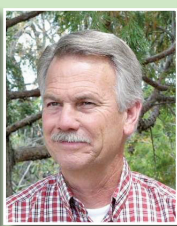


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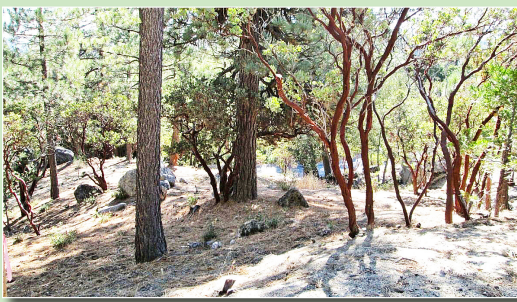

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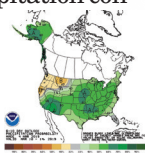

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Residents, businesses struggle in storms' aftermath

Editor's Note: Weather damage to Hill infrastructure, residences and businesses is an ongoing story the Town Crier will follow.

Nearly three weeks after heavy rains and snow damaged Hill infrastructure causing flooding and road closures, residents and businesses are struggling to regain footing in the aftermath.

Many are waiting – for cleanup assistance, repairs to property, road reopenings and a return to normal conditions.

In this article we'll review storm effects on full-time residents at Lake Hemet Campground, reduced small business traffic in Idyllwild attributed to road closures and how longer commutes are affecting propane distribution on the Hill. All who are affected are hoping that conditions will improve in March. Yet many are wary that forecasts of more rain and snow could further damage local infrastructure.

Mary and Michael Murray, long-time permanent RV residents of Lake Hemet Campground, are waiting for cleanup assistance on their water- and mud-damaged property. They are worried that a breached berm or levee that allowed floodwaters to build on their premium rental space will again breach with new rains.

The Murrys have lived year-round at

Rain deluge creates county emergency status declaration

Valentine's Day 2019 will always be remembered, and not just by lovers. The atmospheric river, which passed over Riverside County pouring 8 or more inches of rain, damaged and closed several local highways.

At its Feb. 26 meeting, the RC Board of Supervisors approved a resolution declaring a local emergency due to the storm's widespread damage. According to the background for the resolution, nearly 17,000 residents were evacuated due to the flooding.

The multiple highway closures "... have isolated or limited access to the communities of Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Mountain Center and other areas of the county which will result in

severe economic impact to those communities," the resolution declares.

Gov. Gavin Newsom issued his proclamation of state of emergency for 21 counties, including Riverside, on Feb. 21.

The board also approved a resolution extending the original local emergency proclamation for the Cranston Fire area.

In July 2018, days after the ignition of the Cranston Fire, the board initially declared a local emergency and former Gov. Jerry Brown also proclaimed a local emergency due to the fire. And it included this clause, "The Proclamation of Local Emergency begins the process to receive resources for assistance to first responders, residents and others impacted by the winter storm."

Rains damage local county roads

Highway repairs still weeks from completion

State highways are not the only roads damaged by the February rains. Attention has been focused on highways 74 and 243, but a few local streets also suffered damage from the voluminous runoff.

Delano Road is closed, except for Royal Pine Trailer Park residents, at Four Chimneys Road. At the cul de sac at the end of Idyllwild County Park and across from the entrance to Royal Pines, the road has severely been undercut. Pieces have begun to crumble.

Tahquitz Drive, about a quarter mile north from its intersection with lower South Circle Drive, also is closed. The road is completely severed. The access is available from both ends, but through-travel is impossible.



Runoff also has created some large potholes on Fern Valley Road, according to Dan Miller, assistant with the County Transportation Department in Idyllwild.

Repair work has already begun.

Work on highways 74 and 243 will still require weeks, perhaps another month, before 74 maybe open, according to Shane Massoud, public information officer for Caltrans District 8 Maintenance Office.

the campground for seven years but have been coming to the campground for more than 40 years, even spending their honeymoon in the peace and seclusion of the lakefront site. They were unable to detach their fifth wheel and drive out of the rapidly escalating emergency on Valentine's Day, Feb. 14, because of a fully enclosed and attached patio room.

Other long-term residents were able to detach and drive out on that Thursday. Some, in their haste, did not properly close their sewage connections, causing, according to multiple residents, raw sewage to begin floating throughout flood-damaged sections of the campground.

Mary anxiously watched water rising to the doors of her parked pickup truck, and threatening her patio room and two adjacent sheds in which many valuables were stored. Michael had left for work at Crossroads 243 church at 6 that morning.

Sometime late on Valentine's Day morning, professional responders helped Mary evacuate to the campground clubhouse, where she and her husband would spend the night until flood waters began to recede. They were back in their 40-foot RV home the next day, Friday, Feb. 15. Power had been restored but the Murrays were unsure, with the sewage bubbling throughout the area, whether water was potable.

The issue now for the Murrays and other campground residents is the berm or levee that broke, causing rapidly moving flood waters to impact their residences. As of this writing, the berm has not been repaired. Mary indicated it had broken once before in 2013 under similar flood conditions but had been repaired. She believed it was repaired by Lake Hemet Municipal Water District crews.

LHMWD owns the campground, lake and dam but, under a contract in 2011, California Parks now manages the campground.

And therein lies the conundrum — who is responsible for repairing the breached berm and the damage to many RV residential sites — LHMWD or California Parks? And will the berm and campground be further damaged by coming rains? Calls to Kelly Lam, marketing director at California Parks, and Michael Gow, LHMWD general manager and chief engineer, were not returned prior to deadline.

According to the Murrays, residents have been shoveling and cleaning up, with no apparent campground management plan for cleanup assistance. They are waiting for berm repair and help in restoring their premium site to its pre-flood condition.

The Murrays love the campground and its natural beauty. "It's our home," said Mary. "We're here because of the natural beauty." But they have lost valuables in the flooding and are concerned that more flooding could be ahead. "I've thrown away so much of my stuff that was damaged," she said. "What are we going to do?"

