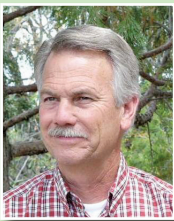

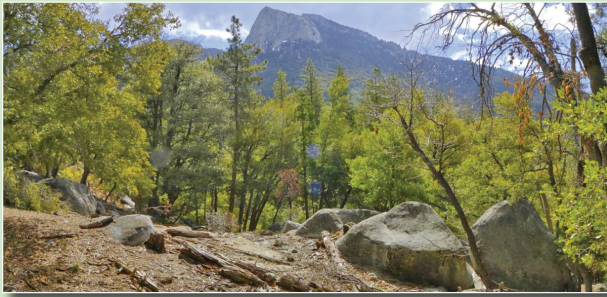

## Bald eagle population stabilized, IWD appoints acting general manager

When former General Manager Darren Milner resigned the evening of Nov. 17, Idyllwild Water District (IWD) was without an acting general manager until a special meeting the evening before Thanksgiving held by the district's directors. The board appointed Field Supervisor Mitch Freeman to fill the position until the district selects yet another general manager.

"He [Freeman] was appointed by the board in open session following the special closed session meeting last Wednesday evening," wrote Board President Dr. Charles Schelly. "His salary was increased \$1,000 a month and he will be considered for the permanent

# Mass casualty training at Idyllwild School

Imagine a bad scene out of a movie. Someone has gone on a mass stabbing at a school. Kids are injured, chaos ensues and lives are on the line. Someone calls 911. Every emergency department nearby responds.

In a matter of minutes, a number of first responders arrive at the school, take control of the threat and treat the wounded all at the same time. It takes many hours, manpower and training to conduct an operation like that successfully.

Law enforcement, medical and fire personnel came together at Idyllwild School Tuesday, Nov. 26, in order to understand the various forms of training provided within each field of public safety.

“There is nothing worse than this type of incident,” said Riverside County Sheriff’s Deputy Chris Waters. “These types of incidents are extremely difficult and have a lot of moving parts.” Waters is a Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Master Instructor and an expert in active shooter preparedness, as well as rescue task force protocols.

In the current climate, first responders are facing some of the toughest situations possible when it comes to large-scale events. Coming together to train is one of the most important things agencies can do to prepare for the worst.

Riverside County Sheriff’s Station conducted the mass casualty drill Nov. 26 at Idyllwild School. Those in attendance included deputies from the Thermal Sheriff’s Station,

Sheriff’s Enforcement Bureau (SEB), California Highway Patrol, Hemet Police Department, Cal Fire, American Medical Response and Idyllwild Fire Protection District. Sheriff’s Explorer Post 378 participated by posing as the victims in the training.

During these exercises, law enforcement swept the area looking for the threat before medics entered. Law enforcement then teamed up with medics and moved in to help victims, keeping medics safe while the victims were treated. Triage was set up and the wounded were extracted and treated before being transported, if necessary.

“This training is extremely vital to keep our entire community safe,” Waters told the Town Crier. “The training went extremely well and all of our partners understand the seriousness of what we are training for. First responders are parents too. This training needs to happen at least twice a year in order to keep the partnership coordination as smooth as possible.”

Cal Fire Battalion Chief Jesse Park and SEB Corporal Shawn Hubachek taught portions of the training and exercises as well.

Each department has its responsibilities and working together is key for success. The bottom line is the same, to be of service to those in need.

# Top tips for avoiding scams at the holidays

Now that the holiday shopping season is in full swing, scammers are shopping too, looking for people to separate from their money. Here are some tips to help you outsmart those bah-humbug scammers and spend safely.

**Online shopping? Pay by credit card.** Credit cards give you extra protection for most online purchases and many cards offer benefits, like protection for returns and purchases. If unauthorized charges pop up on your statement, you'll be able to dispute those charges.

Credit card protections can vary, so check with your issuer to understand all of your card's protections.

