Although the table for directors was virtually empty, the Idyllwild Water District's conference room was full of customers concerned

about the district's rate hike proposal.

Ironically, more former directors — John Cook, Mike Frietas and Vic Sirkin — were present than current board members. The IWD board has one vacancy, and directors Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly and Peter Szabadi were absent. Directors Steve Kunkle and David Hunt attended the workshop.

Without a quorum, General Manager Jack Hoagland told the crowd that the rate workshop could still be held, but no board actions could be taken during the session. Hoagland and Greg Henry, the consultant with NBS, the firm that conducted the rate analysis, led the presentation and answered questions from the public throughout the evening.

Ballot

The procedure to raise rates or fees for most California local governments is subject to Proposition 218, which sets the process for the public to be notified, requires the reasoning and analysis justifying the proposed increase, and allows for the public or customers to express approval or reject the idea.

Almost immediately, Sue Nash, an IWD customer and lawyer, challenged the district on its failure to include an official ballot in the notice of the proposed rate increase. She submitted letters to the board explaining her objection and requesting that the June 20 public hearing be canceled.

Nash based her challenge on California's Constitution Article XIII D section 4, which addresses the procedures for increases in assessments and clearly refers to ballots. However, Propostion 218, enacted in 1996, "created a new category of fees and charges commonly referred to as 'property related fees."

The state's Legislative Analyst's Office has stated that the language of Proposition 218 does not directly define property-related fees; but this type of fee does include water, sewer and trash. Consequently, Henry See Workshop, page A8

Cannabis regulations to be considered at hearing

Riverside County has announced that the Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on cannabis regulation within the unincorporated areas of the county.

The public hearing has been scheduled before the Riverside County Planning Commission to consider an amendment to Riverside County Land Use Ordinance No. 348, proposing to establish regulations and development standards for cannabis activities within the unincorporated areas of the county.

This amendment also proposes to establish permitting and operational requirements for cannabis activities. This public hearing is at 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 20, at the Riverside County Administrative Center.

IFPD commission goes to supervisors over 'closest unit' policy

Letter urges quick change

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commission has thrown down the gauntlet over Riverside County's failure or unwillingness to implement the policy of dispatching the closest-available unit to medical emergencies on the Hill.

Following through on their promise to take some action in response to Riverside County's policy, which states, "For purposes of closest ambulance, the AMR [American Medical Response] Pine Cove

Unit and IFPD ambulances are considered equal distance," on Thursday, May 31, commissioners unanimously approved and signed a letter to the county's board of supervisors challenging this policy.


IFPD, the county's Emergency Medical Services Agency and AMR negotiated a policy prescribing the dispatch of the closest-available ambulance to medical emergencies on the Hill (outside of Idyllwild). AMR has provided IFPD with GPS units to identify where ambulances are. These same units are in all AMR units.

The commission feels betrayed because IFPD is clearly closer to Mountain See IFPD, page A2

Fire commission studying path to convincing voters of need for higher fire fees

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commissioners discussed the means to convince twothirds of the district's voters to raise the parcel, or unit fee, last Thursday night.

Resolution 237, approved in May 1981, established a fee for fire-suppression services. The fee was based on the size of the parcel. For example, a 3,000-squarefoot lot was defined as one unit. A parcel between 7,000 and 12,000 square feet was assigned two units. Parcels larger than 38,000 square feet were assigned four units and unimproved lots were a half unit.

The initial fee was \$32.50 per parcel and has varied from \$35 to \$60 per parcel between 1991 and 2004. The maximum rate of \$65 was adopted in

Twice since then, the district has asked its voters for support to increase the fee; but this requires that two-thirds of

Now, two years later, a commission subcommittee of Henry Sawicki and Larry Donahoo has raised the question of making a third attempt to gain voter support for a higher parcel fee.

"How do we get across to the public that it's necessary?" asked Commissioner Ralph Hoetger. He opined that the department's connection with the community has lessened over his time as resident. While other commissioners did not fully agree, they were willing to examine how to improve this.

Fogle, Chris Idyllwild resident, suggested this might be attributable to regular turnover of the population. "Every 10 years, we need to re-acquaint people to the mountain and fire danger."

