Supervisors consider aligning public health orders with state

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors voted Tuesday to continue the agenda item to rescind four orders set in place by Public Health Officer Cameron Kaiser to align more with the state's orders. After more than seven hours of public comment, staff comment and board debate, the board decided to continue the item to a special meeting Friday, May 8 at 1 p.m.

However, that meeting may be canceled depending on Gov. Gavin Newsom's anticipated announcement on Thursday regarding the phased approach to reopening the state and how that would impact Riverside County. The next scheduled Board of Supervisors meeting is Tuesday, May 12.

The agenda item to rescind four of the orders set forth by Kaiser was placed on the May 5 agenda by Supervisor Karen Spiegel and Board Chair V. Manuel Perez. There were many public comments both in favor and in opposition to rescinding the orders.

Spiegel stated during the meeting that the item was brought forward to align all county orders with the governor's orders, with the exception of face coverings.

Perez stated during the discussion that the county should keep the orders already set forth because the measures in place may allow Riverside County to move forward with the much-anticipated requirements that will be set by Newsom later on in the week.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

Still three recorded cases

The three reported COVID-19 cases in Idyllwild-Pine Cove has not increased since April 6, according to the Riverside University Health System (RUHS) website. The first confirmed case in the area was April 3.

As of May 5, Riverside County has 4,454 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 184 deaths related to COVID-19 and 1,997 people have recovered. There are 215 individuals being hospitalized and of those 75 are in ICU.

As of April 28 at 3 p.m., Riverside County had 3,735 confirmed COVID-19 cases. Of those, 141 people had died and 1,303 people had recovered. Two-hundred-twenty individuals were being hospitalized and of those 73 were in ICU.

As of April 21 at 1 p.m., Riverside County had 2,960 confirmed COVID-19 cases. Ninety-three people had died and 757 people had recovered. Two-hundred-forty individuals were being hospitalized and of those 72 were in ICU.

To date, 58,878 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The age range with the most confirmed cases in the county is still those between the ages of 40 and 64.

Riverside County is encouraging seniors to run their air conditioners as temperatures reach triple digits. The county said that those who reach out to Office of Aging will be able to receive assistance in paying for their utility bills. The cooling centers are not open due to restrictions imposed by efforts to decrease the spread of COVID-19. Seniors are also encouraged to call 2-1-1 if they are without an air conditioner to see if assistance can be provided.

Town Crier update: SBA loan and moving

Like so many businesses and organizations on our Hill, the Town Crier continues to be adversely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Some businesses and organizations do continue to faithfully advertise with us, but some haven't been able to advertise due to the financial strain so many are facing.

So, in March, the Town Crier applied to the federal Small Business Administration (SBA) for several types of loans.

In mid-April, we learned that the Town Crier, although qualified for these loans, would not be receiving any because the SBA was out of money. When Congress voted to allocate more funds for the SBA loans two weeks ago, the Town Crier got back in line.

On Friday, May 1, we learned

from BBVA Bank that the Town Crier was to receive a Paycheck Protection Program loan — enough to deliver paychecks to our five employees for at least another two months.

In addition, the Idyllwild Town Crier will soon be operating out of its new office in Strawberry Creek Plaza at 54391 Village Center Drive, Unit 5, next door to Idyllwild Pharmacy.

This new location represents a considerable downsizing of our physical premises, but the operation and publication of the Town Crier newspaper will not be altered, and all current Town Crier employees will remain with us. We will be providing most of the same services to our community at a location that is more convenient to all.

Our office downsizing is a cost-saving move that coordinates with our Membership model by which so many of you Members are continuing to support your

community newspaper.

We feel we owe it to our Members to economize as much as possible so as to maximize the supporting effect of Membership contributions.

We at the Town Crier are committed to do all we can to serve our Members and readers by securing advertising, economizing on expenses and obtaining needed financing to keep the Town Crier serving our Hill community.

Another round of thanks to you faithful advertisers and Members for maintaining your support of your Hill's community newspaper during these tough times.

County Service Area 38 advisory committee was recently rendered inactive by the county, but the Town Crier continues to be the sole media monitor of the local public entities that are funded by your taxes and that make decisions and recommen-

dations as to how to spend more of those tax dollars.

