Pile burning at Vista Grande station

San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) personnel began pile burning Monday, Dec. 30 at the Vista Grande station north of Idyllwild. Smoke and flames may have been visible to those on the mountain and in the San Jacinto Valley. The burning will continue through Tuesday, Dec. 31.

One pile was burned initially to see if the burn would be safe and productive. The agency was uncertain if the fuel moisture was too high.

The test went well and the burning commenced. The burning will clear 12 acres of brush around the facility, according to SBNF Public Affairs Officer Zach Behrens.

"This is the first prescribed burn in the San Jacinto Ranger District this season," Behrens told the newspaper. "There will be more prescribed burns to come in Pine Cove, at Thomas Mountain and all Forest Service fire stations."

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Christmas Eve quake jolts Hill



A shallow earthquake, 9 miles deep, occurred at 5:24 p.m. Dec. 24 about 4 miles east of Idyllwild. The quake originally measured a magnitude 3.2, but was downgraded to a magnitude 2.9.


The jolt was felt as far away as the Rancho Cucamonga and Lawndale, according to the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS).

On social media, some people reported feeling a jolt or hearing a rumbling while others didn't feel or hear a thing. No damages or injuries were reported.

While there are multiple variables, damage does not usually occur until the earthquake reaches above magnitude 4 or 5, according to the USGS.

The hidden tunnel in the San Jacinto Mountains

Back in the mid-1990s, Huell Howser made his way into the San Jacinto wilderness to explore the wonders that many didn't know existed. The American television personality who hosted "California's Gold," a human interest show produced by KCET in Los Angeles for California PBS stations, adventured through the Sunshine State to shed light on the amazing sites it has to offer.

Howser took a trip on Jan. 8, 1997 through a 13-mile tunnel through the San Jacinto Mountains excavated by the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) during the 1930s as part of the 242-mile Colorado River Aqueduct, which brings water to Southern California.

"There was excitement in the air as we set out to explore this wonderful, seldom seen part of Mt. San Jacinto," said Howser during filming.

Howser and MWD spent three hours traveling and exploring the 13-mile tunnel, sharing a rare glimpse into a world less than 500 people have ever seen since its creation.

That portion, the 13-mile tunnel, took about six years to complete as they dug through solid rock on the northern edge of the San Jacinto Mountains.

The tunnel, a huge and extremely complicated engineering project, still ranks as one of the most difficult ever attempted. The 16-foot tall tunnel usually has 1.2 billion gallons of water a day flowing through it, but once every five to six years, the water is shut off for a day or so to allow for inspections.

Howser took advantage of this opportunity to explore the tunnel and also make some unusual discoveries once inside.

"Oh wow, look at this," Howser exclaimed. "This is wonderful. We loaded up on a little tractor-pulled wagon that turned out to be a three-hour adventure full of surprises."

There are small clams that live in the Colorado River and make their way to the San Jacinto Mountains through the aqueduct, all 242 miles of it. According to the U.S. Geological Survey, the *Corbicula fluminea*, also known as the Asian Clam, are the species that live in those waters.

Howser got to see dozens of these tiny creatures for himself as he traveled through the tunnel commenting, "You got clams in here? This little clam has come all the way from the Colorado River. There's a lot of little clams in here. Look at that!"

Natural groundwater from Mt. San Jacinto also worked its way into the tunnel, shooting horizontal flows through the tunnel walls strong enough to knock you down at approximately 180 pounds per square inch, according to Jay Malinowski, who was the chief of operations for the MWD at that time.

"So look at this thing," said Howser. "It's just shooting across the tunnel. Oh my gosh! This water is what the fellas that made this tunnel were coming up against all the time ... And the next time we turn on our water, we'll have a little bit more of an appreciation of where it comes from."

Howser passed away Jan. 7, 2013 reportedly of cancer at the age of 64 at his home in Palm Springs. He worked until 2012 when he retired. Howser visited Idyllwild many times throughout his career.

Board meeting at FVWD

Employees of the Fern Valley Water District (FVWD) received the \$250 employee annual bonus at the start of the Dec. 13 board meeting. Some board members also got to meet staff members they had not previously met, finally putting faces to names.

