Spotlight: Mountain Disaster Preparedness

Since 1986, Mountain Disaster Preparedness (MDP), a nonprofit, has been helping the community during natural disasters like floods or earthquakes. Its goal is to educate the public on how to prepare ahead of time for the worst-case scenario.

There are nine Disaster Aid Stations (DAS) throughout Idyllwild, Fern Valley and Pine Cove that are designed to help those in need when a disaster strikes. Inside these stations are medical supplies, and search and rescue equipment for the MDP volunteers, including 100 Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) trained volunteers to help those in need.

We can serve about 120 people with minor

injuries in each unit. In the event of an earthquake, flood or road closure, where we are up here by ourselves, that is the purpose of our DAS," said MDP President Mike Feyder. "We have a core medical group — about 12 retired doctors and nurses — that is also available for more advanced medical issues."

While there are plenty of supplies in each DAS to help, food and water are not available

at any of these stations. This is something that MDP encourages the public to stock up on at home. They are a place to get the most updated information and access to electricity even if the power has gone out.

"People are responsible to have supplies for themselves and their family in their own dwelling because outside help would be far and few between if we had a major earthquake," said Thom Wallace, MDP director of Disaster Aid Station and Operations.

There are maps in front of the Idyllwild Post Office on a bulletin board and in the Idyllwild Phone Book to help residents and visitors locate their nearest DAS.

The supplies are funded strictly by grants and donations.

Edison representative speaks at PCPOA meeting

Pine Cove Property Owners Association hosted Jeremy Goldman of Southern California Edison to speak at its Feb. 1 meeting. Goldman addressed Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS), Automatic Shutoff in dangerous circumstances, Systems Hardening and Vegetation Management.

Goldman was also very informative about the monitoring of wind and weather dangers through weather stations and cameras. These cameras can be accessed by the public at mesowest.utah.edu and www.alertwild-

Edison is using the "surgical" approach to PSPS as opposed to the blanket, whole area shutoff. Temperature, humidity and wind velocity are all factors to addressing PSPS.

Advanced notification for those critical care customers with special electricity needs will be sent for those who register for notifications. Oxygen and CPAP machines are only two of the items mentioned. Registration and information is available at sce.com/PSPS. There may be rebates for critical care cus-

tomers. The impacted general public will be notified approximately two days before a proposed PSPS via email, text or phone call.

During the meeting, Goldman was asked about underground wiring. He replied that it costs about 10 to 15 times more than above ground installations. In new developments, the cost is absorbed by the developer and the buyers. He noted that new developments are happening every day and hoped that the costs would go down in the future.

Construction and hardening of the power source from Hemet is planned with fire-resistant poles and crossarms, covered conductors and fast-acting fuses and advanced surge and lightning arresters.


Goldman deplored the lack of communication concerning Edison's inspection of the infrastructure in the mountain communities as Edison received many calls concerning the helicopter flights. The inspections were very successful in locating weak areas that needed attention and Goldman told the audience that a few more flights may be necessary.

Goldman also conferred with Captain Mark Spehar of Cal Fire Station 23 about further cooperation and coordination.

Flooding concerns create confusion

The residents of Lake Hemet Camp 2B (Bear Camp) were given eviction notices on Dec. 17, 2019. Residents have the option to relocate to Camp 1.

One of the main concerns brought up by residents at Camp 2B is that they are being asked to relocate or are being evicted from Camp 2B to Camp 1, which flooded on Feb. 14, 2019.

According to the residents, Base-Camp Hospitality (also Urban Park Concessionaires) was even refusing to take rent payments from some residents (even if they have selected another site in Camp 1) because they had not signed a new rental agreement for the Camp 1 site that includes a hold harmless agreement, which according to residents, strips them of any rights they may have.

Lake Hemet Municipal Water District (LHMWD) says the cause for relocation to Camp 1 is that Camp 2B has been condemned due to concerns about flooding from Hurkey Creek.

The Town Crier covered the Feb. 14 flooding in a Feb. 28, 2019 front page story "Lake Hemet Campground gets Valentine's Day flooding." Accompanying that story was a photo taken by a resident of Camp 1 showing the flooding. The newspaper only published one photo at the time and is republishing the photo here with another photo taken by the same resident that was not previously published for reference. Camp 2B, according to residents, did not flood on Feb. 14, 2019. It washed out some residents' yards but did not flood.

Why are residents being asked to relocate to an area that floods from an area that could potentially flood? Residents have asked Lake Hemet Campground and have yet to receive a response.

