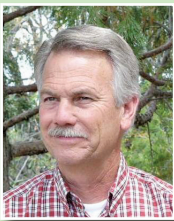

Some really good news came out of the Caltrans community meeting last Tuesday night, Oct. 29, at Idyllwild School that was coordinated by Mountain Disaster Preparedness. There is now full access to Hemet and Banning from Idyllwild.

Public and Media Affairs Chief for Caltrans District 8 Terri Kasinga announced that Highway 243 would reopen by 6 p.m. Friday,

Nov. 1. However, Kasinga told the crowd that the highway could reopen as soon as Thursday. The highway did reopen on Friday.

There will be some flagging. In a press release issued Nov. 1, Caltrans wrote: "striping and recessed markers will be installed beginning Nov. 4 with flagging for about one week."

Flagging will take place Monday through

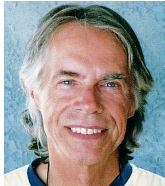

Friday from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. at various locations for the work, according to the press release.

In addition to the striping and installation of recessed markers, tree removal also began Nov. 1. The work will continue for about one week on Highway 243 from post miles 0 to 3 to remove burnt, dead trees from the Cranston Fire.

The journey since Feb. 14

The roads washed out as a result of the torrential rains on Feb. 14 causing full closures on both Highway 74 — from Mountain Center to Hemet — and Highway 243 — from Pine Cove to Banning. For a couple of months, commuters had one option in and out of Idyllwild: Highway 74 through Mountain Center to Garner Valley.

On April 20, Caltrans reopened Highway 74 from Mountain Center to Hemet giving commuters some relief. However, the hours were very limited and vehicles were escorted

On Aug. 30, Caltrans allowed commuters 24-hour access with the pilot car and Highway 74 fully re-

opened Oct. 3 with flagging operations only.

Fire safety reminder

I would like to thank our residents for their partnership, support and continued diligence throughout the 2019 abatement process.

We had a record number of properties that passed our inspection process during the first inspection in April. We also had a record number of properties that passed the final 2019 abatement inspections.

I also want to remind our residents that although we have recently seen much lower temperatures here in Idyllwild, we aren't out of the 2019 fire season yet.

With record low relative humidity, winds and low fuel

moistures, I would ask that our residents maintain a heightened sense of awareness and caution as they begin utilizing their furnaces, fireplaces and wood stoves to heat their homes. Maintain proper clearances and use extreme caution when removing and disposing of hot coals and ashes. Utilize only approved and fire-rated metal containers for the removal of these ashes and only place these containers on fire-resistant surfaces such as concrete, gravel or bare dirt.

Mountain siren alert system update

At the last Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) commission meeting on Oct. 22, Chief Mark LaMont gave an update on the mountain emergency siren alert system from the position of the district.

LaMont reached out to Adam Mikels, inside sales representative for American Signal Corporation, for information on sirens. Mikels presented options, including the pros and cons of each, to LaMont in an email.

"I have been working with them to identify the best possible practice of alarm system use for a community such as ours," LaMont told the commissioners.

"I don't want to say we are slowing the alarm system down at all, but what we are trying to do is ensure that anything that we do here doesn't need to be undone or redone because we didn't research and study this deep enough," LaMont said in response to concerns about timeframe. LaMont articulated that the district wants to "spend the community's money wisely when we get there."

LaMont sat down with members of the Mile High Radio Club and updated "about 200 items that will be required to extend WNKI. Now I know the question came up: What does that have to do with a siren for here?" LaMont said the goal is to work with the mountain top instead of Idyllwild doing its own thing. WNKI-AM 1610 is the emergency radio station for all the mountain communities managed by the Mile High Radio Club.

"County will receive the deal and cost breakdown," added LaMont. "There's \$200,000 worth of equipment and materials that we need to stand up WNKI across

the mountain plateau. That's about the cost that it would take to expand that ... and there are some question marks with how they would land those services and do the improvements in order to utilize the system as we laid it out.

"There are some ideal locations for all of these transmitters to be put into service. Most of them are county-owned properties. There are a couple better locations that are privately owned. The county would have to go into agreements on them to manage those," LaMont said that he does not have the cost for the properties because it is unknown at this time.

