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IWD pegs new general manager, chief operation officer

In the posted agenda for the Idyllwild Water District's Jan. 16 meeting are the items for hiring the new general manager, Michael Creighton, and a chief operation officer, Joel Sears.

Creighton has worked at Mt. San Jacinto College as a water technology instructor. His salary will be \$104,833 annually.

Sears was hired to fill the new position of chief operation officer. However, another item on the agenda will review this position and reclassify it as field supervisor. He will oversee both the water and sewer departments. Sears' salary will be \$92,791 annually plus benefits.

Both agreements have a clause augmenting the salary by \$500 monthly if they reside within 6 miles of Idyllwild.

The board also indicated it would consider arranging a meeting for the community and customers to meet the two new employees.

Governor stresses priority of wildfire safety and preparation

The day after his inauguration and accompanying celebrations, Gov. Gavin Newsom visited a fire risk area and met with emergency management officials as he signed two executive orders addressing wildfires and disasters.

One of the changes he directed his emergency management and fire officials to address is the social vulnerability of populations living in fire prone areas. Not only should they continue to assess the environmental and weather risk of fires, such as fuel load, wind, dryness and efforts to prevent or mitigate them, but Newsom wants to include social attributes, such as isolation, poverty and language barriers to identify the most vulnerable populations.

"Paired with traditional natural risk factors, this data paints a more accurate assessment of the real human risk and can help guide preventative action to help prevent loss of life — especially for vulnerable groups," the press released stated.

The first step will be a report to him with recommendations for administrative, regulatory and policy changes he can take to prevent or mitigate wildfires. These actions will range from immediate to long-term. While Cal Fire is responsible for the report's preparation, other state agencies such as the Office of Emergency Services will contribute.

Also, he offered an advance look at his proposed budget for Cal Fire. Last summer, before it adjourned, the Legislature authorized \$1 billion in forestland management over the next five years.

Newsom's budget proposal will augment that figure to fund more year-round fire crews and acquiring more technol-

gy. The budget will include money for 13 fire engines, retrofitting C-130 air attack planes and fire cameras to spot fires, even using infrared units.

Also, Newsom, Oregon Gov. Kate Brown and Washington Gov. Jay Inslee co-signed a letter to President Donald Trump urging him to increase funding for forest management in the three states.

"In recent years, federal forest management budgets have remained flat, creating a significant gap between funding and need," the governors wrote.

"We are encouraged by Executive Order 13855, which you signed on December 21, 2018, promoting active management of America's forests, rangelands and other federal land to improve conditions and reduce wildfire risk. However, it is constrained by current appropriations," they continued.

Newsom also announced his senior officials for emergency and natural disaster preparedness, response and recovery.

Among them will be Thomas Porter, whom Newsom is appointing as director of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection. He is serving as acting director since Ken Pimlott retired at the end of 2018.

Mark Ghilarducci was reappointed as director of the governor's Office of Emergency Services, where he has served since Gov. Jerry Brown appointed him in July 2013.

"It's not a coincidence that my first full day as governor is focused on emergency preparedness. It's deliberate, it reflects intentionality, and it speaks to the priority that I place on emergency preparedness, response and recovery," Newsom said in the press release.

Edison striving to reduce outages and alert users if an outage occurs

Not only is the Hill subject to planned power shut-downs in case of emergencies such as fire or extreme weather, but due to equipment problems and maintenance, unplanned outages occur frequently.

In December, Southern California Edison, which provides electricity to the Hill, shared this message with local customers: "We're working hard to improve your experience by making updates that will help us react, communicate, and restore power quicker during outage events. These efforts will also make it easier for you to get the latest information."

As a major step to improve its service, SCE is investing \$5 billion to upgrade the quality of its equipment, such as poles and lines, carrying power up the hill to local customers.

SCE also is working to improve its ability to keep these customers aware of what has happened to their service. For example, Edison will leave a phone message, a text message, or send a letter or an email to customers announcing when their electricity will be off in order for SCE to maintain the equipment on that circuit.

When the work is completed, SCE will send a message advising the customers that the power should be back on. After an unexpected outage last week, customers received this message: "Maintenance Power Outage Restored. We would like to inform you that power has been restored in your area."

Among the equipment improvements, Edison has

Idyllwild Fire to submit parcel fee increase to voters this year

“The community loves the department,” said Idyllwild Fire Protection District Commissioner Rhonda Andrewson at the end of the commission’s workshop to discuss a parcel fee and tax measure last week. “We are all in agreement we want and need a measure.”

Commission President Jerry Buchanan then directed the fire staff, Chief Patrick Reitz and Assistant Chief Mark LaMont to develop a proposed measure for the commission’s review at a future meeting. The intent is to put the measure, similar to 2016’s Measure W, before voters later this year.

Basically, the proposal doubles the current parcel fee for all IFPD property owners.

The current parcel fee is \$32.50 on unimproved parcels within the district. For structures, it begins at \$65 annually if the square

footage is 3,000 or less. It grows in increments of \$32.50 until structures greater than 38,000 square feet pay a \$260 fee.

It was initially approved in April 1981. The \$65 cap was not imposed until 2006, but the fee has not been raised for inflation or increasing costs during this period.

