Caltrans estimates four more months for highways to reopen

The damage to highways 74 and 243 is more extensive than originally thought. Engineers have done a more thorough assessment of the damage and the current estimate for full repair and opening of the roads is four months, according to Terri Kasinga, chief, Public and Media Affairs, Caltrans District 8.

Ames Construction, the Caltrans contractor, is not only repairing the damage to Highway 74, where it collapsed and was severed, but is repairing and protecting the highway in several more locations.

The fast-moving runoff eroded the edge of the highway in many places. Work is being done to restore Highway 74 about 0.75 miles west of Mountain Center, before any of the passing lanes.

"There are over 25 locations on SR 243 with damage including two locations with complete road loss," a Tuesday press release from Caltrans explains. "SR 74 has over 40 locations that will require repairs. At this time, Caltrans is estimating at least four (4) months before public access or reopening of See Highways, page A10

Edison submits wildfire mitigation plan to CPUC

Improvement costs approach \$600 million

Last month, in response to Senate Bill 901 (approved Sept. 21, 2018), California's electric public utilities submitted wildfire mitigation plans to the state's Public Utilities Commission.

Southern California Edison's plan was more than 100 pages long. The document described dozens of different actions and plans to lower the risk of a wildfire igniting near or because of Edison's equipment. Many of these steps have already been implemented or are being prepared for implementation this year or next year.

SCE's two principal objectives are "... further harden the electric system against wildfires and enhance wildfire suppression efforts..." Edison estimates that nearly one-third of its territory is considered "High Fire Risk," according to the CPUC and Cal Fire designations.

Most of the planned and proposed actions were shared with local residents last spring, when MDP invited SCE representatives to speak at a community meeting, and through press releases on its website (www.sce. com/safety/wildfire), as well as the "Grid Safety and Resiliency Program" that SCE also submitted to the CPUC in September

The WMP also describes SCE's goals and the measures to assess the accomplishment or progress toward the goals.

In the press release with the WMP, Phil Herrington, SCE's senior vice president of Transmission and Distribution, said, "This is an aggressive plan to protect public

safety. We are implementing a variety of additional tools and technologies to advance fire safety even further throughout our system to respond to the 'new normal' of yearround wildfire risk."

Among the many actions SCE has begun implementing, or has completed, is system hardening as a critical protective action. SCE is replacing older bare conductors with covered conductors, inspecting and replacing poles, and installing automatic reclosers, which function like a circuit breaker.

The newer conductors will "... significantly reduce contact from See Edison, page A7

Our mountains not included in wildfire mitigation report to Gov. Newsom

Gov. Gavin Newsom assumed office on Jan. 7 and the next day, he issued an executive order for the preparation and submission to him of "... recommendations of the most impactful administrative, regulatory and policy changes or waivers the Governor can initiate that are necessary to prevent and mitigate wildfires to the greatest extent possible, with an emphasis on environmental sustainability and protection of public health."

Cal Fire submitted its report last week. The agency identified 35 high priority projects "that can be implemented immediate-

ly to help reduce public safety risk for over 200 communities." However, only four of the projects are in Southern California. The most vulnerable communities are in Northern California, based on the report's results, which employed various socioeconomic data to rank projects.


Two had a fire risk of less than 10. The project evaluation "considered socioeconomic characteristics of the communities that would be protected, including data on poverty levels, residents with disabilities, language barriers, residents over 65 or under five years of age, and households without a car."

As an example, while the report includes the Paradise Fire, where many of the deaths

were elderly people, it does not appear to include access as a measure of safety. While county, state and federal officials frequently warned Riverside County residents of the dangers of flooding and road closures following the Cranston and Holy fires, ingress and egress corridors were not part of Cal Fire's calculation of high priority projects.

The report describes the projects as "... local projects that can be addressed urgently in partnership with communities to make a difference this wildfire season. Examples include removal of hazardous dead trees, vegetation clearing, creation of fuel breaks and community defensible spaces, and creation of ingress

Lake Hemet RV renters face uncertain future

Nearly one month after torrential rainfall caused major flooding and mud flow to areas of Lake Hemet Campground, RV campground site renters face uncertain futures. Additional rains could cause further flooding and campground renters' rights may be limited.

Lake Hemet and the campground are owned by the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District headquartered in Hemet. The campground is managed by Basecamp Hospitality, formerly The California Parks Company.

On Thursday, Feb. 14, a levee breached causing water to rapidly rise to 3 or more feet around meadow-facing premium RV month-to-month rental campsites.


