Last week, the Town Crier spoke with Kendra Johnson, Prifogle's daughter, to see how she and her family are doing.


According to Johnson, the last time the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) searched for Prifogle was Aug. 21.

"I'm not sure exactly where they searched, but I think it was in areas they've searched before," Johnson explained. "The search and rescue teams are separate from the detectives handling the investigation. I feel like the detective hasn't followed up on things he should have, which is really concerning, but the search and rescue teams have been really communicative."

## State coronavirus relief and county staff test positive

Last week, "staff members of the Riverside County Registrar of Voters Office tested positive for coronavirus," the county announced. Permanent and temporary staff were tested and dozens were required to quarantine. The office was cleaned and disinfected.

"It is key to our election process to ensure the Registrar of Voters employees are safe and healthy," said Riverside County Registrar of Voters Rebecca Spencer. "I fully expect that we will be able to certify the election by Dec. 3 and today's [Nov. 25] testing will help the office to meet the state's deadline."

Currently, Riverside County is in the purple tier of the state's tier system. According to the state's tier system, purple means the virus is widespread and that many nonessential indoor business operations are closed.

Congress still has not passed another stimulus package to assist small businesses and those who have suffered permanent job loss as we move into winter.

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced a \$500 million

COVID Relief Grant program, a \$12.5-million increase to the California Rebuilding Fund and temporary tax relief that "entails an automatic three-month income tax extension for taxpayers filing less than \$1 million in sales tax, extends the availability of existing interest and penalty-free payment agreements to companies with up to \$5 million in taxable sales and provides expanded interest free payment options for larger businesses particularly affected by significant restrictions on operations based on COVID-19 transmissions."

California has 4.1 million small businesses. The COVID Relief Grant program will distribute "grants of up to \$25,000 to underserved micro and small businesses throughout the state by early 2021. Nonprofits would also be eligible for these grants.

"While we wait for Congress and the White House to approve an economic relief package that responds to the current surge, California has a chance to help nonprofits, small businesses and communities now," said Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood).

"California is also strengthening its face covering guidance to require individuals to wear a mask whenever outside their home with limited exceptions," a recent press release reads. Go to https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/ CID/DCDC/Pages/CÓVID-19/guidance-for-face-coverings.aspx, to read the updated guidance.

The state added 1,872 beds at alternate care sites outside of the hospital system in anticipation of a surge in cases.

According to the Riverside University Health System Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 31 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and one death reported. Twenty-five of the 31 people have recovered.

As of press time on Dec. 1, Riverside County has 84,412 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 1,442 deaths related to COVID-19 and 67,305 people have recovered. There are 585 individuals being hospitalized and of those 129 are in the intensive care unit (ICU). The county's positivity rate is 9.9%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 27.2.

As of press time on Nov. 23, Riverside County had 78,442 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,400 deaths related to COVID-19 and 65,613 people had recovered. There were 375 individuals being hospitalized and of those 99 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 8.9%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 22.4.

As of press timé on Nov. 17, Riverside County had 75,848 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,374 deaths related to COVID-19 and 64,922 people had recovered. There were 310 individuals being hospitalized and of those 78 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 6.7%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000

To date, 1,109,560 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. The two demographics with the highest number of cases are Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Hispanic/Latino.

#### Schools update

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) began the 2020/21 school year with distance learning.

IAA students returned to campus Oct. 1. For more information, visit

idyllwildarts.org. At this time, school waivers are officially suspended as we are now clearly above the state recommended threshold and the trend indicates further increase to come," the county recently announced.

Reopening

Gov. Gavin Newsom outlined a color-coded, tiered system that will use two metrics to measure the coronavirus: spread rate and test positivity percentage.

The tiers are designated by four colors: purple (widespread), red (substantial), orange (moderate) and yellow (minimal with the lowest restrictions).

Counties must remain at each tier for a minimum of 21 days. The metrics are tracked at www.COVID19.ca.gov. Riverside County moved back to the purple tier on Oct. 20.

Erb wrote on his application form, "My formal education is in chemistry/metallurgy but I have owned a retail/wholesale computer store, was [Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response] hazwoper certified general manager for a chemical storage warehouse and marketing manager in a paint recycling business before 'retiring to Idyllwild.'" Erb served on the city of Industry's HR committee for 12 years.