So, during the month of May, the Town Crier will be on the move, and by May 31, we will be fully ensconced in our new home.

CSA 38 dissolution and advisory committee member criteria

When the Town Crier started looking into what was going on with County Service Area (CSA) 38 advisory committee and its make-up, an email was sent Feb. 28 to Opal Hellweg, legislative assistant to Third District Riverside County Supervisor Chuck Washington, the entity responsible for appointing individuals to fill the seats on the CSA 38 advisory committee.

The email asked: “Who is the nominee for each of the categories below and when do their terms expire? I retrieved this information from the [county] website. Looking at the criteria, someone who lives in Moreno Valley could be a member of CSA 38, correct? Why is there a representative nominated from the volunteer fire department that no longer exists? Will that spot be eliminated, and if not, why?”

The county’s website has this information posted:

- “Member criteria:
- “Qualifications for appointment: Members shall be at least eighteen (18) years of age and a resident of the County of Riverside.
- “Term of office: Four (4) Years.
- “Number of Appointees: Six (6) Members appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- Composition:
 - One (1) member nominated by the Pine Cove County Water District;
 - One (1) member nominated by the Pine Cove Property Owners Association;
 - One (1) member nominated by the Pine

- Cove Volunteer Fire Department;
 - Two (2) members and one (1) alternate member (effective 1/08) selected at large.”
- The advisory committee was dissolved at the last Riverside County Supervisors meeting on April 21 citing: “ ... since the Pine Cove Advisory Committee [CSA 38] was established in 1976, there have been significant changes in the services provided within County Service Area No. 38, most notable change being that the fire protection services in the area are no longer provided by a volunteer fire department; and whereas, the needs that existed when the Pine Cove Advisory Committee was established have since diminished considerably, thereby diminishing the need for the Pine Cove Advisory Committee.”
- Now Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire provides fire protection and American Medical Response provides ambulance service for the Pine Cove area.

The Town Crier sent the above with the only received response from Hellweg after a follow-up email was sent on March 4: “I apologize for the delayed response. Actually, I am doing some research on the formation documents on CSA 38 and will connect back with you soon.”

The newspaper sent another follow-up email on April 24 and received the following response April 27: “Please see the attached Board of Supervisor’s documents regarding the dissolution of CSA 38 advisory committee.”

“I want to rescind our rescinding,” Perez said at one point.

The four orders on the agenda were:

- Order of the Health Officer Closing All Schools, Community Colleges, Colleges and Universities from March 16, 2020 through June 19, 2020;
- Order of the Health Officer Related to Short-term Lodging Facilities through June 19, 2020;
- Order of the Health Officer for the County of Riverside and the Director of Emergency Services Placing Restrictions on Golf Course Use;
- Order of the Health Officer for the County of Riverside and the Director of Emergency Services requiring the use of face coverings and practice of social distancing.


“Rescinding this order does not open the schools,” said Spiegel.

In the document accompanying the agenda item, which was moved up closer to the beginning of the meeting due to the amount of public comment on the item, Spiegel and Perez wrote the following: “In recognition of the need to transition to economic recovery, we continue to position the county to reopen businesses. Keep in mind, rescinding these orders does not negate the governor’s orders, as those are still in place. Any changes to the governor’s order will be provided from the state.”

Third District Riverside County Supervisor Chuck Washington, who represents the Idyllwild area, commented during the discussion that they should urge people to comply with wearing a mask or face covering instead of requiring people to wear a mask or face covering because he thinks if the county asks, people will comply.

Rep. Raul Ruiz, M.D., CA-36, released the following on the eve of the meeting: “Removing precautions too early and without safeguards will only harm individuals and the economy in our community further. We haven’t yet hit our coronavirus peak, our valley hospital COVID-19 occupancy rates are going up again, and we don’t have the safeguards like enough rapid testing, contact tracing, isolation systems, business and worker safety measures or enforcement mechanisms in place to prevent or contain new flare ups.

“The governor clearly stated that the counties must tailor their approach to their realities and readiness. Riverside County and in particular the Coachella Valley, have one of the highest risks and vulnerabilities given our demographics, population and industries. We should not default down to the state’s minimal floor precautions but should have precautions and safeguards in place that reflect our data, risks, and vulnerabilities. We must have a comprehensive, well-defined strategy and safeguards in place to begin gradually reopening the economy and transitioning to our new normal in a safe way that that can contain a flare up, prevent loss of life and keep our businesses open.”

