

2020 tree lighting and holiday market update

This year has posed numerous challenges for local nonprofit and community events, and this year's annual Christmas Tree Lighting and Harvest Festival are, unfortunately, no exception. The good news, however, is that both events are not

entirely canceled. Although the Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) cannot, due to COVID-19 restrictions, shut down the center of town to put on the full Christmas Tree Lighting event with live music, holiday carolers, food and booths surrounding IdyPark, some important aspects of the annual festivities will be happening.

First, through the generous sponsorship of Ferro Restaurant, all of the trees in IdyPark in the center of town will be lit, just as they were last year. The initial lighting of the trees will occur, as always, just after sundown on Saturday, Nov. 28 (the Saturday of Thanksgiving weekend).

Rumor has it that some very special guests might pay a drive-around visit through town with a quick stop to "flip the switch" on the tree lights as pre-recorded holiday music plays in IdyPark.

Second, although Idyllwild Rotary will not be presenting its annual indoor Harvest Festival this year, ICC will be sponsoring an outdoor Idyllwild Mountain Market featuring many local handicrafts, gifts, antiques, art, etc., on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 27 and 28. The markets will be held on both days in the parking lot at the Idyllwild Community Playground at Ridgeview Drive and Highway 243 from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Although the outdoor Idyllwild Mountain Market event is subject to the weather, the good news is that the current forecast for those days is sunny with a high in the mid-50s. Fingers crossed that one bright spot in 2020 will be nice weather on the Hill that weekend.

Still looking for updates on missing people

Tajah Connelly Horner recently went missing in the Anza area. She was located just before the Town Crier went to press last week. The newspaper followed up with the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) media information bureau on her condition when she was located.

"That information was not shared with us only that she was located safely and removed from the missing persons system," wrote RCSD Sgt. Deanna Pecoraro in an email last Tuesday evening.


The newspaper reached out again to the media information bureau seeking any updates regarding the four still missing people in the Idyllwild and surrounding area. Pecoraro responded that they have no updates at this time. Since the beginning of June, the Town Crier has contacted the media information bu-

reau every week in an attempt to receive updates about the missing people in and around the Idyllwild area. Connelly Horner was the seventh person to go missing since March of this year. Four of

the seven people remain missing. Lydia "Dia" Abrams, Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane and Rosario Garcia remain missing.

Pecoraro responded a couple of weeks ago writing, "Sorry for the delayed response as it has been a bit busy for us this week.

"I spoke with our Hemet Station and they have advised that during the month of August, searches were conducted by our Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit, in the last known See Missing persons, page A6

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

More counties join Riverside in purple tier

Gov. Gavin Newsom moved 28 counties back to the most-restricted purple tier of the state's tier system Monday. Riverside County was already in the purple tier. According to the press release issued Monday, 94.1% of the state's population now resides in the purple tier.

According to the state's tier system, purple means the virus is widespread and that many nonessential indoor business operations are closed.

Congress still has not passed another stimulus package to assist small businesses and those who have suffered permanent job loss as we move into winter.

"We are sounding the alarm," said Newsom. "California is experiencing the fastest increase in cases we have seen yet — faster than what we experienced at the outset of the pandemic or even this summer. The spread of COVID-19, if left unchecked, could quickly overwhelm our health care system and lead to catastrophic outcomes. That is why we are pulling an emergency brake in the Blueprint for a Safer Economy. Now is the time to do all we can - government at all levels and Californians across the state — to flatten the curve again as we have done before."

"California is also strengthening its face covering guidance to require individuals to wear a mask whenever outside their home with limited exceptions," the press release reads. Visit https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/ CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/guidance-for-face-coverings.aspx, to read the updated guidance.

The state added 1,872 beds at alternate care sites outside of the hospital system in the event there is a surge in cases.

According to the Riverside University Health System - Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 27 reported COVÍD-19 cases since the outbreak and one death reported. Twenty-three of the 27 people have recovered.

As of press time on Nov. 17, Riverside County has 75,848 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 1,374 deaths related to COVID-19 and 64,922 people have recovered. There are 310 individuals being hospitalized and of those 78 are in the intensive care unit (ICU). The county's positivity rate is 6.7%. The current adjusted

case rate per 100,000 is 13.9.