How much will the sirens alone cost? Mikels wrote it is "hard to be exact, but I can give you some rough estimates to start with. Several factors can cause that to vary such as how it is decided to activate the siren, additional features, and if we are able to roof-mount the primary siren."

The two estimates are \$32,000 for a basic one-siren system and \$76,000 for a deluxe two-siren system. Mikels thinks the price would "fall between them." LaMont said that he has been working with American Signal Corporation to figure out how to best utilize the siren(s) in locations to reach the densest populations.

Commission Secretary Ralph Hoetger asked, "The reach of the siren is all theoretical at this point?" LaMont replied, "No, the reach of the siren is actually based on topographic challenges."

Hoetger stated that it is theoretical because it hasn't been stood up and tested. LaMont responded that it has on their modeling system, but that the district has not actually tried it.

"So, we do not know how far it reaches yet and if one siren will be adequate," Hoetger said.

Riverside County Emergency Management Depart-

ment (EMD) Senior Public Information Specialist Shane Reichardt told the newspaper "EMD is rewriting existing Homeland Security grants to include the siren project. The money would come from funds left over from other projects. Once that is completed, the project will still need to have engineering reviews and environmental studies before any work could begin. We are actively working on this project but there is no current timeline."

Reichardt told the newspaper that Brian Tisdale is still the leader for EMD on the project. "We want to address this as big picture and it will take a little longer to do it properly and incorporate any concerns and choose the best system available."

"We [public agencies] are doing what we can to keep the community safe and get this accomplished as quickly as possible," concluded Reichardt in a phone call.

In addition to his public service, Stone owns his local business, Innovative Compounding Pharmacy. Stone is a graduate of USC, where he earned a doctorate of pharmacy.

Public Safety Power Shut-offs impact Mountain Center

At the direction of the California Public Utilities Commission, Southern California Edison (SCE) conducted a Public Safety Power Shut-off (PSPS) event last week in Mountain Center, causing residents to be without power for multiple days.

According to SCE's website — when there are potentially dangerous weather conditions in fire-prone areas — they may call a PSPS event. They will proactively turn off power in high fire risk areas to reduce the threat of wildfires. While some residents understand the need for this preventative measure, it doesn't mean it doesn't come with some inconvenience.

The Town Crier spoke with a few Mountain Center residents about whether they feel PSPS events are a hindrance or a good safety practice.

Southern California Edison notifies potential affected residents 48 hours before a possible Public Safety Power Shut-off event will take place, but also advises that erratic or sudden onset of conditions may impact their ability to provide advanced notice to customers.

“Nope it isn't worth it,” said Sarah Grace. “I have lived here since 1985 and there's been high winds. Power was never cut for wind. I lost all my refrigerated food within hours of the first outage.”

“It was very stressful and definitely a hindrance,” said Claudia Posey. “Over 80% of the property surrounding us has already been burnt, so we didn't feel it was worthy of the outage.”

While Katie White understands the reasons behind the PSPS events, she also explained her frustrations. “It sucks because I totally understand for safety, but not being prepared enough like having a generator or wood stove makes it difficult. When it was out for three days, I lost my food and had no heat. It happened with no warning. What does this mean for winter?”

In addition to the power shut off, many residents lost their access to water. Posey told the Town Crier, “Because we are on a well, when the power was out, so was our water. This left a family of five with no water, no power, no way to cook (other than stovetop) and no heat. Most of those days we boiled bottled water in a teapot and washed from a bowl.”

SCE notifies potentially affected residents 48 hours before a possible PSPS event will take place, but also advises that erratic or sudden onset of conditions may impact their ability to provide advanced notice to customers. With this, preparation is key considering this seems to be the new normal throughout California.

To prepare for future outages Grace said, “I am going to be purchasing a generator in the near future.”

You can create an outage kit to help ease the frustration during PSPS events. Some items should include a first aid kit, bottled water, flashlights, non-perishable food, a manual can opener, coolers or ice chests, a battery-operated radio, new batteries, an external rechargeable battery pack and a non-cordless phone to plug in during power outages. How to keep your child safe from a dangerous online trend

One of the most exciting aspects of social media for teens is the opportunity to meet and talk to people they don't know. If you are thinking that this flies in the face of one of the basic safety rules you taught your child when they were little — don't talk to strangers — you'd be right. Your teen knows talking to a strange adult face-to-face is dangerous and would never do it, but something about talking to a strange adult on a screen seems inconsequential.

