Limited access to Hemet within six weeks

Caltrans will have escort vehicles available

Caltrans announced Monday evening that Highway 74 will be opened, with an escort pilot vehicle, for several hours each day within four to six weeks.

Several hundred people attended the community meeting, which the Mountain Disaster Preparedness group organized, while several hundred watched it as a live stream or later at home.

Several Caltrans speakers, including Richard Rusnak, Caltrans geotechnical engineer, and Amgad Benjamin, the resident engineer for this area, described the damage to highways 74 and 243. They also explained what is necessary to both repair the roadways and make them safer for the future.

The damage to these highways was catastrophic, Caltrans emphasized. "A lot started to change last week because of the weather. We're doing everything we can to get it done quickly," said Terri Kasinga, Caltrans' chief of public and media affairs for District 8.

Just Monday, Caltrans had a conference call with the project staff and Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington, who

encouraged finding ways to alleviate the limited access while repairs continued. Then, Kasinga said that depending upon the weather and the work progress, within four to six weeks Caltrans would open Highway 74 for three hours each morning and three hours in the evening.

The actual hours may change, but currently the plan is to have one-way escort pilot vehicles from 4 to 7 a.m. and from 6 to 9 p.m. This procedure will probably last six to eight weeks. During the hours between the

While highway closures continue, Caltrans alerts public there is access to Idyllwild

The closures of Highway 74 from Mountain Center to Hemet and Highway 243 north to Banning have created burdens for Idyllwild residents. Local high school students and school personnel have shuttles to and from Hemet available, but these leave at 5 a.m.

Local businesses have multiple problems. First, much fewer visitors and tourists are coming to the Hill. Perhaps this will improve closer to and after Easter. But also, many employees live in Hemet, thus creating a commute at least twice as long as before the rains.

Last week, Caltrans said the closures could extend into June.

While residents can do little to hasten the road repairs, Caltrans understands the problem.

Last week, its District 8 media office issued a press release advising the regional media, "Idyllwild and Mountain Center still open for business and how to get there."

The press release began, "The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) would like to remind the public that restaurants, businesses, lodging, Airbnb's and most other activities are available and open in Idyllwild and Mountain Center."

On Twitter, Caltrans shared the following, "#Caltrans8 would like to remind travelers that Idyllwild is accessible via SR-79/SR-371 through Temecula or SR-74 through Palm Desert. Enjoy your trip!" The accompanying map also was included.

Also, Steve Perez, the ranger at the Idyllwild Nature Center, has scheduled a meeting for the local hospitality business at the Nature Center at 6 to 7:30 p.m. Thursday,

March 28.

"We want to figure out everything we can do to work together," he said and emphasized that the local tourism industry is vital and needs to collaborate. Visitors can be informed of the many local opportunities. This variety will encourage more, he said.

Also, the Riverside County Emergency Management Department is working to identify uninsured and underinsured losses that may be eligible for various assistance programs. EMD is trying to obtain emergency loan funds from the Small Business Administration, and other potential federal or state assistance. The county estimates that total storm damages is approaching \$50 million.

EMD has forms for both individuals and businesses that were uninsured or underinsured for damages caused by the Valentine's Day torrential rain.

EMD representatives were also at the MDP community meeting on road conditions.

Caltrans' contractor is working seven days a week to repair the road damage, which includes "... complete road loss, culvert repair and replacement, wash outs, slip outs, sink holes, slope instability resulting in rock fall, mud and debris flows, and damaged pavement."

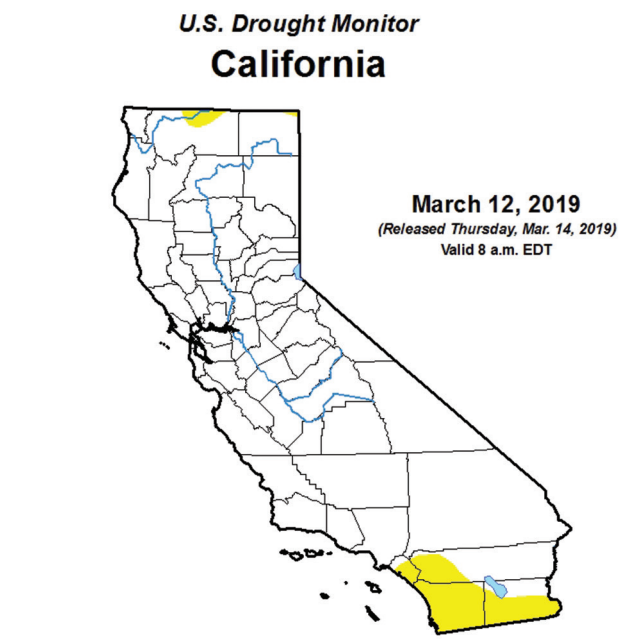

# California drought is drenched and drowned

In April 2017, after five years of little rain, the winter storms were more than sufficient for former Gov. Jerry Brown to rescind the state of emergency, which he declared in January 2014, because of the statewide drought. However, drought conditions persisted throughout the state, even though the worst seemed over. Then, the winter of 2017-18 was the sixth dry and drought year in the previous seven years.

