Three people now missing

Unfortunately, a third person has been added to the list of missing persons linked to Idyllwild or the surrounding areas since the beginning of the year.

According to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD), Rosario Garcia was last seen July 7 wearing a brown shirt and blue jeans at the 26000 block of Katherine Street in Hemet. It's possible she suffers from dementia or Alzheimer's disease. Garcia is a 73-year-old Hispanic female. She is 5' 3" tall and 120 pounds.

Palm Desert deputies from the RCSD were dispatched to the area of 70000 East Highway 74 in Pinyon Pines at 11:46 a.m. on July 9 after Garcia's vehicle was found unoccupied. Garcia was not located after a search of the area was conducted.

"We are asking if anyone has any information or knows the whereabouts of Rosario Garcia to contact law enforcement immediately," wrote Deanna Pecoraro, correctional sergeant with RCSD, in an email.

Earlier in the year, local Roy Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. on the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

RCSD Deputy Jeremy Parsons said, "After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, See Missing, page A6

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE

More businesses have to move operations outdoors or close

With an increase in cases and hospitalizations, the county was ordered by the state to close more businesses if those businesses could not operate outdoors.

The area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 10 cases since the outbreak of COVID-19, the same number reported when the newspaper went to print last week, according to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website. No deaths have been reported for the area since the outbreak.

Because Riverside County is unable to provide recovery data by area, it is unknown how many of the 10 total cases are active since the area's first reported case on April 3.

As of press time on July 14, Riverside County has 26,481 confirmed COVID-19

cases. There are 553 deaths related to COVID-19 and 9,893 people have recovered. There are 536 individuals being hospitalized and of those 136 are in the intensive care unit (ICU).

As of press time on July 7, Riverside County had 21,101 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 506 deaths related to COVID-19 and 8,896 people had recovered. There were 518 individuals being hospitalized and of those 130 were in the ICU.

As of press time on June 30, Riverside County had 17,296 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 457 deaths related to COVID-19 and 7,854 people had recovered. There were 403 individuals being hospitalized and of those 109 were in the ICU.

To date, 294,389 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The age range See COVID, page A2

Payment to IWD CFO authorized after the fact

Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman processed a payment cashing out 160 vacation hours in October of 2019, when the district was without a general manager to approve that vacation payout. The sign-off on the payout did not occur until early December.

Former General Manager Michael Creighton was fired from his position in a special board meeting on Sept. 25. To replace Creighton, the district hired Darren Milner, whose first day with the district was Oct. 21, 2019. Milner abruptly resigned about one month later on Sunday, Nov. 17 and, according to internal emails obtained by the newspaper, Milner's last day in the office was Wednesday, Nov. 13. The district did not appoint newly hired (start date Nov. 1) Field Supervisor Mitch Freeman as the district's acting general manager until Nov. 27.

In response to a California Public Records Act (CPRA) request to IWD, the Town Crier received a document (Sup-

plemental Pay Authorization Form) showing that the sign-off by Freeman on the October vacation payout to Shouman did not occur until early December, about two months after he had processed the check. At the bottom of the eventual payout authorization to Shouman is an initialed note from then-acting general manager Freeman: "This was actually done in October. No GM at the time." Freeman approved the payout on Dec. 6. The approval document was signed by Shouman and Freeman only.

The newspaper reached out to Board President Dr. Charles Schelly, Freeman and Shouman for comment as to why the payment (vacation cashed) was processed before it was properly authorized. A 2014 Supplemental Pay Authorization Form obtained by the newspaper used by Shouman required general manager and "board" signatures.

The newspaper received a response only from current General Manager Leo Havener (hired during a March 4 special meeting), "In response to your question, although the vacation pay out was not signed by a GM or Board President at the

with the most confirmed cases are 18- to 39-year-olds. The two demographics with the highest number of cases are Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Hispanic/Latino.

The county is urging residents and visitors to follow the state's face covering requirement in common and public indoor spaces and outdoors when distancing is not possible. In addition to covering your face, the county also urges everyone to keep 6 feet of distance and wash their hands. The county is on the state's COVID-19 watch list due to the increase of case numbers and hospitalizations.

