Fireworks illegal on the Hill

And in most of Riverside County

"Fireworks are illegal in Riverside County," stressed County Fire Chief Daniel Talbot at a press conference last week. "Except for certain cities, they are prohibited in all other areas of the county."

Fireworks may be bought and used in the following cities: Blythe, Cathedral City, Coachella, Desert Hot Springs and Indio.

Riverside County Sheriff Stan Sniff reinforced Talbot's warning that use of fireworks in county areas can result in confiscation and possibly arrest.

On the Fourth of July, nearly two out of every five calls to the Sheriff's Department are about illegal use of fireworks, according to Sniff. Responding to these calls delays responses to serious needs.

Sniff also warned that when guns are shot into the air, the bullets come down and can cause damage, "That's a violation," he added.

"The District Attorney stands behind law enforcement. It's illegal to have fireworks in Riverside County," said Managing Deputy DA Stephanie Weissman. "If you are caught possessing fireworks you have purchased somewhere legally, but now you have brought them here where it is illegal, you will be cited and may be prosecuted. If you start a fire using these fireworks, you will be prosecuted for a felony offense."

Awaiting Idyllwild agreement on provider contract

The distance between the Idyllwild Fire Station and the American Medical Response unit near Foster Lake is no longer considered "zero," with respect to Riverside County dispatching an ambulance to a medical emergency on the Hill.

The county changed the policy that said, "For purposes of closest ambulance the AMR Pine Cove Unit and IFPD ambulances are considered equal distance," and made it effective as of June 28.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department, Idyllwild Fire Department, the U.S. Forest Service and the Riverside County Fire Department are holding a community meeting at 10 a.m. Monday, July 9, at the Idyllwild Fire Station.

Law enforcement and fire officials plan to discuss the risk and threat of fires on the Hill and what can be done to mitigate them.

"There is risk to public safety from campfires in unauthorized areas given the current forest conditions," said Lt. Zach Hall of the Sheriff's Hemet Station. Inadvertent campfires may have been the cause of two recent fires, and perhaps more.

On the Sheriff's Facebook page, he added, "While this meeting is not about managing homeless encampments, it is about the real danger open fires present and what we can do together to reduce the risk."

Hall and the fire officials would like to discuss efforts to help the homeless in the Idyllwild area. Some assistance may contribute to the risk of fire.

For example, offering a homeless person food such as raw meat, which has to be cooked, requires a fire. Left unattended, this fire might spread. Hall stressed

that he is trying to offer the homeless services available through county agencies.

"The IFPD, RVC Fire/Cal Fire and USFS, in conjunction with the Sheriff, are working cooperatively to reduce the fire danger to the Hill," wrote IFPD Chief Patrick Reitz. "One part of this effort is reaching out to the homeless population in the area to identify potential risks, identifying hazardous behaviors that could lead to a threatening wildland fire while educating and connecting individuals to needed services."

Homelessness is not a crime, but sometimes this behavior can increase the risk of fire. The Sheriff's Department does have a Homeless Outreach Team, which offers a variety of services, including rooms and apartments to the homeless within the county.

Hall and fire officials want to offer suggestions on how assistance can be shared without creating a fire threat.

They invite, "... all community members, residents, faith-based organizations, help/service centers and business owners."

IFPD raises ambulance fees

Financial issues dominated the last meeting of fiscal year 2017-18 for the Idyllwild Fire Protection District's commission last week.

The commission unanimously (3-0) approved a 5-percent increase in the ambulance-service rates. Commissioners Larry Donahoo and Jerry Buchanan were absent.

The new Advanced Life Support cost will be \$1,628, an increase of about

\$80. In the first 11 months of 2017-18 (through May 31), IFPD made 343 medical transports, 62 percent of the medical emergency calls to which it responded.

The commission also approved a resolution opposing the "Tax Fairness, Transparency and Accountability Act of 2018," which was expected to be a proposition on the November 2018 ballot, but was withdrawn on June 29.