Moran is a member of IBEW Local 18 and wrote "As a powerline electrician, overseeing construction of sub-surface structures often involving water mains and services, has trained me in the importance of water distribution."

At the special board of directors meeting Monday, Nov. 16, Bonneau asked to have Erb and Moran rank the top three of the following eight topics: ethics, safety, water quality, sourcing, maintenance, cost control, consumer awareness and staffing."

Included with the November regular board meeting packet were the responses from Erb and Moran. Moran listed water quality, maintenance and cost control. Erb wrote that water quality, cost control and staffing were his top three.

Pipeline replacement project

The four-member board (Erb had not been installed as a board member yet) unanimously approved an emergency pipeline replacement project that will occur on Rising Glen Road, Granite Springs, Shady View Drive and Sunset View Drive. The project will replace

about 2,000 feet of pipeline.

General Manager Victor Jimenez wrote in the staff report: "On Aug. 6, 2020, we placed the three new pressure reducing stations in service and realized that the water mains on Rising Glen [Road], Granite Springs, Sunset View [Drive] and Shady View were severely compromised and in need of replacement. We have experienced over 30 leaks and unfortunately, they continue to pop up.

The board inquired as to the urgency of the need to replace the mains, but due to the unpredictability of the mains, it is very difficult to render an opinion. The mains could continue to suffer major leaks, or they could possibly hold tight; it is impossible to offer an accurate prediction. If I had to offer an opinion, I would recommend replacement as soon as possible."


El-Co Contractors Inc. will complete the project. The company recently finished another pipeline replacement project in the district.

Jimenez also wrote, "This is the project that was going to be proposed for fiscal year 2021/22, but due to the consistent failures, staff is offering the option of undertaking the project as an emergency as soon as possible."

The project will reduce the reserves by \$571,000 by project completion. This includes paying for repaving the streets once the work is complete. "We estimate that the reserves could drop to below \$500,000 before revenue starts to replenish the reserves," Jimenez wrote. Currently, the reserves are \$912,952.79.



Three people in addition to Prifogle

Seven people have gone missing in

the seven people, including Prifogle, remain missing. RCSD media information bureau responded to the newspaper's weekly inquiry Saturday as to whether or not the agency had any updates.

"We do not have any updates on our missing persons at this time," Correctional Sgt. Deanna Pecoraro wrote.

Lydia "Dia" Abrams, Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane and Rosario Garcia remain missing.

The community remains confused by the lack of information released by the media information bureau and is wondering if their safety is at stake. The

On Sept. 10, a RCSD SUV was spotted hauling an off-road vehicle near High-

way 243 and Saunders Meadow Road. According to Hemet Sheriff Station Capt. Leonard Purvis, "They were conducting follow-up searches for Melissa Lane."

While it was unclear exactly where on the mountain deputies were searching for Lane, Purvis also confirmed that the search didn't provide any further information or evidence of where Lane may have gone missing. That is an update the media information bureau could have

Lane, 41, was last seen June 15, according to a poster that was displayed in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane's mother, right after she was reported missing.

'She was an avid hiker but didn't have a destination," Lamont said. "She was last seen in Pine Cove. I don't know if she's dead or alive."

Outside of the search for Lane, the community has not received any updates on the other three missing people. Friends, family and the community have been left in the dark.

Garcia was last seen July 7 wearing a brown shirt and blue jeans at the 26000 block of Katherine Street in Hemet. Garcia is a 73-year-old Hispanic female and it is possible she suffers from dementia or Alzheimer's disease. She is 5' 3" tall and 120 pounds.

Palm Desert deputies from the RCSD were dispatched to the area of 70000 East Highway 74 in Pinyon Pines at 11:46 a.m. July 9 after Garcia's vehicle was found unoccupied. Garcia was not located after a search of the area was conducted.

Earlier in the year, Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. on the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

RCSD Deputy Jeremy Parsons said, "After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days." Also adding, "On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts."


On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams is 65 years old, 5′ 5″ tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams' 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley) June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams.

RMRU went out again June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground search.

