Lack of communication continues

The newspaper continues to reach out to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) regarding those who have gone missing in and around the Idyllwild area. Not only has the newspaper been frustrated with the lack of information and progress from the RCSD, family and friends of those missing are also frustrated.

RCSD has a Missing Persons page on its website, <https://www.riversidesheriff.org/414/Missing-Persons>.

It reads: "The Riverside County Sheriff's Department will investigate all persons reported missing until the person is found or determined to be a voluntarily missing adult. Reporting parties do not have to wait for a specific period to elapse prior to reporting the person missing. In order to file a missing persons report, for persons 18 years of age and older, go to the nearest sheriff's station or police station and bring a recent photo of the missing person to attach to the report."

"Call 911 immediately if the missing person is disabled, requires medical attention, is considered to be at risk or is 17 years of age or younger."

Last week, the newspaper brought you the following update regarding Lydia "Dia" Abrams.

Idyllwild School made the honor roll

Educational Results Partnership (ERP), a nonprofit, designated Idyllwild School to the State Honor Roll for the 2019/20 school year. It was one of 2,568 schools along with Hemet Unified School District's Cottonwood School and Western Center Academy.

The designation is based on the school's 2018/19 data.

"On behalf of Educational Results Partnership (ERP), I am writing to congratulate your school community," wrote James S. Lanich, Ph.D., president and CEO of ERP, in an email to Idyllwild School Principal Matt Kraemer. "After an extensive analysis of student data for every public school in California, Idyllwild Elementary was a clear leader in getting students to grade-level and beyond and has been named to the 2019/20 Honor Roll. Congratulations!"

ERP uses the following factors:

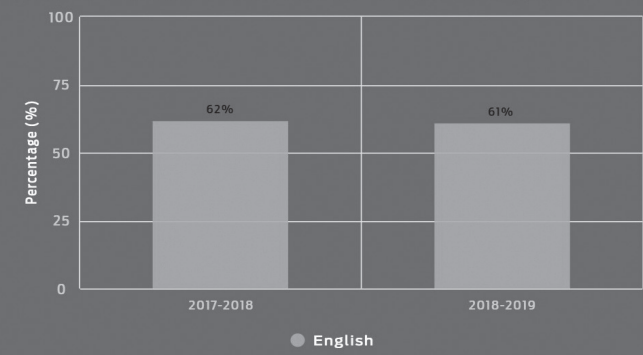
- Evidence-based instructional practices
- A defined system-wide mission of college and career readiness for all students
- An investment in human capital
- Maintenance of data and assessment systems to monitor school and student performance.
- Resources and guidance to support schools' efforts in preparing all students for college and career.

Idyllwild School received the following scores: 61% of the 220 students tested met or exceeded the standard for math.

Cottonwood School received the following scores: 51% of the 133 students tested met or exceeded the standard in English. Forty-three percent of 133 students met or exceeded the standard for math.

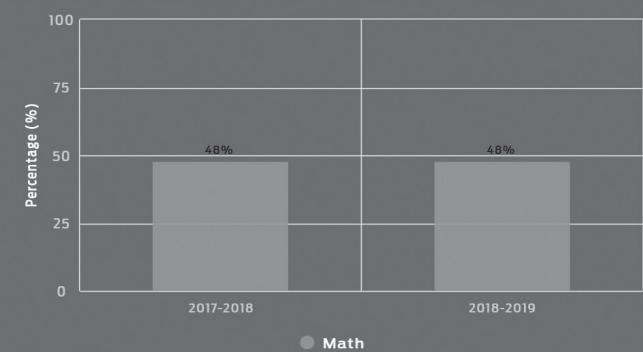
Western Center Academy received the following scores: 91% of the 451 students tested met or exceeded the standard in English. Seventy-six percent of 450 students met or exceeded the standard for math.

Met or Exceeded the Standard in Math

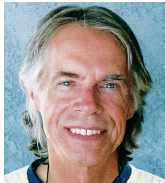

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE: Newsom takes region off Stay-at-Home order, county still in purple tier

Gov. Gavin Newsom’s Stay-at-Home order was lifted Monday, returning Riverside County to the purple tier. Restaurants and gyms can operate businesses outdoors and barber shops and hair and nail salons can operate indoors. Visit <https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/>, to get reacquainted with the purple tier restrictions. The state also extended the eviction moratorium through June 30.

“So many of our small businesses that have shouldered significant burden throughout this pandemic can now refocus on their recovery,” said Riverside County Board Chair Karen Spiegel, second district supervisor. “While some of our businesses may be re-opening, we cannot lose sight of the fact that coronavirus continues to be widespread throughout all of Southern California. It is absolutely critical that we continue to wear masks, avoid gatherings and practice good hygiene to slow the spread.”

