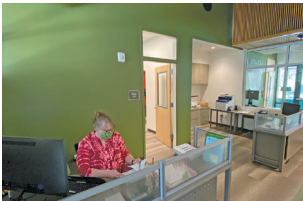

Town Hall renovation complete


The Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) is delighted to announce that the major renovation of Idyllwild's Town Hall is now complete. ICC plans to hold a rededication ceremony and community-wide "Open House" with tours, food, music and fun once state and county COVID-19 restrictions on large gatherings are lifted.

As a brief history, the foundation for the original Town Hall was poured on Dec. 5, 1946, and thereafter a volunteer crew led by local grocer Harold Sanborn worked every Friday for months to build the two-story 4,000-square-foot building, located at 25925 Cedar Street.

Town Hall, which stands on land donated by the Johnson Family, was dedicated on July 10, 1947, and for many years, was operated by the Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce. When the chamber dissolved several years ago, Town Hall reverted to the Johnson family, who put it up for sale.

The property was purchased on Aug. 16, 2019 by Idyllwild Town Hall LLC, a corporation formed by Loie and Dave Butterfield and Tom Hawthorne for the purpose of acquiring and renovating the property. They then donated Town Hall to ICC to operate for the benefit of the mountain communities. The renovation project began on Oct. 14, 2019, and ICC took legal possession of the property on July 31, 2020.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

County now reporting recovered cases by area

As of press time, there are a total of 22 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and one death reported for the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove, according to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website.

The website now reports recovered cases by area. Nineteen of the 22 people have recovered.

Riverside County hosted another free COVID-19 testing day at the Idyllwild Library on Wednesday, Sept. 9.

As of press time on Sept. 9, Riverside County has 54,735 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 1,085 deaths related to COVID-19 and 48,761 people have recovered. There are 185 individuals being hospitalized and of those 62 are in the intensive care unit (ICU).

As of press time on Sept. 1, Riverside County had 53,153 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,026 deaths related to COVID-19 and 44,024 people had recovered. There were 216 individuals being hospitalized and of those 68 were in the ICU.

As of press time on Aug. 25, Riverside County had 51,200 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 978 deaths related to COVID-19 and 28,407 people had recovered. There were 222 individuals being hospitalized and of those 79 were in the ICU.

To date, 556,173 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The age range with the most confirmed cases is 18- to 39-year-olds. The two demographics with the highest number of cases are Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Hispanic/Latino.

Four people officially listed as missing through the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) are still missing.

The Town Crier contacted RCSD Friday morning for any updates on the cases of Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane, Dia Abrams and Rosario Garcia.

According to CBS Channel 8 out of San Diego, multiple search warrants were issued by RCSD back in June.

Channel 8 reported that on June 12, "detectives traveled to New Mexico and seized a Ford RV belonging to Keith Harper, Abrams' 71-year-old fiancé. Investigators impounded the vehicle and removed a 'section of front driver seat' as evidence, according to the search warrant."

The news station also reported "In a June 8 search warrant served on the Bonita Vista Ranch, investigators seized a list of evidence, including a tan bed sheet with possible blood, a Band-Aid with possible blood, a piece of toilet paper with possible blood, two spent bullet casings (with F and REM markings), two handwritten letters and a Netgear router."

"Officers seized more than 2,300 marijuana plants and 357 pounds of processed marijuana, according to the warrant," Channel 8 reported Sept. 2. "The records do not indicate who had been renting the property from Abrams."

In addition, the news station reported, "Detectives described Abrams' disappearance as a 'possible homicide' in search warrants obtained by News 8."

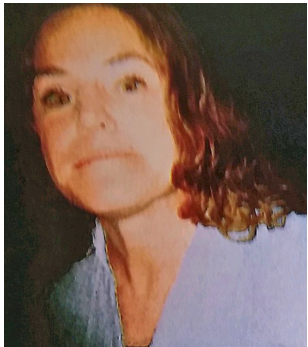

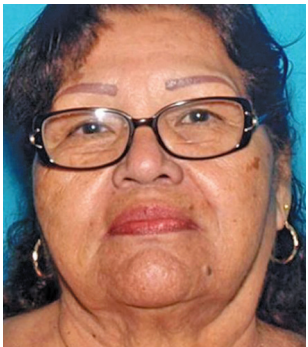

The county is urging residents and visitors to follow the state’s face covering requirement in common and public indoor spaces and outdoors when distancing is not possible. In addition to covering your face, the county also urges everyone to keep 6 feet of distance and wash their hands.

Gov. Gavin Newsom signed legislation Wednesday that he says will help assist small businesses.

The governor’s office announced “Assembly Bill 1577 conforms state law to federal law by excluding from gross income Paycheck Protection Program loans that were forgiven through the federal CARES Act and subsequent amendments in the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act of 2020.

“Senate Bill 1447 authorizes a \$100-million hiring tax credit program for qualified small businesses. The hiring credit will be equal to \$1,000 for each net increase in qualified employees, up to \$100,000 for each qualified small business employer.

“Senate Bill 115, a budget trailer bill, by the Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review appropriates \$561 million in fiscal year 2020-21. This includes \$411.5 million to advance economic stimulus with \$230.5 million to help jump-start construction projects.”