Some questioned whether the commission's and staff's efforts to manage the budget resources could be counterproductive on the vote. Currently, the department has several hundred thousand dollars in the bank, but no reserves for unanticipated emergencies. Would some voters believe this was a reason to reject higher fees, asked one commissioner.

IFPD bills about \$1.6 million annually emergency medical services, but collects about a quarter of this. Reasons vary, from limits imposed by Medicare, Medi-cal and service to low-income customers, according to Battalion Chief Mark LaMont.

Center — and any possible incident east or west of there — than the AMR unit stationed on Franklin Drive in Pine Cove, near the entrance to Foster Lake.

Fire Chief Patrick Reitz told the commission that this caveat was "... never discussed" in the negotiations and "... only on the next day when the policy was mailed was it there. It was a bait and switch."

Presi-Commission dent Rhonda Andrewson felt strongly and said, 'We are dealing with life issues. This is an issue we've dealt with ad nauseam. This dance has gone on and on."

Battalion Chief Mark LaMont agreed and said he has been arguing with the county for 15 years about it. Then he shared an Automatic Aid Agreement between IFPD and the county from May 2000 where it states, "It is understood that all plans, which deal with emergency response shall adhere as closely as practical to the 'closest unit' concept which forms the basis for this agreement."

"In just the last year alone, our IFPD Administration and Staff have

offered the services of the closest ambulance on several occasions only to be told to 'stand down' to 'not respond' or that these border areas are 'not in the IFPD jurisdiction,' the commission proclaimed.

The commission wants to hear back within 30 days, although there was some discussion to set a 10-day limit. The letter warns the board that every day that passes before the policy is changed risks the safety of locals and visitors to the Hill.





Hemet Unified soliciting feedback on construction priorities

Bond measure may depend on results

The Hemet Unified School District is considering a bond measure for school capital improvements. As part of the effort to secure community support and assess what the HUSD community believes are the high priority capital needs, HUSD has mailed a school facilities survey to district residents and parents of HUSD stu-

"The district and the board are considering putting a bond issue on the ballot this November. We are in the planning and information-gathering stages on this and have been for the last few months," said HUSD Trustee Vic Scavarda, who represents Idyllwild.

The survey appears on the computer screen when one goes to the district's website www.hemetusd.

In the survey, the district offers eight school facility choices to rank from most important to least important: Improve student safety and security; repair and upgrade aging schools; prepare all students for college and career; improve student access to science, technology, engineering, arts and math; provide competitive 21st-century instruction; upgrade vocational and career education classrooms; improve classrooms and facilities to accommodate student enrollment growth; and other.

"The responses are providing the district and governing board ways in which we can ensure our facilities are meeting the needs of our community," wrote Alexandrea Sponheim, HUSD's public information officer. "We want to make sure we are being good listeners and that our assessment of facilities needs aligns with the community's.'

HÚSD's current capital bond funding is nearly used, according to Scavarda. The general fund revenues in recent years have barely been sufficient to cover the district's operating expenses. Reserves have declined in the past five years and are not expected to grow soon. Consequently, construction funding, especially for a large number of projects, will need to be funded from bond revenue.

"The responses will be used to determine if there is sufficient interest in the community for such a bond, and what does the community perceive as our greatest need?" Scavarda explained.

In January, HUSD had a consultant conduct a poll of about 700 voters. Among the results reported to the board was a significant majority (greater than 70 percent) felt repairing and maintaining schools helps local property values. And 60 percent believe school classrooms are aging and in need of repair.

"School safety issues and enhanced security are big concerns districtwide, and will take significant resources to implement," Scavarda added. Further, no new school construction is planned. The budget projects for the next few years do not anticipate any substantial enrollment

If a bond measure were on the November 2018 ballot, the district will have to file for it by Aug. 10. If voters approve a new bond measure, Scavarda emphasized that it would not add to local taxes, it would simply continue the current HUSD assessment.

Governor signs new water legislation

Target is urban areas, but rural will be affected

Last week, Gov. Jerry Brown signed two pieces of legislation concerning water usage and water emergencies.

