

ADA and historic buildings

Don't think your business is exempt from Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) laws because you have an old or historic building. In 2019, 3,606 complaints/ pre-litigation letters were served on businesses. That is down from 4,320 in 2018. Riverside County is among the counties receiving the highest amount. The majority of these complaints were accompanied by large fines

The majority of the Idyllwild businesses fall under Readily Achievable Barrier Removal. This applies to all businesses that are called public accommodations, such as a merchant or restaurant, because they serve the public. Businesses that are not open to the public must still comply with the ADA when their facility is altered or renovated.

Historical buildings are required to comply with the ADA, per California Historical Building Code (CHBC) Section 8-602, unless strict compliance will threaten or destroy its historical significance or character-defining features. A business no longer can claim unreasonable hardship for not complying with the code.

If a person files suit against your business under the Unruh Civil Rights Act, you can be liable for statutory damages for each and every offense for a maximum of three times the amount of damage, but no less than \$4,000, and the only thing the plaintiff can recover is attorney's fees.

However, Civil Code 55.56 provides for statutory damages of \$4,000 if the plaintiff is denied full and equal access to a place of public accommodation on a particular occasion or visit, not \$4,000 per each violation, as previously allowed under the Unruh Civil Rights Act, Civil Code 52(a).

Your best defense against a lawsuit is to comply with the ADA. There is no grandfather clause in the ADA, only what is called "Safe Harbor," which means under specific situations, you don't have to modify your facility to meet requirements unless you undertake renovations or additions.

This year, seven people have officially gone missing in the area. Four of those people still have not been found. Rosario Garcia was last seen on July 7, and her family has been left with a deep, vast hole of unanswered questions and grief.

The Town Crier met with Zavala and Atenci that afternoon and they spoke about the struggle the whole family has endured.

"It's been devastating with the holidays and birthdays," Zavala said. "This was our first Thanksgiving without her. One of her grandkids couldn't even be there because it was too hard.



COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

Newsom puts region on Stay-at-Home order

Gov. Gavin Newsom put the Southern California region on a Stay-at-Home order. It went into effect Sunday at 11:59 p.m. and will be in place for at least three weeks. The order, which includes Riverside County, was triggered because Intensive Care Unit (ICU) capacity dropped below 15% in the region.

"We have seen cases and other metrics rising for the past month and it is expected to get even worse this month," said Kim Saruwatari, director of the Riverside County Department of Public Health. "We must practice social distancing and wear masks to preserve valuable space and staff in our hospital system. These resources are already stretched thin."

The county announced Saturday that "Critical county services and programs will continue on behalf of our residents. In line with the regional stay-at-home order, many of those services could return to being provided virtually. This practice has been critical to how the county has conducted business throughout the pandemic. Residents should call ahead to determine if their needs can be met online, over the phone or through the mail. Some services requiring in-person visits may need an appointment.

Congress still has not passed another stimulus package to assist small businesses and those who have suffered permanent job loss as we move into winter, and now, another Stay-at-Home order.

All the following were ordered to close: indoor and outdoor playgrounds; indoor recreational facilities; hair salons and barbershops; personal care services; museums, zoos, and aquariums; movie theaters; wineries; bars, breweries and distilleries; family entertainment centers; cardrooms and satellite wagering; limited services; live audience sports and amusement parks. The following sectors can operate with additional modifications, 100% mask wearing and social distancing: outdoor recreational facilities, retail, shopping centers, hotels/lodging, restaurants (take-out only), offices, places of worship and entertainment production including professional sports.

Riverside County Sheriff Chad Bianco said that his department would not be enforcing the order.

The state had already added 1,872 beds at alternate care sites outside of the hospital system in anticipation of a surge

According to the Riverside University Health System -Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 33 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and one death reported. Twenty-five of the 33 people have recovered.

Ås of press time on Dec. 8, Riverside County has 92,272 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There are 1,488 deaths related to COVID-19 and 68,939 people have recovered. There are 700 individuals being hospitalized and of those 146 are in the ICU. The county's positivity rate is 7.7%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 21.2.

As of press time on Dec. 1, Riverside County had 84,412 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,442 deaths related to COVID-19 and 67,305 people had recovered. There were 585 individuals being hospitalized and of those 129 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 9.9%. The

current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 27.2.

As of press time on Nov. 23, Riverside County had 78,442 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,400 deaths related to COVID-19 and 65,613 people had recovered. There were 375 individuals being hospitalized and of those 99 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 8.9%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 22.4.

