Directors for the Idyllwild Water District kept the same board leadership in place for 2019 and confirmed the selection of a new, but refurbished, general manager last week.

Their colleagues recommended that directors Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly and Peter Szabadi remain as president and vice president, respectively.

Lots of precipitation, especially at higher levels

But still short of average rainfall

A week of rain and snow fell throughout the Hill from Sunday, Jan. 13, through Thursday night, Jan. 17. During this period, the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station recorded more than 3 inches of rain.

Although it seemed to rain continuously during that week, fortunately, this was not a torrential shower, similar to a summer thunderstorm. As a

result, the concerns about flooding and debris flows never occurred for the Cranston Fire

Some temporary mandatory evacuations were ordered for the Holy Fire areas, but Highway 74 and local roads were not inundated.

Four storms passed over the Hill from



Saturday to Thursday. The first occurred on Saturday, Jan. 12. On Monday, the second brought light snow to Idyllwild. The third and fourth storms, Wednesday and Thursday, brought most of the rain.

These storms were connected to the atmospheric river, which is why so much precipitation

fell. But this source also was warmer than the first two storms. Snowfall occurred at San Jacinto Peak and elevations above 8,000 feet, particularly north in the San Bernardino Mountains.

Total rainfall since Oct. 1 has been 9.7 inches at Keenwild. The long-term average rain on the Hill from October through January

has been 11.8 inches. Weather for the next few weeks is expected to be warmer and dry. Nevertheless, the National Weather Service is still forecasting an El Niño weather pattern for late winter into spring.

Legislative analyst supports Newsom budget proposal

"The governor's budget proposal reflects a budget situation that is even better than our estimates," wrote the Legislative Analyst's Office in its comments on Gov. Gavin Newsom's 2019-20 budget proposal, which was released Jan. 10.

The LAO noted that the majority of the \$20.6 billion of increased spending was being proposed for debt repayment, reserves and one-time spending.

Only \$3 billion was proposed for ongoing programs.

Much of the proposed spending, which would continue, is spread among many programs. But more than \$650 million is for the state's educational programs from full-day preschool to the universities and colleges. Another \$350 million will go to increase CalWorks' grant levels.

While the full-day preschool programs have some initial funding, the governor will establish a work group to develop a specific plan for implementing universal

preschool.

This year's funding will provide for 10,000 full-day preschool slots. The goal is to expand that by another 20,000 over the next two years. Although this is consistent with current educational research, the LAO acknowledged that the Legislature might want to review the implementation goals.


There also is another \$500 million for improvement to early education.

Healthcare was another prominent priority in Newsom's budget. He is proposing to expand Medi-Cal to all young adults, from ages 19 through 25 years, and regardless of immigration status.

To fund the subsidies for individuals and families who purchase health insurance through Covered Cal, Newsom wants to implement an individual mandate. If a person does not have health insurance, a penalty would be assigned. The penalty revenues would be used to subsidize the Covered Cal premiums.

However, the LAO expressed See Newsom, page A8



Preceding that decision, the board unanimously appointed Michael Creighton as the new general manager, replacing Jack Hoagland.

Creighton is on the faculty of the water department for Mt. San Jacinto College and has a consulting firm. As a consultant, he has done work in Southern California, including for the Pechanga Band of Luiseño Indians in Temecula. However, in the 1990s he served on the IWD board, including as president, and Idyllwild was his residence.

During this time, he worked at Eastern Municipal Water District until he retired in 2001 and resumed teaching at Mt. San Jacinto College as coordinator of the water technology program.

"I know the community well and have a good sense of the issues," he said. "I am excited about coming back here and will be spending time in the field. I'm very confident I can handle this job."

The board encouraged Creighton to arrange a meeting or more with the community and the dis-

trict's customers to introduce himself.

The board had planned to also appoint a chief operation officer, however, the selected candidate, Joel Sears, ultimately declined the position.

Sears was recruited as the COO, but the board agenda indicated that the job title would be changed to field supervisor.

Director David Hunt felt the district should keep that job title since it has a chief financial officer. Director Steve Kunkle and his three other colleagues favored the

field supervisor title and voted to change the title, while making no changes to the job description.

