Governor seeks ratepayer help to stabilize utilities

Actions to mitigate wildfires remain high priority

Gov. Gavin Newsom is recommending utility ratepayers contribute to a fund that would stabilize the financial condition of California's major electric utilities.

This and other proposals, as well as

som is considering a \$10.5 billion fund to ensure fair compensation for wildfire victims and protect ratepayers from massive rate spikes.

To access these funds, the big three utilities — Pacific Gas and Electric, San Diego Gas and Electric, and Southern California Edison — would have to invest at least \$3 billion in safety.

"Part of our wildfire response is making sure that Californians maintain access to affordable and reliable power, and that power companies are held to the highest standards of safety and accountability as we work toward our clean energy goals," Newsom said in the report. "Financially unstable electric utilities will put wildfire victims in jeopardy and cause California families' electrical bills to skyrocket."

This and several other legislative proposals Newsom hopes to negotiate with the Legislature by July 12.

Other recommendations in the original Strike Force report included upgrading the state's 911 system. This will happen with new tax on phone bills just approved in the current budget legislation for fiscal year 2019-20, passed

He also recommended changes at the California Public Utilities Commission. A new Wildfire Safety Division and accompanying Advisory Board will be created. This also involves a change in the CPUC decision-making process, placing more emphasis on efficiency and transparency.

The Governor's Office of Planning and Research is working with local governments to limit future development in fire-prone areas and to help draft zoning ordinances to restrict new development in fire-prone areas.

Cal Fire has a priority and several hundred million dollars to invest in improving defensible space and reducing hazardous fuels.

County ranks retail, cultivation cannabis permit requests

List goes to supervisors in July

Last week, Riverside County released the rankings of the applicants for permits to sell or to grow cannabis

The list of potential permit recipients will go to the Board of Supervisors for approval at its July 2 meeting. Those applicants whom the board approves will then have until Oct. 30 to submit an application for a conditional use permit, which also must be approved, before operating their cannabis business.

In October 2018, the board approved the permitting process for cannabis businesses. Operations such as distribution and testing had to file a permit request with the county's Planning Department.


However, the retail and cultivation applicants had to respond to a request for proposals from the county. For the first year, the board agreed with its staff recommendation to limit the number of retail permits to 19 and the cultivation permits to 50.

After the RFP was released in March, the county received a total of 119 responses. For the 50 cultivation permits, only 30 applicants submitted a response.

All 30 were "... deemed complete," and will be submitted to the board in July. For the retail permits, 18 applicants submitted for a microbusiness permit, which would include retail as well as another business such as cultivation or distribution. Seventy-one responses were solely for a retail permit.

Wet winter still poses summer fire risks

U.S. Senate encourages federal agencies to reduce wildfire threats

Former Fire Chief for the San Bernardino National Forest was lead witness before the U.S. Senate's Energy and Natural Resources Committee hearing on the outlook for the 2019 wildfire season.

While the wet spring weather has tempered the number of fires, Shawna Legarza, director of Fire and Aviation Management for the U.S. Forest Service, was cautious about the summer and fall expectations.

"... [A]bove normal potential exists for significant large fires this summer across California and the West Coast where a heavy crop of grasses and fine fuels has developed and the wildfire risk will increase as conditions become drier," she told the committee.

"All those grasses will be drying out from the heavy rain and snow pack," she added. "From this will come large fires."

Other witnesses concurred with this forecast. In particular, Wade Crowfoot, secretary of California's Department of Natural Resources, said, "While the precipitation replenished reservoirs and delayed the start of fire

season in higher elevation forested lands this year, it actually worsened the wildfire outlook for 2019, particularly for lower elevation foothills and grasslands."

While the hearing subject was the fire outlook for this summer, the majority of questions were addressed to Legarza and were about the Forest Service's actions and roles.

The committee's questions ranged from "What more can we do?" to "Why aren't you implementing the tools we've given you?"

In particular, several senators were concerned about the reduction in the number of timber harvests throughout the U.S. as a tool to thin forests and reduce fire threats. But some committee members chided Legarza for the Forest Service's recent announcement of revising its environmental analysis process, including expanding the number and type of categorical exclusions.

Sen. Ron Wyden (D-OR) called it a lawyer's full-employment action because of the anticipated litigation. He argued that the Forest Service could spend just as much money on mitigating hazardous fuels as it will defending these regulations.

Concern also was expressed over the time it is taking the Forest Service to equip its fire crews with Global Positioning System monitors. The issue has been posed for several years and this year Congress passed legislation authorizing it.

Jeffery Rupert, director of the Department of the Interior's Office of Wildland Fire, testified that the Bureau of Land Management fire teams will have GPS equipment tracking suppression resources next year.