Assemblymembers Jesse Gabriel (D-Woodland Hills) and Patrick O’Donnell (D-Long Beach), coauthored Assembly Bill (AB) 309, which “would require the California Department of Education to create a model mental health referral protocol for use by schools across California. These protocols would provide guidance to help educators better identify students with mental health needs and quickly and efficiently connect them with appropriate services,” Gabriel’s office announced Tuesday.

“The mental health of California’s children and youth, already at a crisis point, is exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. We are seeing ever-increasing rates of anxiety, depression and suicide ideation among our young people. AB 309 will provide model protocols that will enable our teachers and other school staff to connect students with the help they need in an appropriate and timely way,” said O’Donnell, who is also chair of the Assembly Education Committee.

According to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 102 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and one death reported. Seventy-two of the 102 people have recovered.

Riverside County has 0% ICU bed availability and 0% in the region, according to the county’s website.

As of press time on Jan. 26, Riverside County has 264,363 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 2,857 deaths related to COVID-19 and 186,119 people have recovered. One thousand three hundred and four individuals are being hospitalized, and of those, 334 are in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate is 23.5%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 148.4.

As of press time on Jan. 19, Riverside County had 233,899 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 2,517 deaths related to COVID-19 and 151,506 people had recovered. One thousand five hundred and sixty-three individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, 353 were in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate was 25.8%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 127.5.

As of press time on Jan. 12, Riverside County had 216,275 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 2,250 deaths related to COVID-19 and 145,380 people had recovered. One thousand six hundred and seventy-five individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, 357 were in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate was 23.1%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 107.2.

To date, 2,114,876 total tests have been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS.

Schools update
Gov. Gavin Newsom released the Safe Schools for All plan for schools to return to in-person instruction across the state. Visit <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Safe-Schools-for-All-Plan-Rationale.aspx> for details.

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) began the 2020/21 school year with distance learning.

IAA students returned to campus Oct. 1. For more information, visit idyllwildarts.org.

“At this time, school waivers are officially suspended as we are now clearly above the state recommended threshold and the trend indicates further increase to come,” the county recently announced.

Schools that previously opened may remain open and schools with approved waivers but have not reopened can reopen as outlined in the waiver.

The adjusted case rate needs to be consistently below the maximum level of 14 before waivers will be submitted to the state.

The HUSD board decided that the district will continue with the online learning model through the end of the 2020/21 school year.

The district announced the follow-

ing Jan. 12: “On Dec. 30, Newsom announced a proposed plan for school districts to provide in-person instruction. This plan pertains to kindergarten through sixth grade and has specific criteria that the district must meet to return to some form of in-person instruction. One criterion is the county where the district is located must have a COVID-19 adjusted case rate that is fewer than 28 cases per 100,000 people. Unfortunately, Riverside County does not meet this threshold and therefore we are unable to bring students back into a hybrid model at this time. It is also significant to note that the governor’s Safe Schools for All Plan that was announced on Dec. 30 may change as it has not been approved by the Legislature.”

According to Alexandria Sponheim, HUSD public information officer, “Our facilities and maintenance and operations departments have used this time to complete projects that are normally reserved for the summer or have been scheduled for future years. For example, we have been able to do asphalt replacements, concrete replacements, roofing projects, and other projects that may have been put off based on the shortened timeline of summer work. In addition, regular and routine maintenance is being done as we still have staff members reporting to work each day and work areas and surfaces need to be disinfected.”

Sponheim also told the newspaper that “HUSD has not increased or given any hazard

pay during the pandemic” and “the amount of staff (classified and certificated) at our school sites varies day-to-day. This flexibility was agreed upon through the collective bargaining process. The staff that elect to work from home do so for a variety of reasons including but not limited to underlying health conditions, having someone within their home with a compromised immune system, etc.”

HUSD provides mobile hot spots. However, it realized that was not always adequate in the areas of Anza and Idyllwild. In response, the district stationed two buses that distribute a Wi-Fi signal — one at Town Hall and the other at Lake Hemet — from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Wednesdays. HUSD partnered with the Anza Community Center to bring internet access to students.

Reopening
Newsom outlined a color-coded, tiered system that will use two metrics to measure the coronavirus: spread rate and test positivity percentage.

The tiers are designated by four colors: purple (widespread), red (substantial), orange (moderate) and yellow (minimal with the lowest restrictions).

Counties must remain at each tier for a minimum of 21 days. The metrics are tracked at www.COVID19.ca.gov.

