55055 Strong Drive. Once the Idyllwild Fire Department crews arrived, they found heavy smoke coming through the eaves.

IFD sent five units and several other agencies assisted during the fire. Two engines came from Riverside County/Cal Fire. California Highway Patrol controlled traffic and Idyllwild Water staff, as well as Southern California Edison, were on the scene, according to Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz.

Containment took about an hour and was hindered due to the construction and configuration of the internal floor plan, Reitz said, describing the incident.

“The fire originated in the area of the chimney in the attic and spread throughout the attic area,” Reitz said in an email. “... The bulk of the fire was contained to the attic with heavy water and smoke damage throughout the main floor of the structure. The house is uninhabitable at this time.”

He also stressed, “There were no working smoke detectors in the residence.”

He also urged residents to “have working smoke detectors, one in every bedroom, one in the halls outside the bedrooms, one on every floor and preferably with 10-year batteries. IFD reminds everyone to have chimneys cleaned and inspected on a regular basis by a certified chimney sweep.”

Water districts plan August mail ballot elections

Eleven seats up for election

There will be summer elections for all three Hill water districts — Fern Valley, Idyllwild and Pine Cove. The Riverside County Registrar of Voters announced the mail-in ballot election for directors in these districts and several other county special districts as Tuesday, Aug. 29.

A total of 11 director seats are available. Both Idyllwild and Pine Cove water districts will have four seats to fill, either by incumbents or new candidates, and Fern Valley will

have three seats.

If the total number of candidates for each district equals the number of seats, no election will be necessary. Later in the fall, the Registrar of Voters will ask the Board of Supervisors to appoint these candidates as directors.

Individuals interested in seeking election may begin to file nomination papers. The official Declaration of Candidacy for eligible persons desiring to file for any of the elective offices is available at each of the water district offices or the Registrar of Voters

office. The Declaration of Candidacy must be filed in the office of the Registrar of Voters no later than 5 p.m. Friday, June 2.

If an incumbent fails to file, the deadline for that district will be extended five days to 5 p.m. Wednesday, June 7, for everyone except the incumbent.

Any resident of Idyllwild or Pine Cove water district, who is registered to vote in the district, is eligible to file.

For FVWD, the qualification is limited to land owners.

Candidates are eligible if they meet one of these qualifications: 1) holder of title to land within the district; 2) legal representative of a holder of title to land within the district in accordance with Section

34030 of the Water Code; or 3) a representative designated by a holder of title to land within the district, if the holder has filed with the district written evidence of that designation.

Terms for the seats for each district up for election can be seen in the accompanying table, as well as

the water district offices.

The Registrar of Voters staff is available to help candidates complete the necessary paperwork and answer any questions. Candidates unsure about the local district offices for which they are eligible, based on residency, should contact the Registrar of

Voters office for help. Candidates will receive informational handbooks when they obtain their papers.

Legislature supports changing presidential primary in state

The whole state Legislature was busy last week approving bills to move California's presidential primary to March.

Last week, both the Assembly and the Senate separately approved bills that would move the state primary earlier in presidential election years. The Senate bill would move the presidential primary to the third Tuesday in March and the Assembly bill moves it to the first or second Tuesday. AB568 also will consolidate both the presidential and state primaries. The legislators must decide on a single bill before the

governor can sign it.

The bills easily passed in both houses. The Assembly vote was 52-20 and the Senate vote was 32-6, with bipartisan support. Local State Sen. Jeff Stone (R-Temecula) voted for the change, but Assemblyman Randy Voepel (R-Santee) opposed the Assembly bill.

“The largest and most diverse state in the nation should not be an afterthought,” said Secretary of State Alex Padilla. “Moving our primary earlier will give Californians a greater say in nominating a president and will also increase voter engagement and turnout in down ballot races.”

Technology certainly changed the way we operate here at the newspaper now from how we operated when I started here in 1984.

For one thing, the number of people it takes to produce the weekly newspaper dropped as a result of speed.

