Black bear may remain a long-term resident

Peaceful coexistence is the goal

The young black bear recently sighted in Idyllwild made his way here from Banning. He is believed to be a young male and is referred to as the "Rite Aid" bear since a picture of the bear was taken at the Rite Aid in Banning. He joins an existing and varied wildlife population with which Hill residents have learned to coexist.

Since black-bear populations primarily exist north of Interstate 10 in the San Bernardino

and San Gabriel mountains, and have been rare south of the interstate since its construction, the bear likely crossed under the interstate in a river channel or other underground crossing accessible to wildlife, according to Kevin Brennan, wildlife biologist with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. He noted that once bears have made it south of Interstate 10, they seldom cross back to the north side.

Now that the bear is in the San Jacinto range, it is likely to remain, roaming an average 186-mile-wide territory in search of food. Black bears can move quickly and have been clocked at speeds of over 30 miles per hour. They are inquisi-

tive foragers, with strong memories regarding food sources or caches. They have incredibly strong senses of smell and can detect food at great distances. And since sense of smell is so strong, food within fenced or cooped enclosures can be an attractive and accessible source. Also, small pets in fenced yards could be easy prey if left outdoors with no ability to re-enter the house.

The bears are intelligent and inventive with regard to accessing food. They are adept at climbing, both trees and fences, in order to get to food sources. The more familiar bears are with humans, the more dangerous an encounter with a black bear can become, according to Brennan. Bears be-

gin to identify humans with food sources and are not easily deterred from those sources by intervening humans. Proper outdoor storage of garbage or other food waste is essential in deterring a bear's investigation of a home or backyard.

As reported in our June 1 edition, Brennan noted that once a bear settles down, it remains within an area of 1 to 3 miles in width with longer excursions to search for food. Brennan estimated the Rite Aid bear is probably 2 to 3 years old and weighs over 200 pounds.

"We don't relocate the bears once they are in wildland areas,"

Idyllwild Water District holds workshop for directors

Institutional memory and long-term planning are director goals

The Idyllwild Water District Board of Directors held a workshop with Interim General Manager Jack Hoagland and Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman to help relatively new board members better familiarize themselves with district policies, infrastructure, issues and projects.

The workshop was properly noticed and was attended, in addition to press, by residents Sue Nash and Tom Paulek.

In an hour-and-a-half meeting, the board, at the request of Director Geoffrey Caine, sought to gain clarity on what is available and accessible about the district's past policies, existing infrastructure conditions, plans for current and future projects, possible revision of existing table of organization, and specific goals over a 12-year period that could be prudently and effectively planned for, including completing more projects in house as opposed

to contracting them out.

"My goal in requesting this meeting was to give us [the directors] the opportunity to talk with each other without a restrictive agenda that can prevent freer exchanges," said Caine. "There are so many important and complex issues we are considering and we need to be better informed."

The district itself is in the process of reinventing itself — few employees have been there longer than two years, the district is operating with an interim general manager on an 18-month contract of which he has already served five, and although institutional memory, in the form of records, exists, it is not easily accessible.

Caine sought clarity on how current stand-alone projects fit into a longer developmental scheme, what the roles are of management and the board, the strategy for finding a permanent GM, and the ongoing problem of having a new board that lacks sufficient information to competently vote on pressing matters at regular board meetings. "I don't have time to think it through and I don't have time to talk to my colleagues," said Caine.

Director Peter Szabadi agreed. "We [the board] are still in an inherited stage," he observed. "What I want to see is a more direct-

ed and particularized approach to the matters before us." Director Steve Kunkle noted the critical need for education. "The board we have now needs to be educated regarding maintenance, projects and personnel," he emphasized. "The more informed we are the better prepared we are to make decisions."

Board President Chip Schelly, who moderated the meeting, noted that the board's education is hampered by the district's having so little available institutional memory. "Most staff has been here for less than two years," he said.

Schelly then proposed a forward-looking schedule — one, two, four, six and 12 year markers within which to place stated goals. First on Schelly's white sheet was a 12-year goal to be at capacity service, with 2,000 meters and 750 sewer connections, then working backward, schedule steps to effectively achieve those goals within specific periods.

Other goals included having all or a specific percentage of existing pipe inventoried and replaced if necessary and within what period in time; and what would the manpower requirement be within the next 12 years and what would be the most cost-efficient use of that manpower. Much more was discussed. The

said Brennan. "And we don't destroy a bear unless it is an imminent threat to public safety, and those occasions are relatively rare."

Brennan noted that bears can be relocated from urban habitats to the nearest wildland area, as was the female black bear sighted in Indio. She was relocated to the Santa Rosa range. Brennan said bears can also be relocated if sighted too close to major freeways where they could pose danger to motorists.

There are, of course, concerns that residents, not accustomed to area wildlife, might have about bears being in the area, after years of relatively few incursions. But the San Jacinto Mountains are also home to mountain lions, bobcats, foxes and coyotes, long-term wild residents that require understanding, awareness and caution from coexisting humans.