In a recent press release, Riverside County health officials remind all residents there is still a statewide stay-at-home order in effect and social gatherings are known places where the disease is spread.

COVID-19 testing

COVID-19 testing is available for those with or without symptoms. Testing is free and available for everyone.

Residents can visit www.rivcoph.org/coronavirus/testing to schedule an appointment online or call 800-945-6171 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. to make an appointment over the phone for drive-up testing. Looking for a shorter wait time when calling to make an appointment? The county suggests calling between the hours of 5 and 10 p.m.

A testing site will be at the Mountain Resource Center on Franklin Drive Tuesday, July 21. See the article on page A1 for more information.

Reopening

Riverside County Public Health Officer Dr. Cameron Kaiser ordered the closing of all bars as of Tuesday, June 30 after Gov. Gavin Newsom recommended the closure of bars in seven counties included on the state's watch list. Bars had been allowed to reopen on June 12. Some businesses are required to move their operations outdoors and to close if they are unable to do so. Those businesses are restaurants, wineries and tasting rooms, movie theaters, family entertainment centers, zoos and museums, and card rooms. Restaurants and other businesses may still do takeout but are not permitted to have indoor dining. In addition, the county issued a press release Monday, July 13 stating additional businesses are now "required to move their activities outdoors as part of statewide actions to slow the spread of coronavirus."

"The governor's announcement today [July 13] impacts 30 counties, including Riverside County, that are on the state's monitoring list. Newsom said the order to move activities outdoors was necessary to reduce the spread of coronavirus and curb the recent increase in hospitalizations. Riverside County has experienced a steady rise in confirmed cases, hospitalizations and patients requiring intensive care dating back to Memorial Day."

The new restrictions in-

clude fitness centers and gyms, worship services, offices for non-critical sectors, personal care services, hair salons and barbershops, and malls.

The county said that these businesses may do curbside retail, as long as there are no indoor operations.

"As we struggle with national laboratory issues artificially depressing new case counts, people need to realize we're far from being out of the woods," said Dr. Cameron Kaiser, Riverside County public health officer. "Summer heat isn't stopping COVID-19, but for some of these sectors, the heat means there may be no good way to do them outdoors. We need to reduce the impact on our hospitals by reducing transmission, and as long as the numbers keep rising, the state's need to reimpose restrictions will keep rising too."

Riverside County has been able to reopen, and as of press time, keep the following open: investment properties for short-term rentals, destination retail stores including swap meets, casinos, schools with modifications, hotels (for tourism and individual travel), racetracks, campgrounds and outdoor recreation. As a reminder, youth sports are still not permitted.

Small business grant funding

Between now and Aug. 31, sole proprietors and those small businesses that received the SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan or advance are now eligible for the second round of funding (up to \$10,000) provided to small businesses that have been impacted during the coronavirus pandemic, the county explained in a press release. "The first round

of funding for the small business program resulted in \$7.3 million that will be distributed to 738 small businesses in Riverside County."

Funding is limited and not available to "businesses that have received federal funding through the Paycheck Protection Program. Awardees must also develop and implement a safe reopening plan that addresses employee and customer health prior to disbursement."

Face covering exemptions

I had an awkward encounter last week when a recently widowed friend joined my family for dinner in one of our local restaurants. The restaurant was operating in accordance with the governor’s mandate, and, because our friend is deaf, she and those of us needing to communicate with her, fall under one of the eight categories of face mask exemptions.

We wore masks upon arrival and to place our order, but frequently removed them to communicate with our friend. A customer in line vigorously expressed concern over these lapses. It became quite uncomfortable and, with my mask in place, I eventually responded in anger. I’m not normally quick to anger and would guess this person is also not normally one to intrude or seek confrontation, but, perhaps out of fear and frustration, reacted without an understanding of our situation.

There’s little wonder fear and confusion reign with so much conflicting information. No one claims face masks are thorough protection, but there is growing consensus they can — especially indoors — be of some help in reducing transmission of the virus.