Buchanan questioned the fairness of imposing only \$32.50 on unimproved properties since the department sends the same level of resources to a fire on these lots as for a burning structure. He suggested raising the fee for unimproved parcels, of which there are 874 within IFPD, to \$65.

However, LaMont argued that would be a substantial change in the fee formula and require a more intense defense of the fee increase.

LaMont estimated that the new fee would raise about \$230,000 annually, or twice the current parcel fee revenue.

With the added revenue,

Reitz and LaMont said the district could proceed with its capital improvement plan, fill two vacancies and raise salaries for staff, which were decreased 7 percent in February 2012, when revenues fell precipitously.

The CIP anticipates replacing several engines, perhaps the ladder truck, utility vehicles and other equipment, over the next five to six years.

Without a parcel fee increase, but fully funding the CIP, would result in a \$132,000 deficit over the next six fiscal years. However, IFPD has some reserves to offset the total by about \$100,000.

If the fee doubling were approved, IFPD would end the same period with

an another \$560,000 for reserves, based on staff estimates. IFPD has not had a

budget deficit for several years. However, Reitz and LaMont emphasized that was because of the mutual aid revenue IFPD earns for going to fires outside the district. If the number of mutual aid incidents declined, IFPD might encounter a budget issue, they argued.

LaMont also discussed how the cost of equipment from fire protection gear, helmets and breathing apparatuses has substantially increased. Some pieces are four or five times what they were in 1981.

percent supported it, but shy of the two-thirds requirement for approval.

In the November 2018 general election, 1,778 voters were registered in IFPD and 1,462 or 82 percent cast a ballot in the commissioner race. All four candidates, including incumbents Ralph Hoetger, Henry Sawicki and Andrewson, announced support for raising the district’s revenues.

The commission and staff will use its service data, such as a response time of less than three minutes for medical emergency calls and its integral contributions to the 2013 Mountain and 2018 Cranston fires, to help explain the need for more resources.

In preparation for a measure campaign, the commission also will study the results of a successful tax increase for the Apple Valley Fire Department and an unsuccessful effort in Valley Center.

Interagency cooperation makes headway in educating snow-play tourists

Each winter since 2017, huge numbers of off-Hill visitors have driven to Idyllwild at the first signs of snowfall. With few public snow-play areas, visitors poured into neighborhoods, especially Fern Valley, seeking snow in which to play.

The previously unseen numbers of snow visitors overwhelmed Idyllwild’s infrastructure, causing dangerous traffic jams on two-lane roads, obstructing the free flow of traffic and leaving massive quantities of trash throughout Idyllwild — in highway turnouts, at the Nature Center, at the Idyllwild Community Center site and on private property in higher elevations where there is more snow. And since there are no truly public bathrooms other than for restaurant, gas station and shop patrons, private residential land served that purpose in winters past.

The good news for Idyllwild residents is that a coordinated interagency effort involving the California Highway Patrol, the Riverside County Sheriff’s Department, Caltrans, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington’s office, the Idyllwild Fire Department and the nonprofit Idyllwild Snow Group is becoming effective through a variety of educative efforts:

- Handouts and a website and Facebook page produced by Idyllwild Snow Group that are getting off-the-Hill attention. Ten thousand, five hundred, fifty six people have seen the Facebook/Idyllwild Snow page with the “park on the road-get towed” pictures, in a day

and a half beginning on Jan. 12, 2019. Said ISG organizer Marsha Kennedy, “This is part of an effort to educate visitors and give them realistic expectations of what they’ll find on the Hill.”

- Signs on upper Fern Valley Road prohibiting weekend/holiday parking during the winter, December through April.

- New signs on Franklin Drive in Pine Cove prohibiting stopping at any time.

- Aggressive ticketing and towing by the CHP that is beginning to help visitors realize what they can and cannot do. CHP Officer Mike Murawski takes photographs of towing and ticketing for public posting to warn others.

- Forest Service installed a permanent gate leading into Humber Park Trailhead in August 2018, replacing temporary gates that snow-play visitors simply removed, creating dangerous traffic incidents in the upper parking lot of the trailhead.

- ISG partnered with Idyllwild Rotary for a village map showing snow-play areas and visitor tips. The map is in a new UV-resistant coated glass map case by Harmony Monument.

- ISG also is producing refrigerator magnets for locals, giving numbers to call if there are problems with trespassing, property damage, illegal parking, traffic and road hazards.

The amount of trash left by snow visitors in years past has been staggering and perhaps the largest and most expensive of the problems created by their visits. Caltrans is spearheading an effort to place dumpsters in certain designated pullouts on state highways in the


Idyllwild area. Said David Matza, Caltrans District 8 Government and Legislative Affairs Liaison, “This program has been very effective in Big Bear and Arrowhead in the Bernardino Mountains in reducing trash from snow visitors. We’re excited to be able to bring the program to Idyllwild. It’s satisfying when agencies work together to get things accomplished. The state permit should be approved shortly.”

CR&R Environmental Services, Idyllwild Transfer Station management company, will be tasked with placing the dumpsters and regularly emptying and/or removing them after snow visitor episodes.