The district has a total of five employees. Two, General Manager Victor Jimenez and Office Manager Jessica Priefer, work in the office and three employees — Cameron Clark, Tony White and Jim Nutter — work in the field.

Pipeline replacement project

The pipeline replacement project, as of Dec. 11, had 3,300 feet or 84% of the 3,910-foot pipeline replaced. As of Dec. 30, there is just under 150 feet of the pipeline to replace before the replacement portion of the project is complete. The connection of the mainline to each property still needs to be installed as well as the four tie-ins to the existing sys-

tem, according to Jimenez. "The project is on schedule," said Jimenez. "Now it will be dependent on the weather and hopefully the weather holds out. If we get a ton of snow, then it will delay things."

Building communication

One of the items reported during Jimenez's general manager's report was that he had a very productive meeting with Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) Chief Mark LaMont. Jimenez wanted to meet with LaMont to discuss how to work better together to improve the operations of both districts.

"The discussion included past deficiencies and solutions for the future as well as establishing better communications and education with visiting district personnel in the event of emergencies in the future and the importance of proper hydrant operation with high pressure systems," Jimenez wrote in his report.

FVWD expressed some frustration at a prior meeting at the lack of communication with all fire districts in the past, specifically during the

Cranston Fire. There was no communication between fire personnel and the water districts until after the Cranston Fire, according to Jimenez. IFPD is just the first district he has been able to meet with.

TOC monitor purchase

The board approved the purchase of a Hach Company total organic carbon (TOC) monitor that will cost the district approximately \$35,662 plus tax and delivery. The district budgeted \$40,000 for the purchase. According to Jimenez, the purchase will not exceed the budgeted amount.

Back in May, according to the staff report, the board voted to approve the appropriation of funds for a real-time TOC monitor for the surface water.

The district also received a bid from Shimadzu but decided to go with Hach because it had "local technical support and are offering a better service package, better pricing and proven customer service." Also, the Hach monitor is a little over \$4,000 cheaper than the Shimadzu model.

 - Step 4: Minimize financial hardship by organizing important documents, strengthening your property and considering insurance.
 - During:**
 - Step 5: Drop, cover and hold on when the earth shakes.
 - Step 6: Improve safety after earthquakes by evacuating if necessary, helping the injured and preventing further injuries or damage.
 - After:**
 - Step 7: Restore daily life by reconnecting with others, repairing damage and rebuilding community.

Historical Society Museum is open after repairs

The Idyllwild Area Historical Society (IAHS) Museum is now open. It had to close for a period of time due to a tree branch that fell and went through the roof like a spear as a result of the Thanksgiving storms.

The museum will be open New Year's Eve day and New Year's Day from 10a.m.-5 p.m. before it returns to its regular Friday to Sunday 10 a.m.-5 p.m. schedule.

When docent Nancy Borchers walked in to open the building for visitors on Friday, Dec. 6, she found that the tree branch had speared the roof of the building.

"Due to the recent heavy snow and rain storms, a long top section of an adjacent pine tree broke off and speared the museum roof," IAHS Vice President Marlene Pierce wrote in an email to the Town Crier after the incident occurred.

Within a very short period of time, Manuel Guzman, who removed the branch from the roof, Richard Levitski, Larry Robinson, and Tom and Marlene

The operation began Friday, Dec. 27 and is expected to last 11 days.

Parenting your aging parents when they don't want help

David Solie's 89-year-old mother, Carol, was unyielding. "No, I will not move," she told her son every time he suggested that she leave her home and relocate to a senior living residence.

And it didn't stop there. Although Carol suffered from coronary artery disease, severe osteoporosis, spinal compression fractures and unsteady balance, she didn't want assistance. When Solie brought in aides to help after a bad fall and subsequent surgery, his mother fired them in a matter of days.

"In her mind, she considered it a disgrace to have anybody in her home," Solie said. "This was her domain for over 50 years, a place where she did everything by herself and in her own way."

Conflicts of this sort often threaten relationships between aging parents and their adult children just when understanding and support are needed the most. Instead of working together to solve problems, families find themselves feuding and driven by feelings of resentment and distress.