Scientists tell us COVID-19 spreads mainly through close contact (i.e., less than 6 feet) with an infected person through the respiratory droplets produced by coughing or sneezing. These droplets can land in the mouth or nose or be inhaled into the lungs of those nearby. Depending on the quality and fit of the mask, a varying percentage of these droplets will be filtered out.

Research also shows the virus can spread through the breath of an infected person in aerosol particles too small for any of the commonly worn masks to be effective. It’s easy to identify and distance from someone who is coughing or sneezing, but not so easy to avoid suspended particles from the exhalation of an infected person who is asymptomatic. Knowing this, it seems prudent to practice social distancing, whether masked or unmasked.

Regrettable displays of emotion, such as what happened at the restaurant, occur more frequently than in pre-COVID days. Our fears and lack of understanding can result in loud confrontations which produce the larger particles masks can contain, so it’s especially good we were all masked at the time.

But please be aware the government and health organizations have deemed the wearing of masks to be more hazardous to some in our population than the protective benefits warrant. Wearing a mask is a kindness extended to those who are most vulnerable. In certain cases, as with the deaf, that kindness is expressed by not wearing a mask. In these fearful times, let’s wear masks with understanding, stay calm, practice social distancing and remember most of us are just doing the best we can.

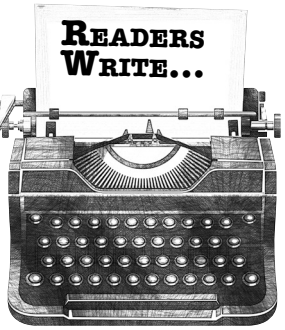

Climate change

DEAR EDITOR:

June 13 was the 12th annual National Lobby Day in Washington, DC for the bipartisan Citizen’s Climate Lobby (CCL). In that time, the Citizen Lobbyist meetings with the members of the House of Representatives have grown from six to 15,000 people with general CCL membership around 200,000.

The purpose of the Idyllwild Chapter of CCL is to lobby the government for swift action on climate legislation. CCL supports bills that will benefit the environment, people’s

Right now there is a bill in congress (HR 763) that would introduce a carbon fee. The bill is revenue neutral, because it gives the fees collected back to the people. Approximately 70% of citizens will receive more money back than they spend in increased energy costs. The vast majority of economists support the fee, showing that it will increase our economy, and use market forces to innovate change.

HR 763 (The Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act), sponsored by 81 bipartisan members of the House, can reduce climate change far more than other actions like reforestation. Climate change is not going away. We need legislative solutions to protect the planet and humans from

Celebrating shades of gray

“Once you label me, you negate me,” Soren Kierkegaard

Got your attention?

This month we focus on effects of our unhealthy penchant for either/or thinking.

Either/or thinking can be defined as “... the tendency to think in terms of polar opposites — that is, in terms of the best and worst — without accepting the possibilities that lie between these two extremes”.

However, everyday reality exists in infinite gray shadings between artificial boundaries suggested by polar opposites. Most of the time, that is. Extremes do exist. Remarkable in their psychological power, nevertheless, extremes are rare.

We need to appreciate the healing and liberating qualities of the shades of

gray. In other words, nothing is truly all good or all bad. These last two statements are examples of both/and thinking.

First note that either/or decision-making can be appropriate in some instances. Willy Steiner of Executive Coaching Concepts (see link) points to these conditions in organizations:

“Such an Either/Or choice is frequently appropriate when:

- “The choice really is strictly binary.
- “Time pressures influence the choice because:
- “They limit the perceived options and favor sticking with the status quo;
- “No viable options seem readily available or obvious;
- “Schedule constraints limit the time available for meeting preparation and adequate time to analyze options in the meeting.”

However, in personal relationships, because extremes are rare, either/or polarization distorts reality and often causes harm in our relationships and on broader stages of society. “Either/or thinking separates us from our partner. And seeing ourselves as disconnected from our partner can allow for all manner of justifications and rationalizations that allow us to make decisions of self-interest rather than in the interest of the wellbeing of the relationship.” (See APA link.)