However, the winter of 2018-19 has eradicated the drought. “This rain has ended the drought across Southern California for the first time since 2011,” said Alex Tardy, meteorologist with the National Weather Service’s San Diego office.

For the first time in years, the NWS has not designated any area of California as in a drought. Even the seasonal forecast does not see drought conditions forming this spring or summer in California.

The latest U.S. Drought Monitor discussion states, “Normal conditions also returned to most of southwestern Arizona to the Salton Sea in southeastern California. The rest of the region in Southern California is still abnormally dry due to very dry previous years.”

# Highway 74 being repaired, hillsides less vertical

Work to repair, restore and make Highway 74 safer between Valle Vista and Mountain Center continued Wednesday, March 12.

Nearly a month after the devastating rain in February, the portion of Highway 74 that was washed out (near mile post 51) is being repaired. As shown below, most of the excavation has ended at this site and now it is being rebuilt.



But reconnecting the two sides of Highway 74 is only a part, of Caltrans mission to ensure safety of drivers. In the past, even light rain storms have eroded the soil sufficiently for rocks and boulders to roll onto or pummel the highway. Based on its geotechnical consultants, Caltrans also is reducing the steepness, which often was almost vertical, along many portions of the highway.



This work is extensive and the dirt and rocks being removed fall below, blocking the lane next to the hill, until that debris can be removed. Much of this dirt has been and will be transported to the work on Highway 243 near Bay Tree Springs.

# Sunshine was break in month of storms

More rain expected at least until April

The winter of 2019 has been wet and cold, perhaps more typical of historic winter weather than recent winters.

For example, the 2017-18 rain year was one of the driest on record in Southern California. In contrast, since the middle of January, the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Station has recorded nearly 20 inches of rain.

That is more rain than a full year for six of the last 10 years and the rainfall since Oct. 1 has exceeded two of the other four. Since Oct. 1, 2018, Keenwild has recorded 26.8 inches of rain.

"Since the start of the water year, October 2018, almost all areas [in Southern California] are at 150 percent of normal [rainfall] and some mountain areas are at 200 percent," said Alex Tardy, meteorologist with the National Weather Service's San Diego office. "This is in the top 10 percent of the wettest years for much of Southern California."

The snow pack in Northern California is already at 1.5 times the average year, he added. And reservoirs are filling. According to the NWS, Diamond Valley Lake is at 91 percent of capacity.

Lake Hemet's water supply has nearly doubled since October, from 6,300 acre feet to nearly 12,000 AF, according to General Manager Mike Gow. In his report to the LHMWD board, he wrote, "Currently, the lake level is 133.9' with the top of the dam at 135' and a storm is forecast for March 21."

This is not the end. The NWS is forecasting more rain later this week and possibly next week, too.

"Active weather continues. It appears between March 20 and 28, we will have another storm off the Pacific in Southern California," Tardy reported. "This is not just normal precipitation but above normal."

Monday morning, March 18, the NWS reported, "Our mountains may be in store for a refreshing coat of white. The storm system midweek should be cold enough to drive snow levels as low as 5,000 feet. At the top of the Palm Springs Tram, and in San Bernardino County, above 6,500 feet, 5 inches or more of snow could pile up."

Beyond this period, Tardy said it could be very wet and active through the first part of April. A brief light storm could pass over this weekend. Next week, the early indication is that another stronger storm system may be coming.

At the NWS Climate Prediction Center, analysts confirmed that the weather conditions have formed a weak El Niño, which could continue through summer.

"However, because forecasts made during spring tend to be less accurate, the predicted chance that El Niño will persist beyond summer is currently about 50 [percent]," stated the climate discussion. "In summary, weak El Niño conditions are likely to continue through the Northern Hemisphere spring 2019 (~80% chance) and summer (~60% chance)."

Besides the unusual amount of rain, Tardy also said this winter is in the top 10 percent for cold temperatures.



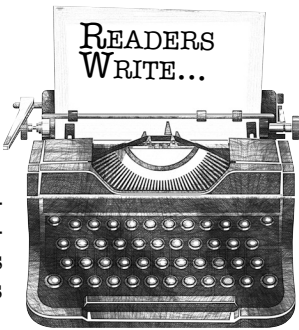

Idyllwild needs the facts before it votes on increase in IFPD fees



Last Thursday marked the one-month anniversary of the Valentine’s Day deluge resulting in lava-like slides that melted our mountaintop.

Next Monday marks the eight-month anniversary since a psychotic man torched a mountainside, causing residents and tourists to flee for days, and damaging the lives of many people who lost their homes or property.

Lives unhinged — uprooted, rerouted. Continuous de-tours to get back and forth to school or work.

Important traveling routes keep getting shut down due to catastrophic events.

In the meantime, businesses suffering loss of sales, including ours, because of both these events within a year. An SBA loan does little to help businesses operating marginally in a small town when the money still has to be paid back.

Some businesses are just simply going to fail.

But, it seems that none of them need scammers to help move that along.

Last week, we received a call from a Jason, who identified himself as a project manager for Southern California Edison, that the Town Crier was behind on its bill and our power would be shut off at 3:45 p.m. that day.