When the program was put into place in Arrowhead and Big Bear, Caltrans District 8 Director John Bulinski said, “Today is a proud day for our region as we have taken a major step in eliminating litter from our stunning mountains that people from all over the country come to visit.”

The stated goal of placing the bins prior to storm events and removing them after the heavily travelled weekends was to reduce left-behind litter. Said San Bernardino County Supervisor Janice Rutherford, who represents Lake Arrowhead and Running Springs, “We welcome visitors who drive up and enjoy the snow, but ask that you please respect the forest and our mountain residents by not littering or trespassing on private property.”

Kennedy noted there is much more to do but that cooperation among county agencies and Idyllwild residents has accomplished a great deal in only two years. She notes more “no parking” signs are needed on Forest Drive, the last Idyllwild street before Humber Park Trailhead. She said closure of parking at Humber pushes visitors down to Forest Drive where parking and trespassing have become acute problems. Her group also would like to see signs des-



Forest Drive, the last residential street in Fern Valley before reaching Humber Trailhead, often receives the brunt of snow-play visitors when the Forest Service closes parking at Humber. Residents are seeking signs such as those on Fern Valley Road to restrict street parking during snow episodes to prevent trespassing and blockage of the street and driveways. Said Cathy Senter Edberg, “These are the throngs of people waiting to play in my neighbor’s yard. As soon as the CHP cleared them off and turned the corner to go up to Humber, they came right back again.”

ignating snow-play areas.

Depending on where you live in Idyllwild, contact with snow-play visitors could be mild or extreme. But it is a Hill problem and the steps taken to educate visitors by official agencies have been pro-

ductive, including a video, “CHP Idyllwild Snow Safety Video” spearheaded by then commander of the San Geronio Pass Station, Capt. Mike Alvarez.

Emma graduated from Idyllwild School, Hemet High School and Oberlin College. She was a writer by profession, and was a prolific and talented artist and illustrator as well. She was a brilliant student and had an extraordinary range of interests and talents.

Emma was active in music and drama throughout her school career. She was a graduate of the Performing Arts Academy at Hemet High, where she sang in vocal ensembles and acted in the theater program. She was proud of getting a coveted perfect score of 5 on the famously difficult Advanced Placement exam for Art History — a feat she repeated on the AP Calculus test.

In college, she took her degree with majors in Classics and East Asian Studies. She was a gifted natural linguist, a self-taught pianist, designed and created her own costumes, and was training as a chef before the onset of her illness.

Emma touched many lives in her unassuming, modest way. She was a kind and private person who had a handful of deep friendships and was loved by an extended family of relations extending beyond mere kinship and across four generations.

Emma is survived by her parents Mark and Sally Salter of Idyllwild; by her brothers David, Andrew and Kendall; by her sister Lauren; by her grandmother Marilyn Salter of Ashland, Oregon; and by myriad aunts, uncles and cousins. She will be fondly, but sorely, missed.



Idyllwild experiencing winter storms

Inclement weather continues through the second week of 2019. While some snow fell at higher elevations last week, Saturday brought some brief and light snowfall to Idyllwild.

Total precipitation through Sunday was not heavy, but more rain and possibly snow were forecast for Monday evening. Two more warmer rainstorms were forecast for the middle to latter part of this week. One was expected Tuesday and the second Wednesday night.

Longer term, the National Weather Service is still forecasting El Niño weather conditions for later this winter and early spring. However, the prediction is 65 percent and described as a weak El Niño.

"Given the timing and that a weak event is favored, significant global impacts are not anticipated during the remainder of winter, even if conditions were

to form," said the latest NWS report.

The rain on Monday and early Tuesday brought more than two-thirds of an inch to the Idyllwild Fire Station. The U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Station recorded nearly an inch by 9 a.m. Tuesday.

With this moderate rain, Idyllwild Fire has recorded 6.5 inches of precipitation, slightly below the long-term historic average for the Hill through January. Keenwild has received about 7.7 inches, which is greater than the average of 6.9 inches from October through January.


Since substantially more rain was expected this week, both should reach and exceed the average through January.

With the precipitation and El Niño forecast, the NWS already stated that the drought condition would likely be removed for much of Southern California.

'The Light Between Oceans'

The Fireside Book Group will discuss M.L. Stedman's "The Light Between Oceans" from 2 to 3 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 16, at the Idyllwild Library.

"After four harrowing years on the Western Front, Tom Sherbourne returns to Australia and takes a job as the lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock, nearly half a day's journey from the coast," according to the book's description. "To this isolated island, where the supply boat comes once a season, Tom brings a young, bold, and loving wife, Isabel. Years later, after two miscarriages and one stillbirth, the grieving Isabel hears a baby's cries on the wind. A boat has washed up onshore carrying a dead man and a living baby.

"Tom, who keeps meticulous records and whose moral principles have withstood a horrific war, wants to report the man and infant immediately. But Isabel insists the baby is a 'gift from God,' and against Tom's judgment, they claim her as their own and name her Lucy. When she is two, Tom and Isabel return to the mainland and are reminded that there are other people in the world. Their choice has devastated one of them."