We talk to tens of thousands of teens every year, and without exception, they tell us talking to a stranger is dangerous but they do it online all the time. When we ask them to explain the obvious discrepancy between what they know is safe and what they are doing, they say real-life choices “feel” different than online decisions. This mindset makes perfect sense in light of what we see every day online. Every child that I have talked to about sending a mean or hurtful online message always says they would have done it differently if they were face-to-face with the recipient. This is true for adults too. Thoughtless Twitter posts have ended careers and relationships.

We talk to tens of thousands of teens every year, and without exception, they tell us talking to a stranger is dangerous but they do it online all the time. When we ask them to explain the obvious discrepancy between what they know is safe and what they are doing, they say real-life choices “feel” different than online decisions.

Ome TV is a new popular iteration of many online platforms that pair strangers together online and often do that through their web cameras. Ome TV is an alternative to Omegle. Omegle is one of the most popular types of apps that connects strangers and has been on the scene for a while. Its popularity is mainly due to YouTubers who have become famous by creating Omegle prank videos on YouTube. If you search for “Omegle pranks” on YouTube, you can watch hundreds of these videos and begin to understand why a teen would be drawn to seek out a similar “fun” experience on Omegle's website or on the Ome TV app. However, what they find are nude men in front of their web cameras waiting to expose themselves to anyone who randomly gets connected to them. Unfortunately, you can't unsee that. The less obvious predators will want to talk to a teen and find out more about them, maybe follow their Instagram or SnapChat account so they can stalk them online.

This app or any app that allows a child to talk to strangers is not safe.

How to keep your child safe

Password protected app store

Omegle is a website. Their app was removed from the app store. If you want to block your child from going to Omegle on their devices, you will need to make sure the web address, Omegle.com, is blocked. There are scores of other apps like Ome TV that are “Omegle alternatives.” A password protected app store will stop your child from downloading Ome TV and other dangerous apps onto their devices.

Talk to your child and filter your internet

Talk to your child about these apps and why they are dangerous. These apps sometimes come up at sleepovers or when teens are together at a friend's house. When your child goes to another house, do those parents filter their internet? They should. Share this with them.

You can filter the internet coming into your home with OpenDNS.com (free service), your internet provider's parental controls (paid service), or your router (free and paid).

Turn on parental controls

You should also turn on parental controls on all of your child's devices. Our book, “Parenting in the Digital World,” will walk you step-by-step through this process.

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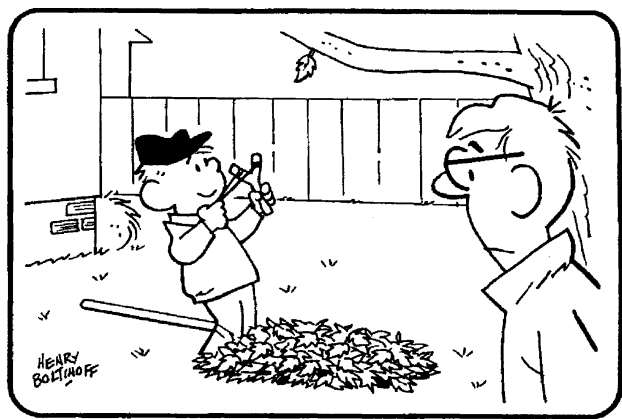
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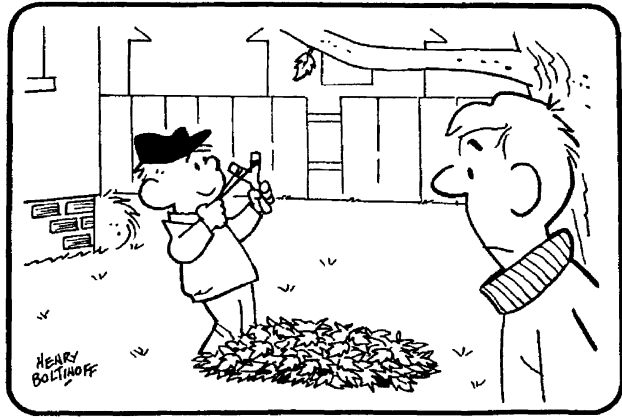
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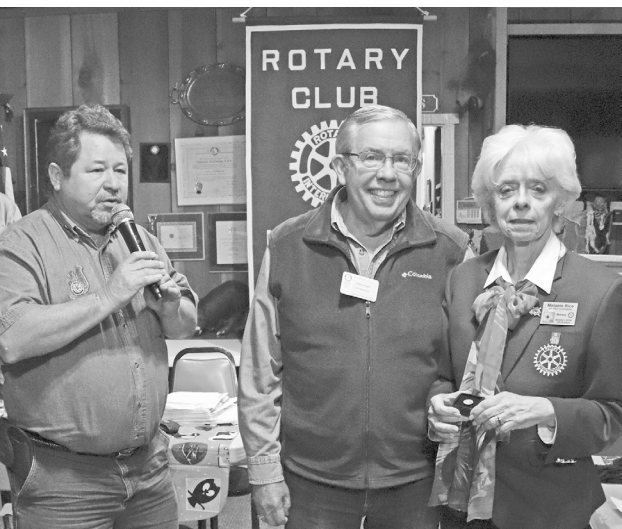

