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How the Legion got its new roof

The American Legion Post 800 in Idyllwild got started in the 1940s. Back then, its building on Marian View Drive was a Kiwanis Club — you can still see the “Circle and K” symbol on the west face of the building.

The Legion bought it from Kiwanis in early 1971.

Tom Pierce, an Army veteran and the Post's 2nd vice commander, was a wee lad in the '40s. He recalls more recent times:

hours folk spent socializing on the deck, nestled among the giant cedars and sugar pine trees, and the Thanksgiving dinners he shared with neighbors, family and friends.

This Thanksgiving, Pierce and fellow Legionnaires made sure almost 250 people had a good dinner and for free, as a part of their commitment to veterans, families and the whole community. Marlene, his wife, cooked one of the 22 turkeys served.

Their community-mindedness and giving spirits are hallmarks

of Legionnaires, men and women who earned the distinction, in part, through an Act of Congress and their active-duty service during a military conflict and subsequent honorable discharge.

But despite the 70-plus years that Post 800 has been in the business of giving, Pierce, an avid picture-taker, likes to tell the story of how the Legion got its new roof.

“There was no formal asking or anything like that,” he said, “but we casually put out feelers

Climate report finds increasing emission-raised temperatures

Southwest should expect less rain, more droughts

In early November, the Trump administration released a “Climate Science Special Report.” Contrary to many of the administration's environmental officials, the report finds that the Earth's climate is changing due to a multitude of human actions.

“Human activities continue to significantly affect Earth's climate by altering factors that change its radiative balance ... In the industrial era, human activities have been, and are increasingly, the dominant cause of climate warming,” said one of the key findings on physical causes of the climate change.

The “Climate Science Special Report: Fourth National Climate Assessment” was prepared with a large cadre of dozens of authors and contributors. They work at many federal agencies and universities throughout the country.

Its purpose, according to the authors, is “to be an authoritative assessment of the science of climate change, with a focus on the United States, to serve as the foundation for efforts to

assess climate-related risks and inform decision-making about responses.”

In the summary, they began, “The global warming of the past 50 years is primarily due to human activities, predominantly the burning of fossil fuels.”

The report acknowledges there are natural contributors to the evolution of climate change. These include solar radiation, volca-

no eruptions, as well as El Niño. However, the conclusion is that these natural events have not been significant contributors to the increasing surface temperatures.

The most important contributor to the climate change is the substantial increase in atmospheric carbon dioxide, CO2. According to the report, “In the industrial era, the CO2 atmospheric growth rate has been exponential with the increase in atmospheric CO2 approximately twice that absorbed by the oceans ... The global average CO2 concentration has increased by 40% over the industrial era.”

Methane and nitrous oxide also are sig-

nificant gaseous contributors to the effective transformation of the planet's climate. “The atmospheric concentrations of CO2, CH4, and N2O are higher now than they have been in at least the past 800,000 years,” the report concluded.

The result of the concentration of these gases in the atmosphere is that the average annual temperature over the U.S. has increased 1.2 degrees in the past 30 years compared to the first 60 years of the 20th century. Cold waves have declined in frequency while heat waves are occurring more often.

Based on climate models, the report projects the average annual temperature over the U.S. will increase 2.5 degrees in the next 35 years and may increase even more before the 21st century ends. The models also predict that extreme temperatures are likely to increase more than the average temperatures. This includes cold days as well as hot days.

There is a very high confidence from the models that, “The number of days below freezing is projected to decline while the number above 90°F will rise.”

The authors examined regions within the U.S., as well as the entire North American

in the community that the Post's leaky roof urgently needed to be replaced.

"Several people got word and responded with anonymous donations. Our Auxiliary and the Sons of Legionnaires donated, too. Altogether, we raised around \$21,000, including the proceeds of special events and member dues.

"We couldn't be more grateful for the help. The leaks had compromised everything and the ceiling had started looking seedy and bad, like it was going to fall down on somebody's head."

Air Force Veteran and Legionnaire Alan Belanger agreed in so many words. He helped stanch the flow "for about three years. I bought a tarp and patched the roof."

Now the snow and harsh weather won't threaten the knotted pine walls lined with Uncle Sam posters and service branch banners.

The vintage helmets, medals and canteens — the "Post 800 Honor Wall," draped in black flags paying respect to recently deceased Legionnaires — all of that is safe from many a San Jacinto Mountain storm to come.

