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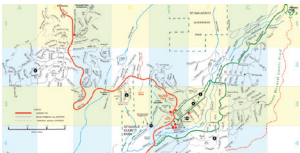
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Extended hours for Highway 74 Memorial Day weekend

The hours for access of Highway 74 between Mountain Center and Hemet have been extended for the Memorial Day weekend.

On Friday, May 10, Terri Kasinga, chief, Public and Media Affairs, Caltrans District 8, announced that the highway will be open, with the use of escort vehicles, from 6 a.m. through midnight Saturday, Sunday and Monday, May 25 through 27.

On Tuesday, May 28, access will return to the current

Plan for permanent Daylight Saving Time progresses

"It's past time we stop switching our clocks and adopt permanent daylight savings time," Assemblymember Jay Obernolte said.

In the November 2018 election, California voters approved a proposition allowing the Legislature to establish Daylight Saving Time on a permanent basis.

Following the approval of Proposition 7, Assemblymember Kansen Chu (D-San Jose), who has been championing permanent DST for several years, introduced Assembly Bill 7 at the beginning of the new legislative session in December.

Last week, the Assembly unanimously approved AB 7, which has now moved to the California Senate.

This bill will make the shift to DST in California permanent subject to the federal government's approval. Federal law does not allow states to establish year-round DST, which is the reason federal legislation would have to approve the clock change.

Chu introduced legislation in 2016 to make the time shift permanent.

"I am thrilled to see the broad bipartisan support for AB 7," he said in his press release. "As momentum builds, and 39 other states consider similar proposals, I'm proud to have California leading the way on this issue. In the wake of the passage of Proposition 7, we're seeing that Californians believe that switching our clocks twice a year no longer makes sense, and science is on our side."

AB 7 has bipartisan support.

Assemblymember Jay Obernolte (R-Big Bear Lake) is one of the bill's author's.

"It's past time we stop switching our clocks and adopt permanent daylight savings time," he said. "Research has shown that switching to year-round daylight savings time would reduce electricity use by 1,500 megawatt hours per day (saving California ratepayers over \$300 million per year), reduce pedestrian fatalities by 13 percent, and decrease robberies by 7 percent, as well as reducing heart attacks, workplace injuries, and suicide rates."

Riverside County budget \$22 million in hole

Trouble may be ahead for future budgets

The current Riverside County budget is expected to end the year (June 30) with a \$22 million deficit. County Executive George Johnson shared the news with the Board of Supervisors at the meeting Tuesday, May 7.

He also noted that the deficit will grow next year, FY 2019-20, without significant and hard decisions.

The county has reserves of nearly \$234 million, which will drop to \$212 million after covering the projected deficit. This is slightly greater than the board's policy to maintain a reserve level of at least 25 percent of the operating budget.

But Johnson and Chief Financial Officer Don Kent stressed that the board could not accept this solution complacently. "The projected shortfall will continue unless we take serious corrective action," Kent warned the board.

The county's economic consultant Robert Kleinhenz, executive director for research at the University of California, Riverside's Business Center for Economic Forecasting and Development, said he expects revenue growth to continue, "subdued, but sustained growth."

"Our expenditures are outpacing that modest growth in revenue," Johnson alerted the board. County departments and agencies have submitted budget requests that are \$46 million in excess of the projected income.

Then Kent added that this was before any of the current labor negotiations have been completed.

The areas creating the budget problems are general assistance, pensions, health clinics and prospective labor negotiations.

This FY, the state transferred responsibility for general assistance to counties. Riverside County has underestimated its costs. At the beginning of the FY, the county planned on \$2.2 million. By June 30, the county will have used \$14.4 million when in January, the estimated total was \$10.4 million. Next year's costs will continue to grow.

Local pension costs have been growing and growing for several years. Riverside County expects its payments to CalPERS to be \$20 million more in FY 2019-20.

The University Health Clinics are operating at a loss. This year they totaled \$16 million. The university assures county officials that it is taking steps to increase revenues.

Finally, the county has contract negotiations with several labor groups to complete this FY. The recent contract with Laborers International Union of North America, Local 777 will cost another \$3.6 million next FY.

Other programs that will place demands on the next budget are the county's capital improvements, staffing of the new John Benoit Detention Center and new equipment for the Registrar of Voters.

