



Washington awards \$2,500 to summer concerts

Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington asked his Board of Supervisors' colleagues Tuesday to approve using of Community Improvement Designation funds to help the Idyllwild Summer Concert Series. They agreed.

Washington is giving the ISCS \$2,500 toward this year's concerts that begin July 6. However, this year and perhaps next year, the Thursday-night series will be held on the opposite side of Highway 243 from the Idyllwild Community Center property.

This is necessary as the San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board commences the first phase of construction on the site this summer. Phase 1 includes grading, parking and the amphitheater.

The funds will be deposited in the ISCS general fund to help for this summer's program, according to Ken Dahleen, ISCS founder and producer. Using the new location also has resulted in the need to obtain new permits from Riverside County. The oversight county agencies charge a fee, which has increased the ISCS budget for 2017.

Washington, who also has helped the SJMCC board, was aware of these added expenses and stepped in to help the series and to maintain the series during this temporary interruption.

Rotary donates 300 pairs of footwear

The Idyllwild Rotary Club has again made a significant contribution to the Idyllwild HELP Center.

On Tuesday, May 16, President Roland Gaebert and Past President Chuck Weisbart delivered 300 pairs of Bob's Clogs to the HELP Center.

"It is a fun opportunity and great potential," said HELP Center Executive Director Colleen Meyer. "I know it will impact a lot of people. The things [the Rotary] does for us is amazing."

All 300 pairs are new. Meyer says they are available for purchase in the center's Thrift Shop and also many will be shared with the center's clientele.

Behind the unusual and generous donation was Chehab Elawar, the former president of the Rotary's district, according to Weisbart.

"He is committed to causes," Weisbart said, describing Elawar. "He comes across manufacturers and is prepared to use whatever they can offer. He's the ultimate humanitarian."

In this case, Elawar received 27,000 pairs of Bob's Clogs from Skechers. He has a warehouse where he stores these supplies as they are shared among the 63 Rotary clubs of District 5330, which includes Idyllwild.

Some have already been taken to orphanages in Mexicali, Weisbart said.



Supervisors accept executive's proposed budget

Hearings set for next month

Riverside County Executive Officer Jay Orr submitted what may be his final budget recommendation to the Board of Supervisors at its May 9 meeting.

In order to fund several major, unplanned and costly issues for fiscal year 2017-18, Orr imposed a 6.5-percent reduction on most county agencies, but not public safety.

"However, this was not sufficient to offset the entire gap," he told the supervisors. "... most departments are able to absorb the 6.5-percent net county cost costs, increased pension contributions, and changes in internal services and insurance charges."

Orr will present the

consequences of these budget reductions to the board at a budget hearing June 19. The board will adopt its preliminary 2017-18 budget at the June 27 board meeting.

Orr's goals were to devise a balanced budget and preserve at least \$150 million in reserves. The largest unexpected budget demand was the governor's decision to shift the In-House Support Services program from the state to the counties.

This imposes a \$37-million demand on the budget. However, on May 11, Gov. Jerry Brown modified his proposal to provide about \$400 million to the counties, which is about two-thirds of their costs. Orr has not had time to address this change and its effect on the county budget.

"Board members will have to decide whether they want to change any of the current budget plans,"

said County Public Affairs Officer Raymond Smith in an email. "... It is crucial to build reserves and reduce ongoing costs wherever possible. Rolling back the cuts would do little to address these other challenges."

Other budget issues remain, Smith stressed. "... even after reducing next year's liability for IHSS, the county still must prepare to open the Indio jail in 2018, cover the costs of the settlement in the inmate health-care lawsuit, and deal with increased pension and salary costs."

Immediate funding issues include the new state contract for firefighters' salaries. The initial estimate from the Riverside County Fire Department was that this would add \$11.9 million to the county Cal Fire contract in 2017-18. During much of the late winter and spring, the fire department's budget was frequently on the board's

agenda.

With the operational changes Fire Chief John Hawkins has recommended, at this time Orr believes the added cost has been shaved to \$6.2 million.

"We are working closely with the fire department to identify other steps to reduce that increase," Orr put in his letter.

The Registrar of Voters estimates that another \$5.7 million is needed for her budget to offset "lower cost recovery projected for the election cycles occurring next fiscal year." But Orr recommended only \$5 million more for the registrar's budget.