Our bookkeeper returned the call to Jason who was able to provide her with our correct account number and amount we had last paid. SCE’s records showed that the amount, down to the last 3 cents, was allocated to the wrong account and they were unable to re-allocate the money. The money would be refunded.

But, in the meantime, we would need to pay again and credit cards would not be accepted as the payment took 12 to 24 hours to clear. What?

But then it got weirder: We would need to take out cash, drive to a CVS pharmacy and buy two green vouchers with that cash, paying \$5.95 for each. Right. SCE was going to make us drive around the mountain to get to Hemet!

She spoke with three of his “supervisors” and all said the same thing.

I called SCE to check our account. It was current.

My bookkeeper came in with her cell phone. By now, it was 4 p.m. Jason called her on that phone. She handed it to me. He wanted to know if she was on the way with the payment. I asked him for the account number. He had that correct.

I asked him why no one had shut off the power yet. He said they had extended the cut-off because she was on her way with the money and the shut-off was done automatically at their end.

When I told him I had checked our account and it was current, the phone went dead before I could say another word.

We reported this to law enforcement and the Federal Trade Commission. SCE has no department in which to report this and recommends a law enforcement report, despite the fact that these criminals had information about our account that SCE shouldn’t be sharing.

Several other businesses, we heard, were hit with this same scam on the same day.

These communities were proclaimed both a county and state disaster area. While government agencies are trying to reduce as much of the harm done to us because of these catastrophes as possible, some other psychotic people try to take advantage. As they say, there should be a special place in h--- for them.

Idyllwild Fire Protection District is attempting to raise the taxes of Idyllwild residents in the form of a “parcel fee.” When this is proposed to the residents of Idyllwild, voters will need all the facts.

I want you to remember what IFPD did to your neighbors in Pine Cove when the residents of Pine Cove wanted to improve ambulance service. In 2003, Pine Cove relied on IFPD for its ambulance service, which was “as soon as they could get there.”

Citizens of Pine Cove wanted what Idyllwild residents paid for: 13-minute response. The money to pay for this was to start at \$60,000 and increase each year up to \$90,000, which somehow became \$129,000.

IFPD told Pine Cove that it had three ambulances and would be able to respond within 13 minutes with a driver and paramedic on board. Pine Cove thought this was a good thing and voted to tax themselves.

IFPD did not disclose that only one crew would be on duty and that it could have had 50 ambulances but only one would be usable.

During the 10 years this contract was in place, IFPD would show up at a call with only a driver; later than the contract required, and sometimes with a paramedic who

could not start an IV due to lack of training and practice.

Then, IFPD commissioners voted to charge residents of Pine Cove an extra \$300 a run because Pine Cove was “out of area.”

After 10 years of begging IFPD to fulfill its part of the contract, Pine Cove was paying \$129,000 a year with an extra \$300 per call and IFPD was still not fulfilling its part of the contract. Enough was enough.

Pine Cove is now fully covered by Cal Fire Station 23 and AMR ambulance service, accountable to the state of California and Riverside County, and paid for through our regular property taxes. That extra tax has gone away.

The citizens of Idyllwild need to learn from the past experience of their neighbors: IFPD promised Pine Cove all sorts of things to lure them in and then did not fulfill these promises.

This information is verifiable through CSA 38 (through which the special tax was enacted) and the Pine Cove Property Owners Association. Meeting times of these two organizations are published in the Town Crier.

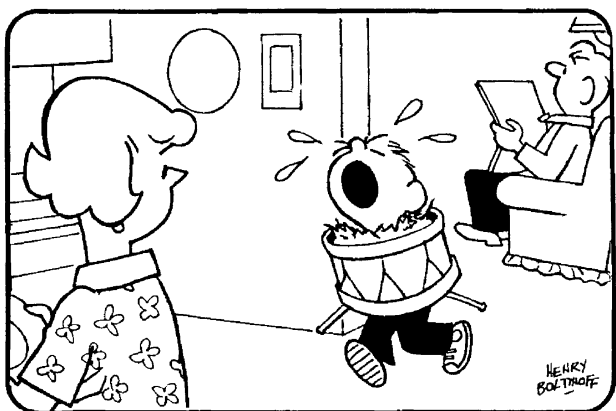

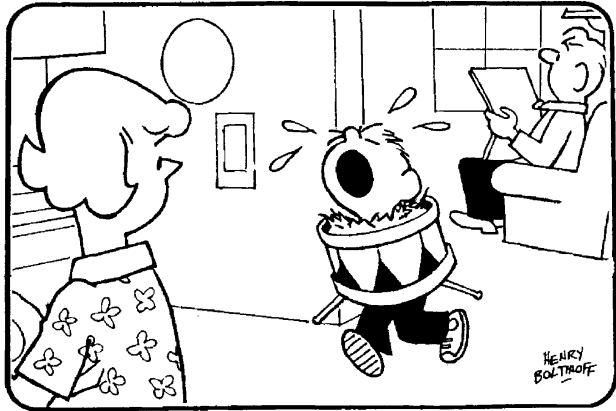

Idyllwild Fire to consider increasing fees for project reviews at March 26 meeting

At the March 26 meeting of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District commission, a revised fee schedule will be on the agenda.

