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Paying for wildfires

Wildfires are not unexpected events for Hill residents. Major fires, such as the recent Cranston Fire and the 2013 Mountain and Silver fires, are not annual disasters, but frequent enough to keep residents alert and prepared to react.

The Cranston Fire burned more than 13,000 acres and the Mountain Fire burned more than twice that acreage. While huge compared to the many smaller wildfires on the Hill that start and are quickly controlled, these fires are relatively small compared to the huge conflagrations that have burned millions of California acres in the past two years.

Each recent year, California fights to contain the largest fire in its history. In 2018, the Mendocino Complex has consumed nearly 475,000 acres. Less than 12 months ago, the Thomas Fire burned 280,000 acres.

According to Cal Fire, from Jan. 1 to Sept. 9, 616,000 acres of state lands have burned compared to 236,000 during the same period in 2017. What is frightening is that the five-year average for the first nine months of the year is 175,000.


Idyllwild Arts hosts College Fair, all HS students invited

Ruiz leads effort to protect newspapers from damaging tariffs on newsprint

In what some contend was an effort to curb "fake news," President Donald Trump's Department of Commerce imposed higher tariffs on newsprint imported from Canada. This would raise the cost of paper, thus having a negative effect on the national newspaper industry.

The initial proposal was to raise tariffs on this product 22 percent, but in a lenient moment, the agency decided on 16.88 percent as the exact amount and the new tariffs were imposed in January.

"The tariffs increase the cost of newsprint by as much as 30 to 35 percent, though the impact on publishers is highly uneven, with some chains in better shape and the dwindling independents most at risk," according to Ken Doctor's July 20 article for the Neiman Lab, a journalism

However, in a surprise,

on Aug. 28, the International Trade Commission voted to eliminate the tar-

The ITC action came days after local Congressman Dr. Raul Ruiz and a group of bipartisan representatives wrote a letter to the ITC urging it to overturn the decision, which was damaging newspapers, especially small local papers throughout the country.

"Local newspapers bind our communities together, providing critical information on everything from public meetings and emergency preparedness to the major issues residents are concerned about," said Ruiz in a press release announcing the ITC decision. "I am proud to support local papers and the communities they serve."

In the letter, members of Congress asked the ITC to intervene. "The International Trade Commission has the power to prevent imposition or reverse these harmful tariffs by making a final negative determination at the conclusion of its investigation into whether imports have caused or threaten to cause material injury.

"Already, this trade remedy has had a negative impact on the market for newsprint, has caused job losses at newspapers across the country and has limited the quality of news available to countless communities," the members wrote.

In January 2018, the Department of Commerce implemented new tariffs that caused the price of newsprint to jump to its highest level in decades. Small and medium-sized newspapers across the country were forced to cut costs by laying off staff and reducing circulation. Combined with declining readership and revenues, many local newspapers were on the verge of shutting down.

Ruiz's involvement followed a letter he received from Idyllwild Town Crier Co-publisher/Editor Becky

Clark, in which she urged him to find a means to help small local papers.

Decrease in Surety Bond fees

The U.S. Small Business Administration announces the first fee decrease in Surety Bond Guarantees in 12 years. The fee decrease will be in effect for guaranteed bonds approved during fiscal year 2019, taking effect Oct. 1, and ending Sept. 30, 2019.

The program is reducing the fee from 26 to 20 percent of the bond premium charged to the small businesses and reducing its contractor fee from \$7.29 per \$1,000 of the contract amount to \$6 per \$1,000 of the contract

Reducing the SBG program fees will not only directly help small businesses, but also will incentivize surety companies and their agents to increase support for small businesses in the marketplace," said Peter C. Gibbs, Acting Director of the Office of Surety Guaran-

Under its SBG program, the SBA guarantees bid, payment and performance bonds for small and emerging contractors who cannot obtain surety bonds through regular commercial channels. SBA guarantees contracts up to \$10 million, including the streamlined QuickApp application for those up to \$400,000.

There are 34 participating sureties and over 350 active agents in the SBG program. On average, completed surety bond applications are reviewed and processed in less than two days.

Hemet Unified School District board meets in Idyllwild

Leslie Schelly honored by board

The Hemet Unified School District Board of Trustees held its Sept. 4 meeting at Idyllwild School.

After the roll call, Vicky Lovett, an eighth-grade student at Idyllwild School, led the board and audience in the "Pledge of Allegiance."

