



COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

School year to begin online

The 2020/21 school year will begin with online education. Both the Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and Idyllwild Arts Academy have released preliminary plans.

As of press time, there are a total of 11 reported cases since the outbreak and no deaths reported for the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove, according to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website.

Because Riverside County is unable to provide recovery data by area, it is unknown how many of the 11 total cases are active since the area's first reported case on April 3. According to Riverside County Public Health on Friday, July 24, it is taking between seven and nine days to receive test results.

As of press time on July 28, Riverside County has 35,910 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 672 deaths related to COVID-19 and 12,489 people have recovered. There are 487 individuals being hospitalized and of those 143 are in the intensive care unit (ICU).

As of press time on July 21, Riverside County had 30,890 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 589 deaths related to COVID-19 and 11,058 people had recovered. There were 536 individuals being hospitalized and of those 135 were in the ICU.

As of press time on July 14, Riverside County had 26,481 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 553 deaths related to COVID-19 and 9,893 people had recovered. There were 536 individuals being hospitalized and of those 136 were in the ICU.

To date, 361,065 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The age range

with the most confirmed cases is 18- to 39-year-olds. The two demographics with the highest number of cases are Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Hispanic/Latino.

A team of federal doctors and nurses have been at Eisenhower Health since July 16 to assist with the hospital's influx of coronavirus patients.

The county is urging residents and visitors to follow the state's face covering requirement in common and public indoor spaces and outdoors when distancing is not possible. In addition to covering your face, the county also urges everyone to keep 6 feet of distance and wash their hands. The county is on the state's COVID-19 watch list due to the increase of case numbers and hospitalizations. The county is giving away 10 million masks that "will be distributed by local nonprofits working in the community, as well as houses of worship, senior meal delivery programs and local businesses. In addition, everyone who visits a county or state-run testing location, will receive masks," according to a press release.

Riverside County health officials remind all residents there is still a statewide stay-at-home order. Businesses had been allowed to reopen only to be shut down again.


COVID-19 testing

then went to Penn State University in 1986 for her master's in English with an emphasis in poetry writing. She moved to Idyllwild in 2012 to take a job at Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA). "I came to Idyllwild in 2012 as the dean of academics, and I always felt as much as I like it, I was very interested in the integration of the arts and academics," Kent-Stoll said. When Pamela Jordan took over as president and head of school at IAA in 2016, she needed an assistant head of school, a role Kent-Stoll happily accepted. "That's when I got to expand my role in building and implementing the programs that integrated the arts and academics," she said. One of the programs IAA started since Kent-Stoll has been there is Art in Society, which educates the citizen artist using art as a vehicle for change and thinking about how art can make a difference. Out of the Art in Society program, IAA has been able to create relationships with outside artist groups like Voices of Our City Choir based in San Diego, which help the homeless individuals get back on their feet. "They have influenced our student population and our students have gone down and have rehearsal with them," Kent-Stoll said.

I asked Kent-Stoll what her plans are as head of school given the restrictions imposed by the pandemic. With a chuckle she said, "I've been head of school for all of a week, so I don't have a grand vision," adding, "What's really important as we enter this age of online learning is to understand that it's not going to go away. I want to build more online opportunities for students who can't reach Idyllwild." Everybody should have access to an arts education. It's part of your being and a passion that should be nurtured and honored. Kent-Stoll wants to help students achieve this whether they are in-person on campus or online. "The faculty are creating an individualized learning experience while using Zoom and other online platforms," Kent-Stoll explained. "I'm really amazed at how our faculty have adapted their curriculum to the online learning." Kent-Stoll also wants to expand and continue developing its community partnerships outside of campus. Last year, Kent-Stoll received a grant on learning how to recruit and retain Native American students. "We've always had a commit-

ment to support Native American students, but we hadn't done a complete study on how to integrate students of diverse communities and how to learn and grow from them," she said. "How could their voices be heard? This is what that grant provided. I want to continue and strengthen dialogues with communities because we become stronger by that and less isolated." Kent-Stoll wants to create a community where everybody feels included, where the community comes before self. "If we could do that, I do think anything is possible and it increases the imagination," she explained. "I remember when I was really young, I would think I would make my own school," she admitted. "My sister and I would talk of having our own homeschool where arts and creativity would be in the center of it. I think that art is basically our soul." In essence, our artistic expression gives us freedom. Providing IAA students, staff and faculty the platform for artistic expression enriching everyone's lives is what Kent-Stoll wants to support as the head of school.