Overtime for the sheriff's department has continued to create a bind as needs for more deputies continued to go unfilled. Orr said that 10 positions will be funded for the correctional staff to reduce their overtime and \$1.4 million will be used for

Chief executive accelerates retirement

Riverside County Chief Executive Jay Orr announced his retirement several weeks ago. He planned to retire the end of August.

At the May 9, Board of Supervisors' meeting, he sent a letter advising the board that he had to move the actual date up to the end of the first week of June.

Orr has accepted a teaching position at Claremont Colleges, he said in his most recent letter.

deputies in the court system.

The public defender and district attorney's offices both need more funding to balance their staffing needs, he said.

Exacerbating the added costs is revenue growth slowing. "... [P]rojections of the growth rates of key discretionary revenues continue softening," according to Orr.

"At the third quarter, property tax revenues are still trending lower than expected," he advised the board.

The result is that reserves may remain stable for two more years before

beginning to increase. Consequently, Orr warned the board, "Any increase in the burden on the general fund will be at the expense of existing commitments."

Although the board unanimously approved the draft budget 4-0, Supervisor Kevin Jeffries expressed his continuing concern. "At some point, [I'll recommend] we perform triage on the budget and not treat every department the same," he said. "I don't want to see a first-line [sheriff's] deputy cut and the same for firefighters."

Eight-session class to help quit smoking offered free

American Lung Association program at the Idyllwild Library

The Hemet Unified School District will present an eight-session workshop hosted by the Idyllwild Library on how to quit smoking.

The workshop program, developed by the American Lung Association, is licensed by HUSD. According to Valerie Velez, HUSD health education program specialist, "This is the first time I'm aware that this program is being offered to the community and certainly the first time it's offered at no cost."

Included as part of the workshop are all materials, including workbooks and CDs. "This is open to the community, parents and others, to learn how to be smoke-free as models to young people, to promote being smoke-free to youth," said Velez. "People who use electronic cigarettes are also welcome." Velez stressed that only FDA-approved nicotine replacement mechanisms are part of the public health community discussion about serious nicotine addiction. Participants are expected to attend all sessions.

"Obviously, a person has to continue working the plan after the workshops," said Velez. "We'll have a panel of former smokers who will give their testimony and tell their stories as part of the series — how to maintain being smoke-free once you've quit. And part of what we're doing in the class is learning how to develop support systems with people who are supportive of these changes."

Velez noted that many people who have used this ALA system have been successful in quitting. She requested that those interested pre-register since space and materials are limited. "Enrollment will be on a first-come, first-serve basis," she said.

Classes will be held every Monday from 4:30 to 6 pm. beginning June 5 to July 17 in the Idyllwild Library Community Room. Velez, certified as a trainer in the program, will be assisted with facilitating by Idyllwild local Bronwyn Jones, a volunteer with the HUSD Tobacco Use Program. Water and snacks will be provided.


Such is the case with 21st Century Fox. Its share price reached a high of \$31 to \$32 shares at the end of March this year.

However, I was most concerned about Pence's remarks supporting Notre Dame's right to deny contraception coverage to its employees, in effect forcing its religious beliefs on them. Hardly anybody still thinks that contraception is a moral issue but if you do, you are free not to use it. Why is it acceptable for Notre Dame or the Little Sisters of the Poor or Hobby Lobby to make that decision for you?

Every religion, with few exceptions, claims to define reality for all of humanity. Put another way, if you don't believe in my deity, you don't achieve salvation. Please stop to consider the ramifications of this. If we have a disagreement it would be helpful to review data and use rational thought to settle it. However, as soon as someone says, "This is what my god wants" then that ends the discussion.

Worse, what value might I have to you if your deity is going to condemn me to everlasting torture anyway? I am sure that was the thinking of the suicide bomber who killed 22 people at the concert in London. If my idea of a deity condemns everyone who doesn't believe like me, why not rid the world of all those who displease my deity? Although the number of people who resort to such violence is, thankfully, extremely small, how many of us reject others who don't believe like we do in many small, destructive ways?

If your religion gives you peace and hope and makes you a better person, good for you and all the rest of us. Let others want to be like you, and when they ask, tell them your story. But please, don't try to force your beliefs on anyone else. Most importantly, don't expect our government, so wonderfully founded on principles of freedom, to endorse your religious beliefs over those of someone else.