The board unanimously accepted the executive's Third Quarter budget report. But in preparation for the 2019-20 budget, Chair Kevin Jeffries (1st District) said, "The board will make the determinations on which departments receive the cuts. Not all departments are created equal. Some have a higher priority for public service than others do."

He also noted that the budget hearing on June 10 would be in the evening to afford people who work an opportunity to speak to the FY 2019-20 budget issues and concerns.

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Major repairs and reconstruction continue on Highway 243

Caltrans and its contractor Ames Construction were busy repairing Highway 243 Thursday, May 9.

Boulder

In Pine Cove, Caltrans crews were removing a huge boulder that was dislodged during the winter storms. It has gradually, but slowly, been slipping. By Friday, it was mostly gone.

Road repair

Work is continuing on repairing Highway 243. New and larger culverts have been installed at two places north of Lake Fulmor. Because these culverts are much larger than the older ones, the road had to be dug out. Currently, there is about a 4-foot drop from the original road surface. This will be corrected, too.

Bay Tree

Work is progressing at this site, too. Because of the fog, it was difficult to

get a clear photograph of the work. But the current work area is probably 20 to 40 feet higher than the bot-

tom of the original washout.

usage hours of 4 to 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. to midnight each day. Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol will continue to enforce the following restrictions:

- The speed limit is 25 miles per hour during the escort.
- Motorists will not be permitted to stop or pull over during the escort.
- Motorists will not be permitted to pass other vehicles during the escort.
- The construction zone on Highway 74 between Mountain Center and Hemet will be a "Double Fine Zone."
- Sections of Highway 74 will have uneven, unpaved roadbed with narrow passage. Be advised that dirt, sand, rock and mud exist on Highway 74. Low-profile vehicles are not recommended.
- No drone, video or photos will be permitted while using the escorts.
- Motorists must follow all commands given by the pilot workers, contractor employees, flaggers, Caltrans crews and the California Highway Patrol.
- Escorts can be canceled at any time due to safety concerns for the traveling public, such as slope issues, rock fall, roadbed concerns and motorists not following traffic laws or escort provisions.

In other news about Highway 74, Caltrans has announced a public meeting Thursday, June 6. The subject will be the issue of a raised curb median in Hemet. Caltrans is proposing to create a raised median on Florida Avenue (Highway 74) from the Ramona Expressway to Cawston Avenue.

Many Hemet businesses and residents oppose the idea because it will eliminate left turns in the middle of the blocks.

Highway 243 remains closed from Lake Fulmor north. There is no news on expected dates for reopening. The repair of the road at Bay Tree Spring is continuing, but will require much more time for completion.

The meeting will be from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. Thursday, June 6, at the James Simpson Community Center in Hemet.

Rain and cooler temps in the forecast

May temperatures have been slightly below average and precipitation remains strong. Through this past weekend, rainfall is approaching two-thirds of the long-term average rainfall for the month.

The possibility of rain is in the

forecast for Thursday and Friday as well as cooler temperatures.

Through Saturday, May 11, the U.S. Forest Service's Keenwild Ranger Station has recorded 0.46 inches of rain. Much of that came Monday, May 6. Since 1946, the average May rainfall has been less than 0.75 inches.

Since Oct. 1, 2018, the beginning of the current rain year, Keen-

wild has recorded 28.73 inches. Historically, the average total rainfall from October through May has been 23.17 inches.

In the past decade, only two rain years, 2010-11 and 2016-17 have exceeded 23 inches. In both of those years, the total recorded rainfall was 33 and 34 inches, respectively.

Two crashes on Hill roads last week

A one-vehicle collision last week resulted only in the vehicle being towed.

John Palmer, 26, of Oceanside, was driving a white 2013 Toyota Prius eastbound just east of Palm Canyon Drive on Highway 74 at about 8:45 a.m. Wednesday, May 8. He took a left-hand turn and the vehicle went off the roadway before he had time to react, according to California Highway Patrol Public Information Officer Darren Meyer.

The vehicle went down a steep rock embankment about 50 feet over the side.

Palmer complained of pain in his left arm and shoulder but was not transported to a hospital. His vehicle was towed.

A two-car collision on Friday, May 10, did result in a patient being transported to an area hospital.