The first action of the evening was the announcement that the board had selected Leslie Schelly, secretary at the school, as the September recipient of the Governing Board Recognition of Excellence Award.

Idyllwild Trustee Vic Scavarda nominated Schelly for a variety of reasons. Not only is she the current secretary, but she was a very involved parent as her three children — Logan, Chad and Chloe — attended Idyllwild School on their way to graduating from Hemet High School.

Scavarda presented her with the award and a \$500 certificate to be used toward the district program of her choice.

As he made the award, he shared Schelly's accomplishments with the audience.

"Idyllwild's attendance has vastly improved due to Leslie's efforts," he said. It has now reached the 96-per-

"Mrs. Schelly is a true asset to Idyllwild's positive office environment. She is usually the first friendly face students and parents see when they enter the office," Scavarda continued. "She is extremely conscientious and conducts herself with the utmost integrity. Leslie truly serves as an outstanding ambassador for Idyllwild School."

During the board meeting, Assistant Superintendent Vincent Christakos presented the unaudited final financial report for fiscal year 2017-18, which ended

Net revenues were nearly \$12.6 million greater than the original estimate (in June 2017) of \$256.9 million. Expenses for the year were \$278 million, which was about \$9.6 million more than the initial budget planned.

For the year, HUSD had a \$8.3 million deficit, which reserves covered. Salary agreements, textbooks and utilities resulted in the expenses growing during the

Beginning FY 2018-19, HUSD has a reserve balance of \$26.2 million, which is expected to grow over the next four fiscal years, Christakos told the board.

All of the trustees thanked Idyllwild School Principal Matt Kraemer for the afternoon, food and dinner. Each complimented the school, too.

When Trustee Rob Davis spoke, he also mentioned concern about Senate Bill 328, which the state Legislature passed the week before. It restricts the starting time for high schools and middle schools to no earlier than 8:30 a.m. Gov. Jerry Brown has not decided whether to sign the bill, which Sen. Anthony J. Portantino, D-La Cañada Flintridge, introduced.

In a press release after its passage, Portantino said, "I am beyond thrilled that our children's health came first today. It is fundamental to put the well-being of our students first and I am glad that this important measure is moving forward. From day one, this has been my top priority. The science and results are clear, our teens are healthier and perform better when school

Last year, Portantino authored SB 328 based on strong research and the recommendation of the American Academy of Pediatrics, whose policy statement advised school districts to change the school day start time for middle schools and high schools to no earlier than 8:30 a.m. Studies have confirmed that insufficient sleep in teenage adolescents poses a public-health risk. A later start time has resulted in more on-time attendance, higher grades and graduation rates, according to Portantino's press release.

Davis felt school start times should be the decision of local school boards rather than the state Legislature. Each district should make the decision based on the needs and services provided to its students and par-

Further, if it applied to all school activities, some, such as some athletic programs, might be harmed, Da-

And Trustee Stacey Bailey opined, that the "zero" period, which precedes the first class of the day and is often used for extra class time or special subjects, might be eliminated. And a later school day could impose difficulties for parents or students getting home and time to study.




The legislation does exempt the "zero period" from the school day, which otherwise could not start before 8:30 a.m. for middle and high schools. If Brown signs the bill, it would go into effect July 1, 2021, or the date on which a school district's collective bargaining agreement that is operative on Jan. 1, 2019, expires, whichever is later.

The bill did not garner overwhelming support in the Legislature. The Senate passed it 23-14 and the Assembly voted 41-34 in favor of it. Local representatives were split. Sen. Jeff Stone opposed the bill and Assemblyman Randy Voepel supported it.

The Riverside County Office of Education was the only county opposing its passage.



Pine Cove is different from Idyllwild

One should first ask, "Why does IWD want to con-

solidate? Is it out of the goodness of their hearts or would it bring some advantage to the customers in Pine Cove or Fern

The answer to all of the above is a resounding no. Consolidation is an advantage to only one small group of individuals, IWD and its board. Everybody else would foot the bills for years of poor management. Its ex-manager couldn't even come up with the state-required license to operate a water plant.

More importantly are the million-dollar-plus improvements it now must make to clarify its water so it can get its own customers to even drink the stuff.

It's the latter point that I believe is the compulsive motivation behind its desire to consolidate.

First, by consolidating, it gains a larger income base to which it can spread the cost of these upgrades across. This reduces the cost to its own customers, but those who live in areas presently covered by the other two water districts will be saddled with helping to pay for the mistakes made by others in a district to which they had no relationship.