Weed abatement notices to be mailed to parcel owners

Editor's note: This is from a Riverside County press release.

Notices of Violation and Order to Abate overgrown weeds, dry grasses and other flammable vegetation will be mailed to property owners of unimproved parcels within the unincorporated areas of Riverside County this week.

Pursuant to County Ordinances 695 and 772, property owners who receive a Notice of Violation and Order to Abate must clear their cited parcel(s) within 30 days, as per the requirements set forth in the notice.

Each year, Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department responds to wildland fires caused by improper equipment use. These fires are preventable. Proper-

ty owners and/or contractors improperly using motorized equipment and conducting brush clearance too late in the day cause many of these types of fires, which are costly. Operators found to be negligent will be held liable for the costs associated with fire suppression. The guidelines can be found on Cal Fire's website in English and Spanish.

Having been a trauma psychotherapist for nearly 30 years, now retired, I still find myself thinking about how to help those of us suffering from traumatic incidents. I know there are many of you who, also, wish to be a healing presence for family and friends experiencing acute states of high-level emotional/physiological stress. Such stress can be caused by a breadth of dramatically upsetting events such as bad motor vehicle crashes, violence, loss of a loved one, devastating medical diagnoses or even direct abuse at the hands of another.

When I say "acute," I am thinking now of someone whose emotional/physiological equilibrium is so deeply overturned that they are "beside themselves," as the saying goes, both figuratively and even literally. You know what I mean if you've ever experienced one of those altered states where you are so disoriented you don't feel like you're in your own body. Your own natural resilience seems lost to you. It's a frightening state to be in and having someone nearby who can help ease that suffering is invaluable.

Often, though, when we're trying to help, we feel inadequate and unprepared.

I stumbled across a terrific book a few years ago, "The Worst is Over." I recommend it. It provides us with needed preparation. The authors call it "verbal first aid."

The authors provide medical evidence that the right words can calm, actually changing the physiological reactions of the sufferer. The wrong words can change reactions, too, worsening them.

When I was training physicians on how to work with women who had been sexually assaulted, one caution I always underscored was that an innocent phrase could have a devastating effect on the victim. A phrase something like, "Why did you even go into that dark parking lot alone?" — although meant empathetically, will frequently be interpreted by the victim as blaming, and become another hurt, long-remembered.

On the other hand, something as simple, genuine and heartfelt as, "I am so sorry this happened to you," can soothe.

There is not enough space here to do justice to verbal first aid, but here are the bare bones. Do these, even with an unconscious person:

Generate rapport with the sufferer. Speak with authority and empathy. Give your name. "I am here to help. The worst is over. I will not leave you alone. Help is on its way. (If this is accurate). I am covering you with some blankets." (Describe your other comfort/first aid measures.)

Get a contract: "Will you do as I ask you to?"
Give clear, positive, firm suggestions for pain relief and healing: "Because your body knows how to heal itself, you can right now begin to relax and let your body do its work. All your body's resources are working at this very moment to help you recover and get through this."

Cal Trans work on Highway 371 resumes Saturday

Delays expected

Last week, Cal Trans suspended work on Highway 371 because of the cold weather. The temperatures were too low for paving.

With warmer weather returning, Cal Trans planned to resume work on Highway 371 beginning last Saturday. Cal Trans crews don't work on Sundays.

Work will continue from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. through Thursday, May 25, and return again from Wednesday, May 31, through Friday, June 2.

Cal Trans will not work Friday, May 26, nor Monday and Tuesday, May 29 and 30.

During the work periods, traffic will be one-way with a pilot car between the Howard Road intersection to 0.4 miles west of Barbara Trail.

Motorists are advised that delays of 30 minutes are expected during the traffic control. The delays can be lengthy because the queue for each direction on hold is cleared to prevent further delays due to longer traffic queues.

This Cal Trans project provides preventative maintenance for Highway 371 and began in mid-April. The \$1.9-million project is applying an overlay treatment to help extend the life of the roadway and was awarded to Calmex Engineering of Riverside.

Allen pleads not guilty to felony charges

Night collision left other driver needing surgery

Pam Allen, 64, Idyllwild, has been charged with three felonies for the March 31 collision with Julia Romero, 17, also of Idyllwild.

Allen was arraigned in Riverside County Superior Court Wednesday, May 17, and pleaded not guilty to the charges.