Since the board had decided to recruit for both positions, Hunt also urged the board to re-open the search for a field supervisor, but all concurred that Creighton, as general manager, should assess the need to fill this position.

In financial business, CFO Hosny Shouman reported that finances were in good shape. Both the water and sewer departments had positive balances through the first half of the fiscal year.

The board also agreed to reimburse GNW Construction of Idyllwild for \$2,233 of added costs incurred while building a weir on Lily Creek near Foster Lake. The project encountered several unexpected obstacles, such as trash backfill, unanticipated grading and less favorable soil conditions requiring larger footings and the associated concrete. Hunt abstained from the vote, citing a family relationship with GNW.

In water business, IWD produced 5.2 million gallons in December, which was 1.6 million or 23 percent less than December 2017. For the full year, IWD's water production totaled 90.7 million gallons, which was only 440,000 gallons less than a year ago.

The water loss percentage for December dropped to 8 percent, about the same as January 2018 and half of the past few months.



Monday night, a vaguely familiar man behind the restaurant bar fessed up to being a new employee and deferred our orders to a nearby server.

His task at hand involved drying dozens of glassware. Within the man's earshot, Jack mentioned it would not be a good time to fly on an airplane. I commented that it would also not be a good time for a major disaster, pointing out that "Past Tense" this week mentioned that 25 years ago, U.S. Forest Service firefighters were dispatched to the Northridge earthquake.

Today, most of our Forest Service employees on the Hill are on furlough, not getting paid, having to find other means to earn money until the impasse is over.

I filled Jack in on my opinions on our USFS employees when the glass dryer interrupted with, "Amen," and stepped toward us admitting that he is a USFS employee on

Another USFS employee I know is making garments to sell to earn money.

What has been on my mind for some days now is that out community, months after the Cranston Fire, is forgetting the most vital firefighting group on the Hill—the ones most responsible for initially saving our community from destruction.

At this time of year, seasonal firefighter hiring and training normally takes place. That's on hold.

Nine stations in and around the San Jacinto Ranger District employ people who serve to protect our forest through not just firefighting, but forestry, wildlife and recreation practices.

You saw the town fill up after the snowfall and then during the Martin Luther King Jr. three-day holiday last weekend. Normally, the Idyllwild Ranger Station would be open to field visitors' questions and direct them to recreation areas. Personnel would be on the trails and in the forest to enforce laws protecting federal recreation areas.

As it is, we don't have the personnel infrastructure to handle such a heavy influx of tourists.

USFS employees don't typically stand out in the community but many live here among us. Many tend to be fraternal and keep to themselves and/or their co-workers/families. You may not even know some of these people are USFS.

Or maybe you do know one or two, or the spouse of one or two, because your kids go to school with their kids. Or you work with the spouse/significant other.

Following the Mountain and Cranston fires, big-bash fundraisers for victims were understandable. Big-bash fundraisers also were held for Idyllwild Fire.

But we've now forgotten our USFS employees who live among us — those who helped in the initial and later attacks to save us from wildfire — even making maps for firefighting. They protect the beauty that makes Idyllwild unique. Some of them live paycheck to paycheck but the gap between paychecks is growing.

You cannot drop off donations at the Idyllwild Ranger Station for them because it is not open. But if you happen to know one, or meet one, maybe you can thank them for their service and offer to help in some way.


Tongue deeply in cheek

Judge denies motion to dismiss charges against Allen

In a Jan. 14 hearing, Riverside County Superior Court Judge Alfonso Fernandez denied the motion to dismiss two counts in the criminal case against

Pam Allen. In April 2017, Allen, 66, of Pine Cove, was charged with three felonies for the March 31 traffic collision with Julia Romero, 18, of Idyllwild, on Highway 243. Two of the charges were for driving under the influence and causing great bodily injury. The third charge was hit and run.