Also waiting for better conditions is Phyllis Brown, long-time owner of one of Idyllwild's marquee businesses, the Prairie Dove boutique and women's clothing shoppe. Brown has owned the well-established and successful business for 23 years but this string of calamities, topped by road closures of both highways 243 and 74, which drastically curtailed off-Hill visitor traffic, has so affected her business that she is considering relocating to another town.

"My business is down 30 percent," she noted. And had Brown not refinanced her home last fall, she would not have had the capital to sustain her business through this reduced tourism period. "January and February are traditionally slow business periods," she said. "I'm just hoping that March, which typically begins my business season, will be better. I'm just going to work and try to be positive. We'll just see."

Brown noted that she is aware other local businesses have suffered greater business loss than she. "I think everybody is under financial stress," said Brown. Like many, Brown said the severe weather and isolation have increased her feelings of vulnerability.

Lastly, propane suppliers have been challenged by road closures (Highway 74 between Valle Vista and Mountain Center, and 243 at Round Robin Dive north of Pine Cove to 11.1 miles south of Banning at Skyland Ranch Road) in their efforts to supply the Hill.

Andrew Kotyuk, CEO of SoCal Propane, was the first to return a call regarding the challenge his company is facing in servicing Hill customers. "Road closures have added two hours plus of travel time to Hill deliveries, as well as the extra cost of diesel fuel," noted Kotyuk. "We're running seven days a week in our office and in the field in trying to service our customers."

"Our challenge is trying to service also service customers who own their own tanks. That's hard. We want to service those customers but must first assist the customers who are regular and with us all the time."

SoCal has made major inroads in the Hill market through competitive pricing and local field management. Frank Jakubac, SoCal partner and field manager, is a Hill resident. For that reason, SoCal customers have said they feel comfortable having a local supply their propane needs.

Kotyuk said supplying the Hill has been a challenge because of the shut down of three or four refineries for planned maintenance. "No one anticipated the severity of this winter," said Kotyuk. "Those refineries pumped

for the season and then stored based on a normal winter's needs. But this was not a normal year. There was much more demand with colder temperatures."

He noted that a 30-year levee in the San Jacinto area broke during the recent storms. "This winter's precipitation has been greater than a 30-year storm for this area."

"These are the times that matter for customer service — times of emergencies. If you can't be counted on when it matters the most, then what does it matter? Servicing our customers and being counted on is what our crews desire. We're thankful we're able to perform."

Kotyuk noted his storage field in San Jacinto will open in 30 days. "We're just waiting on Edison [Southern California Edison] to energize it." That massive storage capability will continue to allow SoCal to price competitively.

Rainfall already exceeding annual averages

More coming this week and next

The past week has been a time for snow melting. Higher temperatures, as well as more rain, have melted most of the snow-fall from the last week of February.

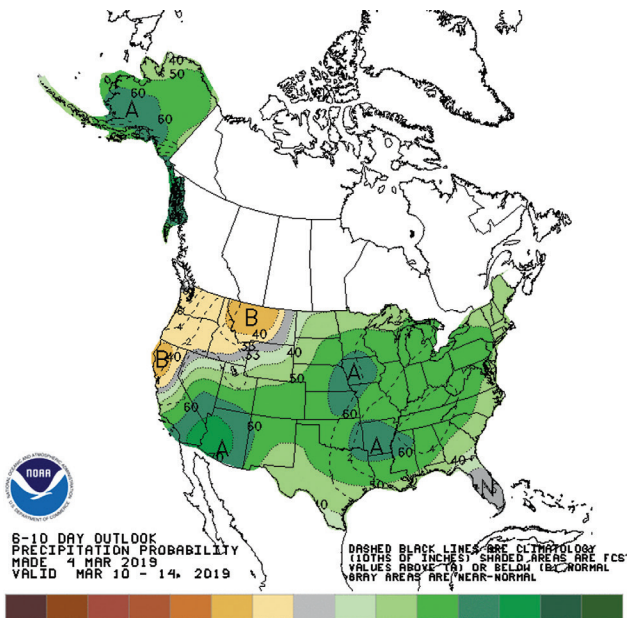
But hopes of a sunny and warm spring are premature. The National Weather Service is forecasting more precipitation and declining temperatures through the week and into early next week.

Saturday brought three-quarters of an inch of rain to the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station and slightly less (about 0.6 inches) was recorded at the Idyllwild Fire Station.

Since Oct. 1, 2018, Keenwild has recorded 25.5 inches of rain. The long-term average for a year is 25.7 inches, of which about 20.5 falls between October and the end of March. More rain is forecast for this week and early next week.

Last week's rain was heavier in the northern portion of the San Jacinto Mountains. Vista Grande recorded 1.8 inches and Poppet Flats had 1.1 inches. Even Garner Valley recorded 0.8 inches.

The next rain was to

arrive late Tuesday. This will be a warm storm and snow levels will be about 9,000 feet. Wednesday, a second and colder storm will cross the Hill and snow levels could drop to 6,500 feet.

But Friday will bring even colder temperatures and NWS expects some snow as low as 4,500 to 5,500 feet..

While next weekend will be warmer and drier, "Another cold upper low will drop down the coast Monday and Tuesday ... The amount of rain and mountain snow we get will depend on how far south the trough digs, but it will most certainly continue the cold weather trend of

below average temperatures," according to NWS.

As to the longer term, the state's Department of Water Resources' most recent snow survey "recorded 113 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent (SWE) of 43.5 inches, which is more than double what was recorded last month statewide, the Sierra Nevada snow pack is 153 percent of average for this date, thanks to several atmospheric rivers during February."

Many of the state reservoirs are already above historical averages for early March.