A U.S. Forest Service Alaska website gives a good account of bear behavior and proper human interaction:

"Bears are curious, intelligent and potentially dangerous animals, but undue fear of bears can endanger both bears and people. Respecting bears and learning proper behavior in their territory will help so that neither you nor the bear will suffer needlessly from an encounter.

"Avoid surprising bears at close distance. Look for signs of bears and make plenty of noise. Avoid crowding bears. Respect their personal space. Avoid attracting bears through improper handling of food or garbage.

"If a bear remains in your space, identify yourself as a human, make noise, outstretch your arms to seem larger

Bear precautions in town:

- Remove/put away anything edible or smelly
- Garbage: Use bear-proof containers until pick-up or dump run
- Food: Keep indoors in odor-free containers, put away picnic leftovers
- Pet food and bird-feeder: Store indoors
- Fruit trees: Protect with electric fencing, pick up fallen fruit
- Compost piles: Remove them

Bear precautions at campsite or trail:

- Food: Put it in bear-proof containers or in a car trunk, not in your tent
- Camp: Clean up immediately after meals
- Hiking: Make enough noise to avoid surprising a bear
- Bear encounter: Don't approach, don't run away. Make noise and appear as large as possible. Give the bear space to leave.

and don't run. Like dogs, bears will pursue a running animal."

Brennan said he would consider holding a public meeting, probably at the Nature Center, to answer residents' concerns about our recent black-bear incursions.



Tuberculosis diagnosed at three hospitals in the county

Testing is being urged after active tuberculosis was diagnosed at three hospitals in Riverside County.

Riverside County health officials are working with administrators at Hemet Valley Medical Center in Hemet and Parkview Community Hospital in Riverside to determine who may have been exposed to tuberculosis after some hospital employees were diagnosed with an active form of the respiratory illness. And in Rancho Mirage, three Eisenhower Medical Center patients tested positive for tuberculosis, as well. There is no indication yet that the cases are related and officials have not determined how the individuals contracted the illness.

Three employees — two at Hemet Valley and one at Parkview — are undergoing treatment and are expected to recover. The individuals are not being identified. Riverside University Health System-Public Health and the hospitals are notifying more than 2,000 staff members and patients at these two hospitals who may have been exposed to the disease.

About 900 notifications are being sent from Hemet Valley and more than 1,200 from Parkview. Those receiving the notification are being urged to be tested for TB, which can be done through their healthcare provider. Hemet Valley has made special arrangements for free TB testing of individuals seen at its hospital. The dates and times will be included in the notification letters. Those who test positive will be referred for an X-ray and evaluation for appropriate treatment.

Those who do not receive a notification letter are not considered at-risk for TB exposure.

At Eisenhower Medical Center, three patients were diagnosed with an active form of the respiratory illness. The three Eisenhower patients also are not being identified because of confidentiality rules.

Riverside University Health System-Public Health and the Rancho Mirage-based hospital are notifying the approximately 500 Eisenhower staff members and patients who may have been exposed to the disease and urging them to be tested for TB. As with Hemet Valley and Parkview Community, those who test positive will be referred for an X-ray and evaluation for appropriate treatment.

Barbara Cole, director of disease control for Public Health, said it may be uncommon to have three cases diagnosed at the same time from the same hospital, but emphasized there is no cause for alarm.

"There are no indications the illness has spread beyond the initial patients, but the testing will provide peace of mind for those who receive the notifications and get tested," said Cole. "We are working closely with the hospital to keep the community safe."

"The risk of transmission is low, but TB can still be a serious illness," said Dr. Cameron Kaiser, public health officer for the county. "If you receive notification you may have been exposed, getting tested promptly will ensure any risk you have is dealt with quickly."

Tuberculosis is a disease spread through the air during prolonged, repeated and close contact with an individual who is infected with active tuberculosis. When left untreated, TB can result in complications that can be serious. TB is not spread by shaking hands, sharing food or drink, or via bed linens or toilet seats.

Symptoms include a productive cough, unexplained weight loss, fever and fatigue. Not everyone infected with TB bacteria becomes sick. A person with inactive (latent) TB cannot spread it to others.

above is offered as examples of what the board is working through.

In short, the board was seeking two things: better information on where the district is currently positioned with regard to resources, infrastructure, needed repairs and/or replacement, and personnel; and a well-thought-out set of goals and an achievable plan for attaining them in the near and longer-term future.

Szabadi noted the need for standard operating procedure manuals for all aspects of the district's business. Hoagland observed, "We have the information but it is not organized. Knowing it's in the files and knowing where it is in the files is the challenge."

One of the suggestions put forward by Hoagland was to contract with a records manager to come in to organize the district's records and available operations information.