The district will consider increasing many fees for reviewing construction plans, water systems and mitigation efforts, and adding some new fees.

Capt. James LaMont developed the new fee amounts. He assessed the time needed to review or evaluate a plan, and based the fees on that.

If approved, the fee revenue could increase between 30 and 50 percent. However,

the current revenue estimate is about \$3,000 so new fees will not dramatically increase total revenues of more than \$2 million.

Commissioners will discuss and consider possible action regarding additions, alterations and increases to Resolution 460, Fire Prevention Fees; Resolution 461, Fire Mitigation Fees; Resolution 462, Fire Mitigation Fee Schedule; and Resolution 463, Fire Prevention Fee Schedule.

The commission meets at 3 p.m. Tuesday, March 26, at the Idyllwild Fire Station.

Customer pipe breaks raise water usage

Annual standby fees approved and return to Stage 1 coming

The principal news from the March 13 Pine Cove Water District meeting was the 40-percent increase in water production caused by many pipe leaks on customer property.

In other business, the board unanimously adopted its annual resolution setting the standby charges at \$30 per acre, per year for each acre or portion, which has been unchanged for many years. The standby fees generate about \$26,500 annually for the district.

A public hearing on the standby rates will held during the June 12 meeting.

In other financial activities, PCWD's cash was \$320,000 at the end of February. "That's what's good," noted Director Lou Padula.

In early March, the district used \$58,000 to pay the balance of its loan for the purchase of property along Franklin Drive. The balance was slightly less than half of the total cost. Paying the balance early will save PCWD between \$4,000 and \$5,000 in interest over the life of the loan, General Manager

Jerry Holldber estimated. About 20 more responses are needed to meet the minimum necessary for the income study the district commissioned this fall, he reported. There was some concern that residents who rent homes may not have gotten the questionnaire.

Office Manager Becky Smith said copies are available at the office.

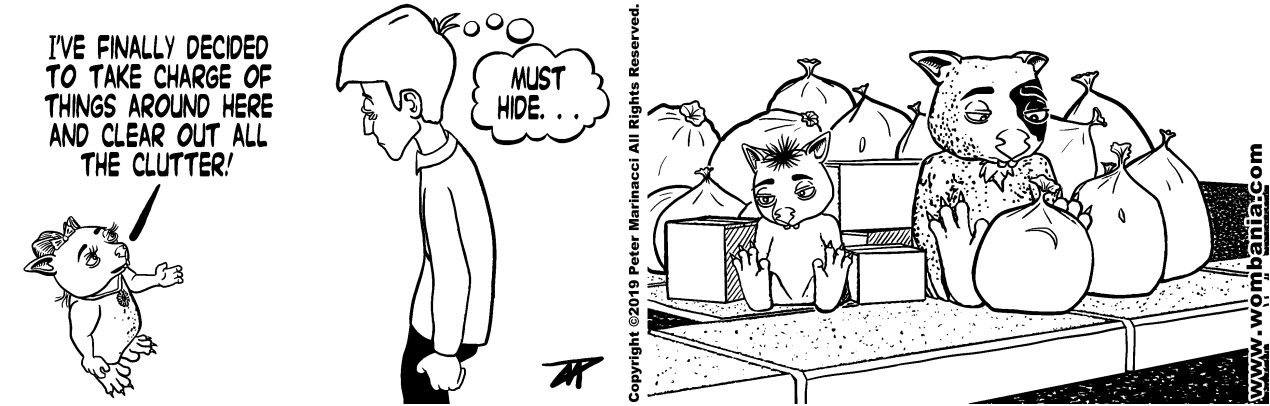
"If the results are similar to Idyllwild's, we'll save thousands [of dollars] per year just in [lower] state fees and have a better opportunity for grants or low-interest loans," Holldber said.

February water production was almost 2.9 million gallons, about 80,000 gallons more than January, but 38 percent more than in February 2018. Holldber attributed this large increase to the number of pipeline leaks throughout the district (see accompanying story). This was the greatest February volume since 2006, when 2.7 million gallons were produced.

However, Holldber assured the board that the wells and system are working fine.

Despite the volume of rain in the past two months, Holldber advised that the groundwater level of PCWD's monitoring well actually dropped 6 feet in February. Nevertheless, the groundwater level of several working wells did increase

No doubt that the torrential Valentine's Day rainstorm caused significant damage to local highways, roads and structures. But this winter's weather terror was not limited to rain. The unusually low temperatures and their duration caused many water pipes to crack or break. Depending on the flow through pipes, these leaks created significant monetary loss for local water districts and homeowners.

At the March 13, Pine Cove Water District meeting, General Manager Jerry Holldber reported that water production in February was nearly 40 percent greater than in February 2018.

This dramatic production increase he attributed to the number of water leaks throughout the district in customer's homes. He has identified at least 27 known leaks. District staff had to shut off water at 15 homes to avoid either substantial damage or more than had already occurred. In one house, the water was coming from the second floor.

So far, he has not found any leaks in the district's pipe system.

Holldber estimated that the pipeline leaks in January and February have cost the district about 1.2 million gallons of water. At one private house, the leak was flowing about 24 gallons per minute.