“For example, if I say, ‘I am good and you are bad’ ... I create a disconnection that may lead to antagonism, conflict, and harm. If, however, I ... understand that I am also bad and you are also good ... in this way we are connected in spite of our opposition. And this connection heals the wound that has been created

...” by either/or thinking. The same unhealthy disconnection is created if I am sure that I am wholly right and you are wholly wrong.

Because we are enculturated into either/or thinking, learning both/and thinking calls for humbly committing to practice and perseverance. We are constantly bombarded by the false reality of either/or, good or bad, right or wrong polarization. How do we get out of this trap? Our task is to “... figure out how people who have seemingly opposite facts both have valid information. By digging deeper to make sense out of what seems at odds, ... do the hard work of problem solving.” (See Schwarz Associates link.) It is hard work. The work heals and forms interconnections rather than forcing us apart.

Let’s find commonality and solve problems from there.

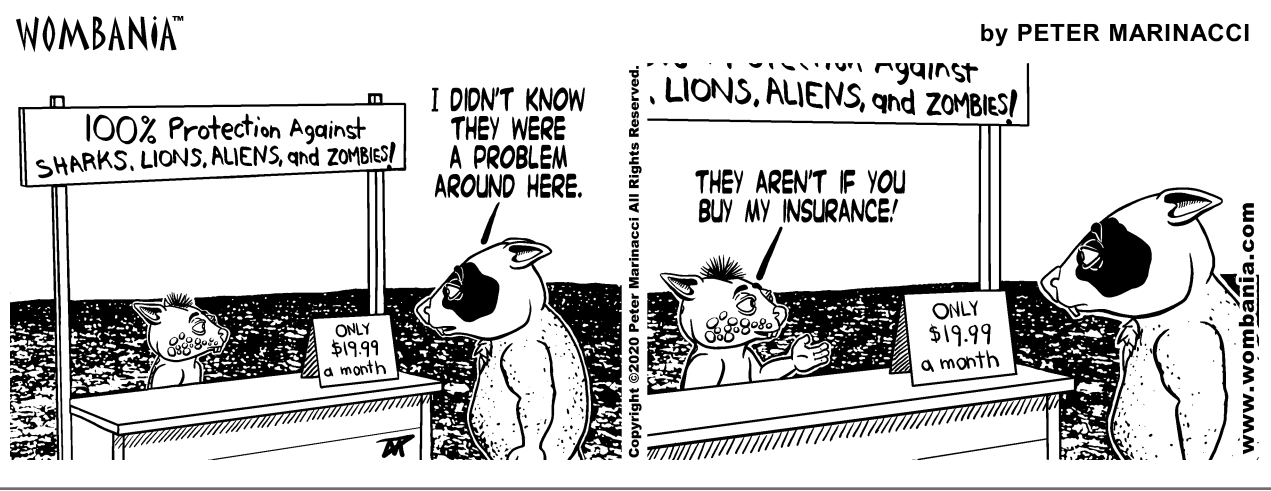

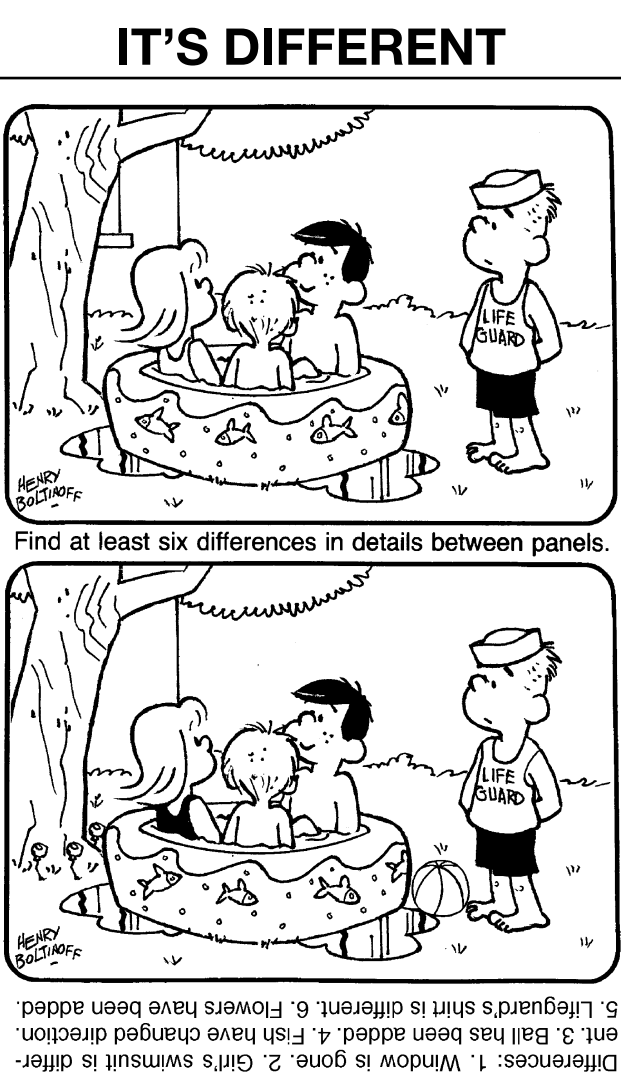

time, this is solely because the District was temporarily without a GM, and there is no place for a member of the Board to sign the form in the temporary absence of a GM. In addition, the District’s procedures do not require the Board President to sign such a form. More importantly, under California law, an employee generally has a right to cash out unused vacation time, and the Acting GM ratified the pay-out of vacation when he started, which had, in fact, been earned by Mr. Shouman.”

It was brought to the newspaper’s attention that Freeman may no longer be with the district. Havener responded to a CPRA request, “We have completed a search for responsive records in your emailed Public Records request dated July, 13, 2020 for a resignation communication by Mitch Freeman. No disclosable public records exist in response to the request of July 13, 2020 (1:45 p.m.) because under section 6254(c) of the California Public Records Act, certain personnel records are protected from disclosure under the exemption for ‘Personnel, medical, or

similar files, the disclosure of which would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.’ In this instance, the District finds the public interest in employee privacy clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosing such records (Govt. Code Section 6255). Thus, any such exempt record would not be produced. The determination as to these exemptions was made by District General Counsel.”

