
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

Illegal campfires are on the rise

It's no secret that the outdoors have become a popular choice to relieve some of the pressures people face in their daily lives. With a recent increase in visitation to the San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF), firefighting personnel and land managers are growing increasingly concerned about the uptick in illegal campfires that have sprung up all over the forest. Year to date, forest officers have documented an over 150% increase, from 33 in 2019 to 87 in 2020.

Campfires built on the ground, or ground fires, are always prohibited on the San Bernardino National Forest because they can escape or reignite after a visitor extinguishes them and leaves. It's what one cannot see underground and control that begs a different story than one might intend. Often thinking it's been extinguished, fires can and have smoldered underground and reignited dead leaf matter or even tree roots. All it takes is a gust of wind to get it going again where it can quickly grow into a full-blown wildfire threatening not only the forest's resources and private properties, but the people who live, work and play in the forest as well.

Under current fire restrictions, building, maintaining, attending or using a campfire is only allowed in fire rings provided by the Forest Service at open developed recreation sites, such as campgrounds and yellow post sites. (Yellow post sites are individual campsites with a fire ring and picnic table; they are not attached to a campground).

The same goes for wood or charcoal barbecues. The prohibited use has also increased, most notably in Lytle Creek and Mill Creek. Grilling with wood or charcoal is only allowed in barbecues provided by the Forest Service in open developed recreation sites, such as picnic areas, with a California Campfire Permit.

Those looking to grill or have a dispersed campfire do have an option. Portable stoves and campfire rings that have a fuel shut-off valve and only burns gas, kerosene, jellied petroleum or pressurized liquid fuel are allowed. Úsers must have a California Campfire Permit and must be at least five feet away from vegetation.

California Campfire Permits are free and can be obtained online after watching a short, educational video from Cal Fire.

A citation for violating fire restrictions prompts a mandatory court appearance. It is a federal offense punishable as a Class B misdemeanor, by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual or \$10,000 for an organization or imprisonment for not more than six months or both.

"We know everyone enjoys having campfires while recreating outdoors," said SBNF Fire Chief Jaime Gamboa. "However, the public needs to be mindful of the conditions and where they are wanting to have campfires, in order to be safe."

Area has additional case

According to the Riverside University Health System (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has seven cases of COVID-19 as of press time. The first reported case for the area was on April 3. No deaths have been reported for the area since the outbreak.

Riverside County is unable to prode recovery data by area. It is known at this time how many of the seven cases are still active.

Riverside County Public Health hosted a one-day ĆOVID-19 mobile testing site at the Idyllwild Library on Tuesday, June 16 from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The county was able to test up to 150 people. According to the county, it is uncertain at this time as to whether a mobile unit will return at a future date.

As of press time on June 16, Riverside County has 11,694 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 395 deaths related to COVID-19 and 6,165 people have recovered. There are 237 individuals being hospitalized and of those 65 are in the intensive care unit (ICU).

As of press time June 9, River-

side County had 9,590 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 365 deaths related to COVID-19 and 5,466 people had recovered. There were 220 individuals being hospitalized and of those 71 were in the ICU.

As of press time June 2, Riverside County had 8,155 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 342 deaths related to COVID-19 and 4,804 people had recovered. There were 203 ndividuals being hospitalized and of those 62 were in the ICU.

To date, 159,287 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The age range with the most confirmed cases in the county is still those between the ages of 40 and 64. However, the 18- to 39-year-old age group is catching up.

Kim Saruwatari, director of Riverside County Public Health, spoke about the health disparities within Riverside County at a recent press conference: "While we are not seeing the same levels of COVID-19 disparities as have been reported elsewhere, we at public health have seen the health disparities that have taken the toll on communities

Grant from ICF expands free transportation

Mountain residents needing transportation and victims of the Cranston Fire received funds from the Idyllwild Community Fund (ICF).

The Forest Folk, Inc. qualified for a \$3,500 ICF grant last December to aid in the expansion of the Idyllwild Shuttle program. The shuttle transports residents for free.

Reba Coulter, treasurer and project manager of Forest Folk, Inc., wrote a letter to the ICF expressing gratitude for the grant which allowed the group to expand shuttle service to the weekly food share at Mountain Center and retain the program's driver.


Coulter also wrote: "Knowing that many, if not most of our permanent residents, suffered greatly because of the Cranston Fire, little did we know how greatly that this service was going to be needed. These funds were largely responsible for helping to retain our driver who, in turn, helped keep the shuttle service in operation. Who could have predicted the pandemic we are now suffering through?"

Between April and May, the Idyllwild HELP Center received \$7,590 in grant money to assist victims of the Cranston Fire. Contact the HELP Center for information about assistance programs if you were impacted by the Cranston Fire.

of color show up in higher rates of heart disease, diabetes, certain cancers and low infant birth weight. These are issues creat-ed by a system that discriminates against a segment of the population and has taken generations to get us to where we are now. This must change." According to the RUHS website, Hispanics/Latinos have at least double the amount of cases per 100,000 of other ethnic and racial groups.

The online festival will include free public performances on Facebook Live, an "In Conversation" series with featured artists, open masterclasses, and special events.