"The BLM plans to equip 240 [GPS] satellite terminals on engines and other equipment in all BLM states at a reasonable cost: additional terminals will be purchased and installed in 2020."

He also discussed BLM's use of unmanned aviation systems to monitor wildfire spread with them on all fires

The Forest Service held a three-day conference this month to discuss GPS equipment with vendors, other fire agencies, scientists and industry experts, Legarza reported.

Fire breaks also were discussed. Sen. Cory Gardner, (R-CO), asked what the agencies were doing to create and to maintain fuelbreaks.

Crowfoot expanded on the value and benefit of fuel-breaks throughout the California forest lands.

"One of the lowest cost and highest impact ways to lower fire intensity and protect communities is fuels treatment — building strategic fuelbreaks," Crowfoot said. "Even in the face of a high-wind-driven mega fire like the Camp Fire, the few fuelbreaks that were in place did their job."

Decrease in Surety Bond fees

The U.S. Small Business Administration announces the first fee decrease in Surety Bond Guarantees in 12 years. The fee decrease will be in effect for guaranteed bonds approved during fiscal year 2019. It took effect Oct. 1, and ends Sept. 30, 2019.

The program is reducing the fee from 26 to 20 percent of the bond premium charged to the small businesses and reducing its contractor fee from \$7.29 per \$1,000 of the contract amount to \$6 per \$1,000 of the contract amount.

"Reducing the SBG program fees will not only directly help small businesses, but also will incentivize surety companies and their agents to increase support for small businesses in the marketplace," said Peter C. Gibbs, Acting Director of the Office of Surety Guarantees.

Under its SBG pro gram, the SBA guarantees bid, payment and performance bonds for small and emerging contractors who cannot obtain surety bonds through regular commercial channels. SBA guarantees contracts up to \$10 million, including the streamlined QuickApp application for those up to \$400,000.

There are 34 participating sureties and over 350 active agents in the SBG program. On average, completed surety bond applications are reviewed and processed in less than two days.

Forest Service proposes changes for its environmental analyses

Earlier this month, the U.S. Forest Service posted proposed changes to how it applies the National Environmental Policy Act to many projects on Forest Service lands.

The draft regulations make it clear that agency decision makers should consider the effect of projects on the environment. And the sequence from a categorical exclusion to an environmental impact statement is the process.

As stated in the release, the Forest Service wants "[to] ensure the right amount of environmental analysis to fit the work, locations and conditions."

The Federal Register Notice mentioned that the Forest Service has a backlog of more than 5,000 special use permits. "The Agency's goal is to complete project decision making in a timelier manner."

Part of the future effort will be to reduce redundant analyses, apply previous work to other projects and, hopefully, reduce the analysis time for a project to start.

"We have pored over 10 years of environmental data and have found that in many cases, we do redundant analyses, slowing down important work to protect communities, livelihoods and resources," said Forest Service Chief Vicki Christiansen in the press release. "We now have an opportunity to use that information to our advantage, and we want to hear from the people we serve to improve these proposed updates."

One of the major changes, as reported, will be new "categorical exclusions." The updates would create a new suite of categorical exclusions, a classification under the NEPA excluding certain routine activities from more extensive, time-consuming analysis associated

with an environmental assessment or environmental impact statement.

The proposed categorical exclusions would be for restoration projects, roads and trails management, and recreation and facility management, as well as special use authorizations that issue permits for outfitters and guides, community organizations, civic groups and others who seek to recreate on national forests and grasslands.

The new categorical exclusions are based on intensive analysis of hundreds of environmental assessments and related data and when fully implemented will reduce process delays for routine activities by months or years, according to the Forest Service press release.

Another major change is the introduction of the concept the Forest Service labels "Determination of NEPA adequacy." Its intent is to outline a process for determining whether a completed Forest Service NEPA analysis can satisfy NEPA's requirements for a subsequent proposed action.

The process requires the consideration of several steps. For example, is there similarity between the prior decision and the proposed actions? Is the range of alternatives for the proposed action adequate? Are there any significant new circumstances or information since the prior decision?

The Forest Service will continue providing public notice in the Schedule of Proposed Actions. Added scoping and public engagement opportunities are at the discretion of the responsible official.

Officials at the San Bernardino National Forest would not comment on the possible effect the regulatory changes might have on local projects. They referred the question to the Washington office.

Mountain Fire case nears settlement

U.S. Attorney cures previous filing error

On June 19, in a somewhat tersely written order, Judge Otis D. Wright II, United States District judge for the Central District of California in Los Angeles, chastised the parties for failing to submit a joint status report on June 10, as previously ordered, and threatened to dismiss their case: United States v. Tarek M. Al-Shawaf, et al., in which the federal government seeks damages due to the July 2013 Mountain Fire that swept around Idyllwild and caused its evacuation.