Some who were able to drive out on Valentine's Day morning will not return. Patricia Blaine and partner Randy got out before noon, but in their hasty exit, their RV sustained damage when hitting a submerged rock. "We're not going back because they haven't corrected the problem," said Blaine.

"The breach has not been fixed and when rains come again, so will flooding. On the 14th, nobody [from campground management] came down to see us or help us. Had we not gotten out when we did, who knows what might have happened."

Blaine provided a copy of her original contract with camp management which defined month-to-month renters as "campers not permanent residents." (Blaine has lived at Lake Hemet Campground since October 2017.)

The contract's "Acknowledgement of Risk and Waiver of Liability" seems to transfer risks, including during emergencies, to those who voluntarily enter onto the campground, thereby limiting campers' expectations of assistance during emergencies, and rights of recovery for losses or injuries sustained.

A section of the contract reads as follows: "I [signing individual] am fully aware of the risks and hazards inherent in boating and camping and associated activities. I have decided to enter onto the property of the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District ("District") and use District fa-



From 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Thursday and Friday, March 28 and 29, the Idyllwild Library Branch of the Riverside County Library System will be offering Mental Health First Aid training in Idyllwild.

One in five Americans has a mental illness, but many are reluctant to seek help or might not know where to turn for care. Unlike physical conditions, symptoms of mental health and substance use problems can be difficult to detect. For friends and family members, it can be hard to know when and how to step in. As a result, those in need of mental health services often do not get them until it is too late.

Just as CPR helps even those without clinical training assist an individual having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid prepares participants to interact with a person experiencing a mental health crisis.

Mental Health First Aiders learn a five-step action plan that guides them through the process of reaching out and offering appropriate support.

"Through this program, we hope to take the fear and hesitation out of starting conversations about mental health and substance use problems," said Linda Rosenberg, president and CEO of the National Council for Behavioral Health, which helped bring Mental Health First Aid to the U.S. in 2008. "When more people are equipped with the tools they need to start a dialogue, more people can get the help they may need."

In just 10 years, Mental Health First Aid has become a full-blown movement in the United States — more than 1 million people are certified Mental Health First Aiders, and that number is growing every day.

Riverside County Library System, through a grant from the California State Library, is offering free training classes to library staff and the public for a limited time. Local community groups are encouraged to attend.

cilities knowing that such an act on my part may involve some danger to my person, to my property, or to the person or property of others. In addition, I understand that I am entering a campground as a camper, and not a permanent resident, in a relatively remote area and that availability of convenience and emergency services is limited or non-exis-

Campers also sign a release from liability and agreement to indemnify both camp owner and management.

Another liability section speaks to acts of God limiting camper recovery rights. "Any person using these [campground] facilities will do so at their own risk. The management and staff assume no responsibility for fire, theft, accidents, vandalism, flooding, winds or any act of God, which may occur during the stay of the tenant/guest.

"Any violation of these rules shall be rounds for termination and/or non-renewal of any tenant's Rental Agreement."

Although Blaine left the campground and is not planning to return, other long-term campers with patio rooms and other attachments to their RVs find it more difficult to

Previously interviewed Mary and Michael Murray love the peace and quiet of their premium site and have been, for the last month, repairing mud and water damage to their possessions. They are planning to stay but are apprehensive about further flooding. "Everything [power, water, sewage connections] is now working and the rain we've had since the 14th has not caused any more problems."

Kelly Lam, marketing director of Basecamp Hospitality, responded to the Town Crier's inquiry about conditions at the park and management's plans to mitigate the damage at the campground and continued difficulties facing long-term renters.

He said, "Lake Hemet Campgrounds sympathizes with the plight of those camping along Hurkey Creek and understands the effect that flooding is causing to their personal property. This is an unprecedented, 100-year flood event.

"We have communicated to all campers that they may move their trailers and RVs to any open campsite away from the flooding.

"To assist with relocating trailers and RVs, the Idyllwild Garage has offered to stand by to tow trailers and RVs and will refer campers to other tow operators should they be unable to help.

"We have told affected campers that once this flooding has subsided, they may move their trailers and RVs back to the campsite they've been occupying, as long as it is still

"Like all campgrounds, Lake Hemet Campgrounds is intended to be occupied temporarily. At Lake Hemet, some campers stay month to month. Their campsite rental agreements specify that it is each camper's responsibility to be prepared to move their trailer or RV should it be neces-

"We have been in touch with disaster agencies to determine if assistance can be provided to those campers unable to afford to move their trailers and RVs, though so far, we've not found an agency able to provide such assistance."