But PCWD was not alone trying to quell the leaks from escaping water. Victor Jimenez, general manager of Fern Valley Water District, said he was dealing

with similar problems throughout his district.

For the January and February billing period, FVWD's water production was nearly 7 million gallons, which was 2.2 million more than the same period in 2018.

"We had seven weather-related leaks, both the district's and customer's leaks in January and February. An additional 15 to 20 homes with frozen pipes which were not our responsibility, but we assisted with thawing them out," Jimenez said, describing the water damage in Fern Valley.

The storm also severely damaged Chipmunk Road, which provides necessary access to one of FVWD's tanks. Consequently, district staff "... cleared out the damaged asphalt and replaced the undermined soil on Chipmunk Road with approximately 18 truckloads of class 2 base."

Besides the loss of water, which Jimenez estimates to be about 500,000 gallons, the direct costs were \$15,000 to \$20,000 in labor and materials to remedy storm damages.

February's water production of 6.6 million gallons at Idyllwild Water District was 20 percent greater than February 2018. Together, the combined IWD production for January and February was nearly 2.7 million gallons, or 24 percent more than the first two months of 2018.

IWD General Manager Mike Creighton acknowledged some leaks, but said he had not reviewed the situation sufficiently to comment on the ex-

tent and location of any major leaks. He planned to report about the situation at the IWD March 20 meeting.

Because of the amount of snow on the ground, and snow berms created from street plowing and driveway shoveling, Jimenez was going to delay the normal period for reading meters. However, after a discussion with Office Manager Jessica Priefer, the district proceeded with its meter reading efforts.

This took more than the normal time because so many were buried. One was damaged from a vehicle (not the district's) running over it in the snow. Reading the meters was beneficial because it helped identify some homes with inordinate water usage.

"There were quite a few, and some with pretty substantial [usage]," Jimenez said. "There were a lot of frozen pipes." He even mentioned that one of the FVWD customers incurred a similar leak to the PCWD customer. Staff saw dripping from a second floor and immediately turned off the valve to limit interior damage.

And the district suffered damage because a sensor froze or clogged, causing a water tank to overflow.

Locating leaks, private and district, turning off water valves, and repairing district pipes cost PCWD about \$32,000, Holldber estimated. This is more than 400 hours of staff time.

All the water districts encourage customers to shut off their water whenever they leave the Hill for a significant time. This is especially important during the winter.

Garner Valley residents file suit to overturn Lake Hemet water rate increase

As expected, Garner Valley residents, who are customers of the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District, have filed a lawsuit opposing the board's December decision to raise water rates.

On Dec. 20, 2018, the LHMWD adopted water rate increases for all of its customers — in Hemet, Valle Vista and Garner Valley. The district did recognize that the Garner Valley water supply is a separate water source and its costs are different from the water supplied to its other customers. Consequently, the actual increases were different between Garner Valley customers and the other LHMWD customers.

Besides the normal increase of costs to produce and serve water, the board and staff included in its rate in-

crease for Garner Valley customers repayment of a loan of \$1.7 million from 2002.

The legal action is directed toward this aspect of the rate increase. The suit claims several substantive errors and a procedural mistake in the decision to raise the Garner Valley rates.

First, the plaintiffs argue that LHMWD's claim of a nearly two-decade-old loan has not been substantiated with any paperwork, loan papers or other. Secondly, they question the board's fear that the district's other 14,000 customers are expecting and claiming a repayment. This has never been demonstrated.

The procedural issue is based on Proposition 218 language for ratepayers to object and to oppose a rate increase. Since the district acknowledges that the water supply and, therefore, the costs of production and service to Garner Valley customers is

separate and independent of the costs for the other LHMWD customers, the objections to a rate increase from the two different customer classes should be treated separately, they argue.

The Garner Valley attorneys argued that more than 212 of the 242 Garner Valley customers objected to the rate increase because of the inclusion of the \$1.7 million. They say this should be a sufficient customer response to initiate a Prop 218 vote.

However, the LHMWD board combined all rate increase objections together. Therefore, more than 7,000 objections, roughly half of all customers, would have been necessary to revise the rate increase. The suit alleges this action diminished the Garner Valley ratepayers, where nearly 90 percent of customers expressed opposition.

The lawsuit asks the judge to negate the rate increase. The next court date is scheduled for April 30.

this month and, "It will take months for the water to work its way here. We won't see any improvement until May," he cautioned. "Just be patient."

And he announced that he expects to lower the water conservation stage from 2 to 1 in April. The district entered Stage 2 in June 2018.

"There will still be an awareness of water conservation, but it is voluntary. And who knows what next year brings?" he told the Board.

Holldber also reported that he plans to replace the web cameras this spring. And several directors expressed gratitude for their availability.

Resident Robert Hewitt said, "The camera showing the highway [243] is so valuable to us, and we're full-time residents." And Director Diana Luther added, "We use [it] everyday."

Number of registered Californian voters continues to grow

Last week, Secretary of State Alex Padilla released the latest voter registration data as of Feb. 10, and 79.1 percent of eligible Californians have registered to vote. Four years ago in February 2015, 72.7 percent of eligible voters were registered.