The meeting was recorded and many of the questions from the board

elicited informed and valuable information from Hoagland and Shouman. But more was discussed than can be reported in this article. All who attended, including residents Nash and Paulek, believe it was a very good start.

Even having studies conducted for eventual consolidation of the three boards was discussed. But as Hoagland pointed out, "You can have all the studies in the world but if you don't have the parties who want to do it [consolidation], studies don't matter. When we have our own house in order, the other districts may be more disposed to consider consolidation. If the parties want to deal, then all the other issues could be worked out."

Directors requested a special meeting, which was tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, June 7, time to be determined, to talk further about issues they will be required to vote on at the next regular meeting on Wednesday, June 21.

Only one water district election on the ballot

Pine Cove election on ballot for Tuesday, Aug. 29

The only ballot election for Hill water district boards will be at the Pine Cove Water District. Three incumbents, Robert Hewitt, Lewis Padula and Joel Palmer, were to be appointed "in lieu" for four-year terms and Vicki Jakubac for two years. But with another candidate, Water Treatment Consultant Jeffrey Kleefisch, running for a full-year term, there will need to be an election. The Pine Cove election will be on the ballot on Tuesday, August 29.

Idyllwild Water District has all directors returning with no other applicants. Consequently, there is no need for a ballot election. At IWD, Vic Sirkin and Geoffrey Caine have been appointed to four-year terms; Charles "Chip" Schelly and Peter Szabadi for two-year terms. Steve Kunkle is continuing to serve his term from a previous election.

At Fern Valley Water District, Robert Krieger and Jim Rees are returning directors and there is only one candidate, retired businessman Jim Wise, to fill the one open seat left available by former director Charlie Wix's resignation. Consequently, there will be no election in this district either.

CSA 38 Advisory Committee members reappointed

Dr. Amber Pairis receives climate leadership award

Climate Science Alliance South Coast Director Dr. Amber Pairis was among eight recipients honored nationally on May 8, for helping safeguard America's valuable natural resources.

Pairis is a former Idyllwild resident. "I grew up in Idyllwild (age 5 and up) and lived there until I went to college in 1992," she said. "Idyllwild will always be home and my family is still there so I am in Idyllwild often. I went to Idyllwild Elementary and graduated high school at Idyllwild Arts."

For their outstanding work in raising awareness and helping the nation's natural resources become more resilient to the impacts of a rapidly changing world, eight organizations and individuals were honored by their peers at the National Adaptation Forum as recipients of the Climate Adaptation Leadership Award for Natural Resources. Recipients were selected from 27 nominations representing activities from individuals and federal, tribal,

state, local and non-governmental organizations from around the country.

"Today we recognize individuals and agencies who are developing and using innovative methods to safeguard the nation's living natural resources from a rapidly changing world," said Kevin Hunting, chief deputy director of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and co-chair of the Joint Implementation Working Group of the National Fish, Wildlife, and Plants Climate Adaptation Strategy. "Their leadership is a source of inspiration for additional efforts to advance climate-smart resource conservation and management with lasting positive impacts on the nation's communities and economy."

The description of why she won is: "Amber Pairis is committed to climate adaptation actions that promote natural resource conservation. She serves as Director of the Climate Science Alliance-South Coast, a partnership between California Department of Fish and Wildlife and the California Landscape Conservation Cooperative with 140

+ partner agencies and organizations. In 2013, Amber was appointed by Governor Brown as the Assistant Secretary for Climate Change-California Natural Resources Agency to coordinate the State's nature-based climate adaptation activities. Pairis was the Climate Change Advisor for CDFW and created the Climate Science Program, CDFW Climate College, Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agency's Climate Committee, and supported development of the National Fish, Wildlife, and Plants Climate Adaptation Strategy."

The Climate Adaptation Leadership Award was

established in 2016 to recognize outstanding leadership by individuals, organizations, businesses and agencies to support the resilience of America's vital natural resources and the many people, businesses and communities that depend on them.

Family. Families of birth. Families of choice. Fathers, mothers, spouses, sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, grandparents, aunts, uncles, friends, colleagues. Family.

Family is the cornerstone of our lives, the continuing bond that steadies us, grounds us and defines us.

James Larkin carefully and preciously carried his family, celebrated them and loved each day of being with them. He was defined by his family.

For James to die suddenly, without warning at age 39, is a tragedy that touches each of us. For with families of our own, we understand this wrenching loss and feel kindred grief.

The groundswell and outpouring of support for James and his family — Rachel, Opal and Jasper — shows the depth of love and respect they engendered. For, as a family, they glowed with positive light and creative energy that warmed the space around them and made daily life a little better for all of us.

James was part of the Town Crier family from 2004 until 2013. He scrupulously performed a variety of jobs — proofreader, typesetter, subscriptions — with rapiers wit and sparkling intelligence. And, for me, he was a critical part of my transition into becoming a newspaper writer.