Solie got so worked up, he considered going to court and asking for a conservatorship — a legal arrangement that would have given him control over his mother's affairs. (The situation was complicated because Solie's brother, who has Down syndrome, lived at the family home.) But Solie's lawyer advised that this course of action would destroy his relationship with his mother.

Today, Solie, a health care consultant and writer with a well-regarded blog about aging (<https://www.davidsolie.com/blog/>), finds the same theme when he consults with adult children caring for parents. Make preserving trust and keeping your relationship intact — not winning arguments — a priority, he suggests. What your parents most need is confidence that you'll listen to them, take their concerns seriously and stay by their side no matter what happens, he says.

How adult children communicate with parents can go a long way toward easing tensions, Solie says. Instead of telling your parent what to do, ask how they'd prefer to solve problems. Elicit their priorities and recognize their values when making suggestions. Give them choices whenever possible. Be attuned to their unexpressed needs and fears.

When Dr. Lee Lindquist, chief of geriatrics at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine, asked 68 older adults in eight focus groups why they resisted help, the answers varied. They said they were afraid of losing their independence, becoming a burden on loved ones, being taken advantage of and relinquishing control over their lives.

Asked what might make a difference, the older adults said they liked the idea of "interdependence" — acknowledging that people need one another from childhood to older age. And they found it helpful to think that "by accepting help, they were in turn helping the person providing the help," according to Lindquist's study (onlinelibrary.wiley.com/doi/full/10.1111/jgs.15526), published last year in the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society.

Unfortunately, no amount of patience, compassion or forbearance will work in some conflict-ridden circumstances. But here's some of what experts have learned:

Be patient. Give your parents time to adjust

At first, Jane Wolf Frances' 87-year-old mother, Lillian Wolf, wouldn't consider moving with Jane's father from New York City to the Los Angeles area, where Frances, her only child, lived.

Although Lillian had Alzheimer's disease and Frances had planned to give her one-story house to her parents, "I deferred to my mother's fear that she was going to be losing something essential," she said.

During three years of caregiving, Frances had learned to not rush her parents. She knew they had slowed down and needed time to process change.

So Frances waited until her parent's home health aide called with concerns about their ability to live independently. After discussing the situation with their physician, Frances approached her mother again. A move to assisted living would be a fresh start, allowing the family to spend more time together, she said. After several conversations, her mother finally agreed.

Post impeachment inquiry thoughts

Idyllwild is an idyllic setting, surrounded by pine trees, looming mountain vistas and people who hold doors open for each other. Yet, it is prey to the divisiveness felt in this country.

Differences in opinion can be a catalyst for sparking thoughtful discussion. It generates new insight and understanding. However, if the disagreement is based on emotions, it evokes anger and conflict.

Our current president appeals to the deep instincts of people. His behavior evokes adoration or contempt.

"Divide and conquer" is Putin's master plan for world dominance and he hit the jackpot with the 2016 Presidential Election. In a democracy, citizens are separated by different political beliefs on how to achieve the good life.

Trump's presidency has resulted in on-line and in-person confrontations between Idyllwild supporters and resisters. I am a "Trumpologist," who watches his press conferences, reads excerpts from his rallies and even listened to the entire Mueller Report.

I hear the awful things he says about people and read the constant barrage of falsehoods and accusations he makes. His brutish ways deeply disturb me. I find it difficult to forgive those who ignore all the damage he has done.

I would be willing to listen and debate anyone who bases support for Trump on verifiable facts rather than the words that come out of his mouth. It would be helpful to hear how his leadership has made life better for all of us.

ies. Listen carefully to your parents' concerns and let them know you're trying to help them accomplish their goals, not impose your agenda.

"It's often helpful to say to your parents 'I'm doing this for you; I'd like you to do something for me,'" Frances said. "People who are good parents perk up on that one and will ask, 'OK, what can I do for you?' Then, you can tell them, 'You can let me help you more.'"