The authors of the measure intended "... to require a two-thirds vote of the Legislature at the state level, and two-thirds See Ambulance, page A8

Hill residents love to vote

Turnout significantly higher than county

and state

Once again, Hill residents from Pine Cove to Garner Valley have demonstrated their attention, if not devotion, to civic responsibility.

For the June primary, the turnout in the four Hill precincts — Garner Valley, Idyllwild, Mountain Center and Pine Cove was 57.6 percent. Turnout in Riverside County was 35 percent and statewide turnout was 37 percent.

Depending upon the race, the choice of candidates differed slightly from the rest of the county or state. Even on the Hill, Idyllwild showed a greater tendency to cast a ballot for a Democrat than the other three precincts.

For example, in the gubernatorial race, 53.5 percent of the Idyllwild ballots checked one of the Democrats; however, in Garner Valley 71.4 percent of the ballots were cast for a Republican candidate.

In Idyllwild, Gavin Newsom garnered nearly 40 percent of the votes compared to only 22 percent in Riverside County and a third statewide. In contrast, John Cox received 56 percent of the Garner Valley votes compared to onethird of the votes in Riverside County and a quarter throughout California.

Cox also was the leading voter getter in Pine Cove and Mountain Center, although he did not collect a majority in either precinct.

Congressman Raul Ruiz, the incumbent Democrat for the 36th District, earned 50 percent or more of the votes in Idyllwild, Mountain Center and Pine Cove. But Garner Valley voters preferred Republican challenger Kimberlin Brown. She got 36 percent of the vote and collectively, the five Republican candidates captured more than 70 percent of Garner Valley's votes.

The vote for state senator favored incumbent Republican Jeff Stone, although the differences between Idyllwild and Garner Valley were still pres-

Stone was the top vote

getter in each of the four precincts. In three, he received the majority of votes cast. Nearly 75 percent of Garner Valley voters favored him. But his total in Idyllwild was 46 percent, only six votes more than Democrat Joy Silver.

The Hill is included in the 71st Assembly District. Incumbent Randy Voepel had two challengers fellow Republican Larry Wilske and Democrat James Elia. Ninety percent of the district is in San Diego County and Voepel easily won a spot on the November ballot against Elia.

However, Hill voters are not supportive of Voepel. Idyllwild and Pine Cove voters gave a majority to Elia. Voepel got about a quarter of the votes in those precincts.

Both Mountain Center and Garner Valley gave a plurality of votes to Wilske, who actually got the most votes in all of the Riverside County precincts in the Assembly District. Although Voepel received a third of the votes in Garner Valley, Wilske still out polled him with 43 percent.

In the nonpartisan District Attorney's and Sheriff's elections, the Hill's

votes were a little more consistent with the rest of Riverside County.

Hestrin captured nearly 60 percent of votes in all four precincts. In Garner Valley, he collected nearly 80 percent.

Countywide, Hestrin earned 66 percent of the vote. In Idyllwild and Pine Cove, he got about 60 percent, 70 in Mountain Center and 80 in Garner Valley.

Except for Mountain Center, which easily favored incumbent Sheriff Stan Sniff, the three larger Hill precincts favored challenger Lt. Chad Bianco. His largest percentage in these three was 43 percent of the Garner Valley voters.

Throughout Riverside County, Bianco got 36.3 percent and Sniff was second with 31.6 percent. They will compete through the summer and fall with the November election deciding the next county sheriff.

Former Hemet Police Chief Dave Brown got about 20 percent of the county vote and about the

same on the Hill for sheriff.

On the five propositions, the Hill and the county were together on all except Proposition 68, the natural resources bond measure. Fifty-two percent of county voters cast a "No" ballot, although a majority of the state approved it. However, only Garner Valley, with 70 percent, opposed the measure. The other three Hill precincts supported it.

Zero-policy immigration issue is the motivator

"Galvanized by the images and voices of immigrant children separated from their parents by President Trump's immigration policies, hundreds of thousands took to the streets Saturday in major cities and small towns across America to expressed outrage that they hope will carry over into the fall election," reported the LA Times, June 30.