Holocaust warning system

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum recently unveiled its updated Early Warning Project. Developed by the Museum's Simon-Skjoldt Center for the Prevention of Genocide and Dartmouth College, the Early Warning Project is a first-of-its-kind prevention tool that utilizes data analysis, crowd forecasting, and qualitative assessments to help policy makers identify countries at risk of atrocities to prioritize responses that could prevent such crimes. The tool focuses on atrocities against new victim groups; it does not forecast violence for ongoing atrocities.

Part of the Early Warning Project is a Statistical Risk Assessment that focuses on countries with the greatest risk for atrocities against new victim groups, countries where risk has been consistent over time and countries where risk has increased or decreased significantly.

Accessible at earlywarningproject.ushmm.org, the Early Warning Project is one tool available to experts in government, NGOs, academia, and others who focus on genocide prevention. It aims to foster attention and discussion around places at high risk for violence, particularly countries that may be unexpectedly susceptible, and what options are available to mitigate those risks.

An education in drinking water

EDITOR:

Idyllwild residents need an education in drinking water use on our mountain.

There are four types of drinking water: ground, spring, surface and reclaimed water. Groundwater is by far the cleanest, safest and most reliable to drink with two exceptions: shallow surface wells which require excessive chlorination due to contamination taking surface water masquerading as ground water and super-deep wells penetrating the radioactive band found deep within our mountain. It's easy to steer clear of these hazards except for a desire to be a cheap water pig.

As for surface and reclaimed water, it's possible to clean but very expensive to do so, requiring highly technical monitoring with a well-paid experienced staff. Pine Cove Water District has it right using mid-level wells with moderate production. Yes, it costs money to lift and store, but it's the best option.

Surface water is problematic. You need a right, license or riparian claim, and diversion infrastructure permitting. It's filthy and dangerous unless heavily treated.

If the state believes you don't have a right, license, riparian claim and in-stream infrastructure permitting, they will come after you criminally and civilly as a number of individuals/institutions have and are experiencing within Idyllwild.

IWD is a prime example. Its litigation/defense bill will likely exceed \$1 million and for what? Filthy, unreliable, substandard water that stops flowing every year that's stored in a lake that dries up almost just as often and that's if they win.

Spring water is filthy but effectively unlicensed. It, too, will bring unwanted attention if exported as bottled water companies found to their dismay in Idyllwild, ultimately losing their spring water sources with a landowner stuck holding the litigation bill.

Water production, storage and delivery must have regulated oversight. Sadly, IWD falls short with water quality violations and state investigations.

Most important are current practices. Both IWD and FVWD have no hydrant maintenance program but have increased rates, inferring such a Prop 218 program exists.

Watershed and infrastructure management are only as good as the creatures managing them. IWD is not a capable managing partner.

Decrease in Surety Bond fees

The U.S. Small Business Administration announces the first fee decrease in Surety Bond Guarantees in 12 years. The fee decrease will be in effect for guaranteed bonds approved during fiscal year 2019. It took effect Oct. 1, and ends Sept. 30, 2019.

The program is reducing the fee from 26 to 20 percent of the bond premium charged to the small businesses and reducing its contractor fee from \$7.29 per \$1,000 of the contract amount to \$6 per \$1,000 of the contract amount.

"Reducing the SBG program fees will not only directly help small businesses, but also will incentivize surety companies and their agents to increase support for small businesses in the marketplace," said Peter C. Gibbs, Acting Director of the Office of Surety Guarantees.

Under its SBG program, the SBA guarantees bid, payment and performance bonds for small and emerging contractors who cannot obtain surety bonds through regular commercial channels. SBA guarantees contracts up to \$10 million, including the streamlined QuickApp application for those up to \$400,000.

There are 34 participating sureties and over 350 active agents in the SBG program. On average, completed surety bond applications are reviewed and processed in less than two days.





Our community saw everything from the birth and dedication of our new Idypark to the town's close call with total annihilation by the Cranston Fire — and everything in between (i.e. black bears trespassing on private property.)

For this month's edition, I want to share with you some local housing statistics on the year 2018 in comparison with the previous three years.


But before that, here's our health and safety tip of the month: January is a good time to test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. It is important to routinely check the functionality and proper locations of all your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. It only takes a few minutes — and could save your life!

Presently, the California State Building Code requires that smoke alarms be located in 1) the hallway outside the bedrooms; 2) in each bedroom; and 3) on every floor regardless of whether there is a bedroom on that floor.*

Every owner of a "dwelling unit intended for human occupancy" must install an approved carbon monoxide device in each existing dwelling unit having a fossil fuel burning heater or appliance, fireplace, or an attached garage. (Cal. Health & Safety Code § 17926(a).)



tude. Let's look together at the healing benefits of forgiveness. U.C. Berkeley's Greater Good Science Center is a rich resource. See links above.

What is forgiveness? Science has demonstrated that both revenge and forgiving are hard-wired into humans (and other primates). "Psychologists generally define forgiveness as a conscious, deliberate decision to release feelings of resentment or vengeance toward a person or group who has harmed you, regardless of whether they actually deserve your forgiveness." (<https://greatergood.berkeley.edu/topic/forgiveness/definition>)

Forgiving is not about letting the other off the hook, making excuses, condoning or glossing over the hurt. It is not even about forgetting.

In fact, forgiving can be more about a way to smooth one's own recovery than a way to benefit the other. Others don't even have to know that you have forgiven them, as some relationships are so toxic it is counter-productive, even dangerous, to engage at all.

