Steele ties for 4th at The Honda

Brendan Steele was in it to the end at The Honda Classic in Florida last week. In a thrilling race to the wire, the Idyllwild native tied for fourth — his second top-5 finish of this season.

He posted a 3-under-par 68-67-71-71 — 277 on the champion course at the PGA National, one of the toughest courses on the PGA Tour.

The thrill-shot of the tournament for Brendan fans had to be on the par-3 15th hole Saturday when his 179-yard tee shot hit a few feet in front of the pin, caught the right side of the hole and rode the rim some 200-plus degrees before flipping out back toward him for a tap-in birdie.

Now with 477 FedExCup points, Brendan has moved up 13 spots on the all-important FedExCup list to 36th place. At the start of the season, Brendan needed to finish in the top 125 to earn his playing card on the PGA Tour for next year. He's now assured of doing that. He has already amassed more FedExCup points this season than did any eventual 125th-place finisher in the previous nine years that Brendan has been on the tour. So now, let's concentrate on a fourth win!

Brendan will be swinging again this week in the \$7-million Arnold Palmer Invitational at the Bay Hill Club and Lodge in Orlando, Florida. This will be the eighth season he has played this tournament. Last year, he tied for 17th place.

Brendan will tee off Thursday at 9:33 a.m. and Friday at 4:33 a.m., playing with Charles Howell III and Jim Hermans both days. Follow him shot-forshot at pgatour.com or with the PGA Tour app. The tournament will be telecast on the Golf Channel (Thursday and Friday) and on NBC on the weekend.

IWD may get a general manager soon

Another special meeting was held by the directors of the Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Feb. 26 to approve the hiring of Leo Havener for general manager, but some issues arose regarding the board's negotiation of the contract and another special meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 4.

Board President Dr. Charles Schelly seemed quite frustrated with Board Vice President Peter Szabadi. According to Schelly, he had been negotiating the contract with

Havener, who was not present at the meeting, and kept coming back to find changes made to the contract by Szabadi without Schelly's knowledge that were not previously negotiat-

"Some changes, by me, but they were not incorporated," Szabadi said.

Havener will be the second general manager to be hired by IWD since it terminated Michael Creighton Sept. 25, 2019 and as of the Feb. 26 meeting will be paid \$117,000 annually because, according to the board, he has declined medical coverage with the district.

Havener has been a consultant since the

summer of 2016, according to his LinkedIn account, when he was released from his contract at Lake Arrowhead Community Services District (LACSD) where he served as its general manager. Finance manager Catherine Cerri stepped into the position on Aug. 23, 2016 and still serves as the district's general manager.

Havener and Cerri were both named in a wrongful termination lawsuit brought forward by former LACSD employee Darlene Butler who alleged that both "subjected Butler to unjustified criticism, discipline and ongoing negative, derogatory and demeaning See IWD, page A3

The San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) is postponing the broadcast burn in Pine Cove, just north of Idyllwild, due to Sunday's storm. The agency originally intended to begin the project this week.

The 189-acre project aims to maintain the Pine Cove Fuel Break, according to the agency's press release.

"Broadcast burns are controlled applications of fire to fuels, under specified environmental conditions that allow fire to be confined to a predetermined area, and produces the fire behavior and fire characteristics required to attain planned fire treatment and resource management objectives," according to the agency's website.

SBNF has been quite busy since the winter season began, having completed over 1,000 acres of fuel reduction in the San Bernardino National Forest.

comments," according to the July 29, 2016 story in The Alpenhorn News.

The Town Crier contacted Cerri for comment about the lawsuit and to ask why Havener was released from his contract but was transferred to her assistant to leave a voicemail. The newspaper did not hear back by deadline. According to court documents, the lawsuit was eventually dismissed.

The newspaper also contacted the Mountain News, which reported that Cerri was taking over the general manager position to ask if they knew why Havener had been released from LACSD. Staff at that newspaper was unable to find the answer.

IWD's Acting General Manager Mitch Freeman pushed for the district to find a general manager after expressing that he did not have an interest in taking the general manager position permanently.

"I feel more comfortable in my old job [field supervisor]," Freeman said. "I don't have that level of administrative experience. There is a special skill set that general managers require. I do not want to bring any liability to the district."

Freeman became acting general manager after Darren Milner abruptly resigned Nov. 17, a Sunday evening, citing "experiencing an unhealthy culture and difficult work environment at the district due to poor communication," as one of his reasons. Milner served as general manager for one month. He was hired after the district's board voted to terminate Creighton, Milner's predecessor.