At 12:35 p.m., David Reidford, 74, of Palm Springs, was driving a white 2014 Nissan Rogue southbound on Highway 243, according to Meyer, when he turned left onto lower Saunders Meadow Road directly into the northbound path of a blue 2004 Jeep Wrangler driven by Luis Felix, 47, of Idyllwild.

American Medical Response transported Reidford to Desert Regional Medical Center for complaint of pain. Felix was not transported.

Small business loan deadline

Director Tanya N. Garfield of the U.S. Small Business Administration's Disaster Field Operations Center-West reminds California small businesses of the May 24, deadline to apply for an SBA federal disaster loan for economic injury caused by the Cranston Fire in Riverside County that occurred July 25 to Aug. 15, 2018.

According to Garfield, most businesses may apply for Economic Injury Disaster Loans of up to \$2 million to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. "Economic Injury Disaster Loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that cannot be paid because of the disaster's impact. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the applicant suffered any property damage," Garfield said.

These low-interest federal disaster loans are available in Imperial, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and San Diego counties in California; and La Paz County in Arizona.

Interest rates are 3.61 percent for businesses and 2.5 percent for private nonprofit organizations with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition.

She taught at Desert Sun and entertained you all with her accordion and voice, folk danced up a storm around there, was one of the first ever dedicated organic food advocates and I remember classmates of mine hooting at her, "Gypsy!" back in the late '50s because she always wore peasant dresses and long skirts, eschewing any other attire (except one day when she went hiking with Bob Beggs up toward Tahquitz wearing hiking shoes and trousers).

I did yard work and helped fold literature inserts for



Jon Gnagy, and my mother taught his wife guitar lessons. Idyllwild was among the great influences of my life as I spent huge amounts of my time in the woods and trails. I can identify the smell of a ponderosa or sugar pine at the drop of a hat, including the way they sound in a gentle breeze, and that is just the start of my profound attachment to your bio-region.

Lead-free hunting begins July 1

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife wants to remind hunters that beginning July 1, nonlead ammunition will be required when taking wildlife with a firearm anywhere in California.

CDFW strongly recommends that hunters acquire and practice with nonlead ammunition well before heading afield, particularly in advance of upcoming big-game seasons, to make sure rifles are sighted in and to understand how their firearms perform with nonlead ammunition.

The nonlead ammo requirement includes hunting on public land, private property and licensed game bird clubs, and applies to rifles, shotguns, pistols and muzzleloaders in any gauge or caliber for the take of any legal species. The nonlead ammo requirement extends to the legal take of nongame birds and mammals and includes firearms used for depredation to take species causing property damage.

The requirement does not apply to hunting with pellet rifles. Since pellet rifles are not classified as firearms, the use of lead pellets is allowed. Lead ammunition is allowed for target shooting where that activity is permitted.

Black bears are back in action

California's black bears are waking up hungry from their winter downtime. To help minimize unwanted bear foraging behavior, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife is reminding those living in or visiting bear country to store food and dispose of garbage properly.

Black bears typically prefer remote mountainous areas. However, as more people frequent or live in natural bear habitat, the abundance of food and garbage associated with human activities is a temptation hungry bears find hard to resist.

"Over the years, we have seen bear behavior change significantly in areas where more people live and recreate in bear habitat," said Vicky Monroe, CDFW's Conflict Programs coordinator. "Beginning with spring and into late fall, we receive a steady stream of calls from the public reporting anything from bears breaking into cabins and tents to bears stealing food off picnic tables."

Black bears, like other bear species, have a highly specialized sense of smell, which can sometimes lead them to towns and recreation areas where they may quickly find an overflowing garbage can, or someone's leftover hamburger and French fries.

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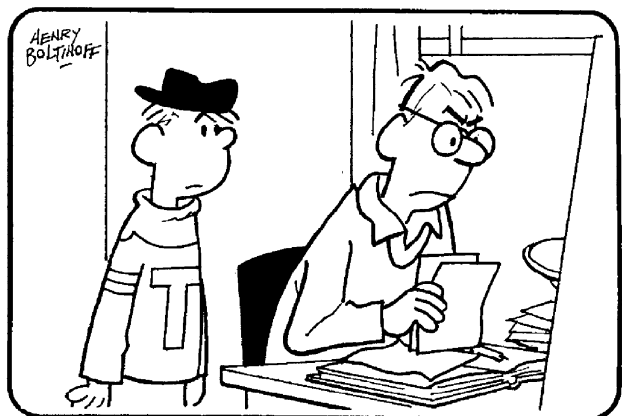