Last month, 19,978,450 Californians were registered to vote, an increase of about 280,000 voters since the November election. Padilla believes the number now exceeds 20 million. For the November 2018 gubernatorial election, 19.6 million voters were registered in the state.

In the past three months, the number of registered Democrats increased 56,000, to a total of 8.6 million.

But the fastest-growing choice was "No party preference." Since October, more than 200,000 individuals have chosen independence rather than either of the major parties or any minor party.

The 5.6 million "no preference" voters are now 28.3 percent of total registered voters. Democrats are 43.1 percent of registered voters and Republicans have fallen to 23.6 percent.

The 4,709,851 Republicans are 26,000

fewer than those registered for the gubernatorial election in November and the fewest total Republicans since before 1998.

In Riverside County, the number of registered voters increased by almost 25,000 to 1.06 million, with 71 percent eligible voters.

Democrats gained about 5,000 voters, Republicans lost 600 and the "no preference" choice grew by 17,500 voters, now representing 25.7 percent of total registered voters.

In the county, Democrats are 36.8 percent and Republicans remain second at 32.1 percent of registered voters, both a slight drop from October.

The number of registered voters in the 3rd Supervisorial District increased by about 5,100, but the 4th District saw registration grow by 6,100 voters.

In the 3rd District, the largest grow was the "no preference," which added 3,600 voters to 62,200. Democrats have 1,100 more registered voters and Republicans saw a decrease of 43 voters, but remained the largest registered party in the district. There are 87,228 Republicans in the 3rd District and the second-highest registered total is 69,853 in the 1st District.

The 3rd District also houses the largest number of "no preference" voters in the

DETAILED SUMMARY OF THE MATTERS PLAINTIFF SEEKS TO VALIDATE:

Plaintiffs are the Garner Valley Property Owners' Association ("GVPOA"), an unincorporated association of property owners located in Garner Valley, and James Martens ("Martens") (collectively, "Plaintiffs"), an individual.

Plaintiffs seek to invalidate the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District's ("District") adoption of Resolution No. 785 which, among other actions, increases water service rates in the Garner Valley service area. Resolution No. 785 and the rate increase seeks to recover \$1,700,000 from Plaintiffs for a historical deficit in Garner Valley associated with previous advancement of funds. However, there is no explanation of the purpose of the purported \$1,700,000 in advanced funds and there is no evidence that the funds were considered at the time to be an advancement and no evidence that the idea of rate increase materials also failed to present any plan or program describing how costs claimed to be misallocated going back to 2002 would be paid back.

The District improperly approved the rate increase by diluting the protesting power and rights of Garner Valley ratepayers. The Garner Valley service area is a self-contained and the costs of operating that system have no direct connection to or impact on the main Hemet/San Jacinto system. The District impermissibly merged the 242 Garner Valley ratepayers with more than 14,000 District ratepayers served through a completely separate distribution system with water from sources distinct from Garner Valley for purposes of calculating protests to the rate increase.

Through this reverse validation (or invalidation) action, Plaintiffs seek: a judicial determination that the District's adoption of Resolution No. 785, and the rate increases adopted therein, was invalid and improper and must be set aside; and a stay and/or temporary restraining order, preliminary injunction and/or permanent injunction restraining and enjoining the District from taking any actions in furtherance of or in purported reliance on Resolution No. 785.

DeAntonio returns to court; hearing set for April

Mark DeAntonio, 53, of Pine Cove, who missed several scheduled court appearances in January and February, appeared in court March 12. A felony settlement conference was set for April 16.

DeAntonio was charged in June with negligently discharging a firearm. He had several hearings in January regarding his attorney’s request for a mental health diversion.

Penal code sections 1001.35 and 1001.36 authorize this review, according to the public defender’s request.

When he missed the Feb. 19 hearing after also missing

a Jan. 29 court date, Riverside County Superior Judge Emma Smith issued a bench warrant and reset bail at \$20,000. A notice to forfeit the \$20,000 bail was filed, and another felony settlement conference and mental health diversion hearing was scheduled for March 12.

This hearing he attended, and he also paid on his bail bond.

On June 25, 2018, DeAntonio was arrested and charged with three felonies: negligently discharging a firearm, manufacturing a zip gun, and being under the influence while in possession of a loaded and operable firearm. He had been released on \$20,000 bail.

openings, Caltrans' contractor, Ames Construction, will be working on repairs.

The opening will delay the final completion by a month or two, according to the engineers. Beginning Friday, Rusnak said Ames will be working 24 hours a day. The night work will be collecting material and equipment for the next day's repairs.

There was no estimate of when Highway 243 might be opened, even for limited access, according to Kasin-ga. Rusnak added that he oversaw similar damage on Highway 330 in the San Bernardino Mountains and it took about five months.

Washington, who was at the community meeting, said, "My mantra is 'don't sacrifice safety'; people's lives are at stake. And I got that loud and clear from Caltrans. In the conference call, we discussed options. And I know my community, I know you folks, you're my family."

During the time before any public traffic can travel Highway 74, Rusnak described the work as a "ballet of elephants." There is very large equipment — trucks, dozers and excavators — that have to be moved daily. Regular traffic would not be conducive to finishing the repairs. Among the immediate projects will be cutting slopes and replacing several culverts to avoid future flooding.