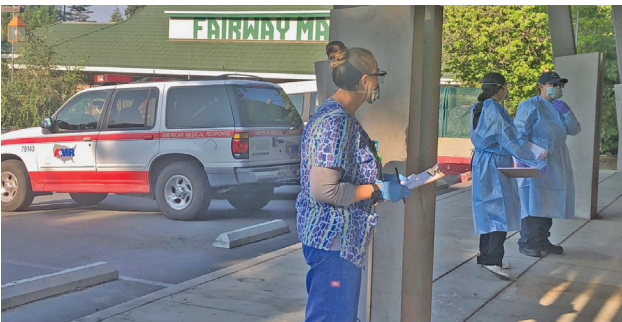
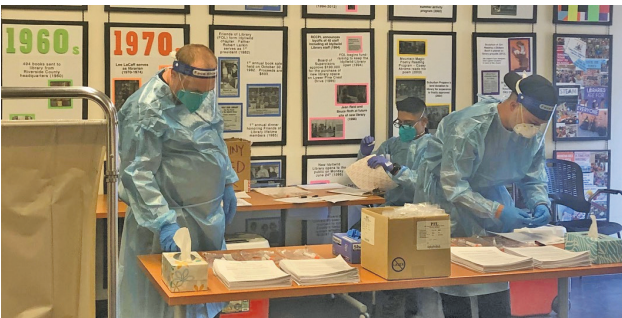
During Wednesday’s press conference, Newsom reminded everyone that small businesses create two-thirds of new jobs and employ nearly half all private sector employees. In addition, he stated there are 4.1 million small businesses in California, employ-

ing 7.2 million workers — just under half the state’s workforce — and 44% of those small businesses, according to survey data, are at-risk of shutting down.

Previously, the Riverside County board of supervisors unanimously approved using \$4 million in CARES Act funding for the Pathways to Employment program which will recruit 500 unemployed adults impacted by the pandemic to receive work training and mentoring.

Participants will receive a stipend of \$20 per hour, training and mentoring from nonprofit and government partners and supportive services including transportation, clothing, counseling and technological assistance.

COVID-19 testing

COVID-19 testing is available for those with or without symptoms. Testing is free and available for everyone.

Residents can visit www.rivcoph.org/coronavirus/testing to schedule an appointment online or call 800-945-6171 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. to make an appointment over the phone for drive-up testing. Looking for a shorter wait time when calling to make an appointment? The county suggests calling between the hours of 5 and 10 p.m.

Schools update

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) began the school year Aug. 17 fully online. Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) students began their 2020/21 school year Aug. 31 with distance learning.

IAA students will be able to return to campus Oct. 1. Dr. Cameron Kaiser, the county’s public health officer, said “They are authorized to allow students back as a hotel as a boarding school, not for in-person instruction.” IAA staff

hopes that in-person instruction can begin by the time students return Oct. 1. The county must move from purple to red on the governor’s new tier system.

HUSD provides mobile hot spots. However, it realized that was not always adequate in the areas of Anza and Idyllwild. In response, the district stationed two buses that distribute a WiFi signal — one at Idyllwild Community Playground and the other at Camp Maranatha — from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Wednesdays. HUSD partnered with the Anza Community Center to bring internet access to students.

Riverside County public and private schools, kindergarten through sixth grade, may now apply for a waiver to conduct in-person education, the county announced Friday, Aug. 21. The district is “assessing the requirements associated with the waiver process and will be engaging the governing board in a study session Sept. 22 to seek direction,” wrote HUSD Public Information Officer Alexandra Sponheim.

Reopening

Gov. Gavin Newsom outlined a color-coded, tiered system that will use two metrics to measure the coronavi-

rus: spread rate and test positivity percentage.

The tiers are designated by four colors: purple (widespread), red (substantial), orange (moderate) and yellow (minimal with the lowest restrictions).

Counties must remain at each tier for a minimum of 21 days. The metrics will be tracked at www.COVID19.ca.gov. Once a county is in the red tier for at least two weeks, schools can reopen without a waiver.

As of press time, hair salons and barbershops, and malls (at 25% capacity) are allowed to reopen. Bars remain closed. Restaurants, wineries and tasting rooms, movie theaters, family entertainment centers, zoos and museums, and cardrooms must move business outdoors, and if unable, close once again. Restaurants and other businesses may still do takeout but are not permitted to have indoor dining. Restrictions have also been placed on the following: fitness centers and gyms, worship services, offices for non-critical sectors and personal care services. The county said that businesses may do curbside retail, as long as there are no indoor operations.

HUSD serves students supper, lunch and breakfast at no charge for students enrolled at Hamilton School, Hamilton High School, Idyllwild School, Academy of Innovation and Hemet High. Meal kits are distributed Mondays and Thursdays from 2:30 to 4 p.m. and will contain breakfast, lunch and supper for three days.

Idyllwild Songwriter Festival: The festival, originally scheduled for Sept. 25 to 27, has been canceled.