In Oct. 20, Defense Attorney Donald Bartell filed a motion to remove the first two felony charges

great bodily injury. Bartell questioned the experience and, therefore, the capability of California Highway Patrol Officer Michael Bell, who covered the crash scene, to assess the evidence and draw an

expert conclusion. Bartell supported this argument with his expert witness Herbert Summers, Ph.D., a forensic engineer, who testified that Bell's assessment of the location of the initial collision was wrong.

The county's Deputy District Attorney Allison Pace made several points in response. First was that California legal procedures require setting aside charges when there

The CHP officer has investigated many crash scenes and taken training collecting evidence. Therefore, his conclusions were based on objective data

and rational. Secondly, Allen did show signs of intoxication and her "breath tested with a blood alcohol level of 0.15 and 0.14, approximately two hours after the collision."

In opposing the DA's response, Bartell continued to argue that there were no witnesses to the case, Bell's description of the crash is inconsistent with Summers' data and the alcohol tests were not appropriately given.

After hearing oral arguments during the hearing, Fernandez ruled, "Officer Bell does have experience and can be an expert witness."

Another hearing has been set for March 8.

Referendum approved to confirm or repeal cash bail system

In August 2018, former Gov. Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill 10, which would have eliminated California's cash bail system and replaced it with a pre-trial assessment program. It effectively eliminated the use of cash to secure release from jail prior to

trial. than five Less months later, Wednesday, Jan. 16, California Secretary of State Alex Padilla announced that all of SB 10 will be put before state voters as a referendum, which has qualified for the state's November

2020 ballot. Registered California voters will have the opportunity to approve or to reject the continuation of the current cash bail system.

Qualification for the ballot requires 365,880 signatures. As of Jan. 16, the Secretary of State's office estimat402,500.

SB 10 would have become effective Oct. 1, 2019. Instead, this referendum places all of SB 10 before the voters. It will become law only if approved by a majority of the voters in the 2020 presidential election. However, if a majority votes against the referendum, the cash bail system remains in place.

Under SB 10, individuals arrested for most misdemeanors would be booked and released without going into custo-

For an individual who is determined to be at low risk to public safety and failure to appear in court, the release would be the least restrictive and no monetary conditions (bail) will be applied.

Some people would not be released under any conditions. would include someone assessed as a high risk in the current case. This

ed that valid signa- individual would not be tures collected exceeded eligible for the pre-trial assessment.

Neither an arrest requiring sex offender registration, nor serious or violent felony arrests for physical violence or great bodily injury would be eligible for release. Being armed or using a deadly weapon also would preclude as-

sessment for release. Several of the other conditions that would prevent release include some circumstances when arrested for driving under the influence, three or more failures to appear in court within the past 12 months, awaiting trial or sentencing in another case, or conviction of a serious or violent felony within

the past five years. The local superior courts will be responsible for conducting the pre-arraignment review and making the release decisions.

Pine Cove Water District finances look good

Board plans to pay off loan early

After a very positive half-year budget report, General Manager Jerry Holldber recommended that the Pine Cove Water District Board of Directors "spend money to save money" at last week's meeting.

In December 2013, the district purchased about 4 acres along Franklin Drive. One incidental purpose of the property is to serve as a demonstration site for abatement. More importantly, PCWD has drilled two successful wells on the property and is considering drilling more wells.

The purchase price of about \$118,000 was financed with a loan for most of the balance. The loan's annual interest rate is 5.25 percent and the current loan balance is about \$58,000.

The district's cash only earns 1.6 percent, whether in a commercial bank or with the state's Local Agency Investment Fund, according to Holldber.

With about five years left on the loan, he recommended paying it off now. This would result in savings between \$4,000 and \$5,000 over the loan's life, Holldber estimated.

In his mid-year budget review, Holldber reported that PCWD's cash balance was \$290,000 and could easily provide the funds to pay off the loan.

After some questions, the board unanimously approved his recommendation.

Director Diana Luther asked if there were any very large projects planned for the next few years for which Pine Cove would need the money. The major planned projects are pipe installation and most of that hardware has been bought, Holldber replied.

For the first six months of fiscal year 2018-19, PCWD has received about \$460,000 in revenue, of which 60 per-

cent is from water sales. The district has received a little more than a third of the expected property tax revenue and the lease revenue is slightly less than half.