There is transportation to Palm Desert and Palm Springs on Mondays via Mountain Center. Transportation to Hemet via Mountain Center is

provided on Wednesdays. To get transportation to the food share at Mountain Center on Thursdays, meet at the HELP Center at noon. Reservations are required. Call 951-426-9688 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. If you are utilizing the shuttle, a face mask and hand sanitation is required. Off-Hill transportation is for medical appointments only.

Living on the Hill

The year 2020 was notable for many things, including being a banner year for the sale of residential real estate in the U.S.

Driven by concerns over a worsening pandemic, urban dwellers around the country have been purchasing homes in more rural areas at a record pace.

Idyllwild has been no exception as evidenced by a nearly depleted listing inventory.

And while Idyllwild has long been known as an idyllic mountain retreat, arts town and hiking destination, it has generated extraordinary buyer interest due to perceived greater safety and lack of urban density — a concern for those attempting to avoid COVID-19 infection.

For new residents, Idyllwild can pose challenges and adjustments — things to put on “to do” lists that are different from city living.

The goal of the Idyllwild Association of REALTORS (IAOR) for this column is to familiarize new residents and prospective homebuyers with some lifestyle adjustments and to acquaint sellers with new regulations that may be part of 2021 escrows.

Local realtors can acquaint new homeowners with some of the basics.

No trash collection occurs. Everyone goes to the “dump,” the transfer station, on

Saunders Meadow Road.

New residents need to know which roads are plowed and which are not. Vendors can shovel or plow driveways.

Street parking restrictions during snow events and the challenges to parking and trespassing by “snow play” visitors who don't understand the limited public play space in Idyllwild will be discussed.

IAOR will give general information and recommendations about plumbers, electricians, builders and handymen.

Topics we'll be discussing in subsequent columns include county regulation of short-term vacation rentals, required registration and collection of county transient occupancy taxes and what neighbors can do if there are problems, county noise ordinances, “Home Hardening Disclosure” required as of Jan. 1 as a fire preventative for homes built before 2010 in high risk fire areas, the details of the Mountain Disaster Preparedness Aid Stations, law enforcement in Idyllwild, response times from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department Lake Hemet substation, response times from the California Highway Patrol, abatement requirements and what to know about local wildlife.

One collision on Highway 74

The California Highway Patrol (CHP), according to Public Information Officer Matt Napier, had “one overtime officer on Sunday and none on Saturday and two resident post officers each day. Chain control was implemented on Saturday for several hours but no checkpoint. An overtime officer was parked at Forest Drive Saturday near Humber Park and turned away about 100 vehicles.” The newspaper will have an update on any collisions that occurred over the weekend in next week's edition.

One collision occurred on Highway 74

last week, according to Napier.

At 3:10 p.m. Friday, Jan. 22, Eric James Clark, 30 of Hemet, was driving a black 2003 Mitsubishi Lancer westbound on Highway 74 east of South Fork Trail in an active construction zone at a stated speed of 45 mph. Victor Gonzalo Jimenez, 53 of San Jacinto, was driving a tan 2006 Chevrolet 3500. Jimenez was traveling in the same direction and stopped for traffic ahead of Clark.

Clark applied the brakes and steered to the right but was unable to avoid colliding with the Chevrolet.

Neither vehicle was towed and no injuries were reported.

Bonita Fire now 93% contained

The U.S. Forest Service (USFS) reported the Bonita Fire is 93% contained at 715 acres, as of press time.

“Firefighters continued to find isolated smoldering across the fire's area today, but with the incoming storm events this weekend and through next week, we are hopeful this fire will be completely extinguished soon,” the USFS-San Bernardino National Forest tweeted out late last week.

Firefighters responded to a wildland fire Friday, Jan. 15 at 1:16 a.m. at the 28000 block of Bonita Vista Drive in Apple Canyon (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley). The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

The USFS took over the incident Friday, Jan. 15 at 6 p.m., which had been under the command of Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department.

The fire forced the evacuation of Mountain Center and road closures at Morris Ranch Road and Borco Street on Highway 74 and Highway 243 at Saunders Meadow Road. All road closures and evacuations were lifted by 6 p.m. Friday, the same day the fire broke out.

Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department reported the fire at 200

acres and 0% containment at 3:20 a.m. Friday, Jan. 15, forcing the evacuation order for Mountain Center. Within 15 minutes, the fire grew 50 acres with no containment.


Three hours later, the agency reported the fire was 600 acres with 5% containment.

Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department reported the fire at 715 acres with 20% containment when the agency transferred command to the USFS that evening.