A felony settlement conference has been scheduled for June 22.

Two of the charges were for driving under the influence and causing great bodily injury. The third charge was hit and run.

The incident happened about 11:30 p.m. Friday, March 31, on Highway 243. In the initial story about the collision, the Town Crier reported, "According to the CHP report, Allen, while trying to negotiate a right-hand curve, drifted across the double-yellow line into the opposing lane of traffic and crashed head-on into Romero's vehicle."

Romero suffered two broken legs and ribs. She needed surgery to repair her legs. Two subsequent Town Crier stories reported on the efforts to raise money for Romero's surgery at www.gofundme.com/getting-julia-back-on-track.



Indivisibles hear about involvement in labor, education and environmental issues

The Idyllwild Indivisibles brought two guest speakers to town last week. While both work for private groups, as part of their jobs, they regularly interact with politics.

Beth Caskie, a labor representative for the California School Employees Association, and Jono Hildner, the political chair for the San Geronio Chapter of the Sierra Club, spoke to attendees at the Wednesday, May 17, meeting.

Both expressed admiration for the formation of the Idyllwild Indivisibles group and its initial efforts. Both were making their first visit to Idyllwild. Both encouraged the members to listen and to engage in issues, whether they are related to education, labor, environment, state or national.

The message was: Participation and communication with elected officials is the means to achieving results and exercising democracy.

Caskie stressed that she was happy to come and share her experience with the local Indivisibles, but her comments were hers, not her employer's policies. At this meeting, she emphasized that she was not representing CSEA.

While she has been a labor representative for more than a decade, her path to politics and labor relations began as a theater major at Northwestern. From there she became curious about writers and authors, which eventually funneled her into work where she tries to improve conditions for educational employees.

But as a political activist, she encouraged attendees to visit the Netroots website and, if possible, attend the national session in August. The benefit would be a broadened perspective of issues, viewpoints and contacts.

As the Indivisibles grow and mature, she offered two rules from her experience. The first was "no despair." Success will not necessarily be quick or complete.

"We improve the world through people, one person at a time," Caskie said.

And the second rule was "no a**holes." Her point was no degree of political insight and acumen overcomes the negative effect of being cranky or venting anger. Neither attracts people to your position or enables them to listen to your message.

She finished with a brief discussion of some current educational and labor issues, such as automatic withholding of union dues.

Hildner also began by encouraging participants to get informed about issues for which they have passion and to engage the process. Remaining alone and silently stifling one's views will be useless.

Describing his emotions and attitudes following the November election, he said, "I finally realized that my self-pity party was not effective. I had to get up and work more. One of the positive outcomes from the election is the mobilization of groups like these."

Since the election, the San Geronio Chapter has seen 5,000 to 7,000 new members. While not all will be more active than writing a check, he hopes 2,000 of them will participate in more activities to protect the environment.

"Politics is an import part of saving the environment," Hildner stressed. "Our new four-word byline is 'Resist, recruit, train and sustain!'"

Several of the environmental issues that occupy Hildner's time include the Dakota Access Pipeline, the reduced budget for the Environmental Protection Administration, stream protection and the recent announced review of national monuments.

The latter could affect several local (in Riverside and San Bernardino counties) monuments.

He also discussed the Cadiz water project, which would transport ground water from the Mojave Desert to Orange County. This has recently been revived.

Hildner also mentioned the Buy Clean California bill (Assembly bill 262). This legislation encourages state agencies to consider minimizing greenhouse emissions when reviewing contractor bids for future construction projects and not just the bid's cost.

Assemblymember Rob Bonta (D-Oakland) introduced the Buy Clean California Act on Feb. 1. It asks how materials, such as steel, concrete, asphalt and glass, which are to be used in state-funded projects, are created.

"This is a fascinating and wonderful possibility," he noted.

On Sunday, May 28, the Indivisibles will sponsor an event — Diversity Works in Idyllwild — at the Town Baker from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., Carol Mc-

Clintic announced.

"It is a celebration of how Idyllwild works together ... we are just a few grassroots people who thought we should do something positive about our community in the wake of so much of a negative atmosphere in our country," McClintic said. The idea originated with Louie Torres, co-owner of the Town Baker, she added.