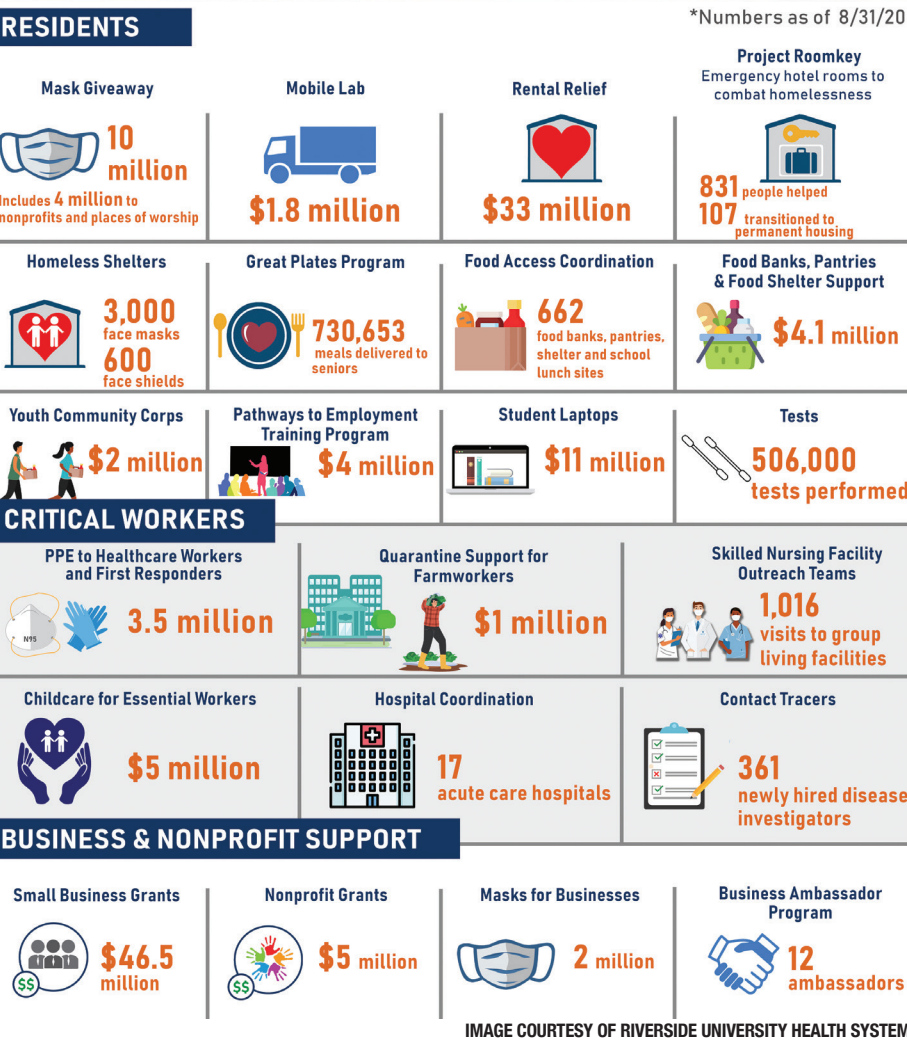

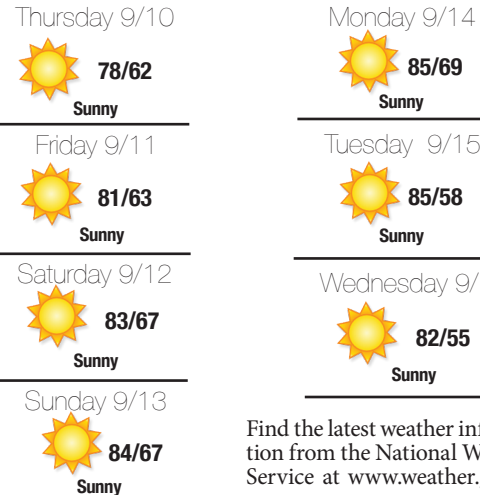

CHP continues safety campaign

Some may have noticed a recent increase in enforcement by the California Highway Patrol (CHP). This increased enforcement is due to community concern regarding unsafe speeds in and around town.

Long-time resident Eric Townsend said in an email at the beginning of July, "On busy weekends with crowded streets, pedestrians in the street, I see people speeding on North Circle Drive as if the street were empty. One to two times per week I get a speeder going maybe 50 mph on my street. Since my street is partially a school zone and there are kids in the street (no sidewalks), this is sort of nuts."

CHP Captain Mike Alvarez heard the concern from the community. Alvarez and Supervisor Chuck Washington's office decided to start a traffic safety campaign.

"Our goal has and always will be public safety for the communities we serve," Alvarez said. "Our main focus during this campaign was to ensure the residents and visitors of Idyllwild and Pine Cove remain safe, particularly during these stressful times."

The campaign was made possible by grant hours provided by entities like the Office of Traffic Safety and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"The grant objectives for our Idyllwild campaign focuses on speed reduction and other primary collision factor violations,"

Alvarez explained. "I usually deploy resources using this grant when our communities and/or local elected officials express concerns about an increase in moving violations and/or crashes. The grant cycle lasts 12 months, so we try to be strategic about deployments."

The campaign began Aug. 10. In a short 17-day period — from Aug. 10 to Aug. 27 — a total of 75 citations were issued, as well as six vehicle impoundments and two arrests due to impaired driving.

CHP broke down the citations by type: 65% were for speeding and 31% for failure to wear seat belts.

"On a positive note, no injury or fatal crashes were investigated during this 17-day period," Alvarez said.

CHP also released an educational video on its social media platforms reminding the community to drive safely and educate the public on traffic laws.

"We will continue to partner with our community and elected officials to ensure we meet the public's expectations," Alvarez said. "I would like to remind all motorists to continue to drive safe. We always encourage community engagement and feedback, and request our community members contact us at SanGorgonioPass@chp.ca.gov."

This campaign will be on-going as long as CHP sees fit. Alvarez explained, "As of right now, this traffic safety campaign remains on-going until statistics indicate driver behavior has been modified."

Forest Service temporarily closes Southern California National Forests, adds prohibitions in others

Most of California remains under the threat of unprecedented and dangerous fire conditions with a combination of extreme heat, significant windstorms, dry conditions and firefighting resources that are stretched to the limit.

Due to these conditions, the USDA Forest Service Pacific Southwest Region announced the following temporary closures and fire restrictions on Sept. 7 to provide for public safety and reduce the potential for human caused fire starts.

They went into effect at 5 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 7 and will be re-evaluated daily

as conditions change.