Top field unuseable after flood



The flooding from recent rains severely damaged the artificial-turf top field at Idyllwild School. Flood waters washed away large segments of the hillside outside the right-center field fence, and large amounts of earth washed through the fence and created wide rivulets of mud and debris across center and left fields. Much of it ended up against the outside gate in left field, at that point creating a broad carpet of debris 4-6 inches thick covering the surface of the field. Principal Matt Kraemer stated nothing could be done to prepare for and protect against an 8-inch onslaught of rain. He said that after the snow melted — and the extent of the damage could fully be seen — Hemet Unified School District experts would inspect the field to determine how best to handle the situation. As of now, the field is clearly unplayable, and it will be for an indefinite period. PHOTOS BY JACK CLARK

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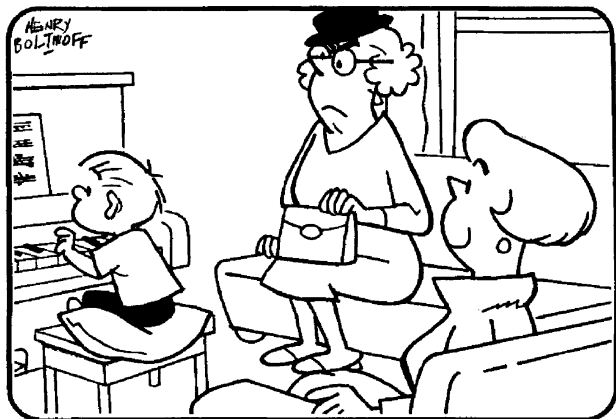
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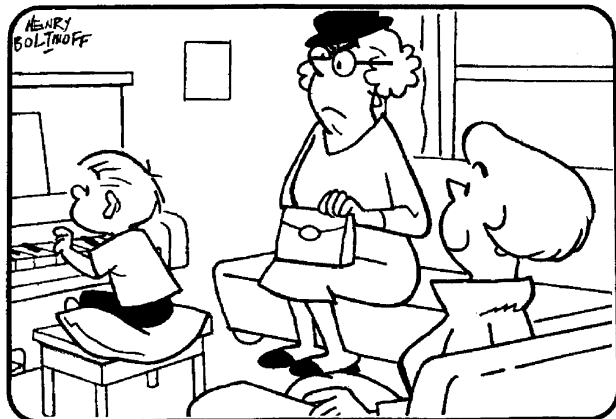

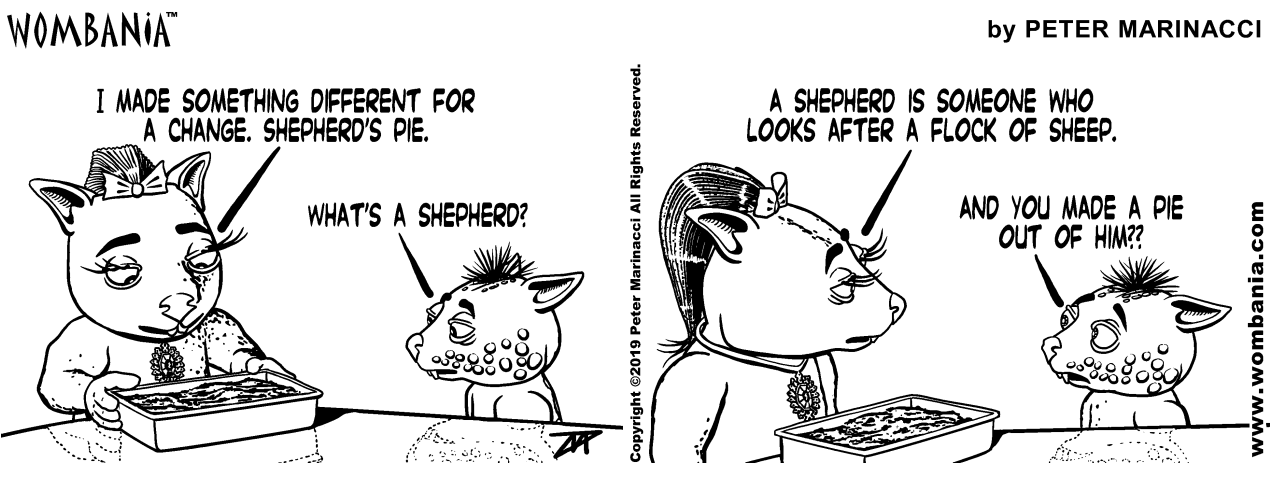
Comments on draft OHV grants sought

Officials with San Bernardino National Forest are seeking comments from the public on two preliminary grants submitted to the State of California to fund the forest's off-highway vehicle operations. The draft applications, based on public and staff feedback given in January and February, seek to enhance ground operations and law enforcement functions:

- Ground operations requests funding for route monitoring and maintenance; facility operations and maintenance at five staging areas, six trailering sites and three campgrounds; habitat monitoring; soil conservation; archaeology site steward program; and new equipment to monitor trails.
- Law enforcement requests funding for staffing and equipment to enforce regulations.

Quiet Skies demands FAA cancel flight path over Idyllwild, shunt jets over Temecula

Calling it a “win-win” for the Federal Aviation Administration and the public, Quiet Skies Idyllwild is demanding that the agency redirect upwards of 250 commercial jets that fly over Idyllwild each day. QSI wants the jets rerouted to a more southerly flight path over Temecula.

QSI spokesperson David Pearson said two hundred jets a day currently fly over that city, located southwest of Idyllwild, east of Camp Pendleton, and near Interstate 15 and Highway 79 interchange.

FAA implemented new arrival and departure paths at the Los Angeles International Airport resulting in a 25-fold increase in the number of audible commercial jets traveling east-bound directly over Idyllwild, according to QSI. Prior to March 2, 2017, roughly ten commercial jets a day flew over Idyllwild on an east-bound route from LAX.

QSI's most recent data show that 196 commercial jets flew over the Hill February 17 — compared to only 15 jets two years ago.

“QSI...demands...[that] the FAA cancel DOTSS2. CLEEE, (pronounced SEE-lee), for health and safety reasons for a half-million people, routing traffic to other existing routes over the largely uninhabited lands south of the Mt. San Jacinto massif,” Pearson said.

“Inland from the coastal Santa Ana Mountains, approximately 600,000 people live under the DOTSS2-CLEEE route...in Idyllwild, and cities such as Perris, Menifee, Hemet, San Jacinto, Palm Desert, La Quinta, Indio and Coachella.”