The court ordered the parties to show cause, in writing, by June 24, 2019, why the court should not lift the stay and dismiss the case for failure to prosecute. Failure to comply with that order, the judge wrote, may result in the dismissal of plaintiff's case.

On the morning of June 24, the U.S. Attorney's Office filed its response and fifth status report in compliance with the court's order in which Assistant U.S. Attorney Kevin Finn advised the court that all parties have now agreed to a final release and dismissal agreement in full settlement and resolution of this federal lawsuit. As soon as all parties and counsel have received and signed the final release and settlement agreement, they will file a dismissal stipulation with the court, Finn wrote.

The U.S. Attorney's Office requested a further stay of the case pending the filing of the dismissal petition. In response, Wright, for good cause shown, ordered the parties to file a further joint status report on or before July 12, or to file a dismissal that complied with federal rules.

The Town Crier will report on the content of the settlement agreement when it becomes available.

Report unsafe and/or illegal driving or problem roads by emailing (SanGorgonioPass@chp.ca.gov) the date, time, location and vehicle license plate (or a passenger's or dash cam's photo). Using the license plate, Capt. Mike Alvarez will contact the registered owner by mail, and issue the registered owner a courtesy warning letter. You get to remain anonymous during the CHP's contact. The warning letter is then kept on file at the San Gorgonio Pass CHP office for future reference.

If you are reporting a problem roadway with a high number of traffic safety concerns, CHP will log it and focus enforcement efforts there, using data to track the locations via hot-spot mapping so CHP can deploy resources in high-violation areas.

"This innovative campaign is designed to show our community we are listening, and even if we can't be in all places at once, we are still committed to public safety. Help us make our roadways safer," the Facebook post stated.



The above publications viewed as unique the fact that the Town Crier continues to be privately owned and a for-profit newspaper. We announce in advance that TC Memberships are not tax-deductible, that Members have no ownership or voting rights, and that we know our Members appreciate the fact that their Membership cannot control or influence the Town Crier's editorial policies and decisions.

Some newspapers have set themselves up as nonprofits with tax-deductible memberships. But, as we explained to the reporters covering the above stories, we feel that a nonprofit model would not work here in Idyllwild because nonprofit newspapers have boards of directors who need experience in the newspaper and publishing businesses and because there are several factions on our Hill that would vie for representation on the board so that they could contour or control the paper's content. We continue to feel that way.

As we informed the reporters, we began the Membership model only after we had tried unsuccessfully to appeal to business advertisers in myriad ways, including even going "free on the Hill." We still need and get business advertising, of course, but it alone is no longer sufficient to keep the Town Crier going, as in former years. As a last resort, we realized that we had to appeal to our readership, who we believed did not want the Town Crier to retire when we did — and you proved that to be cor-

We also emphasized that the Town Crier already had earned the good will of the people it served before we tried the Membership model, and that we doubted that a brand-new, for-profit paper could succeed in the same

You Members have built the Town Crier up on a new model that can serve your Hill community just as long as you want it to. And we believe that your desire will extend into the future partly because the TC is the sole monitor of eight local governmental agencies on our Hill, and because our Hill community has so very many organizations and activities for our participation and enjoy-

ANOTHER POINT **OF VIEW**

Southern California has some of the most rugged, pristine and beautiful patches of unspoiled nature in the state, and arguably the entire country.

Idyllwild-Pine Cove residents often like to reflect on their mile-high "paradise and heaven on earth," their bumper-stickered cars professing and reinforcing their love and devotion.

Our unincorporated hamlet of 3,000 to 5,000 people on this side of the San Jacinto Mountains upslope from Palm Springs is a cherished home to abundant wildlife, hiking trails, clean air, great water, culture, four seasons and a great community spirit.

But this winter's record rainfall crippled north-south access to our homes; severely damaged east and west travel; and tore apart the fragile healthcare fabric linking us to doctors, specialists, hospitals and services off

Much concern has been expressed — and rightfully - about merchants who are losing business due to the road closures, especially during peak travel season. Some merchants already may have closed their doors and fortunately, new businesses keep popping up, speaking to the faith in and the resilience of the Hill.

During the school year, the kids had to wake up and be ready at an unheard-of-time of the morning and to travel for hours roundtrip for education. Work commuters still suffer that burden plus added travel costs. People are worried about the housing market, "Will it slow?" "Has it slowed?" There is worry that people are moving off the mountain.

Numerous what-if scenarios are floated in local coffee shops: "What if the fire season is especially dangerous?" "How does one get off the mountain if there is only one exit?" "What if the remaining open road is affected?" What about adequate water to fight the fires?

One issue that needs elevation is the elderly folk who live here. The infirm. The poor people who don't have gas money to travel the "long way down the mountain" for medical services. What about emergency situations the urgency of humans and canines alike snake-bitten and far from life-preserving anti-venom? What about folk who need daily lifesaving treatments? Yes, there are people on the Hill who need them.