Pierce said, "We scraped to get the money, but got the job done this October, quite some time after we created our roof budget in 2016.

"The 'Army Green' shingles are fantastic and will last 30 to 40 years," he added, with a grin fellow Legionnaires appreciate.

"But there were still surprises since we had put the job off for so long. When our contractor, Jesse Wilkerson of Ridgeline Roofing, got started, he found four layers of roofing dating back to the time of the Second World War. The bottom layer was shake shingles, which are a fire hazard and illegal nowadays."



"We're thrilled to have the new roof, but we're still looking for about \$3,200 to pay for tearing off those layers and putting plywood down to cover the gaps between the boards that were underneath the shake shingles Jesse stripped off.

"And a lot of the original vents and ducts, especially in the kitchen, had to be rebuilt. All of that ran up the bill and 'tore through' our original \$21,000 budget."

When asked how he felt about the new roof, Belanger expressed satisfaction. He sat in the Hall working on Legion business Saturday after Thanksgiving, a few hours before Karaoke would start. He escorted the Town Crier reporter through the bar and pointed to a photo of Danny Richardson, the Post's commander. Several veterans sat, drinking beers on the deck overlooking the horseshoe pits in the backyard.

A more serene place in Idyllwild on this busy holiday weekend — with thousands of visitors awaiting the annual Christmas tree lighting — couldn't have been found or imagined.

A moment later, standing on the deck, the newspaper reporter could see the "old lumber" and feel



it "wobble" under foot, just like Pierce had said, but he'd also shared more good news: "The Legion was going to get a new deck.

"Post members went down and met with Home Depot officials and they came up to take a look and said it would do the job 'gratis.' They told us, 'We'll make it right, period.'"

The deck is "structurally sound," Pierce said, sounding like the engineer he is, "but they'll bring it up to code and put on new plastic products and we'll end up with a new deck.

"They're going to expand it around out front, too, and they're talking about taking care of the shake shingles on the front of the building, but I haven't heard a commitment on that."

Pierce estimated the cost would be "in the neighborhood of \$50,000."

The timeline for the new deck is undecided. "That's up to Home Depot," he said. "At our next board meeting, we'll talk about getting in touch with them again, if someone hasn't already.

"We're thrilled to have the new roof," 2nd Vice Commander **Tom Pierce** said. But the job was bigger than the Legion planned for in its budget. It still needs about \$3,200 to pay for unexpected expenses.

Last month, the Legion finished the long overdue job of replacing its roof. The focus now is repairing the aging deck. 2nd Vice Commander **Tom Pierce** said Home Depot had inspected it and would do the job free for the Post.

"We'll stay active — me, the commander, Barney Brause, Jim Wiley and others — to see the project through to completion."

As the story drew to a close, Pierce exclaimed: "What an honor for us to have the support of the community and Home Depot.

"We want the public to know they can come to the Legion when there is heavy snow and people are isolated or 'down and out,' or when they've lost heat or the power in their house.

"They have a warm place to go. They can get fed. They can come to the Legion and expect to be accommodated. Please come and visit us soon."

Debra A. Varnado is

continent. The largest change in warming occurred in the western U.S. The change in the annual average and annual maximum average temperatures was half a degree greater in the Southwest region (Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico and Utah).

Even for the annual average minimum temperature, the Southwest increase was 1.6 degrees compared to 1.4 degrees for the contiguous U.S.

Warm temperatures and water availability already are characteristics of the region and their importance will be exacerbated in the future.

Water in the Southwest will decline, according to the report, which forecasts diminishing snowpack and resulting less stream flow. Droughts will become more frequent.

Less water and warmer temperatures will have a negative effect on the region's agricultural production, which supports the whole country.

Residents in the rural and forested areas of the region can expect "more wildfire and increased risks to communities across extensive areas," according to the report.

The report suggested that the region might mitigate the worst of these changes with a migration to greater use of geothermal, wind and solar-energy resources. A greater consumption of renewable energy resources could substantially reduce heat-trapping gases.

While the report's conclusions were pessimistic, the authors praised several regional efforts to reverse the emission of threatening gases. Ten northeast and mid-Atlantic states have formed the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative. Five Southwest states have adopted new goals for using renewable energy.

California was singled out for Assembly Bill 32, "Global Warming Solution Act," with the goal to reduce greenhouse emissions to 1990 levels by 2020. AB 32 was enacted in 2006.