As a reference for readers, California Civil Code Sections 799.20 through 799.79

detail R.V. Park Rent Laws.

The code differentiates between long-term and shortterm RV park renters. Code defines "occupant" as one who has occupied a lot for 30 days or less; a resident as one who had occupied a lot for nine months or more; and a tenant who has occupied a lot "for more than 30 consecutive days."

Of interest is section 799.40 which states "The rights created by this chapter shall be cumulative and in addition to any other legal rights the management of a park may have against a defaulting occupant, tenant, or resident, or that an occupant, tenant, or resident may have against the management of a park."

Also, Section 799.42 states, "No occupant registration agreement or tenant rental agreement shall contain a provision by which the occupant or tenant waives his or her rights under the provisions of this chapter, and any waiver of these rights shall be deemed contrary to public policy and

The flooding, rain and heavy snow on the mountain before and after Feb. 14 have caused property damage and travel inconvenience to many Hill residents in addition to those at Lake Hemet Campground,

Because of current and prolonged closures of Idyllwild-access sections of highways 243 and 74, local businesses are hurting due to reduced tourist traffic. The county website www.rivcoready.org, provides links for downloading forms that may provide disaster aid assistance: "Riverside County Operational Area Residential Damage Reporting Form," and "Estimated Disaster Economic Injury Worksheet for Businesses." Upon completion, forms can be submitted to EMDOperations@RivCo.org for possible financial reimbursement of funds from disaster declara-

As of this writing, Tuesday morning, March 12, Idyllwild received 1 to 5 inches of snow with more at higher elevations. Rain was expected later Tuesday.





When departments help others, costs are reimbursed

As the Idyllwild Fire Protection District moves forward with its plan to offer a ballot measure to increase its parcel (unit) fee, several readers have asked questions about how the mutual aid revenue is generated.

"Mutual aid" is the reimbursement that goes to departments that respond to dispatch calls to send crews to fires outside of their jurisdiction. Usually, these are large conflagrations, such as the Camp or Woolsey fires, but not necessarily

The agency or agencies in whose district the fire occurs are responsible for reimbursing the agencies that respond to the requests for help or more resources. For example, more than 20 different jurisdictions responded to the mutual aid requests during last summer's Cranston Fire.

The Idyllwild Fire Department responded to 16 mutual aid requests during 2018. These incidents ranged in size from 282 acres for the Skyline Fire in Corona to 97,500 acres for the Woolsey Fire in Los Angeles County.

When a responding agency is present for more than 12 hours, its time and costs are reimbursed. For some large fires, such as the 2018 Ferguson Fire in Mariposa, the agency may be requested for multiple periods.

The direct salary costs of the firefighters who respond are reimbursed to their agency.

Since sending a team takes staff from an agency's station, other staff or reserves must be called in as back up in case a fire starts at home. These costs also are reimbursed since they are the direct result of supplying mutual aid.

When a team responds, it travels on an engine and sometimes other vehicular equipment such as water tenders. The transportation costs, such as gasoline and depreciation, are reimbursed. Also, if the equipment was dam-

aged, for example, a flat tire was incurred, the cost to repair or replace is reimbursed.

All of the direct costs are totaled and then a 10 percent administrative cost is allowed. In larger agencies, administrative staff completes paperwork and other non-firefighting work to support mutual aid. IFPD is too small for a separate administrative staff to do this work, but it is still eligible to apply the 10 percent fee.

Typically, a complete engine crew responds to the mutual in 2013, he spent every day al aid call. For example, IFPD sent two crews, at different times, to the Ferguson Fire.

However, sometimes it can be an individual responding and their costs also are covered. IFPD Assistant Chief Mark LaMont is a member of statewide Incident Management Team 2. When his team is activated, he responds. The team commander is Chris Fogle, battalion chief on the San Jacinto Ranger District, and the deputy is Norm Walker, former fire manager for the ranger district and former chief of the Idyllwild Fire Department.

In 2017, IMT 2 was assigned to the Salmon August Complex Fire, which burned 65,000 acres in or near the Klamath National Forest. LaMont was assigned to the fire for weeks.

For the 16 mutual aid responses during the summer of 2018, IFPD received or will receive about \$500,000 for its time and expenses, which amounts to \$50,000 in administrative fees. The total hours involved exceeded 14,000.