Pearson said, “In addition to having exposed half-a-million more Californians to over-flight noise and air pollution, the route adversely affects the quality of life of Idyllwild residents...we experience prolonged noise interruption...and the peace and quiet of the surrounding mountain wilderness is disrupted. In the event of severe, inclement weather conditions on Mt. San Jacinto, traffic is often shifted southwards from DOTSS2-CLEEE to DOTSS2-CNERV.”

“By shunting [the flights] to DOTSS2.CNERV [about 20 miles to the south] there would be a less than one percent increase in distance travelled (relevant for jet fuel consumption and carbon footprint), making this a “win-win” for the FAA and the public.”

Responding to Town Crier questions about the impact of more than doubling the number of commercial jet flights over Temecula, Pearson, said, “Yes, there would be an increase in over-flights of Temecula. Temecula and its 114,000 residents are situated under DOTSS2-CNERV.

However, these flights would not number any more than they were already experiencing pre-March 2017 ... when the flight burden in the Temecula-Murrieta zone was between 400 to 500 daily. Temecula does not experience the noise reverberation from over-flights which plagues us here on the bowl-shaped western slopes of Mt. San Jacinto.

“In the bigger picture, planes routed on DOTSS2. CLEEE ... fly over communities with 600,000 populations, whereas the alternative existing DOTSS2.CNERV route passes only over roughly 114,000 persons. We hope to build a consensus with elected officials of the affected communities, leading to FAA's re-analysis of alternative routes, routing traffic away from cities and over largely uninhabited lands south of the Mt. San Jacinto massif.

“Perhaps the FAA can design a modified route just south of Temecula which would make the shift even more compelling for safety and noise pollution considerations.”

QSI Public meeting

About 50 Hill residents and Peter Carlstrom, Field Representative for Congressman Raul Ruiz, M.D., were on hand to hear QSI's “win-win” solution at the group's Town Hall meeting on March 2, the second anniversary of the day FAA's NextGen began routing hundreds of flights over the

Hill.

Carlstrom participated in the program on behalf of Congressman Ruiz, reading Ruiz's letter thanking QSI for their “tireless advocacy” and lauding their “grassroots activism as a source of personal inspiration...You can consider me an ally.”

In his letter, Ruiz went on to say: “My family and I have personally come to rely upon our mountain communities for reprieve from the faster pace of the Coachella Valley. I will continue fighting to ensure that other families are afforded the same opportunity to experience the tranquility that one finds when immersed in the beauty of nature.”

Ruiz's letter said he found the FAA's response to questions he posed in June 2018 “unsatisfactory.” I remain unconvinced that adequate consideration was given to the unique geographical and topographical characteristics of this region when establishing their new flight path,” he wrote.

As recently as February 6 in an email to a QSI member, the Agency continued to stand behind findings from its environmental analyses—that the new route over the Hill would not have any significant impacts to people, historic properties, parks or other applicable environmental resources.

Ruiz's letter stated that he had joined the Quiet Skies Caucus in Congress, and “would continue working to reduce aircraft noise in our district and across the nation.” He reiterated his earlier concerns as a physician...and “as an admirer of the pristine beauty that Idyllwild represents to us all.

“Flight noise in Idyllwild and the surrounding communities poses a serious health risk to residents—costing them sleep and peace of mind—while simultaneously disrupting our local ecosystems. I will continue working toward meaningful solutions in 2019!”

As a part of the program, musicians Peter Davison, Keith McCabe, and Bill Sheppard; Forester Deborah Geisinger; retired Aeronautical Engineer Ygnacio “Nacho” Garcia; and hiking/biking and/or walking enthusiasts Julie Koppel and Pamela Mayfield presented testimony about how the over-flights have affected them.

Unable to be present, business-owner Helen Hixon and musician-songwriter Jeff Hixon sent written comments on NextGen. Audience members asked questions and added their concerns to QSI's overall slate of issues, which include: noisy over-flights and disruption of personal, professional, creative, family, visitor and outdoor activities; air and water pollution; changes in wildlife behavior; threats to business and tourism, and pressure on property values.

Pearson displayed photographs of Idyllwild skies with contrails from jet over-flights, and graphics comparing the unwanted flight path over Idyllwild to the one being demanded of FAA. Musician-songwriter Terry Jo Stratton performed “Quiet Skies” to close out the meeting.

DETAILED SUMMARY OF THE MATTERS PLAINTIFF SEEKS TO VALIDATE:
Plaintiffs are the Garner Valley Property Owners' Association ("GVPOA"), an unincorporated association of property owners located in Garner Valley, and James Martens ("Martens") (collectively, "Plaintiffs"), an individual. Plaintiffs seek to invalidate the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District's ("District") adoption of Resolution No. 785 which, among other actions, increases water service rates in the Garner Valley service area. Resolution No. 785 and the rate increase seeks to recover \$1,700,000 from Plaintiffs for a historical deficit in Garner Valley associated with previous advancement of funds. However, there is no explanation of the purpose of the purported \$1,700,000 in advanced funds and there is no evidence that the funds were considered at the time to be an advancement and no evidence that the idea of cost recovery was contemplated. The District's rate increase materials also failed to present any plan or program describing how costs claimed to be misallocated going back to 2002 would be paid back.
The District improperly approved the rate increase by diluting the protesting power and rights of Garner Valley ratepayers. The Garner Valley service area is a self-contained and the costs of operating that system have no direct connection to or impact on the main Hemet/ San Jacinto system. The District impermissibly merged the 242 Garner Valley ratepayers with more than 14,000 District ratepayers served through a completely separate distribution system with water from sources distinct from Garner Valley for purposes of calculating protests to the rate increase.
Through this reverse validation (or invalidation) action, Plaintiffs seek: a judicial determination that the District's adoption of Resolution No. 785, and the rate increases adopted therein, was invalid and improper and must be set aside; and a stay and/or temporary restraining order, preliminary injunction and/or permanent injunction restraining and enjoining the District from taking any actions in furtherance of or in purported reliance on Resolution No. 785.

Idyllwild Fire honors staff and addresses money decisions

Tax measure action deferred to March

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission held its meeting, nearly four hours in duration, Tuesday, Feb. 26. As promised, the commission had its plan to secure a new and higher parcel (unit) fee on the agenda.