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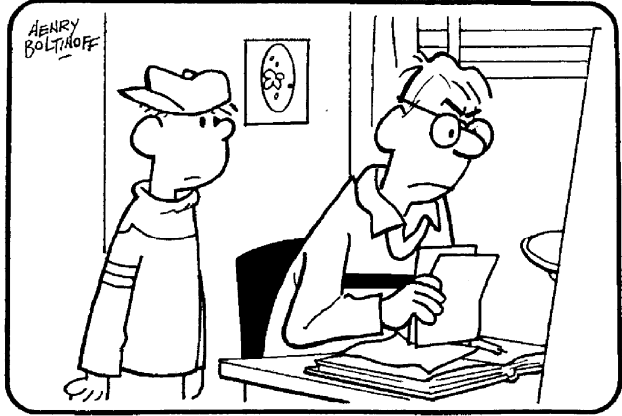

Pine Cove Water finances in good shape, improving

Finances, this fiscal year and next year, were the topics for the Pine Cove Water District directors at their May 8 meeting.

For the first three quarters of fiscal year 2018-19, which ends June 30, expenses have exceeded revenues by about \$90,000. This is largely attributable to the board's decision to pay off the loan for the Kelly property.

The loan amount was about \$58,000. By paying off the loan now, the district avoids interest payments, which would have amounted to an another \$4,000 to \$5,000 over the loan's duration, according to General Manager Jerry Holldber.

Addressing the overall budget, Holldber told the board, "In general, the numbers speak for themselves. There are no surprises, and the bottom line at the end of the year will be good."

Director Diana Luther asked if there were any potential problems, and Holldber replied, "No."

At the end of April, one month beyond the end of the third quarter, PCWD's cash balance was about \$239,000, about \$12,000 more than at the end of March.

Director Lou Padula noted this improvement and said, "Not bad after that big hit [paying off the loan]. We're

doing very well."

Holldber also presented the draft budget for FY 2019-20. Overall, he projects revenue will increase about 7.7 percent from \$975,000 this year to \$1,050,000 in FY 2019-20.

The principal cause for the revenue growth will be the rate increase approved last year. Holldber estimates that service revenue will grow about \$55,000 (9.8 percent) to a total of \$615,000.

There will be some increase in property tax revenue and lease payments.

Expenses are projected to be about \$1.0 million, a 5.3-percent increase. Equipment and loan payments will be less because the Kelly property loan is paid off. The other three accounts will increase about \$20,000 each.

The largest increase is budgeted for capital projects. About \$50,000 will be used to buy more 8-inch pipe for current and future pipeline replacement projects. Salaries and benefits are up a modest \$16,000 (3 percent), for a total of about \$533,000.

The other major increases are the fuel costs for the equipment. Gas prices began increasing this year. Electricity is projected to increase just less than 10 percent or \$4,000.

"Fuel costs are almost up a dollar per gallon," Holldber told the board.

In other business, Holldber reported that water production in April was

2.5 million gallons, nearly 200,000 gallons less than April 2018. However, total production for the first four months of 2019 has been about 10.9 million gallons, which is about 1.3 million more than the same period a year ago.

Much of the current increase occurred in late January and February when an extended period of dramatically low temperatures resulted in frozen pipes and major leaks in all three water districts. Also, a portion of the April usage was water for Caltrans' contractor working on Highway 243 repairs.

Holldber also attributed the additional water usage to the growth in full-time residency in the district.

For this four-month period, this is the most water used since 2007, when 11.1 million gallons were consumed. However, in six of the eight years from 2002 through 2009, water consumption exceeded 10 million gallons from January through April.

In other water news, Holldber reported that the groundwater level of well no. 10, the monitoring well, had risen 1 foot in April, and another 8 feet in May. At 124 feet below ground level, this is the highest it has been since September. And Holldber expects it to continue to rise as the snow melts on the mountain and rains continue.

State budget: paying debt, saving for future, growing education programs and funding help for homeless

Last week, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced his proposed revisions for the fiscal year 2019-20 budget, which begins July 1. The total budget recommendation is \$209.1 billion.