We also now have six nonprofit and public agency members: Fern Valley Water District; Friends of San Jacinto Mountain County Parks; Hemet Public Library; Idyllwild Animal Rescue Friends; Idyllwild Arts Academy; and St. Hugh's Episcopal Church.

But we cannot, and will not, give up on business advertising.

We want to remind Idyllwild businesses that advertising in the Town Crier is "focused advertising." You're not paying for circulation to hundreds of thousands of people only a tiny fraction of whom are interested in Idyllwild. You know every Town Crier reader is truly interested in Idyllwild because they are paying to read Idyllwild's newspaper.

And remember that your Town Crier ad "endures" for an entire week because readers don't toss out their TC until a new issue arrives. The Town Crier stays right there by their chair, and is read and reread all week. It's like advertising for a whole week in a daily newspaper at a fraction of the cost.

So your Town Crier advertising is focused, highly visible and enduring. And that's good for your business.

Lastly, we ask all TC Members to remember to support Hill businesses that support your local newspaper with their advertising. That's a win-win-win for all of us.

We've reiterated our view that a newspaper is a community watchdog that publishes the bad with the good. It warns of danger, advises of opportunity, challenges authority, praises accomplishment, investigates irregularity, marvels at art, exposes abuse, celebrates life and publishes its readers' letters. If a publication does not do all of those things, it may be something else, but it's not a newspaper.

It's now been 15 weeks since we began the Town Crier Membership model to save a newspaper for our Hill community. The objective was to keep the Town Crier from retiring when we do, which should be sometime next summer. To enable that, we need to bring the newspaper revenues up to where its currently unpaid employee positions — especially including that of the editor in chief — could become reasonably compensated. Because if the Town Crier is "breaking even" only if it has an editor, proofreader, pick-up and distribution person, light-duty handyman and occasional lawyer who will work for free, then the paper isn't really breaking even at all. It would be very difficult, if not impossible, to find new owners who would be willing to work for free and continue to operate the Town Crier as a real, community newspaper.

So, it is with gratitude and renewed optimism that we can report that we now are well more than halfway to the increased annual revenues we estimate we will need for the Town Crier to continue on. During these past 15 weeks, there has been an outpouring of readers who are willing to support the TC with new Memberships at various levels they can afford.

We now are at the stage wherein existing subscribers are converting to Memberships. This is happening at the rate of about 10 to 12 per week as old subscriptions expire, and we see no reason why it should not continue at that rate through to the one-year anniversary of

Park Service extends comment period on entrance fee increases

State attorneys general express strong opposition to increase

In October, the National Park Service proposed to establish peak-season entrance fees for the 17 most-visited parks. For example, the proposal almost triples the single-vehicle entrance fee at Joshua Tree National Park.

Last week, the NPS extended the public comment period, from Nov. 23 to Dec. 22.

Also, on Nov. 22, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra, along with 10 other attorneys general, wrote a letter expressing the opposition to the fee increase. In a letter to Michael Reynolds, the acting director of the NPS, Becerra and his counterparts wrote, "We cannot let the most popular and awe-inspiring national parks become places only for the wealthy. As Americans, we are all public landowners."

They recommended the NPS "... scrap the proposed fee increases and begin anew in reviewing the ways to ensure adequate funding to address the deferred maintenance backlog at our national parks without increasing barriers to access."

The state officials made three primary arguments against the fee increase. The first was the increase was "unlikely to address the deferred maintenance backlog."

They focused on the total maintenance backlog, which exceeds \$11 billion, and the fee increases, which are estimated to result in about \$70 million of new revenue annually. With no increase in maintenance projects or costs, the NPS would collect \$7 billion in a century. The backlog would still have a \$4-billion balance remaining.

The AGs then noted that the Trump administration had already proposed a "\$296.6 million reduction in the NPS budget for fiscal year 2018." This seemed inconsistent with the argument that the NPS needs more revenue for maintenance projects.

Also, the AGs argue that the public might respond to the entrance-fee increase by shifting to the purchase of special annual passes, such as the "America the Beautiful." This would reduce the net entrance fee increase.

Overall, they are concerned that these increases will lead to fewer people visiting the premier national parks.

These public lands would become inaccessible to many U.S. citizens.

For the second point, they argue that the NPS has not met past Congressional criteria to justify proposed fee increases.

"As a legal matter, the Service has not offered a reasoned explanation for its proposed fee increases and its actions are inconsistent with the laws that govern our national park system.," they said in the letter to Reynolds.

