

Pine Cove water stolen for illegal marijuana grow

Theft is the reason the water loss has grown so large at Pine Cove Water District. After investing hundreds of staff hours and months of searching for pipeline leaks, General Manager Jerry Holldber reported that he and staff finally discovered that someone had tapped into a water hydrant.

With the help of the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, they determined that the water was being pilfered to nourish an illegal marijuana grove deep in the forest near Pine Cove. According to board President Robert Hewitt, the investigation is still underway.

Holldber estimated that, at minimum, 2.3 million gallons of water has been stolen from the district. The value of this water is more than \$17,000. In Holldber's opinion, it is likely the water theft began during the summer months of 2016.

Besides the cost of the stolen water, Holldber estimated that other costs, such as staff time searching for leaks and detection equipment, have cost another \$42,000.

area regularly. "What can be done to get less crime?" asked one of the organizers, who wished to remain anonymous. "We can't depend on the sheriff and we can't help it there's not enough money. So, why don't we get a secu-

rity guard?" The idea of a regular security firm patrolling town was mentioned at the latest MCP meeting,

One of the organizers stressed that the firm is licensed and insured, with well-trained staff.

Sheriff's Department members attending did not oppose the idea, according to two of the attendees. They believe that Sheriff's Department has blessed the idea.

However, Hemet Station Capt. Leonard Purvis said he could not endorse the action, but "appreciate the extra help. I really like Idyllwild and care for the community," he

said. Purvis also repeated that MCP members are vetted by the Sherfirms don't vet their staff well.

The patrols may start this week. And the organizers will visit with local business people to see if they are willing to share the costs, said another organizer who wished to remain anonymous. "It's for everybody's safety."

Fire agencies wrapping up busy summer season

Discuss other forest threats

U.S. Forest Service participation at the Sept. 13, Mountain Area Safety Taskforce was nonexistent. Forest Service members, who normally attend the local session, were all on fire assignments outside the district and many outside the state, reported Cal Fire Forestry Division Chief Gregg Bratcher,

chaired the meeting.

But those in attendance discussed threats to the local forest and abatement support.

Besides the bark beetle and Goldspotted oak borer, Bratcher said another pest has seriously infested almost all tree species except for palms and cacti in the valleys. The polyphagous shot hole borer is a new pest in Southern California, he announced. While attacking trees, it brings a pathogenic fungus that kills the trees.

In regular season, points are awarded at each tournament as follows: first place, 6 points; second place, 4 points; third place, 3 points; fourth place, 2 points; fifth place, 1 point. Also, one-half point is awarded to everyone who participates.

A member has to compete in at least five regular-season tournaments to qualify for the playoffs.

The club is a member of the Southern California Golf Association and is sanctioned to establish SCGA handi-

Steele closes his best PGA season yet



Brendan Steele posted a 6-under-par 68-66-72-72 -- 278 last week in the BMW Championship, the third of the four PGA Tour post-season playoff tournaments. The Idyllwild native finished 33rd on the FedExCup points list, missing entry to this week's Tour Championship by only three positions.

Measured by multiple parameters, this 2017 season has been the best of Brendan's seven PGA Tour seasons by far. He posted a win, three ties for sixth, and nine top-20 finishes, while making the cut in 20 of 25 tournaments played, including 13 cuts made in a row. His 33rd finish in the FedExCup points list was 17 positions higher than his previous best of 50th in 2015. He finished his 2017 PGA Tour season ranked 60th in the Official World Golf Ranking, and he earned more than \$2.9 million in official prize money. All these are personal bests for Brendan at the finish of any of his PGA Tour seasons

It is anticipated that in only two weeks, Brendan will open his 2018 PGA Tour season by defending his current championship at the Safeway Open in Napa.

Weather Service meteorologist to speak at MDP meeting

Alex Tardy to discuss weather forecasting

Alex Tardy, meteorologist with the National Weather Service's San Diego office, returns to Idyllwild this

As part of National Preparedness Month, the Hill's Mountain Disaster Preparedness group has invited Tardy to discuss recent NWS winter forecasts and expectations for this winter.

'We've had a dry El Niño and a wet La Niña. I thought it would be helpful to learn what happened to those forecasts," said Mike Feyder, MDP president. "He'll discuss the reasons and causes [of the difference] and weather predictions about what will happen this winter."