Idyllwild residents were no exception. Rallying support for "Families Belong Together," Harmony Monument acted as ground zero at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 30, leaving little question that upwards of 175 residents demand immigration and refugee policy changes at U.S. borders.

Led by a consortium of local community activists, the Idyllwild march became a flashpoint for placards and posters, with the chanting, "No hate! No Fear! Immigrants are welcome here!" Bronwyn Jones states, "I love this mountain village and the wonderful people who live, love and work here."

Marching and chanting in unison, the group circled through Strawberry

Creek Square, across the front of the Fort, up North Circle Drive and ultimately returned to the monument. Participants sporting Idyllwild Indivisible T-shirts mingled between participants carrying signs saying "What if They took your Children?" and "Practice Aloha." Temple Har Shalom fielded a sign reminding "First they came for the children," followed by "We are all family," "I care! Do U?" "Proud Americans do Care" and "Proud Americans for family unity," "Human Rights, Truth and Compassion." Even children carried signs saying, "Families belong together." "Resist; Grab 'Em by the 2018 Mid-Terms" and "We are all Immigrants" were common themes.

What is the takeaway from an epoch mobilization of free speech across the U.S. and in Idyllwild under the banner "Families Belong Together?" The National Domestic Workers Alliance Political Director Jess Morales Rocketto stated, "I have literally never seen Americans show up for immigrants like this." But the subject is far

Perhaps the answer lies in the fact that to date, MSNBC reports about 500 families have been reunited, yet thousands of children remain estranged from their families.





Fatal traffic collision on Highway 243

At about 6:25 p.m. Monday, June 25, on Highway 243 near mile marker 19.7 in Poppet Flats, a motorist stopped his vehicle at a dirt shoulder to take photos of the panoramic San Gorgonio Pass below, according to the California Highway Patrol. As the driver walked to the edge of the road, he saw an overturned vehicle in the thick bushes below.

The driver called 911 and CHP responded with Cal Fire to investigate. Upon arrival, CHP and firefighters accessed a damaged green 2010 Toyota FJ Cruiser. After a

search of the Toyota and immediate surrounding area, first responders were unable to find any occupants.

CHP requested assistance from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department K-9 unit. Deputies subsequently located the body of Robert Fulton, 63, of Idyllwild, about 200 feet from the vehicle at 9:10 p.m.

CHP officers are investigating the cause of the collision but have yet to determine an exact cause. Drugs and/or alcohol have not been ruled out as a contributing factor(s) in this collision.

At 1:20 a.m. Tuesday, June 26, on Highway 74, 1 mile east of Keen Camp

Road, Giovani James, 26, of Perris, was driving a green 1998 Mercury Mystic west on Highway 74. The road curved to the left and the vehicle went off the road

At about 11 a.m. Sunday, a Cadillac was turning left onto Highway 371 from westbound Highway 74 at the same time a white Dodge truck was traveling eastbound on Highway 74, then they collided. No one was injured. Idyllwild Garage towed both vehicles. PHOTO BY JENNY KIRCHNER

Kimberly Cooke, 63, of Banning, driving a red 2016 Toyota 4Runner north on Highway 243, allowed her vehicle to drift off the road onto the right shoulder and into the rock mountainside. The driver was transported by American Medical Response to Desert Regional Medical Center with minor injuries. There was damage to the vehicle's front end and it was towed to Idyllwild Ga-

I just finished the annual budget for Idyllwild House Publishing Co. Ltd. last Friday, Jack and I had our shareholders' and directors' meetings Saturday, and I feel a tremendous pressure off my back so I can relax tomorrow, the Fourth of July.

Because of our readers and those who see the benefit of advertising in our publications, we are finally in the black after 10 years. That is a tremendously good feeling to know that this business has a future.

But even with that good feeling, I would be remiss not to say how saddened we are here at the Town Crier over the murders of five newspaper employees at The Capital Gazette in Annapolis, Maryland. All of us in journalism are shaken by this story. Our hearts are broken by this news.

We all know someone who has a grudge against us. Fortunately, most of those people never take such an action as that man did in Annapolis.