When I started, a composing department included folk who made up ads using clip art, typesetting machines, paste-up boards and wax. Pica poles and X-Acto knives were tools of the trade. The department also included a day typesetter for news copy and some ad copy, and me, the night typesetter.

Back then, some of us worked through the nights Monday and Tuesday to get the paper hand-delivered to the printer by 5 a.m. Wednesday.

We used Compugraphic typesetting and photosetting machines — at that time a crucial advantage to newspapers in cost-effectiveness and speed over the previous hot-type method.

The screen on the typesetting machine was small. You could only see a few words at a time so your errors showed up later. This created punched tape — impossible to read — fed into a large machine that produced type on light-sensitive paper. The paper was then taken to the darkroom and run through a developer onto paste-up paper. Then, someone would proof your errors and these would be fixed by requiring the retyping of that one line again.

We worked in the two stone buildings to the west of Creekstone Inn, the composing, front desk, darkroom and bookkeeping in the east building; editorial, circulation and paste-up in the west building.

I worked there for about a year and then returned in 1987 as the front-desk person in charge of answering phones, classifieds, service directory and legals. Then, the co-publisher died a month later and by summer, the business was sold.

New owners brought in the first commercial Apple computers, I was sent to Pennsylvania to train and when I returned, operations were now in the computer age and we were off.

Compared to today, those original programs and computers were primitive. The mouse was a clutzy thing, the monitor displays were in black and white, and were limited in graphics, and storage capacity was laughable. A megabyte seemed enormous to us.

But none of us could see the future and we still can't. So, we were thrilled with the capabilities compared to what we had before.

We didn't know that advancements would eventually allow the paper to be sent to the printer via something called the internet. That we would be able to "build" pages without our trusty X-Acto knives and wax. Ironically, we had a Town Crier website as early as 1995.

Even as late as the early 2000s, we were still "pasting up" the newspaper, and driving it down to the printer in Riverside late, late Tuesday or very early Wednesday, then waiting until it was printed to load it into the truck and drive it back.

Now, the paper is to the printer before 3 p.m. Tuesday. These printer deadlines would never have worked in the old days for TC staff but even the printer's technology is computerized and far more advanced than before.

As we speak, a bunch of eggheads are out there now creating advancements we would never dream of that will change how we publish the Town Crier even next year. Right now, Jack's just content with the little trailer and I'm happy the network didn't crash.

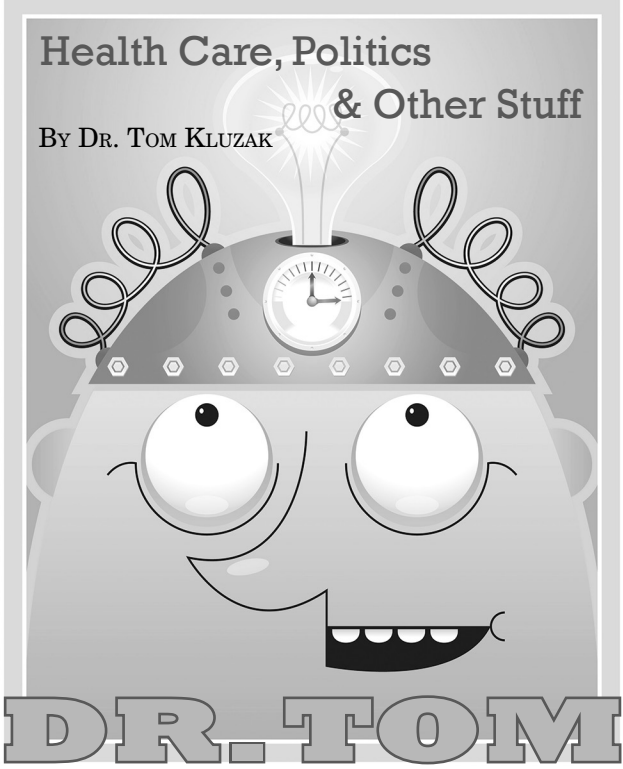

The business case for a single-payer system ...