His revised budget for use of general funds will spend \$147 billion, \$2.8 billion more than the January budget proposal.

The revenue projections for next year continue to be positive, enabling Newsom to increase expenditures as well as increase reserves for future economic bad times.

The Rainy Day Fund will be \$16.5 billion, \$3 billion greater than this FY that ends June 30, and \$1.2 billion greater than the January request.

He also expects that the "wall of debt" will be completely paid for next year. According to his office's press release, "This marks the first time in over a decade that all budgetary debts are completely paid off."

Before augmenting programs or com-

mitting to multi-year spending, Newsom described how he is building budget resiliency. He has allocated funding to paying the unfunded liabilities, repaying debt and building reserves. This amounts to \$15 billion.

Newsom also was proud of his budget priorities. The earned income tax credit was increased by \$120 million. He is proposing to expand the credit to \$1,000 from the \$500 proposal in his January budget. The intent is to help low-income families with children.

Children and their future are also a major priority of the budget. "This is the highest investment in the K through 14 educational system," Newsom said at the press conference. Slightly more than \$81 billion is targeted for the state's educational programs and activities.

This includes more funding for special education and more assistance for teacher loans to help mitigate the statewide teacher shortage. Special education will be allocated nearly \$700 million next fiscal year.

The governor's budget included \$750 million in one-time, non-Proposition 98 gen-

eral funds to assist schools in constructing or retrofitting facilities to expand access to full-day kindergarten programs. The May revision makes funding available over a three-year period, but with eligibility limited during the first two years to schools that will convert from part-day to full-day kindergarten programs.

To provide a greater fiscal incentive and support for districts to participate in the program, the May revision also increases the state share of the facility grant from 50 to 75 percent for schools converting from part-day to full-day kindergarten.

There also is funding to increase the subsidies for California families to purchase health insurance through Covered Cal.

The May revision also encourages accelerated housing development and more aid to help renters "fight back against rent gouging and other unfair practices."

Funding for emergency responses and Cal Fire was not changed in the May revision. The governor's request still includes a \$500 million increase that is allocated to several state departments, including the Office of Emergency Services and Cal Fire.

These funds are intended to improve emergency communication and warning systems, purchase 13 new fire engines, add five new fire crews and increase the pace of wildfire preventions.

However, on Friday, at The Near Future Summit, Newsom and Dr. Peter Diamondis announced a competition to find innovative and novel ideas to detect and extinguish wildfires.

"We want to avail ourselves to the best and brightest minds around the world," Newsom said. "We want the best way to put out fires. We haven't pushed the boundaries of technology and innovation in fire suppression or extinction. We just haven't."

Diamondis, founder of XPrize, added, "Can we find [the wildfire] and put it out before it grows? How [does] it get put out? Is it drones? Is it water cannons?"

During Thursday's press conference, Newsom also continued his support to find ways to assure safe drinking water to all Californians. His January budget included the proposal for a tax on water produc-

Three Idy businesses hit with burglaries

In the early morning hours of Monday, three burglaries occurred in downtown Idyllwild. Two of the businesses were auto mechanic, Idyllwild Automotive and Idyllwild Garage, and the third was Village Market, according to Riverside County Sheriff's Department Officer Jeremy Parsons.

A lot of cigarettes were taken from Village Market.

Green's case consolidated with Lauer's

Charges against Marcus Green, 54, of Thermal, the driver of a car that went over the side of Highway 74 in May 2016 and resulted in the death of a 5-month-old child, have been refiled.

The Riverside County District Attorney's Office dropped the initial filing, which was tentatively schedule for trial this month, and refiled the same charges, but consolidated Green's case with a similar case against Kristen Lauer, 25, of Rancho Mirage, the baby's mother.

Green was driving his Porsche and Lauer was the passenger. While the parents, wearing seatbelts, survived the

crash, the baby, Armani, was thrown from the vehicle and died at the scene.

Within days of the crash Green was charged with vehicular manslaughter with gross negligence, willful harm of a child and inflection of great bodily harm.

Green's bail was set at \$1.86 million and he has been in custody since his arrest.

In May 2017, the DA's Office filed murder and child cruelty charges against Lauer. Her bail was set at \$100,000 and she was released on bail.

A felony settlement conference and preliminary hearing have been set for May 24 for both Green and Lauer.