1. Closure of the following National Forests: Stanislaus National Forest, Sierra National Forest, Sequoia National Forest, Inyo National Forest, Los Padres National Forest, Angeles National Forest, San Bernardino National Forest and Cleveland National Forest.
2. Prohibition of the use of any ignition source on all National Forest System lands (campfires, gas stoves, etc.) throughout California.
3. Closure of all developed campgrounds and day-use sites on National Forests in California.

"The wildfire situation throughout California is dangerous and must be taken seriously," said Randy Moore, regional forester for the USDA Forest Service Pacific Southwest Region. "Existing fires are displaying extreme fire behavior, new fire starts are likely, weather conditions are worsening and we simply do not have enough resources to fully fight and contain every fire. We are bringing every resource to bear nationally and internationally to fight these fires, but until conditions improve, and we are confident that National Forest visitors can recreate safely, the priority is always to protect the public and our firefighters. With these extreme conditions, these temporary actions will help us do both."

Newsom unveils partnership with Sesame Workshop for back-to-school PSAs

On Tuesday, Sept. 8, Gov. The PSAs will be widely distributed through paid media as part of the statewide Your Actions Save Lives campaign, as well as through donated media from multiple partners including the Ad Council, PBS, Univision, LA Dodgers, Anaheim Ducks/Honda Center, San Francisco 49ers, San Francisco Giants, Auto Club, Speedway/General Outdoor, LA Kings, LA Galaxy, AEG, LA Lakers, LA Clippers, LA Forum, LA Rams/SoFi Stadium, FoxSports, iHeart Media, Golden State Warriors, LA Sparks, Sacramento Kings, Anaheim Angels and LAFC.

As part of Sesame Workshop's #Caring-ForEachOther initiative to support families during the COVID-19 pandemic, the three new English- and Spanish-language PSAs feature the lovable Sesame Street Muppets promoting best practices for children and families during the pandemic, including how to properly wear a mask, physically distance, wash hands, and navigate the hybrid learning environment many California children are experiencing this fall.

"As parents, we tell our kids all the time about the importance of washing hands, staying 6 feet apart and wearing masks, but it just might register differently if those messages come from Elmo," said Newsom. "With parents and kids preparing for back to school — many through distance learning — it's critical that we use messengers kids feel comfortable with to share important health tips about COVID, while also providing them assurances during this unique time that they aren't alone."

"The messenger is equally as important as the message," said Lindsey Spindle, president of The Jeff Skoll Group. "In these new PSAs, the iconic Elmo, Oscar the Grouch, Grover and Elmo's dad Louie help children

understand how to stay safe in and out of school during the pandemic by practicing social distancing, hand-washing, and mask-wearing. On behalf of Jeff Skoll and our dedicated teams at the Skoll Foundation and Participant, we are proud to partner with the state of California, Governor Newsom and Sesame Workshop to creatively emphasize that we all have roles to play in curbing the spread of this virus, and that it can be done when we work together."

In my opinion, the most important role of a local newspaper in our democratic society is to share community service information and foster transparent dialogue among residents, public agencies, businesses and nonprofit groups. Although that dialogue is sometimes negative, as has recently been the case with the Idyllwild Water District, it is reassuring when the process leads to positive results.

Such was the case when I read a Letter to Editor in the Town Crier's Sept. 3 edition about a proposed ordinance being considered by Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) that would expand the requirement for automatic fire sprinkler systems in certain situations. The letter writer urged residents to look into both sides of the issue and voice our opinion to the IFPD commissioners.

Following a cursory scan of the ordinance language, I decided to email the fire chief and commissioners to "voice my strong opposition to the ordinance." I said it appeared to me that the potential cost for sprinklers would be prohibitive to existing homeowners like myself who might want to add extra rooms to our cabin.

Thirteen hours later, I received a polite and detailed reply from Captain [Jim] LaMont whom I've never met or corresponded with before. After reading his thoughtful explanation on why the proposed ordinance would not apply in my case — and for most other residents simply adding a new room or two — I totally changed my position and gained a new appreciation for Idyllwild Fire.

This is how our democracy and civil society are supposed to work. The Town Crier and letter writer successfully informed me and other residents of the facts. I evaluated the information and expressed my concerns to IFPD, and Captain LaMont proactively responded via email which transformed my negative opinion into a positive one. Kudos to our local newspaper, to the letter writer and to Idyllwild Fire for their public service!

backgrounds. And they "will not reflect or promote, directly or indirectly, any bias, bigotry or discrimination" against any person or group.

"I was happy to put in the language," said Medina, who said it was similar to wording in the state's sexual education and health law adopted in 2015.

Late Monday, the Senate voted 33 to 4 to pass AB 331 after little discussion. Sen. Andreas Borgeas, R-Fresno, questioned whether the Legislature should be mandating additional graduation requirements when it is also encouraging students to pursue vocational options.

"Something has to give to make room for this," he said. But Borgeas also said he supports ethnic studies and voted for the bill.

Completion of an ethnic studies course would satisfy one of the English or social studies courses required for graduation.

California to require ethnic studies to graduate high school under bill headed to Gov. Newsom

California would become the first state to require that all high school students pass a one-semester ethnic studies course to graduate if Gov. Gavin Newsom signs a bill that the Legislature passed on Monday [Aug. 31], the last day of the legislative session.

But in order to get Assembly Bill 331 out of a Senate committee and on to a final vote, the primary author, Assemblyman Jose Medina, D-Riverside, proposed one amendment and accepted several others.