Quality of life improvement saturation patrol

On Oct. 30, personnel from the Riverside County Sheriff’s Department, California Highway Patrol, Hemet Police Department, Gang Task Force, Murrieta Police Department, United States Forestry Service, Animal Control, Riverside County Probation Department, Riverside County Cal-ID, Hemet Tactical Emergency Medical Services and American Medical Response conducted a high-impact zero-tolerance saturation patrol throughout the unincorporated mountain communities of Anza, Idyllwild, Pine Cove and Mountain Center at the direction of Sheriff Chad Bianco.

The focus of the operation was to apprehend any and all subjects found to be in violation of any crime. The goal of the operation is that the arrest of these offenders improve the overall quality of life for the citizens of the mountain community.

Twenty-six subjects were arrested for 42 criminal violations including 13 felonies. Over six pounds of processed marijuana, approximately 1,500 pounds of marijuana plants, 26 grams of heroin, five firearms (four handguns and one shotgun), three stolen vehicles and over \$10,000 in currency were seized during this operation. Hemet High student stabbed off campus after school

On Oct. 30, at approximately 3:30 p.m., Riverside County Sheriff’s deputies responded to Hemet High School (HHS) in reference to a report of a student who had been stabbed. Deputies arrived within minutes and determined the incident occurred off campus near the intersection of Aurora Drive and Stetson Avenue. The investigation revealed two previously expelled HHS students engaged in a mutual fight. During the fight, the adult brother of one of the juveniles involved began fighting with a juvenile bystander. During

the altercation, the adult male chased the juvenile approximately 30 feet while holding a large knife, stabbing the juvenile in the upper torso before fleeing on foot westbound on Stetson Avenue.

A passerby, noticed the large gathering of juveniles, stopped to render aid to the injured juvenile and transported him to HHS. With the cooperation of HHS administration, along with anonymous students, a positive identification of the suspect was obtained.

The suspect was identified as Hemet resident Angel Medrano. Evidence obtained is sufficient to charge Medra-

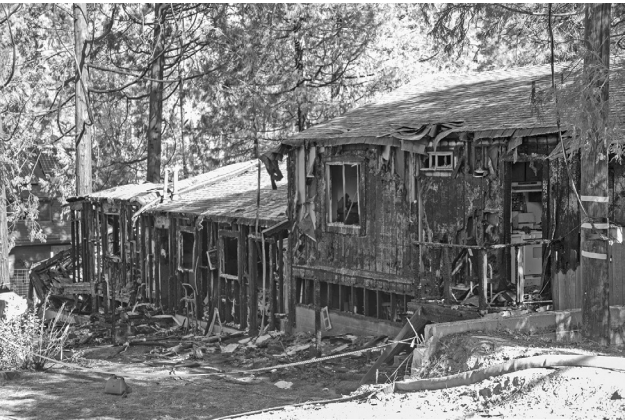

no with attempted murder of the juvenile. The juvenile was transported to Riverside University Health System Medical Center with non-life-threatening injuries.