Should a local resident stricken with a life-threatening condition have to live under the sword of Damocles weighing the risk of postponing treatment due to the more-costly travel — versus struggling to make the trip at all costs?

Gratefully, Idyllwild Shuttle transports the needy down the Hill.

The impact of the roadway damage on residents' healthcare is a significant issue. It warrants some discussion at the community level. The Feb. 14 storm worsened access to routine lab work, surgical procedures, urgent care and routine wellness checkups off the Hill, too. (Care of our beloved pets' veterinary needs took a hit.)

Such pursuits are more costly in travel time, gasoline, patience and physical stamina. God forbid that a test is bungled, and one must repeat a trip for the same service. Heaven forbid that one's caregiver uses LabCorp, not Quest Diagnostics services, necessitating travel beyond where one is accustomed to going.

How are Hill residents faring where their healthcare needs are concerned? Is there a way to check on that?

The presence of Mountain Disaster Preparedness, Riverside County Supervisor Chuck Washington, Caltrans and Ames Construction at the June 13 meeting offered reassurances for the local business and the tourist season. Who is leading the conversation where healthcare issues are concerned?

It is often said that health is one's most valuable treasure. When will we add access to medical facilities and services to the list of important issues on the Hill?



Parental Advisory: Dating Apps

Parents be warned: Some dating apps - like Fast-Meet, Meet24 and Meet4U – allow adults to find and communicate with children. Concerned parents should remove these apps if they're on children's devices.

You also can set your kids' devices so they must get parental approval before purchasing any new apps. Here are a few more things you should know.

FastMeet, Meet24 and Meet4U let children create public dating profiles. So, adults can use these apps to connect with children.

If that's not scary enough, the apps collect users' real-time location data. In other words, adults — including sexual predators — can search by age and location to identify children nearby.

The Federal Trade Commission recently issued a warning letter to Wildec, LLC, the Ukraine-based maker of the three apps, because the company appears to be violating both the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act and the FTC Act.

COPPA requires app providers to give notice and get consent from parents before collecting or sharing any personal information about children under age 13, and the FTC Act prohibits unfair acts or practices.

As the FTC's letter states, "the ability to identify and communicate with children — even those over age 13 poses a significant risk to children's health and safety."

As of May 3, 2019, Apple and Google Play have removed FastMeet, Meet24 and Meet4U from their stores, although it's possible that updated versions of these apps could appear in the future — but only for adults.



MCFSC SUMMER UPDATE ...

As the Town Crier previously reported, Edwina Scott retired from the executive director position with Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council. After several interviews, the board of directors is pleased to announce the hiring of Kathy Wilson (from Idyllwild) as the new ED.

Also, to help the new ED and Field Supervisor Pete Coy, the board has hired Courtney Locke of Pine Cove to work part time performing duties in office management. This position has been filled off and on over the years depending on the amount of grant money available for abatement jobs. This year, there is money, a great need for abatement on our mountain and thus, the need for additional help.

To illustrate the need, our greatest amount of grant money this year is from Cal Fire, totaling \$600,000 to be spent over a three-year period. However, we have had access to this money for only about five months and about one third of it is already spent on 60 occupied parcels on the Hill with another 15 to 25 property owners waiting for abatement.

We also need three new board members at MCFSC and that advertisement is in this paper, as well. After having as many as nine board members and as few as five, the present board has decided seven members is an optimal number.

The Woodies have been busy cutting and splitting wood for the Help Center and working on small abatement jobs for those citizens who qualify for such help. Idyllwild Fire Department has recently committed to help the Woodies cut firewood as a part of its service to the community and to train the young chainsaw operators for structure and wildland fires.

Idyllwild Water defers budget approval

Wants more information before expanding sewer district

After canceling their May meeting, Idyllwild Water District directors were sluggish and not ready to take any controversial action at their June 19 meeting.

Two items - annexing three properties into the sewer district and the fiscal year 2019-20 budget — were deferred to future sessions. Approval of a 10hour, four-day work-week schedule for its field staff barely passed, 3-2. Essentially, General Manager Michael Creighton defined the issue as whether the board chose to trust him to manage the staff and to ensure the work was accomplished.

The standby fees for both the water and sewer districts, which evoked no controversy or any public comment, were approved. These remain at \$30 per acre or parcel, as they have for many years. No one from the public spoke for or against the fees, and the board then unanimously approved them.

Budget

The directors had several concerns and suggestions about the FY 2019-20 budget, which Creighton was just presenting them. Since the board did not review the draft budget in May, several directors wanted another meeting to see how the proposed changes would be reflected before approving a preliminary budget.