**Buy gift cards for gifts, not for payments.** Gift cards are a great answer for the teenager in your life. However, they're also a scammer's favorite way to steal your money. Anyone who contacts you and demands that you pay them with a gift card, for any reason, is always a scammer. Report gift card scams directly with the card issuer (<https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/paying-scammers-gift-cards>), then report it to the FTC at [ftc.gov/complaint](https://www.ftc.gov/complaint). Learn even more at [ftc.gov/giftcards](https://www.ftc.gov/giftcards).

**Research charities before you donate.** With the generous spirit of the holidays, and with year-end fundraising, 'tis the season for donations. Make sure your donation goes where you want it to, not into the hands of a scammer. If someone calls asking you to give to a charity, don't let them rush you into making a donation. Instead, research the charity to make sure your donation counts. Visit [ftc.gov/charity](https://www.ftc.gov/charity) to learn more.

**What you should know**  
In September of 2017, Equifax announced a data breach that exposed the personal information of 147 million people. Under a settlement filed today, Equifax agreed to spend up to \$425 million to help people affected by the data breach. If you were affected by the Equifax breach, you can't file a claim just yet. That's coming. But you can sign up for FTC email alerts about the settlement at [ftc.gov/Equifax](https://www.ftc.gov/Equifax). Not sure that you were affected? The breach claims site will have a tool to let you check. Sign up for an FTC email update to find out when that tool is up and running.

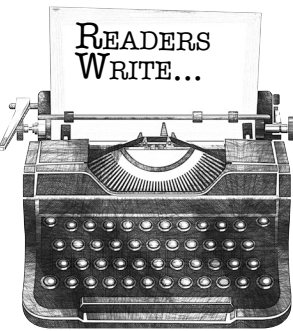

### Document destruction

The Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) appreciates that the Idyllwild Town Crier continues to cover events and happenings in the communities of our mountain. It also appreciates that this newspaper is a diligent watch-



dog that works to protect the rights and financial interests of its locals. With that in mind, the PCWD takes exception to an article in last week's issue headlined "PCWD destroys documents without board knowledge."

The article incorrectly claims the PCWD illegally disposed of water district documents, referencing Government Code § 60200. (The government code referenced by the Town Crier deals with "duplicate records.") After clarifying this issue with

our attorney, we can confidently stand behind this action. According to our attorney, the board does not need to approve destruction of district documents so long as staff carries out the destruction consistent with the district's resolution on records retention. This board, at the time of the destruction of the documents, had (and still has) such a resolution in place.

The PCWD employees destroyed originals, pursuant to the district's resolution on records retention. Therefore, this code section is not applicable to this situation. Additionally, the board was indeed aware of the staff's actions.

The PCWD continually strives to be aboveboard and the PCWD Board of Directors stand behind the staff and general manager and would appreciate a correction by the Town Crier of this inaccurate report as we take great pride in our record of transparency and accuracy.

**Steps for earthquake safety**  
The Earthquake Country Alliance has prepared seven steps for people to take before, during and after an earthquake.  
Before:  
Step 1: Secure your space by identifying hazards and securing movable items.

Step 6: Improve safety after earthquakes by evacuating if necessary, helping the injured and preventing further injuries or damage.

Step 7: Restore daily life by reconnecting with others, repairing damage and rebuilding community.

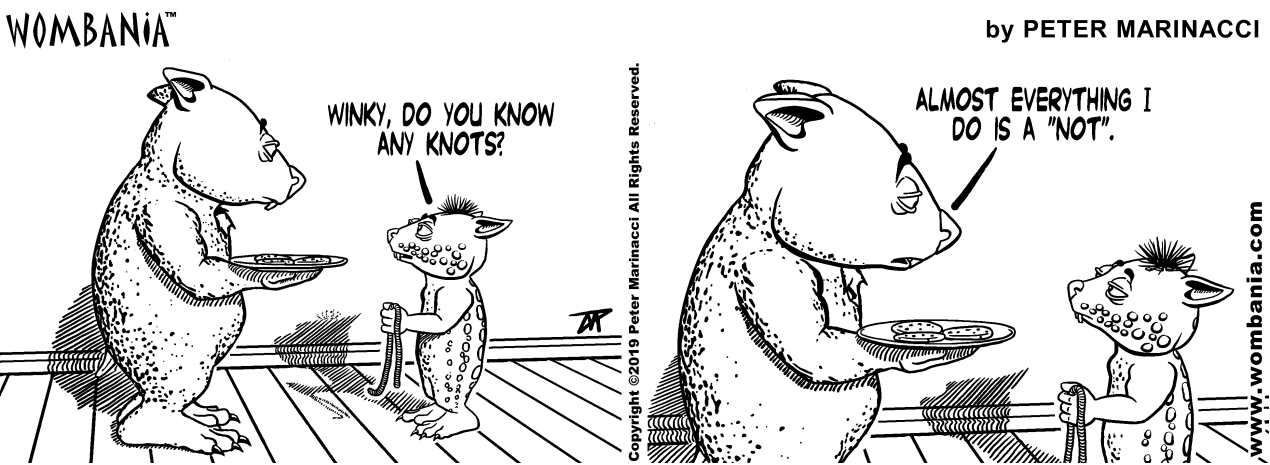
# Mail carriers start their deliveries before the crack of dawn