The newspaper also sent the following questions over to LHMWD General Manager Mike Gow and BaseCamp's Vice President of Marina Operations Tim Colvin on Jan. 31. Gow, who has only re-



sponded to one question to date, had previously referred all other questions to

1. Which agency condemned the land at Camp 2B and may I see the documentation supporting it?

2. What was the outcome of the meeting between board members of the water district and people living at Camp 2B? What mitigation has been done re-

garding the silt? 4. Which agency(ies) were a part of that

mitigation? Has FEMA money been spent?

Has FEMA been out to Lake Hemet? If so, when and why?

Will Lake Hemet pay for relocating the mobile homes left at Camp 2B?

What is the plan for the land at Camp 2B once everyone has been relocated?

9. Has any of this information been communicated to Caltrans, as it may impact Highway 74?

Gow responded to the email in 23 minutes with "Two claims have been filed against LHMWD. Therefore, I decline to comment. Thanks for understanding." The newspaper tried to receive clarification on whether it was two claims or two lawsuits, but has yet to receive a response.

Gow in a Dec. 20 email to the newspaper wrote: "The residents are tenants of BaseCamp Hospitality who is the concessionaire for the lake. Therefore, we would ask that you defer all questions to them." Colvin also did not respond to the above-mentioned questions.

According to the remaining residents, they have to pay for relocation expenses

> and BaseCamp employees will help the residents move, but are not responsible or liable for any damages that occur during the move. Residents have to submit their new rental agreements by Feb. 15 and move within 30 days.

In email communications obtained by the newspaper in a California Public Records Act Request was a letter from Davis & Wojcik, a profession-

BaseCamp Hospitality dated Oct. 1, 2019. The firm represents LHMWD.

In the letter, the firm writes "Our office represents LHWMD, which is the landowner of Lake Hemet Campground and Marina in Mountain Center, California. As you are aware, last winter was a heavy season for rain and snow in the area. Consequently, there was some flooding in Campground 2B last season near the campsites along the creek bed.

"Over the summer, Lake Hemet dredged Hurkey Creek following the appropriate recommendations under supervision of district's (LHMWD) engineer. Unfortunately, water has been and continues to flow from Hurkey Creek into Lake Hemet. Sediment was removed from Hurkey Creek but due to ongoing water flow, the sediment levels did not dissipate adequately and the district does not anticipate it will be able to dredge the creek until the water stops flowing and the lake level drops. This is cause for concern since the campground residents may experience flooding similar to that of last winter or perhaps worse."

The letter goes on, "While the waterway and lake are the obligation of the district, we want to make clear to Base-Camp that the district has performed its obligations under the agreement and cannot guarantee that no further flooding will occur. Therefore, any further preventative action must be initiated and completed by BaseCamp by relocating the tenants in preparation for the upcoming season."

The letter also states that "each tenant has signed the 'Acknowledgement of Risk and Waiver of Liability,' indicating they waive liability for both district and BaseCamp." At least one resident told the newspaper that they have not signed the acknowledgment of risk and

waiver of liability.

The letter continues, "Therefore until the creek can be dredged, this letter serves as a notice to BaseCamp to close the campground and/or cease its use for long-term camping." This statement reveals some conflicting information received by the residents, the newspaper and this very letter from Davis & Wojcik. Both were told that the creek was dredged and silt continued to fill the creek after, making it unsafe and a potential for flooding.

In documents obtained through a California Public Records Act request, the newspaper discovered that the following mitigation had been done: "130 hours of standard time force account labor for a total of \$7,278.92 and a total of 83.5 equipment hours for a total of \$3,141.38 The rented excavator was used by Tom Moses on this project for a total of 24 hours at a rate of \$81.29 per hour for a total allocation of \$1,950.96. Bringing the total amount for work performed up to this point to \$12,371.26.

A resident told the newspaper that LHMWD dredged from the bridge 200 to 300 feet toward the lake and followed the creek and built up excess sand that was dredged and put along the side so water would run through. Within three to four days, the sand was gone. This resident is claiming that the culverts were never cleaned out. When one of the Lake Hemet Campground employees retired seven to eight years ago, the preventative maintenance on the silt build-up stopped.

The newspaper called Lake Hemet Campground and asked if the district will use the land for something else after all the mobile homes have been relocated. According to the campground, there are no plans to turn it into anything at





Kitchen Table Campaign I

Regular readers of this column, aka my wife, know that I am a long-time member of Physicians for a National for a medical special interest group — Health Program (PNHP), a national nonprofit pushing for the adoption of a single-payer health care system.

As a nonprofit, they cannot and do not endorse any political candidate but rather promote the idea that our population would be better and more cheaply served by "improved Medicare for All." As part of their educational efforts, PNHP has developed a series of "kitchen table issues" that require fundamental reform rather than minor tweaks.

The first two of these issues are surprise billing and racial health inequalities. More issues follow and will be the subject of future columns.