# TikTok's new parental controls give parents additional tools to manage various aspects of their teen's account as well as their privacy

TikTok announced it is expanding its parental control, known as Family Pairing, to give parents additional tools to manage various aspects of their teen's account as well as their privacy. The new tools will allow parents to set their teen's account to private, control whether their Liked Videos are visible to others, control who can comment on the teen's videos and even decide whether the teen is allowed to use TikTok's search feature. about TikTok predator problems and parental controls. When Family Pairing first launched in April, it allowed parents to link their account to their teen's in order to manage screen time, direct messaging and whether or not the teen's account would be in "Restricted" mode — a special mode which limits TikTok's feed to a safer set of more moderated content.

With the update rolling out today (Nov. 17), parents will now be able to adjust an expanded range of parental control settings for their teen. They can now turn on or off the teen's ability to access the search bar in the app, where they would otherwise be able to search for content, users, hashtags and sounds.

Parents can also choose to now turn on or off the ability for other users to see the teen's "Like Videos" on their profile. And they can limit who is allowed to comment on their teen's videos by selecting either "everyone," "friends" or "no one."

Lastly, they can choose to switch the teen's account from public to private. The latter would limit discoverability to just those people the teen knows and approves. A private account makes sense for a minor child, of course, but teens often turn their account to public in the hopes of gaining more views for their videos or going viral.

The Family Pairing feature is designed to be used by parents with children age 13 or older, as the app in the U.S. offers a COPPA-compliant, view-only mode for the "under 13" crowd, TikTok for Younger Users.

Families can choose which parental controls make sense for them for use with their teen and for how long. It's a differentiating feature for TikTok to offer, as other social apps popular with teens — like Snapchat and Instagram offer no way for parents to limit their teen's experience.

Cyber Safety Cop's recommendations

If you have a child under the age of 13, their account should be set up in the "view-only" mode. For children 13 years old or older, use the new parental controls you see necessary to better protect your child on this social media platform. TikTok's move to increase parental involvement and safety controls is a very good sign and should help keep more children safe, provided their parent knows about these controls and is engaged in their child's digital world.

# Multiple collisions on mountain roads over last couple of weeks

# 'San Jac Jon' takes to the trails

Idyllwild local Jon King has been hiking since he was a boy. Originally from the

United Kingdom, King bonded with his father who was also a keen hiker. King's love for the outdoors has led him all over the world. He took his passion

and education as a wildlife biologist to work, allowing him to spend a majority of his time outdoors. He specialized in endangered birds.

King realized the need for accurate trail and weather information for the local hikers and the thousands of Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) hikers who

> make their way from Mexico 'In 2016, I started this and originally focused it on the PCT," King said.

King volunteered with the Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit. He currently volunteers with California State Parks as a wilderness ranger, the San Bernardino National Forest during fire season manning the lookout towers on Tahquitz Peak and Black Mountain, and for the Paific Crest Trail Association to help monitor and report any needed trail re-

Volunteering his time, King hikes almost daily to check the condition of the many trails, reporting it to the San Jacinto Trail Report on his website sanjacjon. com.

"Often times

the Forest Service and State Parks check my website for the most updated information," King said. "For them to send resources up in such inclement weather can be expensive and dangerous, so I quickly realized I wanted to get ahead of potential problems instead of coming in after."

King updates his website once a week year-round. If conditions require it, he provides more frequent updates such as anytime there is a significant storm, weather or trail activity.

"I hiked up Nov. 7 during the big storm to see what was going on," King said. "I take the weather every time I summit and document that in the trail report as well to help highlight extremes and potential dangers."

King accomplished some personal milestones after hiking up into the San Jacinto Mountains nearly every day this year, hiking 5,000 miles.

His goal was to reach 1 million feet in elevation gain by the end of the year. He accomplished that Oct. 11. He's now at about 1.1 million feet.

Last year, his website received 100,000 views. While this year has been less due to a decrease in hikers, the website traffic continues to grow every year.

With all this hiking, you can imagine the amount of wear and tear King does to his equipment. Due to that, King does accept donations for direct costs on equipment that can be made at sanjacjon.com/donate.

King explained, "I go through six or seven pairs of boots a year and wear through a lot of other equipment much faster. So, I just want to try to cover my costs where I can. It's not about making profit for my time."



**Technology and** devices can be useful. **But there are times** when it's best to put devices away.