"Unlike prior fee increases or changes established by the Service, the current proposal fails to include any analysis or evidence that the National Park Service has considered or met the criteria set forth by Congress," the official added.

The third point the legal officials made was this proposal did not provide for adequate public comment or local outreach.

"Fee increases by the Service ... when undertaken, have typically been implemented with detailed analysis and robust public outreach. For example, in 2014 and 2015, ... the Service encouraged individual park units to conduct their own public outreach to assess public reaction to fee increases, and such outreach included individualized press releases and social media posts from specific parks."

This effort includes little local efforts and is primarily led from the Washington office.

In Southern California, the fee for one vehicle to enter Joshua Tree National Park between Jan. 1 and May 31 will almost triple, from \$25 to \$70. During the other seven months, the vehicle-entry fee will remain at \$25. For individuals not in a vehicle, the fee will increase from \$12 per person to \$30. Entrance fees for motorcycles and the annual pass also increase.

The National Park Service also is proposing entry- and permit-fee adjustments for commercial-tour operators. The proposal would increase entry fees for commercial operators and standardize commercial use authorization requirements for road-based commercial tours.

Readings from different faith traditions will be shared. Music and song, expressions of hope and peace, will unite those who attend

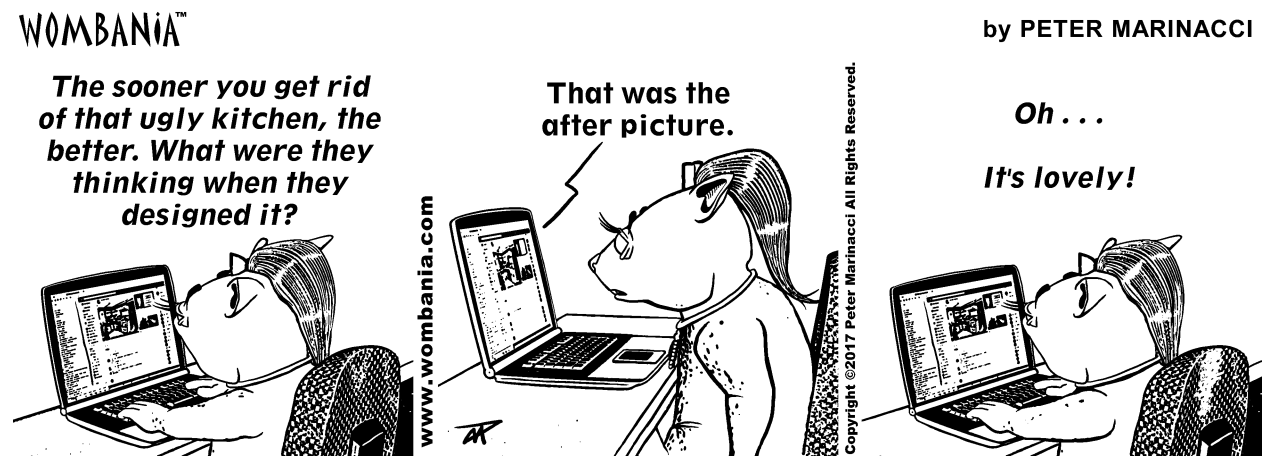

State fiscal analysis for 2018-19 looks promising

Caution about revenues beyond that

California’s Legislative Analyst’s Office issued a positive outlook for the next few fiscal years. Of course, a recession will change the forecast for future years.

In the report, the LAO estimated “... General Fund revenues will continue to grow in the near term ...” regarding forecasting spending and revenues for fiscal 2018-19, which begins July 1, 2018.

Revenue growth will largely occur through increased personal income taxes. These were initially raised in 2012 and voters extended with approval of Proposition 55 in 2016. The LAO is projecting that the state will likely see a surge in capital gains revenue next year.

“For over a year, there has been strong stock market growth. We have

expected that growth to be accompanied by an increase in quarterly tax payments (typically made by higher-income taxpayers). That surge has not yet materialized.

“We suspect that many high-income individuals might have a large tax liability for 2017 ... If we are right, monthly revenue collections in December 2017, January 2018, and/or April 2018 will exceed the administration’s most recent projections,” is the reason for the positive revenue forecast.

However, the LAO expressed some concern about the direction of expenditures for school districts, community colleges, Medi-Cal and state employee compensation costs, including pensions.

Proposition 98 controls the funding levels for K-12 education and community colleges. The LAO is already estimating that improved revenues this fiscal year will result in another \$650 million for education funding. In fiscal 2018-19, higher revenue could push education funding up an-

other \$2.6 billion.