Farmers Market to implement changes

According to Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) Board President Stephanie Yost, an Agricultural and Standards Investigator with the County of Riverside was in town this past Sunday and stopped by the Farmers Market after seeing the sign advertising the market. He offered some information to Yost that ICC was unaware of and is now working to implement. The newspaper reached out to Yost after receiving an email from a local about "A County inspector (not sure if he was with Code Enforcement or Public Health) was there [the local had just returned from the Farmers Market] and I overheard him telling someone that there is no permit for the Farmers Market." "He explained that, so long as our market sells agricultural products like produce, eggs and honey, we must get a certification and be qualified as a certified Farmers Market," Yost wrote. "He further explained that both of the vendors who sell agricultural products also must become certified. "He was quite nice and understood that we just didn't know this (assuming we could hold it on our private property) and explained what we need to do to become certified, which doesn't appear too complicated. I will be working with ICC Director Will [Steichen] to get this handled this week. To be clear, the investigator never threatened to shut us down and he understood that we just didn't realize what we needed to do." The local also expressed concern about the lack of social distancing at the Farmers Market. "I agree with the comment," wrote Yost. "We have tried to verbally request customers to socially distance but find that isn't working. Next week, we will have signage and make other efforts to make this requirement clear."

knows the whereabouts of Rosario Garcia to contact law enforcement immediately," wrote Pecoraro. Earlier in the year, local Roy Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. on the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans. RCSD Deputy Jeremy Parsons said, "After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County, and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days." Also adding, "On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts."

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station Deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Lydia "Dia" Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person. Abrams is 65 years old, 5' 5" tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans. According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams' 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley) on June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams. RMRU went out again on June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground search. Quarter-acre fire last week

The U.S. Forest Service – San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) received a call for a vegetation fire about 9:40 a.m. on Wednesday, July 22. The fire was located off the Webster Trail in Pine Cove, according to the SBNF.

“The fire is a quarter acre in light to medium fuels with moderate rate of spread,” SBNF Pub-

lic Affairs Officer Zach Behrens wrote.

The quarter-acre fire was 100% contained and out within a few hours. Firefighters cut a hand line around the fire. SBNF was assisted by Cal Fire, Riverside County Fire (Cal Fire) and the Idyllwild Fire Protection District. Firefighters were able to quickly establish containment with air resources.

The cause is still under investigation.

Update on Caltrans’ culvert work

Travel along highways 74 and 243 has increased since stay-at-home restrictions have loosened up. However, expect delays traveling both highways, up to 20-30 minutes.

“Culvert work continues on State Route 74 and State Route 243,” wrote Philip Havins, Caltrans public information officer for maintenance, in an email last week. “The tentative completion date is mid-October 2020. Although, that timeframe is dependent on weather and any other issues that may arise.”

The Town Crier previously reported in February, “The resident engineer advises that the emergency culvert replacement project will continue till September 2020,” wrote Caltrans Public Information Officer Joy M. Schneider. “The resident engineer has directed the contractor to keep the delay below 30 minutes. If readers have questions or concerns, they can contact public affairs at 909-383-4631.”

“The timeframe was amended from Labor Day weekend to mid-October in early June,” wrote Havins on the reason for the extended timeline. “As with anything construction-related, times are fluid and may change. Additionally, the work being performed on these culverts is painstaking and requires the project team to execute their respective tasks with very little margin of error.”

Highways 74 — from Mountain Center to Hemet — and 243 — from Pine Cove to Banning — washed out as a result of the torrential rains on Feb. 14, 2019, causing full closures on both highways.

On April 20, Caltrans reopened Highway 74 from Mountain Center to Hemet giving commuters some relief. However, the hours were limited and vehicles were escorted by pilot car.

