# Fire closed Highway 74 for several hours

A small fire ignited about noon Saturday, Oct. 14, when a vehicle and trailer caught on fire just west of Mountain Center on Highway 74.

The Mount Fire, on both sides of the highway, reached three acres before containment, according to Incident Commander Chris Fogle, battalion chief on the San Jacinto Ranger District. Firefighters from the district's Engine 56 mopped up the fire that evening, he added.

Ambulances transported four people from the vehicle to area hospitals. (See traffic collision story on page A2.) California Highway Patrol reported that both the Jeep and the trailer, which it was pulling, were fully burned.

Closure of Highway 74 did not appear to affect attendance at Saturday's Art Walk and Wine Tasting, according to Peter Szabadi of the Art Alliance of Idyllwild, which sponsors the annual event.

There was a unified command with the U.S. Forest Service San Jacinto Ranger District and Cal Fire/Riverside County firefighters.

"A quick response of ground and aerial fire assets from Forest Service and CalFire" held the fire from spreading, Fogle wrote in an email.

The rapid initial attack included a he-

licopter and two air tankers besides the ground engine crews. Nearly 80 firefighters combated the fire and prevented it from ex-

panding and spreading.

# Fern Valley water rate increase looks likely

Board decision expected  
Oct. 20

With minimal discussion, the Fern Valley Water District directors concurred with the Rate and Revenue Committee's recommendation for new water rates last Friday. The board will vote on the proposal at its Oct. 20 regular meeting.

The committee, composed of directors Trisha Clark and Robert Krieger, has been developing the new rate recommendations for more

than a year. A preliminary report was delivered to the board during the August meeting.

This proposal would set monthly meter charges from \$30 for a ¾-inch or less meter to \$2,400 monthly for an 8-inch meter. Currently, the largest meter in the district is a 6-inch meter and the monthly charge would be \$960.

Water usage would cost \$4 per 100 cubic feet (or 748 gallons) for the first 1,000 cubic feet (7,500 gallons) in the two-month billing period. Usage greater than 1,000 cubic feet would cost \$11.30 per 100 cubic feet.

With the new rates, the committee estimated that water revenue would be about \$800,000. The proposed new rates would be for five years with a potential maximum increase of 5 percent annually, according to General

Manager Victor Jimenez. If an increase were needed, the board would have the discretion to raise rates between 1 and 5 percent.

Jimenez and the committee projected the revenues and costs, including capital investments, for the next 10 years, through 2026-27. This included paying off the unfunded other than retirement post-employment benefits in the next five years, he said.

The proposed rates were compared to current water costs. Meter charges can increase significantly. For a customer with a 5/8-inch meter, but no water usage, the water bill would increase from \$32.70 bi-monthly to \$60, nearly an 85-percent increase.

For the average customer who uses 5,600

# Trinity Houston describes what it's like in a Category 5 hurricane

Alone, but helping  
hundreds, she had  
to confront it

The past eight weeks will never be forgotten. While we may not recall details or even trends during September 2015 or September 1995, September 2017 saw two major earthquakes in Mexico, several category 4 and 5 hurricanes

in the Caribbean, which landed onshore, major wildfires in Northern California and a mass shooting in Las Vegas.

Trinity Houston, executive producer of the Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema, experienced and endured Hurricane Irma as it pummeled Sint Maarten. (The island known as St. Martin in English is divided between French Saint-Martin and Dutch Sint Maarten.) More importantly, not only did she live through it, but thousands of others survived because of her actions before, during

and after the Category 5 hurricane passed over the tiny Caribbean island.

This is the second of three parts describing the ordeal Houston encountered, and the actions she took that helped so many. Part 1, which describes the days up to the arrival of Hurricane Irma, appeared in the Oct. 12 edition of the Town Crier.

Hurricane Irma was classified as a Category 5 hurricane because its wind speed exceeded 155 miles per hour. Category 5 is the most severe category. Howev-

er, Irma's wind speed actually exceeded 185 mph and gusts were maximum at 230 mph.

The winds were getting stronger Tuesday and Tuesday night, Sept. 5. By Wednesday morning, except for the hour or so when the eye of the hurricane passed over Sint Maarten, the winds were vicious.

Although windows were boarded as strongly as possible, the winds still were felt inside the Simpson Bay resort. Rain was pushed through the seams and

# Three crashes on Hill roads last week, all with injuries

Three vehicle crash incidents took place over the last week on Hill roads. Each of the three had injuries, some serious.

