





Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 shot placed on pause

The county announced Tuesday that it has placed a "pause on the administration of Johnson and Johnson vaccines at its clinics, following a recommendation from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)."

County health officials said "there have been no reports of the rare, severe illness like those described in the CDC guidance among the 19,424 doses of Johnson and Johnson that have been administered in the county. There are no warnings of similar issues with the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine that is also available for use.'

"We are taking this step because the health and safety of our residents is our No. 1 priority," said Dr. Geoffrey Leung, public health officer for Riverside County. "Although we have not seen any reactions like those described by the CDC, it is critical the public have the confidence of the safety of vaccines that we offer.'

The county will be offering the Pfizer shot to those with appointments at the Alessandro High School location. The county's "mobile team clinics in Hemet, Mead Valley and Lakeland Village scheduled for today [April 13] will be canceled. About 400 people total were scheduled at the mobile clinics."

The newspaper asked the county what will be happening with Ŝaturday's clinic in Idyllwild.

"The Saturday clinic is still on and being converted to Pfizer," wrote Jose Arballo Jr, the county's senior public information specialist. "The second dose date is May 8."

The Hill reported April 8 "A COVID-19 vaccination site in Colorado closed early on Wednesday after patients experienced adverse reactions to Johnson & Johnson's one-shot vaccine."

The Hill also wrote: "Clinical trials have shown that the Johnson & Johnson vaccine is 66 percent effective at **By Jenny Kirchner** preventing COVID-19 overall, and 85 percent effective REPORTER/PHOTOGRAPHER at preventing severe cases."

Caltrans upgrade project:

Caltrans is performing an upgrade project on highways 74, 79 and 371. The project will upgrade 306 linear feet of bridge rail that meets current crash and safety standards, extend one box culvert, widen one bridge and replace another bridge to provide standard shoulder widths and sidewalks. Crews will be performing bridge barrier replacement and guardrail installation at the Cahuilla Creek Bridge near Anza, weather permitting through mid-April. April 18 search for Roy Prifogle and more info on Lydia 'Dia' Abrams

As of April 12, four people still remain officially missing in or around the Idyllwild area. Lydia "Dia" Abrams, Melissa Lane, Roy Prifogle, and Diana Perez Gonzalez.

Last week, we received updated information about the April 18 search for Roy Prifogle in the Pine Cove area where Prifogle went missing over a year ago. Prifogle's daughter Kendra Johnson posted the information on her Facebook page.

As of print time, no updates on the exact location of the search have been provided. In the post, however, it states those who would like to volunteer are able to go out

"I am always happy to hear that others want to find him," Johnson wrote. "My family and I would love for anyone to go out hiking on April 18th. Make sure to bring water, good shoes and a buddy. We don't want more people getting lost! Once again, thank you, thank you to everyone that wants to help us find some an-

David Gotfredson, investigative producer with News Channel 8 out of San Diego, has come across some new information regarding Dia Abrams and her self-proclaimed fiancé Keith Harper.

Gotfredson wrote in his most recent story on April 5, "... Keith Harper filed a petition in Riverside County court March 22, asking a judge to appoint him successor trustee to the Abrams estate, as spelled out in the trust agreement. Harper's petition included a copy of the entire trust agreement, which previously had not been made


The updated trust was revised just weeks before Abrams went missing and that her adult children, Crisara Abrams and Clinton Abrams of La Jolla, were to be excluded as beneficiaries.

"The amended trust named Harper as both trustee and beneficiary of the estate, in the event of Abrams' death or incapacitation," Gotfredson wrote. Further into the story Gotfredson wrote, "Abrams' amended trust names a second alternate trustee and secondary beneficiary in the event of Harper's death: Diana Fedder. Fedder is a former neighbor of Abrams, who helped the missing woman manage her estate and list it on Airbnb for short-term rentals.'

On March 9, Abrams' children filed a petition attempting to remove Harper as the trustee, claiming he is unfit to serve. Gotfredson reports the children's attorneys argued, "the Riverside County Sheriff's Department is investigating Mr. Harper as a potential perpetrator of the crime or crimes that led to [Abrams'] disappearance." And he reports the petition states, "Given Mr. Harper's potential involvement in [Abrams'] disappearance, his breaches of fiduciary duty, and his criminal history, he is unfit to serve as trustee and there is a significant risk of loss if he is not suspended and removed."

According to Gotfredson's story, Harper's attorney Dennis Healey believes there See Missing persons, page A5

pause in use of Johnson & Johnson's single-dose coronavirus vaccine after six recipients in the United States developed a rare disorder involving blood clots within about two weeks of vaccination.

'All six recipients were women between the ages of 18 and 48. One woman died and a second woman in Nebraska has been hospitalized in critical condition.

"Nearly seven million people in the United States have received Johnson & Johnson shots so far, and roughly nine million more doses have been shipped out to the states, according to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"We are recommending a pause in the use of this vaccine out of an abundance of caution," Dr. Peter Marks, director of the Food and Drug Administration's Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, and Dr. Anne Schuchat, principal deputy director of the C.D.C., said in a joint statement. 'Right now, these adverse events appear to be extremely rare.'