On Aug. 30, Caltrans allowed commuters 24-hour access with the pilot car and Highway 74 fully reopened Oct. 3 with flagging operations only.

There was a full closure on Highway 243 from Feb. 14 to Nov. 1.



Reminder: File to run for local office

In preparation for candidate filing under COVID-19 restrictions, the Riverside County Registrar of Voters is encouraging contact-less filing options for candidates who wish to run for local office in the Nov. 3, 2020 Presidential General Election. Candidate filing concludes on Aug. 7, 2020 at 5 p.m.

Candidates can request to receive their documents via email or regular mail by calling the Riverside County Registrar of Voters office at 951-486-7200. Candidates have the option of taking the Oath of Office via a notary service or by using a video conferencing service with Registrar of Voters’ staff. If candidates prefer to file in-person, appointments are highly recommended. Walk-ins are permit-

ted. However, wait times may occur as physical distancing requirements and limitations are implemented.

Candidates can make an appointment by calling 951-486-7200. Completed documents with original signatures must be received by the Registrar of Voters by the close of the nomination period at 5 p.m. on Aug. 7, 2020, in order for the candidate to be qualified for the ballot. For convenience, there will be a secure drop box located outside of the Registrar of Voters’ office for candidates to drop off their completed nomination forms.

If an incumbent fails to file, the deadline for that office will be extended to 5 p.m. on Aug. 12, for everyone except the incumbent.

The Registrar of Voters’ staff is available to help prospective candidates complete the necessary paperwork and to answer questions. Please

call 951-486-7200 to schedule an appointment. Candidates unsure about the local district offices for which they are eligible, based on residency, should contact the Registrar of Voters office for help.

Candidates will receive informational handbooks at the time they obtain their papers.

We are continuing to learn more about the challenges the health pandemic poses to students and residential schools, and to take the steps necessary to plan for a healthy 2020-2021 academic year. We have been guided by the priority of offering the strongest experience possible for our students, with the community’s health and safety at the forefront of our plans and decisions.

Governor Gavin Newsom rolled back the state’s reopening schedule after COVID-19 cases in California rose in recent weeks. Additionally, several counties, including Riverside, were placed on a monitoring list based on the outbreak and spread of the virus. Upon advice of the school’s Medical Advisory Board, we have made the difficult decision to start classes online on August 31. Students will return to campus when it is safe to do so but not before October 1. Also, in order to adhere to CDC guidelines including social distancing and limiting numbers in group gatherings, we have decreased our student body by 20% for the fall semester and possibly the full academic year.

We are finalizing the protocols and procedures necessary if it is ever determined that a student or adult at Idyllwild Arts has contracted COVID-19 or been exposed to someone who has tested positive for the virus. To date, we have had no reported positive cases on campus but have, on occasion, asked employees to self-quarantine when notified that an employee has come in contact with an individual who has tested positive for COVID-19.

This is a difficult time, full of anxiety and uncertainty. We will continue to provide updates to our Idyllwild community for transparency and to support the health and wellness of our mountaintop community.

Hang up on business impostor scams

Scammers love to use the same old tricks in new ways. One of their favorites is to pose as a business or government official to pressure you into sending them money or personal information. Now, some scammers are pretending to be popular online shopping websites, phishing for your personal information.

For example, you get a call from someone who claims to be with "Amazon.com." (Spoiler alert: they're not really from Amazon.) The voice on the phone will say that your credit card has been charged a large amount of money for some order. Then, they'll give you the "Amazon Support" phone number and tell you to immediately call if you didn't make that purchase.

If this seems suspicious, that's because it is. Scammers want you to call the number they give so they can ask for your passwords, credit card number and other sensitive information to get your money. If you get a call like this, there are a few steps you should take:

- Hang up. Don't call them back on the number they gave you. If you're concerned about an order you didn't place, contact the business through a customer service phone number or email you know is legitimate. You can usually find a company's real information on their website.
- Check your credit card account. If you see a charge you don't recognize, file a dispute with your credit card company immediately.
- Report the fake call to the business. Make sure to use the contact information from their website — not the information from the phone call. You can also report the call to the FTC.