However, the discussion of the tax measure was held to the end of the meeting, at which point the commission also deferred any action until its March meeting.

Commissioner Henry Sawicki, chair of the Ad Hoc Tax Measure Committee, said William Berry, a California political consultant, contacted him and advised that the way the commission was approaching the issue would “ensure defeat.”

Berry, who apparently has shepherded many local tax measures to victory, offered to discuss the subject with Sawicki or other commission members.

Sawicki said he would contact Berry and share the discussion with his colleagues at the March meeting, when they will presumably move forward on putting the proposal on a ballot later this year.

The principle reason for the length of the meeting was the honoring and recognizing of various members of the career staff.

“We’re catching up with a lot of information, and I am proud and honored of the accomplishments, which stand before you,” Assistant Fire Chief Mark LaMont said as he brought the career staff forward and described their accomplishments.

In the absence of Fire Chief Patrick Reitz, LaMont announced several promotions and pinned badges on Russel Bray and Nelson Escovar, who have completed their probation periods,

and are now firefighters and emergency medical technicians.

Idyllwild battalion chief’s wages broken down

Editor’s note: Because of pressing issues regarding the local weather disasters, we are unable to investigate further this week on this issue, as some readers and also attendees requested at last week’s news meeting.

Following publication of the Idyllwild Fire De-

partment wages, as reported to the state Controller General, who posts it on the agency’s website at <http://publicpay.ca.gov/>, several readers requested more detail on the battalion chief’s remuneration, which totaled more than a quarter million dollars in 2017. The wages reported were more than twice what the Fire

Chief received.

The information presented is posted as submitted by the reporting entity. The controller provides this information for more than 3,000 special districts and is available for calendar years 2009 through 2017.

LaMont said Trevor Douville, the county EMS director who accepted the documentation that LaMont presented, admitted that EMS had not seen these papers and would present them to the county counsel to move the agreement forward.

LaMont also reported that a draft of a new dispatch agreement with Riverside County was under review. LaMont and RC Battalion Chief Bill Weiser met and discussed the agreement and possible changes.

The cost of the contract with the county may be increasing, so LaMont also is investigating alternative dispatch centers such as San Bernardino County, North County Joint Powers Authority in San Diego County and the city of Hemet Police Department.

The district recently acquired a new fire engine.

Beverly Hills announced the equipment was surplus and IFPD purchased the engine for \$6,000.

About another \$13,000 to \$21,000 will be used to purchase more equipment and supplies for the engine, which will then be certified as a Type 1. Eventually, current engine 622 will be modified to become a water tender, capable of carrying 1,000 gallons, LaMont told the commission.

Both vehicles will qualify to be used on mutual aid assignments, he added.

This fiscal year, mostly since the Cranston Fire, IFPD has received more than \$45,000 in donations. The gifts have been used to purchase equipment such as breathing apparatus and the new engine, protective gear for staff, vehicle radios and improvements for the computer system.

The commission reviewed a draft of a new set of fees for reviewing construction plans, water systems and mitigation efforts. These will be posted before the March meeting, when the vote on accepting them will occur, according to President Jerry Buchanan.

Jim LaMont revised the fee schedule and the new fees are based on the estimated time it will take to complete the action, such as reviewing a construction plan, according to his brother, Mark LaMont.

If approved, the fee revenue could increase between 30 and 50 percent. However, the current revenue estimate is about \$3,000 so new fees will not dramatically increase total revenues of more than \$2 million.

of California, Davis’ 3-day “2019 Airplane Noise and Emissions Symposium,” the goal of which was “developing ways to work cooperatively to mitigate the environmental impacts of NextGen flight path changes.”

Several FAA officials were scheduled to attend and/or present at the conference, including Kevin Welsh, Executive Director of FAA, Office of Environment and Energy, and representatives of the National Organization to Insure a Sound-Controlled Environment (NOISE), an advocate for noise-affected communities and an affiliate of the National League of Cities.

Pearson said although he did not attend, FAA officials “would be able to hear Idyllwild’s case during the ‘Community Group Annual Gathering.’ We’re trying to bring back the peace and quiet that we all cherish up here.”

During spring 2018, QSI members Sheppard and McCabe had begun to hear, see and feel the effects of the increased commercial jets flying over Idyllwild. In April 2018, The Town Crier investigated their complaints, linking them to NextGen’s new aircraft routing procedures deployed between November 2016 and April 2017 at LAX and other airports in California and around the nation. Sheppard and McCabe’s initial detection of the increased over-flights led to the creation of QSI in May 2018.

Snow Group talks progress to Pine Cove

Despite a rainy and cool morning, about 20 residents trudged to the Pine Cove Fire Station to hear Fern Valley resident Marsha Kennedy discuss the origin and efforts of the Idyllwild Snow Group.

Heavy snowfalls during the winter of 2016-17 attracted a vast number of visitors to the Hill. Most of them were seeking places to park close to where their children could enjoy and play in snow, which is a seldom, if ever, possibility in the flat lands from Hemet to the coast.

With so much snow, even plowed roads barely had local access. Visitor parking along the edge of the roads and berms often made passage difficult and posed problems for emergency vehicles.

Kennedy and several friends and Fern Valley neighbors were concerned about the effect on public safety, as well as the cavalier attitude of littering, leaving trash and parking on private property.

After a Town Crier “Out Loud” column, Kennedy and her cohorts found sympathetic companions throughout the Hill communities, and the Idyllwild Snow Group was conceived and formed.

Since then, they have reached out and spoken to local representatives such as state Sen. Jeff Stone and Riverside County Supervisor Chuck Washington, law enforcement officials at both the county and state level, and the local forest ranger district.

The concerns about offensive and rude behavior were just part of the larger issue of where visitors could find safe places to enjoy the snow without harming residents.

“Snow-play visitors are an irreversible force,” Kennedy admitted. But the Hill has “no infrastructure needed to accommodate this influx during difficult weather conditions.”

The group has developed a flier, which is on its website (idyllwildsnow.com), and found in the case next to Harmony Monument in town. The flier identifies several areas, with public restrooms, available to those coming to enjoy the snow. These include the Nature Center, the State Park, Idyllwild County Park and Thousand Trails.