Staff

Staff at IWD is slimmer these days. Amy Miller-Hawley, office assistant, is no longer with the district as of Feb. 19 and Jeannine Copelin, administrative assistant, is temporarily out of the office. When asked about the staffing immediately following the Feb. 26 meeting as a follow up to an email sent by the newspaper earlier that day, Freeman responded that he was waiting for legal to get back to him before he could respond.

When Freeman responded by email a couple of days later, he wrote: "Current office staff is as follows: Acting General Manager is Mitch Freeman. Hosny Shouman is presently Chief Financial Officer. An administrative assistant is presently temporarily out of the office and temporary part-time help is assisting in her absence." The district will not comment on Miller-Hawley. The newspaper requested her resignation letter, but the district stated in a response to a public records request that it is not in possession of one.



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

Paying for health care reform

With all of the misinformation about health care financing spreading throughout social media and the news media, I thought it would be a good time to devote a column to the topic. While I was contemplating this, an article was published in The Lancet.

For those of you who aren't familiar with The Lancet, it is the world's foremost medical journal. Academic phy-

sicians pine their whole lives away hoping to publish an article. So, the three scientists were undoubtedly thrilled to publish "Improving the prognosis of health care in the USA" in the journal under the heading of Health Policy.

Here is a recap.

The authors begin by pointing out the fact that 37 million Americans do not have health care insurance and 41 million more have inadequate access to care, in spite of the fact that we pay a higher percentage of our Gross Domestic Product for healthcare than any other country.

Through a careful financial analysis, they conclude that the enactment of the Medicare for All Act would lead to a savings of 13% and, more importantly, would save 68,000 lives per year. Most of the article is devoted to the budgetary projections that lead to this conclusion.

By enacting Medicare for All (not to be confused with Medicare for All Who Want It, but actually the same as Improved Medicare for All with the elimination of deductibles and copays and the addition of dental care and other services), reimbursement rates for hospitals would decrease by 5.5%. They project reduced payments to physicians of 7.4%.

This may sound unacceptable to some, and I hope to address some of these issues in future columns. However, remember that the cost of billing to hospitals and physicians — and the hassle associated with billing hundreds of insurance companies — all disappear with a sin-

Other savings would come from negotiating lower prices for drugs, a practice now prohibited for Medicare. Improved fraud detection would save 4%.

Interestingly, everyone knows about Medicare fraud, which is now thought to be a serious problem. But do you know about fraudulent billing of private health care insurance? No, because the insurance companies don't track that, or if they do, they do not release the numbers. It is easier for them to just pay.

Remember, if their costs go up, everybody benefits except the patient. So, there is reason to believe that a single-payer system would result in better fraud detection.

Think of the savings that would result from the fact that everyone will be covered. No more right offs for uninsured patients. Everyone will pay and no one will be

Finally, how will this be financed? Through taxes, estimated by the authors to be composed of a 10% payroll tax and a 5% income tax. This is much less than most people pay for insurance and it frees employers from being insurance agents.

Because of space limitations, this is only a synopsis. Remember, Medicare for All could save thousands of lives and decrease costs. It is worth thinking about!

Rep. Ruiz calls out Trump's EPA budget cuts

Cuts would hurt enforcement and monitoring of air and water quality

environmental injustices, including airborne hazards, in the Eastern Coachella Valley. In a hearing with the Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on the Environment and Climate Change, Ruiz pushed back against Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Administrator Andrew Wheeler regarding the Trump administration's proposed budget for the EPA, which calls for deep cuts to programs that monitor air and water quality.

After Ruiz highlighted drastic proposed cuts to tribal environmental programs, Wheeler said he would work with Ruiz to support tribal nations seeking to build capacity for their environmental and air quality programs.

"Under this budget, the chances of my constituents drinking arsenic-laden water and breathing hazardous air increases drastically," Ruiz said. "This is why I'm so disappointed in this administration's budget."

In closing, Ruiz asked, "Will you commit to working to honor the government's trust responsibility and ensure that tribes are fully supported in their efforts to establish and grow tribal environmental programs with me?"

'Yes, I'd be happy to work with you on that," Wheeler replied.