Director Peter Szabadi

There should have been a public session and then the ment. board discusses the capital program choices," he said.

Examples of some the changes included Director David Hunt's recommendation to include funding for rehabilitating existing wells in the capital program, along with drilling new wells. Szabadi cautioned about testing for new wells too soon since the water table level remains abnormally high due to the abundant winter and spring precipitation.

Director Steve Kunkle questioned the need to buy large trucks for both Annexation to sewer the water and sewer departments as opposed to one vehicle, which could be shared by both departments. Several expected greater funding for pipeline replacement done by IWD staff.

And President Dr. Charles "Chip" Schelly and others urged more money to ensure the horizontal wells above Foster Lake can be returned to service Kunkle before next winter.

Overall, the proposed water budget for next FY, which begins July 1, would be \$1.65 million, an increase of \$150,000. Total revenue, including property taxes and standby fees, is anticipated to be \$1.8 million, yielding a positive balance at the end of the year of \$130,000.

For the sewer program, Creighton proposed a budget totaling nearly \$600,000, with expected revenue of \$815,000.

IWD does not have a plan that adequately evaluates the current system's capacity. Further, the wastewater treatment facility is 50 years old and needs upgrading or replacing.

The state will be inspecting the wastewater treatment facilities this week, Creighton added.

The board took no action on the proposed annexation and Schelly asked Creighton to analyze the system and conduct a further review of the request.

Work schedule

The final item diswas Creighton's cussed proposal to implement a four-day, 10-hour work day for the field staff. He argued that this would help with recruitments and improve morale for current employees, and had already been approved for office staff.

Directors asked questions about ensuring the office was open five days a week and how the fourday schedule would affect operations of the sewer plant and water projects requiring more than one

Creighton noted that other districts, even Fern Valley Water, were using this schedule. He was only proposing to use it from July 1 through September, and then evaluate staff performance and accomplishments to determine its merit.

While the directors were clearly skeptical and concerned about how it would affect customer ser-

Idyllwild Water schedules special meeting on next year's budget

The Idyllwild Water District Board of Directors has scheduled a special meeting to complete approval of its fiscal year 2019-20 budget for 6 p.m. Wednesday June

A closed session to perform an evaluation of the general manager will follow the action on the budget.

Schelly cast the deciding vote and stressed it was only a temporary change. In the fall, Creighton will have to convince the board that customers were not negatively affected and projects were not delayed.

Water production

In May, IWD produced 7.7 million gallons of water, which was 440,000 gallons (5.4 percent) less than May 2018.

For the first five months of 2019, total water production has been 35.8 million gallons. This volume is nearly 10 percent greater than the same period in 2018. More than 80 percent of the greater production occurred in January and February. The total production is the greatest amount since the same period in 2013.

Also in May, IWD began pumping water from its Foster Lake wells. Usage of this water had been substantially reduced because of the high levels of organic products in the wells.

This step has reduced the disinfectant by-product concentration, which trihalomethanes (such as chloroform) and haloacetic acids that are formed from the reaction vice, it was approved 3-2. between chlorine, the purification chemical, and natural organic material in the water.

For several months, IWD has used its wells in town for the vast majority of its production.

The groundwater level of the Foster Lake wells fell 10 feet in May as production there resumed.

Creighton says the testing has shown that the new granulated carbon filter plant is successfully removing the organics and halomethane reducing concentrations. The latest test result indicated the concentrations are substantially lower and well within the permitted state amounts.

His latest readings for trihalomethanes indicated 17 micrograms per liter on lower Pine Crest Avenue, where the September reading was 14. The maximum contaminant level is 80. On Double View Drive, the THM reading was 6 micrograms.

For the haloacetic acids, Creighton reported a concentration of 12 micrograms per liter on Pine Crest Avenue compared to 5.6 level in September. On Double View Drive, the reading was 2 and the MCL is 60.

Fern Valley water authorizes pipeline replacement contract

Work starts in July, continues to fall

At its June 21 meeting, the Fern Valley Water District Board of Directors welcomed Jim Gates as the new member. Gates was appointed earlier this month to replace George Rowell who resigned in April.

The board approved a contract with El-Co Contractors of San Bernardino to replace and install new pipelines in the Rim Rock and Azalea neighborhoods.

El-Co was the only firm to bid on the contract and its original bid was \$1.45 million. Victor Jimenez, general manager, had estimated the project would cost about \$1 million.

In a 4-1 vote, the board approved signing a \$1.23 million contract. The \$220,000 difference is El-Co's estimate of the cost for bedding (soil), shading and backfill material to complete the project. This was dropped in anticipation that Idyllwild Water District may have soil for FVWD and Pine Cove Water District may have some areas of soil and rocky material.

If added costs arise, Jimenez said that change orders would be used to modify the contract, but the \$1.45 initial submission would be the cap.