Surprise billing

'Surprise" medical bills are probably of no surprise to any of us, as over half of Americans have received bills for something that they thought was covered by insurance.

Out-of-network billing rose from 32 to 43% for emergency room visits and from 26 to 42% for hospitalizations from 2010 to 2016, with average outlays rising from \$220 to \$628 and \$804 to \$2,040, respectively.

These amounts are a financial disaster for most families. Only about a third of us can pay an extra bill of \$500 without difficulty. Remember: these are insured patients! It is obvious that allowing insurance companies to be part of our health care "system" means that this problem will continue to grow.

Therefore, a public option or continuation of "Obamacare" that depends on these companies will not solve the issue. It makes me suspect that those who claim to like their insurance haven't had to use the emergency room or been admitted to a hospital or else they are afraid that switching to another company will be worse than what

"Medicare for All" means that no patient will be billed directly, that there will be no insurance networks and all emergency rooms and hospitals will be covered. Those of us who have passed the age of 65 did not experience the dread of switching that is so often talked about.

Feb. 10, 2020 To the community,

As many of you know, March Air Reserve Base (MARB) has been hosting a group of 195 passengers who arrived at the base Jan. 29 after arriving from China. They have been under a 14-day quarantine that is set to expire Feb. 11.

The group—many of whom work for the U.S. State Department or are related to someone who does — has been isolated

from base personnel and were not permitted to leave the fenced quarantine area.

Only official medical staff, such as health care workers with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and nurses from Riverside University Health System-Public Health (RUHS-PH), have been in direct contact with the former passengers. They have conducted temperature checks and watched for possible symptoms. At the end of the 14-day period, people

who have not developed symptoms will have successfully completed their quarantine and will be free to leave.

To date, no one has tested positive for novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) among the 195 in quarantine. Two individuals with symptoms were retested and also found to be negative, and have since recovered.

We have heard your concerns about the evacuees on the base. Many of these concerns are reasonable. Unfortunately, some people with these concerns have taken them out on the families and households of people working at MARB. There have been comments made that have been hurtful—

both in person and on social media — that are often based on incorrect or incomplete information. A few base workers have even been accosted in uniform. This is not acceptable, and needs to stop.

Please understand that people on and off the base are not at increased risk for exposure to the new virus, and we don't restrict people who don't actually pose any risk. They have had no contact with the evacuees, whose area is fully separated from base personnel. You do not need to exclude household

or family members of MARB personnel, nor do you need to require them to obtain unnecessary "clearance letters" from a physician or health authority. They pose no greater risk than anyone else.

We understand your concerns about exposure to 2019nCoV and Riverside County is committed to protecting the health and safety of its residents. We are working with state and federal partners to take every precaution to protect this community and will take immediate

action if any person being monitored develops symptoms of 2019-nCoV. So far no cases of nCoV have been detected, and we don't expect it to happen, but we are ready if it does.

Narrow networks of doctors and hospitals limit patient choice

The next time you hear someone — likely a politician or spokesperson argue that America's health insurance arrangements are fine because they offer lots of choice for patients, don't take them seriously.

What choice are they talking about? Almost anyone navigating the health system over the last decade knows that insurers have limited where they can go for care and whom they can see.

The concept of limiting patients' choice of doctors, hospitals and other medical services like radiology practices or speech therapy began a few decades back with HMOs. The health management organizations argued that, to assure quality, they were allowing their insured patients to see only the best providers.

The theory sounded good, but in practice the health providers squawked and networks gradually be-

came more inclusive. That changed again as costs continued to rise and insurers started to choose only doctors who accepted their fee schedules. Things got kind muddy for patients because they didn't know for sure whether a doctor was in the network because they charged low prices or because they offered superior

The way networks operate has gotten even more opaque and manipulated, according to new research from Simon Haeder, Penn State assistant professor of public policy, and his colleagues. Their research tells us more about how insurance carriers are limiting patient choice.

Do insurers deliberately exclude doctors offering certain specialties in the hope of forcing out the "lemons" among their insured patients — those

likely to be sick? Haeder told me that may be happening. For example, dia-

betics need to see endocrinologists periodically to help manage their insurer constructs a network with no or few endocrinologists, patients may be forced to seek care elsewhere or pay out of pocket. Such a strategy, says Haeder, allows an insurer "to offload costs" they don't want to pay.

It's even harder to find doctors in fields where there are fewer providers such as cardiac surgeons, podiatrists, and in some cases, obstetricians and gynecologists. The problem is even greater in rural areas where it's common for patients to drive many miles to find a practitioner to treat them.

Haeder and colleagues also found that the problems with network ade-See Health, page A6

It is interesting to note that hospitals became integrated after 1965 because the legislation that created Medicare required it. ance coverage, eliminate deductibles, copays and coinsurance and allow anyone to use any health care facility.