For those in need of behavioral health assistance, you may utilize a computer and smartphone app called TakeMyHand.co. You may also contact 2-1-1 or call the behavioral health CARES line at 800-706-7500. A 24/7 free, confidential crisis or suicide intervention service can be reached at 951-686-HELP (4357).

Riverside County launched an economic recovery task force that is expected to be in place for 18 months to provide recommendations to the Board of Supervisors on re-starting the local economy.

“Representing each of the five supervisorial districts and regions of the county, the task force draws upon the established business expertise and resources from local chambers of commerce, tourism bureaus, industry leaders and public sector partners,” a press release from the county stated. “County staff members from the Economic Development Department and Transportation and Land Management Agency will work alongside the task force to support the critically important objectives of the task force.”

The county is allowing limited access to community pools as of April 24. The pools can only have one swimmer at a time and no groups around. If a child is using the pool, an adult can be present to supervise. The county is working to revise the guidance for clarification, but the revision was not received by press time and may be addressed at the Friday, May 8 special Riverside County Board of Supervisors meeting.

The county is allowing drive-up religious services to occur. The order was amended April 17. The county asks that social distancing be maintained, people stay in their vehicles and do not interact with others. The county had previously allowed drive-up services for Easter weekend only.

The county is allowing non-contact outdoor activities (with restrictions) such as: golf, tennis, equestrian activities, hiking, biking and pickleball, in a revised order that had previously closed golf courses to aid in containing the spread of COVID-19.

Under this revised order, social distancing must be maintained and face coverings must be worn at all times. Large gatherings are prohibited until June 20. The county still prohibits the use of picnic tables, playgrounds, team sports or other similar public events and gatherings, according to the April 20 press release.

Enforcement

The order for social distancing and wearing a face covering was extended through June 19. Beginning May 1, the county will follow Gov. Gavin Newsom’s Stay-at-Home order as it pertains to gatherings. The press release issued by the county reads: “The governor’s order states that all California residents must stay home unless they are engaged in an essential business or activity, such as grocery shopping or visiting the doctor.

“The governor’s order does not have an expiration date. As soon as the governor releases the Stay-at-Home order, Riverside County will be ready to move into the governor’s second phase of reopening businesses.”

“This is a valid order and enforceable by fine, imprisonment or both,” said Riverside County Sheriff Chad Bianco in a message he posted on social media. “However, I need to make it perfectly clear to all residents of Riverside County. We will not be setting up any type of police state and this is not a declaration of martial law in Riverside County. Riverside County Sheriff’s deputies will not be stopping vehicles or setting checkpoints for motorists. We will not be stopping you while on a walk with your kids or while you’re out running or hiking.”

If you see nonessential businesses operating at this time, you are able to report them to the county. Complaints should be made to DOCLiaisonOfficer@rivco.org, 951-351-6866 or RivCoMobile App. The county asks that you have detailed information on the location. The county also banned short-term lodging until June 19 unless it is being used to contain and mitigate COVID-19.

COVID-19 testing

COVID-19 testing has been expanded to those without symptoms.

Residents need to call 800-945-6171 to make an appointment over the phone for testing at all five locations — Coachella Valley, Harvest Christian Fellowship church in Riverside, Perris Fairgrounds, Blythe Fairgrounds and Lake Elsinore. Those seeking tests at the Lake Elsinore (state testing site) location are encouraged to use the website <https://www.projectbaseline.com/study/covid-19/> for appointments but may use the above-mentioned phone number.

More state testing sites are operational in Riverside County. To make an appointment, visit <https://lhi.care/covidtesting> or call 888-634-1123. Testing is available for everyone, regardless of insurance or immigration status, and is no cost to the resident, according to the May 5 press release. The eight additional state testing locations are in Perris (two), Norco, Mecca, Riverside, Beaumont, Desert Hot Springs and Hemet.

“Testing is a top priority of Riverside County and the

State of California, and I am pleased with this incredible partnership with the state to expand testing,” said Riverside County Board Chair and Fourth District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez. “I am particularly glad we will have testing sites in Desert Hot Springs and Mecca, two communities with high need and essential workers on the front lines. Testing is for everyone, regardless of immigration status, and it is free. I encourage everyone to make an appointment, get tested and help our county and state continue to make progress on this crucial aspect of our coronavirus efforts.”