As of press time on Nov. 10, Riverside County had 71,620 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,338 deaths related to COVID-19 and 63,478 people had recovered. There were 228 individuals being hospitalized and of those 64 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 5.9%. The current adjusted case rate per

As of press time on Nov. 3, Riverside County had 68,920 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,322 deaths related to COVID-19 and 61,421 people had recovered. There were 179 individuals being hospitalized and of those 43 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 5.6%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 10.1.

As of press time on Oct. 27, Riverside County had 66,732 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,295 deaths related to COVID-19 and 59,516 people had recovered. There were 164 individuals being hospitalized and of those 60 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 5.2%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 9.1.

To date, 950,956 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The two demographics with the highest number of cases are Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Hispanic/Latino.

HUSD will continue with the online learning model through Jan. 21 for elementary students and Feb. 1 for middle and high school students.

The district previously announced, "This decision was made due to concerns related to safety and the desire to create the most stable and consistent learning environment for students. The potential disruption to in-person instruction in the hybrid-model is due to procedures and protocols that the district is directed to follow from the State and County Public Health officers." Reopening

Gov. Gavin Newsom outlined a color-coded, tiered system that will use two metrics to measure the coronavirus: spread rate and test positivity percentage.

The tiers are designated by four colors: purple (widespread), red (substantial), orange (moderate) and yellow (minimal with the lowest restrictions).

Counties must remain at each tier for a minimum of 21 days. The metrics are tracked at www.COVID19. ca.gov. Riverside County moved back to the purple tier on Oct. 20.

Director Hunt pushes back on salary schedule increases

The Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors approved in a 4-1 vote to implement a pay grade and step schedule, and eliminate automatic 5% salary increase upon completion of certifications.

General Manager Leo Havener wrote in the staff report that the "board of directors will consider approving general manager recommendation of a proposed pay grade and step schedule and eliminate the district policy of an auto-matic 5% increase in pay upon completion of each certificate obtained.

"The existing salary step schedule has no grades, job titles only, and 20 steps for each position. Additionally, there are inconsistencies between positions within the existing

salary step schedule that should be corrected."

Instead of 2.5% for each step, 5% was approved to go into effect next fiscal year (September 2021). Director Dave Hunt was the lone no vote.

The majority of the board's focus was on the office and

However, the general manager starts year one with \$102,212 on the chart. Havener currently has an annual salary of \$117,000. By year two, the base salary on the chart increases to \$107,454. By year 10, the salary increases to \$159,516. The chart is included with the story. According to the staff report, there is no fiscal impact.

On the agenda for Wednesday, Nov. 18 is a request brought forward by Hunt for the "board of directors to con-

sider reestablishing pay grade and step schedule that includes 2.5% per step and reestablish the district policy of a one-time bonus upon certification completion."

The background on this item reads: "The majority of local water districts have 12 steps of 2.5%. Our current step schedule increase of 5% from 2.5% is not consistent with the standards in the local industry. To assist in equity, a onestandards in the local industry. To assist in equity, a onetime bonus for certificate completion by employees would increase pay grade motivation. (Per Director Hunt)"

Regarding fiscal impact, the staff report says there is also none.

BBVA bank to be acquired by PNC

BBVA and PNC Financial Services Group, Inc. have announced that PNC will acquire BBVA USA, of which Idyllwild's BBVA bank is a branch. BBVA USA is a banking subsidiary of BBVA USA Bancshares, Inc., the whole of which is being purchased by PNC.

The transaction is not expected to be formally approved by regulatory agencies until the latter half of 2021. PNC has announced that it intends to merge BBVA

USA into PNC Bank, N.A. and to "convert BBVA USA customers to the PNC platform with BBVA USA branches assuming the PNC Bank name."

The Town Crier contacted our local BBVA branch on Monday morning for comment and to inquire as to how, if at all, this transaction is expected to impact customers here in Idyllwild.

Our BBVA branch referred us to an off-Hill press relations person, Christina Anderson, who declined specific comment regarding whether PNC would or would not be closing any of BBVA's branches - nor could she comment on any customer-affecting changes PNC would or would not be making at our local level.