If you gave information to a business impostor, head to IdentityTheft.gov for tips to protect yourself. To learn more about impostor scams, visit the FTC's Impostor Scams page (<https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/features/feature-0037-imposter-scams>).

Riverside County tax roll grows, impacts of COVID yet to be seen

Strong demand for inland real estate led to a nearly 6% increase in property values in Riverside County going into 2020, according to Riverside County's Assessor-County Clerk-Recorder.

Assessor-County Clerk-Recorder Peter Aldana announced today [July 21] that the taxable value of all property in Riverside County for the current year grew to \$320 billion, an \$18 billion increase. This year's tax roll — a list of all taxable property, its owner and its value as of Jan. 1 — will generate more than \$3.2 billion for local government services.

"Since the tax roll is based on property values as of Jan. 1, we won't see the impacts of COVID until next year," Aldana said. "Pre-COVID, our economy was growing and strong demand for Riverside County real estate led to increasing property values. We won't see the impacts of COVID until we look at property values as of Jan. 1, 2021. A lot can happen between now and then."

The median home price in Riverside County grew to \$401,250 in December 2019, approaching the record high of \$432,000 set in January 2007, according to CoreLogic, a real estate information services firm.

Despite the increase in home prices, most property owners will not see an equal rise in property taxes on their next annual tax bill, which will be mailed in October. State law requires the assessor to enroll real property at the lesser of its

current market value or the Prop 13 value — the market value as of the date the property was acquired or constructed, adjusted up to 2% annually for inflation. Eighty-four percent of Riverside County property is enrolled at its protected Prop 13 value.

Property owners may review their 2020 assessment roll value by visiting the assessor's public access website at <https://ca-riverside-acr.public-accessnow.com/Home.aspx> or calling 951-955-6200. Although the assessor works to enroll fair-market values, an owner might disagree with the valuation. Those owners may file a free decline-in-value application online. Applications are due by Nov. 1 and are available online at the website mentioned above.

Property owners also may request a formal hearing before the assessment appeals board. The deadline to file is Nov. 30. The application is available on the clerk of the board's website at www.rivcocob.org.

Speeding needs to be stopped

In recent months, Idyllwild residents have reached out expressing frustration and concern about drivers speeding and tailgating more than usual on our local roads and highways.

Long-time resident Eric Townsend wrote in an email, "On busy weekends with crowded streets and pedestrians in the street, I see people speeding on North Circle Drive as if the street were empty."

"One to two times per week I get a speeder going maybe 50 mph on my street. Since my street is partially a school zone and there are kids in the street (no sidewalks), this is sort of nuts."

It's uncertain why this is happening. Perhaps during these unprecedented times, people are less patient with one another. Regardless, it's causing a negative impact and ultimately puts everyone's safety at risk.

"I'd rather not wait until we have some local fatalities to get some action on the problem," Townsend added.

I reached out to our local public safety agencies to see if there is a solution to this issue. According to residents, a few of the roads that seem to have had an increase in speeding are Tollgate Road, North Circle Drive, Saunders Meadow Drive and South Circle Drive.

Sarah Rodriguez, board assistant to Riverside County Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington, responded right away. She contacted the county transportation department to see if there were any current road studies being conducted on any of our county roads.

"The county doesn't have any transportation improvement projects for the streets that you named, but our office has put in a request for the transportation department to conduct a road study for road improvements," Rodriguez wrote.

As of print time, the Town Crier did not hear back from Rodriguez about how long it would take from the time a request is submitted to when action will be taken.

I also reached out to the California Highway Patrol (CHP) and the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSO) to ask what kind of action could be done to mitigate the problem.

"It was right to contact CHP regarding this concern. The Riverside Sheriff's Office does not handle traffic service calls in the Idyllwild area," RCSO Corporal Lionel Murphy wrote in an email.

As of print time, the CHP had not responded.

During these unprecedented times, while we are all on edge, it's important to practice patience and be considerate to others. Be observant to those who live on these roads and to pedestrians that are walking along the streets.