"Though forgiveness can help repair a damaged relationship, it doesn't obligate you to reconcile with the person who harmed you, or release them from legal accountability..."

"A former victim of abuse shouldn't reconcile with an abuser who remains potentially dangerous, for example. But the victim can still come to a place of empathy and understanding." (<https://greatergood.berkeley.edu/topic/forgiveness/definition>)

Bishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa states, "If the victim could forgive only when the culprit confessed, then the victim would be locked into the culprit's whim, locked into victimhood, no matter her own attitude or intention. That would be palpably unjust." The victim remains shackled. "Forgiveness gives us the capacity to make a new start."

How does forgiving heal? Research has shown that forgiveness is linked to positive mental health outcomes such as reduced anxiety, depression and major psychiatric disorders. Benefits include improved relationships and a greater sense of connectedness to others.

Other research has shown that social connectedness is essential for trauma healing. Forgiving is associated with fewer physical health symptoms and lower mortality rates. By reducing stress and eliminating toxic anger, forgiveness lowers blood pressure and prevents coronary heart disease.

Learning the skills of forgiving: Please see the links above for several approaches to cultivating your ability to forgive. My favorite is https://greatergood.berkeley.edu/article/item/the_ancient_heart_of_forgiveness by Jack Kornfield:

"Discover that it is not necessary to be loyal to your suffering. ... We are so loyal to our suffering, focusing on the trauma and the betrayal of 'what happened to me.' OK, it happened. It was horrible. But is that what defines you? ...

"The Dalai Lama, whose culture in Tibet has been destroyed, has stated, '... They have taken so much. Why should I also let them take my joy and peace of mind?'"

Flu season here; 4-year-old dies from flu

Getting your vaccine is advised

Influenza season began and is active in Riverside County. Last week, county officials announced that a 4-year-old girl died and had tested positive for influenza. This is the second pediatric flu-associated death in California this flu season.

This is the third flu-related death in Riverside County since the 2018-19 flu season began. According to Jose Arballo Jr., senior public information specialist for the county Public Health Agency, two adults and the child have died from the flu.

As of Jan. 12, visits to physicians for influenza-like symptoms were above normal ranges in Riverside County.

Flu is statewide and at elevated levels, according to the state Department of Public Health. As of Jan. 5, both outpatient likely influenza indications and hospital admissions were above expected levels for this point in the flu season. Hospitalizations increased last week.

Hospital costs to be posted online

CMS requires hospitals to share cost info with the public

On Thursday, Jan. 10, Seema Verma, administrator for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, held a telephone conference to discuss CMS efforts to build greater transparency of medical costs. The purpose is to offer patients more information about the cost of prospective procedures and surgery, thus allowing them to include the cost of the procedure in their decision.

In a federal rule approved in August 2018 and effective Jan. 1, hospitals are required to make public their charges. These must be posted on the Internet in a machine-readable format.

"My goal is patients are first," Verma said, describing the rule's purpose. "This is a potential driving force for quality and value [of medical service]. Health costs are sky rocketing and the status quo is unacceptable."

Verma envisions that patients will be able to access information on the costs of their treatment and combine

According to the county's press release, the child's death occurred outside the county. It was reported to Riverside County health officials late last week.

"The child had not received a flu shot and had no underlying health issues," said Dr. Cameron Kaiser, Riverside County public health officer.

Last week, 10 influenza-related deaths were reported in California, bringing the flu season total to 52 since September. About half the deaths were individuals older than 65 years.

There is still time to get the flu shot, Kaiser said, adding that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that all persons 6 months of age and older receive a flu vaccination each year. Kaiser also recommends frequent hand washing and avoiding getting close to people who are sick as ways to avoid the flu. If you or your child are sick, stay home from work and school.

Last year (2017-18), there were 23 flu-associated deaths in Riverside County of individuals 64 or younger.

it with quality measures being developed, thus seeking the best service for the lowest costs.

Currently, hospital charges for the same procedure or treatment can vary by 50 to 75 percent within the same geographical area. However, she noted that these are the basic publicly announced costs and are not what a hospital may charge an insurance company.

"This denies the patient the ability to make a value-based decision," Verma lamented. "Our intention is that this is the first step. Hospitals can go further."

Requiring the price data to be in a machine readable format, CMS hopes that third parties will develop software or applications that can use this data, combine it with other accessible data to improve patients' ability to compare and make a health decision that includes costs as part of the mechanism.

"CMS wants to make healthcare costs more affordable through price transparency," she stressed. "This is the first step to make it understandable to the patient."

As of Monday morning, Jan. 14, this information was not found online for Desert Regional, Eisenhower, Hemet Valley, Loma Linda University or Menifee Valley medical centers. Several hospital representatives were not aware of the requirement.

Local man killed in crash on Highway 74

Local couple involved in aftermath of fatal crash

A crash on Highway 74, about a quarter-mile west of Cranston Station, resulted in the death of Idyllwild local Russell Alyn Bomgardner.