While the mutual aid responses take staff from the district, the benefits are more than the reimbursements. Both Fire Chief Patrick Reitz and LaMont praise and value the opportunity for real time training the IFPD staff gains from its participation in fighting these fires outside the district. Both Reitz and LaMont emphasized how important going to these fires is to the crews' effectiveness.

"It's great training, and we get reimbursed," LaMont has

And the responses are growing as the number of large and extended wildfires has increased in California. In fiscal year 2015-16, IFPD's mutual aid revenue was about \$240,000. At that time, the department estimated it would slowly increase.

For example, the projection for the current fiscal year (2018-19) was slightly more than \$250,000, about half of what IFPD actually has received or will receive so far this fiscal year.

Forecast shows precipitation abating

Runoff continues to flow down many streets, often through yards and under or into homes. Last week, less than an inch of rain was recorded at the Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station; yet the sides of many local roads still have water running along the curbs and into drains.


About a third of an inch fell in Garner Valley and closer to a quarter of an inch was recorded at the Idyllwild Fire Station.

With the calendar approaching Spring, the weather appears to concur. Drier and warmer trends have been forecast beginning Wednesday and Thursday, March 13 and 14. Idyllwild may heat up to the 50s and 60s during the next week.

Since Oct. 1, 2018, total rainfall through Monday, March 11 recorded at Keenwild has been 26.4 inches. The long-term average for a year is 25.7 inches, of which about 20.5 falls between October and the end of March.

The National Weather Service's forecasts for the next 6 to 10 days, for the next two weeks and for the next month all show below average precipitation.

The National Weather Service forecasts below-average precipitation in Southern California for the next six to 10 days, through Wednesday, March 20.



Say what?! We insisted my friend had every right to tape comments at a public meeting, but it took a while to convince the surly official. He clearly didn't know the first thing about open meeting laws.

It goes with the territory. The press must sometimes teach Sunshine 101 to public officials on Main Street, U.S.A. This column recognizes some of those public servants and intrepid reporters with symbolic citations from my Sunshine Week playlist.

"Here comes the sun" award to Hilde Lysiak, a plucky 12-year-old reporter who made headlines on a visit to Patagonia, Arizona. Riding her bike to investigate a tip, Lysiak was stopped by Patagonia town marshal Joseph Patterson and asked for ID.

Lysiak gave her name and said she was a reporter. Patterson said, "I don't want to hear about any of that freedom of the press stuff." Lysiak said he also threatened to put her in juvenile detention.

In a second encounter, Lysiak began video-taping Patterson and said, "You stopped me earlier and said I could be thrown in juvie? What exactly am I doing that's illegal?" Patterson warned her (inaccurately) against posting the video online. "If you put my face on the Internet, that's against the law," he said.

Lysiak posted a YouTube video of their exchange on her Orange Street News website. She later received an apology from Patagonia mayor Andrea Wood who said the town respects her First Amendment rights.

"House of the rising sun" award to Brenda Fisk, mayor of Paint Rock, Alabama (population 200). Mayor Fisk drafted a resolution to close town board meetings to non-residents and members of the press. She told the Jackson County Sentinel, "What goes on in Paint Rock is the business of the people who live in Paint Rock." Fisk said she had "personal reasons" for proposing the move, "but I since found out that I cannot do that."

"I can see clearly now" award to Kirby Delauter, a county councilman from Frederick, Maryland. Delauter Prize-winning editor of the Storm Lake Times in Iowa. once threatened to sue the Frederick News-Post for "unauthorized use of my name." The newspaper responded with an editorial using his name 26 times. They also explained why newspapers in America are actually allowed to write about public officials without their permission. Delauter later apologized.

"Let the sunshine in" award to Jerry Toomey, former mayor of Mitchell, South Dakota. A citizen called Toomey "a drunk" during the public forum portion of a Mitchell City Council meeting. His accusation set off a heated exchange, and stemmed from an earlier altercation between the two men in the citizen's driveway.

In an interview with the Mitchell Daily Republic, Toomey called the incident "a black eye" for the city, but added, "The public forum has a critical place in government and it is important to let people voice their issues, valid or not."

Editor's note: This letter is being sent to Rep. Dr. Raul Ruiz. Mountain Disaster Preparedness has organized a community meeting called "Storm Lessons Learned and Caltrans/CHP Highway Report." The meeting will happen on Monday, March 18, from 6 to 7:30 p.m. in the Idyllwild School Gymnasium.