Imagine that you run a U.S. small business. You have long-term employees to whom you are loyal and vice versa. You have an anniversary coming up, but it is not one you look forward to because it is that time of year when you renew the health insurance you purchase for your employees and yourself. Undoubtedly, the cost will go up; maybe you will be forced to shift more costs to your workers.

Not long ago, one of your long-term employees was diagnosed with breast cancer, thankfully caught early, but her surgery and chemotherapy were expensive. Another employee was severely injured in an auto crash.

You are, therefore, very worried that this year we might be going back to a time when premiums will take a huge jump because of your firm's medical-loss ratio. Under the Affordable Care Act, you saw your premiums rise 3 percent in 2016, the average across the country, and you realize that, even though there aren't very effective cost-control strategies in place, it still could get much worse.

You have been so concerned that you attended a town hall meeting with your U.S. representative and asked him why we don't have a single-payer system. He replied that that would be government healthcare, which we don't want in this country. If you want it, you should move to Canada. (This is what a representative actually said to one of his constituents).

Returning from your meeting, you imagine what healthcare in this country could be. It is estimated that everyone could be covered with a payroll tax of 3.3 percent, much less than the 7 to 12 percent of employee salaries businesses now pay for health insurance.

Also, you would no longer need to spend time being an insurance agent. Since all healthcare would be covered, your costs for workers compensation, automobile and liability insurance would also go down, and there would be no need to worry about retirement health benefits or employees switching jobs to get insurance or lower their costs.

Wow. Your administrative costs would decrease, your headaches would decrease, your profits would increase and you could give your employees long-awaited raises. And, you are pretty sure your friends who work at or own larger businesses would find labor negotiations a lot easier if they didn't hinge so much on insurance costs.

But then you snap out of it. There are just too many people making too much money on healthcare for that to happen.

Although there is no rational basis for the continuing existence of health insurance companies, the \$20 million the average CEO makes will pay for a lot of slick TV ads, a la Harry and Louise of the Clinton era, that distort the facts. Like the campaign to defeat Prop 61 in California: Be afraid; drug costs will increase for everyone. Which, of course, would increase drug-company profits, probably the reason they spent \$109 million to defeat it.

Next, a few aphorisms, tidbits and comments on modern life.

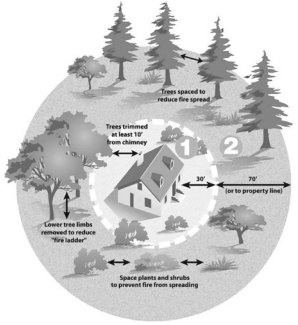

Chief concerns

We Want to Save Your House From Fire — Please Help Us

A major wildfire is burning below the ridge and above Hemet. You wonder if the fire will reach your house. Then, your mind wanders to your own personal responsibility. You question what will you do if the fire reaches your house. How will your house survive? Will it survive? What have you done to prepare your house to survive?

Creating clearance around your house, or what is termed "Defensible Space," will make a difference when firefighters come to defend your residence from wildfire. The clearance will reduce the threat of the fire igniting your residence, and destroying your property and private, loved possessions.

Please read along for some valuable ideas on why you should be prepared and provide clearance around your buildings.

Defensible Space means the area adjacent to a structure or dwelling where wildfire prevention or protection practices are implemented to provide defense from an approaching wildfire or to minimize the spread of a structure fire to wildlands or surrounding areas (California Government Code 51177).

It does not mean removing all vegetation from around a home or creating a bare ring of earth. But it does mean providing clearance for fuels that can carry fire. Cal Fire has been conducting D-Space inspections for more than 60 years. And, the inspection effort has made a difference.

About D-Space inspections, Cal Fire Director Ken Pimlott recently shared his thoughts about these inspections with his field commanders:

"Defensible Space is essential to improve a home's chance of surviving a wildfire ... Public Resources Code 4119, which gives Cal Fire (personnel) the authority to perform these inspections, was originally intended to help prevent a structure fire from extending into the adjacent vegetation and surrounding wildland areas.