Each week he proofed my articles as I was struggling to learn the proper form for writing for a newspaper. Each week, after proofing my articles, he would give me a list of words he either believed I overused, used incorrectly or should not have used at all. I think he thought, at least at first, that I was not serious enough about my job or lacked the talent to perform it properly. Nevertheless, I saved each list and posted it on my bulletin board near my desk. Each week, I waited for the next list, which he never failed to provide.

Certainly there was genuine chastisement and instruction in each list, but there was also a degree of merry humor that became a bond between us. The lists helped smooth my way into a new work situation and reminded me how important each word is. And James' lists made me think and made me laugh. They were carefully prepared, well-thought out and never frivolous. The days he gave me his lists were good days, days I looked forward to, and days I will remember.

By the way, James would not have approved of my using "rapiers wit" or "sparkling intelligence."

In the end, with James' sudden death, words are just that — words, and no matter how heartfelt or well-intended, they are inadequate. His death, now at this time, is beyond one's ability to understand. We are left wondering how this could happen and what we can do.

Love. Love is what we can do. We can come together in love to honor James and his young family. For, as family members and as a village, that is what we do. And it is what James would have wanted.

Dr. Browning's lesson for all

Distraction can be deadly

Dr. Kenneth Browning, physician-proprietor of Fern Creek Medical Center, spoke with the Town Crier recently to give the details behind his bizarre auto crash at our local transfer station on Monday morning, May 29. He hopes everyone can learn from it.

Browning related that he had just backed his car up to a dumpster — as we all have done. He braked to a full stop, intending to shift the car into park, put on the parking brake and exit the vehicle — again, as we all have done. But immediately upon braking to a stop, he received a cell phone call from his wife. She was asking him for a number — an account number or a password, or some such — and they had to ponder a while before Browning came up with the answer and transmitted the number to her. When the call with his wife ended, he existed his vehicle to go about emptying the trunk of his car — as we all have done.

Suddenly, he observed his car backing up, and he realized he hadn't yet put it in park and set the parking brake. He rushed to reach in with his foot to step on the brake, but his foot slipped off the pedal and onto the accelerator. The car shot backwards, and the open door or door frame body-slammed him flat, face up on the pavement. The car hit the dumpster so hard it knocked the dumpster over onto its back. In the process, the rear of his car rode up the front of the dumpster and was lifted off the asphalt. The car came to rest, suspended on the now-vertical bottom edge of the upturned dumpster, with Browning underneath.

Browning said he looked up and thought, "I'm a dead man." He was sure the car was about to come crashing down on him. But, with the help of bystanders, he got out from under the vehicle, which remained suspended.

Although he told the people there at the dump he thought he was "OK," he learned later that was not the case. Both sides of his torso now have pain so bad, he said he feels like he's "lost his center core." He also sustained serious lacerations and scrapings to his extremities. Fortunately, he said, he's feeling a bit better each day.


He notes that, in a strange way, it was lucky that the car shot back into the dumpster so fast. "If it had been going slower, it might have just shoved the dumpster back instead of knocking it over," he said. Then the rear of the car would have dropped off the edge of the pavement, the front end of the car would have tipped up and then come crashing down on top of him. But with the dumpster knocked on its back, the edge of the dumpster's sturdy bottom held his vehicle up, enabling him to escape a very serious injury or worse.

Browning feels the lesson to be learned is: We must beware of distractions in our busy world. When one does happen, after it's over and you go back to what you were doing, take close stock of exactly what you were doing and where you were in the process when the distraction happened. In his case, he assumed he had already put his car in park and set the brake, but he hadn't. That assumption could have cost him his life.

Of course, similar advice holds true regarding many more commonly encountered distractions: You're driving, and your cell phone rings or tells you it just received a text message. Instead of fumbling to answer the call or scan the message while you're driving, adopt a personal rule that you won't even look at your phone until you've found a place to safely turn out and stop.

That simple practice could save lives, whether we're the driver getting the call or we're approaching a driver who is.

Poverty ...

I've got a really strange idea and here is how it happened. I read a news report about Ben Carson, our secretary of Housing and Urban Development, in which he was quoted as saying that poverty is a state of mind. I took that to mean that poor people are to blame for their own poverty. It was no surprise then, when I received my weekly email from TED that one of their talks caught my eye with the title: "Poverty isn't a lack of character; it's a lack of cash." I encourage you to spend 18 minutes watching it.

Ideas sometimes have the ability to turn our worlds upside down. One of my favorite stories is about Ignaz Semmelweis, a physician in Vienna, who just happened to notice that there was quite a difference in the incidence of childbed fever, an infection that develops after delivery, between two different obstetrical wards in a hospital. Patients cared for by midwives and even those delivering outside the hospital had a much lower infection and death rate than those attended by the doctors.

Semmelweis caught the germ of an idea, even though this occurred in the days before anyone knew what germs really were. Doctors spent a lot of time dissecting cadavers, discovering new and important things about arteries, organs and so forth, but when summoned to evaluate a woman in labor, wiped their hands on their aprons and examined the unfortunate soul. Many of these women developed childbed fever and many of those died.