CONGRESSMAN RAUL RUIZ, M.D.:

On behalf of the Idyllwild Association of Realtors®, local business owners, parents and residents of Idyllwild, we are writing to voice our concern regarding the road conditions and the timeframe for reopening Highway 74 from Hemet to Idyllwild, and Highway 243 from Banning to Idyllwild. Currently, the only access to Idyllwild is Highway 74 from the east going through Garner Valley.

Idyllwild is a small mountain town with tourism as our #1 source of revenue. We understand and appreciate that Caltrans is doing everything it can to get these vital arteries open as soon as possible, but our local economy does not have the luxury, or margins, to "hang on" for the months these two highways are projected to be out of service.

It is not just the real estate sector that is suffering, but also the local retail stores and restaurants that cannot sustain their current operations.

Local families and parents worry about their children who are now obligated to travel 1.5 hours each day just to get to school. In turn, county, state and local revenues — property tax, sales tax, T.O.T., etc. — are all going to suffer.

Without assistance, and with only one way into Idyllwild for the next several months, the town will be decimated to the point of extinction. It has already been a huge economic burden since the Valentine's Day storm took out the two state highways a month ago. This burden only gets worse as each day passes.

We are asking that one lane be open with pilot vehicle escort as soon as possible on state highways 74 and/or 243. The survival of our little town depends on it.

Editor's note: When asked about the flights over Temecula in an email, Pearson's response was: "Yes, there would be an increase in overflights of Temecula. However, these would not number any more than they were already experiencing pre-March 2017. Also, Temecula does not experience the noise reverberation from overflights which plagues us here on the bowl-shaped western slopes of Mt. San Jacinto."

spokesman who sent the following email to the Barbourville Mountain Advocate: "From this point forward when KSP is working on an investigation, you are to wait until OUR press release is sent out before putting anything on social media, radio, and newspaper ... If this continues, you will be taken off our media distribution list."

Jon Fleischaker, general counsel for the Kentucky Press Association, said the order violated the First Amendment and state agencies cannot withhold information "just because they don't like what the media outlet is writing.'

"Walking on sunshine" award to Art Cullen, Pulitzer Cullen's editorials about agricultural impact on his state's

poor water quality were not popular with some prominent Republicans. The GOP-controlled Iowa Senate stalled a resolution to recognize his national writing prize. Cullen responded, "I would not want the support of a den of philanderers and oafs." He added, "I honestly do not care if I am ever honored by the Iowa Senate, the U.S. Congress, or any other institution of dysfunction and cynicism.'

Brian Hunhoff of the Yankton County Observer is a member of the South Dakota Newspaper Hall of Fame. He received the 2005 S.D. First Amendment Committee Eagle Award "for protecting the public's right to know" and the 2014 Golden Quill award for editorial writing. He is a twotime winner of the National Newspaper Association Freedom of Information Award.



MANAGING EMOTIONS

There's a skill used in cognitive-behavioral therapy called Opposite Action. It is very effective for managing troubling

emotions and problematic ways we deal with them. As the name implies, the skill involves reversing both how the emotion feels and what problematic actions we habitually take to deal with the emotion (behavioral-expressive as-

Problematic actions don't lead to a beneficial outcome. They often perpetuate or make worse the troubling emotion and interfere with our daily lives and relationships.

Let it be stated, though, that we don't need or want to change all troubling emotions. For instance, grief over the loss of a loved one is painful but genuine and we honor this emotion as appropriate in our culture.

The idea of OA is to change the behavioral-expressive aspects of a troubling emotion by acting in a way that is opposite to that emotion. We are not wasting our time trying to block the emotion, which usually is ineffective anyway, but

are changing what actions we take. This can lead over time to reducing the strength of that emotion, making it easier to

For example, withdrawing from life when feeling sad or blue can cause the sadness to last longer. Constantly shouting at someone you are angry with but care about can push

How OA works, in five steps:

- 1. Name the emotion. We may want some help with this because it can be a bit tricky at times.
- 2. Name the problematic action connected to the emotion. For example:

Fear: Avoid Anger: Attack/judgmental thoughts Sadness: Withdraw Shame: Hide

- 3. Decide do you want to reduce this emotion? If we don't really want to reduce the emotion, we won't have success with OA. Ask yourself, "Will reducing this emotion and changing my actions bring me closer to the life I want to live?
- 4. What is the emotion's opposite action? Using the chart above, here are the OAs:

Avoid (Fear): Approach; do what you are afraid of Attack/judgmental thoughts (Anger): Gently avoid; be kind/decent

Withdraw (Sadness): Be active; approach. Go do other things that make you feel confident and competent. Hide (Shame): Approach; repeat this behavior over

5. Go all in. This final step means genuinely, enthusiastically, repeatedly engaging in the OA. This isn't easy so don't scold yourself for finding it challenging.