According to the still unfinished California Highway Patrol report, at 9:57 p.m. Friday, Jan. 11, Bomgardner, 26, was driving a 2004 red Ford Ranger pickup truck westbound on Highway 74 near Blackburn Road when, for unknown reasons, he lost control of his vehicle, causing the vehicle to rotate counter clockwise, leave the road and crash into a tree in the center median at which point the vehicle came to rest. The crash caused the tree to fall

into the eastbound lane of Highway 74.

Just as the tree fell, Idyllwild resident Gary Weber, 74, was driving his 2017 gray Honda CRV eastbound and struck the downed tree. The impact caused injury to Weber's passenger, Susan Weber, 68, also of Idyllwild. She was transported by American Medical Response ambulance to Hemet Valley Medical Center complaining of pain in the chest and neck.

First responders had to use the "Jaws of Life" to cut into the wreckage to extract Bomgardner from his badly damaged vehicle. He was pronounced dead at the scene at 10:35 p.m.

Newsom releases his 'California for all' budget

After less than one week in office, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced his proposed budget for fiscal year 2019-20, which begins July 1. The total budget recommendation is \$209.1 billion.

Newsom's budget proposal, benefitting from unexpectedly large revenue, addresses many issues, which he raised during the campaign and continues Gov. Jerry Brown's concern about preserving the state reserves in case of an economic downturn. He also is earmarking several billion to pay down state debt.

Nearly 85 percent of the new funding is for one-time efforts, which can be discontinued if the state revenues drop next year. Also, Newsom is proposing to pay more of the state costs for the California Public Employees' Retirement System and the California State Teachers Retirement System for unfunded pension liabilities, which will both save about \$7 billion over the next 30 years.

State Sen. Jeff Stone had this to say about Newsom's proposal, "Governor Newsom certainly came out with an ambitious budget full of outside-the-box thinking. I appreciate his commitment to ensuring we have an adequate Rainy Day Fund and am encouraged that the

governor seems to recognize that California may face a recession in the coming years."

Healthcare, housing, education and early childhood programs are the major areas where Newsom wants to invest more funds.

One of his major initiatives is establishing a working families tax credit. This will provide another \$500 tax credit for low-income families with young children who already qualify for the state's Earned Income Tax Credit. This credit he proposes to expand to full-time workers earning \$15 per hour.

The budget also includes funds to increase subsidies to low- and middle-income residents for healthcare coverage. Also, Medi-Cal will be available to young adults between ages 19 and 25, regardless of immigration status.

Part of the healthcare package will include an individual mandate, similar to the federal individual mandate, which originally was a part of the Affordable Care Act.

The proposal includes \$1.3 billion for grants to spur housing development and new tax credits for low- and moderate-income housing construction.

The budget addresses child poverty in two programs. There will be more funds available for low-income families served

by CalWORKs. Secondly, Newsom proposes a \$6,000 grant for students attending California public colleges and who also are parents.

Funds for school districts grow. A one-time program to encourage full-day kindergarten programs is part of the education portion. To help districts with their payments for teacher retirements, the budget includes \$3 billion to augment district payments to CalSTRS. And he proposes that the second year of community college education should be tuition free.

Wildfires and emergencies are another important area in Newsom's budget proposal. The Cal Fire budget will have another \$415 million, much of which is for fuels reduction and wildfire prevention. But there is added money for Cal Fire's air attack resources, including 13 new fire engines, new helicopters, retrofitting C-130s and communication equipment.

Cal Fire will have nearly \$10 million for staff to use remote sensing technology for advance fire warnings, as well as monitoring fire behavior.

As a consequence of the weaknesses in the emergency notification systems for the Northern California fires this year, Newsom wants to revamp the state system. This may include a 911 tax on phone service.

There are funds to replace proper-

ty taxes for counties, such as Riverside, where the major conflagrations occurred this summer.

A ghost of budget pasts accompanies Newsom's proposal. To help disadvantaged communities eliminate contaminated water and afford the capital investments, Newsom plans to revive the proposed tax on water.

In response to this piece of the budget proposal, Cindy Tuck, deputy executive director for government relations for the Association of California Water Agencies, said in a press release, "The vast majority of the state's residents have access to safe drinking water, but a small percentage of the population does not. This unacceptable reality is a social issue for the state of California. ACWA believes that making access to safe drinking water for all Californians should be a top priority for the state. However, a statewide water tax is highly problematic and is not necessary when alternative funding solutions exist and the state has a huge budget surplus."

In his transmittal message, Newsom described his budget proposal as "California for all. That is the driving idea behind this budget proposal and my first year in office."

County accepting some cannabis business permit applications

Cultivation and retail sales still on hold

Riverside County begins 2019 with a sanctioned cannabis industry. As of Dec. 26, 2018, the county began accepting applications for distribution, manufacturing, testing and wholesale nursery facilities within the unincorporated areas.

The first step in obtaining a county permit is the submission of conditional use permit. Also, each enterprise must have an appropriate state license. Much of this information can be found on the county Planning Department's Cannabis webpage at <https://planning.rctlma.org/Cannabis.aspx>.

The initial deposit for a CUP review is \$9,646.14 with another \$471 for the environmental review.

Applications for growing and selling cannabis, including microbusinesses, are not being accepted yet. The county is preparing a different application process and will issue only 19 retail permits and 50 cultivation permits in 2019. The process for approval of permits for these activities, which will involve responding to a request for proposals, is expected to begin in February.