One amendment would push back the start date to the graduating class of 2029-30; districts would have to begin offering a course in the 2025-26 school year. Medina said the new schedule would give schools and districts "plenty of time to prepare for a smooth implementation" and give the state time to provide funding for the new courses, which would be considered a state mandate.

Another amendment would allow a school district's or charter school's governing board to adopt a "locally developed" ethnic studies course instead of a statewide model ethnic studies curriculum that is being developed.

In early 2021, the State Board of Education is required to adopt the model curriculum, which has been the subject of intense debate and criticism and is now in its second revision. Since the model curriculum is intended to serve as a guide, not a mandated curriculum, the bill would give districts and schools flexibility to decide what would be taught.

The amendment makes that authority explicit and creates the possibility that some districts would adopt a course that pays little attention to the model curriculum's focus on the four minority groups traditionally covered by ethnic studies courses. They are African Americans, Latinos, Asian Americans and Native Americans.

"That would not be my intent," Medina said Monday.

Last week, the state's largest school district, Los Angeles Unified, on its own adopted an ethnic studies graduation requirement, starting in 2023-24. Earlier last month, Fresno Unified, the state's fourth-largest district, adopted a two-semester ethnic studies requirement, starting with the class of 2021-22. Medina said he would not be surprised if other districts also establish an earlier timetable.

Quick passage of this bill, and another requiring ethnic studies for California State University graduates, which Newsom signed into law on Aug. 17, re-

flects the power of the Black Lives Matter protest movement and the growing recognition that all children should be taught the historical roots and the enduring legacy of ethnic and racial prejudice in America.

Ethnic studies broadly examine the history, culture, politics, contributions and prejudices facing ethnic and racial ethnic groups nationwide. But in California, ethnic studies grew out of protests at San Francisco State and UC Berkeley in the late 1960s. They led to demands for ethnic studies courses focusing on the four minority groups whose political struggles and rich heritage, advocates said, have been ignored in literature and history courses.

At the direction of Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond, the California Department of Education's draft curriculum keeps the focus on those four groups.

The draft curriculum emphasizes the importance of giving all students the opportunity to explore their own backgrounds and ethnicities. Its eight goals include enabling students to develop a better understanding of others, promoting "self-empowerment" for civic engagement and fostering "interpersonal communication." The preamble recognizes that content that "challenges conventional ideals or prompts difficult conversations" may be controversial.

Proposed sample lessons delve into issues like the persecution of Native Americans starting in the Mission period, the discrimination against Mexican Americans as well as their influences on California politics and culture. Lessons would also focus on police profiling and government redlining policies that banned African Americans from white neighborhoods.

But in comments and testimonies over the past year, other ethnic groups, including Armenians, Sikhs and Indian immigrants, have objected that the model curriculum ignores their experiences. Jewish Americans objected to references to Jewish stereotypes and the downplaying of anti-Semitism. Critics said lesson plans were ideological, with a leftist perspective that sees the American experience only through the lens of oppression and identity politics.

To address concerns, Medina agreed to several amendments proposed by the California Legislative Jewish Caucus that would assure that ethnic studies courses would be objective and non-prejudicial. Instruction and materials, the amendments state, shall not teach or promote religious doctrine and will be appropriate for students of all races, religions, genders, sexual orientations and diverse ethnic and cultural

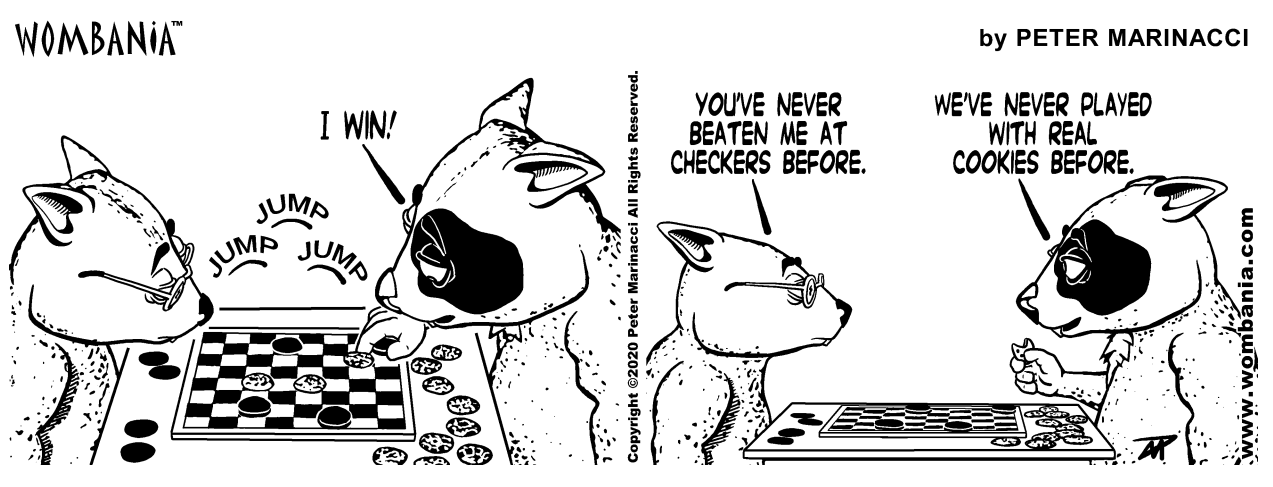

The purchasers made significant efforts to preserve many of the building’s most charming features, including the original Town Hall sign and the beautiful stone fireplace and chimney.