Let them know you're on their side

Denise Brown was convinced her parents, Roger and Sally Loeffler, were making a terrible decision. In the previous year, Roger, 84, had been diagnosed with bladder and prostate cancer and undergone extensive surgery. Sally, 81, had suffered three internal bleeds and had one-third of her stomach removed.

Brown didn't think they could live on their own anymore, and her parents had moved into a retirement community upon her recommendation. But then, at a family meeting, her mother stood up and said, "I'm not dying in this dump. I hate it here." As Brown and her siblings turned to their father, he said, "I'll do whatever your mom wants."

When her parents decided to move to an apartment, Brown was confrontational. "I raised my voice and said, 'This is not good, this is terrible,'" she said. "They were shocked, but they said 'It doesn't matter; this is what we're going to do.'"

As Brown thought about her reaction, she realized she thought her parents would be safer and have a more "gentle" death in the retirement community: "Then it occurred to me — this wasn't what my parents wanted. They valued their independence. It's their decision about how the end of life plays out."

Brown let her parents know she'd respect their wishes but would need to set limits. Her work — Brown is the founder of www.CareGiving.com — had to be a priority, and her parents would need to arrange other assistance if she couldn't be available. (Brown's two

brothers and sister help out.) And they'd have to be willing to talk openly about how their choices were affecting her.

What doesn't work: trying to communicate when any one of them is tired or angry. "We never get anywhere," Brown said. "Everybody gets defensive and shuts down."

What does work: "asking them questions like 'how do you think we should try to solve this problem?' It's interesting to hear their answers, and it makes working together so much easier."

Try to put angst to one side and help make this time meaningful for them and for you. Most of all, your parents want to feel emotionally connected and accepted, even in a diminished state.

Stop expecting your parents to be as they used to be.

After her father's death, Loi Eberle was distraught when her mother, Lucille Miller, became involved with a man she and her siblings didn't like. With his encouragement, Miller invested in real estate and lost a great deal of money.

But nothing Eberle or her siblings said could convince her mother that this relationship was destructive.

Eberle struggled with resentment and anger as her mother's needs escalated after a heart attack and a diagnosis of myasthenia gravis, a severe neurological disease. "Mom and I had this love/hate relationship all my life, and there was a huge need for healing in this relationship," she said.

In 2012, Eberle moved Miller, then 89, from her longtime home in Minneapolis to a nursing home in northern Idaho, near where Eberle lives. Gradually, she realized that her mother "had transitioned to being someone else" — someone who was vulnerable and at her life's end.

"I think for a long time I had this idea that I was going to help Mom come back to who she was, and I spent a lot of time trying to do that," Eberle said. "I finally had to forgive myself for failure and understand that this is the life process."

With this shift in perspective, emotional tension dissipated. "When I'd visit, my mother was always so happy to see me," Eberle said. Miller died in March 2017 at age 94.

Letting go of unrealistic expectations can defuse conflicts. This is the final stage of your journey with your parents. Try to put angst to one side and help make this time meaningful for them and for you. Most of all, your parents want to feel emotionally connected and accepted, even in a diminished state.



Equifax data breach settlement:

What you should know

In September of 2017, Equifax announced a data breach that exposed the personal information of 147 million people. Under a settlement filed today, Equifax agreed to spend up to \$425 million to help people affected by the data breach. If you were affected by the Equifax breach, you can't file a claim just yet. That's coming. But you can sign up for FTC email alerts about the settlement at ftc.gov/Equifax. Not sure that you were affected? The breach claims site will have a tool to let you check. Sign up for an FTC email update to find out when that tool is up and running.

Confidential teen crisis line

A California Youth Crisis Line is available toll-free 24/7 to assist youth, teens and their families in crisis or in a time of need.

Calls are confidential and trained staff can provide appropriate referrals to assist with issues such as family problems, relationship violence, runaway, homelessness, depression, teen pregnancy, substance abuse, suicide and more. The crisis line is 1-800-843-5200.

Master gardeners available

The Riverside County Cooperative Extension has master gardeners available to answer questions.