"In preparation for the next drought and our changing environment, we must use our precious resources wisely. We have efficiency goals for energy and cars - and now we have them for water," said Brown in a press release.

This legislation establishes guidelines for efficient water use, and a framework for the implementation and oversight of the new standards, which must be in place by 2022. Among their goals are the fol-

- Creating incentives for water suppliers to recycle water.
- Requiring both urban and agricultural water suppliers to set annual water budgets and prepare for drought.

"The measures impose a number

of new or expanded requirements on state water agencies and local water suppliers, and provides for significantly greater state oversight of local water suppliers' water use, even in non-drought years," commented attorneys for Best Best & Krieger law firm.

Senate Bill 606 primarily orders the State Water Resources Control Board to establish long-term standards for per-capital daily indoor residential water use. The state already has a law requiring a 20-percent reduction in urban per capita water use.

The new standards will establish an indoor, per-person water use goal of 55 gallons per day until 2025, 52.5 gallons from 2025 through 2029 and 50 gallons daily in 2030.

Although most of the bill addresses urban water usage, one section affects the local water districts. Currently, a water district is authorized to declare a water shortage emergency condition within its service area when it "finds and determines that the ordinary demands and requirements of water consumers cannot be satisfied without depleting the water supply of the distributor to the extent that there would be insufficient water for human consumption, sanitation and fire protection."

SB 606 will now require the water agency to declare the water emergency.

The second bill, Assembly Bill 1668, also is primarily focused on urban water distributors. However, this bill requires California's counties to include small water suppliers and rural communities in their assessment of potential water shortag-

By Jan. 1, 2020, the SWRCB is to propose recommendations concerning the implementing countywide drought and water shortage contingency plans, which should address small water suppliers and rural communities. These recommendations may be included in the county's local hazard mitigation plans.

(W)ith the passage and signing of these bills, we can now check the box next to 'conservation is a way of life' in California and take another key step in implementing the governor's California Water Action Plan," said Timothy Quinn, executive director of the statewide Association of California Water Agencies in a press release after Brown signed the bills.

Republican party shrinking in California

Third District remains bastion in county

The number of registered Republican voters continues to decline in California. Last week, the Secretary of State released the final registration numbers before Tuesday's primary election.

Statewide, 44.4 percent or 8.4 million voters registered as Democrats. But surprisingly, the number two choice is no longer "Republican." As of May 21, 25.5 percent of registered voters declared "No Party Preference." This is almost 85,000 more voters than the 4.8 million selecting Republican.

The number of "No Party

erence" voters has been growing for the past 20 years. In 1998, only 12.4 percent or 1.8 million declined to choose a party. During this period, the Democratic party has remained the first choice of about 45 percent of

However, Republican registered voters has fallen from 35.8 to 25.1 percent of registration.

In the last four years, total voter registration has grown from 17.7 million to 19 million, a 7.3 percent increase. The Secretary of State's Office reported that 75.7 percent of eligible voters have registered, which "... is the highest percentage of eligible citizens registered to vote heading into a California Gubernatorial primary in the past 64 years."

In Riverside County, 373,367 voters have registered as Democratic. Republicans number 337,550.

The third-largest contingent is "No Party Preference" with 220,898 registrants. No other party has more than 35,000 registered voters.

Since the November 2016 presidential election, total Riverside County registration has declined about 35,000 voters. Both major parties have incurred a decline in registration, while the NPP has gained 6,000 voters.

Within Riverside County, the 3rd District has the fewest registered Democrats. About 62,000 of the district voters are Democrats, compared to 86,700 in the 5th Dis-

However, the 3rd District is home to more Republican (86,600) and NPP voters (51,200) than any of the other four districts.

Have you ever celebrated those wacky celebratory days and months like National Popcorn Poppin' Month (October) or Kiss & Make Up Day (Aug. 25), seriously?

This month has some doozies: Go Barefoot Day (June 1), Best Friends Day (June 8), Eat Your Vegetables Day (June 17) and World Music Day (June 21).

June is Children's Awareness Month. Is that to remind us that we have children in case we've forgotten them the other 11 months of the year?

It is also National Iced Tea Month, but I don't need to be reminded of that. Iced tea is my drink of choice yearround. If I don't have any within reach at any given time during the day, I get antsy.