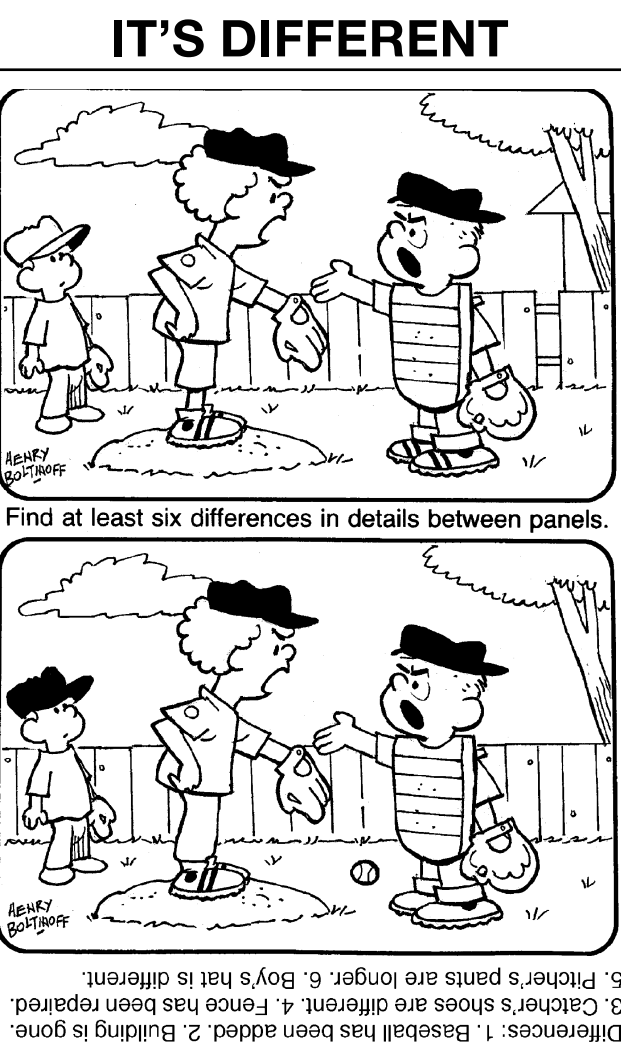
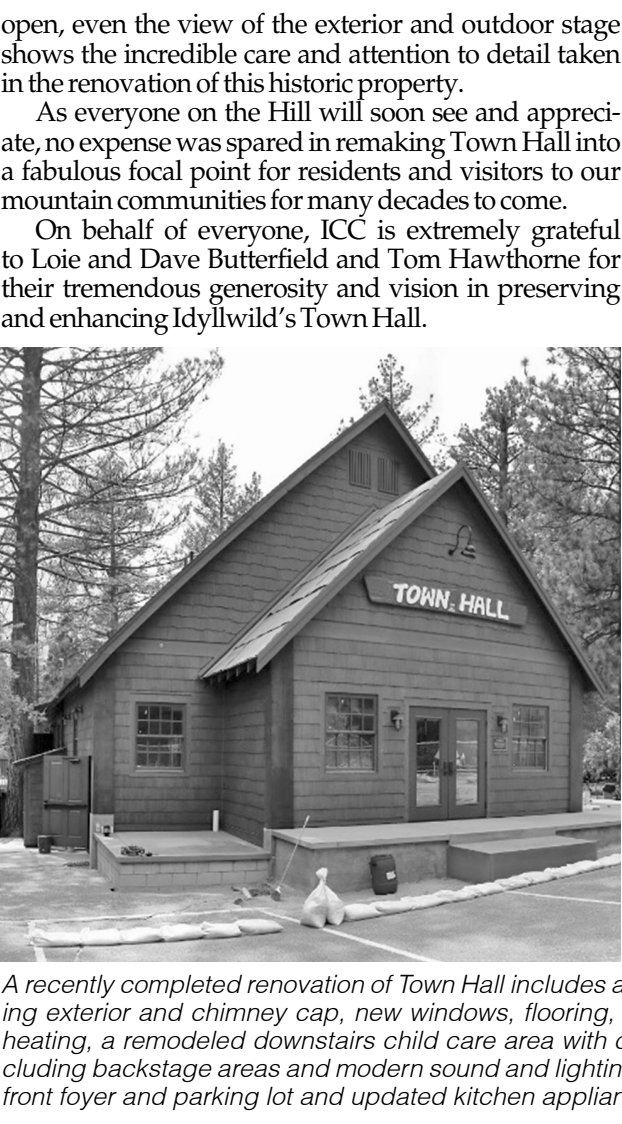
The new owners also took into account ICC’s future planned uses of the property, including the expansion of ICC’s existing recreational and social programs, the Sunday Farmers Market and monthly Feeding America pantry box distribution, expanded programing for kids, families, seniors and visitors, outdoor concerts, indoor theater performances, enhanced child care services, as well as making the property available for weddings, conferences, meetings and other rental uses and events. This renovation project was inspired and led by Shane Stewart, the broker of Idyllwild Realty and a licensed general contractor.

The project was implemented using all local Hill vendors, including Terry Griner of Griner Construction and his crews, Keith Smith of Harold K. Smith Excavating and Materials, Steve Holldber of Idyllwild Heating & Cooling and Larry Donahoo of Village Hardware.

A fire and a heat wave

Not only is the area experiencing unhealthy air quality as a result of the El Dorado Fire but the hottest day on record for Idyllwild was Sept. 6. The temperature reached 104 degrees.

Gov. Gavin Newsom signed an emergency proclamation Sept. 3 to free up additional energy capacity amid extreme temperatures.

The California Independent System Operator (ISO) urges people to conserve energy in the afternoons and evenings. For more tips to conserve energy, visit <https://www.flexalert.org/>.