You can ask about how to save water in your landscape, what's damaging your plants, how to make and use compost in your own backyard, what's ailing your trees, or any gardening-related question. Calls are taken between 9 a.m. to noon Monday to Friday at 951-683-6491, ext. 231, and from 9 a.m. to noon and 1-4 p.m. at 760-342-2511.

Medicare does not give out DNA kits

The FTC is getting reports that callers claiming to be from Medicare are asking people for their Medicare numbers, Social Security numbers, and other personal information in exchange for DNA testing kits. The callers might say the test is a free way to get early diagnoses for diseases like cancer, or just that it's a free test, so why not take it? But the truth is, Medicare does not market DNA testing kits to the general public. This is yet another government imposter scam.

Website devoted to scams

The Federal Trade Commission has a website designed to get people talking about scams such as identity theft, imposter scams, charity fraud, health-care scams, paying too much, "you've won" scams and campaign materials.

Ruiz votes to lower tax burden on homeowners, teachers, first responders

Bill passed by House reinstates full SALT deduction

By THE OFFICE OF REP. RAUL RUIZ, M.D.

Rep. Raul Ruiz, M.D., CA-36, voted Dec. 19 to reinstate the full deduction on state and local taxes taken away by the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (P.L. 115-97). H.R. 5377, the Restoring Tax Fairness for States and Localities Act of 2019, would blunt the harm from one of the most damaging provisions of the 2017 tax bill to the state of California: the \$10,000 cap on the State and Local Tax (SALT) Deduction. The bill also increases the tax deduction for teachers and first responders for out-of-pocket expenses on school supplies and professional training.

“The Trump tax bill enriched millionaires, billionaires and large corporations at the expense of homeowners in our district,” said Ruiz. “I fought to reinstate the full state and local tax deduction to give middle-class homeowners

relief. This bill also gives a much-deserved tax break for teachers and first responders who sacrifice so much for the community. I am glad we fought for and won this victory for homeowners, teachers, first responders and families in our district. I urge the Senate to vote on this bill.”

Background
In 2017, 6.4 million Californians (35% of taxpayers) utilized the SALT deduction for an average amount of \$20,451. In the 36th congressional district, 33% of taxpayers took the SALT deduction for an average of \$10,884 in 2016.

H.R. 5377, as reported by the Committee on Ways and Means, addresses the \$10,000 cap on the itemized deduction for state and local taxes (SALT) placed into law from 2018-2025 by the Republican tax bill, the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (TCJA). H.R. 5377 contains the following provisions:

riage penalty in 2019: The SALT cap is set at \$10,000 for everyone, whether the household is composed of a single individual or two married taxpayers filing jointly. H.R. 5377 would eliminate the marriage penalty in 2019, allowing married couples filing jointly to deduct \$20,000 and married couples filing separately to each claim \$10,000.

2. Elimination of the \$10,000 Cap in 2020 and 2021: For the years 2020 and 2021, the H.R. 5377 suspends the \$10,000 SALT deduction cap altogether, making SALT fully deductible in those years.

3. Reinstate the top rate of 39.6%: H.R. 5377 would restore the top individual income tax rate from the current 37% to the pre-TCJA level of 39.6%, while also restoring the top income bracket at the pre-TCJA levels. In 2020, the top rate would begin at \$479,000 for married couples, \$452,400 for heads of household, and \$425,800 for single filers.

4. Above-The-Line Deduction for Teachers and First Responders: H.R. 5377 doubles the above-the-line deduction for educators' out-of-pocket classroom and professional development expenses: current law allows a \$250 deduction and the proposal lifts it to \$500 (and indexes it for inflation). Additionally, the bill adds a new above-the-line deduction for professional first responders, including law enforcement officers, firefighters, paramedics and emergency medical technicians of up to \$500 for unreimbursed expenses related to tuition and fees for professional development courses or expenses for uniforms.

Report traffic violators to CHP

The San Geronio Pass California Highway Patrol is starting a new traffic safety campaign that uses community members to assist in identifying unsafe roadways and drivers.

Report unsafe and/or illegal driving or problem roads by emailing SanGeronioPass@chp.ca.gov the date, time, location and vehicle license plate (or a passenger's or dash cam's photo).