According to Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department's webpage for the incident, “the first arriving engine company reported 15 acres of heavy vegetation and pine trees involved.” More than 250 firefighters responded to the incident, including personnel from the Idyllwild Fire Protection District.

‘Because you said ... you’d be there’

Ryan Craig, the publisher-editor of the Todd County Standard, a community newspaper in rural Elkton, Kentucky, acknowledged that he once ran a story advising local farmers to attend an important public meeting on agricultural zoning. Craig believed that the future of farming in his community was about to be affected at the meeting, and he wanted farmers to participate because he thought they might be unhappy about it.

“The crowd at the event was sparse,” Craig wrote. “So, the next morning at the local greasy spoon, I rage-walked to the liars’ table, full of farmers, and asked why in the hell they didn’t come to the meeting? Didn’t they know how important it was?”

“One of the farmers stopped eating his eggs, looked up and said, ‘We didn’t go because you said in your story that you’d be there. ... I’ll read what you’ll write in the paper and decide if I need to be mad or not.’”

Whew! Would that make a journalist catch breath, or what?

First, what an enormous compliment to Craig and his journalism. Those farmers were willing to trust their local newspaper to attend a public meeting important to their livelihoods and to publish a thorough and accurate report, planning to base their reaction to the meeting on what Craig wrote. All journalists should be so accomplished as to earn that level of trust with their readership.

Second, what a tremendous ongoing responsibility falls on local journalists everywhere — not only to attend the meetings of their local public agencies, but to write a thorough and accurate report of the important happenings at those meetings. Their readers are depending on them for this because what happens at those meetings can affect their views, their votes and their life decisions.

In our Hill community, the Town Crier is the sole monitor of six separate local public agencies: four water districts, a fire protection district and a downtown historic district. These agencies are funded by your tax dollars, and they make decisions and/or recommenda-

Of course, the Town Crier also keeps you advised of other events and happenings on our Hill — from traffic accidents, to community service groups to entertainment.

Coronavirus relief scam impersonates Joe Simons from the Federal Trade Commission

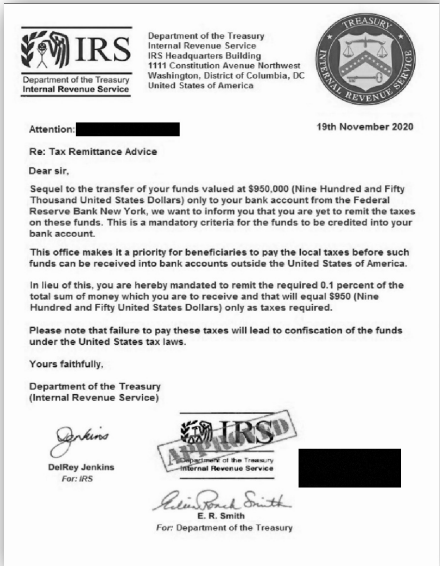
Scammers are at it again, pretending to be from a government agency to rip people off. Here’s what you need to know about the latest coronavirus relief fund scam.

You get an email that looks to be from Joe Simons of the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). It says you’re getting coronavirus relief money. The email includes a fake certificate to make you think the money is real.

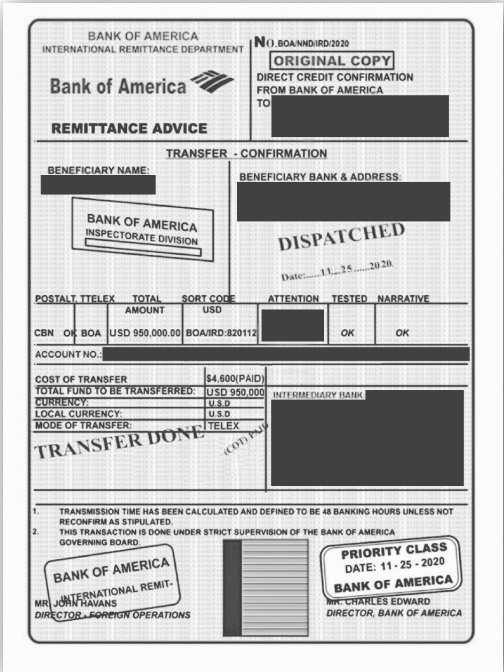


If you reply, they say you have to pay taxes before you get your money. They may include a fake letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), like this one, to convince you.

If you pay, they say you must pay the State Department for a certificate that proves the funds are not related to any terrorist activity and the money is cleared for you to receive. (Yes, really!)



Finally, if you pay that, they send you a fake remittance order showing that the money is on the way to your bank account.