At 11:35 a.m., Saturday, Oct. 14, Jonathan Gregory, 27, of Moreno Valley, was driving a 1990 Jeep Cherokee east-bound on Highway 74, 1 mile west of South Fork Trail, when a fire began in the vehicle. With Gregory were three passengers — Ashley Gregory, 25, Aubrey Gregory, 5, and Candice Gregory, 4, all from the same address in More-no Valley. All four suffered burns that required trans-port — Jonathan by American Medical Response to Des-ert Regional Medical Center in Palm Springs with burns to arms, face and head; and Ashley, Aubrey and Candice by AMR to Riverside Regional Medical Center in Moreno Valley. On his Facebook page, Jonathan said the family was taking a camping trip to Lake Hemet when his gas tank exploded. “We were very lucky to get the girls out without a scratch or burn,” he said.

At 3:20 p.m. Friday, Oct. 13, Douglas Miller, 39, of Menifee, was driving a white 2016 Ram truck east-bound on Highway 74, 1,000 feet east of McGaugh Road when, for unknown reasons, his vehicle left the roadside, struck the mountainside and rolled over. Miller com-plain-ed of pain in the neck and back but did not request transport. There were no passengers in Miller’s vehicle and no other vehicles involved in the incident.

About 5:35 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 14, Jonathan Schil-ler, 20, of Perris, was driving a white 2016 Chrysler 300 northbound on Highway 243, 200 feet south of Marian View Drive, at speeds deemed excessive by the investi-gating officer. As the vehicle started to enter the turn near Marian View, it didn’t complete the turn, causing the vehicle to continue straight ahead.

Schiller’s vehicle then sideswiped a black 2001 Lin-coln, driven by Sherri Hemmer, 49, of Idyllwild, which

was traveling southbound. Schiller’s vehicle next struck a white 2014 Dodge Ram truck head-on that was also traveling southbound, according to California Highway Patrol Officer Graham Aanestad.

The Ram truck was driven by Miguel Leeleon, 61, of Rancho Mirage. With Leeleon as front seat passen-ger was Gregory Leeleon, 67, also of Rancho Mirage. Both Leeleons were transported by AMR to Eisenhow-er Medical Center in Rancho Mirage. Schiller was not



According to California Highway Patrol Officer **Graham Aanestad**, at about 5:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 14, a white Chrysler 300 was traveling northbound on Highway 243 near Marian View Drive. Its approaching speed was about 45 mph. As the driver started to enter the turn near Marian View Drive, he didn’t complete the turn, causing him to continue straight ahead, sideswiping a black Lincoln traveling southbound with his Chrysler. Then, his vehicle struck a white Dodge Ram truck head-on, which was also traveling southbound. Three occu-pants from the incident suffered minor injuries and were transported by ground ambulance. One ambulance went to Eisenhower Medical Center and one to River-side County Regional Medical Center. Drugs or alcohol were not suspected as being the cause of the incident.

concrete. The floor of her room was covered in inches of water and she was on the fifth floor.

Tuesday night in the last group meeting before Irma arrived, Houston advised the current occu-pants to use the bathrooms for safety. These were not exposed to exterior forces and the bath tubs provided some additional protection.

“I said, ‘Hope for the best, but prepare for the worst,’” she advised her new friends and responsi-bilities. “Stay in your rooms and don’t open any doors because of the wind.” They stationed one employee on every floor for help if they were needed. But when everyone left for their rooms, Hous-ton was alone.

In those minutes be-fore the worst of the storm pummeled the island, she was able to call a friend —

a good friend from Hemet — and pour out her own fears to someone else.

“What can I do? We’ll need planes to leave,” she cried. “But if the airport loses power and I expect it will, airlines won’t land. We’ll need private or mili-tary help.”

Of course, the power was lost to the whole is-land, but the resort com-plex had generators to rely on. However, by late Tues-day, these failed, too.

“I tried to get some sleep, but that was impos-sible,” she lamented. The wind force was so strong and the air pressure so strong, my head felt like it was in a vise! The building shook from the wind.”

She called her mother, who didn’t know Houston was on the island waiting for a major hurricane. During that call, the phone died.