Using the license plate, Capt. Mike Alvarez will contact the registered owner by mail, and issue the registered owner a courtesy warning letter.


You get to remain anonymous during the CHP's contact.

The warning letter is then kept on file at the San Geronio Pass CHP office for future reference.

If you are reporting a problem roadway with a high number of traffic safety concerns, CHP will log it and focus enforcement efforts there, using data to track the locations via hot-spot mapping so CHP can deploy resources in high-violation areas.

"This innovative campaign is designed to show our community we are listening, and even if we can't be in all places at once, we are still committed to public safety. Help us make our roadways safer," the Facebook post stated.

Review of Idyllwild Master Chorale’s ‘I Remember Christmas’

With the potential for a white Christmas (or at least a wet Christmas) on the horizon, and a cover of gray skies for the Hillfolk, the annual presentation of Idyllwild’s Master Chorale was proving to be unpromising for both attendance and programmatic reasons.

Artistic Director Dwight Holmes’ choices seemed at first glance uninspiring for his chosen theme — one would have expected to “remember” the upcoming holidays with a bit more of the familiar pieces — but with more of the unknown, and an eschewing of the usual “Messiah” excerpts (for one example), a pleasant vehicle for memory was performed for a grateful, if less than full, audience response.

The concert start proved inspirational enough, with the two soloists in the Vivaldi Concerto for two trumpets and strings (Richard Candelaria and James Sherry) giving forth themes of joy in all three short movements. The three sections from the Vivaldi “Gloria” were equally uplifting.

There followed four sections of three carols each, from the French, Spanish, English and contemporary Ameri-

can traditions, with the last two following older texts in newer musical formats and in the case of the last three selections, those generally familiar from previous holiday offerings, and including Holmes’ title piece.

In general, a solid performance from all forces was evinced and auditors’ reactions were more than evidence of an overall enjoyment.

A shortened set of jazz-inspired pieces for the Idyllwild perennial Sherry Williams — from the works of her devoted composer/arranger John Rodby — closed the program and provided (at least for this listener) a more than satisfactory conclusion.

Both “One Lone Candle” and Rodby’s medley of three traditional carols in modernized format were delivered with Williams’ usual melodic aplomb. The final “Some Children See Him” brought out ever more a plea for cultural unity in diversity. The response was significantly greater than for the larger choral works, but the general appeal was felt throughout.

The audience’s delight was ever apparent as it passed in procession through the brisk air to the year’s final weeks and with a wish for better times and accomplishments ahead.

The top eight-point finishers of the year go into playoffs in August, September and October to determine the club champion. A member has to compete in at least five reg-

ular-season tournaments in order to qualify for the playoffs. The maximum handicap index allowed in the playoffs is 24.4. The champion goes on to play in the Southern California Tournament of Club Champions in December.

Palms to Pines Golf Association plays a tournament off the Hill once a month at a different golf course. The games are usually played on the third Friday of the month but may be adjusted for holidays.

Tournament fees range from \$40 to \$60 and the fees include green fees, tournament entry fees, golf cart and range balls. Guests usually pay \$10 less since they don't compete in the tournament.

More holiday recipes

Pecan Sandies

(Originally from the 1962 *Better Homes and Gardens Cookbook with updates / suggestions by Deidre Vail*)

Ingredients

- 1 cup of butter, softened
- 1/3 cup of sugar
- 2 teaspoons of water
- 2 teaspoons of vanilla
- 2 cups of sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 cup of chopped pecans

Directions

Cream together butter and sugar; add water and vanilla; mix well.

Add flour, about 2/3 cup at a time, and mix well after each addition.

Mix in the chopped pecans.

Chill in covered container for three to four hours. The dough can be stored for a week or more at this stage.

I use a 1.25-inch cookie scoop for dough and roll each scoop into a ball. (Original recipe says you can place cookies 1.5-2 inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake at 325 F for about 22-25 minutes. They should be slightly golden brown around the bottom edge of the cookie where it touches the cookie sheet.

Cool on cookie sheet for a few minutes, then transfer to cooling racks.

Cool for about 15 minutes total, until they just slightly warm to the touch.