In a follow-up email, Anderson added: "During this [regulatory approval] time, customers will continue to interact with the bank in the same way they always have. Customers should expect to receive communication on what to anticipate as the two banks integrate as PNC, and BBVA and PNC are both committed to working together to continue ongoing, transparent and open communication so customers know what to expect each step of the way."

The TC will report further details as they become available.

Fake Clorox and Lysol websites try to take people to the cleaners

Scammers follow the headlines. They take advantage of what's happening in the news to find new ways to get people to part with their money. During the COVID pandemic, cleaning supplies have been in high demand, but often in short supply. Scammers see that as opportunity knocking.

Last week, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) announced a complaint against defendants who are using fake websites (with real product names in the web address) and real product images and logos of wellknown brands like Clorox and Lysol — all to make people think they're buying products from the companies' official websites.

The FTC says that none of the sites are owned by, affiliated with, or authorized by the companies that make

Clorox and Lysol, and that none of the people who paid for cleaning and disinfecting products from these sites got what they or-

The FTC is working to shut down the sites, stop the defendants from setting up future sites and help people protect themselves against these kinds of scams.

Before you order from an unfamiliar online store, consider these tips to help avoid a

• When trying to find items that you know are in high demand and short supply like cleaning supplies or PPE in the middle of a pandemic — you need to be extra careful when buying online, especially if the The FTC is working to shut down the sites, stop the defendants from of stock elsewhere.

• Look at the terms of the sale (www.consumer.ftc. gov/articles/0020-shopping-online). Calculate the total price, including taxes, shipping and handling. Find out when you can expect your delivery. If you have to return the item, can you get a refund? Who pays for return shipping? Is there a restocking fee?

 Pay by credit card (www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/0221-billed-merchandise-you-never-received). You'll get protections under federal law, so you don't have to pay for merchandise you ordered but didn't get.

 If you have a problem with an online purchase, try to work it out with the seller, but remember: you have the right to reverse an unauthorized or fraudulent charge directly with your credit card issuer by filing a chargeback dispute (www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/ what-do-if-vou-were-scammed). And if you suspect a scam, let the FTC know at ReportFraud.ftc.gov. To learn more about avoiding COVID-related scams, visit ftc. gov/coronavirus.



ommended fourth year of math needed to be eligible for

Both the UC and California State University require three years of high school math but recommend four as part of the A-G courses that students must take to be eligible for admission. Historically, that typically includes Algebra 1, Geometry and Algebra 2, which often leads to Calcu-

But some students do not reach Algebra 2 or Calculus by their senior year, the courses aren't offered, or they don't want to take the courses because they don't align with their academic pathway, creating barriers to college admission

According to UC officials, the decision to accept a variety of quantitative reasoning courses for admission aims to provide more options outside of the traditional Calculus track, which isn't required for most non-STEM pathways.

It will also expose students to other math topics that are increasingly available on college campuses and in-demand in the workforce.

"There have been ongoing efforts from high schools to design and implement an expanded range of college-prep math courses, so at its core, this is an opportunity to broad-

en the range of course options for students to enter UC," said Eddie Comeaux, chairperson of the UC Board of Admission and Relations with Schools, which approved the admission change.

Students must still complete three years of math,

including a course in geometry or an integrated math ple ways to get to an answer. course that covers enough geometry to be eligible for UC. Approved math and quantitative reasoning courses must also cover topics included in elementary algebra, two- and three-dimensional geometry and advanced algebra.

In recent years, courses such as Introduction to Data Science (https://www.introdatascience.org), a high school course developed by LA Unified and UCLA, have grown increasingly popular. First offered in LA Unified in the 2014-15 school year, it has since expanded to 17 California school districts plus other districts in Idaho, New Jersey and Oregon.

Phineas Banning High School in LA was among the first schools to implement the data science course, which was already accepted by UC to meet the required third or optional fourth year of math before the recent admissions change.

Shirley Guzman, assistant principal at Phineas Banning, saw students struggling with the traditional math course progression and wanted to introduce opportunities to engage them in quantitative reasoning. After bringing on the course about five years ago, Guzman said students began to "see math differently because they felt successful in it, even if they didn't before or didn't like their Algebra courses."