But, we did have a man like that last year who threatened one of our reporters with bodily harm. The man was arrested and charged, then given a misdemeanor sentence that required an anger management course. Apparently, that did no good because he took to venting his anger on-

What we do in this small town that is more valuable than anything else we do is hold those in government posts accountable to the people they serve. We report on other important issues that affect your lives, too, such as wildfires, traffic collisions and weather events.

Does that make us "the enemy of the people?" No, it doesn't. We who work here are good people who contribute to this community both here at work and outside of work. We, and those journalists in Annapolis, don't deserve to be called "the enemy of the people."

And so many of you have made that clear to us through your support of this past nearly one year of Memberships.

I just stopped this column to take a call from a man in Redondo Beach whose subscription just ran out and who berated me for our Membership model that is keeping this newspaper here for the people of this community. Most of you see the value of the paper being here — even if you spend less for it at the store or pick it up for free at the Help

Tim Grobaty, who writes for the Long Beach Post, recently wrote an opinion piece for PBS in which he pointed out the importance of community newspapers: "To add to the woes is the fact that many politicians see the media as overzealous watchdogs. And they're right to think so; their fear is warranted, because that's what the small newspapers do so well: Keep a steady eye on the opportunistic city government, the shady school board, the double-dipping water commissioner. And there's a direct relationship between a town's size and its paper: The smaller the city, the more important its paper is to the community."

That is also true here and was also true in Annapolis. Small-town newspaper journalists and employees don't get paid much. It is hard work. But we do this because we love it. When I write this column, when our reporters write their stories, they write to you, the reader. We serve you, in a sense. We want you to be informed about what affects

ANOTHER POINT OF VIEW

Editor's note: Alice Alveraz is volunteering at the Port Isabel Detention Center in Los Fresnos, Texas.

Today (Saturday) I worked as an attorney. As many of you know, I'm here in Texas working as a volunteer medic at a clinic for families who have just been released from ICE. Happenstance and fate connected me yesterday to a group of attorneys who were meeting with parents separated from their children and detained in Port By Jack Clark Isabel Detention Center.

Our job today was to gather information about where their children were at, how the kids were, amount of contact (if any), the status of their asylum claim and if they had been subject to coercive efforts to give up their asylum claims in exchange for being reunited with their children — some as young as 6 months.

This is a prison — no phones allowed, no jewelry, no water/coffee. I brought nothing but two pens and a notepad, and was locked in a 10-foot-by-6-foot room from 1:30 p.m. to 8:20 p.m. Each parent (referred to by their number and not name) was brought to me in prison-like at-

What I learned:

- Mothers were told that if they signed a piece of paper (with no explanation of what it was) they would see their children soon (ostensibly, this was to coerce them to forfeit their asylum claim).
- I was told mothers had been in for 10 to 20 days and had no contact with their children at all.
- Some had a phone call from their child but did not know where they were.
- · Many thought that if they were deported, their children would be kept here in the U.S. (turns out this is happening — see recent Reuters article).
- Some parents did not speak Spanish or English well enough to have a credible/reasonable fear interview without violating due process (but did not know how to ask for a translator or that they had a right to a transla-
- Mothers and fathers had been separated from their children for up to 18 days already.
- Mothers and fathers are provided a phone number to call for attorney help but they do not have money to make the call. (I gave them my toll-free number).
- Almost all the mothers cried when asked about

Finally, every mother and father I spoke to was BECKY CLARK, EDITOR moved and many cried when I told them that today, in every major city all across the U.S., people were in the streets protesting the taking of children. That the many good people of this country were fighting — in the streets and in the courts — to fix this terrible wrong.

> I know there is more, but I am exhausted. This took all my stamina, legal knowledge, language skills and empathic efforts in attempting to be there 150 percent for every person I spoke to.

If you are not well out of your comfort zone, you are not doing enough.