As you might have suspected by now, the money never shows up. That’s because every step of the way was carried out by scammers looking to steal your money. So, what can you do to protect yourself against imposters when their stories keep changing?

- Be suspicious of any call, email, text, or letter from a government agency asking for money or information. Government agencies don’t call you with threats or promises of — or demands for — money. Scammers do.
- Don’t trust caller ID — it can be faked. Even if it might look like a real call from a real government agency, don’t trust it.
- Never pay with a gift card or wire transfer. If someone tells you to pay this way, it’s a scam.
- Check with the real agency. Look up their number. Call them to find out if they’re trying to reach you — and why.

If you look up Joe Simons, you’ll see that he is the chairperson of the FTC. But Joe didn’t email you. Scammers pretending to be Joe did.

Here’s another sign this is a scam: The FTC is not involved in distributing coronavirus economic stimulus money in any way. Economic stimulus payments come from the IRS. The IRS won’t contact you by phone, email, text message or social media with information about any payments related to the coronavirus pandemic, or to ask you for personal or financial information. Check out irs.gov/coronavirus for the latest info about coronavirus relief payments.

If you get an email that says you’re getting some money, don’t reply, period. And definitely don’t give them your bank account or other financial information. Report it to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.

Abrams’ case since the beginning.

On Jan. 11, Gottfredson wrote in an updated story that Abrams self-proclaimed fiancé, Keith Harper, filed a lawsuit, claiming to have power of attorney over Abrams’ estate.

“The Riverside Sheriff’s Department is investigating Abrams’ disappearance as a missing persons case, and investigators suspect foul play, according to search warrants obtained in September by News 8,” Gottfredson wrote.

The Idyllwild Town Crier reached out to the RCSD over the weekend asking for updates or if the department had identified any suspects in the five missing person cases from the Idyllwild and surrounding areas. It also asked if the department was concerned that the majority of those missing are women.

The newspaper did not receive a response by press time.

In recent weeks, the Town Crier spoke with the friends and family of all the missing people about their feelings, concerns and experiences. The only person the newspaper has not been able to get more information about from family is Abrams.

Five people remain missing

Eight people have gone missing in the area since March of last year and five remain missing.

The newspaper has been asking for updates weekly since early summer.

On Sept. 10, a RCSD SUV was spotted hauling an off-road vehicle near Highway 243 and Saunders Meadow Road.

According to Hemet Sheriff Station Capt. Leonard Purvis, “They were conducting follow-up searches for Melissa Lane.”

While it was unclear exactly where on the mountain deputies were searching for Lane, Purvis also confirmed that the search didn’t provide any further information or evidence of where Lane may have gone missing.

Lane, 41, was last seen June 15, according to a poster that was displayed in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane’s mother, right after she was reported missing.

“She was an avid hiker but didn’t have a destination,” Lamont said. “She was last seen in Pine Cove. I don’t know if she’s dead or alive.”

Outside of the search for Lane, the community has not received any updates on the other four missing people. Friends, family and the community have been left in the dark.

Rosario Garcia was last seen July 7 wearing a brown shirt and blue jeans in Hemet. Garcia is a 73-year-old Hispanic female and suffers from Alzheimer’s disease. She is 5’ 3” tall and 120 pounds.

Palm Desert deputies from the RCSD were dispatched to the area of 70000 East Highway 74 in Pinyon Pines at 11:46 a.m. July 9 after Garcia’s vehicle was found unoccupied. Garcia was not located after a search of the area was conducted.

Earlier in the year, Roy Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. on the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

RCSD Deputy Jeremy Parsons said, “After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days.” Also adding, “On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts.”

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams is 65 years old, 5’ 5” tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams’ 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley) June 9. They conducted a search from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams.

RMRU went out again June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground search.

The most recent woman to go missing from the Hemet/San Jacinto area is 27-year-old Diana Perez Gonzalez who was reported missing Dec. 11. According to family, Gonzalez visited the Idyllwild area regularly. She was last seen by her boyfriend.

Christy Rojas, Gonzalez’s sister, and her family are struggling with her sister missing.

Rojas said, “We’ve been terribly sad. We think about her every day and have dreams of her, waiting for any sign or a miracle because we miss her and love her a lot. But the most important, her baby needs her. We can see the sadness in her eyes. Although she can’t speak, we know she misses her mom.” Gonzalez is also pregnant.

"He has inspired students by personally dressing up as Charles Dickens along with his wife Pat and handed out cash awards for first through third place for both essay and poster contests," Kraemer wrote. "Students have submitted extraordinary works of art and essays over the years. In addition to this, he has sponsored the Mary Austin Scholarship Fund in which he awards three high school seniors \$1,000 each for books or technology needs.