Medi-Cal expenditures also are projected to be \$600 million less than the current budget plan. Proposition 56 (tobacco tax) has helped reduce the demand on General Fund sources.

However, the LAO is projecting that Medi-Cal expenses in 2018-19 will grow \$2.2 billion.

And another \$1 billion demand on the state’s revenue will be compensation for employees. The LAO projects pay costs will grow \$540 million, due to new employee agreements. Many of the agreements provide for a 4-percent pay increase next year.

Also, pension and health benefit costs will likely increase \$500 million.

Overall, the LAO projects revenues will be \$3.7 billion greater than the expected expenses in 2018-19. It also is expected that the current-year revenue will be \$3.8 billion greater than the June 2017 forecast.

The result is that the state’s reserves will total

about \$13.6 billion when fiscal 2018-19 begins and will grow to \$19.3 billion, if the Legislature does not enact more spending.

If the state were to confront an economic recession after 2018-19, the LAO foresees these reserves being used to continue programs before any spending reductions are approved.

In January, Gov. Jerry Brown will submit his last budget proposal. A year ago, he cautioned legislators about increasing expenditures because a recession would damage the budget and reserves. He is likely to continue this message next month.

Forecasting the future budget is fraught with uncertainties, such as federal actions on healthcare costs and state pensions. Consequently, the LAO’s recommendation to the Legislature is to continue building reserves until the effect of these significant uncertainties becomes better known.

Whitewater Preserve nearby

You don’t have to slog for miles to find water in the desert with the Whitewater River, a year-round stream, just off Interstate 10. The best way to experience this waterway is by visiting the Whitewater Preserve, an oasis managed by The Wildlands Conservancy.

The Whitewater Preserve spans more than 2,851 acres. The visitors’ facility is a renovated historic building from its time as a fish hatchery. There are picnic tables, shaded benches and two ponds with fish, making for a relaxing visit. Or you could choose to be more active by heading out on the trailhead that leads to the San Geronio Wilderness.

The preserve is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with the exception of Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year’s Day. Permits are required for camping, backcountry trip parking, and afterhours hiking. The preserve also hosts many free programs, but reservations are required.

In Section 2.1, language would be added that the owner or one acting on behalf of the owner could make an application. Section 2.4 would add that combined sewers are not permitted. Section 2.12 would change as follows: EQUIVALENT DWELLING UNITS (EDU) means the capacity for water usage and wastewater discharge equivalent to the quantity usage and discharge from a single family residence using established at 250 gallons of water wastewater daily. Section 2.13 would add this sub-section shall apply to commercial and/or institutional customers. 2.17 would state that a Lateral Connection means the actual "Wye" connection to the public sewer main line. Section 2.22 would be renumbered as 2.23 and define RWQCB. In several places the word "industrial" would be changed to "institutional." Section 2.27 would be renumbered 2.29 and add "One unit of service is equal to one Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU). A single family home is equal to one EDU. Commercial, institutional and industrial customers' units of service will be determined by the number of fixtures connected to the sewer." Section 5.7 adds the owner is responsible for the sewer lateral. In Section 6.14.07, \$2,500 is changed to \$25,000. The minimum sewer easement width in Section 6.15.01 would be 12 feet but wider if the depth of the sewer is more than 8 feet below the ground surface or if the slope is greater than 15%. In 6.16.01, "water and" is removed from "water and wastewater." 7.2.04 would state "total suspended solids of 30 mg/L." 7.2.05 would state "total dissolved solids of 600 mg/L." 7.2.08 adds the DISTRICT may enter into agreements with dischargers with unique waste streams to exceed the amounts specified in Sections 7.2.01 through 7.2.07, when mitigating circumstances that will not jeopardize the ability of the DISTRICT to meet its Waste Discharge Requirements as established by the RWQCB exist. Sections 7.7 to 7.8 state it shall be unlawful to discharge the contents of a swimming pool or hydrolysat to a sewer. 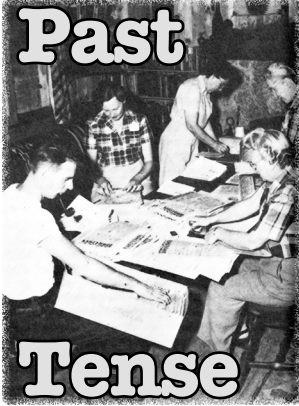