Legislation replaces three measures on November ballot

The potential number of propositions Californian voters might have had to vote on in November was 15. However, on Thursday, June 28, the sponsors of three measures withdrew them after the state Legislature approved legaccomplishing their goals and Gov. Jerry Brown agreed to sign the

Soft-drink manufacturers were upset with local governments. They were opposed to recent and future impositions of local taxes on sodas. Consequently, they spent millions to get a proposed proposition eligible for the fall ballot. The measure would have required all new state and local taxes and fees to be approved by two-thirds of the voters

This would apply to any taxes, not just on soda. So, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission passed a resolution earlier in the week opposing the proposed measure because of possible implications on its future parcel-fee measure.

The Legislature approved Assembly Bill 1838 to prohibit the increase or levy of a tax or fee on groceries through 2030. It also repeals or rescinds any increases enacted after Jan. 1, 2018.

In signing the bill, Brown noted that only four out of 482 cities in the state were considering a

soda tax. Nevertheless, he wrote, "Mayors from countless cities have called to voice their alarm and to strongly support the compromise which this bill represents."

State Sen. Jeff Stone opposed the bill and referred to it as another deal with special interests. He offered his respect to the proponents of the tax, especially as a means to help reduce child obesitv.

On Monday, July 2, the California Medical Association and the California Dental Association announced that they would sponsor an effort to place an initiative on the November 2020 ballot to restore a statewide tax on sugar-sweetened drinks. The associations estimated that this tax would raise \$1.7 billion.

"In the face of growng public support for local health taxes on sugar-sweetened beverages, the billion-dollar global soda industry last week put corporate profits ahead of public health and forced an ultimatum upon the leadership of California's state government," said Dustin Corcoran, CMA chief executive officer, and Carrie Gordon, CDA chief strategy officer, in a statement released with the announcement.

"Big Soda may have victory but, for the sake of our children's health, we cannot and will not allow them to undermine California's long-term commit-

Start studying: 12 measures on November ballot

Twelve is how many propositions will be on the November ballot and three other possibilities were withdrawn Thursday. Besides U.S. senator, offices such as governor, lieutenant governor, state senator, assembly member, sheriff, school district and perhaps local offices, 12 measures, which range from bond approval to eliminating California in favor of three states, will lengthen the already-crowded ballot.

These include four bond measures totaling more than \$16 billion.

Below are brief summaries of the 12 propositions on the ballot this No-

Proposition 1

This authorizes the state to borrow \$4 billion to help build affordable housing, including loans to veterans for farms, homes and mobile homes.

Proposition 2

This proposition allows money from a 2016 \$2 billion bond to be used for housing for homeless. A legal challenge wanted to limit the use to mental-health services.

Proposition 3

This is another bond measure for \$8.9 billion to fund infrastructure projects. These will be for safe drinking water, water quality, water conveyances, groundwater sustainability and storage, surface water storage, dam repairs, and watershed

Supervisors add money for public safety

They also approve fiscal year 2018-19 budget

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a budget, with amendments, for fiscal year 2018-19, which started this week.

The board added \$5.3 million to its initial budget. All of the new funds will be for public-safety agencies. The Probation Department received \$1.8 million. In response to District Attorney Michael Hestrin's request at the June 11 hearing, Executive Officer George Johnson recommended an another \$1.5 million for attorney staffing.

Another \$2 million was allocated to the Sheriff's Department specifically for augmenting deputy-patrol staff in the unincorporated

In his report of the recommended additions, Johnson told the board, "The Executive Office supports the Sheriff's commitment to identify and implement a variety of solutions to increase the number of patrol hours in the unincorporated areas, until hiring catches up to meet the demand."

Supervisor Kevin Jef-

fries (1st District) also asked the purpose of the \$2 million, ensuring it would be for unincorporated-area staffing.

With the amended funding, the budget for 2018-19 is about \$805 million.

Jeffries also raised the question about the contract with consulting firm KPMG. He asked about the contract's future and whether there would be any unused funds.

Chair Chuck Washington (3rd District) responded that he has discussed this issue with Johnson and expects him to report to the board in July about the contract's status, successes, funds and future needs.

In other action, a majority approved sending a letter to Cal Fire Director Ken Pimlott requesting a reduction of 12 positions within the next four months. County Fire Chief Daniel Talbot said he opposed the staffcut.