Besides being Eat Your Vegetables Day, June 17 also is Father's Day. Is it coincidental that those two fall on the same day? Yes, it is. Father's Day is not always June 17 but EYVD always is.

If you're wondering where I'm going with this, I'm sliding into a patriotic subject of June 14, Flag Day.

Flag Day first was celebrated in the late 1800s at schools before being celebrated in June 14, 1891, at the Betsy Ross House in Philadelphia, and then being officially adopted by several states.

Because of many nationwide celebrations of Flag Day, it was officially established by the federal proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916, and then later designated National Flag Day by an Act of Congress under President Harry Truman on Aug. 3, 1949.

No law exists about how to fly or display the American flag, but a National Flag Code was written in 1923 by representatives of a large number of organizations, under the auspices of the American Legion's National Americanism Commission. Not properly noticed and explained

I attended the May 30, Idyllwild Water District workshop on the rate changes to be voted on at the June 20, board meeting, but came away with more questions than

First, why were the property owners and tenants not sent a ballot, as required by Proposition 218? [Cal. Const. Article XIII C § 4].

Second, what impact will these new rates have on the district's Water Shortage Contingency Plan? If the new rates are approved, will the drought plan become invalid and will the district then need to do a new 218 rate study, notice and ballots when there is another water shortage in the district?

Pursuant to all of our rights under the Brown Act, I have emailed the district my 218 protest (name, reasonable identification of the parcel where I pay the water bill, and my opposition or support to the proposed assessment). I also requested that the two above questions be put on the agenda and answered by the board and/or their attorney before voting on the proposed rate changes.



You state that the Climate "[L]obby believes wrongly that the burning of fossil fuels is the major cause of climate warming" today. All burning, whether it be gasoline in our vehicles, petroleum or coal in our power plants, or wood burning, produces the greenhouse gas

Rumble-strip project on Highway 371

Caltrans will make safety improvements near Cahuilla in two locations on Highway 371 between highways 74 and 79 to place centerline and shoulder rumble strips, and install enhanced visibility, 6-inch striping.

The first location is from Wilson Valley Road to Cary Road (mile-post marker 60.2 to mpm 67.7) and the second area is from Kirby Road to Highway 74 (mpm 72.8 to mpm 77.1.)

The estimated \$756,000 project, awarded to Jabre Contracting Inc., was scheduled to begin Monday, May 14, weather permitting, and is anticipated to last fewer than 30 working days.

Initially, the work will be done between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday to Friday, excluding holidays. One lane will be closed at a time with one-way lane traffic control in place. Motorists should be prepared to stop and plan for delays.



Americans With **Disabilities** Act business compliance

Don't think your business is exempt from Americans With Disabilities laws because you have an old or historic building. Last year, 3,826 complaints/pre-litigation letters were served on businesses within Riverside County, among the counties receiving the highest amount. The majority of these complaints were accompanied by large fines and lawsuits.

The majority of the Idyllwild businesses fall under Readily Achievable Barrier Removal. This applies to all businesses that are called public accommodations, such as a merchant or restaurant, because they serve the public. Businesses that are not open to the public must still comply with the ADA when their facility is altered or renovated.

Historical buildings are required to comply with the ADA, per CHBC Section 8-602, unless strict compliance will threaten or destroy its historical significance or character-defining features. A business no longer can claim unreasonable hardship for not complying with the code.

If a person files suit against your business under Related Accessibility Requirement and correct the violathe Unrun Act, you can be hable for statutory damages for each and every offense for a maximum of three times the amount of damage, but no less than \$4,000, and the only thing the plaintiff can recover is attor-

However, Civil Code 55.56 provides for statutory damages of \$4,000 if the plaintiff is denied full and equal access to a place of public accommodation on a particular occasion or visit, not \$4,000 per each violation, as previously allowed under the Unruh Act, Civil Code 52(a).