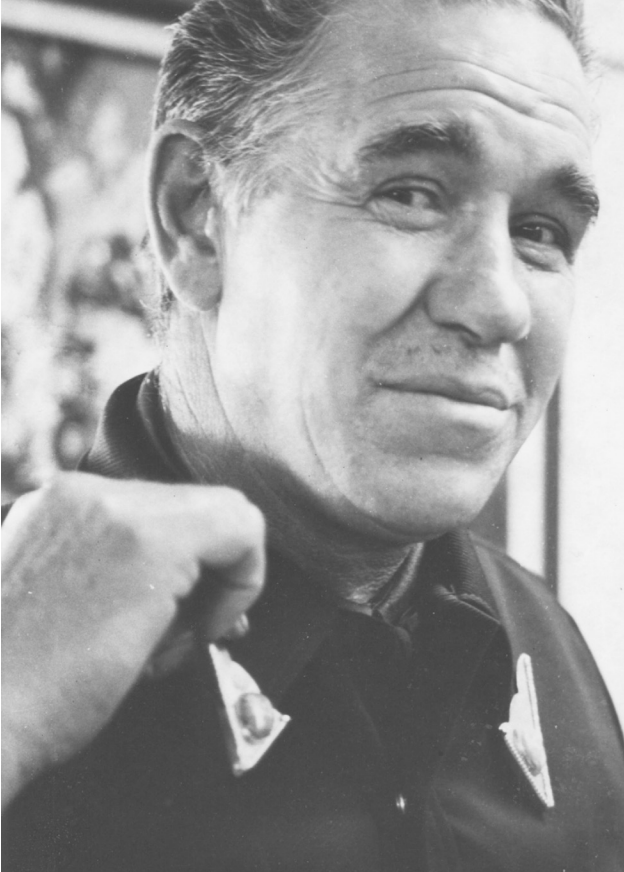


70 years ago - 1947

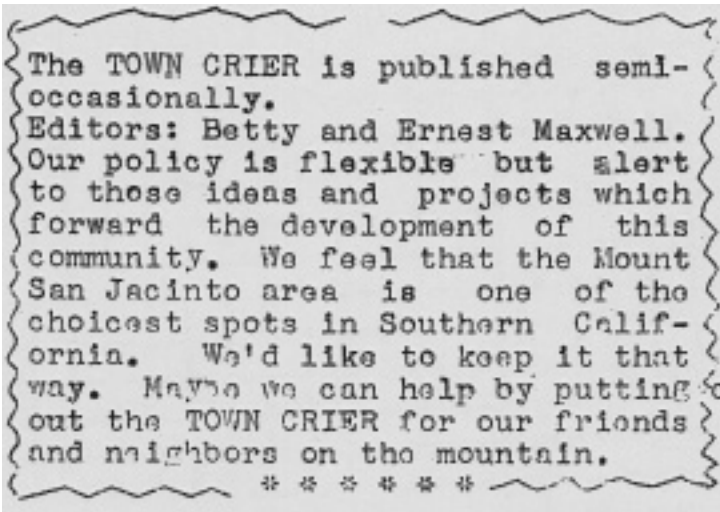

Idyllwild Pickleball courts open for public play

Pickleball has a new permanent home in Idyllwild. According to a press release from Chris Trout, Idyllwild Community Center's spokesperson, "Barry Wallace, ICC board member and Idyllwild's resident pickleball expert, has just announced that the new pickleball courts are now open for play."

The state-of-the-art courts will be listed on the USAPA website's "Places to Play" map (<https://www.places2play.org/>). With that listing, Idyllwild joins more than 4,000 venues in all 50 states where pickleball is played.

Said Trout, "The Idyllwild Community Center has a compelling vision, and that is to enhance the quality of life for every resident of the Hill communities and visitors to the area by developing and providing vibrant recreational, cultural and social opportunities. As of this week, the ICC program of activities will be broadened to include the most popular and fastest growing sport in the country, pickleball."

"Begun in the 60s by a couple of folks who were tired of chasing tennis balls, the actual [pickle] ball is designed to be slower than a tennis or racquet ball. That makes it easier to hit. The court is the size of a badminton court. Players still get plenty of exercise without having to cover a larger area. The game attracts adults and children who find it easy and just plain fun."