Collision on Highway 74

There was one collision on Highway 74, according to California Highway Patrol Public Information Of-

ficer Matt Napier. On June 14 at 2:45 a.m. Rodrigo Cuellar, 27 of San Jacinto, was driving his red 2016 Dodge Journey westbound on Highway 74 just west of Dry Creek at a stated speed of 35 mph. Steele cut at Charles Schwab

In the first PGA Tour tournament after a three-month COVID-19-caused layoff, Brendan Steele had a rough go at the Charles Schwab Challenge.

He was cut after posting a 4-over-par 71-73 — 144 over the first two days. The Idyllwild native wasn't alone. Notable players including Phil Mickelson, Ricky Fowler, John Rahm and Matt Kuchar were also cut.

Brendan boomed drives averaging 320 yards but only 32% found fairways. He hit 58% of greens in regulation but his putter wasn't helping him vis-à-vis the rest of the field.

Steele is not listed in the field of this week's tournament.

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PUBLISHER EDITORIAL PCWD GM attacks Town Crier accuracy

Along with Town Crier (TC) Editor Melissa Diaz Hernandez, I attended the June 10 meeting of the board of Pine Cove Water District (PCWD), one of the seven local public agencies the Idyllwild Town Crier monitors to keep the public informed.

It seems the Town Crier editor is being excoriated by PCWD for legally and appropriately making press inquiries.

A major subject — seemingly THE major subject — of discussion was an article written by Diaz Hernandez appearing in

In that piece, TC's editor had reported that, utilizing the California Public Records Act, she had requested documents relating to any bids the district had received for "Repairs to Heater and new duct work in shop" and for "Install new filter rack with upgraded filter" at PCWD. The district responded, "There are no documents responsive to your request." So, PCWD did not send that work out for bids. Instead, the work was simply given to Idyllwild Heating and Air Conditioning, which is owned by the brother of PCWD General Manager Jerry Holldber. Diaz Hernandez pointed out this fraternal connection in the June 4 issue.

Now, California law does not require that a public district's maintenance and repair work amounting to less than \$15,000 in parts and labor be sent out to bid, and Diaz Hernandez did not say it did. But nothing prevents a public district like PCWD from sending lesser jobs out for bidding or, at least, spreading its work around local businesses. Holldber's brother's company is not the only heating and air conditioning company on the Hill. Mountain Mechanical on Upper Pine Crest also does such work.

In a previous story and mentioned again in the June 4 story, Diaz Hernandez reported that PCWD Director Vicki Jakubac had voted to approve an expenditure to SoCal Propane, of which her husband is a part-owner, instead of recusing herself from that vote.

California Government Code section 87100, the very first section in Chapter 7, which is entitled "Conflicts of Interests," provides: "No public official at any level of state or local government shall make, participate in making or in any way attempt to use his official position to influence a governmental decision in which he knows or has reason to know he has a financial interest." And section 87103 provides: "A public official has a financial interest in a decision within the meaning of Section 87100 if it is reasonably foreseeable that the decision will have a material financial effect, distinguishable from its effect on the public generally, on the official, [or] a member of his or her immediate family ..."

Yet — at least according to PCWD President Robert Hewitt — PCWD's attorney, Brad Neufeld, opined that Jakubac's vote constituted no conflict of interest? Neufeld once was an instructor at a class attended by both Holldber and my co-publisher that addressed the very topic of conflicts of interest. Attorney Neufeld must be aware of the above two Government Code sections. It is further notable that Jakubac says in the future she will not be voting on any matters involving her husband's company.

Also, in the June 4 article, Diaz Hernandez reported that she had sought receipts for expenses under an \$18,000 PCWD allocation for "transportation and travel," since she had noticed Fern Valley Water District allocates only \$1,500 under such a category. At the meeting, Holldber explained that PCWD includes diesel fuel for its heavy equipment under "transportation and travel." Since Fern Valley lists its corresponding fuel under "operating expenses," is anybody surprised that Diaz Hernandez would inquire about this obvious disparity in allocated transportation and travel amounts between the two water districts? Yet Holldber criticized Diaz Hernandez's article as if inquiring into this under the California Public Records Act were something only an unworthy newspaper would do.

At the June 10 PCWD meeting, Holldber attacked the Town Crier, saying he wanted and expected, but apparently does not feel he is getting "accuracy" in the TC's news coverage of PCWD.

Yet, neither Holldber nor anyone else has yet pointed out a single instance of factual inaccuracy in Diaz Hernandez's June 4 piece. I'll say it again: Neither Holldber nor anyone else has yet pointed out a single instance of factual inaccuracy in Diaz Hernandez's June 4 piece.

It seems the Town Crier editor is being excoriated by PCWD for legally and appropriately making press inquiries.

PCWD certainly does not like to see it printed in the Town Crier that PCWD sent work to GM Holldber's brother, that a PCWD director voted to approve an expenditure to her husband's company, and that the Town Crier editor investigated the 12-fold disparity between the budget monies two local water districts had allocated for transportation and

Well, since PCWD doesn't like to see that in print, why did they do it? Why simply award jobs to Holldber's brother? Why accept Jakubac's vote regarding her husband's company without someone speaking up? Why list your heavy equipment diesel fuel under "transportation and travel" instead of "operating expenses" and then climb all over Diaz Hernandez when she inquired into the oddly disparate transportation and travel allocations between the two districts?