As of press time on Nov. 17, Riverside County had

75,848 confirmed COVID-19 cases. There were 1,374 deaths related to COVID-19 and 64,922 people had recovered. There were 310 individuals being hospitalized and of those 78 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 6.7%.

The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 13.9.

To date, 1,212,700 people have been tested for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS.

Schools update

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and Idyllwild Arts Academy (IÁA) began the 2020/21 school year with distance learning.

IAA students returned to campus Oct. 1. For more information, visit idyllwildarts.org

"At this time, school waivers are officially suspended as we are now clearly above the state recommended threshold and the trend indicates further increase to come," the county recently announced.

Schools that previously opened may remain open and schools with approved waivers but have not repopened can reopen as outlined in the waiver.

The adjusted case rate needs to be consistently below the maximum level of 14 before waivers will be submitted to the state.

HUSD will continue with the online learning model through Jan. 21 for elementary students and Feb. 1 for middle and high school students.

The district previously announced, "This decision was made due to concerns related to safety and the desire to create the most stable and consistent learning environment for students. The potential disruption to in-person instruction in the hybrid-model is due to procedures and protocols that the district is directed to follow from the State and County Public Health officers." The date is subject to change.

Reopening

Life Tribute William "Bill" Baker 1930-2020



Dear Idyllwild Community

As I write to you this week, it is with a heart full of gratitude for the hard work and dedication that everyone has shown at Idyllwild Arts. With less than two weeks remaining in the semester, we are pleased with everyone's efforts to keep our students engaged and our school community safe.

We have held outdoor activities with students, opened a coffee house for added treats and conducted arts classes with students wearing masks and adhering to social distancing protocols. Since October 1st, we have conducted 1,296 COVID-19 tests for employees and 968 tests for students. The testing has revealed 5 positive tests overall. We will continue to test regularly until the students depart for Winter Break.

Even with our stringent safety protocols, this week we learned of two positive COVID-19 results in our school community (totaling 5 cases). Housekeeping quickly responded and thoroughly cleaned and sanitized all appropriate spaces. Staff immediately conducted contact tracing and anyone potentially exposed was notified. We are following the guidelines and regulations of federal, regional, and local health officials, and in many cases we exceed all recommended protocols.

As students prepare to leave for Winter Break, staff and faculty are preparing for the spring semester. We now have the benefit of experience, testing policies and practices, and data regarding what works well to keep our community safe. With COVID-19 cases expected to rise in the coming weeks due to the holiday season, we have made the decision to start next semester on February 1, 2021. Doing so may also allow more of our students to travel to campus and for visa and travel restrictions to be lifted. We will not leave campus for Spring Break so the end of the school year is still scheduled for the end of May.

Before the students take their leave, we encourage you to visit our website to find the links that will take you to any remaining performances and the exhibit, "Quarantined". I, personally, have been very moved to see students present theatrical, dance and vocal performances while wearing masks. I heard every word and understood every emotion. Kudos to their wonderfully, talented instructors.

Customers wondering: high-interest banking app or highway robbery?

"It's been almost a month and we still don't have our money. We're broke and putting groceries on credit cards ..." That's just one of many customer reviews posted about the mobile banking app offered by Beam Financial Inc. and founder Yinan Du — the defendants in a lawsuit

filed today by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).

According to the complaint (https://www.ftc.gov/system/files/documents/cases/01-_complaint.pdf), the Beam Financial defendants advertise their Beam banking app as a high-interest bank account offering "24/7" access to your money with "NO LOCKUP." Beam Financial also says people can easily make an unlimited number of free transfers into and out of their Beam accounts at any time — with funds arriving in 3 to 5 business days. That's a lie, according to the FTC's lawsuit, which cites numerous complaints posted by frustrated and desperate people who are worried that Beam Financial has simply stolen their deposits.

- "Don't put your money into Beam because you won't get it back. They will hold it to collect as much interest for themselves until I'm assuming someone shuts this company down for fraud."
- "I am still without my \$2900 and Beam doesn't answer the phone or email. They've stolen my money during a pandemic."

The FTC also says that people didn't get the high interest rates that Beam Financial promised.

When the FTC formally demanded information and answers from the Beam Financial defendants, they refused to respond.

Thinking about downloading a mobile banking app? Be sure you understand how it works first. Read the terms and do an online search to check out the company's track record, all before you deposit your money. Anglers can choose to auto-renew sport fishing licenses

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE CONTRIBUTED

California anglers can now purchase 2021 fishing licenses and related items directly through the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) website (https://www.ca.wildlifelicense.com/InternetSales/) or authorized license agents. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, license sales counters at CDFW offices remain temporarily closed to the public.