Although he did not specifically mention the tax during the press conference, he was adamant that the Legislature and the executive branch find a solution.

“That's a proud day when the Legislature and the governor can align on providing a basic fundamental right, and that's clean and drinkable water at an affordable price for the most vulnerable Californians,” the Governor said. “To walk away from that, to abandon that, I think is to walk away from our values.

I am not wedded on how, but I am wedded on doing it, and we're gonna get it done.”

A day before the May revision was released, Newsom and First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom announced some tax changes they have designated as the “Parents Agenda.” The Parents Agenda comprises “a sales tax and use exemption for diapers and menstrual products, increased child care and increasing the proposed state Earned Income Tax Credit for kids under the age of 6.”

A board member for more than 20 years, Raiguel served as chair for seven years, and helped the organization weather the downturn of 2008, leadership transitions and major building projects. Her contributions to Idyllwild Arts have been honored with the naming of "Faith's Way," the street behind Lowman Hall, a recognition she treasures.

She's thrilled to be addressing the associates, and with the above in mind, will gladly answer questions.

ART'S CORNER

Idyllwild Master Chorale presents "A Night at the Opera"
Saturday, May 11, 2019, 7:30 p.m.
Lowman Concert Hall, IAA Campus

In the selection of the proper elements of a choral concert presentation, one should always take into account all levels of practical audience responses, and generally make them not only favorable as a whole, but also providing an education in the process.

From the projected advertising which led up to Saturday evening's concert — beginning with the title — a diverse enough program was expected, and was certainly "favorable" to a fault in a most pleasing combination of instrumental as well as vocal styles. However, the overall dominant mode of the proceedings tended to minimize whatever selections could be determined as "operatic" in nature in the placement of the more "popular" items, and this inherent disparity naturally brought out a real disconnect between those methods of presenting a set piece in either opera or musical theater.

Perhaps if Director Dwight "Buzz" Holmes had revised his subtitle to "A Night at the Musicale," it might have been better served, but from the fact that all was in proper order beforehand, singers in good voice and respectful of the rotation of the soloists and ensembles, the foregoing criticism was not as necessarily warranted as it might have appeared.

So, beginning with the set of numbers from Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Carousel," and from there proceed-

ing through sets from "Les Miserables" and "Tommy" (this latter set as a nod to Mr. Holmes's original production of the rock "opera"), the evening was overwhelming in presenting sheer vocal power, particularly in the numbers "You'll Never Walk Alone" and "Do You Hear the People Sing" (to take the more salient examples).

That power display was carried over to the individual performers as well; in particular the efforts of Eric Bolton (in both the "Carousel" and "Tommy" excerpts) and Justin Patrick Holmes (in the "Les Mis" portion) are those that this listener would single out as significant, as well as in the overall blending of choral activity.

And in the scattering of the operatic pieces, and the leaving of works for solo performers as distinct as possible, the balance was partly maintained between ensemble and individual workings.

Ms. Dimyana Pelev's interpreting of the "Habanera" from "Carmen" (complete with red dress) was subtly seductive in its vocal weaving, and John B. Fleming's Puccini excerpt (the "Nessun Dorma" from "Turandot") was equally persuasive in power as well as subtle.

Linda Wallace and Fredda Koupal's vocal blending on the "Flower Duet" from Delibes' "Lakme" was a floating world wonder, and the excerpts from Borodin's "Prince Igor" brought both chorus and soloist (in this case, bass Chris Kruse) in a sensual swirl of soundscape possibility.

Only the Donizetti piece (the famous "Lucia di Lammermoor" sextet) failed to impress this listener; the lack of power displayed was probably due for the most part to the middle placement of the singers on the stage (instead of bringing all six of them up front, as usually performed). A minor detailing, of course, but still a lapse on the part of the presenters.

Nevertheless, the ensemble was well-behaved throughout — no interference was observed, and the ac-

companiments were well within the chorus and soloists proclivities; in particular, those of guest cellist Julianna Buffum Holmes and acoustic guitarist Erik Lingren (the latter providing a entertaining imitation of Pete Townshend's "Kid Gavilán" playing style in the four "Tommy" examples) deserve special mention, as does the usual yeoman work of pianist Edwin Hansen throughout all parts.

A definitely smoothed performance, another feather in the cap of "Buzz" Holmes and forces, and a generally satisfied audience, who responded in kind with appreciative plaudits.