The poor pregnant women of Budapest even realized what was happening, if not why, and tried very hard not to be admitted to the doctors' ward. Ignaz thought he would try something so he had the doctors wash their hands between the morgue and the labor room. Lo and behold, the death rate plummeted.

Leading physicians of Vienna apparently refused to believe such nonsense, because they, as the superior gentlemen they were, could not possibly be responsible for causing disease! It was, they believed, due to poverty and the general unseemliness of the obstetrical patients; in other words, they were losers.

It would take many years for Semmelweis' ideas to be accepted, though he didn't help his cause by labeling those who rejected them murderers and, in general, being a little crazy. Ironically, he died in a mental hospital of an infection after being beaten, never to know the impact he would eventually have.

So, what if we now have ideas that are as wrong as the doctors in Vienna, counteracted by others such as what Semmelweis proposed? Could such a modern, new idea be guaranteed basic income, as promoted by Rutger Bregman in his TED talk? Could it be that scarcity causes changing in our thinking? That poverty causes poor decisions rather than poor decisions causing poverty? Maybe you need to give a man a bunch of fish before he can even think about learning to fish.

I've never lived in a place where so many people are happy to live, where we feel so lucky just to be here. Could we share that feeling making our little town a site to research the effects of universal basic income on its poor citizens? It would take education, grants and lots of outside help. Would anyone else like to support me in trying?





A couple months ago, the Snow Group conducted a straw poll among about a third of Idyllwild businesses regarding the effects of snow-play visitors. Almost 90 percent of those we spoke with said their experiences were negative, that this particular kind of tourist creates challenges while contributing little or nothing to the local economy. The Snow Group wondered if our merchants might have arrived at any solutions to snow-play visitor issues, or if we might have any solutions to offer them. We scheduled a meeting at the library on May 23 and invited about 60 businesses to attend.

Only eight people showed up, representing five businesses. A snack shop had increased sales, but due to food sales was prohibited from allowing use of their restroom and so sent people to The Fort's. Any trash outside their shop was picked up by an employee.

A lodge reported increased bookings and increased trespassers in search of sledding slopes. A plant nursery's location reduced problems, and so they only encountered snow visitor requests for restrooms, water and tools.

An inn had increased bookings along with illegal parking and traffic congestion issues. A realtor welcomed tourists to parking and restrooms, and received polite behavior and thank yous, an attitude in contrast to that of several other realtors who had spoken of the negative impact of the snow-play surge.

Can the Snow Group reduce the stress caused by snow-play visitors on our merchants? Based on the low turnout, we conclude there is currently not enough support for further action on our part. Although the Transient Occupancy Tax was mentioned by a business owner and discussed among the attendees, the Snow Group does not plan to further investigate those funds.

We realize also that the type of distress experienced by residents and by businesses differs. Snow-play visitors in residential areas trespass in private yards, park illegally, occasionally damage property or threaten residents, and hinder emergency response. These are law-breaking issues that can be addressed.

On the other hand, the problems experienced by merchants, with the exception of shoplifting, tend to be annoyances — the demand for restrooms, littering, traffic congestion and so on — rather than law-enforcement matters. Perhaps the immediate answer for local merchants lies in the comment of the realtor who attended our meeting, "Idyllwilders adapt."

File for tax refunds by Aug. 1

Owners of residential or business property in Riverside County have until Aug. 1 to file for unclaimed property tax refunds.

Board of Supervisors Chairman John F. Tavaglione and Treasurer-Tax Collector Don Kent issued the reminder to give taxpayers sufficient time to file for refunds and not be caught short by the deadline. Filing instructions and a list of all unclaimed property tax refunds from tax year 2012 and prior are available on the Treasurer-Tax Collector’s website at www.countytreasurer.org/TaxCollector/UnclaimedMoney/PropertyTaxUnclaimedRefund.aspx.

Kent said 575 refunds totaling \$586,728.78 remain unclaimed. Most refunds stem from valuation reductions by the assessor and are related to corrections or cancellations to the tax roll after taxes already had been paid. Under California law, property tax refunds unclaimed for four years after the payment date — or one year after a requested claim form has been mailed back to a taxpayer by the county, whichever is later — may be transferred to the county general fund by order of the supervisors. After Aug. 1, any unclaimed money shifts to the general fund and no longer can be claimed.

Public Records Act may get teeth

(This story is from a California News Publishers Association release.)

On Tuesday, May 30, the California Assembly overwhelmingly approved a measure that would impose fines on agencies that knowingly violate the California Public Records Act.

AB 1479 by Assemblyman Rob Bonta (D-Alameda) would give courts the power to charge a government agency up to \$5,000 for delaying or obstructing access to information. The bill also establishes a custodian of records to allow requesters to informally appeal to a designated agency employee if a request is denied.