"Applicants are required to have participated in the Charles Dickens Contest when they went to Idyllwild School and be college-bound. Last year, he came to Mr. [Mike] Van Zee's social studies class as Charles Dickens and gave a biographical account of his life. The students were mesmerized by his performance!"

"Doug Austin has truly given back to the youth of the Idyllwild community and has been a strong supporter and advocate for Idyllwild School," Kraemer concluded in his nomination of Austin to the district.

As we were saying ...

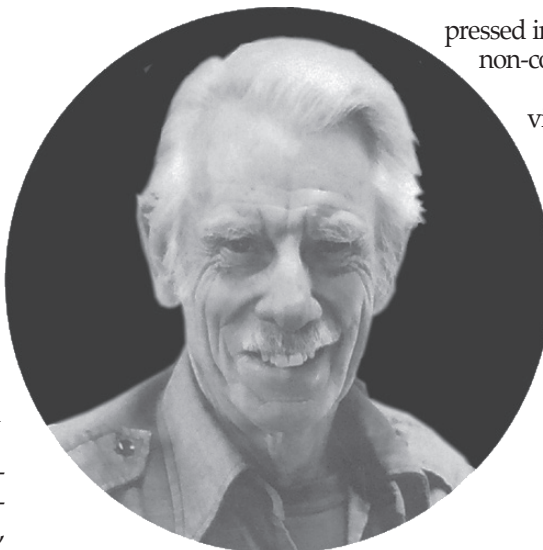
Editor's note: This originally ran Jan. 29, 1981.

Since Donnajean's interview several weeks ago, there have been requests for me to write a rather complete history of this place. Her interview touched on some of my recollections and opinions covering the last 35 years in the community.

Whatever history I generate has been material for Town Crier. Through the years I was in a good position as editor-reporter-photographer to record many events. In the news business, we have an opportunity to collect a mass of information. Unceasing curiosity and a thirst for knowledge compel us to look under rocks along the paths.

Doing a thorough job on local history isn't my bag. There are a couple of reasons. First, I'm addicted to the comments of one of the greatest pitchers who ever played pro baseball, Satchel Paige. A favorite statement was: "Don't look back, something might be gaining on you."

The other reason is that in looking back there are memories. This community is what it is today because of many stalwart individuals who are no longer among us. They played an important role following World War II in shaping our development. These persons ex-

pressed imagination, foresight, rugged individualism and a high degree of non-conformity.

Because services were limited, we had to develop greater individual responsibility. There was a strong kinship for the environment, just as the farmer becomes attached to his land. Folks felt protective of "The Hill."

The remoteness of the area gave us a rural feeling and the recognition that when the chips were down Mother Nature was in charge. Anyone who came to town to change the nature of things usually left defeated. There were constant reminders that weather conditions, droughts, fires, hard winters and all the blessings of the Earth were important.

In November 1943, a major fire swept down to the Cranston Ranger Station from near Mountain Center. Touched off by hot ashes dumped outside during a gusty Santa Ana wind, the fire raced back uphill and was stopped from destroying the community by backfires on West Ridge.

From almost the beginning, the Idyllwild Inn was the center of community affairs. The old one burned to the ground in May 1945 and was replaced by one that served as the civic center until Town Hall was built. It, and Fern Valley Lodge, were settings for many parties.

No report on events or people can be concluded without reference to certain real "old-timers." The Jerry Johnson and Poates families are a story in themselves. Jerry donated land for Town Hall and Eleanor developed Eleanor Park. Lemmie Poates was "contractor" for Town Hall, helped by brothers Bill and Vic. Then there was their mother, Ma Poates, maker of fantastic pies.

There's lots of local history, but for the 1980s I have my eyes set in the direction of new frontiers to explore.

Steele T21 at The American Express

Brendan Steele fired an 11-under-par 68-68-72-69 — 277 at The American Express tournament in La Quinta last week to finish tied for 21st place.

Brendan's drives, averaging more than 302 yards, found 64% of the fairways, hitting nearly 71% of the greens in regulation, but lost about one stroke per round with the putter on his way to a top-25 finish.

As a result, the Idyllwild native moved up from 95th to 89th on the FedExCup points list and is now the 82nd-ranked player in the Official World Golf Ranking.

Brendan told the Town Crier that his long layoff during the holidays enabled him to spend more time

with his family, which he said "helped a ton" toward improving his play.

He said he decided not to play in the tournament at Torrey Pines in La Jolla this week — a tournament he's played every year since joining the PGA Tour in 2011 — because "it's never been my best event, the weather looks bad and I'd rather have a week off before Phoenix, which is one of my better events."