When the newspaper asked for clarification as a result of his CPRA response that Freeman did in fact resign, Havener responded, “I am not answering that question.”

In preparation for candidate filing under COVID-19 restrictions, the Riverside County Registrar of Voters is encouraging contact-less filing options for candidates who wish to run for office in the Nov. 3, 2020 Presidential General Election. Candidate filing began on Monday, July 13, 2020 at 8 a.m. and concludes on Aug. 7, 2020 at 5 p.m.

Candidates can request to receive their documents via email or regular mail by calling the Riverside County Registrar of Voters office at 951-486-7200. Candidates have the option of taking the Oath of Office via a notary service or by using a video conferencing service with Registrar of Voters’ staff. If candidates prefer to file in-person, appointments are highly recommended. Walk-ins are permitted. However, wait times may occur as physical distancing requirements and limitations are implemented.

Candidates can make an appointment by calling 951-486-7200. Completed documents with original signatures must be received by the Registrar of Voters by the close of the nomination period at 5 p.m. on Aug. 7, 2020 in order for the candidate to be qualified for the ballot. For convenience, there will be a secure drop box located outside of the Registrar of Voters’ office for candidates to drop off their completed nomination forms.

If an incumbent fails to file, the deadline for that office will be extended to 5 p.m. on Aug. 12, for everyone except the incumbent.

The Registrar of Voters’ staff is available to help prospective candidates complete the necessary paperwork and to answer questions. Please call 951-486-7200 to schedule an appointment. searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County, and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days.” Also adding, “On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts.”

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station Deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Lydia “Dia” Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams is 65 years old, 5’ 5” tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and tur-

quoise jack, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

According to the Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams’ 160-acre ranch in the Garner Valley area on June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams.

RMRU went out again on June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground search.

The newspaper contacted RCSD to ask if there were any updates on the whereabouts of Prifogle or Abrams. Pecoraro wrote, “As of today [July 10], we do not have any further updates. We still have them in the system as missing persons.”