The website also offers advice on using chains, road closures and litter disposal.

Kennedy noted that visits to the website have grown from about 8,000 in 2018 to more than 190,000 already this year.

The group conversed with the California Highway Patrol and the county Sheriff’s Department, both agencies of which seem receptive to and cooperative about the dangers excessive visitors can create on snow-laden roads. The agencies send additional deputies to the Hill after snow and patrol the roads to reduce illegal parking. The first weekend with snow after highways 74 and 243 were closed in February, CHP had a checkpoint at Lake Hemet to limit access for non-residents.

The local Idyllwild Ranger District also has cooperated, according to Kennedy. The gates to Humber Park have been locked to prevent traffic and access during snow events. Also, there is an effort to emphasize that the area is the Humber Park Trailhead, Devil’s Slide and Ernie Maxwell trails, as opposed to a large and inviting park.

The group is still working with officials to obtain signage identifying snow-play areas. The county has

placed many no snow parking signs along Fern Valley Road and others.

PCPOA Director Jerry Holldber suggested Kennedy encourage the U.S. Forest Service to expand its efforts to provide snow-play areas. The local forest lands are available for other recreational use, such as hiking, horse-back riding, off-road-vehicles and fishing. Playing in the snow is another appropriate activity if it is organized and controlled.

Other comments included Pine Cove resident Jeff Smith discouraging the placement of trash bins in local highway turnouts. He argued that these were safety locations and should not be overwhelmed with long-term parking.

Mark Dean suggested the group also work with the local rental agents and Airbnb hosts so they can help inform visitors of the local situation and opportunities.

MDP community meeting on highway repairs

Mountain Disaster Preparedness has organized a community meeting to discuss the highway access to Idyllwild caused by the recent weather. The session will be 6 p.m. Monday, March 18. Mike Feyder, MDP president, is arranging a location to accommodate the public. But the time and date are set. Representatives of the California Department of Transportation and Highway Patrol, and the county will attend and speak to the public about the progress of the work to repair highways 74 and 243. Time also will be allocated to discuss many questions about the lessons we learned from this isolation. “This is the first time we are really an island in the

sky,” Feyder said, describing the highway situation. As a consequence of the road disruption, individuals were concerned about heating homes during the extremely low temperatures. Propane deliveries were limited, and rain and snow limited firewood delivery to burn. Also, people were worried about the ability of emergency vehicles, such as ambulances, to get patients to hospitals or other medical care. “We will devote some time to discussing these types of issues, too,” Feyder said. “We want to get community feedback. There are lessons to be learned.” Also, there may be some attention devoted to the use of social media as a source of information rather than official agency websites or representatives. A long commute for school staff

The closure of Highway 74 is much more than a nuisance or inconvenience for Idyllwild high school students and Hemet Unified School District personnel who commute. Several HUSD staff live in Idyllwild and work in Hemet, and some Idyllwild School faculty live in Hemet. The district is trying to help as much as possible, according to Idyllwild School Principal Matt Kraemer. HUSD has a shuttle available in both directions. Gov. Newsom discusses State of the State

Proposed actions will affect the Hill

On Feb. 12, Gov. Gavin Newsom spoke to the state Legislature giving his State of State address. Newsom covered many topics from housing to high-speed railways, and several subjects, which will have direct or incidental effects on the Hill. Water supply was a major topic to which Newsom devoted significant attention. Not only did he address the issues such as the Delta tunnels and groundwater recharge, Newsom reminded the legislators “... millions of Californians woke up without clean water to bathe or drink.” Calling this situation both a “moral disgrace and a medical emergency,” he implored them to solve it with sustained funding. His budget proposal in January resurrected the concept of a statewide water tax to fund these systems containing lead, arsenic, uranium or other contaminants. The Legislature has not acted yet. The Association of California Water Agencies has opposed the tax on individuals. Instead, it has recommended using some of the state reserves to fund the necessary system improvements. He also touched on energy issues, particularly the financial danger facing Pacific Gas and Electric because of its role in the recent Northern California wildfires. Newsom recognizes this problem affects each of the state’s electric utilities and has created a commission to find solutions. Southern California Edison has prepared and submitted a Wildfire Mitigation Plan to the state’s Public

Utilities Commission. The growing senior population in the state was another issue Newsom considers important for the Legislature’s attention. The last census reported that the Hill’s senior population was equal to under age 20s, and both are larger than residents between ages 20 and 50. Not only does he want a Master Plan for Aging, but he will launch an Alzheimer’s Prevention and Preparedness Task Force. In just the past few months, the Hill has lost two residents who wandered away from home and could not be found before they died. And he ended his talk with attention on healthcare and health insurance for state residents. He wants to expand subsidies for those earning less than \$48,000 annually and extend help to families making up to \$150,000. JP Crumrine can be reached at jp@towncrier.com.

THOUSANDS OF PACIFIC CREST TRAIL HIKERS EXPECTED THIS SEASON

Each year brings thousands of hikers from across the world to California to begin the journey of a lifetime on the Pacific Crest Trail, a 2,650-mile journey from the Mexican border to Canada. This spectacular trail winds through 25 national forests and 7 national parks. Hikers from around the world come to complete the 4-6 month journey on the Pacific Crest Trail. In 2018, 31 countries were represented on the trail and 2019 is on track to be the busiest to date. Idyllwild, at mile 179 of the PCT, is widely known in the PCT community as a hiker-friendly town.

The Pacific Crest Trail Association (PCTA) issues PCT long-distance permits on behalf of all federal, state and local agencies that hikers will encounter throughout their trip. A total of 7,313 permits were issued for the 2019 hiking season. This increase of 289% in just 5 years and 20.5% from last year combined with winter storms similar to 2017 when David O'Sullivan went missing, means there is a strong probability of injury or getting lost while hiking back to the PCT.

This season's hikers have already started to trickle through Idyllwild.



SAFETY CONCERNS FOR HIKERS

Search efforts for David O'Sullivan exposed concerns that PCT hikers should be aware of. Directional signs are not always PCT hiker-friendly at junctions. Most but not all hikers carry phones with apps to guide them to the correct trail which helps, but hikers without a smart phone on trail are at a disadvantage.