Checking for ID theft of a child

The Federal Trade Commission advises: Any parent or guardian of a child knows the milestones that come with turning 16 — learning to drive, maybe dating, or thinking about college. But now, there's one more: checking their credit report.

But my kids don't have a credit card, house or car. Why should I check their credit report?

Because somebody else could be using your child's personal information. Once a child's — or anyone's — Social Security number is stolen, it can be used by identity thieves.

Checking to see if your child has a credit history, and then thoroughly reviewing it when they turn 16, can help you spot signs of identity theft. If you find false or inaccurate information, you'll have time to correct it before your child applies for a job, a loan for college or a car, or tries to get a credit card or a place to live.

Generally, children won't have credit reports unless someone is using their information for fraud.

What if my child has a credit report with incorrect or false information? Visit IdentityTheft.gov to report the problem and follow the steps outlined to resolve it.

File for tax refunds by Aug. 1

Owners of residential or business property in Riverside County have until Aug. 1 to file for unclaimed property tax refunds.

Board of Supervisors Chairman John F. Tavaglione and Treasurer-Tax Collector Don Kent issued the reminder to give taxpayers sufficient time to file for refunds and not be caught short by the deadline. Filing instructions and a list of all unclaimed property tax refunds from tax year 2012 and prior are available on the Treasurer-Tax Collector's website at www.countytreasurer.org/TaxCollector/UnclaimedMoney/PropertyTaxUnclaimedRefund.aspx.

Kent said 575 refunds totaling \$586,728.78 remain unclaimed. Most refunds stem from valuation reductions by the assessor and are related to corrections or cancellations to the tax roll after taxes already had been paid. Under California law, property tax refunds unclaimed for four years after the payment date — or one year after a requested claim form has been mailed back to a taxpayer by the county, whichever is later — may be transferred to the county general fund by order of the supervisors. After Aug. 1, any unclaimed money shifts to the general fund and no longer can be claimed.

Identity theft reporting simpler

When it comes to reporting and recovering from identity theft, the Federal Trade Commission has simplified the process by eliminating the need for a police report in most cases.

How does it work? When you report identity theft using IdentityTheft.gov, you'll answer some questions about what happened. IdentityTheft.gov then uses your information to create the tools you need to begin your recovery, including: a personal recovery plan; pre-filled letters to send to merchants, banks and others affected by the identity theft; and an “Identity Theft Report,” which is your official statement about the crime.

In most cases, you can use your report in place of a police report to clear your account and credit records of transactions that resulted from the identity theft. That's because when you use IdentityTheft.gov, you're reporting the crime to the Federal Trade Commission, a federal law enforcement agency.

Grinding facility open Mondays

The Idyllwild grinding facility resumed Monday operations effective May 1. The facility will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays and Friday, from May 1 through Nov. 29, 2017. (It is closed from noon to 1 p.m. for lunch.)

The facility will then close again on Mondays during the winter months (December through April) due to low tonnage volumes and customer participation.

Weekend preview: Memorial Day honors the fallen

Memorial Day, originally Decoration Day, began in 1866 as an observance to honor Civil War dead, both Union and Confederate. It was called Decoration Day because of the practice of decorating the graves of the more than 600,000 men who died in the conflict.

Over the years, the observance was expanded to honor war dead from all American military conflicts. And the practice of decorating graves, at first annual gatherings of family members to place flowers on the graves of fallen

soldiers, also expanded to include decorating graves of family members and friends regardless of military service.

Idyllwild's American Legion Post 800 will host two events: a Saturday, May 27, hamburger, brats and hot dog barbecue from 1 to 7 p.m. All are welcome to both attend and bring side dishes, if they choose. Admission is \$8 but alcohol service at the bar is limited to Post members, vets and member guests; and a solemn commemoration of Memorial Day at 11:00 a.m. Monday, May 29.

At 11 sharp, the Post honor guard will com-

mence the ceremony outside, honoring Post and other Hill veterans who have passed on in the past year. There also will be a formal flag folding, with each fold of the flag honoring dead from a particular American conflict.

Navy Capt. Ned Roberts will talk about his own service and the distinction of being part of a long line of veterans, with combined service of more than 120 years. Post Col. Barney Brause will act as emcee for the ceremony. Afterward, the Ladies Auxiliary will host a complimentary luncheon.

Bill Sheppard had major career at the apex of rock and roll

Bill Sheppard was there. Right in the center of West Coast rock and roll. Right when it was all happening.