Second, and of greater importance, by consolidating, it gains access to more sources of water it can use to dilute its water source, reducing the clarity problem, thus either eliminating or reducing upgrades it is presently being forced to plan for.

For others on the Hill in the other water districts not involved, be forewarned that if it happens to us, it can happen to you as well. The Pine Cove Water District has done an excellent job for many years keeping both the water quantity and quality high.

It installed fire hydrants across the community and, more importantly, it understands Pine Cove. It knows we're not a tourist area like Idyllwild is. We're a bedroom community with families and retirees. We have a gas station and a sundry store.

IWD, as an organization, cannot understand our needs on the same level as our local people do. It deals with restaurants and other businesses that use more water in one day than most of us use in a year.

In closing, I quote what is often tossed around more as a joke with little consideration given to it, but I ask that you indulge me and really think about it. "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."


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

A series of classes for family members who care for older adults with Alzheimer's, stroke, Parkinson's and other chronic conditions is being offered for free through the Riverside County Office on Aging. Attendees will receive information on community resources, acquire skills to cope with changing demands and better understand how dementia affects personality and decision

The Care Pathways program began the week of July 9, in Riverside, Moreno Valley, Menifee, Murrieta, Hemet, Perris, as well as the Coachella Valley.



Among the hundreds of bills the state Legislature did not pass was Senate Bill 845. This proposal would allow water customers throughout the state to voluntarily give or "tax" themselves to provide a source of funds for assisting disadvantaged communities to install projects to ensure safe drinking water for their

The amount would have been about 95 cents per bill, but individuals could decline to pay the "voluntary tax." However, water districts would have had to modify their accounting and collection software to receive and send the funds to the state.

And in November, California voters will be able to support Proposition 3 with another \$500 million allocated for safe drinking water for disadvantaged communities.

When the current legislative session ended at midnight Aug. 31, neither a statewide water tax nor "voluntary tax" had been approved.

Wildfire legislation awaiting governor's decision

The horrendous wildfires that have ravaged Northern and Southern California, especially in the past two years, have gotten the Legislature's attention.

In June, at the request of Gov. Jerry Brown, legislative leaders established the Wildfire Preparedness and Response Conference Committee, to study and consider legislation "to strengthen disaster preparedness and ... appropriate policies to respond to the increasing fire danger.

While the committee's creation was to address wildfire issues facing pubic utilities, such as preparation, equipment, accountability and liability, the committee quickly realized that solutions were more comprehensive than just the scope of utilities' responsibility. Further, despite Pacific Gas and Electric's threat of bankruptcy without legislative assistance, the members were not about to be steppingstones for PG&E or other utilities.

By midnight Aug. 31, when the legislative session ended, the committee had in the waning moments convinced enough of its colleagues to support several bills, including a major revision to Senate Bill 901.

But one of those was not the Hill's State Sen. Jeff Stone, who was a member of the committee. Since the final bill language was only available days before the session ended, Stone promised Committee Chair Bill Dodd (D), with whom he has a good relationship, that he would vote to bring it to the Legislature's floor, but could not be relied on to support the whole bill until he had read its language.

"My priorities were to make sure the victims of fires were taken care of," Stone said. For example, he wanted language to expedite rebuilding of homes, after the owners had filed insurance claims and were awaiting those funds. "I wasn't elected to represent PG&E," he stated.

said. Ultimately, Stone abstained in the final Senate vote.

Brown has not signed any of the legislation yet. But since he encouraged the Legislature to address the utility issue, most pundits assume he will approve these initial

The hundred-page bill authorizes utilities and the state to do more to prevent and to prepare for wildfires. Investor-owned utilities will have to file more comprehensive plans about their actions to prepare for wildfires and when the fires threaten equipment, such as protocols for de-energizing electric lines.

It appropriates \$200 million annually for five years for forest health, fire prevention and fuel reduction. This would be used for thinning and more frequent prescribed burns. Stone felt this was not a long enough period to improve forest health.

"It will take at least 10 years to clear 129 million dead and dying trees," Stone opined. But the five-year commitment seems misleading to Stone, who argued that one session cannot commit future Legislatures to provide the funding. He preferred that the \$1 billion be appropriated now, set aside and use \$200 million from the reserve for each of the next five years.