"If we can move that schedule up, we will — that is our objective," Rusnak affirmed.

ed the meeting with several videos, which he took with a drone. These showed the work on Highway 74, including the removal of a large rock or boulder.

Mike Feyder, MDP president, opened the session. He asked that all questions be written and would be answered after the speakers had finished discussing the road damage and repairs.

The initial question asked whether work was being

done 24 hours per day. Rusnak replied that would start Friday.

Washington and Kasinga also announced that with help of the County Economic Development Agency, large message boards on interstates 10, 15 and 215 would be alerting drivers on how to get to Idyllwild. EDA also will have a website called LoveIdyllwild.com.

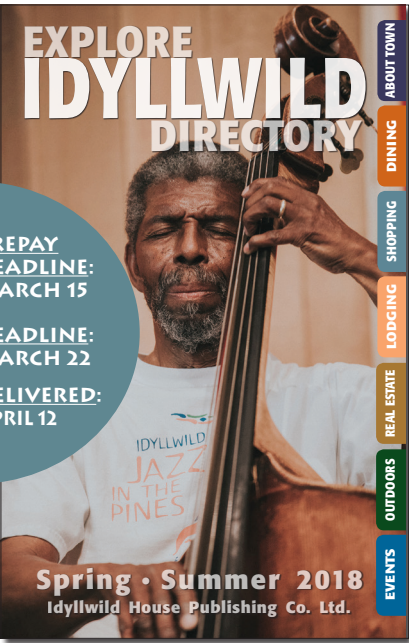

## Idyllwild man puts his money where his heart is

Educator Dr. Haddad raises money to give second life to retired race horses

College dean, teacher and avid horseman Dr. David Haddad volunteers his time and expertise for a cause close to his heart. The Idyllwild resident founded a nonprofit, the Sandia Creek Ranch Auxiliary Foundation, in 2014 to help facilitate creating a second life for race horses retired by injury, age or loss of funding.

Sandia Creek Ranch, in Fallbrook, is a multi-purpose ranch that, in one element of its mission, takes in former race horses and uses its network to place them in second life home ranches and horse properties, through sale and/or lease.

When not riding his favorite horse Sonny in disciplines including dressage, jumping, cross country and hunting, Haddad commutes to his career as teacher and dean of the California International University in Los Angeles. Lately, his commute has been complicated by road closures of highways 74 and 243 caused by the Valentine's Day storm.

The same storm has damaged Sandia Creek Ranch infrastructure, including feed barns, corrals, arenas and trails, further complicating Sandia's job of caring for and placing these stout-hearted horses. More than \$1,000 worth of hay was damaged by strong winds driving rain horizontally into feed barns. Other damage includes half a foot of mud and silt throughout the ranch.

Sandia also raises and boards horses on its 30 acres. At present, staff are caring for 74 horses and have borrowed another 5 adjoining acres from a sympathetic property owner to help accommodate their charges. According to Haddad,

it is ideal to allocate an acre per horse. Therefore, with damage to its facilities, Sandia staff are stretched past capacity.

Haddad chartered his foundation in order to provide horse lovers a tax deduction for gifts to support Sandia Ranch and its mission. Staff at the ranch have not had the time or expertise to form a ranch nonprofit, hence Haddad's decision to provide a donor enticement — a tax deduction — through his foundation.

it founded in 2007 to raise money for retired racehorses.

CARMA is responsible for hosting fundraising events, educating owners and trainers on thoroughbred retirement, and raising awareness and working to unify the racing industry in support of its equine athletes.

CARMA facilitates the transition of racehorses off the track through its placement program to facilities such as Sandia Creek Ranch. CARMA worked with the California Horse Racing Board to adopt a rule change allowing for a 0.03-percent deduction from race purses to help fund equine retirement.

Since 2008, CARMA has granted more than \$4 million to organizations such as Sandia Creek that retire, retrain

and re-home thoroughbreds who have raced at partnering tracks in California.

At Sandia, retired race horses that can no longer race are trained in other disciplines, such as dressage, cross country, jumping and hunting, depending on the nature and extent of their injury.

For Haddad, living in Idyllwild, with its peace and tranquility, and riding at Sandia, Garner Valley and other pristine places, are the perfect restorative tonics for an otherwise pressure-driven career.

Spending time in the company of horses, appreciating their intelligence, their hearts, their strength, skills and devotion, is an ongoing and rich learning process for a dedicated educator.

# Idyllwild businesses face extreme challenges

The Valentine’s Day storm that dumped historic levels of rain with accompanying wind and snow, caused massive damage to Hill infrastructure closing two of the main arteries into Idyllwild — highways 243 and 74. Continued post-Feb. 14 rain and snow complicated Caltrans’ efforts to repair both roads, causing setbacks that, until Monday, Feb. 18, caused Caltrans to revise predictions of repair completion to four months for both roads.

With Caltrans’ decision on Monday, March 18 (reported separately) to prioritize repairs on Highway 74 and allow pilot car escorts in four to six weeks during three-hour morning and evening time periods, there are rays of hope for local businesses.

Tourists are still able to get to the Hill directly from the desert and San Diego. And Caltrans will begin running bulletins on freeway electronic signs with directions to Idyllwild via roads that are open. Caltrans also will use social media to note Idyllwild businesses are open.