And not many know how big his career was. It turns out, Bill is so modest even his wife and sons did not know how close to the sun he flew with the groups with which he played, sang and recorded.

When Bill tells his story, there is always a smile and a gentle knowingness. And if anyone who reads this had the experience of being fans or groupies of rock or pop groups, or were actually in music from the mid-1960s to the late 1970s, you will understand what the smile and nod mean.

It was a unique time in American cultural history and musical evolution. A confluence of events political and social created a vibe that may never again be repeated. "Back then it was magic," said Bill. "Not a lot of people were [rock] musicians then. You could walk into a room and be immediately accepted. The time was fun, harmless and we were more thoughtful, cheerful and a lot more accepting."

Bill had his first professional gig when he was 13, playing sax Friday and

Saturday nights in Huntington Beach with Denny and the Chancellors, a group with a current record. "We backed all the Motown singing groups that came in," said Bill.

At the same time, while still in junior high school, Bill was a math brain, winning the Orange County-wide math award in eighth grade. And that is just the beginning of a regular music career that began at 13.

After a few years, the lead singer of D and C quit and Bill took over. Then a group called the Fabs, also with a record, heard Bill singing and offered him the lead singer position in the already successful band. At that time in Southern California, groups soon to be famous were forming and everyone knew everyone. "In 1965 I was asked into a recording studio to do vocals for a group whose lead singer was having pitch or phrasing problems so I laid the vocal on 'Mister, You're a Better Man Than I.' The group was The Yardbirds.

"I would do it all over again in a minute," said Bill. "It all flowed, it was all connected and it all seemed inevitable. Each new thing just presented itself as the next thing. We didn't know we were naive. We were just riding the

waves and the waves kept coming."

And the next wave was the biggest. At 18, five years into his pro career, Bill and two members of the Fabs formed the nucleus of Stack. Stack would develop its own cult following because of its high-energy concerts, and the quality of its instrumentals and vocals. Stack was endorsed by Sunn amplifiers as was The Who. "So, when The Who was not touring, we used their equipment," remembered Bill. This was before the release of "Tommy."

Stack released only one album, "Above All." Bill

noted that original copies of the vinyl album now sell for about \$7,500, so strong was the concert following for this group.

After two years with Stack, managers wanted to book the group into clubs and require them to play for four hours each night. And that was it for Bill. "I could not perform, at the energy level we did, for four hours and I left for that reason," he said.

After Stack, Bill arranged, sang and recorded a folk album, while based out of Running Springs. He toured Canada for a year in the summer of 1970 and came back to SoCal

and started working night clubs.

As the musical waves continued to create flow, a producer heard Bill singing and tapped him to be part of a new group, Ruby Wheller. The producer bought a house and paid the new group to live and rehearse in the house for a year. "This was a great group," said Bill. "The music was superb. But we came out of that year just when disco hit. And as a result, we played big venues one time only. We were doing original rock material and everyone wanted disco dancing."

As part of musically surfing those exciting and formative years in rock and roll, Stack played on the bill with The New Yardbirds (soon to become Led Zeppelin), opened for Iron Butterfly, Three Dog Night, Chicago Transit Authority (later Chicago), The Byrds, The Flying Burrito Brothers, Jimi Hendrix and Alice Cooper. After the heady ride, Bill stopped playing for around 15 years, transitioning into being a representative for musical instruments and amps, and creating sound design for major Las Vegas hotels and concert venues.

"On May 15, 2006, my wife Debbie and I came up to Idyllwild on our 24th anniversary for a visit," he

remembered. "We had no plans of moving from our home in Orange County that we were still remodeling. But we drove by a house that was for sale. The price had just been lowered. Forty-six days later, our house had sold and we were living in Idyllwild." The Sheppards own the local video store and Bill still plays and sings locally.

As an anecdote, underlining his modesty, Bill recounted taking Debbie and sons Billy and Danny to the Fender Museum in Fullerton where a 50-year exhibition about Orange County's history as a rock and roll mecca was being mounted. "There were walls of displays and booths on each group, including Stack," said Bill. "The kids did not know anything about my history. Even Debbie did not know that much."

That evening, the family attended a dinner honoring the groups, among them the Righteous Brothers and No Doubt. "Danny looked around and said, 'You're in here with all these groups?!'"