In September 2015, Tardy came to Idyllwild to discuss the multiple El Niño forecast warnings. More than 150 people filled the Idyllwild Library to hear him.

Attendees did not leave disappointed. The Town

Crier gave his talk positive reviews: "Tardy, who spoke without notes, ... Fluent, engaging and frequently enter-

At the time, Tardy did share forecasters' concerns that extreme weather is a difficult prediction and, "There is a little unknown about what is developing."

But based on the science and forecasts, he did tell the full room of locals, "We're going to be seeing a lot of precipitation in Southern California, even while the drought persists."

In his proclamation of September as National Preparedness Month, Gov Jerry Brown said, "Given the hazardous world we inhabit, the net emergency is always just around the corner, and preparedness can mean the difference between inconvenience and trage-

Feyder not only endorses this concern for preparation, but directly referred to damage — human and property — hurricanes Harvey and Irma have recently caused in Texas and Florida.

The presentation begins at 6 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 28, at Town Hall.

Bird stamp art contest

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife is holding an art contest to select the design for the state's 2017-18 upland game bird stamp.

The California Upland Game Bird Stamp Art Contest is open to all U.S. residents ages 18 and up. Entries will be accepted from Monday, Oct. 30, to Wednesday, Nov. 15.

This year's stamp features the Wilson's snipe (Gallinago delicate), a charismatic, diminutive migratory game bird. The Wilson's snipe relies on its long, straight beak to forage for invertebrates in muddy wetlands from the coast to the high Sierra Nevada.

Entries must include at least one Wilson's snipe, preferably in a setting representative of its natural habitat in California. Entries will be judged on originality, artistic composition, anatomical accuracy and suitability for reproduction as a stamp and a

Grinding facility open Mondays

The Idyllwild grinding facility resumed Monday operations effective May 1. The facility is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from May 1 through Nov. 29, 2017. (It is closed from noon to 1 p.m. for lunch.)

The facility will then close again on Mondays during the winter months (December

through April) due to low tonnage volumes and customer participation. The grinding facility accepts wood waste affected by the bark beetle. Prohibited waste includes household waste, appliances, e-waste, metals, tires and other hazardous, explosive and medical wastes. Customers who use the facility pay a per-ton rate on pre-paid accounts.





A good time to talk science...

"The first principle is that you must not fool yourself and you are the easiest person to fool."

-Richard P. Feynman

The recent severe storms once again brought the question of climate change to the fore. Climate is not the same as weather so it is not possible to blame a particular storm on man-made changes in our atmosphere, but climate scientists know that such changes are real.

Denying this fact is, I believe, akin to our ancient relatives who clung to the belief that the Earth was at the center of the universe and the Sun revolved around it. Science, however, doesn't deal with superstition or beliefs; it deals with facts about the natural world.

Science is a method of inquiry, nothing more, nothing less. It is not magic, though, according to the late science fiction author Arthur C. Clarke. Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic. That leaves many of us relying on rocket scientists, climate scientists, physicians and other experts to interpret the science for us lest we succumb to the magic.

So, how does science work? It starts with a question about nature. What is that? Why is it doing that? Then an idea (hypothesis) is proposed. For example, the Earth orbits the Sun. Then an experiment is designed to prove the idea. Data is collected and the results analyzed. The theory is proven or disproven, always provisionally, susceptible to more analysis or data.

Then comes the useful part; the future can be predicted. We know the Earth orbits the Sun and, building on that, we learn when the Sun will rise and set, when eclipses will occur.

Although the basic premise is simple, it remains true that any of us can easily be fooled. Therefore, science is rigorous. Statistical analysis must be exact. As a result, scientific papers get retracted, opinions get changed, theories get tweaked.

That is one of the most wonderful thing about science; it is always open to questions but you need to know what you are talking about to question settled science, that is, those questions for which there is a scientific consensus, on which the majority of experts agree. Remember that scientists — individuals susceptible to being fooled just as any of us — as a group do not have an agenda, do not start with beliefs, but base conclusions on data that is observed and analyzed.

With this as a background, I cut to the chase. Global warming is real, it is man-made, and it is a serious risk to mankind.

Evolution is a fact. Vaccines work and do not cause autism. These are not controversial, they are settled science, proven with overwhelming amounts of data. They allow us to predict the future, to plan for it, perhaps to change it.