Although UC already accepted that particular data science course, Guzman had trouble convincing counselors who work with students to develop their course sched-High school students planning to apply to the Univerules — to recommend students take data science instead of traditional advanced math courses. The expansion of acceptable math courses will help remove that barrier, she said, and hopefully encourage more schools to adopt and create alternative math options for students.

'Counselors feel better when it's in writing," Guzman said. "No one will question why a kid has data science instead of Algebra 2 in their transcripts. This validates a lot of

Updating the list of approved courses is also critical for expanding access to college for first-gennew college-prep math courses, math eration students, she said, education and equity advocates have because many of those students rely on their counselors for information about how to apply to college and what courses they can or should take.

Nearly 90% of students at Phineas Banning are eligible for free or reduced-price lunch and about 94% are Latino, according to data from the California Department of Education, and many graduates who go on to college are the first in their family to do so, Guzman said.

"We have to step away from thinking that there's only one way to get to college. Now we can tell students they can take statistics or computer science," Guzman said. "Giving students choices at the high school level is very important because if we narrow the pathway, we will leave a lot of students behind."

Supporters of UC's admissions update hope the move will encourage more schools to adopt alternative math courses and pathways for students.

"I think the admissions policy that UC has articulated really opens up more possibilities to teach math in ways that are more effective and better support students in developing quantitative reasoning skills, whether they want to pursue a STEM career or not," said Pamela Burdman, executive director of Just Equations, a nonprofit focusing on the role of mathematics in educational equity.

Comeaux, who is an associate professor of higher eduition at UC Riverside, sees the adoption of the Common

> 2015 as driving the appetite for differentiated math pathways. The current math standards have required a significant shift in instruction, such as emphasizing math concepts over memorizing facts and procedures and finding multi-

"You have all of these different ideas for math within Common Core," Comeaux said. "That appears to be the motivation for this movement because there are a number of campus stakeholders already engaged in these conver-

Math requirements for college admission stirred controversy last year when the California State University system proposed requiring a fourth year of math or a quantitative reasoning course for admission. Under that proposal, which is slated for a vote in 2022 (https://edsource. org/2020/csu-trustees-on-wednesday-delayed-decision-torequire-extra-year-of-high-school-math/623130), students could choose from a number of different courses to satisfy the additional year requirement, including data science,

computer science and applied mathematics.

Advocates of the CSU proposal said it would help students come better prepared for math courses in college. But skeptics pointed out it isn't necessary because the vast majority of students who attend CSU already take four years of math. They also argue that requiring an additional year of math or quantitative reasoning could put some students at a disadvantage if they are otherwise qualified for admission but they attend a school that doesn't offer enough

"My organization and others were concerned that CSU's proposed policy could narrow access because students' ability to take the fourth year was contingent on their high school circumstances," Burdman said. "We wanted to see more evidence about the claim that it wouldn't have a negative impact on equity."

Both the CSU proposal and UC's decision to revise its Core math standards in math course list open up a wider range of math courses students can take to be eligible for admission, and officials in both systems have said more exposure to advanced high school math will help prepare students for college-level courses. But unlike the CSU proposal, UC does not want to make it mandatory.

That's one reason why UC has so far put off increasing the number of science courses students must take to be considered for admission from two to three, which was proposed after the state adopted the Next Generation Science Standards in 2013.

If we increase the number of courses required, and a handful of high schools don't have access to enough science courses, what message does that send to students?" Comeaux said. "They can apply to UC, they still have as good of a chance to get in, but when you have students already at a disadvantage, the perception might be that 'we are not welcome."

Initially, Comeaux worried that the math courses update could put students at schools that don't have alternative quantitative reasoning courses at a disadvantage for admission. But those concerns have largely subsided after learning that schools can create their own quantitative reasoning courses, and that it won't create any new restrictions for prospective students.

"Just like any other discipline or content area," he said, "the opportunity to expose students to a wide range of options in math pushes their critical thinking skills and could expose them to another way of thinking that might not be presented to them."

area that Rosario Garcia and Roy Prifogle may have been. No additional information or leads were located during those searches. Melissa Lane is a continued investigation and as well have no updated information at this time. Dia Abrams is a continued investigation with no further update at this time."