Under a settlement filed today, Equifax agreed to spend up to \$425 million to help people affected by the data breach. If you were affected by the Equifax breach, you can't file a claim just yet. That's coming. But you can sign up for FTC email alerts about the settlement at ftc.gov/Equifax. Not sure that you were affected? The breach claims site will have a tool to let you check. Sign up for an FTC email update to find out when that tool is up and running.

Some safety tips from Cal Fire:

1. Don't mow or trim dry grass on windy days.
 2. Never pull your vehicle over in dry grass.
 3. Target shoot only in approved areas, use lead ammunition only, and never shoot at metal objects.
 4. Check and obey burn bans.
 5. Ensure campfires are allowed, and if so, be sure to extinguish them completely.
 6. Report any suspicious activities to prevent arson.
 7. If you see something — say something.

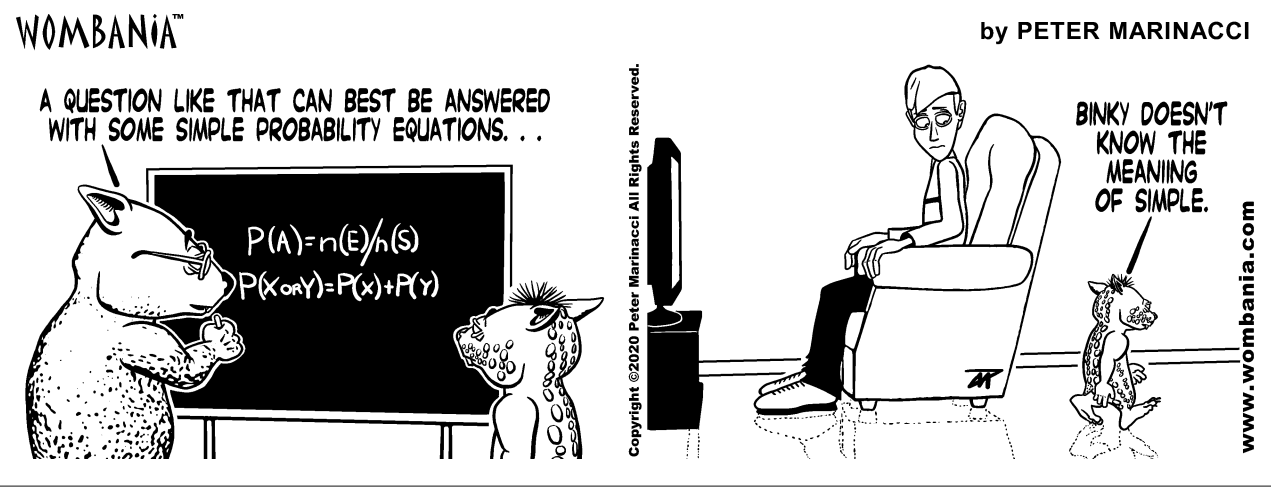

Schools update

HUSD set its reopening plan for the 2020/21 school year at its board meeting Tuesday, July 21. “Due to the guidance criteria, all schools (public, private, and charter) within Riverside County schools will not be permitted to return to school in a traditional manner,” the district released last week. “As such, HUSD will open the school year in a fully online learning model beginning Aug. 17, 2020.” The district has provided some options for low-cost internet through Spectrum and Frontier on its Parent Resource Center website.

In addition, “HUSD’s online learning model will differ significantly from what was offered when schools closed in March. Students will receive a combination of live instruction provided by their teacher and independent projects, assignments, and activities. Additional support will be provided for English learners, students with disabilities, foster students, and homeless youth. Our program will be designed to be substantially equivalent to in-person learning.”

Idyllwild School will be reaching out to families in the coming weeks regarding the distribution of devices as well as expectations for attendance and grading. Additional communication will be sent to those families who completed the Academy of Innovation Online program interest form. “The Academy of Innovation is the HUSD’s blended learning school designated as an independent study program,” Alexandra Sponheim, HUSD’s public information officer, wrote in an email responding to a question about student/teacher interaction in the Academy of Innovation program. “This allows for customized learning platforms year-round. When safety restrictions are removed and school begins to operate normally, the Academy of Innovation will continue to offer online learning for families and individuals. We will also offer the blended learning option where students attend classes a few days per week on site and complete a portion of work at home independently.