By depending on insurance companies to "give" us health care, we are relying on an outdated model that rewards them for not providing us with that health care. Insurance companies and other entities, for-profit and nonprofit, are too often subject to profiteering, the taking of excess profits. Yes, nonprofits make money. They just call it by different names.

Why do doctors and hospitals submit "surprise" bills? Because they can! A fundamental change in the way Americans pay for health care is needed. Bandaids won't

If directories report that certain specialists for treating kidney problems are located nearby, but when you call for an appointment and you find they are no longer practicing, what do you do? Go without care? Pay out-of-pocket? Or search far and wide for someone who takes your insurance?

When the Affordable Care first went into effect and for a few years after that, the media and advocacy groups did point out that many plans had few providers and others offered directories that were out of date. They singled out those plans.

There's not much of that kind of reporting or outrage these days. Maybe it should come back to highlight the significant barriers to care Haeder uncovered.

"We thought if we gave people insurance everything would be great," he told me. "But there's a difference between having insurance and having access to care."

The focus of advocates, policymakers and even some insurers became the premium people would pay. But the premium is only one element of a policy that determines the final bill to the consumer. Coinsurance, copays and deductibles, all of which have risen astronomically in the last few years, are equally important and are contributing to the rising medical debt.

Knowing which providers are in a network is important, so is understanding the games insurers play to do what insurers always do: limit their risk of paying out money for sick people.



H.R. 4059 would fulfill a 1999 agreement between the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the ACB-CI to acquire and exchange lands within the Santa Rosa and San Jacinto Mountains National Monument and allow these lands to be managed in a cooperative and coordinated manner. A land exchange for these parcels between BLM and ACBCI was finalized in March 2019. The land that was acquired by ACBCI from the BLM through the land exchange is in a remote wilderness area within the Monument and will be managed as conservation land similar to how the land was managed by

Taking this land into the trust will complete the BLM-ACBCI agreement and allow ACBCI and BLM to consolidate the "checkerboard" landownership in and around the Agua Caliente Indian Reservation. The goal of consolidating land ownership is to provide more logical and consistent land management.

H.R. 4495 serves to authorize the Secretary of Health and Human Services, acting through the Director of the IHS, to acquire private land to facilitate access to the Desert Sage Youth Wellness Center in Hemet, California and for other purposes.

The Desert Sage Youth Treatment Center provides culturally sensitive treatment for Native American and Alaska Native youths between ages 12 and 17 suffering from Substance Use Disorders (SUD). Previously, Native American and Alaska Native youth used out-ofstate facilities which took away their support systems at this crucial time of recovery from SUD.

Desert Sage was constructed in 2016 and can serve up to 32 patients at a time. It is the only IHS youth regional treatment center in California. It is currently accessed by a dirt road that is prone to washing out and cracking.

When the facility was constructed, IHS was unable to reach agreements with landowners on adjacent properties in order to pave and maintain an access road. Ruiz's legislation would give IHS the authority to purchase the land from willing sellers and construct a road to the facility.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Native American and Alaska Native populations had the second-highest overdose rates from all opioids in 2017 among racial/ethnic groups in the United



Art project to 'rehumanize,' one bead at a time

Mountain Pottery will be hosting an event to create clay beads to represent each of the 7,209 deaths that have occurred in the last 20 years among migrants crossing the southwestern border of the United States.

The beads will be incorporated into a work of art made by Cannupa Hanska Luger at the Mesa Contemporary Arts Museum in Mesa, Arizona, according to the press release.

With a bachelor's in studio arts from the Institute of American Indian Arts, Luger's education and talent has provided vast opportunities and collaborations in multi-

To name a few of his achievements, Luger was a recipient of the 2019 Joan Mitchell Foundation Painters and Sculptors Grant, a 2019 Yerba Buena Center for the Arts Honoree and the recipient of the Museum of Arts and Design's 2018 inaugural Burke Prize.

Tiffany Fairall, chief curator of the Mesa Contemporary Arts Museum in Mesa, Arizona, and Colette Pecenka, curator of exhibitions and education, are leading the

"I know Idyllwild is a community that cares and is full of people that care," said Helen Hixon, Mountain Pottery owner. "It gives everyone an opportunity for free

to come make a bead and to have their handprint in this installation. It's making something beautiful out of something tragic."

The art installation is called "Something To Hold Onto." The goal will be to rehumanize the large and abstract data with the creation of these handmade items. These beads won't be fired, meaning they will eventually disintegrate back into the earth bringing the process full circle and raising awareness of those lives lost.

"This is just one way to give back to our community, and our community contributing to this amazing international collaboration that will be installed in Mesa, Arizona," Hixon said.




Support youth golf