So, Brendan will tee it up next in the \$7.3-million Waste Management Phoenix Open, played next week in Scottsdale, Arizona.

In 10 years, he's posted six top-20s there, including four top-10s, two of which were top-5s.

Brendan also told the Town Crier that he is considering playing the following week in the \$7.8-million AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am in Pebble Beach, California.

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


AN INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR AND ILLUSTRATOR DAVID WIESNER

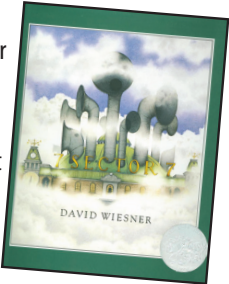
Q: Is the story *Hurricane* based on your childhood? Did you have a cat named Hannibal?

A: Yes, *Hurricane* is the only one of my stories that actually happened to me. Playing on that tree was the best! I had a cat, but her name was Fuzzy (really). I changed the name to fit in with the adventuring nature of the kids.

To make the pictures, I used old photos of my house, cat, yard, bedroom, etc. for reference. So, what you see in the book is where I lived and grew up. The kids are not me or my brother, although I used our names. I used the kids of some friends as my models.

Q: After reading *Sector 7*, I wanted to know if you grew up in New York City?

A: I grew up in New Jersey, not too far from New York. I really enjoyed going into the city. I loved the architecture—especially the Empire State Building. It was great to be able to use it in my story. I designed the *Sector 7* factory in the sky by looking at a lot of New York City buildings. I then created a place with bits of many of them all together.



Q: Why do you draw fish in many of your stories? Is it your favorite animal?

A: I don't have any fish for pets. I like the way fish look and I like to draw and paint them. They appeal to me visually. They are very strange and fantastical looking, so I use them a lot when I make pictures and stories.

Q: How do you come up with the ideas for your picture books?

A: *Tuesday* came about because I was asked to create a painting for the cover of a magazine for kids. I was told that I could do whatever I wanted, but they let me know that there were a lot of articles about frogs in this issue. Frogs are very cool looking—soft, round, lumpy, and really goofy-looking. I wanted to draw them.



I got out my sketchbook and began to draw frogs. I then drew one on a lily pad.

The shape they made together, the round blob of the frog on top of the circular, saucer-like bottom, made me think of something else that had the same shape—a flying saucer. And then I thought, “why not make the frog and lily pad fly around, like a flying saucer?”



For the cover, I showed a group of frogs rising up out of a swamp, heading off to some kind of mischief. I liked the frogs as characters. They had distinct personalities. I wondered what happened before and after this scene. I then began to create the story that would become my book *Tuesday*.

Q: Why do *Tuesday* and *Sector 7* have very few words and almost all pictures?

A: A wordless book offers a different kind of an experience from one with text, for both the author and the reader. There is no author's voice telling the story. Each viewer reads the book in his or her own way. The reader is an integral part of the storytelling process. As a result, there are as many versions of *Tuesday*, *Sector 7*, *Free Fall*, and *Mr. Wuffles*, as there are readers. As the author of a wordless book, I don't have to concern myself about whether the reader's interpretation of each and every detail is the same as mine. My own view has no more, and no less, validity than that of any other viewer.



Q: What is your favorite movie and what makes it your favorite?

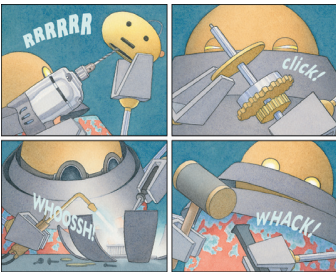
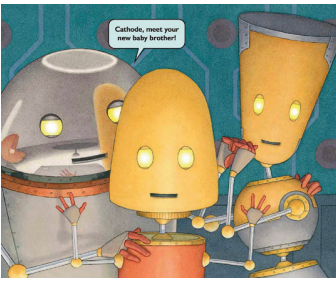
A: 2001: A Space Odyssey is my favorite movie. It is a very complex story and it is told almost entirely with images. I learned a lot about telling stories visually from that movie.