Do keep on keeping on, though, and eventually, you will see the results you want. As stated above, like any skill this requires practice. It will not work for you if you don't work it.

Some last thoughts. OA works when the troubling emotion is not well-founded in real situations. Fear is justified when there's a real threat to life and limb; OA won't work here. Anger is an exception. Although anger may be justified, our habitual actions may make the situation worse, and then OA may be the right skill.

DETAILED SUMMARY OF THE MAT-

TERS PLAINTIFF SEEKS TO VALIDATE: Plaintiffs are the Garner Valley Property Owners' Association ("GVPOA"), an unincor porated association of property owners located in Garner Valley, and James Martens ("Martens") (collectively, "Plaintiffs"), an individual.

Plaintiffs seek to invalidate the Lake Hemet

Municipal Water District's ("District") adoption of Resolution No. 785 which, among other actions, increases water service rates in the Garner Valley service area. Resolution No. 785 and the rate increase seeks to recover \$1,700,000 from Plaintiffs for a historical deficit in Garner Valley associated with previous advancement of funds. However, there is no explanation of the purpose of the purported \$1,700,000 in advanced funds and there is no evidence that the funds were considered at the time to be an advancement and no evidence that the idea of cost recovery was contemplated. The District's rate increase materials also failed to present any plan or program describing how costs claimed to be misallocated going back to 2002 would

be paid back. The District improperly approved the rate increase by diluting the protesting power and rights of Garner Valley ratepayers. The Garner Valley service area is a self-contained and the costs of operating that system have no direct connection to or impact on the main Hemet/ San Jacinto system. The District impermissibly merged the 242 Garner Valley ratepayers with more than 14,000 District ratepayers served through a completely separate distribution system with water from sources distinct from Garner Valley for purposes of calculating

protests to the rate increase. Through this reverse validation (or invalidation) action, Plaintiffs seek: a judicial determination that the District's adoption of Resolution No. 785, and the rate increases adopted therein, was invalid and improper and

must be set aside; and a stay and/or temporary restraining order, preliminary injunction and/ or permanent injunction restraining and ining the District from taking any actions in furtherance of or in purported reliance on Resolution No. 785.

Flu activity in California higher than nationwide

Nationwide, influenza activity was elevated at the end of February, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention expects the high level of activity to continue beyond the first few weeks of March.

However, in its latest weekly report, the CDC stated, "Severity indicators continue to increase as expected but remain substantially lower than what was observed last season.

In California, the state's Department of Public Health reported, "Flu activity is increasing ... several more weeks of influenza activity is expected." Flu-like illness was widespread, as it was in 47 other states. The number of outpatient visits was moderate.

In California, the number of visits to physicians increased during week nine (which ended March 2) compared to week eight. However, it remains below-average nationwide. And compared to the same week in 2018, nationwide visits are lower in 2019.

Hospitalizations increased last week from the previous In Riverside County, visits to physicians surged during

week eight (12.4 percent) compared to the prior three weeks

and are above the historical average for this date. But the percentage of visits continued to decline in weeks nine and 10. In week nine, they were almost 11 percent and as of Friday, March 9, they were 8.1 percent. However, this is above the historical data for this period.

Local school absenteeism increased to 9.7 percent from 7.4 percent.

Since Sept. 30, 2018, 307 Californians have died from influenza, of which 42 died last week.

CDC expects the flu activity to remain elevated for several weeks. Consequently, health officials still recommend getting a flu vaccine if one has not already gotten it. Even if flu is contracted, the vaccine will mitigate the symptoms. This year, two different influenza viruses are prevalent.

The A(H3) is becoming more common as the flu season progresses. But the A(H1N1) virus still predominates nationally. Both are circulating in California. The CDC stresses, "The majority of influenza viruses characterized antigenically are similar to the cell-grown

reference viruses representing the 2018–2019 Northern

Hemisphere influenza vaccine viruses." In other words, the viruses now circulating are similar to the viral material that was used to prepare this year's





both SR 74 or 243 can take place. Reopening will be contingent upon delays due to weather or other unforeseen damages or circumstances. There are limited lane widths on SR 74, however in the event of an emergency that would require community evacuation, Caltrans, in coordination with the California Highway Patrol (CHP), Riverside County Sheriff and Emergency Management, will make arrangements for evacuation if it becomes necessary between Mountain Center and Valle Vista."

Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington toured the highway last week and said, "I learned a lot about highway construction and why the damage occurred. And also about the gap between realistic expectations and

what the community expects them to do." Washington also emphasized that Caltrans not only has to repair the damaged road, but must rebuild the support base in order to prevent future damage.

Besides repair, Caltrans engineers identified several locations where the hillside, or wall of the mountain, posed future danger for rockslides or collapse.

These photos depict the work being done to reduce this future risk by scaling the hillside to reduce its steepness.

and egress corridors."

Apparently, the projects for which the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council received funding, and are in a high fire risk designated area, were not rated high priority. This is an area that has experienced two major conflagrations within five years and a third about 12 years ago where the lives of five firefighters were lost.

"It is disappointing that Cal Fire didn't include the Holy or Cranston fire areas, they are still fire prone," said state Sen. Jeff Stone, who represents the Hill. He also expressed his concern about the limited access and egress from the Hill, especially during fire season.

The 35 projects were not the only recommendations contained in the report. The authors recommended deploying National Guard with Cal Fire to establish bases to work on fuels treatments. More housing for seasonal employees was the third priority.

The report also recommended suspending regulatory requirements for assessing fuels reduction projects and streamlining requirements for permits, licenses and contracts.

Stone, who served in August on the Legislature's ad hoc committee that developed SB 901, feels the effort to lift and loosen the regulatory and legislative constraints to fuels reduction is valuable.

"Cal Fire does need bold legislation and leadership, which will not impede it from doing its job," he said. Emphasizing this point, he repeated that his principal problem with SB 901 was the five-year window for expedited fuels maintenance. With so many dead trees throughout the state, Stone argued for a 10-year window.

Funding and staffing needs for Cal Fire also were listed as an immediate priority. Newsom requested almost another \$100 million for Cal Fire in his current budget proposal. This would fund 13 new engines, air tankers, fire detection cameras, and staffing for CCC crews and equipment.

On March 6, the Legislative Analyst's Office presented to the Legislature the following recommendation: "Cal Fire, in coordination with OES, to provide an assessment of existing state, mutual aid, and federal fire response capacity; gaps in capacity; and where additional resources would be most beneficial."

Longer term, the report recommended that more state agencies sign memoranda of understandings to help create fuels reduction. Also, the report urged Cal Fire to find more options to encourage home owners to harden their homes with the Wildfire Urban Interface areas. The latter included a longer term goal of possibly strengthening codes for defensible space, including financial penalties.



Inspirational speaker and singer to perform at Town Hall

Named 2016 'Music Evangelist of the Year'

Johnny Rowlett is a gentleman country singer honored as "Music Evangelist of the Year" in 2016 and 2018 by the Inspirational County Music Association. He is a Nashville recording artist with four top-five singles. Two of his songs, "The Truth Is" and "Old Mustang," hit number one on the PowerSource Nashville charts.

Rowlett also has been honored for Video of the Year and Male Vocalist of the Year by the ICMA.

After balancing a recording and performing career with weekend ministries, Johnny and wife Gale decided that wasn't enough. Five years ago, they began their own full-time and "life-long" traveling ministry, taking their music and inspirational talks wherever they were needed — churches, high schools, prisons, retirement homes, and impromptu stops and mini-concerts along the highway.

"We went on the road full-time because we realized there are so many more people to be reached," said Rowlett. "We sold our home in Monroe, Michigan, and moved our entire lives into the tight quarters of our motor home. Though living in a motor home doesn't come without its difficulties, it's allowed us the freedom

to go where and when God opens doors."

They dedicated their mission to connecting people to God through song, speaking and prayer. Rowlett said he and Gale believe that Christianity is rooted in "true relationship, not religion."

The central tenet that defines their career and ministry is giving. In addition to singing and speaking to audiences and assemblies, wherever they are, they carry with them "Gale's Hope Bags," giving them to any in need.

"Everywhere we went we saw those who were homeless," said Gale. "Once in Montana on a cold night, we met a man lying on the ground outside of a Flying J truck stop. We went to multiple homeless shelters all over the country and learned how we could help. It seemed like every city we visited, God would show us people that just needed to be loved and min-

istered to.

"We began to save up extra soaps and shampoos from hotels we stayed in every

night. We took the extra food that pastors put in our welcome baskets and we would give it to people on the street. That's where it started."