The newspaper reached out to county health to find out how far out appointments were being made before we went to print a few weeks ago. Several people contacted the newspaper saying it was taking two weeks to get tested. It was stated during the Riverside County Board of Supervisors meeting on May 5 that the Lake Elsinore and Perris locations have same day appointments available. The Indio and Harvest Christian Fellowship church in Riverside locations have appointments available beginning May 8.

Hemet Global Medical Center opened the first private COVID-19 drive-up testing site in Riverside County. You can make an appointment by calling 951-765-4757.

Local entities update

Fern Valley Water District: The office is closed to the public.

Idyllwild Community Center: ICC has closed all of its programs (including sports, senior fitness and childcare) for the time being.

Idyllwild Fire Protection District: The front office is closed to the general public, but all administrative operations will stay the same, such as building permits and inspections. The district is operating business as usual. When responding to calls where patients exhibit COVID-19 and flu-like symptoms, personnel will be using personal protective equipment. The patient will be handed a mask to put on themselves and personnel will then evaluate the patient in the back of the ambulance. If personnel need to go inside a residence, they will limit the length of time they are inside.

Idyllwild HELP Center and Thrift store: Check their Facebook page for updates.

Idyllwild Library: The library is closed to the public. All online services are still up and running. Staff are available for Live Chat or Ask a Librarian reference from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday through the Riverside County Library System website at <http://www.rivco.lib.ca.us/>.

rivlib.info. Branches are currently not answering phones. All books currently checked out are being automatically renewed through at least June 7 and will continue to be renewed as needed so no late fees incur. The library is not accepting any book returns and will not accept any items left on the curb.

Idyllwild Pharmacy: Contact the pharmacy at 961-659-2135 or by sending an email to idyllwildpharmacy@verizon.net to request prescriptions or over-the-counter items. Check the Idyllwild Pharmacy Facebook page for updates on hours.

Idyllwild Town Crier: The newspaper is still open, but our office is closed to the public. Printing, faxing and all in-person services are on hold until our office can reopen. Contact information is on page A4.

Idyllwild Water District: The district’s office is closed to the public.

Lake Hemet Campground: Day use and RV camping as of May 1. Check <https://lakehemetrecreation.com/> for guidelines.

Pine Cove Water District: The district’s office is closed.

Riverside County offices: Most county buildings are closed to in-person visits. County government will continue to provide services. Visit county department websites or call for assistance on how to complete requests online, over the phone or through the mail.

Riverside County Parks: Riverside County Regional Park and Open-Space District (RivCoParks) did a limited re-opening of parks under last week’s Riverside County Public Health orders. Parking lots are now open to support activities in regional parks and on trails. Social distancing and face coverings are still required when out in the public. Guests may not use playgrounds, picnic tables, nor play team sports, participate in gatherings or any public events. Regional parks and open-space areas are open for day use, however sports parks, nature centers and historic sites remain closed to the public. Parks and trails will continue to be monitored for compliance and if areas are inundated with people and distancing cannot be maintained, the need for closures will be re-evaluated.

State parks: All campgrounds, museums and visitors centers are closed and all events are canceled until further notice. Some parks are closed, including parking. All vehicle access is closed for all remaining parks. Visit www.parks.ca.gov/FlattenTheCurve for a list of closures.

Urgent action needed to prevent a COVID-19 outbreak in Idyllwild

EDITOR:

I was very troubled to see the large crowd of weekend motorcyclists outside of the Lumber Mill restaurant this Saturday.

There were 20 to 40 people at various times, packed closely together and not wearing masks. While I welcome these visitors to our town, the lack of compliance with social distancing poses an immediate threat to our safety.

I am aware of only three reported cases of COVID-19 in Idyllwild. This suggests that we do not yet have the numbers of infected people that leads to community spread.

However, the arrival of visitors from all over the region is likely to dramatically increase cases unless orders from the Riverside County Office of Public Health are enforced.

The restaurant manager said that he asked the people outside to socially distance as instructed but got lit-

tle compliance.

I then spoke to a sergeant at the Hemet Sheriff's office, who said that they are not enforcing the county's orders and that it was his department's policy to take an “educational approach” to deal with the public.