Hill resident and longtime sports director and pickleball advocate Wallace spearheaded the construction of the new courts, designed to replace the "pop-up" courts on the old tennis courts at the Idyllwild Community Center. Those courts were slated to disappear when construction began at the ICC site. Because pickleball had become so popular at the ICC site, and given the imminent closing of the site for construction, Wallace and the ICC board undertook a gargantuan effort to fund and construct new courts.

A contract was signed with Idyllwild Pines Camp and Conference Center to locate the courts adjacent to the Idyllwild Skate Park and Rick Barker Dog Park. The new courts also will be managed by ICC, under supervision of Recreation Director Bob Lewis.

"The professional, landscaped pickleball courts were made possible by private donations to the ICC and funds from Riverside County," wrote Trout in her release. "According to Janice Lyle, ICC president,

'Supervisor Chuck Washington, along with his staff, CSA 36, and Riverside County Parks and Recreation has been a champion of this project. We are also once again grateful for the community-spirited generosity of Kelly Schlenz of Idyllwild Pines for providing the site.'

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Bald eagle counts start next weekend

The U. S. Forest Service has scheduled its four bald-eagle counts for this winter, all counts being on Saturday mornings. The counts will be Dec. 9, Jan. 13, Feb. 10 and March 10.

Migrating eagles typically begin arriving in the area in late November and leave in late March or early April. During the winter, Southern California bald eagles are typically found at many of the lakes, including Big Bear Lake, Baldwin Lake, Silverwood Lake, Lake Arrowhead, Green Valley Lake, Grass Valley Lake, Prado Dam, Lake Perris, Lake Hemet, Lake Skinner, Diamond Valley Lake, Lake Matthews and the Salton Sea.

The Forest Service stresses that no experience is necessary to be a volunteer. Signing up ahead of time is not required either. Volunteers can just show up at the designated time and location. Dress should be warm to accommodate morning temperatures, and binoculars and a

watch are helpful.

Brief orientations are conducted prior to the count so volunteers know where to go and what to do.

Through radio-tracking of the bald eagles, biologists learned that some of the same individual eagles migrate year after year to the San Bernardino Mountains from Montana, Wyoming, Idaho and Canada. Some of the San Bernardino Mountains' eagles were tracked all the way to Alberta and the Northwest Territories in Canada — that is about 2,000 miles one-way, according to Ann Bowers, the San Jacinto Ranger District biologist.

"Breeding populations of bald eagles in Southern California were wiped out in the late 1950s. Since 2003, several pairs of bald eagles have decided that our southern California neighborhoods were too nice to leave — they built nests and have successfully raised families. Nesting bald eagles are now found at Lake Hemet, Lake Skinner, Lake Matthews,

and Big Bear Lake," Bowers wrote in an email.

"K-02, a female eagle hatched at San Francisco Zoo in 2000, was released on Catalina Island as part of reintroduction efforts. In 2004, she arrived at Lake Hemet, [taking] up year-round residence with the male bald eagle that was already there," Bowers wrote. The pair hatched and raised eaglet chicks for years.

During the 2014-15 nesting season, Forest Service staff at San Jacinto Ranger District noted that K-02 had not been sighted since March 2014. In December of 2014, two bald eagles were observed at Lake Hemet, neither one bearing tags.

In April 2015, K-02 was spotted flying over Lake Palmdale, confirming that the two eagles now residing at Lake Hemet were likely to be a new male and female pair. Although the new pair of eagles exhibited breeding behavior, such as incubating the nest, no offspring were ob-

served until the 2015-16 nesting season. The parents successfully fledged their first chick, according to Bowers.

As bald eagles raise families in Southern California, it is now possible to see bald eagles year-round (not just during winter migrations). Because of the influx of migrating bald eagles during the winter, the easiest time to see eagles is still between December and March.

The bald eagle count is a wonderful opportunity to catch a glimpse of the breath-taking national symbol.

The local count will be at Lake Hemet. Volunteers should plan to meet at the Lake Hemet Market at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 9, for orientation. Contact Bowers (annbowers@fs.fed.us or 909-382-2935) for more information.

Other counts that day within the SBNF will be at Big Bear Lake, Lake Arrowhead and Lake Gregory, Silverwood Lake State Recreation Area and Lake Perris State Recreation Area.