“The Academy of Innovation will offer online learners approximately 8 to 10 hours per week of scheduled live instruction with teachers and peers via virtual access on the computer. In addition, teachers will be available throughout the week to connect with students via email and virtual chat to support the independent learning requirements. This flexibility will support a number of learners desiring a year-long online experience that is flexible and consistent throughout the entire school year.”

Sponheim confirmed that HUSD students who need a device will be provided with one.

Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) students will begin the 2020/21 school year Aug. 31 with distance learning. Students may be able to return to campus starting Oct. 1 if the governor’s orders have changed with fewer than 300 students on campus.

Once students are able to return to campus, IAA will “monitor the health situation and enable students to move through the day in family pods, academic classes will be entirely online when students first return to campus. This will reduce the number of teachers on campus and assist a smooth transition for students as they adjust to in-person instruction. In addition, certain arts classes focusing on theory or research may remain online, assisting the optimization of classroom, studio, and practice time.”

Reopening

In addition to the closure of all bars shortly after reopening, restaurants, wineries and tasting rooms, movie theaters, family entertainment centers, zoos and museums, and cardrooms had to move business outdoors, and if unable, close their businesses once again.

Restaurants and other businesses may still do takeout but are not permitted to have indoor dining.

Additional restrictions recently implemented include fitness centers and gyms, worship services, offices for non-critical sectors, personal care services, hair salons and barbershops, and malls.

The county said that these businesses may do curb-side retail, as long as there are no indoor operations.

Riverside County has been able to keep the following open as of press time: investment properties for short-term rentals, destination retail stores including swap meets, casinos, hotels (for tourism and individual travel), racetracks, campgrounds and outdoor recreation.

As a reminder, youth sports are still not permitted.

Small business grant funding

Between now and Aug. 31, sole proprietors and those small businesses that received the SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan or advance are now eligible for the second round of funding (up to \$10,000) provided to small businesses that have been impacted during the coronavirus pandemic, the county explained in a press release. “The first round of funding for the small business program resulted in \$7.3 million that will be distributed to 738 small businesses in Riverside County.”

Funding is limited and not available to “businesses that have received federal funding through the Paycheck Protection Program. Awardees must also develop and implement a safe reopening plan that addresses employee and customer health prior to disbursement.”

Another program is CERF+ (Craft Emergency Relief Fund, Inc.). This provides a one-time \$1,000 grant to artists working in craft disciplines who are facing food, housing and medical insecurities caused by the pandemic. Priority will be given to eligible artists who have traditionally been underserved by the grant-making community. The deadline for the first round ended July 29, but a second round will accept applications from Aug. 19 to Sept 9. 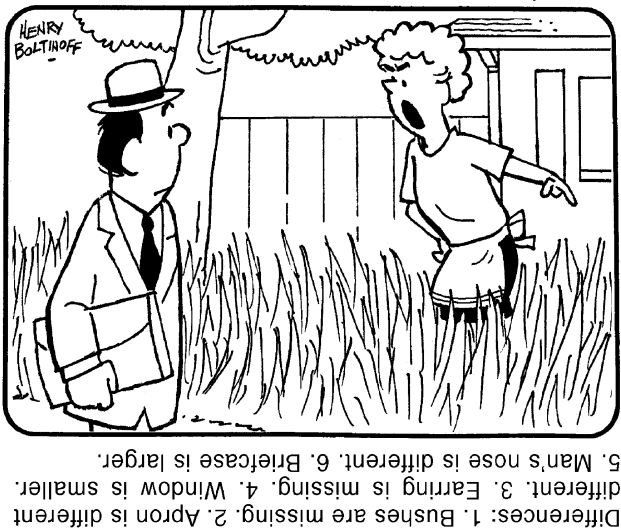
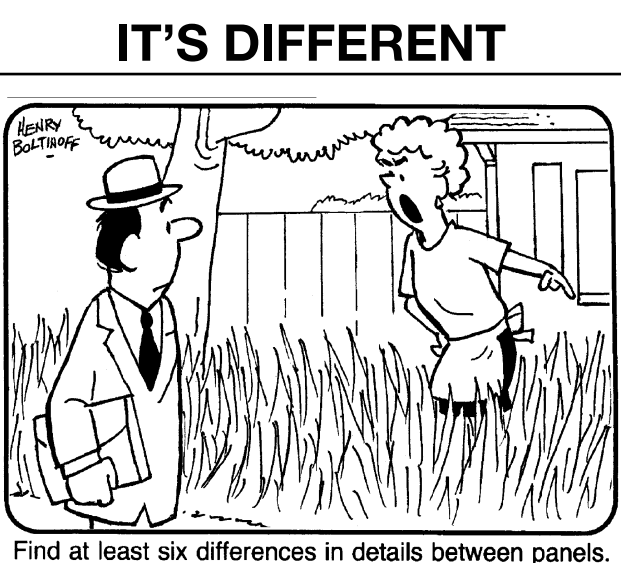