Expenses from July through December were about \$485,000 and reserves are sufficient to offset the negative balance. With a greater portion of the revenue expected in the second half of the year and fewer expenses, Holldber assured the board its finances were in good and stable condition.

"The revenue estimates look pretty good," he said. Because the district may sell three new water meters, Holldber is optimistic that the cash balance would still approach \$300,000 at the end of the fiscal year, even if the property loan were paid.

In other business, the board approved a resolution setting its meetings at 10 a.m. the second Wednesday of each month. This is not a change, but just an update of the resolution.

Holldber also reported that the California Rural Water Association survey of median family income in the district has started. When completed, he hopes the results will enable PCWD to qualify for more state grants.

Water production for December totaled 2.1 million gallons, which was 340,000 gallons or 14 percent less than December 2017.

"Everything is fine. There have been no surprises and I'm not aware of any frozen pipes," he said.

For the whole year, PCWD produced 33.6 million gallons, which was 3.2 million or 8.6 percent less than all of 2017. This is the first year production has declined since 2015. However, the water theft for illegal cannabis production increased production in 2016 and 2017.

In December, the district's well levels remained constant and Holldber expects the current rains to lift them later in the spring and summer.

Fern Valley to seek multiple bids for pipeline project

Board leadership re-elected for 2019

The Fern Valley Water District board last Friday directed General Manager Victor Jimenez to invite multiple firms to bid on the planned replacement of pipeline along Upper Rim Rock and Dogwood roads later this year.

Because the area is underlain with extensive rock and bedrock, Jimenez recommended working directly with El-Co Contractors of San Bernardino who have successfully installed pipeline for FVWD in the past.

With its experience, Jimenez felt El-Co could do the work with simpler plans instead of a more complete survey plan. Avoiding engineered plans and inspection service would reduce the project's cost about \$50,000, he argued.

"If we open bids to a full set of contractors, I'm concerned we'll get a low-ball bid and hit for a ton of change orders," Jimenez said.

Director Robert Krieger did not feel that a pipeline project requires full drawings. Rather, he recommended, before soliciting for bids, Jimenez meet with potential bidders, walk the area, and discuss the potential rock obstacles and how they would dispose of the debris.

"Every street has rocks. I can't agree that these roads are different from others in the district," noted Director James Rees, who felt strongly that Jimenez should obtain more than one bid.

"This is a huge part of our budget and could save thousands of dollars [by getting competition in the bids]," he argued.

Regardless of the process and ultimate contractor, Kreiger felt the district would need a pre-bid conference. After selecting a contractor, the district will need to devote time to monitoring the work and engaging with the contractor to ensure that unexpected change orders are submitted.

After further discussion, the board voted 4-1 to adopt a multiple-bid process. Director Richard Schnetzer felt comfort-

able with Jimenez's recommendation so he opposed it.

In other board business, the current officers, President Trischa Clark, Vice President Schnetzer and Secretary Krieger were unanimously chosen to continue another year in the positions.

Clark appointed herself and Schnetzer to the budget and personnel committees, and Krieger and Rees to the planning committee.

In a surprise announcement, Director George Rowell announced that he and his family will be moving to Kansas later this winter or spring. He will eventually resign from his board seat, to which he was appointed in January 2018.

Few questions were asked about the district's mid-year budget status, which is in good condition. After six months, expenses have been about \$725,000, which is about \$75,000 more than revenue during this period. However, more property taxes and water usage billing periods remain before June 30.

Major expenses remaining this fiscal year include the \$250,000 payment for unfunded retiree health benefits, and capital investments for hydrants and pressure-reducing stations.

In water business, FVWD customers consumed nearly 5 million gallons of water in the billing period for November and December. This is about 360,000 gallons or 7.8 percent more water use than the same period in 2017.

For the whole year of 2018, consumption was 35.6 million gallons, which is about 108,000 gallons, or less than 1 percent, fewer gallons than in 2017. This is the first decline in consumption since 2015

However, there was some concern that the unaccounted-for water was nearly 25 percent. Jimenez expressed reservations but said the figure was not necessarily accurate until the district replaces its water meters on its storage tanks and re-assesses the methodology for computing water usage.