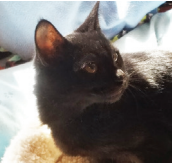

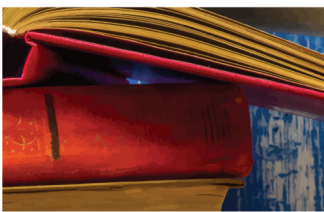

Opal and the Secret Code

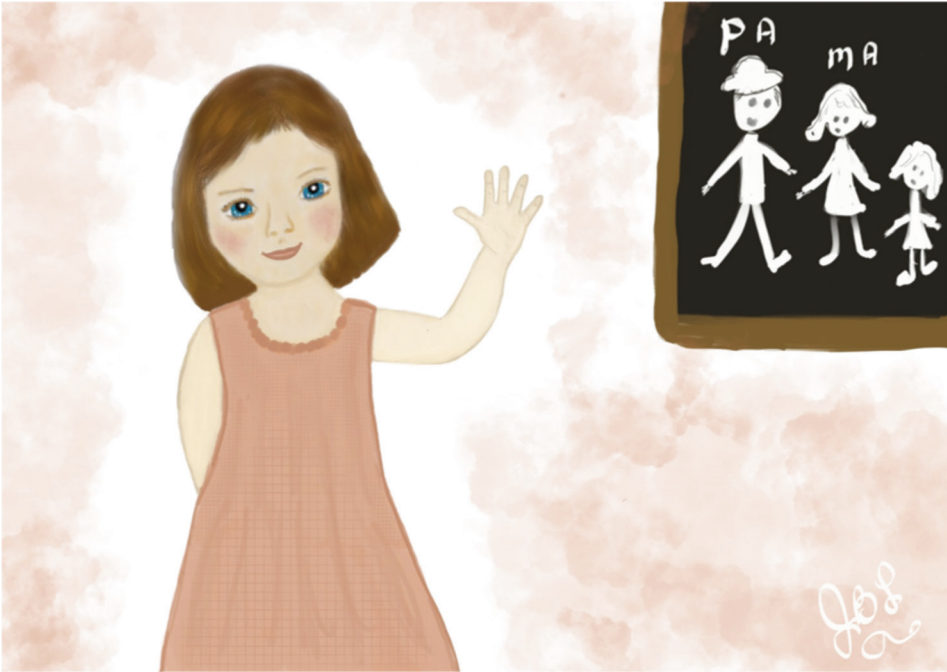
This is the sixth in a nine-part weekly series. The series is unique because it tells the true story of a deaf girl, Opal Meghan Fleming, and how in the 1930s, learning American Sign Language opened up a whole new world for her. It shows how her new language made her feel equal to others and not left out in a dark, lonely world.

Opal’s resilient spirit enabled her to overcome so much in her lifetime. She became a well-educated, dignified person loved by so many, including the author of Opal’s story. For 20 years, she was a teacher’s aide at the North Carolina School for the Deaf. She died in 2003.

This year (2017) is the 200th Bicentennial of the first American School for the Deaf. Janie, who lives in Hemet, is available to visit classrooms to help motivate kids to write their own stories and build believable characters.

Chapter Six: Teacher of the Secret Code

Today was a happy day! My brother and sister, hand-in-hand, walked to school. I was going, too, with Pa and Ma following close behind. I wasn’t going back there to be one of their students. No, I was happy be-



cause today I was going to be their teacher — teacher of the Secret Code!

Together my family and I marched up the wooden steps to the one-room school house and entered the small crowded area. Parents stood up behind the kids who were seated at their desks. The teacher stood at the blackboard motioning me to come to the front.

Soon I was standing right up front with all eyes on me. I looked around the room. I wondered if they remembered the time I gave the boy with red hair and freckles a black eye or when I put gum in the hair of the girl with the long braids or the many other things I had done.

My heart pounded.

Pa winked at me. Ma smiled. My brother and sister sat up tall and proud. I took a deep breath and remembered when I stood in front of everyone at the deaf school and how each one raised their hands in applause. I turned, chalk in hand, and wrote on the blackboard the sentences Pa had helped me with the night before:

I learned a Secret Code. Do you want to learn it, too?

Then I wrote letters on a blackboard just like my teacher had done and I showed them the hand shapes for each letter. I wrote down words and showed them how to sign each one. Everyone tried to copy me when I showed them a sign. It was fun for me to see how hard it was for some of them to make the hand shapes and move their eyes, noses and lips around. There were many giggles coming from old and young alike.

When I finished teaching, I smiled at my audience and I bowed. What a surprise! They all raised their hands and shook them in applause. I wondered how they had learned how to do that ... until I saw my brother wink at me. I guess I wasn’t the only one teaching the Secret Code.

I wonder if you will become a teacher of the Secret Code.