Your best defense against a lawsuit is to comply with the ADA. There is no grandfather clause in the ADA, only what is called "Safe Harbor," which means under specific situations, you don't have to modify your facility to meet requirements unless you undertake renovations or addi-

There is some protection for small businesses who have an inspection under the Certified Access Specialist program. The benefit of an inspection for a qualified small business is: You can request an early evaluation conference, receive a 90-day stay-of-court proceeding, and refrom \$4,000, if you are found in violation of a Construction and business owners should attend. The course is free.





Trial set for Marcus Green

A tentative trial start date in the case against Marcus Green has been set for July 2.

Green, 53, of Thermal, was the driver of a car that went over the side of Highway 74 in May 2016 resulting in the death of a 5-month-old child. The Riverside County District Attorney's Office filed two felony charges murder and willful child cruelty — as well as gross domestic violence.

In April, Green's attorney, Michael Rowlands, deputy public defender, filed a motion to set aside the indictment because of irregularities when he was initially charged. However, on Monday, June 4, Judge Dean Benjamini ruled against the defense motion and set the trial date.



Idyllwild customers want to pursue possibility of consolidating water districts

One of the issues discussed during the Idyllwild Water District rate workshop was consolidation of the three local water districts — Idvllwild, Fern Valley and Pine Cove.

Greg Henry, of NBS, who conducted the rate study, explained that IWD needed a sufficient reserve balance in case of unexpected, major and expensive catastrophes.

"Smaller districts need

districts have more ability to spread risk," he stated.

In response, Dwight "Buzz" Holmes, Idyllwild resident and vice chair of the Idyllwild Arts Academy's Board of Trustees, said, "If bigger has more ability to share risk, isn't that an argument for consolidation? That's the elephant in the room."

Vic Sirkin, a former IWD director, has opined that consolidation could reduce the cost of operating the three districts by hun-

to hold reserves. Bigger dreds of thousands of dollars. Customers of all three districts have raised concerns about the rising water rates; therefore, there may be some interest in pursuing this course.

> "But they can call us. I'm not hearing from the boards in the other districts. There's no interest in consolidation," said IWD General Manager Jack Hoagland.

> He also added that he had reached out to the other two districts, but neither Robert Hewitt, president of the PCWD nor Trisha Clark, president of the FVWD, has heard from anyone on the IWD board or staff about this issue.

> Sue Nash, an Idyllwild customer, expressed disappointment that none of the IWD directors have "expressed interest in consolidation or making an ef

fort in that direction."

However, Henry emphasized that consolidation would require time. It was not included in his analysis and would unlikely affect costs for the next five years.

Yet, Marge Muir, who owns and manages property within IWD, urged the board to pursue this option. She told the group that in the 1980s, there was much more cooperation among the districts. As an example, she described the work with the presence of the joint powers agency as an example that almost led to Fern Valley sharing the treatment plant.

"This is a 21st-century solution." Holmes main-

responded to Nash that a notice, such as IWD mailed to property owners and customers, was what the state courts have found sufficient for fee increases.

Cost analysis

The rate increase was predicated on NBS's projection of future revenue needed to operate the water and sewer districts, Henry said. A multiplier, based on recent increases for different types of expenses, was applied to the operating costs such as salaries and benefits, and utilities.

Also, based on direction from the general manager and board, NBS assumed an annual capital-improvement budget of \$400,000 for water and \$300,000 for sew-

This resulted in an estimate that water revenue would need to grow from \$1.27 million this year to \$1.66 million in fiscal year 2022-23. The sewer revenue would also need to increase \$117,000, from \$630,000 to \$747,000.

This is just the revenue needed from fees. The property-tax revenue is separate, as are the stand-by fees.

But the board also wanted to increase the proportion of revenue it collected from its base monthly fee as opposed to the actual water-usage fee. The result is a complicated set of rate changes that can vary from customer to customer depending upon their meter size and water

The commercial rates, as well as for Idyllwild Arts Academy, are simpler and no water tiers are applied to these usages.

Objection

Since the need to increase the rates derives from the need to grow revenues in order to provide these services, several customers suggested, strongly, that IWD should first look to options that would reduce current operating costs before asking the public for more money.

For example, Henry said the capital program for water includes replacing more than 21,000 feet of pipe over this period. The cost would be about \$200 per foot, when a contractor performed the work, and \$120 per foot, when the district used its own staff.