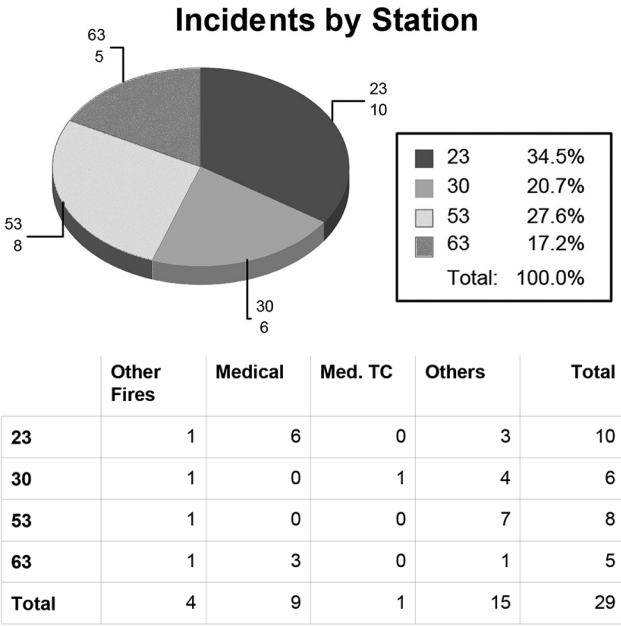


After-school care at Town Hall

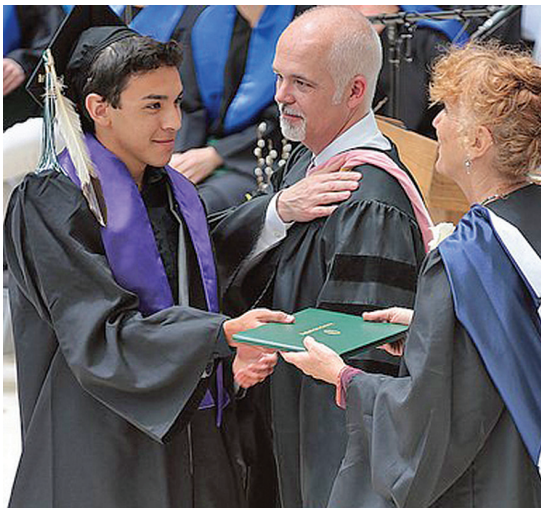

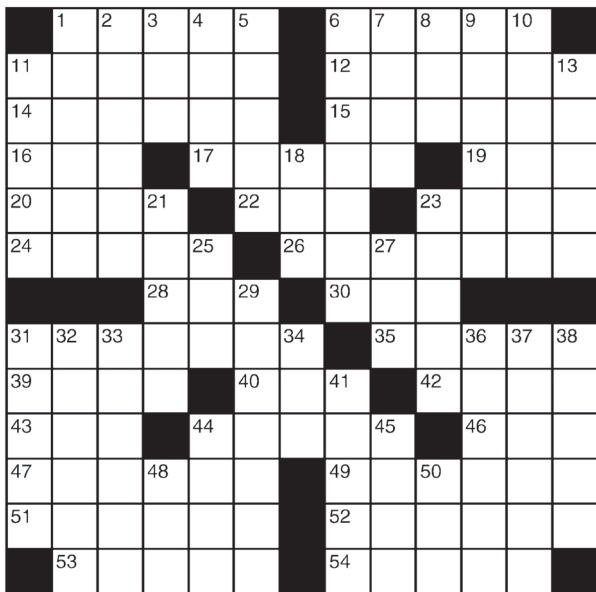

freedom to be themselves and not just follow pop-culture norms learned from the media."

The Cahuilla mother is Terria Smith, editor of the print magazine News from Native California (newsfromnativocalifornia.com). She adds, "At Idyllwild you don't see the cliques that you see in public high schools and Idyllwild students are so much more self-assured and comfortable with themselves than students in public high schools are."

Because the self-confidence encouraged by the Idyllwild Arts community enables students to focus on education, an academy graduate like Greg Ballenger (class of 2014), of the Diné (Navajo) Nation, has been able to shine at the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe and in an internship with Walt Disney Imagineering, a group exhibit in England and additional studies in Italy.

Besides visual arts, which Ballenger studied, the Idyllwild Arts faculty of working professional artists teaches students in the disciplines of music, theatre, dance, fashion design, film and digital media, creative writing, and interdisciplinary arts.

Although the summer program is arts-only, Idyllwild Arts Academy, also teaches a challenging academic curriculum, making it a true college-preparatory school.

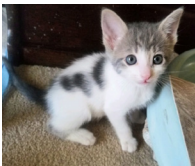