Over the years, the focus has changed to help ensure that structures in wildland areas have sufficient clearance for firefighter and public safety, and to ensure the structures have the best possible chance of survivability when exposed to unwanted and destructive wildfires ... Defensible Space provides significant, positive and direct impact on community and firefighter safety."

- Defensible Space will:
- Provide firefighters the opportunity to effectively defend your residence
 - Signal firefighters your residence may be defensible
 - Increase the odds your home may survive on its own if firefighting sources are overwhelmed
 - Give you time to safely evacuate

More on this subject next week.

In 1909, the San Jacinto portion was given to the Cleveland National Forest. We have been the San Bernardino National Forest since 1925, when President Coolidge created it."

Barry Zander responded later to the question of how Suicide Rock got its name: "Monique and I traveled through North America for five years. In almost every state and province visited, we encountered a ledge where an Indian princess and her brave lover were forbidden from being together, so he jumped off the rock. In the Smoky Mountains, he flew back up into her arms.

"It's as common a story as those who told us, 'If you don't like the weather here, just wait 10 minutes.'"

The Snow Group had a very positive meeting last week with Riverside County Sheriff's Hemet Station Capt. Leonard Purvis. Purvis listened to our summation of the Idyllwild/Fern Valley/Pine Cove recreational snow-visitor problems. He completely understands our concerns for the safety of people and property. We all agreed that one key to safety during snow events is the increased presence of sheriff's deputies.

Regarding staffing, Purvis responded that he wants one deputy on the Hill 24/7, all year round. During snow events, (that "perfect storm" of heavy snowfall followed by a weekend of fine weather), he indicated he will deploy as many deputies as necessary. "I'll come up myself if I need to," he stated.

Purvis spoke of the cross-agency coordination and cooperation between his department and the California Highway Patrol. Each helps the other whenever and however needed. This echoes the same declaration made by Capt. Kari Clark, the CHP's San Geronio Pass Office commander, with whom the Snow Group met a few weeks ago.

Purvis recommends that area residents not hesitate to call and report trespassing, threats or other illegal behavior on the part of snow visitors. These situations are the responsibility of the Sheriff's Department. Their non-emergency number is 951-776-1099.

A record is kept of all calls made to this number and to 911. The volume of calls will help determine the extent and severity of the Hill's snow-visitor problems.

Also, callers can ask for contact by the responding deputy, to have closure and to know what has been done.

Idyllwild man involved in fatal traffic incident

At about 5:40 p.m. Monday, May 8, Phillip Wills, 62, of Idyllwild, was driving his 2003 Honda Pilot eastbound on Highway 74 just west of Doe Canyon Road at mile marker 38.66, near Cranston Guard Station.

According to the press release from the California Highway Patrol, Bernardo Santana-Brito, 52, of Huntington Beach, was driving his 2001 Toyota Tundra westbound when, for unknown reasons, he allowed his vehicle to drift onto the right dirt shoulder. Santana-Brito lost control of the truck and slid into the opposing lane of traffic directly in front of Wills' Honda.

Wills saw the truck coming toward him, swerved to the right, but could not avoid colliding with the truck. According to the CHP narrative, the right front of the truck collided with the front of the Honda causing the truck to overturn.

Santana-Brito was not wearing a seatbelt, was ejected from his truck in the collision and suffered fatal injuries. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Wills was wearing his seatbelt, suffered moderate injuries and was transported by Mercy Air to Riverside University Health System Medical Center in Moreno Valley for treatment.

One traffic crash on Hill roads last week Suspected DUI

One traffic crash occurred on Hill roads during the last week. Driving under the influence was suspected to be a contributing factor to the crash.

At 2:42 p.m. Friday, May 5, Colleen Pennington, 56, of Idyllwild, was driving a white 2006 Ford Escape northbound on Highway 243 near mile marker 24, when, according to the California Highway Patrol report, she lost control of her vehicle and struck the hillside. Her vehicle came to rest blocking the northbound lane.