Admittedly, some facts are inconvenient. No one who has made a fortune off of cigarettes wants to believe that See Dr. Tom, next page

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



Stonewood Canyon seeks mutual aid

The Fern Valley Water District both rejected an entreaty for help and was rejected in the same meeting. But the dominant topic at the board's Sept. 15 meeting was the discussion of unfunded liability for post-employee retirement benefits, other than pensions.

Almost-Director Jim Wise has apparently had second thoughts about accepting his election to the FVWD board. In January, former Director Charles Wix resigned. He had been re-elected in 2013, so his term would have ended on Friday, Dec. 1.

In May, directors Jim Rees and Robert Krieger announced their intention to seek re-election to their seats and Wise entered the race for the third seat.

Since no other candidates filed for the primary, a formal election was not necessary to fill the three seats. At its July 25 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors appointed the three candidates, including Wise, to the three seats with the terms beginning Dec. 1

The Fern Valley directors approached Wise about appointing him prior to December to fill the remaining months of Wix's term.

In a letter to the board, Wise wrote, "After further thought, I am declining that honor and wish not to be considered for an appointment [to] the board."

Director Richard Schnetzer commented that this

preted to mean only that Wise would not accept an appointment before his term begins in December rather than resigning even the appointment from the supervi-

His colleagues, Vice President Trischa Clark and Robert Krieger, agreed. President Rees was absent. Consequently, the board will send a letter to Wise requesting clarification of his intention to assume his elected seat in December. If he declines, FVWD will continue to have one vacant seat on its board.

While Wise was walking away from FVWD, Angela Colson, general manager of Stonewood Canyon Estates, in a letter to the FVWD board, requested the district to consider "... providing us with emergency help with our water system should we need it ..." Stonewood Canyon Estates is north of Pine Cove.

Colson clarified that the FVWD help would only be necessary until their engineer arrived or if the circumstances were too difficult for him alone to handle.

While General Manager Victor Jimenez said he had discussed the request with Colson and emphasized that FVWD would not be able to transport equipment that far, Schnetzer wanted to be sure FVWD would be reimbursed for costs and also thought "emergency" should

However, Krieger was concerned about the extent of help. For example, would FVWD be asked to operate the system? He was concerned about FVWD getting involved with a private water system, particularly one closer to the Pine Cove Water District, and one, which, in his opinion, has had water problems in the past.

The directors decided to postpone an actual decision until Rees is present.

Most of the meeting was devoted to listening to a presentation from Joseph D'Onorfrio of Bartel Associates of San Mateo. The firm performed an actuarial analysis of the district's long-term unfunded liabilities for non-pension costs of retirees.

At the end of fiscal year 2016-17, Bartel estimated that FVWD's unfunded costs were about \$545,000.

After this presentation, the board referred the issue to its Rates and Revenue Committee to see if it would affect the rate structure.

Krieger said the committee would still like to hold a public hearing about changing the rates in December. The board tentatively decided to hold a workshop on the possible new rates for 9 a.m. Friday, Oct. 13.

In water business, Jimenez reported that consumption for the July and August billing period was 8.2 million gallons, which was only 67,000 gallons more than

For the first eight months of 2017, total FVWD consumption has been 24.4 million gallons, which is 9 percent or 2 million gallons more than in 2016.

For this billing period, Jimenez said the unaccounted-for water was about 16.6 percent of the total production, about twice the loss for July and August 2016.

Flow in Strawberry Creek has not ceased for the summer, Jimenez reported. "[It] is still producing for us. Well production fell, which is good." The district's need for well water fell from 43 percent of production a year ago to 8 percent in August 2017, according to Jimenez.

Steps to take after Equifax breach

Equifax, one of three major credit reporting agencies, had a substantial and critical cyber security breach this summer.

Security information, such as names, birth dates, Social Security numbers, addresses and possible driver's license numbers for more than 140 million U.S. consumers was stolen.

While this breach occurred over a period of months, Equifax did not reveal it until earlier this month.

California Attorney General Xavier Becerra recommends finding out if one's information has been compromised. To find out if the Equifax data breach affects you, please visit www.equifaxsecurity2017.com/potential-impact/. If using Wi-Fi, ensure a secure Wi-Fi connection before submitting personal information.