Then there's Fuller Ridge, a five-mile section on the PCT before hikers start their descent to Snow Creek Road near the Desert Water Authority (DWA) property. Many injuries were reported from slipping and falling on Fuller Ridge in 2017. Some hikers reported taking up to two hours to climb back up to the trail.

When snow is present, hikers scatter, some using Devil's Slide, which is the most popular trail to take especially when the mountain is snow free. Others take Black Mountain road in order to avoid Fuller Ridge, and others take Deer Springs.

Although unusual, some take Marion Mountain Trail. These multiple exit points present a unique challenge for searchers as they attempt to reconstruct the missing hiker's return to the trail and narrow down the search area.



HIKER RESOURCES

A valuable resource along the 2,650-mile journey is the "Trail Angel." PCT hikers call anyone who helps them along their way a Trail Angel. Trail Angels are people who offer water, food, shelter, rides or anything needed to help them complete their journey. In order to get to the trailheads, many hikers will look for a ride, sometimes hitchhiking along roadways. Some Idyllwild residents advertise their services on a Trail Angel Idyllwild Facebook page.

Another important resource for hikers who ask about trail information is the San Jacinto trail report available at sanjacjon.com. Referring them to the sanjacjon.com site provides current, local trail information. Jon King is on these trails almost daily and consistently updates trail conditions. He knows the trails and reports critical information so hikers are aware of any dangers, water conditions or areas where winter equipment is needed.

HOW YOU CAN SAVE A LIFE

In recent years, we've learned Trail Angels can assist searchers by simply reporting the trailhead where a hiker was dropped off. This information saves searchers critical man hours spent ruling out trails.

Although we hope this isn't the case, the O'Sullivan family and the David O'Sullivan search team want you to know that as a Good Samaritan or Trail Angel you can provide critical information at the beginning of a search if you collect 3 pieces of information every time you transport a PCT hiker back to a trail. Specifically, start a log to use when transporting a PCT Hiker back to a trail. In the log collect:

- 1) the hiker's real name (not the trail name)
- 2) date and time
- 3) the trailhead at which you dropped the hiker(s) off.

These three pieces of information can be golden to search and rescue personnel if a hiker goes missing after leaving Idyllwild. In fact, in some communities, Trail Angels take a picture of the hikers they drop off to further help with a search. Pictures are helpful in that they can quickly be circulated on social media e.g. PCT Facebook pages and in creating flyers of what the hiker was wearing and their latest look (e.g. beard, no beard etc.).



DID YOU SEE DAVID?

It has been nearly two years since a hiker from Ireland set out on a journey that brought him to Idyllwild. He has not been seen or heard from since.

David O'Sullivan, a 25-year-old Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) hiker from County Cork, Ireland, dreamt of hiking the PCT after reading the book "Wild" by Cheryl Strayed.

David, an honor student, finished his studies at University College Cork with a degree in English and philosophy. He set a goal of hiking the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) in 2017 and prepared physically and financially to make his goal a reality.

On April 5, 2017, David hiked into Idyllwild, staying at the Idyllwild Inn for two nights.

He completed chores such as laundry, resupplying his food for the next section of the trail and eating

some good, hot food.

He wrote to his parents on the evening of April 6. This was the last Con and Carmel O'Sullivan would hear from their son.

In his last email home he wrote in part, "The good news is that Idyllwild is a great town to stay in for the day. The restaurants are tasty and cheap. Everyone is super friendly."

The following morning he checked out of the Idyllwild Inn, headed for one of the trails leading to the PCT and has not been seen or heard from since, never reaching his next resupply town of Big Bear.

An ocean away, back in Ireland, his parents await any news about their son's whereabouts.

A dedicated group of volunteers has not forgotten about David and search for any clues of him along the trails of the San Jacinto Mountains and beyond.

The O'Sullivan family is not alone in their nightmare of the unknown. Three other hikers have vanished along the PCT since 2015. Chris Sylvia disappeared in 2015 while on a section hike near Anza. Kris "Sherpa" Fowler disappeared in 2016 in Washington; David went missing in 2017 and Gavin Johnston disappeared near Stevens Pass, Washington in 2018. The families of these four young men anxiously await answers on the fate of their missing sons.

Adventures in arctic medicine coming to Idyllwild

The term “page turner” is generally associated with novels of suspense, intrigue and mystery. Rarely do we find it applied to a work of nonfiction. But one writer has crafted a memoir of his time as an arctic physician that well earns that accolade.

The book is “On Call in the Arctic” by Thomas J. Sims, M.D., a fast-paced and engaging read. Once begun, you won’t want to set it down for a moment.

In the early ’70s, as a young physician with the beginnings of a family, Sims was assigned by the Public Health Service to be the sole physician in Nome, Alaska.

The difficulties of extraordinary life in that part of 1970s Alaska were multiplied by his youth, inexperience, family responsibilities — and the fact that he was constantly on call to provide healthcare for not only the residents of Nome, but also the inhabitants of 13 Eskimo villages in southwest Alaska. (Yes, Eskimo, not Inuit, per the Author’s Note.)

Sims’ writing makes you his close companion. You

live his experiences, making do with substandard living accommodations, poorly equipped medical facilities, having to improvise to meet one medical emergency af-

ter another, responding to calls using the most unlikely and perilous forms of transportation.

Example: A baby fixing to be born in a hurry, a young man in agony with acute appendicitis and a boy with a severely fractured arm — all coming through the emergency room doors minutes apart. Sims’ vivid dialogue pulls you into the ER with him and his aides as he scrambles to doctor them all simultaneously.

More: Another baby appearing determined to enter the world neither head nor breech first, but sideways — extending a blue hand in early greeting. A frantic phone call to

an OB-GYN specialist in Anchorage yielded only a single word of advice — “Pray” — then the line went dead.