The 12 work on payroll, personnel and accounting, services that are crucial to firefighters, he felt. "Without these services, it will be a challenge for us to make payroll on time," he said.

Washington While agreed with Talbot and opposed the letter, the vote was 3-1 to sign and send it to Cal



Trial date set for Marcus Green

A trial start date in the case against Marcus Green has been set for Aug.17.

Green, 53, of Thermal, was the driver of a car that went over the side of Highway 74 in May 2016 resulting in the death of a 5-month-old child. The Riverside County District Attorney's office filed two felony charges murder and willful child cruelty — as well as gross domestic violence.

In April, Green's attorney, Michael Rowlands, deputy public defender, filed a motion to set aside the indictment because of irregularities when he was initially charged. New Medicare cards are arriving

The U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services is mailing new Medicare cards to protect the safety and security of people with Medicare benefits. The cards no longer contain a person's Social Security number, but rather a unique, randomly assigned Medicare number that protects the identities of people with Medicare, reduces fraud, and offers better safeguards of important health and financial information.

CMS has begun mailing the new Medicare cards to people who currently have Medicare benefits in California. As soon as people receive their new Medicare card, they should destroy their old Medicare card and keep their new Medicare number confidential.

People with Medicare and their caregivers can visit medicare.gov/newcard to find out when new Medicare cards will be mailed to their area. They can also sign up for email notifications about the new card mailing and check the status in their state.

Les Gin newest Idyllwild Water director

Editor's note: At its June 20 meeting, the Idyllwild Water District Board of Directors selected Les Gin as the fifth director. He replaces Catherine Dearing, who resigned in May. Since Gin did not campaign for the position, the Town Crier interviewed him so the community would have some knowledge of the new water di-

He will have to stand for election in 2020 for the final two years of the term.

Gin has been an Idyllwild resident for less than two years, unlike David Hunt, the most recently appointed director, who has been a lifetime Idyllwild resi-

Gin from Arizona is extremely happy with his choice of Idvllwild for retirement. "When we visited Idyllwild in the summer of 2016, we fell in love with it,"

His interest in volunteering has not waned since settling here. Already, with assistance of his partner, Holly Parsons, he has contributed to several Art Alliance of Idyllwild events, including offering his backyard as a staging corral for the AAI's new deer herd.

"I want to connect with the community," Gin said.

While Gin does not have extensive experience with water production or treatment, he does have years of service on public nonprofit organizations and financial acumen, both of which he believes will benefit IWD.

His lack of "hands-on" water experience will not prevent him from learning about water issues and forming an opinion. But it will be the process of forming that decision and involving the public that will be his contributions to the board, he said.

"I believe in an inclusive environment," Gin said. "We all have a stake in its ownership and success. Of course, opinions matter, but through education we learn the facts, not hearsay.

"I try to be an active listener, not trying to form a judgment early," he added. "I want to defuse emotional responses and not make promises before understanding."

Besides cultivating an interaction with the customers and fellow board members' views, Gin recognized that a divided board seldom helps its community.

"After we make a decision, we need a united front," he said. "We can't undermine each other."

Only 66 years of age, Gin has devoted nearly two-thirds of his life to the banking and financial profession. His background makes him comfortable with numbers, including budgets. It motivates his seeking facts for problem solving and

While he abstained from the vote on raising the IWD water and sewer rates, his first opportunity to cast a director's vote, he did support the proposed 2018-

19 budget.

"I have to have numbers, and voting for the budget just made sense to me," he said.

And Gin hopes the power of numbers will help the board educate and enlighten the community. "We need to be able to explain why we're doing what we're doing. Decisions can't be drafted in the dark with no transparency.

"We should be transparent. We're

serving the community," he said, offering to employ the bidding process more to keep the community informed of who and why they are doing their work.

"Sometimes the best long-term decision does not come with the cheapest short-term cost. The cheapest bid may cost more in the long run," he noted from his own experience using contracts.

But Gin is not unaware of local water issues and the district's responsibilities to its customers. He has lived through a very wet winter in 2016-17 and now an extremely dry season in 2017-18.

