Skeletal remains located in **Pinyon Pines**

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD) confirmed Monday that skeletal remains were located in the Pinyon Pines area.

"Skeletal remains were located on Feb. 5, but at this time we have not had a positive identification on those remains," wrote RCSD Correctional Sgt. Deanna Pecoraro of the department's media information bureau. "The remains were located near the 70100 block of Highway 74 in Mountain Center [Pinyon Pines]. No further information is available at this time.'

Five people remain missing

Eight people have gone missing in the area since March of last year and five remain missing.

On Sept. 10, an RCSD SUV was spotted hauling an off-road vehicle near Highway 243 and Saunders Mead-

According to Hemet Sheriff Station Capt. Leonard Purvis, "They were conducting follow-up searches for Melissa Lane.

While it was unclear exactly where on the mountain deputies were searching for Lane, Purvis also confirmed that the search didn't provide any further information or evidence of where Lane may have gone miss-

Lane, 41, was last seen June 15, according to a poster that was displayed in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane's mother, right after she was reported missing.

'She was an avid hiker but didn't have a destination," Lamont said. "She was last seen in Pine Cove. I on't know if she's dead or alive.

Rosario Garcia was last seen at her home July 7, 2020 in Hemet by her family. According to Garcia's family, her car was found on Sawmill Trail 5E02 in Pinyon Pines two days after she was last seen, but there was no sign of Garcia.

Riverside County has new CEO

Jeffrey A. Van Wagenen Jr. was unanimously selected to be the new Riverside County Executive Officer (CEO) in a special closed session meeting last week.

Van Wagenen replaces George Johnson, who retired in December. Juan C. Perez served as the interim CEO.

The board of supervisors was to approve the employment contract and compensation package at its Feb. 9 meeting. The newspaper went to press before the conclusion of the

meeting and will report on the item next week. "The hard work of the county is done in our departments every day by our dedicated staff," said Van Wagenen. "I am honored to serve the board of supervisors on behalf of the

2.5 million people who choose to call Riverside County home.

If approved, Van Wagenen will receive an annual salary of \$325,000 plus fringe benefits and "shall automatically receive an annual salary increase of 4% upon satisfactory performance as county executive officer on the anniversary date of the effective date of this agreement," according to the employment contract.

The annual salary range for the position is \$262,821.10 to \$413,826.40.

According to the county's press release addressing his background, "Van Wagenen has worked for 14 years in public service with the county of Riverside, including the last three years as assistant CEO for seven public safety departments. Prior to his latest tenure with the county, he owned and operated a criminal law office for 10 years. Van Wagenen earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Southern California and his juris doctorate from the University of California, Hastings College of Law in San Francisco."

Riverside County has more than 22,000 employees in more than 40 departments that are overseen by the CEO.

"After doing a competitive, nationwide recruitment, I am pleased that one of our Riverside County residents will be our next CEO," said Board Chair Karen Spiegel, Second District Supervisor. "Jeff has been a driving force within the county and built a strong reputation for collaborative solutions to tough problems."

County remains in purple tier

Riverside County returned to the purple tier after the Stay-at-Home Order was lifted. Visit https://covid19. ca.gov/safer-economy/, to get reacquainted with the purple tier restrictions. The state has shut down and reopened businesses multiple times since the first Stay-at-Home Order in March, leaving many small businesses, who have been able to keep their doors open, struggling to keep their business afloat.

The county announced last week, "For those who received a first dose at a county vaccine clinic (also called points of distribution or PODs), local health officials will reach out to residents through the contact method provided at the first appointment. At that time, the county will provide instructions for receiving the second dose conforming to the current CDC guideline on timeframes. Residents who received their first dose at [a] private provider, should contact that same provider to schedule their second dose."

The CDC announced the second dose can be administered 42 days after the first dose instead of the originally recommended 21 or 28 days.

According to the Riverside University Health System - Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 109 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and one death re-

ported. Ninety-one of the 109 people have recovered. Riverside County has 0% ICU bed availability and

0% in the region, according to the county's website.

As of press time on Feb. 9, Riverside County has 282,736 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 3,377 deaths related to COVID-19 and 237,199 people have recovered. Seven hundred and sixty-eight individuals are being hospitalized, and of those, 209 are in the ICU. The county's positivity rate is 16.6%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 62.3.