In a county press release regarding air quality, Dr. Cameron Kaiser, Riverside County public health officer, recommends that those who live in areas impacted by smoke and ash should avoid strenuous activity, remain indoors with the air conditioning on and windows and doors closed. Also, keep the indoor air fresh with a clean filtering system to prevent from bringing smoke inside.

“Residents in the San Geronio Pass and western Riverside County need to be aware of the risks of breathing unhealthy air and take steps to keep safe,” said Kaiser. The county let residents and visitors know on Tuesday that the smoke and ash advisory was issued effective Sept. 8 until further notice.

The 11,000-plus-acre El Dorado Fire in San Bernardino County was 19% contained as of press time. The fire started around 10:20 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 5 in the El Dorado Ranch Park in Yucaipa.

Cal Fire released that the fire “burning near Oak Glen in San Bernardino County was caused by a smoke-generating pyro-

technic device used during a gender reveal party.”

The county also reminds people that “wildfire smoke can cause a range of health issues, which include burning eyes, runny nose, shortness of breath, scratchy throat, headaches and chest pains. Smoke can also worsen chronic heart and lung disease.”

“We have taken a number of precautions to ensure everyone is safe while they are evacuated,” said Bruce Barton, director of the County of Riverside Emergency Management Department. “In addition to sheltering away from smoke, we implemented expanded precautions to ensure evacuated residents are protected from COVID-19 with screening, physical distancing, sanitation stations and a number of other safety measures.”

Missing persons

“Abrams went missing under suspicious circumstances and foul play is suspected,” Riverside detectives wrote in a June 9 warrant.”

The Town Crier asked RCSD if any of the information from Channel 8 could be confirmed.

On Tuesday morning Correctional Sergeant Deanna Pecoraro said, “At this time, none of this information is able to be confirmed. We have not confirmed or discussed this information with the Channel 8 (San Diego).”

As of print time, no further details or information was available regarding Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane or Rosario Garcia.

Melissa Lane, 41, was last seen June 15, according to a poster on display in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane’s mother, “She was an avid hiker, but didn’t have a destination. She was last seen in Pine Cove. I don’t know if she’s dead or alive.”

Rosario Garcia was last seen July 7 wearing a brown shirt and blue jeans at the 26000 block of Katherine Street in Hemet. Garcia is a 73-year-old Hispanic female and it is possible she suffers from

dementia or Alzheimer’s disease. She is 5’ 3” tall and 120 pounds.

Palm Desert deputies from the RCSD were dispatched to the area of 70000 East Highway 74 in Pinyon Pines at 11:46 a.m. on July 9 after Garcia’s vehicle was found unoccupied. Garcia was not located after a search of the area was conducted.

“We are asking if anyone has any information or knows the whereabouts of Rosario Garcia to contact law enforcement immediately,” wrote Pecoraro.

Earlier in the year, local Roy Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. on the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

RCSD Deputy Jeremy Parsons said, “After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days.” Also adding, “On the second or third day of the search, we

found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts.”

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Lydia “Dia” Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams is 65 years old, 5’ 5” tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jack, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams’ 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley) on June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams.

RMRU went out again on June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground search.

Free disposable masks for everyone

The Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) is distributing free disposable masks to anyone in (or visiting) the mountain communities. Packages of masks are available every Sunday at ICC’s booth at the Farmers Market at Town Hall (9 a.m. to 2 p.m.). Future distributions will occur outside the post office. ICC will also include packages of free masks in its Feeding America pantry box food distributions on the first Tuesday of each month outside of Town Hall.

Additionally, ICC has delivered 50-count boxes of free masks to all public-facing businesses in Idyllwild and will do so again in a month or so. All businesses and organizations (public-facing or not) are welcome to obtain free masks. Contact ICC through the website idyllwildcommunitycenter.org.

The mask distribution is part of a countywide program sponsored by Riverside County in conjunction with a wide variety of nonprofits and local organizations. The purpose of the program is to make free masks available to everyone throughout the county to protect against the spread of COVID-19.

Other local organizations participating in the county’s mask distribution program include Idyllwild Fire Protection District, Idyllwild HELP Center and Mountain Communities Mutual Aid, which will include free masks in its weekly food boxes.

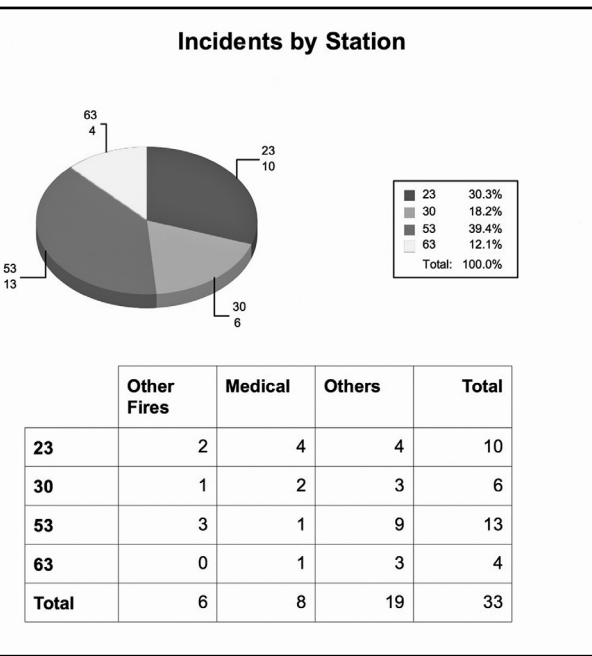

Few people live in Idyllwild who can say they were actually born in Idyllwild. Many live here but are born in nearby hospitals or birthing centers. However, Tammy Fogle was born in Idyllwild with the help of midwives.