The complication is that FVWD's permit to divert surface water limits the months to which it can divert and when the tanks must be empty.

concern that the two programs would be conflicting. The health insurance penalty is an incentive for individuals to buy health insurance. As more do purchase coverage, the penalty revenue will decline and, therefore, less will be available to subsidize Covered Cal premiums.

While the LAO noted that Newsom did not earmark billions for reserves, the reserve balance will increase about \$200 million. Total reserves are projected to be \$18.5 billion at the end of fiscal year 2019-20, which is about 13 percent of the General Fund.

However, Newsom did allocate about \$9.7 billion toward debt and state liabilities. For example, \$5.3 billion will be used to make supplemental payments to both Cal PERS and Cal STRS. The effort to reduce the state's share of the unfunded liability for these programs should result in interest savings greater than \$7 billion over the next 30 years.

The LAO also complimented Newsom for using \$4.4 billion to repay sever-

al state debts, such as special fund loans and payment deferrals.

Always uncertain that the revenue collections will continue at the current pace, the LAO also noted that \$5.1 billion, or about a quarter of the increased spending, was directed to one-time projects such as housing and kindergarten facilities.

Anticipating the May revision, the LAO cautioned that revenues, particularly from capital gains, may be lower than estimated because of the market's downturn in December. If that occurs, the LAO noted that lower revenues also will lower several constitutionally mandated spending items, such as reserve deposits. Thus, the effect on discretionary revenues will be mitigated because the governor is not expanding ongoing spending by much.

The LAO was positive and complimentary reviewing Newsom's first budget. "The governor's budget makes prudent choices in allocating these resources," concluded the LAO.

Holocaust warning system

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum recently unveiled its updated Early Warning Project. Developed by the Museum's Simon-Skjodt Center for the Prevention of Genocide and Dartmouth College, the Early Warning Project is a first-of-its-kind prevention tool that utilizes data analysis, crowd forecasting, and qualitative assessments to help policy makers identify countries at risk of atrocities to prioritize responses that could prevent such crimes. The tool focuses on atrocities against new victim groups; it does not forecast violence for ongoing atrocities.

Part of the Early Warning Project is a Statistical Risk Assessment that focuses on countries with the greatest risk for atrocities against new victim groups, countries where risk has been consistent over time and countries where risk has increased or decreased significantly.

Accessible at earlywarningproject.ushmm.org, the Early Warning Project is one tool available to experts in government, NGOs, academia, and others who focus on genocide prevention. It aims to foster attention and discussion around places at high risk for violence, particularly countries that may be unexpectedly susceptible, and what options are available to mitigate those risks.

Support for caretakers

A series of classes for family members who care for older adults with Alzheimer's, stroke, Parkinson's and other chronic conditions is being offered for free through the Riverside County Office on Aging. Attendees will receive information on community resources, acquire skills to cope with changing demands and better understand how dementia affects personality and decision making.

The Care Pathways program begins in January throughout Riverside County.

Telling the story of the homeless

Idyllwild Arts symposium to raise awareness for an endangered minority

With the fraying of community bonds and the gaping holes in the U.S. safety net leaving millions of Americans only a health crisis or a job loss away from becoming homeless, the crisis of homelessness touches more of us than we'd like to admit.

On Feb. 1, Idyllwild Arts Academy's annual Art in Society Symposium will present "Uneasy Street - Untold Stories of the Homeless." The annual series focuses on misunderstood groups and endeavors to connect with those groups through communal art projects and stimulating dialogue.

The Art in Society program is coordinated by Eduardo Santiago. The Art in Society program gives the academy's high school artists opportunities to link the development of their craft to efforts to solve social problems a task for which the arts, with their persuasive powers, are well suited.

"The symposium isn't meant to solve all the problems of the world," said Santiago. "It's supposed to make our students and our community more aware of how they can inform, inspire and influence society through the transformative and healing power of art.'