When I continued to express concern for the safety of Idyllwild residents, the sergeant commented that the visitors were exercising their First Amendment rights to congregate.

I pointed out that the visitors were not protesting against Stay-at-Home orders, certainly their right. Rather, they were just some nice folks having lunch, but failing to comply with the orders.

Later, I reflected on this puzzling comment from a law enforcement sergeant who I would expect to be well versed in the First Amendment and civil rights law. Was he suggesting that I was only engaging in the political disagreement currently playing out on the evening news?

I believe that there are legitimate questions about the need to save our economy as well as our lives. Fortunately, the Stay-at-Home orders are designed to save both lives and the economy.

Virtually all of the epidemiologists believe that these policies are needed to make the reopening of businesses possible. I feel the pain that our beautiful little tourist town has experienced the past few years and hope that we do not lose any more of our wonderful businesses.

I am asking that Idyllwild town leaders immediately look into this problem and determine the legal issues involved and the enforcement and educational options available to the town before the arrival more visitors..

CSA 38 dissolution

EDITOR:

I was dismayed to see that County Service Area (CSA) 38 was dissolved by the County Board of Supervisors. This advisory committee always worked hard to keep Pine Cove safe: masticator for fuel breaks, fire hydrant improvement, over-the-side and EMT equipment, a concrete pad for hose cleaning, etc. Then I see criticism of committee members because they are so community minded that they volunteer for more than one committee. The critics should volunteer themselves instead of complaining. Is this a reason to eliminate one of these?

Understand that fire hydrants are not used by wa-

ter districts. They are used by fire departments. On occasions, water districts check the hydrants and clear out adjacent water lines. At an Idyllwild Water District meeting, I heard an argument as to who should lubricate the hydrants: the water district or the fire department. In Pine Cove the water district does it.

To quote the Town Crier [Opal Hellweg, legislative

assistant to Riverside County Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington] “the dissolution of the advisory committee does not impact the funds collected for CSA 38 ... without the need for an advisory committee and all the resources a committee needs.”

County oversight took 10% of the CSA funds and since the unpaid volunteer advisory committee is out, the county will take not only 10% but all of the funds without any input from the community. I understand that auditing of these funds is long overdue and that there is quite a discrepancy between the reports and the actual balance.

Did the county get tired of CSA 38 advisors asking where the funds had gone or where the equipment purchased with CSA 38 funds was being used? If the masticator is being used all over the county, the county should have bought it. I can remember asking for years: What does this line item mean? The county overseer responded that it is “just a place holder to make the balance right.” He said this every time I asked, and I never got a straight answer. With this attitude and without an audit, I can see how the county has a discrepancy.

The members of CSA 38 advisory committee are intelligent, experienced people committed to the safety and welfare of Pine Cove and the fire department. They advised the wise use of county tax funds for the benefit of the people of Pine Cove. Now, are our taxes just part of an unaudited slush fund to be used by the county at their whim?

He crossed the middle of the roadway resulting in a head-on collision with Stanton Ford Greene, 86 of Rancho Mirage, who was driving southbound on Scenic Drive at 10-15 mph in his gray 2008 Infiniti M45. Greene and his passenger were transported to a local hospital by AMR with minor injuries. The vehicle was towed by Palms to Pines. Fischer was uninjured and his vehicle was towed by a private tow company.

Idy's Helping Hands delivers meals and more

Idy's Helping Hands (IHH) is a 501(c)(3) group with the number one goal of enriching the lives of the seniors and adult residents with disabilities. Through compassion, socialization and emotional support, IHH has been successful in doing so.

"Our team is inspired by their love for the elderly, professional experience and a desire to be of service in the community," said Founder, Executive Director and Treasurer Debbie Daniels. "With aging-in-place as our guiding purpose, we are passionate about our mission."

Since it was founded in July of 2018, IHH is providing service to about 70 to 80 people here on the mountain — from errands and shopping assistance to resource connections and paperwork assistance, socializing, wellness checks and leisurely activities.

With COVID-19 causing many organizations to change how they operate, IHH is in the same boat. Part of what IHH provides with socialization is in-person interaction.

Unfortunately, during these challenging times things have changed.