The measure was voted off the Assembly floor with a 71-1 vote, with Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin (R-Thousand Oaks) voting no. Several other members stayed off the bill. Many of these assemblymembers received opposition letters from their local counties and cities.

Editorial support for AB 1479 highlights the frustration of journalists and members of the public who regularly face roadblocks to access, despite clear law that presumes disclosure of information. But with AB 1479's proposed enforcement mechanism, reporter and public complaints can be rectified.

By allowing a judge to determine that an agency acted wrongly, and to punish it for doing so, AB 1479 encourages compliance with the act. Moreover, assessed fines would signal to the public that an agency had fallen down on its duty to comply with the CPRA. All this goes toward promoting a culture of transparency, where agency employees and lawyers embrace the presumption of openness that the people and the Legislature have repeatedly said is to be the status quo.

AB 1479 will likely be heard in the Senate Judiciary Committee this month before the Legislature recesses for summer break.

Wildfire season to be challenging, say secretaries

U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue and Interior Secretary Ryan K. Zinke joined forces in Boise, Idaho, last Friday at the National Incident Fire Command Center for a tour and briefing on the upcoming wildfire season.

Following the events, the secretaries sent a memorandum to wildland fire leadership highlighting the importance of inter-departmental collaboration in protecting communities and managing public lands. In the memorandum, Perdue and Zinke stressed the need for working together as they anticipate the 2017 wildfire season to be "another challenging year" saying:

"The Departments of the Interior and Agriculture will improve the way that both Agencies manage wildfires by ensuring that all of our firefighting assets are utilized in the most efficient way possible. It is critical that firefighters have the right tools, resources, and flexibility to allow them to do their jobs safely and effectively. We look forward to working with leaders in both Agencies along with our state and local partners to explore opportunities to improve our operational efficiency and take advantage of the firefighting infrastructure and assets that are currently in place. We will also continue to integrate science and technology into all of our firefighting and to capitalize on other advancements to better inform and support our firefighting capabilities.

"Our success will be defined by how well we meet our obligations and how efficiently we use our resources and the management tools available to us. By keeping our employees and the public safe from harm or loss, by effectively suppressing unwanted fire, and by doing everything we can to improve the health of our landscapes, we will be successful."

Idyllwild Soroptimists host comedy night at Brewpub

This night it's all for laughs, although the annual Soroptimist International of Idyllwild fundraiser raises money to combat a dangerously pervasive and serious social problem — human trafficking. For more than 40 years, Soroptimist International of Idyllwild has passionately raised funds and advocated for women and girls.

This year's fundraiser — Hilltop Comedy Night — showcases headliner talent in a headliner venue, the Idyllwild Brewpub. On Tuesday, June 20, normally an off night for Idyllwild's newest "go-to" gathering place, the Brewpub will be open to ticketed patrons beginning at 5 p.m. for a 6 p.m. show. The event replaces the annual fundraiser Celebration of Women in the Arts.

All funds raised from the \$20 entry tickets will be used to fight human trafficking. Ticket proceeds will be donated to Million Kids (www.millionkids.org), a nonprofit that works with local law enforcement and concerned citizens, businesses and other organizations to end human trafficking domestically. Million Kids President Opal Singleton serves on the Riverside County Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force.

Proceeds also will be donated to THORN (wearethorn.org), a nonprofit co-founded by Ashton Kutcher and Demi Moore to digitally comb the dark web to stop sexual exploitation of children. THORN partners with the tech industry, government agencies and non-government organizations to protect vulnerable children around the world.

Soroptimists have planned a Hilltop Comedy Night to remember — classic comedy and music emceed by the inestimable and indescribable Conor O'Farrell and Frank Ferro.

Los Angeles standup comedian Sarah Tiana heads the comedic bill. Originally from Calhoun, Georgia, Tiana's act emphasizes the thrills and challenges of growing up in the American South after "The War of Northern Aggression" and of trying to survive the current war between the sexes. Tiana stresses that she does not classify

herself as single. She says she is too old for that. She said she prefers the designation "sexually active."

Tiana is a standup regular on "Comedy Central" and "Chelsea Lately." She also is a regular writer on the "Josh Wolf Show" on CMT (Country Music Television). She has hosted the "Country Music Awards" red carpet, and has actively supported America's military men and women in 12 comedy tours for the troops — in Germany, Singapore, Afghanistan, Guam, Iraq and Okinawa.

In 2005, Tiana helped create a sketch comedy troupe, "The Strait Jacket Society," as a way to help young actors in Hollywood gain stage time and audience exposure while still having fun. More than 500 actors have completed the program since its founding.

Idyllwild Actors Theatre's dazzling dynamic (and very funny) duo Michèle Marsh and Jacob Teel round out the standup comedy section.

A surprise local trio "Cher and the Sonnies" sends up the music and comedy of '70s icons Sonny and Cher. Word on the street is that Cher will not disappoint as the knockout fashionista she continues to be.