Roll in powdered sugar. (Note: If they are too warm, the sugar melts and gets gooey; too cold, and the sugar doesn't stick to them. You might need to play around with the timing for best results.)

Cool them completely before putting them in boxes or storage containers.

Note: Makes about 33 cookies. I usually double the recipe because I only have a hand help mixer, but with a stand mixer, you can probably triple or quadruple it to save time.

Ravioli Lasagna

Ingredients

- 2/3 pound of hamburger meat
- 2/5 pound of mild Italian sausage
- Olive oil
- 1 large onion diced
- 4-6 cloves of garlic, finely chopped
- Italian herbs, salt and pepper to taste
- 1 24-ounce jar spaghetti sauce
- 1 package (I think it is about 24 ounces) frozen cheese ravioli
- 1 8-ounce package shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 8-ounce package shredded six-cheese Italian blend
- 3/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese from deli section (not the dry type in a cylinder)

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 F.

Cook the two types of meat together until crumbly. Drain fat and set meat aside.

Sauté onion and garlic in olive oil until onion is cooked and translucent.

Add drained meat back into onion mixture and season to taste with Italian herbs, salt and pepper.

Spread a couple of tablespoons of spaghetti sauce into

a very thin layer on the bottom of a 9-by-13-inch pan. This will keep the ravioli from sticking to the pan.

Place half of the ravioli in a single layer on top of the thin layer of spaghetti sauce.

Spread half of the meat/onion mixture over the ravioli.

Spread half of the mozzarella and half of the six-cheese Italian blend over the meat mixture.

Spread half of the remaining spaghetti sauce over the cheese.

Repeat the ravioli, meat/onion, cheese and spaghetti sauce layers in the same order.

Cover tightly with foil. Hint: Make sure you carefully spread the last spaghetti sauce layer all over the top so

the foil won't stick to the cheese.

Bake at 350 F for about 45 minutes. Check that internal temperature is 195 F with a thermometer. The edges should be bubbling.

Remove foil and spread the Parmesan cheese over the top. Return to oven, uncovered, for about 10 minutes until the Parmesan cheese is melted. Makes 8-10 ample servings.

Note: There is a vegetarian version, which I have never tried. Substitute one box thawed chopped spinach for the two types of meat. Thaw spinach and squeeze out the water. Mix spinach with the onion/garlic and season to taste.

Follow the instructions above, substituting the spinach/onion mixture for the meat.

GOOD TIMES AHEAD


Editor's Note: This front page story was published on Jan. 11, 1947, the sixth edition of the Town Crier to ever be printed.

Social Security scam
Getting calls saying your Social Security number is suspended because of suspicious activity? It's a scam. The Social Security Administration (SSA) is not calling you, no matter what your caller ID says.

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Scammer 411

Government agencies will rarely, if ever, call you. If they do, it will be after they send you a letter — or to return a call you made to them. But anytime the “government” caller demands information (or payment by wire transfer or gift card), that’s a scam.

Don’t trust caller ID. Scammers use technology to hide their real number, but show one that seems legit. So if the caller ID shows a 202 area code, or says “government” or “Washington, DC,” don’t take that at face value. It could be anyone calling from anywhere.

Never give anyone who calls or approaches you out of the blue information like your Medicare, bank account, credit card or Social Security number. Scammers can use your information, steal your identity, get credit in your name and take your money.

Report government imposters and other scams to the Federal Trade Commission.



Free/reduced-price school lunches

Hemet Unified School District is distributing application forms to all households for free and reduced-price meals for enrolled children.

Applications are also available at the principal's office in each school.

To apply for free or reduced-price meal benefits, complete an application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted at any time during the school year.

The information households provide on the application will be used to determine meal eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or program officials.

Requirements for free and reduced-price benefits are as follows: For households receiving Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP, or FDPIR benefits, applications need only include the enrolled child(ren)'s name, Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP or FDPIR case number, and the signature of an adult household member.

For households who do not list a Food Stamp, CalWORKs, Kin-GAP or FDPIR case number, the application must include the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the signature and corresponding Social Security number of an adult household member.


Walk a dog for ARF