Director Jim Rees voted against issuing the contract because there was only one bidder. However, Director Robert Krieger, who participated by teleconference, voted for it and added that a second firm participated in the

pre-bid conferences, but elected not to submit a bid. El-Co will start work in July and Jimenez estimates

the project will be completed in October.

The board unanimously adopted its fiscal year 2019-20 budget. While the operating costs are projected to be about \$925,000, which is nearly \$600,000 less than expected revenues, the capital budget plan is for \$1.86 mil-

The pipeline project is included for the full bid amount of \$1.45 million. The other large capital projects are continuing the fire hydrant upgrade (\$146,000) and installing three new pressure reducing stations

If all the estimates are accurate, FVWD reserves will decrease by \$1.3 million in FY 2019-20. Next July, the balance would be about \$620,000. But a minimal capital program is planned for FY 2020-21. Jimenez told Gates the reserves would then begin to be restored.

In his operations report to the board, Jimenez said May production, especially from wells, had fallen from previous months. Both Strawberry and Tahquitz creeks were flowing strongly and, "Surface water availability is far above demand at this time."

Mike Feyder, president of Mountain Disaster Preparedness, told the board that the disaster assistance shelter, which the board had approved last year, was ready to be opened. With the help of Idyllwild Rotary, MDP plans a community event on Saturday, July 20.


Beginning July 1, customers who pay their FVWD water bill with credit cards will have a service fee of about 3.5 percent added to the payment.

Lead-free hunting begins July 1 The California Department of Fish and Wildlife wants to remind hunters that beginning July 1, nonlead ammunition will be required when taking wildlife with a firearm anywhere in California.

CDFW strongly recommends that hunters acquire and practice with nonlead ammunition well before heading

afield, particularly in advance of upcoming big-game seasons, to make sure rifles are sighted in and to understand how their firearms perform with nonlead ammunition. The nonlead ammo requirement includes hunting on public land, private property and licensed game bird clubs, and applies to rifles, shotguns, pistols and muzzleloaders in any gauge or caliber for the take of any legal species.

The nonlead ammo requirement extends to the legal take of nongame birds and mammals and includes firearms

The requirement does not apply to hunting with pellet rifles. Since pellet rifles are not classified as firearms, the use of lead pellets is allowed. Lead ammunition is allowed for target shooting where that activity is permitted. For more information, visit CDFW's Nonlead Ammunition in California webpage at www.wildlife.ca.gov/hunt-



County approves tentative \$838 million budget

At its June 18 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a tentative fiscal year 2019-20 budget. This included five adjustments that the County Executive Office must incorporate into the final budget proposal, which was on the June 25 agenda for approval.

The entire board heard the public opposition to a proposed reduction in the Cooperative Extension program at its June 10 public hearing. This program, in cooperation with the University of California, Riverside, provided agricultural education programs, such as the local 4H, to school-age students.

Immediately after the public comments, the board unanimously agreed to restore \$562,000 for this pro-

"The message is received. We'll identify ways to move cooperative staff from leased space to county-owned, and ways to share support staff," CEO George Johnson said at the hearing.

Supervisor Manual Perez, District 4, requested a restoration of \$500,000 for the Code Enforcement budget. He argued that CE inspections often find potential areas vulnerable to fire and require that they be improved. This is less costly, especially for the whole community, than to have to respond to a fire.

Another \$1.5 million was recommended for the Economic Development Agency. Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington felt that the reductions over the past

few years have impended the agency's efforts to solicit and bring new businesses with jobs to the county.

The added funding will reduce the \$20 million contingency, leaving a balance of \$17.4 million entering the new fiscal year.

Two other changes do not have direct and immediate fiscal impacts. First, Chair Kevin Jeffries, District 2, recommended that the EO more thoroughly review the budget for the Animal Services Department. The purpose is to find potential savings and operating efficiencies that might obviate or, at least, lower the proposed increases in fees and rates for residents of unincorporat-

This could include contracts with nonprofit or joint power organizations to provide some of these services.

The fifth change directs the EO to enforce Jeffries proposal for county agencies to use county-owned office space rather than leased space. His intent is to find savings wherever possible.

... [N]et county cost funded departments that lease office space ... shall be directed by the County Executive Officer to relocate to available county-owned office space. If a department does not want to utilize county-owned space when available, the net county cost portion of their budget will be reduced in the amount of the difference between the private net annual lease and the county new annual lease. Waivers from this can be granted by the CEO, provided the board is notified in advance.'

The county staff reviewed, evaluated and ranked each response according to the criteria described in the RFP. While the top 19 ranked retail applicants would seem to be the ones for board approval, two groups of three are within 1,000 feet of each other. The county regulation requires at least a separation of 1,000 feet between retail cannabis shops.