If you confirm you have been a victim, to protect yourself, Becerra recommends taking the following actions:

1. Put a fraud alert on your credit file.

A fraud alert helps protect you against the possibility of someone opening new credit accounts in your name. A fraud alert lasts 90 days and can be renewed.

To post a fraud alert on your credit file, you must contact one of the three major credit reporting agencies below. If you contact any one of the three major credit reporting agencies, fraud alerts will be automatically added by the other two agencies as well.

- Experian, 1-888-397-3742, experian.com/fraud/cen-
- TransUnion, 1-800-680-7289, transunion.com/fraud
- Equifax, 1-888-766-0008, alerts.equifax.com

2. Review your credit reports. Look through each one carefully.

Check your credit reports from Experian, TransUnion, and Equifax — for free — by visiting annualcreditreport.com. Accounts or activity that you don't recognize could indicate identity theft, especially accounts opened recently.

3. If you find items you don't understand on your report, call the credit bureau at the number on the report.

Credit bureau staff will review your report with you. If the information can't be explained, then you will need to call the creditors involved and report the crime to your local police or sheriff's office.

If you think that you have been a victim of identity theft, more information on next steps is available on our Identity Theft Victim. Checklist: www.oag.ca.gov/ idtheft/information-sheets.

4. Consider placing a "freeze" on your credit file.

A security freeze prevents your information from being shared with potential creditors and is the strongest form of protection. A freeze costs a one-time fee of \$10 (but may cost more to lift or renew). You need to request a security freeze from each of the three reporting agencies. Equifax has waived the \$10 fee, but the other two companies, TransUnion and Experian, have not. Pine Cove Water pursuing capital purchases — pipe and tractor

The major portion of the Sept. 13, Pine Cove Water District's board meeting was General Manager Jerry Holldber's report on the water theft. (See page A1.)

In financial business, the board noted and Holconfirmed the cash balance had increased in August.

With these financial resources, Holldber recommended that the board consider using more funds to purchase another 3,200 feet of pipe. This is about

Holldber alsopressed his gratitude to Fern Valley Water District for its help last month during the repair of a leak on Highway 243.

checked lines and hydrants. Half of our staff time was trying to find the leaks. It was a lot of time wasted."

The water theft was discovered in July when a customer "... notified the district that a fire hydrant out on Pine Cove. the dirt road had a wet spot," Holldber reported. Staff checked the hydrant and found it had been turned so it was shut off.

The next day, the district received another call about the same hydrant leaking. Further investigation discovered that it had been turned back on overnight.

"It was obvious that someone was messing with the district's hydrant," Holldber said. "Because of the amount of water flowing, we knew someone was stealing

our water."

The next day he reported the theft and situation to the Sheriff's Department.


This water theft poses another problem for the dis-

trict. PCWD has several water hydrants on the periphery of the district. These are available to the U.S. Forest Service and Cal Fire in case of fires in the forest near

Locking them would be a hindrance for the fire de partments in case of an emergency. Holldber is investigating options for protecting the hydrants while ensuring access in case of fire emergencies.

Fortunately, the wet winter meant the water theft did not create an emergency for PCWD customers, Holldber noted. "Last year, 20 or 30 or 40 gallons per minute [of use] would have affected our well levels."

Once funded and started, Harris envisions three groups of six vets at a time working and recovering at Living Free. The transition training will complement the training given to every recruit.

Many veterans are reluctant to engage in traditional 'talk therapies' for a variety of reasons," Harris opined. "It simply goes against the warfighter grain. Stepping into a ring with a wild horse is an entirely different experience, and a challenge well suited to for veterans."

War Horse Creek will be the next phase of sanctuary at Living Free, Harris promises.

Library offers an exotic musical journey

Music educator and opera buff Diane Mitchell's six-week musical journey will be an international smorgasbord.

As previously reported in the Crier, this free course will examine the exotic influences on non-Western music and how they have permeated and profoundly changed Western music, from classical to jazz and everything in between. As Mitchell notes, "Where armies and explorers go, musicians and other artists also go, and those who come home often bring wondrous stories and songs with them.

Here's a peek at Mitchell's syllabus.

Week one is called "Mediterranean Coexistence." Mitchell writes, "During the Middle Ages, the boundaries between east and west were blurred as Mediterranean Christians, Muslims and Jews lived in relative harmony and their music reflects Mitchell promises to explore the music of Sephardic Jews, Arab-Andalu-

sian dances, Gregorian chant and Spanish court songs of the period.