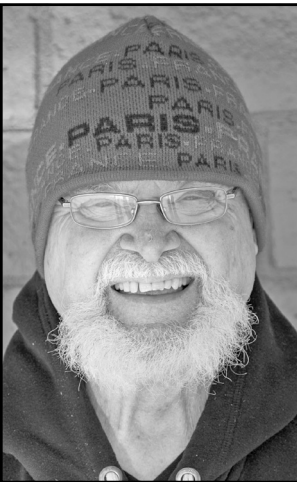

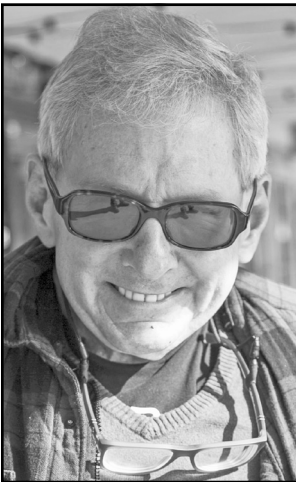

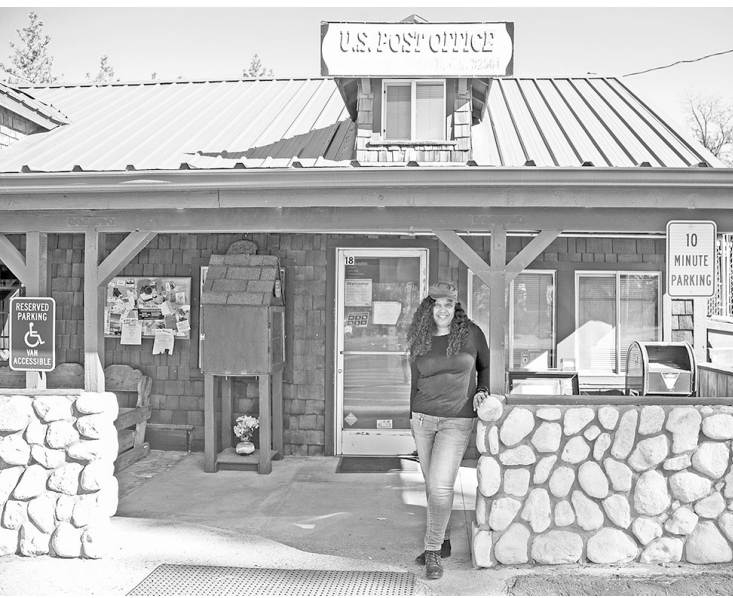

# Holiday safety is important for you and the U.S. Postal Service

## Prevent slips, trips, and fall for the holidays

Safety should be a year-round concern, but with all the hustle and bustle to get ready for the holidays, it's possible that safety isn't the first thing that comes to mind for most of us. For the U.S. Postal Service, safety is always a top priority. We have some tips that can not only help keep our carriers safe as they deliver your holiday gifts, but you and your family as well.

### Around the house

Toys, bicycles, small pieces of yard

equipment, yard trimmings, the garden hose, or other items on the lawn, walkway or steps can cause a tripping hazard or serious injury. While you might be able to avoid tripping, mail carriers may have their hands full of packages and could miss seeing these items. Take a moment to make sure your yard and walkways are clear of any obstacles to make it safer for everyone.