They fill and distribute Hope Bags everywhere they go. These 1-gallon bags contain basic necessities such as water, clean socks, granola bars, soaps and lotions. "It's not what's in them, but rather who's giving them," said Gale. "It's our heart to have these bags be a point of contact that helps us build relationship with these people and it gives us an opportunity to pray for them and believe with them for supernatural healing and revelation of who Jesus is."

According to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's annual Homeless Assessment Report, as of 2017 there were around 554,000 homeless people in the United States on a given night, or 0.17 percent of the population.

"It's our passion to give and to help these people," said Rowlett. Although Rowlett has been accorded many honors in the country music industry, he said he is most proud of being named Music Evangelist of the Year by the ICMA. "This recognition is reassurance that our life's mission is working and changing lives," he said.





ART'S CORNER

By Arthur Connor Music Reviewer

What with the preceding weeks of cold, blustery rain and snow here on the Hill, it would seem somewhat adverse for a recitalist to present a public program dealing in the main with (possibly) equally adverse weather conditions.

Nevertheless, the presenter in question, guest pianist Caroline Oltmanns, acquitted herself of the task quite well on Monday, March 4, in Lowman Concert Hall on the Idyllwild Arts campus, and though her audience was few in number (perhaps in anticipation of further inclemency), the concert was much appreciated in both execution as well as formal design.

Beginning with probably the best-known piece in Leos Janacek's 15-movement piano suite, based on his native Czech folk melodies for the most part (the overall title itself coming from a Moravian folk tune), Ms. Oltmanns' interpretation of "On an Overgrown Path (Po zarostlem chodnicku), #2: A blown-away leaf (Listek odvanuty)" seemed to suggest that the "leaf" being blown was more manuscriptive than arborial in nature, at least to this listener; the wind in this case being the slow and fast flow of memory concerned, and regarding the content of the page (perhaps a missing sheaf of music manuscript, or a lost love letter?) as better left in the auditor's imagination. as the varied dotted rhythms flew by, either quickly or slowly at the whim of both composer and interpreter.

In her introduction to Beethoven's Sonata #17, Opus 31 #2, D Minor ("Tempest") which followed, Ms. Oltmanns referred to the story of the composer's brief injunctive exegesis of that work: "Read Shakespeare's 'Tempest," not as a case explanation, but as an indication that more is involved here than mere tone-painting; indeed, those critics who can identify themes associated with the characters of the drama (Prospero, Miranda, Caliban, etc) have a hard time unifying the whole of the composition through these parts.

For her efforts, our soloist was valiant in her coalescence of the disparate elements of the sonata's first movement (tempi, volumes, etc), keeping the vicissitudes to a required minimum, and then restoring a sense of calm in the second movement, and rounding out the rondo finale with a more than requisite balance between the repeated theme and the several episodic outbursts, whether deemed "tempestuous" or not.

After a short pause, Ms. Oltmanns returned to her instrument with a remarkable traversal of selected piano preludes of Claude Debussy, each having to do with the effect of wind in nature.

Her minimal approach emphasized not so much the composer's impressionistic qualities as much as the actual events implicit in these brief explorations; the wind on the field of heather, the billowing and rustling of sails, and the rough seas the Western wind had to pass over were all present in the delicate fingering and judicious pedaling exhibit-

Following the short interruption of Sinding's ever popular "Rustle of Spring" (perhaps inserted as an "eye" for the coming storm, and played in as "popular" a manner as possible), Ms. Oltmanns essayed two of the more dramatic pieces from the Franz Liszt portfolio: his solo piano arrangement of the Schubert/Goethe "Earl-King" and the "Storm" from the first book of the "Years of Pilgrimage."

The drama involved in both pieces was similar; the action of the father and son riding through the wind and rain, as well as the description of a Swiss mountain storm (as can only occur in Switzerland) was complemented in her energetic fingered responses to the required action; such action as would have been exhausting to many a performer, but with the appropriate instinct of both timing and force, such mechanisms were brought to the fore to evince the necessary timed effect, as well as to avoid a total collapse at the end. And in conclusion, Ms. Oltmanns returned to the Debussy Preludes as an encore presentation as a summation of the proceedings (with "Le vent de la plaine" (The Wind on the Plain), Book I, #3), in effect an illustration of the benefits of air and earth (as a contrast to our Hill's preoccupations with fire and water), and as a promise of better and more beneficial effects of natural elemental mixtures.




Brendan moved up 31 places on the FedExCup points list to 136th, and he climbed 11 spots on the Official World Golf Ranking to 134th.