The cost of a 2021 annual resident fishing license has been set at \$52.66, while a one-day license will cost \$17.02.

For the first time, anglers have the option to sign up for auto-renewal of their annual sport fishing licenses, report cards and validations.

"More than a million anglers purchase annual licenses to fish California waters and for many of them, this will be a welcome feature," said Josh Morgan, chief of CDFW's License and Revenue Branch. "Signing up for auto-renewal helps ensure that you won't end up on the water with an expired license."

Anglers must enroll in the auto-renewal program through CDFW's online sales website. License agents cannot enroll customers in the auto-renewal program, but customers who make purchases in person from license agents can go online later and enroll themselves.

Not all CDFW products for sale are eligible for auto-renewal at this time, although the feature will be expanded to other items in the future. There is some protection for small businesses who have an inspection under the Certified Access Specialist program. The benefit of an inspection for a qualified small business is: You can request an early evaluation conference, receive a 90-day stay-of-court proceeding and receive reduced minimum statutory damages to \$1,000 from \$4,000, if you are found in violation of a Construction Related Accessibility Requirement and correct the violation within 60 days.

The facility inspected does not need to comply with all applicable construction-related accessibility standards in order for you to receive legal benefits, but the property must be inspected by a CASp before a claim is filed.

The eight National Forests are in California's Southern and San Joaquin zones: Angeles NF, Cleveland NF, Inyo NF, Los Padres NF, San Bernardino NF, Sequoia NF, Sierra NF, and Stanislaus NF. These Regional Orders will be in effect from Dec. 8, 2020, through Jan. 6, 2021. Additional Regional Orders affecting other zones are possible as well.

Day use of National Forests will remain open for the health and welfare of Californians. We urge all visitors to follow CDC guidelines to recreate responsibly and check with your local National Forests be-

gating the further burden on limited healthcare facilities," said Randy Moore, Regional Forester of the USDA Forest Service's Pacific Southwest Region.

"Campgrounds, like other overnight accommodations, create opportunities for people from differing households and communities to gather, require maintenance and regular cleaning, and entice the public to travel distances far enough from home to necessitate overnight accommodation. Taking those things out of the equation is a prudent measure at this time.'

Pines two days after she was last seen but there was no sign of Garcia. The car didn't appear to be ransacked and only her DNA was found in the vehicle. That leads them to believe she got disoriented, and lost, as opposed to someone else being involved with her disappearance.

"Everything shows she made the drive on her own," Atenci explained. "Nothing was taken from inside the car. Her seat wasn't adjusted. There were pills and jewelry in the car. There was a full tank of gas still. The DNA results came back with nothing except her own. She had her pursë with her - \$250 in cash, all her cards and blank checks. If someone wanted to steal her identity, they could have. There's been no activity on her accounts since she went missing."

Zavala and Atenci shared some good memories of Garcia, emphasizing how much her family meant to her.

"She loved her grandkids and she loved to dance," they said.

"I have a very short video – but now it's priceless — of her at one of her grandkid's birthday parties," Atenci added. "She was in the background just dancing, dancing, dancing to Mexican music. She was friendly to everybody and everyone knew her in town.'

Garcia has three grown children and eight grandchildren. She lived in the same house for almost 50 years with her husband. One of her grandsons, who is now 20, lived with her and his grandfather to help take care of them.

"He's my youngest and he's the one that is taking it the hardest," Zavala said. "He's the one who didn't join us for Thanksgiving. They were very close. Having to be in the house is hard for him. He and my dad have been the ones taking care of her and they were used to waking up and seeing her every day."

Since Garcia has been missing, another one of her grandchildren turned 3 years old, and for the first time, he said Gamma (grandma), but she was not there to hear it.

"She would've loved that and the fact she wasn't here to hear that is heartbreaking," Atenci said. "He looks at pictures and he knows who she is."

Zavala has been the rock for her family during these tough times, "I'm the headstrong of the family; I

of my nieces and nephews, of my own kids and my dad. I have to be the tough one but nobody knows what I go through when I'm by myself. It was a tough Thanksgiving but I told myself we have to have Thanksgiving and make the best of it for the kids. They're little and don't understand really what's going on."

With time ticking by, Garcia's family has been frustrated with the lack of communication or action from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD).

They're not doing anything for us," Atenci said. "They don't call us. They make us feel like they're not on the case — not even a courtesy call. We take to social media and put flyers up. We spent her birthday on Sept. 4 handing out flyers in the community. This banner was donated by Golden Brush Signs in Hemet. We're doing everything we can and we're not going to be quiet until she's found.