As of press time on Feb. 1, Riverside County had 275,872 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 3,171 deaths related to COVID-19 and 214,877 people had recovered. Nine hundred and seventy-nine individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, 268 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 20.0%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 110.6.

As of press time on Jan. 26, Riverside County had 264,363 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 2,857 deaths related to COVID-19 and 186,119 people had recovered. One thousand three hundred and four individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, 334 were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 23.5%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 148.4.

To date, 2,293,845 total tests have been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS.

Schools update

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) and Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) began the 2020/21 school year with distance learning.

The HUSD board decided that the district will continue with the online learning model through the end of the 2020/21 school year.

The district announced the following Jan. 12: "On Dec. 30, Newsom announced a proposed plan for school districts to provide in-person instruction. This plan pertains to kindergarten through sixth grade and has specific criteria that the district must meet to return to some form of in-person in-struction. One criterion is the county where the district is located must have a COVID-19 adjusted case rate that is fewer than 28 cases per 100,000 people. Unfortunately, Riverside County does not meet this threshold and therefore we are unable to bring students back in the latest and a latest this time. This class is a latest and the latest this class is a latest and the latest thin the the lates hybrid model at this time. It is also significant to note that the governor's Safe Schools for All Plan that was announced on Dec. 30 may change as it has not been approved by the Legislature."

According to Alexandrea Sponheim, HUSD public information officer, "Our facilities and maintenance and operations departments have used this time to complete projects that are normally reserved for the summer or have been scheduled for future years. For example, we have been able to do asphalt replacements, concrete replacements, roofing projects, and other projects that may have been put off based on the shortened timeline of summer work. In addition, regular and routine maintenance is being done as we still have staff members reporting to work each day and work areas and surfaces need to be disinfected.'

Sponheim also told the newspaper that "HUSD has not increased or given any hazard pay during the pandemic" and "the amount of staff (classified and certificated) at our school sites varies day-to-day. This flexibility was agreed upon through the collective bargaining process. The staff that elect

to work from home do so for a variety of reasons including but not limited to underlying health conditions, having someone within their home with a compromised immune

system, etc."

HUSD provides mobile hot spots.

RUHS Medical Center verified as the only Level-1 Trauma Center in Riverside County

The American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma (ACS-COT) awarded Riverside University Health System Medical Center (RUHS-MC) Level-1 Trauma Center verification, constituting RUHS-MC as the only trauma center in Riverside County with this verification from the ACS-COT.

This recognition certifies that the medical center provides the highest quality of trauma care from initial resuscitation to rehabilitation. The verification team found that the medical center's strengths were in their ability to strongly collaborate with regional EMS services, the depth of expertise, commitment and collaboration of all clinical programs involved in the care of injured patients, the impressive growth and existence of the research program, and the exceptional outcomes, to name a few.

In the last few years, the health care facility has made strides to enhance its trauma care. RUHS launched CECORC (Comparative Effectiveness and Clinical Outcomes Research Center), built a strong team of board-certified trauma surgeons, increased their resuscitation area to handle up to five patients simultaneously, created injury prevention programs and markedly improved their quality outcome scores.

Raul Coimbra, MD, PhD, FACS, Surgeon-in-Chief for RUHS-MC, says that this verification is a testament to all the talented team's hard work and passion for improving the quality of trauma care and for the several years of development under the leader-

ship of Daniel Ludi MD, FACS, the trauma medical director.

This accomplishment required a tremendous amount of teamwork that helped streamline a very detailed and organized process," Coimbra says. "We are grateful for the support of both county and hospital leadership that paved the way for our community to have access to the highest level of trauma care in the region."

Chief of Medical Staff Arnold Tabuenca, MD, says he is proud of this well-deserved

"I am elated that our institution has received this high honor," says Tabuenca. "The process of becoming a verified Level 1 Trauma Center elevated the level of care that we provide, thus allowing us to save more lives in Riverside County."

Established by the American College of Surgeons in 1987, the COT's Consultation/Verification Program for Hospitals promotes the development of trauma centers in which participants provide not only the hospital resources necessary for trauma care, but also the entire spectrum of care to address the needs of all injured patients. This spectrum encompasses the prehospitalization phase through the rehabilitation process. Verified trauma centers must meet the essential criteria that ensure trauma care capability and institutional performance, as outlined by the American College of Surgeons' Committee on Trauma in its current "Resources for Optimal Care of the Injured Patient" manual.

the way to an agreement. Sawicki said he hopes to have the MOU in place by March so the district doesn't have to worry about it.