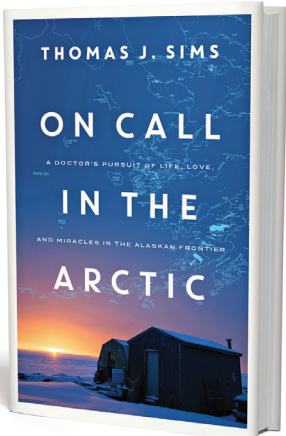
And: His own baby son injured in a violent “snowmachine” crash, requiring his immediate, simultaneous professional and personal attention.

Between medical adventures, mix in Sims’ captivating depictions of Alaskan natural phenomena — relentless winter darkness, aurora borealis and Bearing Sea “breakup” — and you feel you’ve been there.

Dr. Sims is coming to Idyllwild to speak about his unique Alaskan adventures at Idyllwild Library at 1 p.m. Saturday, March 16. All are welcome to attend.

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‘Turnover’ stirs up Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema

Bestselling novelist comes to Idyllwild

Janet Fitch of ‘White Oleander’ fame to lead April Writers Retreat

Janet Fitch’s mega-bestselling 1999 debut novel “White Oleander” makes her well qualified to lead the April 5 to 7 Spring Writers Retreat (idyllwildarts.org/spring-writers-retreat/) on the Idyllwild Arts campus.

The course description promises an attempt to “reinforce participants’ connection with their creative sources, and explore aspects of craft,” and the craft that Fitch lavished on “White Oleander” wasn’t the only thing that made it an Oprah’s Book Club selection.

The protagonist and narrator, 13-year-old Astrid Magnussen, gets placed with a succession of brilliantly characterized Los Angeles foster families after her mother goes to prison for killing an ex-lover. If the pain of the worst family drama is something many of us would like to avoid and forget, it’s also a source of creativity for an artist brave enough to explore that pain in order to understand and overcome it.

Kirkus Reviews found many virtues in “White Oleander,” including its “panorama of late 20th-century American life.” Fitch also portrayed late 20th-century American life in “Paint It Black” (2006), focusing again on Los Angeles, but this time on the anarchic punk-rock scene of the ’80s.

And Fitch’s most recent novel, 2017’s “The Revolution of Marina M.,” while journeying half a world away from Los Angeles to the Russian Revolution, is even more panoramic than “White Oleander” in its sweeping view of one of the most decisive moments of the last century.

All three of her novels show the unflinching artistic courage that first emerged in “White Oleander.” She is an author not afraid to probe the wounds of a broken family, of young people drawn to extremes of action and expression, or of a nation convulsed by revolution. Yet her discoveries are beautiful, and the people who take part in her April Writers Retreat will benefit from Fitch’s gift for finding beauty as well as from her courage.

The retreat costs \$685 and space is limited.

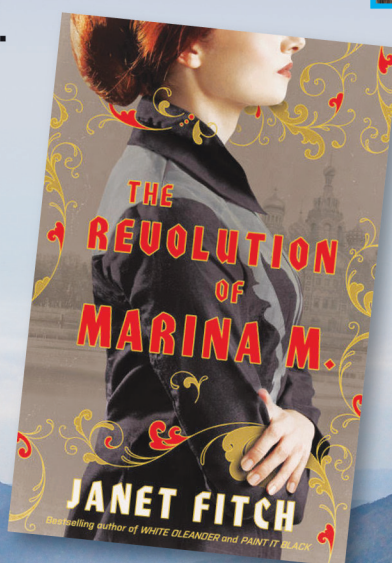

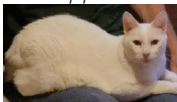

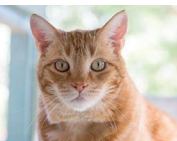

With the help of a slide rule, Larry Smith estimated he had removed 8 tons of snow from his roof.

65 years ago - 1954
The snow pack in Tahquitz Valley, the survey team found, measured only 28 inches in depth.

60 years ago - 1959
Planes and helicopters spent several days over Idyllwild and environs searching for a missing jet trainer from El Paso. No trace was found.

55 years ago - 1964
Dr. Max Krone announced that the University of Southern California had acquired the campus and all structures of the Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts.

50 years ago - 1969
For the first time in more than 20 years, the level of Lake Hemet was at the top of the dam. Flood gates were opened to release some of the water.

45 years ago - 1974
The Town Crier printed a story, “How to get gas.” Only one of the three Idyllwild gas stations was pumping on weekends; the second was pumping weekdays from 9 to 11 a.m. and 4 to 6 p.m., and the third started at 8 a.m. but stopped when 500 gallons had been pumped in a day.

40 years ago - 1979
Motor homes, vans, pickups, Indio CHP cars, a large bus, trailers and catering trucks rolled into the Lake Hemet Market parking lot. It was a startling sight for local customers and travelers. The filming of a two-hour “Eight is Enough” TV episode was taking place.

Idyllwild Fire Protection District got a great deal on two used Thumpers (mechanical cardio-pulmonary resuscitator units) from the city of Mesa, Arizona. The price was \$1,000 plus tax, compared to more than \$11,500 for new ones.

15 years ago - 2004
The Hemet Unified School District board decided to install artificial turf on the playing fields at several schools, including Idyllwild and Hamilton.

10 years ago - 2009
The trial of Raymond Lee Oyler, 38, of Beaumont, for murder and arson for the Esperanza Fire of Oct. 26, 2006, con-

cluded with the prosecutor and defense attorneys completing their closing arguments. He had been charged with starting 23 fires in the Banning Pass and Cabazon areas during the spring, summer and fall of 2006. He also was charged with five counts of felony murder.

5 years ago - 2014
Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. signed legislation to assist drought-affected communities and provide funding to better use local water supplies.

1 year ago - 2018
Hemet High School became another target of the aftermath from the Parkland, Florida, school shooting. A student scribbled a threat on the stall in a girls’ bathroom at HHS.

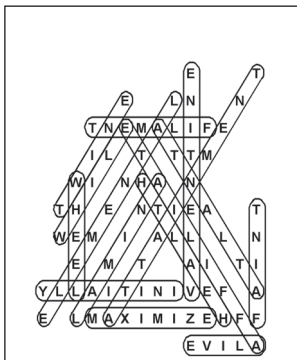