Another part of the permitting process will be a development agreement between the county and the permittee. This will be negotiated during the application approval process. The Planning Commission will review each permit application before the Board of Supervisors accepts the development agreement. Both the commission and board will hold a public hearing before granting approval.

If a proposed operation is not located within an approved land-use zone, a change of zone application also will have to be filed along with added costs. A change in zone will require a minimum deposit of \$3,648.54.

To report cannabis businesses operating illegally in the county's unincorporated areas, contact the Riverside

Where cannabis businesses may be located

Riverside County land-use zones, where cannabis businesses (other than retail and cultivation), may be located, are listed below. If the business is in an incorporated city, it must comply with the city's regulations.

Nurseries

Outdoor and mixed light cannabis wholesale nurseries may be located within these land-use zones: A-1, A-P, A-2, and A-D.

Indoor cannabis wholesale nurseries are allowed within these land-use zones: I-P, M-SC, M-M, and M-H.

Cannabis manufacturing facility

Non-volatile cannabis manufacturing or extracting either type N (edible or topical products or type P (packaging and labeling products) are allowed within zones I-P, M-SC, M-M, and M-H.

Volatile cannabis manufacturing or shared-use facilities (a combination of volatile and non-volatile processes) are allowed within these zones: I-P, M-SC, M-M, and M-H.

Testing facility

Facilities for testing cannabis and cannabis products can be located within zones C1/C-P, C-P-S, I-P, M-SC, M-M, and M-H.

Distribution facility

Distribution of cannabis and cannabis products from manufacturer to dispensary will require a Type 11 licensee to be bonded and insured at a minimum level established by the licensing authority. These businesses are allowed in zones C1/C-P, C-P-S, I-P, M-SC, M-M, and M-H.

increased the capacity of local power lines from 4 kilovolts to 12kVs. This improves the ability to interconnect different circuits because the 12kVs lines outnumber the older 4kVs. While this has a greater benefit in urban areas with many more nearby circuits, it still helps Hill customers. For example, Tomaso Giannelli, SCE's senior manager of the Outage Communications Team, said it "... allows us to service business and residential customers on the same circuit."

Other physical improvements to equipment include the gradual replacement of wood power poles with metal. Also, the capacity and fire resistance of the power lines themselves has been strengthened. This also reduces the threat of fire damage. Edison also is installing new fuses.

On the Hill, rebuilding and upgrading the substation in Idyllwild involved installation of equipment, which can be enabled remotely or automatically. Automated reclosers are circuit breakers that respond to momentary problems such as faults.

Remote-controlled switches isolate outages sooner and enable SCE staff in Menifee to do some work to control switches while a lineman travels to Idyllwild to examine and repair the onsite problem.

Remote fault indicators allow Edison to locate problems along a circuit so that the lineman can go directly to that site. In the past, they would have to search the entire circuit to discover the problem.

All of these improvements, "Save time and allow quicker restoration of power," Edison said.

Wildfires, such as the 2018 Cranston Fire, and weather, such as Santa Ana winds, which could damage equipment, possibly causing fire, are the primary reasons for the planned power shutdowns for the entire Hill.

SCE cannot wait for alerts about fires; the company has taken a proactive role to improve its ability to see and to forecast fire danger. It now has four weather stations on the Hill. This provides actual local conditions in addition to National Weather Service data.

Following the Cranston Fire, "SCE replaced 131 damaged poles with brand new poles, lines and equipment. So a lot of the area now has new equipment," according to an SCE spokesperson.

Also, SCE removed dozens of burned trees near its lines. "SCE continues to monitor the condition of some trees that the SCE arborist feels may recover from the Cranston Fire," the spokesperson said. "If the trees don't recover, SCE will identify them for removal. SCE continues to do patrols every 90 to 120 days looking for dead trees that might threaten SCE lines or equipment."

No matter how much effort and patrol SCE does, it still encourages residents to call about trees threatening power lines. Also, when power is out and you're not sure it is a widespread outage, call Edison.

They stressed that customers can be the eyes and ears of a prob-

lem before it expands to a crisis. This can reduce the restoration time, Giannelli stressed.

Edison encourages readers to sign up for or update their information at the sce.com outage center under "Manage Notifications." They can choose to get text, phone or email outage alerts. If customers have an outage or see a power problem, they should report it via 800-611-1911.

Also, if customers or residents ever see a line down, stay away and call 911.

As to PG&E recently announcing bankruptcy due to the fires in Northern California, Edison International and Southern California Edison's Robert Laffoon-Villegas, Corporate Communications, said, "The tragic consequences of wildfires have impacted the entire state, and Edison remains committed to providing its customers with safe, reliable, affordable and clean power."

"The company is able to manage the financial wildfire liabilities it currently faces, and continues to invest in grid hardening and other capital programs. Just last week, the California Public Utilities Commission approved Edison's request to track its \$582 million Grid Safety and Resiliency Program to help prevent future wildfires."

Edison is also actively engaged with state leaders to develop comprehensive public policies to address statewide wildfire mitigation and liability reform."