Several people urged Hoagland to review the plan and install more pipe with in-house staff. While he did not object, he noted that staff could be interrupted completing the pipeline replacement if an emergency occurs elsewhere. Consequently, for projects in the commercial district, he prefers to hire a contractor who can start and finish the job within a specified period.

When asked if residential customers were subsidizing commercial customers on these large pipeline projects, Henry replied that commercial customers tend to use more water and, therefore, pay their share through the usage fees.

IWD's combined reserves are currently \$3.7 million, according to Chief Finance Officer Hosny Shouman. This spring, the board lowered its goal to \$4.1 million from \$5 million for combined for water and sewer re-

The district could use more of its reserves for the proposed construction, but Henry warned that increases the risk to the district and customers if an unexpected catastrophe occurred.

Waste treatment plant

One major unknown is the remaining operating life of IWD's waste-treatment plant. Hoagland has expressed concerns about the life expectancy of the plant almost since arriving at IWD.

Earlier this year, an outside consultant suggested replacement costs in the range of \$4 million. Hoagland has reviewed these plans and believes these estimates are too high. He opined that \$2 million is a better estimate.

While the rate analysis assumed \$300,000 annually for sewer capital projects, the IWD budget proposal indicates that the sewer capital-improvement program will be closer to \$75,000 annually.

If the treatment plant were to require unexpected and sudden work, the source of funding would likely be a combination of sources, according to Henry. Reserves would be available, but not likely sufficient for a sewer project that large. Therefore, debt would have to be investigated, too.

Fire spotters keep sights on 'Jewel of the Mountains'

Idyllwild residents live in one of the most wildfire-prone forests in the country, with vivid, scorched reminders of past blazes dotting the evacuation routes from the Hill. But Hill communities are far from being proverbial "sitting ducks," with no recourse to protecting their homes, properties and lives.

Oftentimes, the only thing that stands between a trail of smoke in the San Bernardino National Forest and a potentially catastrophic blaze is a lookout in one of the seven operational towers located there.

In addition to ground and air crews, equipment and other firefighting resources, teams of trained volunteers many of them our neighbors—keep watch over the forest.

The late George Hall, an Idyllwild resident, volunteered for 20 years at Black Mountain Lookout located 13 miles from Idyllwild, off of Highway 243. A plaque mounted on a rock nearby commemorates his hard work and dedication.

Hall was a member of Ed Harrison's corps of volunteers — now numbering 36 — at Black Mountain. "We're like the lifeguards at the beach or the alarm bells [in a school or building]," Har-

rison said. "Lookouts help the Idyllwild community by

watching for smoke ... when a fire is just a single branch on a single tree-I've seen it many times. "Those fires don't

tend to make the 5 o'clock news, but if we weren't spotting the smoke, they would be on the news because they would be consuming thousands of acres. We can get a crew out when it is a \$100 fire instead of a million dollar one." Last October, Black

Mountain volunteers spotted the Azalea Fire near the Girl Scout camp north of Idyllwild.

"It was reported by someone on the trail," Harrison said, "but volunteers Blair Smith and Paul Marak took photos from the tower and called in directions to the fire.

A recent photo of the Black

Mountain Lookout tower.

"The Lake Elsinore blaze in October was way out of our area of responsibility, but volunteer Sig Fertig called it in. Normally, we only report fires in or threatening our forest."

For the 2017 season, Black Mountain called in three smokes within the forest and 12 threatening the forest. Bob and Norma Romano are the team leaders for lookouts at Tahquitz Peak tower. Paul McDonnell leads

volunteers at Red Mountain Tower. Both towers look out over Hill communities. Volunteers began staffing the towers May 20, work-

ing minimum eight-hour shifts once a month from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. when the facilities close, but many volunteers donate far more of their time.

The Southern California Mountains Foundation coordinates all tower volunteers — about 300 — including those at Butler, Keller, Morton and Strawberry.

"We partner with the U.S. Forest Service," Pam Morey said. "They own the towers, but we think they're ours. Ask any volunteer, they'll tell you, 'We own them.'

We maintain them on donations, things like extra lumber, paint, batteries, prepaid cards, anything. Help is always needed."