As the hurricane’s eye passed, Houston and some others risked going out-

side. Portions of the roof had blown off; the door to one couple’s bungalow was blown away. They and some others had to be relocated to safer places. And many cars were already turned on their roofs. And the window protection for several vil-las was lost.

“We had about an hour to move these people to a safer place,” she stated.

As the eye passed and the hurricane returned, the winds were less. It was still another four hours before the hurricane had totally moved past the is-land.

“It was massive dam-age. It felt like a Catego-ry 6 or 7, if there was one,” Houston said, describing

the immediate feeling. “Cars were flipped over everywhere. Some were on top of other cars. It was more like a tornado.”

But in the immediate post-storm assessment, they determined that none of the guests suffered any major injuries. One em-ployee did incur a broken arm when they slipped in a wet area.

“In that first meeting, everybody was happy and cheering, ‘We made it!’” Houston said. Now they had to make it off the is-land.

Thomas “Thom” Lloyd Pentecost of Eagle Rock and Idyllwild, passed away Thursday, Aug. 3, 2017.

Thom was born on Dec. 31, 1938, in Indianapolis, Indiana, to Lloyd Thomas Pentecost and Mildred Lu-cille “Mid” Griffith Winkler. He had one younger brother, Bob Pentecost (d. 1992).

Thom began tap dance training in 2005 at the age of 65 with Pacific Studio for Dance, where he inspired and mentored four generations of dancers.

Thom was beloved by many and will be remembered as a generous, creative, loving, supportive and fun man.

He is survived by his cousin, Linda Drake, loving in-laws and many dear friends that span his lifetime.

# Pine Cove Water finances improving, auditor says

## Water production less in September

Financial reports dominated the Pine Cove Water District meeting Wednesday, Oct. 11. General Manager Jerry Holldber reported on the current budget balance for fiscal year 2017-18 and Terry Shea, the district's auditor, reported his findings for the completed 2016-17 audit.

Through Sept. 30, PCWD's expenses for fiscal year 2017-18 have exceeded its revenue by about \$53,000. This was caused by the seasonal variation of revenue.

During the first quarter of the fiscal year, Riverside County does not distribute any property tax payments to special districts. The first property tax receipts will be received in December. Also, only the August billing period for customer payments for water usage occurred in this quarter.

One of the good trends from last year continued. PCWD sold two more water meters in the first quarter, which was the projection for the whole year.

Total revenue was about \$162,000 and expenses were about \$215,000, which included some, such as insurance, that were for the full year. This is why the balance for the Service and Supplies, and the Equipment and Loans accounts were more than 30 percent in one quarter.

Director Joel Palmer noted that the district's legal costs had already exceeded 40 percent of the year's projection. However, Vice President Diana Luther, in the absence of President Robert Hewitt, replied that there was an unexpected and unusual situation (the water theft) this quarter.

Once again, Terry Shea of the auditing firm Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott of San Bernardino, said PCWD's "... financial statements report fairly the year's transactions. We had no disagreement with management."

The district's net position, as of June 30, 2017, was \$2.7 million, an increase of \$130,000 during the year. "Last year, the net position only increased \$4,000," said Brianna Schultz of RAMS.

For the year, the long-term debt in-

creased \$50,000. Although the amount owed on loans and notes decreased \$40,000, the potential pension liability increase offset that reduction.

The pension liability increase was largely attributable to CalPERS investment conditions. PCWD's actual pension liability decreased during the year, but the CalPERS fiduciary situation deteriorated some, which resulted in an increase in the PCWD obligations, on paper. Next year, CalPERS investments might increase substantially.

"Our operating revenues were up and the operating costs down," Holldber said. "Our carry-over cash was better. Overall, we're headed in the right direction. Although we're not a rich district, every year we're better."

And Shea responded, "Yes, you are an improving system."

In other financial matters, the board approved the purchase of a new tractor with backhoe. And Holldber reported that the Board of Supervisors, at its Oct. 3 meeting, approved the reimbursement, up to \$55,000, to the district for construction of shade cover over the fuel-tank station that PCWD and Cal Fire/Riverside Fire Department Station 23 share. The source of the funds will be from County Service Area 38's account, according to the agreement with the county.

In water business, Holldber reported that 2.9 million gallons of water were produced in September.

"That is back to a normal level," he told the board.

The 2017 September volume is 220,000 gallons less than in September 2016. Since January, water production is about 4.1 million gallons more than the first nine months of 2016, but the apparent water theft increased production this year.