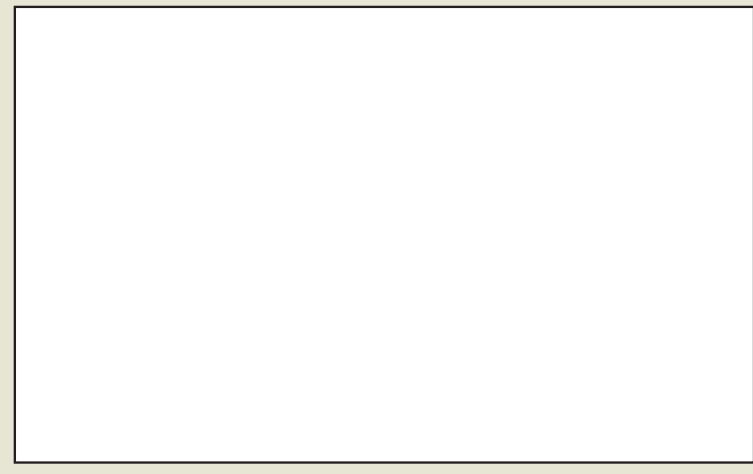
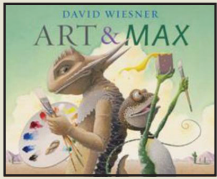

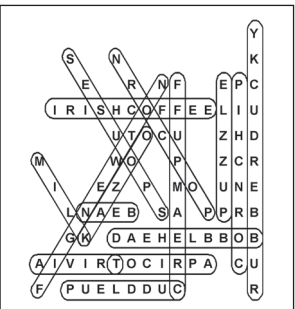

50 years ago - 1971
The Town Crier reported that the total value of building permits for the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area in the previous year amounted to \$1,363,472. There were 44 single-fam-

ily dwellings and four commercial sites under construction.

45 years ago - 1976
Entries were being accepted for the Miss Idyllwild Contest. The winner would reign over the Bear Flag Festival planned for June.

40 years ago - 1981
Idyllwild’s First Church of Christ Scientist held a service to celebrate and give thanks for the release of 52 American hostages held in Iran for 444 days.

35 years ago - 1986
The Riverside County Planning Commission approved plans for a Buddhist meditation center northeast of Apple Canyon Road in Garner Valley.

30 years ago - 1991
The U.S. Forest Service awarded a \$2,000 grant to the San Jacinto Ranger District to build and install bird houses to attract bluebirds. A decade-long decrease in

the bluebird population had been noted and it was hoped new nesting sites would reverse the trend.

25 years ago - 1996

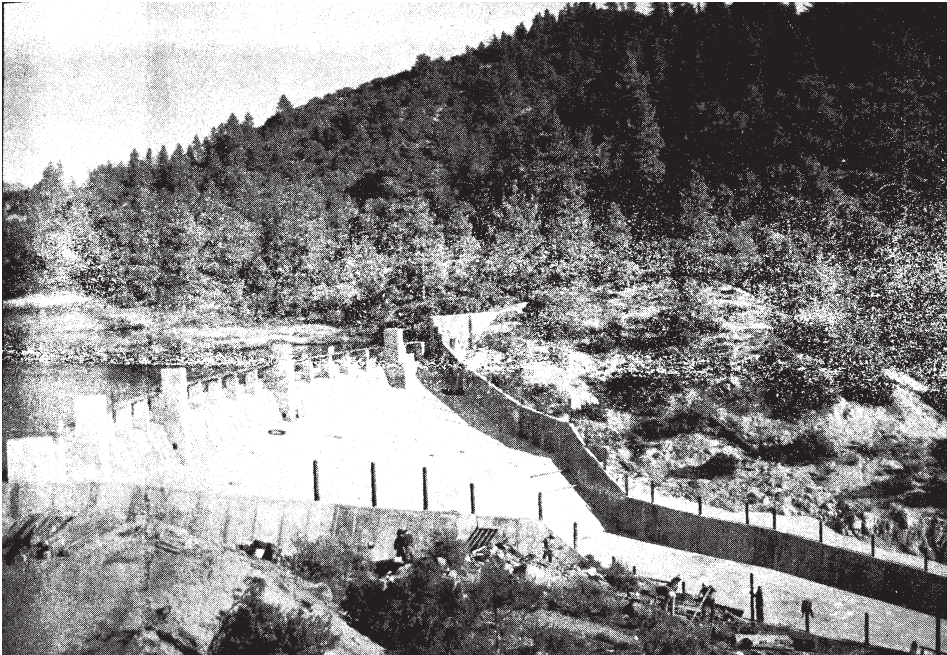
15 years ago - 2006

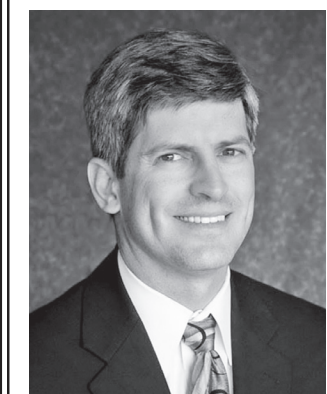