Chief Mark LaMont stated the district salaries are roughly 30-40% under other agencies.

Emergency siren alert system update

The district has the siren on the property. Because of COVID, Sentry Siren, Inc. has been dealing with a backlog to install the siren. A subcontractor for Sentry Siren, Inc. will be installing the siren. Sentry Siren, Inc. advised against installing the siren on the building.

New brush engine

The district added a new/used brush engine to its fleet. The engine was paid for by the USFS/USDA FEEP. The only cost to the district was \$7,400 for paint and hose/nozzle installation.

cific obligation to life saving and so the ideals behind what was presented, originally with 33%, work around the ideals of life saving," said LaMont. The concern is adding onto smaller cabins and that impact on the call volume. "Part of my problem with this goes past the liability of adding fuel, adding square footage, putting houses closer to other homes and that is we have the lowest operating budget in the county. There is nothing outside of a measure that will get us additional operating dollars, and we cannot short of passing something that says, if you add onto your house, you will be responsible to pay this much for emergency services from now on and I don't think anybody wants to see that." Part of this, according to LaMont, was to figure out how to serve the citizens of Idyllwild, keep them safe and to ensure the district is capable of providing the service.

Hoetger's issue still is whether or not this will have any impact on passing a measure that he feels is needed. He also brought up the traffic issue after a snowfall and the concern regarding response times and wanting to limit the growth of Idyllwild.

The board will "hear final discussion regarding this and other changes" at the district's next board meeting in February.

The current language reads, "when an addition to an existing structure is 50% or more of the original square footage, the entire structure shall be provided with an automatic sprinkler system." The community has the ability to review the following amended language that will be up for approval at the February meeting: "When an addition to an existing structure is 33% or more of the original square footage, 'and' the addition area is greater than 1,000 square feet, the entire structure shall be provided with an automatic sprinkler system."

The district was awarded \$156,000 Assistance to Firefighters Grant to purchase four cardiac monitors, ambulance gurneys and additional EMS/medical gear. An agency contribution of 5% is required. The total amount is \$148,571.43.

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District Board of Fire Commissioners have unanimously approved language pertaining to the 2019 CA Fire Code, the Uniform Fire Code, local policy, and regulations pertaining to Fire prevention, Fire Ordinances and restrictions within the jurisdictional boundaries of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District. This approval took place at the regular Fire Commissioners meeting of January 26th 2021 at 3:00 p.m.

One of the local ordinance changes being considered is as follows:

Chapter 9, Section 903.2.11.8 is hereby added to the California Fire Code to read as follows:

903.2.11.8 Additions to Existing Buildings.

(IFPD Current Language under IFPD Resolution 480)

When an addition to an existing structure is 50% or more of the original square footage, the entire structure shall be provided with an automatic sprinkler

Options (alterations) presented:

1 When an addition to an existing structure is (33%) or more of the original square footage, "and" the addition area is greater than 1000 s.f. the entire structure shall be provided with an automatic sprinkler system.

2 When an addition to an existing structure is (33%) or more of the original square footage, "and" the total square footage including the addition is at or greater than 2660 s.f. the entire structure shall be provided with an automatic sprinkler system

Board language approved as follows:

"When an addition to an existing structure is (33%) or more of the original square footage, "and" the addition area is greater than 1000 s.f. the entire structure shall be provided with an automatic sprinkler system"



Values clarification

Voltaire once said, "Those who can make you believe absurdities can make you commit atrocities.'

Perhaps, this is a good time to think about our values and about the process known as values clarification.

First, what do we mean when we talk of values? There is some general agreement in academic circles regarding the definition of the term "values." For example, the University of Hong Kong website states: "Values are standards or ideals with which we evaluate actions, people, things, or situations. Beauty, honesty, justice, peace, generosity are all examples of values that many people endorse. In thinking about values, it is useful to distinguish them into three kinds:

'Personal values: values endorsed by an individual. For example, some people regard family as their most important values and structure their lives so that they can spend more time with their family. Other people might value success instead and give less time to their families in order to achieve their goals.

"Moral values: values that help determine what is morally right or wrong, e.g., freedom, fairness, equality, etc, well-being. Those which are used to evaluate social institutions are sometimes also known as political values.

"Aesthetic values: values associated with the evaluation of artwork or beauty.'

In another example, simplicity, peace, integrity, community, equality and stewardship, are the stated values of Quakers.