Every year, from late May to Veterans Day, lookouts notify forestry officials when they spot smoke.

"We look for threats to the surrounding communities and the forest, fires started by a lightning strike, or a manmade cause along a roadside where someone can see it right away and get on their cell phone and report it," Harrison said.

"But the lightning strikes are more in unpopulated areas, and from our vantage point, we can spot a trail of smoke."

At an elevation of 7,772 feet, Black Mountain tower volunteers can see the Santa Rosa Mountains, Mt. Palomar Observatory to the south and San Gorgonio Pass to

On days when Santa Ana winds have cleared the air, Catalina and San Clemente islands in L.A. and San Diego counties are visible.

Fertig, a volunteer at Black Mountain for almost sev-

en years, recollects how Black Mountain helped break a

"A few years back ... in July 2014, [team leader] Ed received a phone call from a gentleman at the Mt. Wilson Observatory in the San Gabriel Mountains. He asked Ed if someone was on the tower.

"Norm Vargas was observatory staff. He said, I have a [21-inch-by-34-inch] mirror that I brought from home and I want to flash it to see if your tower guy can see it.'

"He flashed it and the guy in the tower was able to see the mirror. That was a record — about 79 miles as the crow flies — direct line of sight. His previous record was 34 miles. On a clear day, that's how far you can see."

Vargas' extraordinary feat continues to amaze Fertig, but the routine of scanning the forest is what originally drew him to the tower.

"I was retired and I thought it would be a really neat and helpful thing to do. I really enjoy it.

We receive 24 hours of training and spend one eighthour shift with a current volunteer who has a checklist to make sure we know all the procedures and are competent to do them on our own. We also greet visitors, about 2,750 a year.

When we arrive, the first thing we do is drive through the Boulder Basin Campground about a halfmile from the tower and count how many spaces are occupied and put that in our log. If I see wildlife — mostly deer and bobcat — I'll put that in the log, but bear warning signs are posted.

"Inside the tower, when we scan and see smoke, we record its color and use an Osborne Fire Finder — a 360-degree wheel that sits in the middle of the tower to determine its distance, bearing, and we also determine a nearby landmark.

"The Osborne has a map of the entire area which we can see — and actually we can see more than that. We use a hand-held radio to convey the information to the San Bernardino forest dispatch, which decides how to re-


Fertig scans for smoke every 15 minutes and prepares weather reports — usually twice daily — recording wind direction and speed, ambient temperature and relative humidity.

We call that in to the forest service to help firefighters on the ground prepare for their day."

With a great deal of pride, Harrison tells the story of how one of our lookouts spotted a smoldering leaf pile a couple of years ago behind a cabin in Idyllwild.

"The fire crew went out and was able to extinguish the fire. It was an absentee owner, but then the fire crew came to the tower to thank our volunteer for spotting it. They were amazed he could spot the smoldering from that distance."


"Mysterious sets of circumstances preceded the writing of "The Cabin Elves of Idyllwild," recalls author Bob Greenamyer. "When we moved to Idyllwild full-time and replaced our wall heaters with a forced-air system, we were left with holes in our walls. That's when the idea came to disguise the holes, inside and out, with little doors with colorful knobs and hinges that didn't open; or so we thought.

"We awoke one sunny day to find a tiny canvas bag filled with miniature trinkets tied to one of the little door knobs and pinned to the bag was a note. Penned in tiny print was an offer from the elves of friendship, wisdom, advice for forest life and gifts for our grandchildren. That's when we knew for sure ... we had cabin elves,' Greenamyer mused, "and that was only the beginning."

The elves taught the Greenamyers many obscure secrets of forest living, and through it all they became fast friends. Then it occurred to him to create a kids' story about their cabin elves. With the help of his literary family, because little can be accomplished alone, the story took shape.

Greenamyer consulted a website called "People per Hour," identified an artist and together they worked remotely for about three months to create authentic illustrations. Self-published on Create Space, the book is available through Amazon and at select stores in Idyllwild. A reading of this magical story by its author will take place at 1 p.m. Saturday, June 9, at the Idyllwild Library, followed by a craft.



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
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Idyllwild Pharmacy changes hands, not services