Even though February is an historically slow month for local businesses, most report significant loss of business with sales down on average from lows of 30 percent to highs of 70 percent or more. Idyllwild businesses are locally owned and operated with most, if not all, operating on very small margins — therefore any business downturn is significant.

Many interviewed businesses, including long-term marquee businesses like Prairie Dove and the Candy Cupboard, reported losses.

But on a sunny Sunday, March 17, with intimations of spring in the air, interviewed business owners were bullish and determined to survive. There also were bright spots.

Manny Solis reported that the county had finally approved the opening of the Solis’ newest enterprise, Mamma Mia’s Crepes and Desserts, on the upper level of The Fort. A clearance still is needed from the Idyllwild Fire Department, but Solis hopes to open in two to three weeks. Meanwhile, although business is down at Fratello’s and the other Solis restaurants, local support and weekend traffic is sustaining them.

Idyllwild Inn was at 80 percent capacity last Wednesday, according to front desk staff, and full for the St. Patrick’s Day weekend.

Candy Cupboard is betting on recovery, with a decision to stay open seven days a week, noon to 6 p.m. during the week and 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekends.

Spruce Moose proprietor Sasha Fisher, with customers in her store on Sunday, said with determination, “The Spruce Moose stays!”

Jenny (Yafen) at 88 Far East International said Idyllwild Arts students were very helpful in regularly buying food products from Asia that she stocks. And even though business was otherwise off by 50 percent, the St. Patrick’s Day weekend was much better than the previous two weeks.

Mim at Coyote Red’s said the last three weeks had been “atrocious” but St. Patrick’s Day, March 17, was busy and promising.

There is no question local businesses are hurting and that some may be forced to close. First, there was the fire in July with a five-day evacuation that hurt local businesses, and now many face an uncertain tourist future caused by road closures for indeterminate periods. But with sunshine on Saturday and Sunday, the town was busy, and there was an air of optimism.

The warm weather seemed to dispel some of the gloom that seemingly constant rain and snow had caused. Idyllwild looked good on St. Patrick’s Day weekend.

For now, on a sunny weekend, business owners were determined and cautiously hopeful.

The Brewfest was scheduled for June 1. Estimates for highway reopenings are mid-June.

For all of these reasons, Janice Murasko, ARF director, said the board felt it was in everyone’s best interest to cancel the 2019 Brewfest and resume in 2020.

“We couldn’t impose on local businesses this year,” she said.

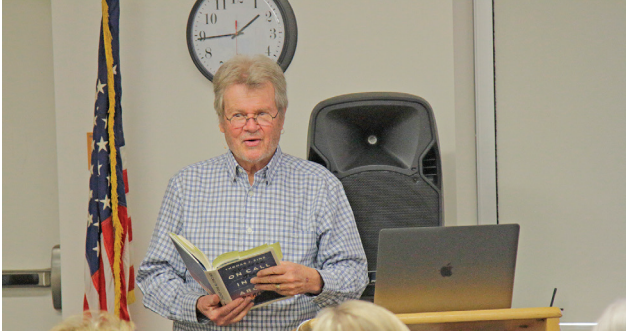

## Family bought back house 19 years after father had to sell in 1998

Three generations of the Ewing family returned to Idyllwild to celebrate St. Patrick's Day in the original Ewing home.

"This weekend, as has been happening for over 45 years, the Ewing clan will get together and celebrate St. Patrick's Day," wrote daughter-in-law Camille Ewing before the event. "Most of the grandkids, now with families of their own, will be returning to Idyllwild to celebrate coming back after 20 years to share memories and relive good times."

In 1984, Paul and Bernice Ewing designed and built their Idyllwild log cabin dream home on Idyllbrook Drive. The spacious home became a festive host for family gatherings of Bill and Bernice, the five Ewing siblings, their spouses and children.

With the death of Bernice in 1993 and the onset of health issues for Paul in 1998, he was forced to sell the home.

In 2017, one of the sons, Bill, along with wife Camille, bought the property and have been restoring the home back to its original condition with important structural and design upgrades.

The purchase came about unexpectedly. "One of my nieces was in Idyllwild and, by chance, met the lady who had bought the home from my dad," said Bill. "She was contemplating selling, so we bought it to preserve our family history."

The St. Patrick's Day week-

end provided a perfect time to introduce the house to the Ewing grandchildren and cousins, many of whom had not seen the house before. In all, there were 58 celebrants decked out in green shirts playing as if they all were children. Festivities included a talent show where the emcees were ages 9 and 11; a traditional family card tournament; dancing to Motown music; a clan reunion photo; and, of course, eating.

First, there was a barbecue at noon, then a taco truck from Riverside at 3 p.m. and an endless cake after that.

And for the those who were older, the walk into town and a trip to the Candy Cupboard brought back so many memories.

"When we were little, the walk into town felt like miles," said Kyle Ewing. "Now it's so short. But Idyllwild seems like a time capsule, so little has changed."

**Indie:** My human and I really did, but I guess it wasn't meant to be.

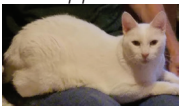