We develop our values through interaction with our families, friends, schools and religious institutions — essentially, through interaction with the cultural influences in which we grow up.

For some, a strictly homogeneous setting is the most advantageous for the education of the young. For others, diverse experiences and influences are most significant. This, in and of itself, is a difference in cultural values. We don't all hold the same values. Our personal values differ.

What then is values clarification and why is it useful? Many counselors, educators and psychotherapists are incorporating values clarification into their work with students and clients.

SmartRecovery.org shed light on values clarification. "The goal of 'values clarification' is for you to become nurse with a Master of Arts in psychology.

fully conscious of their influence, and to explore and honestly acknowledge what you truly value at this time in your life. You can be more self-directed and effective when you know which values you really choose to keep and live by as an adult, and which ones will get priority over others.'

We develop our values through interaction with our families, friends, schools and religious institutions essentially, through interaction with the cultural influences in which we grow up.

The American Psychological Association defines values clarification as "... any process intended to promote an individual's awareness and understanding of his or her moral principles and ethical priorities and their relationships to behavior in daily life." (See below link).

The Oxford University Press (see below link) describes values clarification as, "Values Clarification is an approach that helps clients clarify their goals, priorities and values, make decisions, and implement changes in

In the same source, this process is outlined as asking .. ciarirying questions and strategies in a structured ifying the dilemma and acknowledging feelings. 2) Establishing goals and priorities. 3) Generating alternatives. 4) Exploring pros, cons and consequences. 5) Making a choice, freely, 6) Planning for action — determining next steps and committing to act."

It further suggests "... four steps in any values clarification experience: choosing a value-rich topic, using values clarifying questions and activities, employing the valuing process and creating an atmosphere of safety and respect."

Top frauds of 2020

The year 2020 was a tough year. Between the pandemic and the economic crisis, we all had our hands full. And scammers didn't take any time off either — 2020 was a busy year for fraud. In 2020, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) got more than 2.2 million reports about fraud, with people telling us they lost nearly \$3.3 billion.

In 2020, the FTC got more than 2.2 million reports about fraud, with people telling us they lost nearly \$3.3 billion.

Here's what we heard from you in 2020:

The top fraud of 2020 was impostor scams. Scammers showed up wearing many different hats from that of a government official, to a known business, to a dear family member or friend. The FTC got nearly 500,000 reports of impostor scams and people reported losing a lot of money to these scammers: \$1.2 billion, with a median loss of \$850. Government and business impostor scams were also among the top categories of COVID-19 and stimulus related reports, proving once again, that scammers follow the headlines.

Online shopping and negative reviews were the second most reported fraud category of 2020. With the pandemic came an increase in online shopping, and then a wave of reports about sellers failing to deliver on promises — or just failing to deliver, period. The FTC got more than 350,000 reports, with people telling us they lost a total of more than \$245 million, with a median loss of about \$100.

The phone is still the top way scammers are both through phone calls and text med format in individual counseling. ... 1) Clarifying – clar-sages. In fact, there was a sharp increase in the number of reports saying that scammers contacted them by text message. And, not surprisingly, many of these text messages were related to the pandemic. We heard about text message scams luring people to click on links with promises of stimulus relief, economic relief or loans for small businesses, or "waiting packages."

We can only fight scammers with your help. When you report to the FTC, your report is instantly available to more than 3,000 federal, state, and local law enforcers across the country who are looking to fight fraud. If you've spotted a scam, tell us at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.

Stop illegal robocalls

Are you getting hounded by robocalls and wondering what you can do about them? Reporting illegal robocalls helps the Federal Trade Commission and other law enforcement agencies go after the scammers behind them. But what can you do to stop those calls now? One option is a robocall-blocking app for your mobile phone.

Robocall blocking apps can give you the ability to do things like prescreen your calls before the phone rings; block certain types of calls, including calls that others have flagged as fraudulent or unwanted calls; block anonymous calls that show up as "unknown" callers; and use reverse lookup to detect fake caller ID information from call spoofing.

If your mobile number isn't already on the National Do Not Čall Registry at www.donotcall.gov/, it's also a good idea to add it. If you continue to get sales calls, at least you'll know the callers don't respect the law. If you continue to get illegal robocalls or other unwanted calls, report them to the FTČ. Your complaints not only help us target scammers, but also help telecommunications carriers and other industry partners that are working on call blocking solutions.