The responding CHP officer noted Pennington said she swerved to avoid a fox in the roadway. She was subsequently arrested for suspicion of driving under the influence.

GOLDSPOTTED OAK BORER STILL A DANGER — LOOK FOR INDICATIONS AND LEARN MORE ...

So, as we all pursue the ever-compelling joys and rewards of removing all flammable materials from the 30-foot zone around our homes and structures, giving us all satisfaction in knowing we are keeping the carpets of pine needles and burgeoning waving seas of grass from providing ground fuels for any and all potential falling embers, there is something else we can all be doing.

Spring brings the beginning of the emergence of the adult Goldspotted oak borers from the thick-barked black oak trees. The 1/16 of an inch distinctive capital D-shaped holes in the bark of the trunk and lower large branches tell us the tiny GSOB beetles are living in our most majestic old oaks.

You can help scientists still on the cutting edge of research to collect data contributing to the possibilities of learning how to control and, perhaps, stop the growing infestation and death of oaks as it spreads across our forests. As you work in your yard, examine the oaks closely.

Are there a few of these D-shaped holes? If so, the tree can be treated. There are topical insecticides that kill the emerging egg-laden females before they have a chance to take flight and further infect your own trees, your neighbors' trees and the trees in our national forest.

Call local arborists to find out what you can do to keep your oaks alive and beautiful through the seasons.

On walks with your friends, raise awareness about the GSOB threat to our forest as you talk about and take note of any oaks that have not leafed out. Look at the leaves. Are they smaller than usual? Are they curled and deformed?

If you suspect any trees are having a problem, please call the GSOB hotline at 951-659-8328 and report the location of the tree. You, as citizen scientists, can make important contributions to the data being reported and collected.

GSOB beetles do not fly far. How, then, did they get here? The most likely case that scientists have found by observation is already-infested oak transported for firewood. Buy your firewood locally.

Good news, bad news for SoCal air quality

Improvements but still major quality problems

The American Lung Association’s “State of the Air 2017” report cited the Los Angeles region, which includes the Inland Empire, for recently achieving its lowest levels ever for unhealthy ozone days and year-round particle pollution.

But the region remains among the most polluted in the country. “Our state’s air quality continues to hit unhealthy levels each year, putting Californians at risk for premature death and other serious health effects such as asthma, COPD and lung cancer,” said Olivia Di-

az-Lapham, president and CEO of the American Lung Association of California.

Ozone pollution, particularly dangerous to those with breathing issues, is exacerbated by global warming, according to a report by the Union of Concerned Scientists, a leading science-based nonprofit working to create a healthy environment and safer world. Ground-level ozone pollution affects lung diseases such as asthma and can cause breathing difficulties even in healthy people. It also drives people into emergency rooms, creating a significant financial drag on the American economy.

“While power plants and cars are among the main sources of ozone-forming pollutants [the chemical precursors to ozone], ozone’s forma-

tion is dependent on temperature, among other conditions,” notes the report. “As a result, climate change-induced rising temperatures have the potential to increase ozone pollution — and its health and economic burdens — across large parts of the country both now and in the future.”

In “State of the Air 2017,” California has 11 out of the top 25 most ozone-polluted cities in the country, with Los Angeles-Long Beach topping the list.

San Bernardino County tops the list of California counties with the highest weighted average of high-ozone days from 2013 through 2015 (in other words, most ozone-polluted days). Riverside County is second and Los Angeles County is third. All three

counties received failing grades for high-ozone-polluted days.

Particle pollution, caused by diesel engines’ exhaust, wood-burning devices and wildfires, also is deadly. “Particle pollution, known as soot, can lodge deep in the lungs and trigger asthma attacks, heart attacks and strokes,” said Dr. Felix Aguilar, a family practitioner in Los Angeles.

The Los Angeles region ranked nationally for all three pollution categories — first in ozone pollution, ninth in short-term particle pollution and fifth in year-round particle pollution.