Week two is called "From the Alhambra." Historically, the northern African Moors had conquered and held most of southern Spain for about 700 years until the late 1400s. Arab music and poetry had a profound influence on the dance and music of Spain. Go to a flamenco show in Spain and you hear the Moorish bases of the songs and the way the singers articulate them. So much of what we consider Spanish music was originally Moorish, especially flamenco. This also can be heard in the music of classical composers like Albéniz, De Falla, Granados and Rodrigo.

Week three is called "Invasions from the East" and will survey the period in the 17th and 18th centuries when Ottoman conquerors got to the gates of Vienna before being stopped. Cultural influences, especially in music, seeped into Western music. Classical composers from Rameau to Beethoven were intrigued by exotic Turkish Janissaries and the gypsy music of Hungary and Po-

Week four is "On the Steppes of Central Asia," and traces the influence of the many cultures composing the Russian Empire of the 19th century — the results are heard in famous Russian composers' music such as Rimsky-Korsakov's "Scheherazade," Borodin's "Prince Igor" and Tchaikovsky's "Nutcracker."

Week five, "Pagodas in Paris," traces how, with the opening of Japan to the West in the 1800s, all things Japanese and Chinese became the rage in Europe. Notes Mitchell, "At the Paris Exhibition of 1889, European composers such as Ravel and Debussy heard Indonesian gamelan and Japanese kotos for the first time, opening their ears to new harmonic and melodic sounds. "

Finally, in week six, Mitchell concludes her musical journey in the Americas, examining how the flood of immigrants in the 1800s, with their own musical traditions, began to create a new "American" sound. That sound showed up in odd rhythms from Turkey in Dave Brubeck's "Take Five." In the second half of the 20th century, classical composers like Phillip Glass were inspired by Asian philosophies and sounds that transformed their musical language and our musical lexicon.

Handouts from Mitchell will include lists of examples used in class and recommended reading. "People will be surprised at how great the Eastern influence is in art and music," she said. "It's everywhere, and I'm doing this because it's the music I love. I'll be supplementing the presentation with historic and modern videos which I hope will encourage people to go out and hear live music.'

Mitchell's journey is free to the public and is held from 3 to 5 p.m. Thursdays from Sept. 21 to Oct. 26 in the community room of the Idyllwild Public Library.

Who were your Idyllwild mentors?





Local author pens Russo-Japanese war novel

Ron Singerton, a local resident, sets his well-researched novels in interesting historical periods — periods of systemic change and social upheaval.

With "A Cherry Blossom in Winter" (Penmore Press LLC 2017), Singerton visits a time in history when two powers, one emerging and one declining, are at odds over influence in Asia.

War looms as an expansionist Imperial Russia collides with a newly aggressive Imperial Japan over spheres of influence in Asia. Given the current struggles between the U.S. and China and the importance of the Korean peninsula in this competition, Singerton's latest novel is full of historical parallels with today.

The book explores the rising tide of peasant revolt in Tsarist Russia and the cultural threat it poses to the nobility. A young naval cadet, son of a Tsarist emissary to Japan, accompanies his father to his new posting just as Russia is beginning to build a Trans-Siberian railway, expand its influence in Asia and secure a warm-water port for its navy.

The book, with romantic subplots, is well researched with accurate depictions of historic battles in the Russo-Japanese War of 1904-05 — a war that culminates er.com.

with the defeat of Russia and the emergence of a newly militaristic Imperial Japan. The destruction of the Russian navy at the conclusive battle of Tsushima is the beginning of the end of the Romanov dynasty and marks the beginning of expansionist winds that will lead Japan to attack Pearl Harbor in 1941.

Chanticleer Editorial Book Review's review of "Cherry Blossom" states, "Singerton's book does a great job in presenting this prewar time as one of both personal and national conflict. ... By pulling in the geopolitics of the beginning of the last century, along with developments such as the introduction of Marxist ideology, the near-collapse of Russian court nobility, anti-Jewish pogroms, the mistreatment of Russian peasants, and widespread anti-Asian sentiment, the overall effect is a slow-build to the climatic and brutal naval battle [that ends the book]."

Singerton said he is developing a treatment to present to potential movie and television producers. He has been in contact with Scott Simon of National Public Radio's "Morning Edition" about a possible interview.