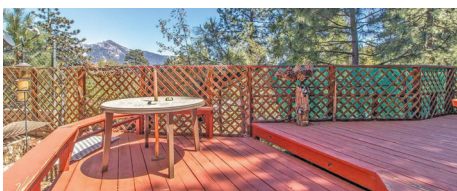

Idyllwild School's remodel update

The work at Idyllwild School, which began on April 27, has been very noticeable in recent months.

Tim McBride, superintendent of the project for Hamel Contracting Inc. out of Murrieta, gave the Town Crier a tour on Friday morning to explain the progress of the remodel.

"We are relandscaping the area, adding a rock garden and installing new Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant ramps. We took out seven of the pine trees that were out front," McBride said. "We had to go down about five feet to get to the root bulb. They were estimated to be 100-130 years old. Most of the trees were in critical proximity to power lines."

There's going to be a new administrative office, reception area, a security door and principal's office. The entire entryway is being upgraded to include more security.

"We are remodeling and bringing everything up to code in the front office area," McBride said, who has enjoyed working on the mountain these last few months and talked about the many people in the community he has come in contact with since he's been here.

"This is a cool little town," he said. "I dig it. It has a cool vibe. I've never been up here before taking this job. When we drive through town everyone has wanted to know what's been going on."

Hamel Contracting Inc. was the same company that built the William M. Lowman Concert Hall at Idyllwild Arts Academy, which McBride was not superintendent for.

If all stays on schedule, the completion date for the remodel is Aug. 14. The remodel is being paid for with capital facilities funds and Measure X proceeds.

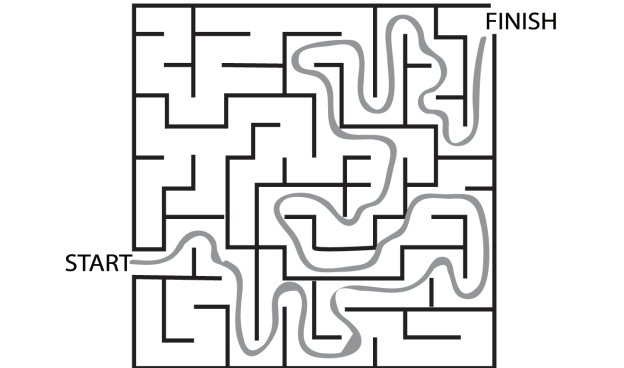
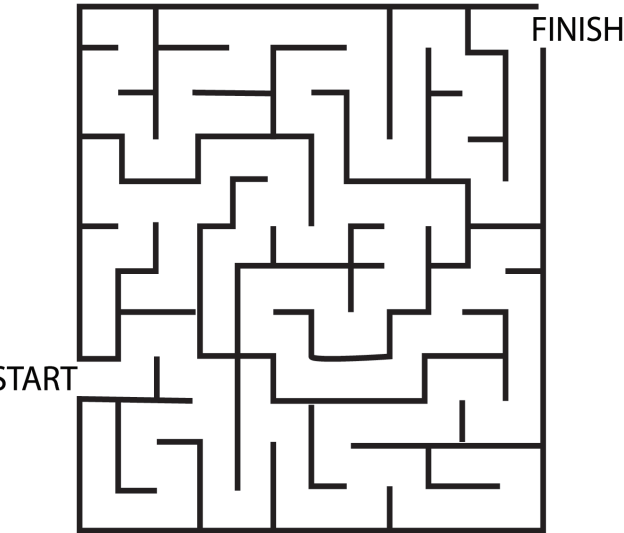