These two years have been just the opposite and it is very concerning. We may have to do something this summer,"

He even opined about consolidation. Referring to his predilection for numbers, "How do you support three water boards, three executive positions, three administrative staffs? We had nine separate banks in Phoenix, which were merged into one and I was one of the presidents without a job."

He advocated finding the best practices at each district and sharing those mechanisms so that everybody on the Hill benefits.

'It's a community. It's all our water and it needs to be safe and plentiful," Gin urged. "At the end of the day, all each of us does is turn on the tap and want safe water."

The ALS contract between EMD and an ambulance provider sets the standards, conditions and terms of operations. These are the same throughout the county, and include clinical standards, data reporting and other information to review patient care, according to Barton.

"Being compliant with the law and good patient care are not mutually exclusive," Barton stated.

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz acknowledged that the agreement was awaiting IFPD's concurrence. But he said it has taken months to get drafts back and forth.

While he also acknowledged that EMD had made many compromises, the map issue was not the only remaining difference. "There are a few other issues. If I take it back to the commission, I don't think they'll support it." But he did offer to put it on the commission's agenda for

However, at the comhe then mission's June meeting, a day after the Mountain Center session, Commission President Rhonda Andrewson said she had several problems with the agreement and wanted to meet with Barton before the contract returned to the agenda.

After the meeting, in response to a Monday question from the Town Crier, Barton said he "... would like to complete that ALS agreement and get it back to the Board of Supervisors before the end of August. The 2018 county EMS plan update is due to the state EMS Authority by Aug. 31, 2018, and we would like to report it has been completed.

Both Pearson and Barton were pleased with the meeting and its results. When told that the "Closest ALS Ambulance" policy had been modified, Pearson responded, "He kept his word; that's good."







Idyllwild Storytellers to showcase at Middle Ridge

Wordsmiths — poetic and lyrical — rejoice! Forums for your work are expanding to include Idyllwild Storytellers, a monthly series hosted by performing poet Brian Michael Tracy. This time-honored tradition places storytelling in all forms squarely in the center of an eclectic gallery at a time when spoken word and song craft have much to offer a world in transition. Each month will feature renowned storytellers from multiplicities of genre, an open-mic session will follow and, of course, spirits will flow.

Following the guest speaker, Idyllwild Storytellers invite artists of all meter and measure to the open mic, as long as the selected work inspires and tells a story. Lyrics accompanied by acoustic instrumentation also are summoned to add their unique mystique.

Tracy is no stranger to Idyllwild's art scene. A longtime pilgrim to these mountains for creative nourishment and a student in the Idyllwild Arts creative-writing program, he and his wife recently made Idyllwild home.

Following a five-year period studying Depth Psychology, Tracy guest-lectured at Pacifica Graduate Institute's, Ph.D. program on the relationship between psychology and poetry. Tracy also authored a series of webinars discussing the healing power of language. His work has appeared in The Wallace Stevens Journal, Plainsongs, California Quarterly, Depth Insights and Yogi Times, and on spoken-word radio programs throughout the United States and Canada, including stations KPFK in Los Angeles and CIUT in Toronto.

Tracy is the author of three books of poetry, "Driving With Dante" (Conflux Press 2007), "The Distance Between Shores" (Conflux Press 2009) and "Opaque Traveler: A Dream Sequence in Verse" (Tebot Bach 2012). He also has released three critically acclaimed CDs of music and poetry, "Midnight Tea" (2007), "Blackbird Ballads" (2009) and "The Mystical Prism of Its wisdom and its lore Being" (2016).

"I think as an artist, I write to make sense of the Where your cup is waiting

world. I view poetry as the informed translation of a Where all that you can't see speechless soul. I think we're all creating on multiple levels. No matter the occupation or avocation, we give ourselves to the world," Tracy muses.

To the question, how does poetry change the world? Tracy responds, "Art gives us new possibilities to feel, see and understand by expanding individual and cultural consciousness. Really good art will invite rediscovery because of the layers. We could say the metaphor of poetry exists when it's detonated."
