

With Riverside University Health System (RUHS) reporting three confirmed COVID-19 cases for Idyllwild-Pine Cove, residents continue to express concern about visitors bringing the virus to town.

As of April 14 at 1 p.m., Riverside County has 1,961 confirmed COVID-19 cases. Fifty people have died and 376 people have recovered.

As of April 7 at 1 p.m., the county had 1,016 confirmed cases, 28 deaths with 67 individuals having recovered.

When the Town Crier went to press on Tuesday, March 31 there were 371 confirmed cases, 13 deaths and 30 individuals had recovered.

To date, more than 29,000 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to Riverside County Public Health Officer Dr. Cameron Kaiser. The age range with the most confirmed cases in the county is

still those between the ages of 40 and 64.

During the April 14 RUHS press conference, Riverside County Emergency Management Director Bruce Barton gave the following update on hospital capacity: In the 17 acute care hospitals in Riverside County, 60% of the beds are currently occupied. There are 218 ventilators in use and 274 available. There are 255 isolation beds in use and 124 available. There are 252 patients in ICU with 109 beds available. There are 249 negative pressure rooms in use and 386 available.

According to a press release issued April 14 by the county, "Specialized teams designed to educate and equip employees at licensed care facilities throughout Riverside County will start

Rotary makes donations

The Idyllwild Rotary held a virtual board meeting last week to donate funds to local organizations that will help the community during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The board voted to grant \$900 to the Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) to cover costs of the Feeding America project.


ARF will be receiving \$500 from Rotary to assist in funding the repair of an old deck.

The Idyllwild HELP Center received \$1,000.

"The people of Idyllwild have a lot of needs now and we might want to give more later," wrote Rotary Presi-dent Tom Kluzak in an email with the updates regarding the donation made to the HELP Center.

A \$1,000 donation was made to ICC to help fund gift certificates to essential workers who are in contact with the public on a daily basis. The donation will cover about half of the amount needed. (See story above.)

"The idea for this project came from Mary Rider of the Nature Center," wrote Kluzak. "She proposed giving gift certificates to those working in the grocery stores, post office, etc. who are putting themselves at See Rotary, page A2

"The teams will target specific regions — Northwest, Southwest, Central and Eastern—in the county and work with staff members at

"There has been so much incorrect information that has spread that many employees in these facilities are scared to show up for work," said Saruwatari. "Information is power and by providing these employees with accurate information about how COVID-19 is and is not spread, they will be confident when they report to work."

The press release also reveals: "80 patients, including 34 who had earlier tested positive for COVID-19, were evacuated from the Magnolia Rehabilitation and Nursing Center and transferred to different locations throughout the coun-

The county allowed drive-in church services to occur over the Easter weekend.

Enforcement

An order was issued by Kaiser stating that people could be fined or arrested for congregating of any size in public and not wearing a face covering. This order runs through April 30.

"This is a valid order and enforceable by fine, imprisonment or both," said Sheriff Chad Bianco in a message he posted on social media last week. "However, I need to make it perfectly clear to all residents of Riverside County. We will not be setting up any type of police state and this is not a declaration of martial law mation on the location."

Bianco also stated during his message: "Your deputies, police officers, dispatchers, fire and EMS personnel are here around the clock ensuring your and protection safety during this trying time. If we must respond to violations of this order, our ability to respond to emergencies and critical calls for service will be greatly impact-

"Cover your faces, stay at home unless absolutely necessary and help out your neighbors as much as possible. If you don't do it for yourself, do it for me. Do it for my family. Do it for your family. Stay home, stay safe and together we will get through this," Bianco concluded.

In addition, during a recent Riverside University Health System press conference the comment was made that the county was looking at cellphone data and noticed people aren't traveling (moving around) as much. When asked about Riverside University Health System Public Information Officer Brooke Federico responded: "Some of this is available on Unacast, where counties are graded for their social distancing. In addition, Google created a California mobility report here: https://www.google. com/covid19/mobility/."