For September, the unexplained water usage was 9 percent, the lowest level in many months, Holldber reported and said, "We're back to single digits and that is an acceptable level."

The groundwater level of the district's static well, no. 10, did not change in September. "That is the first since February that didn't drop," Holldber said. "But other district wells' groundwater level did increase. Water is still moving through the ground."

# Soap opera star and news anchor challenge Ruiz for Congressional seat

Congressman Dr. Raul Ruiz will likely have to face at least three challengers in the June primary and one of them in the November 2018 election.

Last week, soap opera actress Kimberlin Brown Pelzer announced her entry into the Congressional race. She was a featured speaker at the 2016 Republican Convention. She was in "The Young and Restless" and, more recently, "The Bold and Beautiful."

"I'm thrilled to announce that I'm running for Congress in CA-36," she wrote in her Twitter account on Tuesday, Oct. 10. She could not be reached for comment.

Then on Monday, Oct. 16, former desert news anchor Dan Ball of Palm Desert announced his entry in the race, too.

"I'm running to put people first. It's time this district had a strong, community leader represent us in Washington who will put constituents first, work across the aisle and actually get things done for our community. I'm

All challengers will find Ruiz a tough opponent in this somewhat conservative district. In 2016, Ruiz collected 62 percent of the vote to beat state Sen. Jeff Stone, who was former Riverside

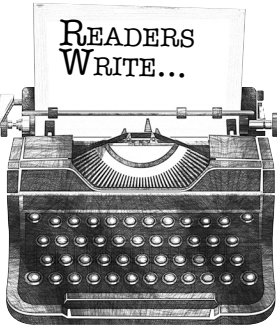

## Stop illegal robocalls

Are you getting hounded by robocalls and wondering what you can do about them? Reporting illegal robocalls helps the Federal Trade Commission and other law enforcement agencies go after the scammers behind them. But what can you do to stop those calls now? One option is a robocall-blocking app for your mobile phone.

Robocall blocking apps can give you the ability to do things like prescreen your calls before the phone rings; block certain types of calls, including calls that others have flagged as fraudulent or unwanted calls; block anonymous calls that show up as “unknown” callers; and use reverse lookup to detect fake caller ID information from call spoofing.

Which app works for you might depend on your phone’s operating system. Before you consider downloading any app, think about the call protection you need and do your research. CTIA, a trade association representing manufacturers and providers of wireless products and services, has a comprehensive list of call-blocking apps.

If your mobile number isn’t already on the National Do Not Call Registry at www.donotcall.gov/, it’s also a good idea to add it. If you continue to get sales calls, at least you’ll know the callers don’t respect the law. If you continue to get illegal robocalls or other unwanted calls, report them to the FTC. Your complaints not only help us target scammers, but also help telecommunications carriers and other industry partners that are working on call blocking solutions.