Background

The Trump administration's proposed cuts would bring the EPA to its lowest funding level in 40 years. Specifically, the White House budget proposed cutting:

- \$38 million from the water system supervision program, which is a 40% funding reduction from last year.
- \$15 million from civil and criminal enforcement division for environmental programs such as clean water
 - \$6 million from compliance monitoring programs. • \$23 million from EPA's enforcement of waste and
- recycling regulations.

The administration also requested a more than 30% reduction in funding for the Tribal General Assistance Program and the Tribal Air Quality program. Both programs assist tribes in California's 36th congressional district with monitoring and improving air quality.

EPA air and water quality programs played an essential role in addressing environmental injustices the East Valley faced in 2019, including the arsenic-contaminated water in the Oasis Mobile Home Park and mulch fires in Thermal.

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
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

HUSD expands career exploration

Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) was awarded more than half a million dollars from K12 Strong Workforce to expand its career explorations classes for middle school students, the district announced March 2.

The program is currently at Rancho Viejo Middle School and Dartmouth Middle School, and beginning in the 2020/21 school year, it will be at Diamond Valley Middle School and Acacia Middle School.

"Nereyda Gonzalez, director of secondary education, is looking for a way to provide these offerings to our K8s," wrote Alexandrea Sponheim, HUSD public information officer in an email when asked if the program would be expanding to Idyllwild School. "She is currently looking for ways to make this happen."

Over the last few years, HUSD has been working diligently to provide an increase in the number of offerings for its career-focused classes. At the high school level, the district offers Career Technical Education (CTE) path-

CTE pathways allow students to take a class that provides in-depth knowledge and hands-on experience in a particular career field. At the beginning of a CTE pathway, students learn about the field and its many intricacies. Next, students are able to utilize what they have learned and work on hands-on activities to further their comprehension. Finally, students are partnered with a local business in the field where they intern, gaining real-world experience in the industry.

This school year, HUSD expanded its career focus by adding career exploration labs to Rancho Viejo and Dartmouth. Career explorations allow students to spend

three-week modules learning about various career fields and completing hands-on projects based on their learnings of each field. At the end of each module, students are able to research the type of schooling needed for that career and they can begin to plan for life after high school.

"It's better than other classes because you can find out what you want to do and if you actually like what you are working on you can see what colleges there are for you to go to," said Jasmin Cadena, career explorations

The Secondary Education Department and College and Career Department identified that the expansion of CTE in middle school would be highly beneficial to the students. By expanding to middle school, students are now thinking about their future and different career paths they would like to pursue. They are then able to enter into high school with a better idea of what classes they should add to their schedule.

A lot of thought and work went into expanding CTE in HUSD. Staff wanted to make sure they were adding pathways that met the needs of local workforce demands and provide living wages.

In addition, they wanted to make sure that pathways were aligned from middle school through the community college level. This means that students will be able to attend one of the local community colleges and pursue a certificate in the career field they are interested in and be a worthy candidate for businesses looking to hire.

HUSD is working to ensure students are prepared for life after their K-12 education. Whether a student is focused on furthering their education or entering immediately into the workforce, the district wants them to have the skills necessary to be successful and earn a living wage.

to allocate resources in a manner that best serves our student body and the communities that HUSD serves. In 2015, ASPIRE was a program that was created and included in the district's Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) at the onset of the State's new funding and accountability model. Every program and resource funded through the LCAP is monitored for its effectiveness as mandated by the state. Through this ongoing monitoring and evaluation, the decision was made to close ASPIRE and resources currently allocated to this program will be redistributed to meet the diverse needs of HUSD's students.

"Although ASPIRE will close at the end of the current school year, the district is committed to continuing to educate and support all students, including those that have been served most recently at ASPIRE. The goal of ASPIRE and the district is to provide students with the skills that are necessary to be successful in school and post-graduation," concluded Sponheim.

'It's never an easy decision to close a school because of the impact it has on students, teachers, and staff throughout the whole district," wrote Board Member Vic Scavarda, who represents the Idyllwild area, in an email. "For my part, it took a lot of thought and reflection because I wanted to be sure in my mind

that the closure would be best for all the kids in the district. We opened ASPIRE in 2015, and have celebrated the success stories over the years. Undeniably, there have been some dramatic results. However, considering the information we get from the state comparing ASPIRE to other similar schools throughout California, it became evident to me that we need to try something different in order to be more effective. Regrettably, I came to the conclusion that the time had come to take a different path."