"We can't have any facetime contact, so we drop everything at their door," Daniels explained. "We are still doing grocery shopping and pharmacy runs. We provide transportation to their doctor's appointments as well."

In addition to that, IHH has filled a void for hot meal deliveries. Similar to Meals on Wheels America but run by the community and volunteers. Meals on Wheels America doesn't service the Idyllwild area, so Daniels realized the need for such a service, especially with the COVID-19 Stay-at-Home order.

"Now what we are doing is we've gotten into meal deliveries and care package delivery," Daniels stated. "We delivered 35 casseroles in a week and multiple care packages."

The care packages include essentials like bleach, laundry detergent, dish soap, facial tissue, toilet paper, paper towels, mask, gloves and wipes.

Sammy Busby, IHH volunteer, explained how people are willing and ready to help but funding is needed.

"As we transition to meal delivery, thankfully we have the volunteers wanting to deliver and restaurants willing to provide food," Busby said. "What we need now is funding. Currently, we have a budget for 30 residents one meal a day,

for five days. That's not enough to cover everyone that needs help."

IHH has about 10 active volunteers and another 10 to 15 that want to help.

Funding would provide the restaurants the money they need and it would provide the seniors in the community a variety of meals.

IHH spoke to Annie Weaver at The Red Kettle and Lori Ferro at Ferro and Idyllwild Brewpub already. Both Weaver and Ferro are both on board to help, they just need the funding to do so.

"The reason I reached out to the restaurants is they could use the business now," Daniels said. "They have the industrial kitchens, and in the long term, we want a strong foundation and a professional system. This would help build that from the start."

The seniors and those with disabilities are grateful for the help and for the company.

Busby recalled his interaction with one senior on a recent meal delivery, "When I was delivering in Royal Pines, a senior came up to me and she asked, 'Are you the ones delivering the food to the seniors?' She was really excited and it was really exciting for me. It feels good to be able to help them."

Every meal delivered is a healthy serving for two people. In addition, Amy Andres McMahon has been donating a featured donut each week to be included with each delivery and Pete and Suzon Capparelli donated citrus from the orchard on their property.

"Right now, we can only afford to do the meals once a week due to financial restraints," Daniels explained. "We provide other services as we can. We check on people once or twice a week to do our other services."

With volunteers out delivering to more and more seniors, they are also identifying people who will need help in the near future.

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced the Great Plates Delivered program that will provide three free meals per day for seniors who are at high risk due to COVID-19. The program, as of press time, is still in pending status. High-risk individuals and restaurants with food delivery in place were en-

couraged to apply online. The Red Kettle applied.

"We are identifying residents that will need help after the pandemic is over also," Daniels said. "We probably have identified 15 to 20 people that would fit our original mission statement — to age-in-place and not need to leave the Hill."

During this time, we all need to pull together and help one another. It helps those that need it and it provides those that are helping or volunteering their time a sense of pride by helping someone in need.

Daniels commented, "Helping people is so amazing, isn't it? I've never been so busy, doing so many different things and loving every single minute of it. I love our seniors. This town and the people that are in it are awesome. I'm so grateful. My heart is full."

Pathfinder Ranch looks to future

Pathfinder Ranch in Garner Valley was founded in 1964. The nonprofit 501(c) (3) is on an 80-acre property that backs up to the national forest, providing plenty of space for outdoor activities and education. With summer around the corner, Pathfinder is doing its best to figure out a solution during the COVID-19 pandemic. Currently, Pathfinder is closed and only eight of about 34 employees that would normally be working this time of year are working from home. “The hope is that we can offer some kind of programming this summer,” Pathfinder Ranch Executive Director Chris Fife said. “We recognize the position that everyone is in, and even though camp might not be normal this summer, I think that it’s important for the kids.” Fife spoke to me during a phone interview about Pathfinder’s diverse programs and some of the activities offered. “For summer camp, we are mostly recreation based,” explained Fife. “They learn horseback riding, rock climbing, arts and crafts, canoeing, archery and we have a challenge course. Then during the school year, we offer outdoor education to fifth- and sixth-graders mostly.” Besides their summer program and outdoor education program, Pathfinder also rents out space to a variety of

youth groups, community groups and support groups. Fife explained how satisfying it is to provide a positive yet challenging experience to kids and adults. “We get quite a few

local kids but getting to see the variety of children that aren’t from here or used to the mountains is really fun to see,” said Fife. “Some haven’t seen horses or goats, or even where an egg comes from other than the store. I’ve had adults come visit 30 to 40 years after they attended camp as a child and the memories come flooding because it made such an impact on them.” In total, between 8,000 to 9,000 students a year attend. The outdoor education program during the school year hosts 5,000 to 6,000 students and the summer camp hosts about 1,500 kids. The remainder is dispersed throughout other programs. Last year, Pathfinder hosted students from 70 schools in 17 school districts throughout Southern California, as well as various private schools.