Because the creative population of Idyllwild Arts is best reached through the arts, the 2019 symposium will feature San Diego's renowned homeless choir, Voices of Our City. They will appear along with the Los Angeles Poverty Department (LAPD), a performance group closely tied to Los Angeles' Skid Row neighborhood.

"Their name is a provocation of the original LAPD, the Los Angeles Police Department," Santiago ex-

plained. "The homeless are mistrustful of all police because in most places it's a crime to sleep on the streets. That's like making it illegal to be poor!"





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'Up Close and Personal: A retrospective of artist Darcy Gerdes'

Images captured on canvas by renowned Idyllwild artist Darcy Gerdes are, quite simply, breathtaking. Her talent expresses itself in an array of vivid wildlife scenes conveyed in acrylic, rivaling in scope the perennial beauty of nature herself. They somehow appear both magnified and distant.

Visionary wisdom inspires her soft brushstrokes and richly layered dimensional color, and the result is exquisite

Also included in Gerdes' retrospective are charming children's illustrations which sold worldwide in the early years of her career. The collection then gives way to a flourish of fairy and fantasyscapes, unconstrained by conventional reality, and influenced by the empowered women featured in Nordic mythology.

"Paintings come to me in a dream and I paint them in my head," Gerdes muses in her charming Idyllwild studio. Floor to ceiling north-facing glass invites regal light, affording an oblique angle across a magical, forested enclave. "Inspiration can strike anywhere," she adds. "If I love the theme, it comes to life."

Wildlife is one of Gerdes' favorite themes. An enchanting feeling is experienced in the presence of her piece entitled "Moonlight Magic" where a contented fawn is curled up in purple flora in a mystical, moonlit forest.

One senses alchemy here, and there's no doubt about that in Gerdes' mind. She attributes it to the water that she bathed in moonlight before mixing it with Liqui-Tex acrylic paint.

A resident of Idyllwild since 2001, Gerdes' love for this forest also inspires the whimsical collection captured on canvas titled "Idygnomes."

"There are nights when the wolves are silent and only the moon howls." This George Carlin quote inspired her painting entitled "Wild Solitude." In this piece, we witness a snowy forest meadow awash in blue moonlight. A lone wolf sits in rapt homage to an alluring sentinel: La Luna. Breathtaking for its majesty, the wolf seems to silently exude, "I am here." Implicit in moonlight's glowing response, "I see you."

Painting for as long as she can remember, Gerdes was drawing caricatures since before first grade. A challenging childhood led to an inner world of imagination that manifested itself through art.

While in elementary school, her work was exhibited in Laguna Beach, inspiring her to continue sketching. Mrs. Mason, "a fabulous high school teacher" and graduate of Boston College Arts, directed her training in realism, and a Disney animation artist living next door inspired whimsy and showed Gerdes that art could sustain her professionally.

Initially, Gerdes' illustrative work was spotted by an artist from Figi Graphics who asked her to produce backgrounds for her art. This proved a perfect opportunity for earning a living and was the genesis for 15 years illustrating for four different companies. She successfully progressed into acrylic, watercolor and colored pencil fine art when accepted by jury for Laguna Art-A-Fair.

Always a supporter of the community and in salute to the Art Alliance of Idyllwild's Deer Sightings project, Gerdes painted the legendary story "Spirit of Taquitch" on a life-sized deer located in front of Middle Ridge Winery. And for wine enthusiasts, her deer's image decorates the label of a signature bottle of the Middle Ridge 2011 Cabernet Sauvignon.

The first exhibition devoted to the full scope of Gerdes' career will be featured in the upper level of Middle Ridge Winery Tasting Gallery, beginning Wednesday, Jan. 23. It presents an unparalleled opportunity to study Gerdes' work, which spans nearly five decades, beginning with her early illustrative works created for Leanin' Tree Greeting Cards and on products carried at Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, Hallmark Cards and J.C. Penny, to her current wildlife and landscape paintings.

The show will be held concurrently with Middle Ridge Winery's "The Idyllwild Collection: Obsessions" exhibit and runs through April 21. An artist's reception will take place from 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 2, and is open to the pub-