The bill also creates new exemptions in the Forest Practice Act to encourage and make tree harvesting easier and more effective. The largest trees on each site would be protected. The exemptions are for fuel reduction and small landowners

Public agencies or nonprofits funded with fuel reduction grants may sell logs from the construction of fuelbreaks. This section of SB 901 reminded Stone of the work benefiting the Hill, which the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council does.

While he supports streamlining to allow more thinning to collect more air-quality data.

The final 48 hours of the session was crazy, a frenzy, Stone and fuel reduction, Stone felt the five-year limit was too short. "Especially since it takes a couple of years to develop the plans," he noted. And this was one reason he abstained in his floor vote for the bill. "I wanted to reduce the onerous application process to private property owners trying to clear brush.'

> Besides additional funding, Cal Fire will have a Wildfire Resilience program to assist nonindustrial timber owners, providing more assistance to local agencies on the "Fire Risk Reduction Community" list.

> This bill authorizes using financing to reduce the utilities' direct costs associated with damages for wildfires. The financing would be available for the amounts borne by ratepayers of the 2017 wildfires or of future fires. The use of a rate-recovery bond is the securitization of a cash-flow stream generated by a fee charged to utility customers.

> Those who opposed SB 901 usually referred to these provisions as a PG&E bailout.

> These provisions, to which consumer advocates objected, allow utilities to assign some costs directly to customers and to borrow money to cover other expenses through bonds repaid with higher utility bills — if state regulators deem it is "just and reasonable" based on an array of factors, including the utility's conduct.

> The bill also establishes the Catastrophic Wildfire Cost and Recovery Commission within the Governor's Office of Planning Resources. This commission, composed of five members, will hold public meetings to assess, report and make recommendations surrounding the issues of catastrophic wildfire costs, especially affecting utilities

> Other bills related to wildfires also passed. SB 1260 removes several limitations and impediments to prescribed burns. It encourages the burns as a tool to strengthen forest health. It also authorizes funds for air resource boards

Prop 1: Borrowing for veterans' housing programs

Editor's note: On Tuesday, Nov. 6, a general election for governor, lt. governor, and many other state and local offices will be held. Included on the ballot will be 11 propositions. The Town Crier will briefly describe the measure and identify who supports and opposes each proposition from this edition through the Oct. 25 edi-

Proposition 1 would authorize \$4 billion in bonds for housing programs for veterans. This would include loans, grants and construction projects.

Prop 1 is just one of four bond measures on the November bal-

The specific allocation of the \$4 billion follows:

Home Loan Program, which offers loans to veterans for purchasing homes, farms or units in cooperative developments, and mobile

• \$1.5 billion for the Multifamily Housing Program, which offers loans for the construction, rehabilitation and preservation of rental housing for persons with incomes of 60 percent or below the area's median income;

 \$300 million for the Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account, which offers grants for infill infrastructure that supports high-density affordable and mixed-income housing;

\$300 million for the Joe Serna Jr. Farmworker Housing Grant Fund, which offers grants and loans for farmworker hous-

• \$300 million for the Local • \$1 billion for the CalVet Housing Trust Matching Grant Program, which offers matching grants to local housing trust funds:

\$300 million for the Self-Help Housing Fund, which provides forgivable loans for mortgage assistance, the development of multiple home ownership units and manufactured homes;

• \$150 million for the Transit-Oriented Development Implementation Fund, which offers loans and grants to local governments and developers for housing projects near transit stations; and

• \$150 million for the Home Purchase Assistance Program, which offers loans to low- and moderate-income homebuyers.

The state would have to appropriate \$170 annually for 35 years to repay the bonds.

In support of Prop 1, Gerald G. Wilson, past state commander, Disabled American Veterans, Department of California, wrote, "A safe, stable, affordable home is how we can provide a lifetime of support for veterans of all generations and their families."

Other supporters wrote. "Prop. 1 will address rising homelessness in our neighborhoods. Families pushed to the financial brink are living in cars, doubled and even tripled up in overcrowded housing. Families with no other options turn to overwhelmed shelters.

Gary Wesley wrote the official argument found in the state voter information guide in opposition to Prop 1. He raised questions about the state's overall indebtedness.

As of Aug. 1, the major committee supporting Prop 1, Affordable Housing Now, a coalition of housing California, California Housing Consortium, State Building and Construction

Trades Council of California and Silicon Valley Leadership Group has raised about \$2.1 million. The largest donation has been \$250,000 from the Chan Zuckerberg Advocacy.