Whichever applicant, from the group of three, the board selects, the other nearby applicants will be eliminated. Consequently, that would eliminate four applicants; therefore, the next four on the list may be among the 19 earning the retail permit.

The 23rd operation on the list, Green Goddess Riverside LLC, gave its address as 54900 Pine Crest Avenue. This appears to be the only retail applicant in Idyllwild. Green Goddess submitted applications for several locations within the county. The one in Supervisor Jeff Hewitt's District 5 was ranked number 20. The rest were ranked below 23.

After the board ratifies the retail and cultivation permit applicants, each has 120 days (until Oct. 30) to file a conditional use permit and a development agreement.

The CUPs also will be evaluated to determine if a General Plan amendment or a zoning change or variance is necessary as well as the "appropriate level of environmental review."

The planning staff emphasized that a top ranking is not equivalent to approval.

State budget ready for July 1 provides various benefits compared to the legacy system,

Education and healthcare top priorities

The California Legislature approved a \$215 billion budget for fiscal year 2019-20, which begins July 1.

Educational spending dominates the budget, but Gov. Gavin Newsom and legislative leaders agreed on several new programs, including health insurance for the poor, immigrants and many non-citizens.

Families of four who earn as much as \$150,500 a year would be eligible for health insurance subsidies under the new law. Also, California's Medicaid program would expand to include young adults ages 19 to 25.

Funding for initiatives to address concerns about wildfires and to try to mitigate their effects also was substantially increased. This includes a monthly fee of 80 cents on phone, including cell phone, bills to pay for critical improvements, such as handling text messages, photos and, even, videos, in the state's 911 system.

The current fee is based on phone calls, but as the use of text messages grows, the fee is collecting less revenue. The governor's January budget request estimated the

fee would generate about \$170 million annually. These funds would build a "Next Generation 911 system that

including faster call delivery, increased routing accuracy and functionality, call overflow and backup functionality, updated geographic information capability and wireless location data, and incoming text capability.'

The governor's proposals for increasing the Rainy Day fund and paying down state obligations, such as funding for teacher's pensions, were not changed.

State Sen. Jeff Stone, 28th District, who represents the Hill communities, supported many of these initiatives, but argued that healthcare for people in the country illegally was wrong.

"Budgets are about priorities. I agree with the belief that we should be philanthropic to the working families who struggle to make ends meet. I agree that we should care about working poor who can't afford healthcare," he said in a press release after the budget vote. "That's why I find it morally wrong to raise taxes on working men and women in order to give free healthcare to individuals between the ages of 18 and 25 who are in this country

He argued that addressing homelessness was a necessary priority and more consideration for these programs would benefit state residents.

"Government's first priority is public safety. Its next priority is to help those citizens who can't help themselves," concluded Stone.

The Idyllwild Deer Sightings Two bands and Project adds Samuel T. Deerfly a new tradition

In 2013, the Art Alliance of Idyllwild added a touch of colorful magic to Idyllwild by installing 22 painted deer, the first public art project of its kind on the Hill. Of the original 22 deer, "Rocky" outside of La Casita was stolen and "Postcards from Idyllwild" at Idyllwild Inn was destroyed beyond repair. Neil Jenkins replaced Rocky with "Rocky II" that now stands in front of La Casita.

As a second stage in 2018, AAI planned to install just another 15 deer. However, the project proved so popular with artists and sponsors that the herd reached a total of 50 painted deer and one coyote. AAI artists took their imaginations to new heights creating magical, mythical and exotic creatures.

The last of the herd, "Samuel T. Deerfly," created by Dore Capitani, was installed at the Courtyard Gallery on Saturday, June 22. This steampunk masterpiece of gears, keys and a wingspan more than 5 feet long represents the very best Idyllwild artists have to offer and is a fitting conclusion to this sixyear project. AAI sponsored Samuel T. Deerfly and dedicated it to Idyllwild Realty in appreciation of its support throughout the years.

Besides the artist Capitani, the installation team consisted of

Neil Jenkins, Scott Bump, Eric Yandell and Scott Finnell.

AAI publishes maps of the "Trail of the Painted Deer" so that locals and visitors may identify all of the deer, their names, the artists who painted them, their locations and the generous people who sponsored them. The herd consists of bucks, does and fawns, each with its own theme and no two are alike.

"They range in size, level of organization and traditions, but in all cases they will include a brass band, jubilant dancing in the street and members decked out in a wardrobe of brightly colored suits, sashes, hats and bonnets, parasols and banners, melding the pomp of a courtly function and the spontaneous energy of a block party, albeit one that moves a block at a time."

Spectators are invited to become participants at the end of the parade this year.