Audrey Carver, 21 of Idyllwild, has been quite the artist for most of her life, which makes sense considering how much talent this small town produces.

Carver was born in Flagstaff, Arizona, and moved with her family to Idyllwild before the age of two. She spent her pre-kindergarten time with Kathy Lewis at Lil Critters Child Care before attending Idyllwild School. Carver spent all nine years at Idyllwild School, promoting out as a "Hillbilly."

Carver became interested in visual art at a very young age and her passion has only grown as she's turned into a young adult. While some artists have specific reasons for why they do their art, Carver had a more interesting answer when I asked what it was about art that she loved so much.

'I can't remember ever wanting or choosing to do art, I just did it," Carver said. "I think art is so important for so many different reasons, but it's such a part of me. I don't feel like I actively choose to do it, I just do it."

Due to her passion for visual arts, Carver chose to attend the Idyllwild Arts Academy as a visual arts major graduating as the class valedictorian in 2017.

Wanting to expand and learn more about different parts of the world, Carver applied and was accepted into Tufts University in Boston, Massachusetts.

Carver didn't waste any time getting out and exploring the world. She went from Idyllwild to Ecuador. "Going to Ecuador was a gap-year program offered through Tufts," Carver said. "They organized the trip. After being in Idyllwild for 18 years, I wanted to try

something completely different."

During her time in Ecuador she lived with a host family. "I spoke no Spanish, so I learned Spanish," admitted Carver. "I worked at a culinary school teaching English while also learning how to cook. It was beautiful and it was such a wonderful experience."

As Carver was learning to cook, she learned about Ecuador's delicacy – guinea pig.

"Their national delicacy is a guinea pig," Carver said. "The first time I saw that I was kind of traumatized because I'm a vegetarian, but they don't taste terrible."

Now in her sophomore year at Tufts, Carver enrolled in an interdisciplinary program that allows students to create their own major.

Associates meeting features Marianne Kent-Stoll

The Associates of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation, aka The Associates, held its monthly meeting via Zoom video conference on Monday, June 8. Marianne Kent-Stoll, vice president of educational programs at Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA), was the featured speaker as part of the ongoing Spotlight on Leadership series.

Kent-Stoll spoke about the school's response to the coronavirus pandemic and plans for the future. IAA decided to close a week before Riverside County schools and then worked through the difficult logistics of getting students to their home countries and states in a time of restricted travel.

They succeeded and then instituted online learning and a virtual graduation.

Since then, the faculty and administration have been working overtime to respond to these unprecedented times. Web-based learning, made popular by Sal Kahn, founder of the Kahn Academy, has thus far had limited application in arts education. However, IAA aspires to be at the forefront of this newly necessitated hybrid approach to education in music, dance, creative writing, fashion design, theatre, film and digital media, visual arts and "InterArts" that make up the major concentrations of study available at the school, in addition, of course, to the typical high school curriculum.

The challenges of operating a boarding high school with students from over 30 countries are legion in normal See Associates, page B6

"I'm an Art and Human Ecology Major, focusing on environmental science, anthropology and visual art," Carver explained.

As COVID-19 brought education to a standstill, Carver came back to Idyllwild in March and is staying with her family until she can go back to school. Being back in Idyllwild after being away has given Carver a new outlook on the tiny town she grew up in.

"I honestly didn't realize how special Idyllwild was until I left. Being with the same 24 kids all through school, by the time I graduated, I was angsty and wanting to get away," Carver explained. "Then I realized Idyllwild is a place where everybody loves you. I know all my teachers, friends and neighbors. Knowing everyone will take care of you is a beautiful thing and I realized how important it is to have 3,000 people who love you and will be there for you."

Living in Ecuador and Boston has been a challenge,

but a good experience for Carver.

"It was really hard to be in a big city," admitted Carver. "I think I've adjusted to not having the same kind of community, but I love Boston and I really loved Ecuador. I think I've learned I'll be able to find my feet wherever I go."

Carver has also found an interest in journalism and writes a column for The Tufts Daily, which is an independent student newspaper on campus.

"I honestly feel like it's similar to art because it's communicating to the world," said Carver. "I have a column where I interview the campus bus drivers and police, just about their lives. Some have these crazy and interesting stories. I do some illustration for a culinary magazine also because I'm in a cooking club. Writing the column has made me more compassionate and aware of how we shape and move in society."

As Carver continues to explore the world and all it

has to offer, her future looks bright.

"Currently there is a plan in place to study in Spain, and I plan to finish my degree," Carver said. "I'm still learning what is out there and just exploring it all."

She offered some words of advice for young people that have grown up in Idyllwild, "For people graduating from Idyllwild I'd like to say, don't take for granted where you're coming from. Don't be afraid to go far, but don't be afraid to come back either. I can see myself coming back to Idyllwild someday."