Pathfinder also offers performance art class and nighttime activities such as night hikes and astronomy. There is a small farm and a nature center on the property. A planetarium, the site’s newest addition, was built last year, all part of Pathfinder’s adventure program. “We have 17 horses on site,” Fife said. “In the farm, kids get to learn about how to care for different types of animals like the horses and goats. They get to pet, feed and groom them. In our nature center, we have reptiles and mammals and students can hold a snake, turtle and a chinchilla.

“It’s funny to see a kid who might not be very fond of snakes and watch their attitude change once they get to hold one,” Fife said. With the reptiles, students get to learn about the skeletal structure, the reptile’s environment and native versus non-native species. They also learn about the different types of animals in the farm, how they’ve adapted to the domestic lifestyle, including predator versus prey. “Everybody likes the cute animals but they also get to see the beauty in the reptiles and it’s a whole different type of beauty,” Fife said. “Or they see a horse and it’s huge size and think, ‘How am I going to control this animal?’ I get to empower these kids and helping the kids try new things is really fun and important.”

The summer camp allows the kids to get out on their own and learn some independence while in a safe environment. They have the opportunity to take some controlled risks and learn new skills while meeting new people. “Sometimes the scariest thing is learning how to make new friends that are different from you, but the kids learn about the similarities they all share,” Fife explained. “If they want, they can reinvent themselves since they don’t know anyone. It’s really satisfying to be a part of that program.” The outdoor education program incorporates the teachers and parents. The kids get to stretch and learn alongside their teachers, who are possibly going through the same challenges as the students.

“They get to create relationships with the kids that they wouldn’t in a classroom setting,” Fife explained. “Sometimes the adults are more excited than the kids.” Pathfinder is hoping to create activities if it can be done safely and are open to input from the public. “We are trying to figure out what the community needs and how to fill those needs,” Fife said. “We are going to continue to offer scholarships so kids can attend. We accept donations, which can be done through our website under the donate tab. We are always grateful for the support if they are able to. We will stretch our donation dollars the best we can.”

Overall, Pathfinder Ranch gets kids involved in nature, teaches them skills and hands-on experiences at a level that they will carry into their adult lives. If you would like to make a donation or reach out to Pathfinder Ranch, you may do so at pathfinderranch.com.

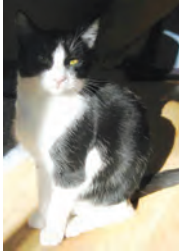

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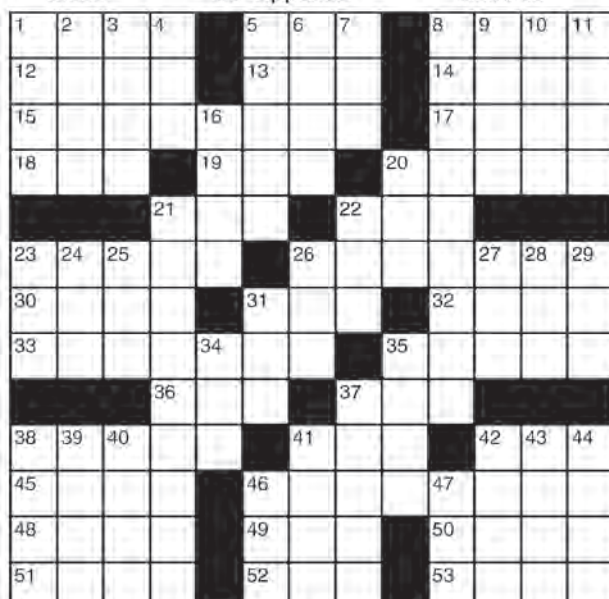