While Fogle was born here, she moved around a lot growing up. Her father served as military police.

"We moved around a lot," Fogle explained. "I went to 15 schools before graduating from high school."

Life progressed very quickly for Fogle. While most children are still at home going to school and being a kid at the age of 13, Fogle took a different path.

At the age of 13, Fogle moved out of her parents' house and took a job at McDonald's.

"I didn't want to be a nurse," Fogle said. "I wanted to be a homicide detective, but since my mom was there, she invited me to come to the hospital."

Fogle managed to juggle going to nursing school at San Bernardino Adult School at Loma Linda University Medical Center while finishing up high school at Redlands High School. She also had a job at the same time.

"We opened on a Friday, but we didn't expect to get much business because we didn't promote anything," Rostro said. "By Saturday, it was packed. We've got a lot of good feedback."

Dear Idyllwild Community,

Idyllwild Arts Academy is off to a great start as students began classes on August 31. In this virtual environment, we met students in 33 countries and are holding classes throughout the day to accommodate many different time zones; we have "flipped the classroom," which allows students to learn at their own pace and maximize one-on-one interactions with teachers and peers; and we held our annual Back-to-School Showcase, this time featuring students as well as faculty and staff. With classes underway, we now turn our attention to bringing students back to campus, their home away from home.

As I write this letter, Riverside County is in a purple tier, indicating that the virus is widespread. However, with cases declining and Idyllwild's unique location in a secluded, mountain community, Riverside County Health Department has granted permission for students to return to campus on October 1. Based on Health Department Guidelines, we will test students before as well as frequently after they've arrived on campus, assign cohorts, and determine that all students are virus-free before beginning modified, in-person classes. Riverside County must also move from a purple tier to a red tier before Idyllwild Arts Academy can resume modified, in-person instruction.

Our extensive reopening plan includes frequent testing, extensive and ongoing cleaning, reconfigured spaces such as the dining hall, classrooms, and the bookstore, increased technology throughout the campus, and much, much more. While on campus, everyone is expected to adhere strictly to CDC guidelines that include wearing masks and social distancing. There will be no public performances during the semester and students will be prohibited from going into town, both during the week and on weekends. Visitors to campus will be highly restricted. If you would like to learn more about our reopening plan, please visit our website at www.idyllwildarts.org. Our highest priority is to keep our community healthy and safe throughout this pandemic.

We remain hopeful that in-person instruction can begin soon after boarding students return to campus. While student performances and exhibits cannot be held publicly, we expect to have a number of presentations online. We hope you will join us.

“Loma Linda paid for my nursing schooling because I was working,” Fogle said. “I just had to pay for books and uniforms.”

On June 21, 1990, Fogle graduated from nursing school as a licensed vocational nurse (LVN). On June 22, 1990, she graduated with her high school diploma from Redlands High School.

Fogle worked for Loma Linda off and on for 16 years. She’s worked in all different areas of nursing, but her favorite has always been pediatrics, specifically labor and delivery.

Not long out of high school, her brother introduced her to the U.S. Forest Service.

“My brother had been in the California Conservation Corps (CCC) and said he learned a lot of cool things, and if I wanted to do something different, to join,” she said. “They sent me up north to Hayfork between Redding and Eureka.”

While there, Fogle did everything from salmon restoration with the Department of Fish and Wildlife to emergency response after natural disasters, including battling wildfires.

While she was in the CCC she attended a 30-day fire academy through the U.S. Forest Service, eventually becoming the first CCC female captain.

“I was the first female captain the CCC ever had,” Fogle said. “I was also the only one in Hayfork that lived with 56 gang members for a while. I never had a bad crew. I still keep in contact with some of them.”

Fogle was the captain of fire crews from the U.S Forest Service and the department of corrections, leading them on the front lines of hundreds of wildfires. Many in the department of corrections also went to school to obtain their GED or college education. While they did that, Fogle took photography at the College of the Redwoods, a hobby she always wanted to learn.

When Fogle returned to Idyllwild, she started working for Idyllwild Fire and continued her nursing career at the Idyllwild Health Center, working there for 11 years.

She’s been very active in the community. Along with her work, she also volunteers as the activities chair for the Idyllwild Volunteer Fire Company, helping organize events all over town throughout the year.

Due to Fogle’s extensive nursing knowledge and training, she is a certified LVN II. The training opened the door to the opportunity to be a travel nurse.

Fogle now works for seven different travel nursing businesses, going to other states or anywhere in California when needed.

“I probably get 20-30 requests a week from all over the country,” Fogle said. “We are usually in hospitals or convalescent homes depending on the state.”

When traveling for work, Fogle is normally gone for three to four months. However, there are times it has stretched out to eight months or more. When she is in Idyllwild, she works part-time for the Regenerative Medical Group and can be seen at Fern Creek Medical Center.

With no intention of stopping and still having the passion for being of service, Fogle said, “I’ve now been in nursing for 31 years and fire for 30 years.”

Outside of her many work travels, Fogle also loves traveling for fun. She’s been all over the world, vacationing and helping on mission trips.

“Every couple of years, I’ll plan a trip overseas,” she said. “I research and plan for two years before I go, and then visit multiple countries if I can. The history and cultures are amazing.”

While the travel bug was ingrained at such a young age, and adventure is always on the horizon, Fogle always enjoys coming home to the place it all began.

“I love our community,” Fogle confessed. “We’re a melting pot of all kinds of people, and that’s part of what makes Idyllwild so special. I’m blessed to live in our town of amazing people in the mountains and amazing forest.”