Parade goers are reminded that only foot traffic is allowed on the parade route between 8 a.m. and noon. The parade begins at Fern Valley Corners at 10 a.m. and ends at Village Center Drive around noon Thursday, July 4.

Black bears are back in action

California's black bears are waking up hungry from their winter downtime. To help minimize unwanted bear foraging behavior, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife is reminding those living in or visiting bear country to store food and dispose of garbage properly.

Black bears typically prefer remote mountainous areas. However, as more people frequent or live in natural bear habitat, the abundance of food and garbage associated with human activities is a temptation hungry bears find hard to resist.

"Over the years, we have seen bear behavior change significantly in areas where more people live and recreate in bear habitat," said Vicky Monroe, CDFW's Conflict Programs coordinator. "Beginning with spring and into late fall, we receive a steady stream of calls from the public reporting anything from bears breaking into cabins and tents to bears stealing food off picnic tables."

Black bears, like other bear species, have a highly specialized sense of smell, which can sometimes lead them to towns and recreation areas where they may quickly find an overflowing garbage can, or someone's leftover hamburger and French fries.

Paint with Jen Hajj at the library

At 10:30 am Wednesday, July 3, Jen Hajj will show how abstract art can be created by using acrylics to create paintings. As Jen puts it, "One can create beautiful and interesting paintings by letting the pigment run amok."

Jen came to Idyllwild five years ago and started volunteering at the school and library. One of her many passions is handling live birds such as eagles, hawks and owls, which she took around to the schools.

She also organized the Bird Festival in San Diego, the largest on the West Coast.

Many may know her as a folk singer who performs at Higher Grounds and Café Aroma, or a travel consultant with Holbrook Travels, which caters to natural history and eco tours for small groups. She enjoys doing things that are "kooky or different."

She became intrigued with acrylic painting when viewing a YouTube on acrylic paint pouring. This technique is one where the components in the paints interact

in different ways.

As Hajj put it, "The components don't like each other and will create all kinds of strange bubbles and designs on the paper." She believes in providing activities that promote creativity and discovery of the chemical reaction of the paints.

This is the third of the family STEAM events presented by the Idyllwild Library this summer.

STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics. It is a national educational initiative designed to teach how all things are related to each other by integrating experiences in everyday life.

Susan Righetti, Idyllwild Library assistant librarian, who oversees the library's Education Programs, validates STEAM. "Having STEAM education in the library is a neutral space where students are not being graded like school. The library can focus on what most interests children and adults. It also fosters creativity, curiosity and a community of tinkerers."

One more STEAM program is left in the series on July 10. All the programs are free and appropriate for all

Since that decision, I have met bi-monthly with several key figures of Idyllwild Arts to consider how we might re-envision this iconic event. I am grateful to Bob Boss, Rose Colella, Evan Christopher, Mark Davis, Tom Hynes, Keith Miller, Harry Pickens, Chris Reba, Palencia Turner, Wendy Winks, and of course, Marshall Hawkins for taking seriously the future of jazz at Idyllwild Arts. After several meetings, independent and collective thinking, we were able to articulate that the mission of Jazz In The Pines is to "support and empower the students of Idyllwild Arts through an inter-generational teaching-artist model anchored in the strategies of jazz music and the artistry of its greatest practitioners."

This past weekend, I watched as 70 young jazz enthusiasts came to campus to participate in our annual Jazz Intensive program that takes place two weeks every summer. On Monday, they eagerly waited to audition with the hope of securing one of the top spots in the band and work with this All Star faculty that includes multi-Grammy winner John Daversa, Yamaha recording artist Wayne Bergeron, iTunes "Rising Star of Jazz" Frank Fontaine, pianist, educator and composer Barb Catlin, and trombonist and musical director Francisco Torres to name just a few. These students have come to study Jazz...at Idyllwild Arts...In The Pines.

From our earliest days Idyllwild Arts has been bringing together practitioners and enthusiasts to explore and learn on the campus of Idyllwild Arts in the idyllic location of Idyllwild. This has continued through to the present day when young classical musicians attend our Summer Program to be under the baton of Larry Livingston or be inspired by John Walz, Edith Orloff and Roger Wilkie of the famed Pacific Trio. When Jazz In The Pines returns, it will do so in the tradition of bringing together students with practicing artists to study the music of the masters, to explore humanity through multi-generational conversations and lectures, and to hear music performed by practitioners.

To announce Jazz In The Pines 2020, the school will, once again, participate in the town's Fourth of July parade. Euphoria Brass Band will join us to play in the Second Line, a tradition made famous in the brass bands of New Orleans.

You'll hear more about Jazz In The Pines 2020 as activities take shape for the coming year, so please mark your calendars now for June 28 - July 11, 2020. In the meantime, I hope that you visit the campus over the next two weeks to hear our young, budding jazz artists and the faculty who teach and inspire them.