Two firms, Essex Property Trust of San Mateo and Members' Voice of the State, have given \$150,000 each. During August, employees of Essex also have contributed another \$19,000.

Employees of Novogradac and Company, with headquarters in San Francisco, have given \$34,250 since Aug. 1. Some of these contributions have come from other states such as Massachusetts, Ohio and Texas, and other states, besides California.

No committee has reported any funding to oppose the propo-

SCE to prepare for, reduce wildfire disruptions

On Monday, Sept. 10, Southern California Edison unveiled its plan to improve the safety of its equipment, especially within fire-prone areas, and reduce the threat of exacerbating wildfires. The entire initiative, which will cost about \$580 million, has been submitted to the California Public Utilities Commission for approval.

SCE has designed a multi-phase program, with much to be accomplished by 2020 and more in the following years.

'We're going beyond traditional state practices," said Phil Herrington, senior vice president of Transmission and Distribution at SCE in a press teleconference Monday afternoon. "We'll employ the leading mitigation measures from around the world." Some of the actions have begun to be implemented or installed, such as weather stations and high-definition cameras.

During the teleconference, Herrington elaborated on the different aspects of the plan. Hardening of infrastructure, increasing situational awareness and enhancing operational practices are the three areas SCE intends to strengthen with these investments.

Within the next two years, the

miles of overhead power lines in high fire-risk areas with insulated wire," and another 3,400 miles by

This work is designed to reduce the chances of "arcing and sparking" from tree limbs, metallic balloons or palm fronds, which frequently blow onto power lines, he explained. Also, fire-resistant composite poles will be installed to support the additional weight from the new, heavier wires.

Another improvement will be installing almost 16,000 current-limiting fuses. This device can interrupt the power in a circuit more quickly, thus reducing heat, than current fuses. The current-limiting fuses also will segment circuits when isolating a problem. Thus, an outage will affect fewer customers.

Situational awareness will be improved using the high-definition cameras and better weather data. Some of these have already been installed.

The enhanced operation practices will involve more vegetation management, remote inspections and power shutoffs.

While the CPUC has issued new rules on tree pruning in high fire-risk areas, SCE plans to do more. According to the press release, the utility will "inspect all trees within 200 feet of its

utility plans to "replace nearly 600 electric facility, and remove or p trees that could strike the equipment." While beyond the current clearance requirement, Herrington noted that during high winds, their proximity presents a threat.

SCE also will make greater use of infrared technology to conduct inspections of remote distribution

And, as the Hill experienced in December 2017, safety-power shutoffs, although a last resort, are part of the initiative. But better information and greater amelioration of the necessary inconvenience will be employed.

SCE has developed a new emergency outage notification system. Further, for those in the midst of an outage, SCE will provide "Portable Community Power Trailers." At the trailers, "customers can charge their personal devices (mobile phones, tablets, laptops, etc.) ..."

"It's a new normal since 2017. Already, 2018 is an active wildfire year," Herrington said. "Changing state policies and recent legislation underscore [these needs].'

If the CPUC approves these actions, SCE estimates the average customer bill will increase \$1.20 monthly. For customers using California Alternate Rates for Energy assistance program, the estimated increase will be 81 cents.

increasing in number and size for years.

"As part of its fire preparedness, SCE began installing an initial 125 solar-powered weather stations this summer in communities throughout its 50,000-square-mile territory to pinpoint local weather conditions in high fire risk areas. Two have been installed [on the Hill," wrote Mary Ann Milbourn, the SCE media advisor, in an email.

The weather stations have software that enables them to "... forecast weather conditions down to a third of a mile area," she wrote in an article.

The stations have sensors that detect several weather elements present at the station's location. It is capable of measuring solar power, ambient air temperature and relative humidity, and wind speed.

The station includes a microprocessor that converts the sensor's data into a local weather status. The station is powered with solar energy, but includes batteries for cloudy or rainy periods. This data is transmitted to the SCE Situational Awareness Center, and the station has a cellular antenna to identify weak cell-signal coverage.

These data help SCE make the decisions to turn off power to certain areas when the threat of wildfire could harm or exacerbate the conflagration's size or direction, according to Milbourn.

"All of this information will be at the meteorologists' fingertips in the Situational Awareness Center as well as for their day-to-day forecasting. These tools are expected to strengthen SCE's current prevention strategies and increase coordination with first responders and affected communities when a wildfire starts," she added.

The combined state and U.S. Forest Service total-burned acreage in 2018 is 1.3 million acres.