The Lung Association report summarized the following: “The air is cleaner today because of the Federal Clean Air Act, California’s groundbreaking clean air and clean energy laws,

and local air pollution control programs,” but “Climate change is impacting California’s fight for healthy air, with warming temperatures, droughts, heat waves and wildfires which can all create conditions for poor air quality and have devastating impacts on lung health.”

The report notes that statewide, more than 35 million Californians (91 percent) live in counties affected by unhealthy air during the year. Almost 17 million live in counties that received three failing grades in the report (ozone, short-term and year-round particle pollution).

The future for clean air also is complicated by a change in the national administration. Scott Pruitt, Trump’s pick to head the EPA, sued to block the Obama era federal health

standard for ozone when he was attorney general in Oklahoma. Recently, the Trump administration indefinitely delayed a federal court hearing in which the administration was to defend the health standard, raising concerns that the administration would roll back the Clean Air Act, which requires the EPA to set health standards and develop regulations to meet them.

The Lung Association report recommends that everyone can make a difference for clean air — by driving less, carpooling, walking or biking where possible, switching to electric transportation instead of gasoline cars, avoiding wood burning and using less energy overall.

CHP advises motorcyclists, car drivers to share responsibility

May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness month in California. Summer brings more motorcyclists on California roads, according to the California Highway Patrol.

Accordingly, CHP and the California Office of Traffic Safety are working together to help reduce motorcycle fatality and injury collisions, and to promote roadway safety through education and awareness.

“No matter how you travel on California’s roadways, safety should always come first,” said CHP Commissioner Joe Farrow. “Motorcyclists and drivers both share equal responsibility for roadway safety. Motorcyclists are sometimes hard to see and are more vulnerable to collisions than other drivers. Be alert, share the road, and look twice for riders.”

CHP data showed 476 statewide motorcyclist fatal-

ities and 14,000 injuries in 2016; in 2015, the numbers were 494 killed and 13,500 injured.

Hill highways, popular for motorcycle “runs” from the desert and surrounding metro areas, have historically tallied a high number of motorcycle-involved collisions, possibly owing to Hill weather and road conditions that are different from riders’ points of travel origin. Last year those numbers were down — no fatalities, 18 injuries and two property damage crashes on Hill roads (highways 243 and 74).

“We know Idyllwild is a popular destination for motorcyclists in the spring and summer,” said CHP Public Information Officer Darren Meyer. “With snow and rain, gravel and cinders can remain on the roadway shoulders and in the center of roadways for months, causing risk for motorcyclists. It’s like riding on marbles. Everyone, including local resident drivers, needs to be careful. It’s a team effort to be safe.”

CHP advises riders to protect themselves by wearing proper helmets and protective gear, always using turn signals, never riding in a driver’s blind spot, obeying rules of the road and riding sober.

Motorists can do their part by responsibly sharing the road — looking twice for motorcyclists and leaving plenty of space between their vehicle and the rider. “Both riders and drivers must be constantly aware of the dangers,” said Rhonda Craft, OTS director. “We all have to be mindful of every vehicle around us and share the roadways with safety in mind.”

Since California law does not specifically prohibit motorcyclists from lane splitting on state freeways, motorists must be especially vigilant to be aware of riders’ lane maneuverings. California law does prohibit drivers from intentionally blocking or impeding motorcyclists in a way that could cause them harm (CVC 22400).

Several cities consider joint powers for police services

Seventeen cities, and one Indian Tribe, contract with the Riverside County Sheriff’s Department for police services. In the past several years, as the county’s budget problems have stabilized, but not been eliminated, most of the cities have expressed concerns over increasing costs of their contracts.

In the past, their options were to negotiate fewer services and coverage from the Sheriff’s Department or decide to establish their own police department, as some cities such as Riverside and Hemet have.

The sheriff’s costs are based on the department’s

current salaries and equipment costs. There is no “profit margin” and the sheriff cannot subsidize any city.

The costs for other sheriff’s operations, such as jails, courts and the coroner, are not included in the costs of the service to the cities.

For fiscal year 2016-17, the Sheriff Stan Sniff just notified the cities that the annual increase would be 5.14 percent. Labor costs were the cause for the increase.