Garcia's family even reached out to Texas EquúSearch, a search and rescue organization dedicated to searching for missing persons, hoping they could provide search and rescue efforts. Unfortunately, being based in Texas, they don't have any ties in the Southern California area.

"When they said they didn't have anything, it really upset us," Atenci said. "It was a big, big hope for that professionalism to come search. We need professional climbers to search the ravines and crevices, to get off the trails where we can't. Obviously, she's not on the trails or roads or we would have found her by now. All organizations are tied to the sheriff as far as search and rescue go, so we'd have to go through them, so it's been hard. We need some kind of closure one way or another."

Garcia's family expressed how grateful they are to the communities and volunteers that have continued to support and help search for Garcia. As they spoke of how many people have helped them, a passing car pulled up and stopped.

The driver, Jesse Glick, of Palm Desert, said, "I was up there yesterday and I thought of you guys. I'll go up there again and I'll always keep a lookout for clues." Adding, "I've seen these nice ladies here before and I've always kept an eye out when I'm in that area. It's always important to be cognizant and aware of your surroundings and what you may see because it

have to be. I'm carrying the weight might be evidence for missing people or situations. You need to keep looking. I just hope the authorities will do one more search before the winter because nobody will want to come out here to do searches once it snows."

As Glick got back in his car and drove off, Atenci said, "It's people like him who have helped us more than any agency has. I feel like we have been more supported by the community than law enforcement."

People need to remember that this is someone's mother, wife, grandmother — someone's loved one that is missing and needs to be found.

"It's hard waking up every day and it's another day," Atenci said. "You wake up hoping, go throughout the day and go to sleep upset. It's mentally exhausting and then you break down in the night. She is the heart of our family and it's a big void. It's getting harder the longer she's missing."

"T've already prepared myself emotionally and physically that I don't think she's with us anymore," Zavala added. "I have to be realistic. I just want to bring her home."

Three people in addition to Garcia remain missing

Seven people have gone missing in the area since March of this year. Four of the seven people, including Garcia, remain missing. RCSD media information bureau responded to the newspaper's weekly inquiry Friday as to whether or not the agency had any updates.

"The cases are still open. No updates from our investigators," Sgt. Albert Martinez wrote.

Lydia "Dia" Abrams, Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane and Rosario Garcia remain missing. The newspaper has been ask-

ing for updates weekly since early summer. On Sept. 10, a RCSD SUV was

spotted hauling an off-road vehicle near Highway 243 and Saunders Meadow Road.

According to Hemet Sheriff Station Capt. Leonard Purvis, "They were conducting follow-up searches for Melissa Lane."

While it was unclear exactly where on the mountain deputies were searching for Lane, Purvis also confirmed that the search didn't provide any further information or evidence of where Lane may have gone missing. That is an update the media information bureau could have provided.

Lane, 41, was last seen June 15, according to a poster that was displayed in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane's mother, right after she was reported missing.

'She was an avid hiker but didn't have a destination," Lamont said. "She was last seen in Pine Cove. I don't know if she's dead or alive."

Outside of the search for Lane, the community has not received any updates on the other three missing people. Friends, family and the community have been left in the dark.

Garcia was last seen July 7 wearing a brown shirt and blue jeans in Hemet. Garcia is a 73-yearold Hispanic female and suffers from Alzheimer's disease. She is 5' 3" tall and 120 pounds.

Palm Desert deputies from the RCSD were dispatched to the area of 70000 East Highway 74 in Pinyon Pines at 11:46 a.m. July 9 after Garcia's vehicle was found unoccupied. Garcia was not located after a search of the area was conducted.

said, "After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days." Also adding, "On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts."

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams is 65 years old, 5' 5" tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams' 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley) June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams.

RMRU went out again June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground

While COVID-19 has impacted all of us adults, children have endured many challenges as well. Idyllwild has always supported the arts. For being such a small town, we are full of artists who use all different medi-

Once they write and illustrate the pages Lulu Jr. provides, students mail it back to the company, and within three weeks, the students receive their very own hardcover book of their

Sixth through eighth grade students received a binder full of different types of art supplies including graphite and watercolor pencils, and two different journals to use as they wish.

"Lulu Jr. worked with us to reduce the cost of these sought-after book projects and will be blogging about our school on their Lulu Jr. blog," Jones said. "Idyllwild School is the first to do an 'all school' book project with

Lulu: I hope that Santa Paws leaves them lots of love, petting and a warm home.