### Furry friends

With kids home from school for winter break sometimes the doors are left open and the family dog is running loose. Dogs are wonderful companions who bring joy and happiness to their families. But unfortunately, sometimes things happen, and the usually happy pup could end up biting

someone.

Nearly 6,000 postal employees and a staggering 4.5 million Americans were attacked by dogs last year. Many attacks could potentially be avoided if dog owners would take a few extra moments of precaution.

- If a carrier delivers mail or packages to your front door, place your dog in a separate room and close the door before opening the front door. Some dogs burst through screen doors or plate-glass windows to attack visitors. Dog owners should keep the family pet secured.

- Parents should remind children and other family members not to take mail directly from carriers in the presence of the family pet, as the dog may view the per-

son handing mail to a family member as a threatening gesture.

- The U.S. Postal Service places the safety of its employees as a top priority. If a carrier feels threatened by a dog, or if a dog is loose or unleashed, the owner may be asked to pick up mail at a post office until the carrier is assured the pet has been restrained. If a dog is roaming the neighborhood, the pet's owner's neighbors also may be asked to pick up their mail at the area's post office.

during the winter at three sites, in recent years with the aid of the public, officials with SBNF are discontinuing the annual census effort,” the agency wrote in a press release issued last week. The yearly count has shown that the species’ population has stabilized since the bald eagle was delisted under the Endangered Species Act in 2007. The highest count in one year reaching 12 to 15.

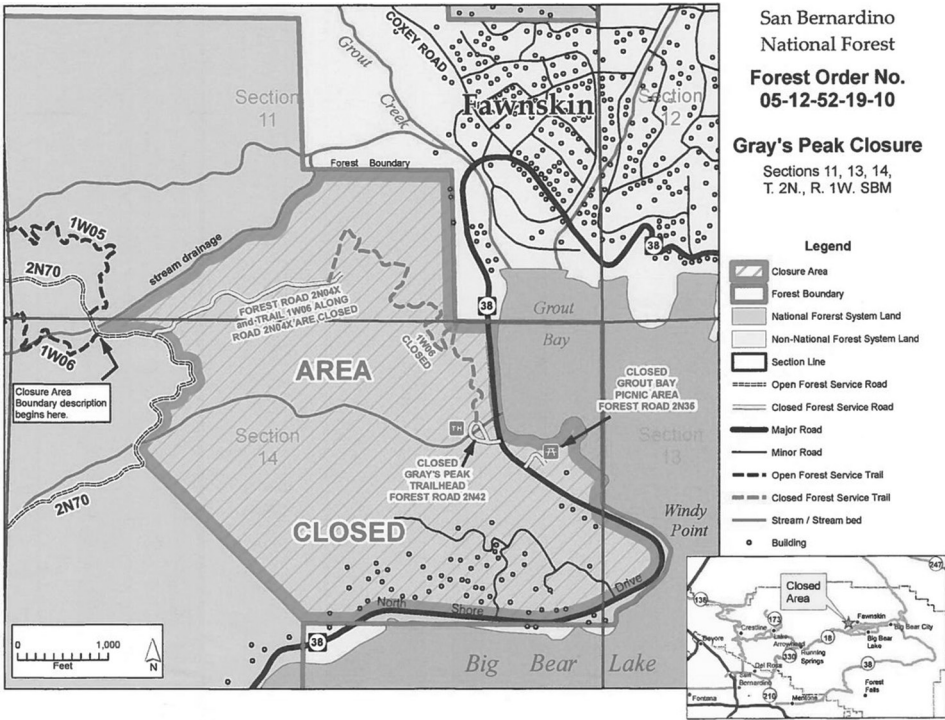

position, if he is interested. He was given authority to start acting in the general manager capacity immediately following the board vote on Wednesday evening, Nov. 27.”

Freeman was hired by IWD Oct. 16 with the approval of his contract during the board’s regular meeting. He was hired the same meeting as Milner. Freeman started work for the district Nov. 1. Milner began Oct. 21.