And yes, Bill Sheppard was. He was there. In the middle of it all, just as the Orange County rock and roll wave was ready to ride.

Race Day launches Idyllwild summer recreation

Idyllwild 5k/10k race and fitness walk a romp for all ages

You have to be there — literally. And if you can walk, no matter how slowly, there's a place for you.

For the past 37 years, the second Saturday in June is race day — the Idyllwild 5,000 meter/10,000 meter race and fitness walk celebrates everything that makes Idyllwild a tonic for body and soul: exercise, fresh air and majestic mountain scenery. Although the race and walk are exhilarating, the half hour or so before the race is idiosyncratically Idyllwild. It's usually chilly — the sun is just beginning to illuminate sections of Village Center Drive where runners and walkers are gathering. Some are fast-walking around the square to limber up, some are running and some are simply staking out sunlit sections of the street to literally get warm.

Through it all, announcer-in-chief Chip Shelly wittily

greet participants by name. Yes, Idyllwild's that kind of town, where Chip knows most of those who have come out for the race. The mountain air is bracingly fresh but not too cold for locals. Non-locals crowd Higher Grounds for caffeinated warmth.

And for many, if not for most, race day is not about winning — it's about gathering with friends and neighbors to raise money for Idyllwild School physical education programs and equipment. It's showing up to make a difference. Over the years, the Race Committee has raised more than \$70,000 to fund PE equipment, scoreboards, turf for top field, athletic uniforms and other items for Idyllwild School. Without race proceeds, the school would lack much of the financial underpinning of its PE program.

Occasionally, the race can change lives. Runner and triathlete Bill Whitman first ran the 10k in 1992. "I had such a positive impression of the town and became very intrigued with Idyllwild," he remembered. Whitman is now a full-time resident and physical therapist/attorney for many town residents.

Race day this year is held on Saturday, June 10. Start times are 7:15

a.m. for the 5k race (slight delay for the fitness walkers), 8 a.m. for the 10k and 9:15 a.m. for the Kid's Run at Town Hall. There will be an awards ceremony after the race and a pancake breakfast.

The top male and female finishers in the 5k and 10k will receive special awards and custom medallions. Awards also will be given to the top three male and female finishers in each age group of the runs. The top five overall male and female finishers in the 5k fitness walk also will receive awards.

So mark your calendar and consider the salutary benefits of participating — brisk, early-morning mountain air, camaraderie, pom-pom waving race cheerleaders along the race route, Chip Shelly on the microphone as you start and urging you on as you finish, and a post-race hi-carb feast.



The non-alcoholic cocktails have been named for locations in Idyllwild. Special guests will demonstrate how to accent trays with vegetable or fruit garnishes. CDC recommends fewer shots
 The Center for Disease Control now recommends that 11- to 12-year-olds receive two doses of human papillomavirus vaccine at least six months apart rather than the previously recommended three doses to protect against cancers caused by HPV infections. Teens and young adults who start the series later, at ages 15 to 26, will continue to need three doses of HPV vaccine.
 CDC Director Tom Frieden said, "This recommendation will make it simpler for parents to get their children protected in time."
 Generally, preteens receive HPV vaccine at the same time as whooping cough and meningitis vaccines. Adolescents ages 13 to 14 also are able to receive an HPV vaccination on the new two-dose schedule.

Mental health urgent care center
 A mental health urgent care center opened its doors in October to provide around-the-clock assessment, psychiatric support, medication management and customized services to adults voluntarily seeking assistance in crisis situations.
 Desert Crisis Walk-In Center is located in a remodeled storefront at 2500 North Palm Canyon Drive, Suite A4, Palm Springs. The center will remain open 24 hours a day throughout the year. RI International, a private provider of behavioral health programs, is operating the center under a contract with Riverside University Health System.
 Guests also may be referred to the walk-in center by mobile crisis teams or law enforcement. All visits and stays are voluntary. Length of stays cannot exceed 23 hours.
 During that time, guests will participate in the development of individualized care plans that include recovery education, peer-to-peer support, mental health services, nutritional counseling, coordination and referral to community-based services.
 Steve Steinberg, the director of RUHS Behavioral Health, said the center will help relieve pressure on local emergency departments that get overwhelmed by individuals brought in by law enforcement on involuntary psychiatric admissions known as a 5150