Jazz chanteuse Sherry Williams injects her brand of warm, "buttery" vocals and sophisticated elegance into an otherwise raucous evening. Williams, much loved by Idyllwild audiences, is known for caressing a lyric to bring out the emotional content of the song. Songwriter Jack Segal ("Scarlet Ribbons," "When Sunny Gets Blue," and "When Joanna Loved Me") said of Williams, "She is the incomparable present-day combination of Lady Day [Billie Holiday], Sarah [Vaughan] and Ella [Fitzgerald]."

Idyllwild becomes a vibrant outdoor art studio

Art Alliance presents Plein Air 2017

For one weekend annually, painters create art outdoors in four designated gardens and in other locations throughout Idyllwild, taking advantage of the bold blue skies and vibrant light the mountain location provides.

Beginning at 8 a.m. on Saturday, June 10, 25 painters will paint in plein air, (French for "open air"), transforming Idyllwild into an open-air art studio.

Painters will paint outdoor scenes in their medium of choice — oils, pastels, or watercolors — competing in the Art Alliance of Idyllwild's Plein Air 2017 Festival.

Painters must finish by 2 p.m., providing an ample six hour window for residents and visitors to stroll through the village to watch participating artists at work. Additional artists will be creating art at galleries and Art Hot Spots throughout the downtown core from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

The plein air movement began in the mid to late 19th century by French impressionists who sought to capture on canvas the dazzling nuances of natural outdoor light.

The plein air movement grew in popularity with the introduction of paint in tubes, which eliminated the need for artists to grind and mix dry pigment powders with linseed oil to create paint.

Plein Air 2017 kicks off at 7 p.m. on Friday, June 9 at the Grand Idyllwild Lodge with a live painting demonstration by celebrated guest artist Rich Stergulz.

Based in Murrieta, Stergulz teaches plein air painting and paints on commission. His work is found in prestigious private collections and is widely exhibited in galleries throughout Southern California.

Brad and Jacki Rechtfertig, Grand Idyllwild Lodge owners, host the live painting event. Only 50 seats are available. Check in begins at 6:30 and Stergulz's demonstration begins at 7. Parking at the Lodge parking lot is reserved for Lodge guests, with some spaces available for handicap parking. Attendees are asked to park along North Circle or Pinecrest and walk up to the Lodge.

Although free, seating is limited and online registration is required to reserve seats for Stergulz's demonstration. During this hour long tutorial, Stergulz will share tips and techniques about the craft of plein air painting.

On Saturday, after competing painters finish at 2 p.m., judges will review the work of contestants and determine winners. From 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. competition winners will be announced at an artist reception at Middle Ridge Winery Tasting Gallery on North Circle Dr. The upstairs gallery will feature finished artwork of each participating artist and all art will be for sale.

On Sunday, from noon to 4 p.m., Middle Ridge will continue to display contest art. For more information about Plein Air 2017 visit www.artinidyllwild.org.

Lemon Lily Festival one week earlier

In hopes of having blooming Lemon Lilies on display during this year's festival, organizers moved it a week earlier than it has traditionally been held. It will be held Saturday and Sunday, June 24 and 25, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

This local beleaguered flower, poached to near extinction in the early 20th century, once was so ubiquitous and healthy that the plants were thought to number more than 30,000. When they bloomed, the lilies' perfume would waft throughout the entire valley. Plants could grow to 6 feet high with multiple large, fragrant, yellow flowers.

The Lemon Lily Festival, inaugurated in 2010 by Dave Stith, Doug Yagaloff, Shelley Kibbey and a host of committee members, had as its mantra "Education, celebration and restoration of the Lemon Lily."

The Friends of the Idyllwild Nature Center nonprofit has taken the lead in both hosting the festival and in Lemon Lily propagation efforts. Lemon Lilies are now celebrated every summer in a continuing effort to familiarize residents and visitors with the flower's Hill history and propagation efforts to restore it to its former glory.

The festival entertains children and adults with ac-

tivities that were common during the flower's heyday in the late 19th and early 20th century: Pioneer Town featuring gold panning with the Hemet Rock and Gem Club; leather working with Tandy Leather; a flint-knapping demo and more "old time" activities; Nikki's Painted Ponies and Alpacas; a children's story book walk featuring "The Lemon Lily Fairy" by local author Sherri Domenigoni; talks by initial festival organizer Stith entitled "Insights on the Restoration of the Lemon Lily" and "New Species for the Flora of the San Jacinto Mountains"; and a talk by Master Gardener Linda Powell.

On both Saturday and Sunday, musical entertainment features The Stone Creek Jumpers and Three for Joy. Snacks also are available on both festival days.

Check the festival website for times of specific events and performance schedules at (<http://lemonlilyfestival.com/2017-entertainment-schedule/>).

There is free shuttle service on both days from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. from the Town Monument to the Nature Center.