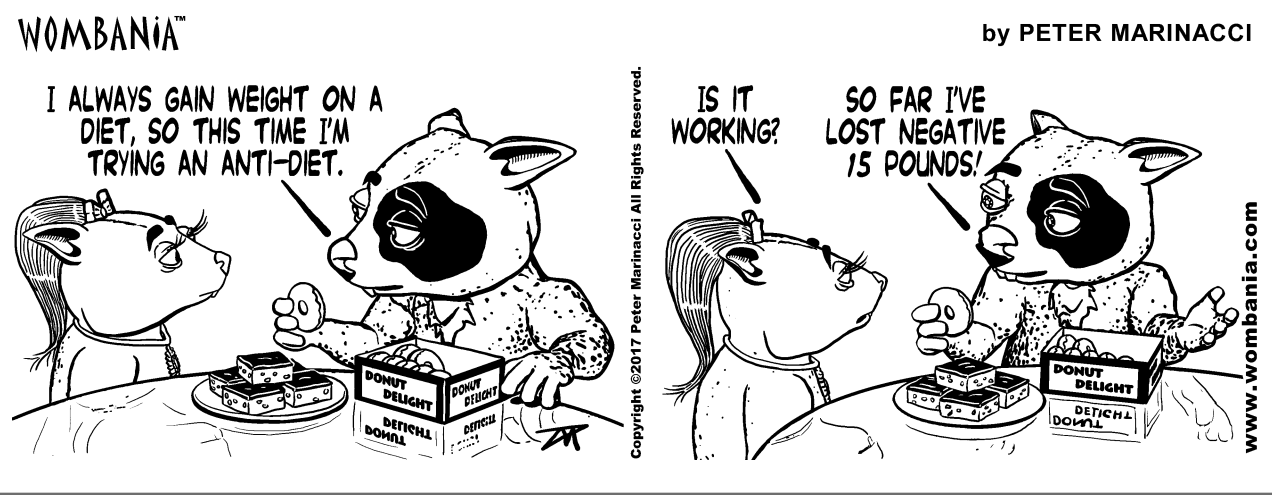

# Covered Cal prepared for Trump's refusing to reimburse health insurers

Late Thursday, Oct. 12, the Trump Administration announced it would stop making the cost-sharing reduction payments to health insurers. On the next day, in a filing with the U.S. Court of Appeals in the District of Columbia, the administration confirmed it planned to cease making the payments because they were unauthorized.

Under the current law, health plans must offer the cost-sharing reduction subsidies to low-income consumers in the form of lower co-pays and deductibles, with the federal government reimbursing carriers for the difference in costs, according to James Scullary, communications and public relations officer for Covered California.

Covered Cal already planned to ensure that health plans could participate in 2018 by adding a surcharge to make up for the potential loss of those reimbursement payments, which are roughly estimated to be worth \$800 million or more to California consumers in 2017.

In the original case, the House of Representatives sued to stop the payments because Congress had not approved any appropriations action that authorized making the payments. This argument convinced the federal district court in the District of Columbia in 2016.

The case is being appealed. After nearly nine months in office, President Donald Trump has authorized his Department of Health and Human Services, along with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, to stop these payments.

Based on an opinion from the attorney general's office, on Thursday, Eric Hagen, the acting Secretary of HHS, ordered CMS to halt the payments.

“In light of that opinion — and the absence of any other appropriation that could be used to fund CSR pay-

ments — CSR payments to issuers must stop, effective immediately. CSR payments are prohibited unless and until a valid appropriation exists,” he wrote to Seema Verman, CMS administrator.

The cost-sharing reductions are part of the Affordable Care Act and made to health insurance companies to cover their losses for insuring low-income individuals.

It is not clear whether the payments will stop immediately in October or later for 2018. Many people feel the companies may pull out of states in which they need the payments or raise their premiums to unaffordable levels for low-income families.

In California, Covered Cal released a statement last week saying it was prepared for this event and California residents need not fear the loss of their insurance, according to Scullary.

California's health plans will included a “surcharge on Silver-tier plans for the 2018 coverage year.

“However, because the surcharge is only being loaded onto Silver-tier plans, those who purchase coverage without getting federal help — whether through Covered California or by buying directly from health insurance companies — can be protected from paying any surcharge. Most Covered California consumers who receive financial help in the form of an Advanced Premium Tax Credit, or subsidy, will not see a change in what they pay for their insurance in 2018 because of the surcharge, and many will actually end up paying less because their subsidy amount will increase more than the surcharge,” the press release stated.

Covered Cal issued its press release Wednesday, Oct. 11, because, “We couldn't wait any longer,” Scullary said.

Scullary also emphasized that the open season begins Nov. 1 and continues through January 2018, unlike the federal program, which ends Dec. 15.

# From HIV to puppy mills, new laws for California

## But beach smoking ban vetoed

The most recent California legislative session ended Sept. 30. California legislators were busy during the final weeks and passed hundreds of bills. Governor Jerry Brown has had several weeks to decide whether he will sign a bill into a new law or veto it.

Below are several bills, which he signed and will become new state laws, and a few, which he determined should not become laws.

**Drug price increases**

One of the first bills signed was Senate Bill 17, which requires drug manufacturers to notify the state when the wholesale price is scheduled to increase more than 16 percent within a two-year period. The bill applies to drugs, which cost more than \$40 for a 30-day supply.

The intent is to promote transparency in the drug business, said the bill's author, Sen. Dr. Edward Hernandez.

There is also a requirement to analyze how drug prices affect health care premiums.

"Drug companies abuse their market power by jacking up prices, and the public is looking to their government for help," Hernandez said in the press release. "Requiring drug companies to provide advance notice and some explanation for large price hikes is a step toward a more stable and predictable prescription drug marketplace."