The community remains confused by the lack of information being released by the media information bureau and wondering if their safety is at stake.

On Sept. 10, a ŘCSD SUV was spotted hauling an off-road vehicle near Highway 243 and Saunders Meadow Road. According to Hemet Sheriff Station

Capt. Leonard Purvis, "They were conduct-

ing follow-up searches for Melissa Lane." While it was unclear exactly where on the mountain deputies were searching for Lane, Purvis also confirmed that the search didn't provide any further information or evidence of where Lane may have gone missing. That is an update RCSD could

have provided. Lane, 41, was last seen June 15, according to a poster that was displayed in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane's mother, right after she was reported missing.

"She was an avid hiker but didn't have a destination," Lamont said. "She was last seen in Pine Cove. I don't know if she's dead or alive."

Outside of the search for Lane, the community has not received any updates on the other three missing people. Friends, family and the community have been left

in the dark.

The emotional toll all of the families and friends of these missing people are having to endure can only be expressed as excruci-

Garcia was last seen July 7 wearing a brown shirt and blue jeans at the 26000 block of Katherine Street in Hemet. Garcia is a 73-year-old Hispanic female and it is possible she suffers from dementia or Alzheimer's disease. She is 5' 3" tall and 120 pounds.

Palm Desert deputies from the RCSD were dispatched to the area of 70000 East Highway 74 in Pinyon Pines at 11:46 a.m. July 9 after Garcia's vehicle was found unoccupied. Garcia was not located after a search of the area was conducted.

Earlier in the year, Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. on the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

RCSD Deputy Jeremy Parsons said, "After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days." Also adding, "On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts."

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams is 65 years old, 5' 5" tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She

was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched Abrams' 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley) June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams.

RMRU went out again June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical

Local artist turns dream into reality

Idyllwild local Carmen Park has called our Hill her home for four years. Originally from Georgia, Park grew up in a family that glorified ghost stories and mysteries.

"Growing up in Georgia, I always wanted to be Nancy Drew," Park said. "The very first stories I read were mysteries and ghost stories. So from a very young age, I was fascinated by them."

Park, being the inquisitive person that she is, never quite fit the societal mold. Park wasn't the ideal student growing up, especially in math, but she held a deep sense of curiosity and excelled at reading. By the time she was in second grade, Park was reading at a college level.

She also excelled at writing. In eighth grade, Park won an award for an essay she wrote, scoring not only the highest in her school, but one of the highest scores in the state of Georgia.

She's always been an avid lover of research, spending hours upon hours sifting through archives, newspapers, and the vast world of the web for accurate information.

After years of dreaming, Park finally created her own podcast "Past Dark." This has allowed her to put her research, knowledge and opinions into an audio form, and share it with the masses.

"There's a lot of things that I find really interesting and fascinating that doesn't fall into the category of true crime, mystery or the paranormal," Park said. She explained what types of topics she will cover, "basically, anything that I have an interest in that I feel others would have an interest in also, even about disasters, political regimes or architecture."

Park launched "Past Dark" on Halloween. Without any marketing, Park doubles her listeners every day. Friends and family from all over the world tune in to hear what Park has created.

"My goal is to release one episode a week," Park said. "I want them to really capture people's interests. They're going to be deep and the subjects will be vastly

So far, Park has talked about Shirley Ardell Mason, also known as "Sybil", who allegedly had 16 different personalities. She's also done an episode on Tonton Macoutes and the phenomenon about those who believe in phantom his-

Outside of writing the podcasts, Park is also doing all of the music and sounds and produces everything herself.

Park has always had an interest in true crime and mystery. She attended college through the Los Angeles Community College District. She is a certified fingerprint analyst in the state of California and certified in crime scene investigation.

Park has always followed her own path, and while maybe a bit lonesome, it has led her to amazing experiences.

Park commented on the feedback from her new podcast.

"The response that I've gotten is way beyond what I expected," Park said. "It already feels like such an adven-

ture and I'm just getting started."

Park also offered a bit of advice to those forging their own path.

"If you are passionate about something, keep going," she said. "You'll find your path. There is somebody who is interested in what you have to say. Find those