If you have any information of the whereabouts of Roy Prifogle, Dia Abrams or Rosario Garcia, contact the RCSD immediately at 800-950-2444.

Art Alliance cancels the 2020 Art Walk & Wine Tasting

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild (AAI) has successfully staged 22 annual Art Walk & Wine Tasting events. This event is key to raising funds for the AAI as well as bringing over a thousand visitors to town, thus benefitting local inns, restaurants and shops.

Like many other local events, this event has fallen victim to the COVID-19 pandemic. As Riverside County experiences a surge in coronavirus cases, the AAI board recently voted to cancel the 23rd Art Walk & Wine Tasting. It was to take place on October 10, 2020.

AAI President Donna Elliot explained that this decision was taken in an abundance of caution: "We are concerned for the health and well-being of our wineries, artists, volunteers, visitors and our community." Many counties in California have faltered in their efforts to flatten the curve, including Riverside County. An event such as the Art Walk & Wine Tasting falls into the Stage 4 category of the "Resilience Roadmap." Stage 4 basically ends the "Stay Home Order."

Upon reaching this stage, open larger gathering concerts and venues may resume. We assume that even by October, we will not have reached this stage. An initial concern was that medical experts predicted a "second wave" of the virus during the autumn months and this may have prevented the event. However, we haven't even weathered the first wave yet. It seems only logical and prudent that the AAI cancels the event now.

The AAI invites persons interested in the 2021 event to continue to register for updates and details of the 23rd Art Walk & Wine Tasting. Already, the AAI looks forward to making the 2021 event spectacular. Register at www.artinidyllwild.org for this and other AAI events.

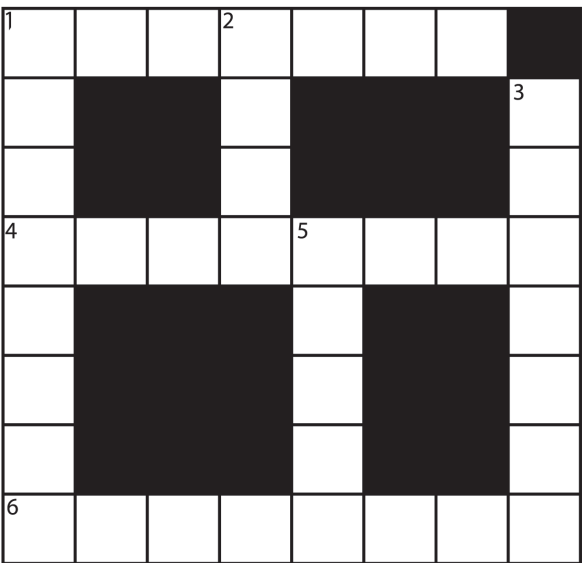

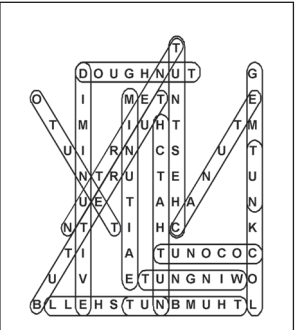

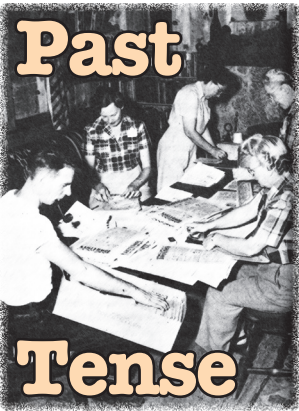
Scammer 411

Government agencies will rarely, if ever, call you. If they do, it will be after they send you a letter — or to return a call you made to them. But anytime the “government” caller demands information (or payment by wire transfer or gift card), that’s a scam.

Don’t trust caller ID. Scammers use technology to hide their real number, but show one that seems legit. So if the caller ID shows a 202 area code, or says “government” or “Washington, DC,” don’t take that at face value. It could be anyone calling from anywhere.

Never give anyone who calls or approaches you out of the blue information like your Medicare, bank account, credit card or Social Security number. Scammers can use your information, steal your identity, get credit in your name and take your money.

Report government imposters and other scams to the Federal Trade Commission.