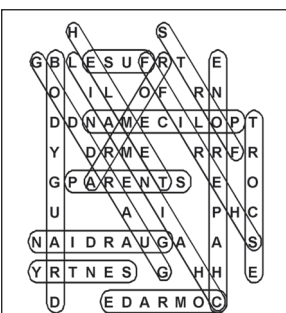

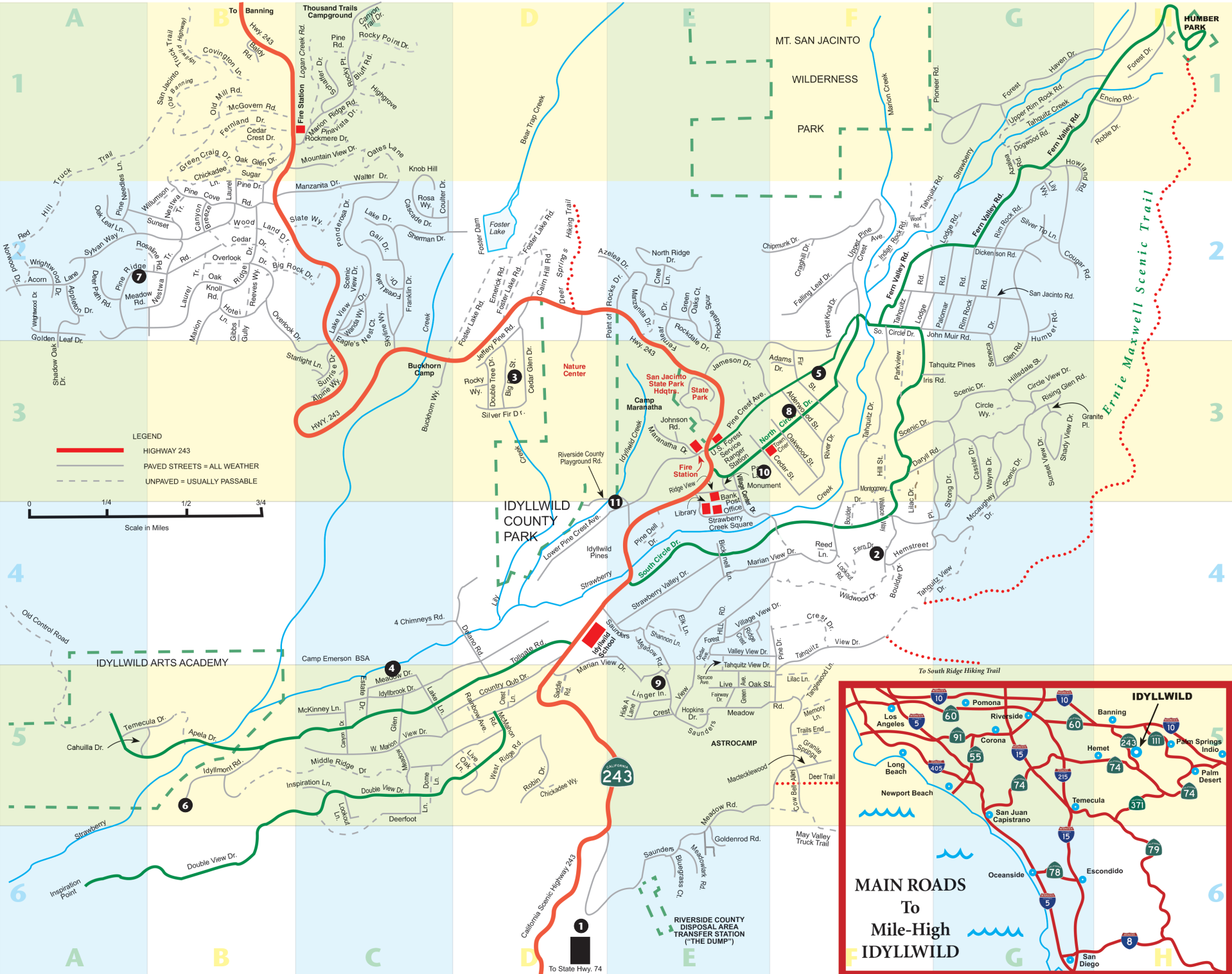