Residents may still call 800-945-6171 to make an appointment over the phone for testing in the Coachella Valley and Harvest Christian Fellowship church in Riverside. Those seeking tests at the Lake Elsinore location are encouraged to use the website https://www.projectbaseline.com/study/covid-19/ for appointments but may use the above-mentioned phone number. A fourth testing site opened up at the Perris Fairgrounds Tuesday. You must have symptoms and an appointment to show up to the drive-up test sites. Some of the symptoms include fever, sore throat, cough, runny nose or congestion. Those who have risk of exposure may also be tested, which means exposure to a confirmed case.





Are you or someone you know being harmed at home? Or perhaps you are close to the abuser? Domestic Violence (DV) experts expect to see increased rates of DV while isolating at home.

DV includes stalking, physical, emotional and sexual abuse. Women and men are victims, although to date, the majority of victims are female and the majority of abusers are male.

Some indicators of DV include:

- You frequently make excuses for your partner's behavior to friends and family.
- You find yourself hiding and withholding informaportation or to fly. tion from friends and family so you don't have to explain or make excuses.
- never quite express what it is, even to yourself.
- You start lying to avoid your partner's put downs and reality twists.
 - You have trouble making simple decisions.
- You have lost control over your own finances. You have the sense that you used to be a very different Domestic violence includes stalking,
- person more confident, more fun-loving, more relaxed. • You wonder if you are a abuse. Women and men are victims,
- "good enough" partner. You feel hopeless and joy-
- You feel as though you can't do anything right.
- COVID-19 impacts DV victims:
- An abusive partner may feel more justified and escalate their isolation tactics.
- Abusive partners may withhold necessary items, such as hand sanitizer or disinfectants.
- the pandemic to control or frighten survivors, or to prevent them from seeking appropriate medical attention if they have symptoms.
- Abusive partners may withhold insurance cards, threaten to cancel insurance or prevent survivors from seeking medical attention if they need it.
- Programs that serve survivors may be significantly impacted — shelters may be full or may even stop intakes altogether. Survivors may also fear entering a shelter because of being in close quarters with groups of people.
- Survivors who are older or have chronic heart or lung conditions may be at increased risk in public places where they would typically get support, like shelters, counseling centers or courthouses.
- Travel restrictions may impact a survivor's escape or safety plan. It may not be safe for them to use public trans- with a Master of Arts in psychology.


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Most parents are worried school closures will leave their students behind, survey finds

Four out of 5 parents of California public school students say that school closures from the coronavirus are making them feel stressed, and 9 out of 10 are worried their students will fall behind academically, according to a survey released Wednesday (https://west.edtrust.org/press-release/poll-ca-parents-concerned-about-school-closures-caused-by-covid-19/).

The survey of 1,200 parents statewide for the nonprofit student advocacy organization Education Trust-West also found that 44% of parents said that

their child's teacher had contacted them personally, and fewer than a quarter had been provided access to or contact with a school counselor.

At the same time, however, parents gave good grades overall to this point, with 81% saying their child's school or district is doing an excellent or good job providing learning materials and instruction during the closure. They've done this by email (63%), text messages (35%) and personal phone calls (26%), plus other means, like robocalls.

Noting that parents gave schools high marks in handling the crisis of shutting down schools and getting out information, Elisha Smith Arrillaga, Ed Trust-West's executive director, indicated the transition to distance learning has been uneven, particularly in providing services for English learners and special education students.

"What we found is a tale of two crises. There's the immediate crisis — keeping students safe, healthy, fed and housed; shutting schools down in an orderly way; getting information to parents. And then there's California's longstanding education equity crisis," she said. Months-long school closures "will only exacerbate those gaps," she said.

Global Strategy Group, located in New York City,

conducted the web-based survey from March 26 through April 3. Many California school districts had not formally launched distance learning plans by that point, assuming schools might reopen in early April, and so will be stepping up their efforts over the next two weeks. That could account for some parents' unmet expectations.

Smith Arrillaga said that while she is "cautiously optimistic" that the rollout of distance learning will improve in coming weeks, the survey contains "warning signs about how closures will worsen existing inequalities." Parents confirmed what educators have assumed, that disproportionate numbers of low-income, Latino and African American families lack the technology that are prerequisites to remote learning.

While 29% of families statewide said access to reliable internet would be a barrier to distance learning, the proportion rose to 38% of low-income parents, 35% of Latinos in Los Angeles suburbs and 47% of parents in Northern California, including the Sacramento area. Fifty percent of low-income parents and 42% of Latino and African American parents statewide said they lacked "sufficient" devices at home to serve multiple siblings at home.