Steele to play Barracuda

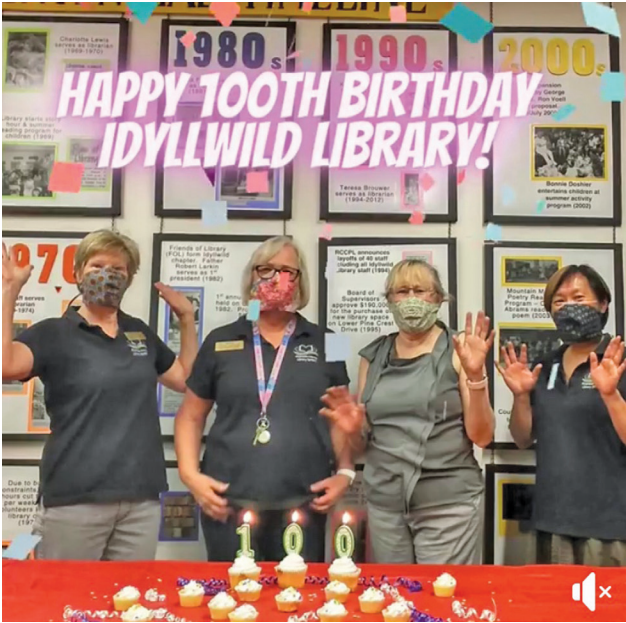

For the fifth time in his PGA Tour career, Idyllwild native Brendan Steele will compete in the Barracuda Championship. This year, however, it will be played on a different course: The Old Greenwood par-72 course at the Tahoe Mountain Club in Truckee, California.

The Barracuda tournament is distinguished by its Modified Stableford scoring system. Instead of competitors simply playing to win with the fewest strokes, this system awards positive points for better play: 8 points for each double eagle, 5 points for each eagle, 2 points for each birdie, zero points for each par, and negative points for worse play: -1 point for each bogey, and -2 points for each double bogey or worse.

Since this scoring system rewards players for good play more than it penalizes them for bad play, players are encouraged to play aggressively.

Brendan will tee off Thursday at 12:33 p.m. PDT and Friday at 7:33 a.m. PDT. He'll be playing both days with Kevin Tway and Pat Perez.

A temporary plan for the Idyllwild Transfer Station was approved by the Riverside County Board of Supervisors.

30 years ago - 1990
Despite July rains that dropped 2 inches of wa-

ter on the Hill and seemed to abate the drought-like conditions, Idyllwild Water District declared a Stage 3 water shortage emergency.

25 years ago - 1995
In response to two complaints that the Hemet Unified School District was teaching creationism as science, Superintendent Stephen Teele proposed implementing a district-wide policy on science instruction.

20 years ago - 2000
The Chamber of Commerce was interested in selling Town Hall, but feedback from the community was overwhelmingly negative. A petition was drafted to "Save Town Hall."

15 years ago - 2005
Hemet High School student and pitcher Travis Leavitt was selected

as a member of the Los Angeles Times Desert/Mountain all-region baseball team.

10 years ago - 2010
New Idyllwild Postmaster Kelly Gates was sworn into office. The ceremony, attended by more than 50 people, was held at Mark Taylor's Idyllwild Dance Studio and a luncheon at Town Hall followed.

5 years ago - 2015
The Town Crier learned that two other lawsuits were filed against a property owner and his caretakers stemming from the Mountain Fire besides the two filed by Cal Fire and some private landowners.

1 year ago - 2019
Sherry Williams — sweet, smooth, soulful jazz vocalist — performed at the Idyllwild Summer Concert Series.