But in 2015, the contract cities decided to explore another option — create a joint powers agency to provide them with police services. Last month, Matrix, the consultants who prepared the study, began

to discuss the results with the cities of a regional police department.

Simply, Matrix Consulting Group, the authors of the study, found that a JPA could provide the same level of service at less cost for most of these cities. The feasibility study was based on only nine of the cities forming the JPA — Coachella, Jurupa Valley, Lake Elsinore, Menifee, Moreno Valley, Perris, San Jacinto, Temecula and Wildomar.

Maxtrix estimated that the first-year costs of police services from the JPA would decrease for six of the cities. For Wildomar, which has the lowest-cost contract, the JPA costs would be 37.7 percent

greater. Menifee’s costs would be 13 percent more and Coachella would see a 6-percent increase.

The biggest savings were for Moreno Valley, Temecula and Lake Elsinore. Their savings range from nearly 20 percent to 15 percent. Moreno Valley’s costs with the county sheriff are nearly \$40 million annually. Temecula pays about \$25 million. They are the top two and Jurupa Valley, which pays about \$16 million, is the third highest.

The principal reason for the savings is the state’s retirement plan. The JPA would be hiring staff in 2017. Even if salaries were the same, the retirement policy would be less than for exist-

ing sheriff or police staff.

As a new agency, the JPA would not have any unfunded liability for past retirement commitments or current healthcare commitments for retirees. The study also assumed that employee benefits, such as retirement and healthcare, would be defined contributions rather than defined benefits.

Matrix has made presentations at several of the city council meetings, but so far, the cities are still digesting the report and no formal effort has been made. Riverside County’s budget for fiscal year 2017-18 is under review and in the next month, the anticipated contract costs for next fiscal year will be public.

The cities’ reaction to those costs will signal what the next step may be.

this ordinance, be considered permitted or conditionally permitted uses in any zone classification . . . and if a use is illegal under federal or state law, it is prohibited.”

County supervisors will continue to review Proposition 64, its derivative regulations and proposed state medical-marijuana regulations and “blend” them with county regulations, as permitted by state law.

In the meantime, the proposed state rules, with public comment open until Tuesday, June 13, are only for medical marijuana. (Visit www.cannabis.ca.gov to make public comments.) Rules for recreational marijuana come later.

Major changes for patients include curtailed hours for dispensary operation — from 24/7 to maximum legal hours from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. Local jurisdictions may further limit allowed hours.

Patients may only purchase 8 ounces (half a pound) per day unless a patient’s physician deems that amount insufficient to mollify the patient’s condition. Patients must be aged 21 or older to enter a dispensary’s limited-access areas, unless younger than 18 and accompanied by parent, legal guardian or primary caregiver. (An apparent unad-

ressed gap exists between ages 18 through 20.) Patient ID requires a physician’s recommendation for medical cannabis and valid proof of personal identification.

Home delivery is possible, but only by employees of the dispensary who are 21. Delivered meds must be signed for by the recipient patient at the time of delivery and delivery can only occur during dispensary operating hours.

State agencies estimate quality-control provisions will add about \$500 more per year to patient costs, but state agencies affirm in the coming regulated market marijuana will be dosed correctly, tested and clean, hence justifying the added cost.

Regulations affecting cannabis business owners give military vets expedition on business license applications; require 600 feet distance of dispensaries from nearest schools; prohibit active-duty law enforcement from holding a license unless the licensed business is located in a county different from the one in which law enforcement personnel serve; require cannabis business facility renters to have written permission from the building owners to operate a

cannabis business in the owned property; and require all business employees to have laminated ID badges issued by the licensee showing employee name, licensee name and employee’s passport-sized photograph.

Importantly, licensed dispensaries must be covered in video surveillance at all times and many business operations, including destruction of returned medical cannabis, must be destroyed in full view of video cameras. Transportation of medical marijuana can only be in enclosed, human-operated vehicles.