Educators Peter and Ann Kindfield come home to Idyllwild

Peter and Ann Kindfield, recent arrivals, bring an extraordinary level of teaching experience and academic accomplishments to the Hill. Both have doctorates from the University of California, Berkeley, in science and mathematics education.

Both have long careers in education, including as educational researchers, professors at major universities, public-school teachers and teachers in alternative community schools in which project-based curricula are used to develop students into active and engaged lifelong learners.

As Peter explains their evolution as teachers, they have moved from standard current teaching methods to what he calls immersive and emergent education — a model in which the student drives educational growth through project-based experiential learning.

Peter notes that children are naturally inquisitive but that current educational methods often stifle students' natural inquisitiveness by mandating teaching to the test, with unnatural walls between subjects. As a science and math teacher, Peter took children into outdoor natural settings for observation and questioning. "Outdoor education is so valuable in general," he said, "so many things that get students learning and wondering. My way of doing is to walk along with the children and let them learn along the way and build on what they see."

"As a child, I loved learning but hated school. There was so much I wanted to learn and understand, but in school I was simply expected to do as I was told. I just didn't fit into the one-size-fits-all model of education. My early educational experiences and 40 years of working with other people who didn't fit the mold have helped me become the learning facilitator I am today."

"I believe that all people are unique with our own strengths, challenges, experiences, and interests and that the best way to support learning is to start where each learner is and help them expand and extend their interests, experiences, and expertise from there."

The Kindfields come to Idyllwild from 15 years in Summertown, Tennessee, where both were part of an intentional community called The Farm. Peter served as principal and full-time science and math teacher at The Farm School and Ann served as Farm School administrator, part-time teacher in biology, communication arts and remedial reading, as well as lecturer

at Peabody College, Vanderbilt University. "We wanted to be in an educational environment that understood people learn by doing things, by watching others, by intention and action, not by being taught to take tests," Peter recounted.

The Kindfields are from the East, Peter from Manhattan and Ann from Pitts-

burgh. Their teaching careers include service in New York, New Jersey, the Bay Area in California and in Tennessee. And in a not uncommon thread, they have come to Idyllwild responding to a "call" to be here. Said Peter, "I think the best way for me to describe what I meant when I said I felt called here is that since our first visit, I have had a recurring and growing feeling each time I have encountered a new place or person, that I belong here."

Peter explains that at age 19, he came to Palm Springs because his grandfather owned a furniture store there. Although attracted to California by that visit, he wanted a greener place to be, not knowing that Idyllwild, just on top of the mountain, was the greener place he was looking for.

While in Tennessee and while thinking of relocating, he reconnected with a cousin who had shared his time in Palm Springs. The cousin suggested he and Ann would like Idyllwild. They visited last winter and just completed their cross-country drive from Tennessee to their new home in Pine Cove.

And unlike many who fall in love with Idyllwild and move here to duplicate the

life they had elsewhere in this new setting, the Kindfields say they are bringing their experience and skill sets and will wait to see what the community and the mountain might want from them. "I teach tai chi, permaculture and am experienced in teaching and tutoring students," he said. "We have formed a company called Hilltop Education Connections as a base for providing emergent learning support in the 'academic' areas with a focus on science, math, technology, permaculture and outdoor education for one-of-a-kind learners residing in or visiting the Idyllwild area. Our general approach is to help people pursue their interests, and expand and extend their experiences in ways that connect deeply with their everyday lives."

They are upbeat and positive about their move and the services they can provide to others. In addition to their doctoral degrees, Peter holds a master's in educational psychology from U.C. Berkeley and a bachelor's in psychology from U.C. Santa Cruz. Ann holds a master's in biochemistry and molecular biology from U.C. Santa Cruz and a bachelor's in biology from Pennsylvania State University.







Check your vehicle for recalls

The U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is reminding the driving public to check their vehicles for any open recalls on NHTSA.gov/recalls.

Over the last decade, NHTSA oversaw 7,878 recalls affecting more than 390 million vehicles and items of vehicle equipment.

Vehicles one to three at the time of recall average an 80-percent repair rate. Vehicles that one to five years old at the time of recall average a 76-percent repair rate.

Vehicles recalled at six to 10 years old see the repair rate drop to 56 percent, on average (while manufacturers mail recall notices to owners, the task of reaching current vehicle owners becomes more difficult when vehicles have changed hands, particularly if they've had multiple owners).

Visit NHTSA.gov/Recalls and enter your vehicle's 17-digit vehicle identification number. In seconds, you'll know if your vehicle is subject to a safety recall. Every recall is fixed for free. Recalls do not expire.

Get Alerted. Sign up for Recall Alerts. If your vehicle is included in a future safety recall, you'll receive an e-mail letting you know.

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

USPS changes rates in 2019

The United States Postal Service will have new rates as of Sunday, Jan. 27, 2019.

The new prices will include a 5-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp, from 50 cents to 55 cents. The single-piece, added-ounce price will be reduced to 15 cents, so a 2-ounce stamped letter, such as a typical wedding invitation, will cost less to mail, decreasing from 71 to 70 cents.

Mailing Services product prices will rise about 2.5 percent. Shipping Services price increases vary by product.

The Postal Service receives no tax dollars for operating expenses and relies on the sale of postage, products, and services to fund its operations.