Several local artists have donated pieces of art to be used in a raffle to help defray both the costs of producing the festival and continuing propagation and restoration efforts. Raffle tickets are available at the Nature Center every day during June business hours preceding the event.



Pianist, composer and teacher is a phoenix rising

Second-place winner in 2017 McCallum Theater's Open Call competition

Some think artists are self-indulgent egotists glorying in their creative pursuits. The reality is often far more complex and demanding.

Michael Staff, local pianist, composer and teacher, was on the road to a major concert-performance career. He was preparing, at age 21, to enter the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, one of the most prestigious in the world, when he suffered a nervous breakdown. His story — of fighting back to continue doing what he loved — is instructive, and is an inspiration to anyone who overcomes daunting setbacks to pursue their dreams.

Michael had and still has two career loves: math and music. "I started piano late," said Michael, "at 13." But he quickly progressed technically, and artistically recognizing how perfectly tuned and interwoven were his loves of math and music. Even as he resumes performances as a concert pianist, Michael is currently enrolled in a bachelor's program in math at Western Governors University.

He recently won second place in the McCallum Theater's 2017 Open Call competition at the College of the Desert campus in Palm Desert. It's an important milestone and marks Michael's reentry into a concert-performance career that derailed 12 years ago as he was preparing for the Van Cliburn competition. "I was studying with Dr. Tao Chang (Azusa Pacific University) and working on Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1, in B flat minor and Schumann's Piano Concerto in A minor when I had the breakdown, precipitated by the pressure of preparation and some neurological issues," he recounted.

He said he was no longer in a position to continue with a concert career, either emotionally or physically.

Over time, at Erin's urging, he resumed performing. "She saw how important music was to me and she saw performance potential that I did not see," said Michael.

Even though he is a nine-year resident of Idyllwild, Michael has kept a decidedly low profile — until recently. "I played at Mile High Café for about a year, starting in 2014, then began to play at other events at the urging of friends," he said. His performance at the McCallum was his reentry onto a main stage, playing the "Hitchcock Variations on Gounod's 'Marche Funèbre D'Une Marionnette.'" The video of the 18 finalists' performances, published on DVD by Open Call, has the audience cheering when Michael finished. Performances took place Thursday, April 13, through Saturday April 15, to standing-room-only audiences.

He stopped playing and stepped away from music — at first to heal and then gradually, to regroup and find a way forward. "I started washing windows, mostly in the desert area, to earn money," he said. "That's what I did for over five years."

When he was 23, Michael became engaged to his now wife Erin. They just celebrated their 10-year anniversary. And with her support and encouragement, he began, slowly, to consider returning to music as his profession. "I remember coming home day after day, trying to play through the Chopin ballades [Ballades 1 through 4] and some other favorites but my fingers were not responding because of the constant repetitive movement from window cleaning," he remembered. "The frustration led to a depression that lasted several weeks. Eventually, I realized that it wasn't worth it [to work at window cleaning] and that living is more than just surviving. So my wife helped me to gradually get enough piano students to quit any labor jobs which would deteriorate my [piano] abilities."

Michael is a Renaissance man — an intellectual, an artist, a teacher, an author and a performer. In November 2015, he was nominated to create a lesson for TED Ed: "Lessons Worth Sharing" on the subject of math in music theory. The finished piece, "Group Theory 101: How to Play a Rubik's Cube Like a Piano" is available online and is an intriguing linking of math and music (<http://ed.ted.com/lessons/group-theory-101-how-to-play-a-rubik-s-cube-like-a-piano-michael-staff>). "The TED team said it was one of the hardest projects they'd done," said Michael.

Michael also has his own youtube page, www.youtube.com/user/faustwaltzer, with videos ranging from lessons in music theory, mathematics in music, to recordings of some of his work as a composer/pianist.

He is writing a book, "Intersection, the Intersection of Math and Music," which he plans to complete within the next couple years. He also is recording, in Hollywood, a CD of his own compositions, which he expects to complete in September.

Asked where, in his career, he would like to be in five years, Michael said, "I'd like to have my book completed, my album finished, be performing in concerts, introducing my own music and playing the music of others, be self-managed and promoting my own career."

"I think classical music is a dying genre and I'd like to be involved in making it more accessible and interesting to a wider audience. I think currently the way it is packaged is too dry, too esoteric and often too long, given shortening attention spans."

"I think there is a formula to create a balanced concert program — to have a theme, such as color; a subject such as oppression; and to balance compositions that are new with those that are more familiar to the wider audience. The human brain has the two sides, intellect and emotion. One needs to appeal to both, but overall, emotion prevails."

"Moments in life and in history also make music more powerful. A lot of my influence comes from outside of music — literature, history, political satire and mathematics. I've been very fortunate to be able to pursue what I love, especially when it's working."

It is working for Michael Staff and he has battled hard to put his career back on track — a phoenix rising and revitalized.