**College education**

Assembly bill 19 would waive fees for those students enrolled for the first time in the community college system and who take at least 12 units per semester. This new waiver would only be available for a newly enrolled student's first full academic year of attendance.

Currently California Community Colleges charge students an enrollment fee of \$46 per unit per semester. The board of governors may waive this fee for students meeting prescribed requirements.

The legislature must appropriate funds for this bill.

It also intends for community colleges to partner with local educational agencies to provide secondary and postsecondary students and their families assistance in learning about college opportunities, completing college preparatory courses, and applying for college and financial aid.

It also expects these partnerships to support and improve high school student preparation for college and reduce postsecondary remediation.

The potential cost of waiving these fees may be more than \$31 million annually.

**HIV transmission**

SB 239, authored by Assemblymember Todd Gloria and State Sen. Scott Wiener, updates California criminal law to approach transmission of HIV in the same way as transmission of other serious communicable diseases.

An individual, who knows they have human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and expose another individual to it, by having unprotected sex, can be convicted of a felony and sentenced to state prison. Senate Bill 17 would repeal this provision and define it as misdemeanor. The individual could be sentenced to a county jail for six months.

It is also a felony to donate blood if one knows they have acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) or tested positive of HIV. This also has been lowered to a misdemeanor.

"In the decades since these laws were passed, societal and medical understanding of HIV has greatly improved, and there are now effective treatments that lengthen and improve the quality of life for people living with HIV. Furthermore, there is no evidence that laws

criminalizing sexual activity on the part of people living with HIV accomplish their intended goal of improving public health, Wiener, who was the co-author, said when he introduced the SB 239 in February.

"Today California took a major step toward treating HIV as a public health issue, instead of treating people living with HIV as criminals," said Wiener said in the press release after its signing. "HIV should be treated like all other serious infectious diseases, and that's what SB 239 does. We are going to end new HIV infections, and we will do so not by threatening people with state prison time, but rather by getting people to test and providing them access to care. I want to thank Governor Brown for his support in helping to put California at the forefront of a national movement to reform these discriminatory laws."

While the votes on this bill (the Senate passed it 24-12 and the Assembly passed it 52-19 were not overwhelming, defeat was not threatened. St. Sen Jeff Stone opposed it and Assemblyman Voepel did not vote on it.

**Political ads**

Assembly bill 249, the California Disclose Act, would open the windows on who may be paying for various political ads or campaigns. More information on the source of funds for political ads — printed or telephonic — will be required.

The act prohibits a candidate or committee from sending a mass mailing unless the name, street address, and city of the candidate or committee are shown on the outside of each piece of mail in the mass mailing.

This also applies to a mass electronic mailing. The bill would provide that these disclosure requirements do not apply if the mass mailing or mass electronic mailing is paid for by an independent expenditure.

The new disclosure law prohibits candidates or committees from expending campaign funds to pay for specified telephone calls that advocate support of, or opposition to, a candidate, ballot measure, or both, unless the name of the organization that authorized or paid for the call is disclosed to the recipient of the call during the course of each call.

The act also requires advertisements to include disclosure statements, with the names of the persons who made the two highest cumulative contributions to the committee paying for the advertisement.

**Puppy mills**

Brown signed AB 485, "Pet Rescue and Adoption

Act." Beginning Jan. 1, 2019, California pet stores will be allowed to sell only dogs, cats or rabbits that which were obtained from a public animal control agency or shelter, society for the prevention of cruelty to animals shelter, humane society shelter, or rescue group.

And the dogs and cats must comply with laws regarding spaying and neutering of these animals.

AB 485 applies to the retail sale of dogs, cats and rabbits.

The bill's author, Assemblyman Patrick O'Donnell said in a press release after the Governor signed the bill, "This is a big win for our four-legged friends, of course. But also for California taxpayers who spend more than \$250 million annually to house and euthanize animals in our shelters."

Although the American Kennel Club opposed the bill, its language does not prohibit the purchase of the animals from private breeders.

**Smoking on public beaches and parks**

Senate Bill 386 and Assembly Bill 725 would have banned smoking on California public parks and beaches. Last week, Gov. Brown vetoed both bills.

In his veto message, Brown said he thought both bills were too broad. For example, the fine for lighting one cigarette in a state park could be \$485.