The three state agencies regulate different aspects of the industry: The California Department of Consumer Affairs, Bureau of Medical Cannabis Regulation, licenses dispensaries and all medical marijuana businesses that do not grow cannabis or manufacture cannabis products. The California Department of Food and Agriculture licenses cannabis growers. The California Department of Health licenses manufacturers of cannabis products.

One begins about 0.7 miles north Highway 74, in Mountain Center, and continues to Saunders Meadow Road. The second area begins about 0.3 miles north of Marion Ridge Drive (north of Pine Cove) and continues through Poppet Flats to 0.7 miles south of Lincoln Street.

Cal Trans advises motorists that this project “will require varying lengths of full directional closures for the safety of workers and motorists on Hwy. 243,

which is a two-lane, mountainous highway with narrow shoulders. When work begins on May 11, there will be lane closures and flagging operations. One direction of traffic may be delayed for up to 30 minutes while crews grind the pavement and place the rumble strip. The work hours are 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

“Please allow extra time for your commute,” Cal Trans urges drivers.

The project will cost more than \$1 million and should be completed in July, according to the Cal Trans press release.

With "Idyllwild's Got Talent," a fundraiser for the Idyllwild Community Center, Town Hall once again will host neighbors performing for neighbors — no big city glitz, just hometown fun.

Said organizer Suzy Capparelli, "I'm always amazed at how much talent there is here. This event shows off our local talent. People just love to have fun.

"This is the kind of show Linda Wheeler-Lackey and I put together 30-some years ago. It was titled 'A Night on the Town,' put on by the Soroptimists and performed at the same spot — Town Hall." And although Becky Clark claims not to remember, she and her two young children sang and Becky played piano. Chris Thile [age 5 or so] played banjo with his father. Now he leads Nickel Creek

and is replacing Garrison Keillor as host of 'A Prairie Home Companion.' There were other talents of varying degrees, one of the lesser ones being when Cindy Weaver and I performed a short, one-act called 'Save Me a Place at Forest Lawn.'"

Playwright Bruce Graham writes of bereavement, beer and bridges

South Philly playwright Bruce Graham likes to tell a good story, entertain his audiences, and showcase the humanity and honesty of his blue-collar characters. Graham still lives only 10 minutes from where he was born. He knows his people, their voices and their issues.

Idyllwild Actors Theatre will present a staged reading of Graham's "Stella and Lou," a lightly comedic and warm-hearted embrace of how people come together, drift apart, and face the very real fears and anxieties of getting old and facing death alone.

The play takes place in Lou's bar in South Philly near closing time, when a purposeful visit by Stella, one of Lou's regulars, changes both their lives. These are ordinary, working-class people dealing with the classic conundrum of what do you do if you're single at 60 and the winters aren't getting any easier.

Abetted by Donnie, a younger, wise-cracking regular who fears romantic commitment, the beer-fueled bar banter can be brisk, bracing and surprisingly eloquent as Lou, Stella and Donnie look at who they are and where they are at this point in their lives. Can they build bridges of connection or do they bleakly and bravely solo on?

The Chicago Tribune (2013 Chicago premiere) said: " 'Stella and Lou' is a play about late-in-life loneliness, themes that are not often explored in the theater, for all their ubiquity ... [the play is] refreshing, [and] potentially devastating, mostly because it feels so familiar."

Village Market will retain but move historic sign

New owner Jay McCormack keeps Selden Belden sign

As Jay McCormack and family continue their ambitious revamp of Idyllwild's historic Village Market, McCormack is installing a new sign on the front of the market. "We want the community to know it's a new business with a new look," said McCormack, who previously helmed nine off-Hill Rio Ranch Markets.

But in a nod to Idyllwild's history and its historic district, McCormack will retain the Selden Belden-designed sign that has long anchored Village Market through many ownership changes.

"We are formally reaching out to the [Idyllwild Area] Historical Society to let them know we intend to relocate the sign to the south side of the building so it will be visible to all customers parking at the market," said McCormack. "That way, its historical value and position will be retained."