As the number and size of the fires continue to grow, the cost to combat them and protect lives and properties grows.

Last week, Cal Fire Director Ken Pimlott wrote the state legislative leaders that the Emergency Fund appropriation of \$442.8 million for fiscal year 2018-19, which started July 1, is approaching zero. In two months, Cal Fire has already expended nearly \$431.9 million.

"Cal Fire resources have been deployed to a number of new wildfire incidents in recent days, including the Sliger Fire in El Dorado County," he warned.

Consequently, Pimlott requested an emergency injection of \$234 million "to ensure sufficient authority exists to respond to wildfire activity that occurs between September and November."

Firefighting costs for the Forest Service or the Bureau of Land Management have not yet been released. But this funding will affect other programs this year. The change in procedure to eliminate using other program funding does not begin until fiscal year 2020. Federal firefighting costs in 2017 were nearly \$2.5 billion.

But firefighting agencies are

not the only ones to bear costs of fires. Home and business owners suffer losses, too. After the December 2017 wildfires, nearly 16,000 claims were filed for losses amounting to more than \$1.4 billion. About 6 percent of the claims were for total loss. In July 2018, the Carr and Mendocino fires have created nearly 9,000 claims, totaling \$820 million.

The Cranston Fire burned 11 residences, of which seven were destroyed, and another five minor structures were destroyed, according to the Riverside County Fire Department's report.

Five of the burned homes were in Idyllwild, on Deerfoot Lane. Many have asked why these burned and the town was spared.

Idyllwild Fire Chief Patrick Reitz and Cal Fire Division Chief Bill Weiser acknowledged that no special investigation was done immediately after these homes burned. The Cranston Fire was still a major threat, moving around the town through Mountain Center.

But a number of reasons, not one single cause, contributed to this loss. The wind direction and speed might have changed at that moment. These homes were at the top of three steeper slopes, or fire intensity and direction may have changed, construction materials of the buildings and local fuels all might have contributed to a different situation and result.

In addition, a propane tank exploded while firefighters were in the area. The explosion was audible at the Keenwild Fire Station, according to Weiser. Consequently, to ensure the protection of onground firefighters, the fire commanders ordered them to step back and be sure no other explosions were imminent. In addition. the air attack teams were warned of the area where the explosion occurred.

During these moments of ensuring firefighter safety, the fire may have spread more quickly, but as Reitz said, "So many variables are involved, it is impossible to say without an investigation."

Reading by 'Dead Girls' author Alice Bolin

"Everyone loves the dead girl," writes Alice Bolin in her new collection, "Dead Girls: Essays on Surviving an American Obsession" (William Morrow/HarperCollins).

It's a provocative claim that leaves Bolin, a University of Memphis visiting assistant professor of English, with some 'splaining to do — perhaps during her appearance on the Idyllwild Arts campus at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 4, in the Fireside Room at Nelson Dining Hall.

In a recent New York Times (https://tinyurl.com/ y8holfac), Carina Chocano's review of Bolin's "deliciously dry, moody" book suggested that the dead girl is "a blank slate onto

which a male protagonist can project his fantasies, mostly about himself."

Bolin is remembered as dry but not moody by Idyllwild Arts students and colleagues who enjoyed her stint as poet-in-residence from 2014 to 2016. For all her good humor, though, Bolin was unsettled enough by the first year of HBO's popular "True Detective" series to publish the well-received essay that led to her book.

She argued that "The Dead Girl Show" — "Twin Peaks" and "Pretty Little Liars" girls are other examples relies on "two odd, contradictory messages for women": girls are "wild, vulnerable creatures who need to be protected from the power of their own sexualities." Yet they must "trust no dad" because "father figures and male authorities hold a sinister interest in controlling

girl bodies and harming them."

Provocative, indeed, as well as challenging. Bolin's incisive, wide-ranging intelligence won't permit her to avoid challenges. Anyone who visits the Idyllwild Arts campus on Oct. 4 to listen to her read will hear the challenge, and the intelligence.

Bolin lives in Memphis, Tennessee. Special areas of interest for her critical essays about literature, country music and popular culture include murder, makeup, social media, poetry and 20th century women writers.

She earned her master's in fine arts in poetry from the University of Montana, has published many poems and stories, and has been nominated for a Pushcart Prize. "Dead Girls: Essays on Surviving an American Obsession" is her first book.

Admission is free and open to the public.






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Adult Coed Softball