Milner served as general manager for a month. Milner was building morale within the district, setting goals for staff.

The votes to hire Milner and Freeman were unanimous with present board members. Director Peter Szabadi was absent from the meeting.

Milner was hired as the district’s general manager after his predecessor, Michael Creighton, was fired by the board in a Sept. 25 special meeting. Director Les Gin was absent for the meeting and Szabadi abstained from voting responding to the newspaper in an email as to why he abstained, “I would have preferred a longer transition period for new management personnel to take over the management of our district.”

Government agencies will rarely, if ever, call you. If they do, it will be after they send you a letter — or to return a call you made to them. But anytime the “government” caller demands information (or payment by wire transfer or gift card), that’s a scam.

Don’t trust caller ID. Scammers use technology to hide their real number, but show one that seems legit. So if the caller ID shows a 202 area code, or says “government” or “Washington, DC,” don’t take that at face value. It could be anyone calling from anywhere.

Never give anyone who calls or approaches you out of the blue information like your Medicare, bank account, credit card or Social Security number. Scammers can use your information, steal your identity, get credit in your name and take your money.

Report government imposters and other scams to the Federal Trade Commission.

# Storm dumps first snow on the Hill

The first snowstorm of the season Thanksgiving weekend caused only minor problems for Hill residents and left mountain peaks, trees and rooftops covered with snow.

A total of 10 inches of snow was recorded at the Pine Cove County Fire Station during the weekend. About 3 inches of snow was recorded in Pine Cove Thanksgiving Day. An additional 2 inches was measured Friday, Nov. 27, and 2 1/2 inches were measured Saturday, Nov. 28, and Sunday, Nov. 29, according to Dick Coyle, PCCFD captain.

At the Idyllwild Fire Station, traces of snow, mixed with rain, began falling Thanksgiving Day, but it was not until Saturday, Nov. 28, that measurable snow was recorded, according to Fire Chief Bud Hunt. Then, 1 1/2 inches of snow was measured. Throughout the weekend 1.64 inches of precipitation was recorded.

Because temperatures dropped into the 20s at night, mountain roads were icy. This caused several minor accidents on the Hill.

Power was cut to Pine Cove residents for about six hours and then again Saturday morning for a couple of hours because of the storm, according to A.E. Sandell, an official with Southern California Edison.

Power went out at about 5:30 Friday night from the Singingwood Motel at Alandale for almost six hours. Then again the power was out for about two hours Saturday beginning at 7 a.m.

The storms dumped about 8 inches of snow at Long Valley near the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway at the 8,400-foot level.

A foot of snow was recorded at Round Valley at the 9,100-foot level and 2 1/2 feet of snow was recorded at the 10,804 foot San Jacinto Peak, according to State Park officials.

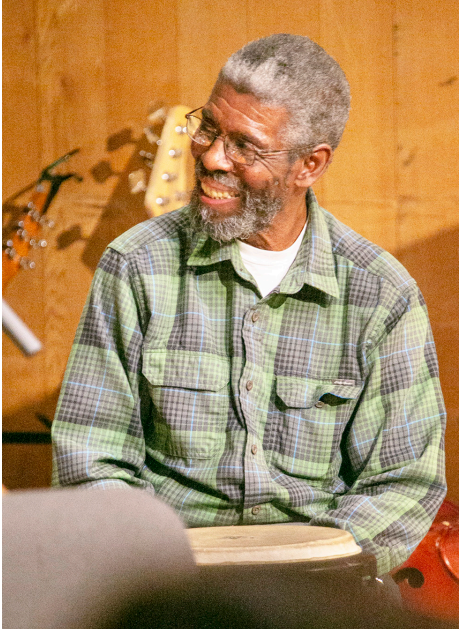
**5 years ago - 2014**

**Heavenly Whiskers:** Two kittens adopted together would be great. They would keep each other company and play with each other, giving the humans a break!

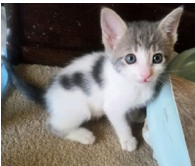
**Agatha:** That really would be nice. I'd like to stay with one of my siblings, but I'd be happy to be the only fur child!