Through purchases by districts and partnerships with Goggle and nonprofits, the state hopes to quickly provide tens of thousands of Chromebooks and internet hotspots. But State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond, participating in a press conference on the survey results, said those would not be enough to fill the need and called for further donations.

The survey also found:

 54% of parents have received academic and/ or other resources from their school daily or at least three times each week.

• Only 31% of parents reported that their school or district is providing instructional materials for English learners.

• 24% of parents reported their school or district was providing instructional materials and other resources for special education students.

• 75% characterized themselves as every effective in using technology to communicate with their child's teacher.

• 72% of Spanish-speaking parents, 62% of African American parents and 61% of low-income parents said they were very concerned that school closures would throw their children off track to go to college, compared with 51% of parents overall.





Cathie Davis: Local nurse on the frontlines of COVID-19

Idyllwild resident Cathie Davis has called this mountain her home for 36 years. Growing up in Orange County, Davis knew she wanted to be a nurse and had plenty of options on where she could pursue that goal.

When I was nine years old, I told my mom I was going to be a nurse," Davis said. "It's what I always wanted to do."

At the age of 14, Davis started as a "candy striper" volunteering and assisting staff in the obstetrics department at Orange County Medical Center, which is now the UCI Medical Center. At the time, volunteers were called candy stripers because they wore red and white striped uniforms.

Davis went to Golden West College in Huntington Beach to become a licensed vocational nurse, which jump-started her career and helped her land her

Davis started at Children's Hospital of Orange County in

"I always wanted to work with kids," Davis said. "So, my first job was at Children's Hospital of Orange working in the NICU [neonatal intensive care unit] and Oncology."

After moving to Idyllwild, she continued her education at College of the Desert and Mt. San Jacinto College to become a registered nurse (RN), eventually completing her Bachelor of Science in Nursing at University

"You couldn't choose to take

time off back then, so I decided to become a teacher so I could stay home with my kids," Davis said. For 19 years, Davis raised her kids and helped many families by teaching preschool and pre-K.

"I worked at Idyllwild Child Development Center for 12 years until it closed," explained Davis. "My mom and I built Trinity Pines the Children's Place. It was open for five years. I then taught preschool and pre-K from my home for two years while I went to school for my RN." Davis explained.

Once her kids were grown, Davis went back to her life-long passion — nursing — and returned to Eisenhower Medical Center. Davis worked at Eisenhower Medical Center for six years before she had her kids.

Davis has worked at Eisenhower Medical Center in Rancho Mirage for a total of 19 years. Currently, she is the director of nurses for 4 East, which handles general surgery. She is also the director of pediatrics.

Davis is now facing the unprecedented battle that many are facing with the COVID-19

She oversees 90 employees in 4 East, and her unit that once focused on surgery recovery, is now a COVID-19 unit.

"As nurses, we typically hold hands and have close contact with our patients," said Davis. "Now, we have gloves, gowns, visors and masks. So, it's difficult to provide that personal care with all that gear on but it is for our protection. We can't take

care of the patients if we don't protect ourselves."

Even in these challenging times, Davis looks at her career and when asked if becoming a nurse was everything she thought it would be, she answered: "Yes. It's a blessing to be with people when they are not at their best — emotionally and physically trying to recover. The unit I work in is a surgical unit and we know how to help people get well."

"It's fulfilling with lots of happiness and sometimes a few tears," Davis added.

Davis explained to those looking to go into the nursing field, "You need to have a passion for people. It's such a privilege to have that contact with a person. I've probably cared for 10,000 people in my career and every one of them was a privi-

Since COVID-19, Davis has been facing a different kind of nursing. However, Davis has seen humanity pull together in this time of crisis.

"One thing I've seen through this is that people are watching out for each other," said Davis. "Neighbors and friends are reaching out to each other to make sure they are okay. People are being kind to one another. I love that.

Davis also explained how much it means to her for her patients to come back and visit.

"Some patients make full recoveries and sometimes patients don't make a full recovery," Davis said. "But they have a quality See Davis, page B3