"The students, parents and teachers that spoke to our board assisted in my decision to vote in favor of not closing ASPIRE School," wrote Valenzuela in an email. Both Hikel and Valenzuela were contacted for comment.

What will happen with the students attending ASPIRE?

"Administration and ASPIRE staff are working with current ASPIRE students to meet their re-entry requirements so they can be transferred back to their home school," wrote Sponheim. "If students do not meet their re-entry requirements students will be able to attend Riverside County Office of Education's Community Day School Betty Gibbel or their family can enroll them in a private or charter school ... They would no longer be considered an HUSD student. However, once the student meets the re-entry requirements, they can be re-enrolled in HUSD."

A comprehensive new schedule of programs and classes for 2020 has been announced by the Idyllwild Community Garden & Education Center (ICG), formerly known as the Idyllwild Demonstration Garden, a 501c3 nonprofit project of Young Idyllwild Inc.

ICG created an 8-week course for the local Girl Scout troop #533 and a weekly class for youngsters ages 4 to 7 for Town Hall's afterschool program.

Julia Goldfarb Sousa was brought on board as an intern to help develop and oversee the garden programs, joining other key volunteers Julie Koppel, Julie Roy and Reba Coulter. The creation of Young Idyllwild and its youth activities came about through the vision and efforts of Kathy Wilson.

Helen Hixon, a former educator and owner of Mountain Pottery, has been another essential contributor to the development of the garden. This past year, she worked with Susan Righetti, library associate at the Idyllwild Library, to bring the children to the garden for story time where they read books about fall plants and then used fallen leaves to make pictures.

Piano concert review

All sorts of things were being preprocessed in anticipation of Feb. 18 scheduled "PianoFest" performances, both on the ground and in the skies.

When considered as a whole — the dry and cold air present that evening, plus the morning's occultation of Mars by the Moon (and other portentous events)—the situation presented itself as ominous, given Idyllwild's preoccupation with fire and water (not to mention cold), and thus could have accounted for the sparseness of the attending audience.

Nevertheless, the devotees of the scheduled keyboard practitioners all crowded, for the most part, on the left-hand side of Lowman Hall, were treated to a display worthy of a new constellation, courtesy of the collective aegis of faculty members Jeanette Louise Yaryan and Douglas Ashcraft.

It was perhaps fortuitous that the centripetal piece on the program was the opening movement of Gustav Holst's "The Planets" in the composer's two-piano scoring (prior to the orchestral version). However, the lead-in selections, as well as what followed, were more than an adequate panorama of keyboard sonorities, somewhat enhanced by the added resonance that a less-than-full hall provided.

Thus, Xuerong Sharon Wang's essaying of J. S. Bach's "Toccata in E Minor" and Xinyi Selena Sun's playing of the opening movement of Mozart's "Sonata in D, K. 311" both proved the performers' technical abilities as well as a standard of programming introductions.

The brief appearance of Ryan Lawrence's playing of Chopin's "Prelude in A Major" was an essay in concentra-

tion and performance economy, as were the two Beethoven ets" was then presented. Both Myungchan Andrew Kim sonata movements cleanly played by Tong Daisy Su and and Saveliy Sotnikov's rendition brought forth the stark-Michael Stroud from the F-Sharp and the G-Major sonatas, Opus 78 and 49, respectively.

A shift in performance quality was evidenced in the next two repertory excerpts: Chopin's "A Major (Military) Polonaise" had the requisite martial character (perhaps as an unintentional preview of the Holst) and Debussy's "Hommage a Rameau" took to task the French Baroque master with impressionistic whole-tone moistening of the environment and its assembled auditors. The performers -Yichen Jane Wang and Michael Dunaevsky, respectively — took their parts quite seriously and were rewarded in those efforts.

The aforementioned "Mars" movement from "The Plan-

ness of the piece, from the drumming 5/4-time rhythm to the clarion calls of the upper voices, even more so than the orchestral arrangement.

The following "Ballade in A-Flat, Opus 47" of Chopin (perhaps representing the Moon in the constellation's traversal) proved a blessed relief in Feinila Kaysaier's blissful rendition. Proceeding in sequence, the concert finished on two high notes, with Messrs. Kim and Sotnikov providing more than perfunctory performances of Beethoven's early sonata movement (A Major, Op.2 No.2) and Bartók's 5-part "Romanian Folk Dances," respectively. Polite applause was provided and a general satisfactory overview of the evening — as well as future prospects — was effected by all present.

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