More importantly, Brown said, "Last year, I vetoed Senate Bill 1333, a similar measure, because I believed that such a far-reaching prohibition in every state park and every state beach was too broad."

He concluded his message with this statement, "If people can't smoke even on a deserted beach, where can they? There must be some limit to the coercive power of government."

gallons every two months, the water cost would increase \$24.67 (38 percent), from \$65.33 bi-monthly to \$90.

Several customers have come to the office upset about the possible increase, Jimenez said. After he explained the need and rationale for the new rates, they left with a better understanding and in a better mood.

The two tiers represent the district's water sources — surface and ground wells. Water diverted from Strawberry and Tahquitz creeks, although it is treated, costs significantly less to produce than pumping water from the ground, Jimenez told the board. Thus, tier one, \$4 per 100 cubic feet, represents surface water costs and tier two (\$11.30) is the cost of providing groundwater.

"It's expensive to pump out of the ground," he said. "We have monthly utility bills whether we pump or don't. And the volume of groundwater pumped increases the costs along with additional maintenance costs for the wells."

Usage rates are for all customers. Jimenez emphasized that every customer will pay the same rate for water used. There is no difference between residential or single-meter and multiple-customer users.

And based on the 2015 San Juan Capistrano water rate case, Jimenez stated that a tier imposed just for conservation would not be legal, which is the reason for only two rate tiers.

"Looking at every year, it looks like a good blueprint," commented President Jim Rees.


Because of the requirements for inside sprinkling systems for construction of new homes, Jimenez said that FVWD will discontinue selling 5/8-inch meters. In the future, the smallest residential meter will be a 3/4-inch meter.

If the board approves the new rate recommendation at the Oct. 20 meeting, a public hearing will be held, probably in December. The proposal would be sent to customers and property owners within the district before the hearing.



## Idy Talks speaker series features IAA junior

She sees her future teaching music to young students

Hong Kong native Ashley Leung, third-year Idyllwild Arts Academy junior music major, is the next Idy Talks speaker. The long-standing speaker series, once done in conjunction with the Idyllwild Community Center, is now a solo series produced by IAA.

An accomplished violinist, Ashley is preparing to become a teacher with the specific goal of inspiring young musicians — teaching in areas where music, as an educational component, is becoming less available.

Ashley will talk about her journey, as a ninth-grade music student, from her home in Hong Kong to Idyllwild and the academy, and the growth that migration has produced, both musically and culturally.

Although she will discuss the challenges any ninth grader would face journeying halfway around the world to an arts boarding school, she also will discuss her mission to help educate young music students in areas where musical opportunities are limited.

Beginning in 2015, Ashley organized, with the help of her father, a project to teach music one week every summer at Song Zi WenJiaHe Primary School in impoverished Hubei Province in central China. “My father donated a small computer lab with 20 desktop computers for the school in 2012,” she related, noting how her connection with the primary school began. “They have basic academic subjects and a few art classes, but no music.”

“Each year, I invite four or five students who attend Idyllwild Arts to come with me to teach music and art to these underprivileged students.”

Called “Teach Music for China,” its mission statement captures Ashley’s personal goal of offering music instruction in areas where it is not readily available. “Our mission statement is ‘to enrich and cultivate music education as a form of self-expression in an underprivileged school in China. Music is a powerful tool to transform lives.’”

As the core of her program, she and her volunteers teach violin and piano. Their students are in grades one through six. “We also teach recorder and play games to make the experience fun.”

“There are many ways to be-

come a musician, but not in an impoverished town. That is why we do what we do — to bring music to these young students.”

Ashley had to fund the program and obtained a grant and other contributions to do so. She continues to fundraise online to sustain the program. “I really like teaching,” said Ashley. “I love it seeing kids learn something in a different way. Growing up in the safe environment in which I did allows me to go outward, explore more, and to give more. Coming to Idyllwild Arts has made me aim higher. I thank God for this chance to start over and grow as a person and as an artist. I take things more seriously here at Idyllwild Arts because of the talent all around me. My teachers have exposed me to new ways of learning.”

“There is this concept and demand at Idyllwild Arts that everyone needs to perform in class, to be fully present and engaged. And being in Idyllwild is perfect — far enough from city life to not be distracted and yet close enough to cultural events in Los Angeles.”

Ashley has studied violin, piano, flute and dance. Her talk is at 6 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 19 at the Town Gallery on North Circle Drive.