"While the move was framed as a recommendation to health practitioners in the states, the federal government is expected to pause administration of the vaccine at all federally run vaccination sites. Federal officials expect that state health officials will take that as a strong signal to do the same. Within two hours of the announcement, Gov. Mike DeWine of Ohio, a Republican, advised all health providers in his state to temporarily stop giving Johnson & Johnson shots. New York State and Connecticut quickly followed suit.

"Scientists with the F.D.A. and C.D.C. will jointly examine possible links between the vaccine and the disorder and determine whether the F.D.A. should continue to authorize use of the vaccine for all adults or limit the authorization. An emergency meeting of the C.D.C.'s outside advisory committee has been scheduled for Wednesday."

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced last Tuesday "On June 15, California will fully open its economy if two criteria are met:

If vaccine supply is sufficient for Californians

16 years and older who wish to be inoculated; and

If hospitalization rates are stable and low." The entire state will move into the new phase and the state will revisit the June 15 date, if needed. Riverside County entered the orange tier last Tuesday.

The CDC defines vaccine as "A product that stimulates a person's immune system to produce immunity to a specific disease, protecting the person from that disease. Vaccines are usually administered through needle injections, but can also be administered by mouth or sprayed into the nose."

The county was reporting that 16.2% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

To date, 2,813,729 total tests have been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Riverside County school students in ninth grade returned April 12 and has an estimated population of 2.47 million.



WHC seeks funding to build Camp Harris

War Horse Creek (WHC) at Living Free Animal Sanctuary just completed the pilot phase of its veteran transition program and is seeking an initial \$150,000 of funding to build out the facilities veterans stay at while they are in the program. Camp Harris, the facilities, will be named after the late Randall Harris, military veteran and former president of War Horse Creek.

The newspaper previously reported, "On the morning of March 2, Mike and Linda Rivkin, business managers from the Southern California Pipe Trades Administrative Corporation (SCPTAC) and active and retired military, met at Living Free for the groundbreaking of the semi-permanent structures that will be built between now and the middle of June.

"The Rivkins donated \$25,000 to the WHC. SCPTAC

provided a matching \$25,000 grant."

"War Horse Creek is effective for veterans at any stage of their transition, from newly released to veterans who have been out for decades, the results have been astounding," says Executive Director of War Horse Creek Ray Barmore. "Our goal is to raise enough funding to build out fa-

cilities and infrastructure, in addition to offering scholar- to find." ships for veterans to participate at no cost to them."

War Horse Creek is a veteran-led program which rescues wild mustangs from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and brings them together with military veterans in an innovative approach called Collaborative Horsemanship," War Horse Creek writes of the program. "This approach gives veterans the opportunity to master skills that go dormant during their military tenure - empathy, patience, understanding, kindness and compassion. Once these skills are mastered with the Mustangs, they can be ingrained as adaptive habits and transferred to family, friends and society. The program combines Collaborative Horsemanship with life skills training, recreational activities, downtime and connection opportunities.'

"Mustangs are, in effect, highly sensitive 1,200-pound biofeedback mechanisms that sense and respond to a veteran's intentions, physicality and emotions, mirroring back subconscious issues so that they may be identified and addressed," Barmore said.

"I didn't have to say a word to anybody," Air Force veteran Itzel Barakat said about War Horse Creek. "I felt my heart healing and that's what I needed. War Horse Creek provided a sense of relief and peace that I haven't been able

"I have been teaching veteran transition courses for 10 years and have continually brought students up to War Horse Creek," said Harold "Doc" Martin, 20-year military veteran and professor at Pasadena City College. "For those already moving forward with their lives, the time spent there deepened their commitment and fully cemented the connections they were creating with other veterans. For those suffering the most, the time spent with the Mustangs often resulted in a real breakthrough. I cannot imagine a better place to help veterans transform their military experience and readjust to civilian life."



In May of 2013, when Becky and I bought the Town Crier, our single goal was to keep it serving our community. At that time, there were nine local public agencies serving our Hill, and no media monitored and reported on them except the Town Crier. We felt our Hill community very much needed a real newspaper.

But we needed to find a way for the Town Crier to survive the severe economic downturn that had been slamming newspapers, especially local community newspapers. More than 2,000 newspapers have now folded throughout the United States.

The Town Crier could not afford a paid editor. It needed to be able to pay an editor a reasonable salary so the paper could carry on with new owners after we retired. We did not want the Town Crier to retire with us.

So, we tried 25% advertising discounts, additional bundling discounts and free color. We tried keeping the Town Crier open on weekends and serving as a Visitor's Center, informing tourists as to inns, shops and restau-

In an effort to attract advertising, we tried making the Town Crier "free to the Hill," with free copies in every local mailbox and at more than 40 locations around town, and for seven months our circulation jumped 130% - not 30% - 130%.

But nothing worked until we adopted our Membership model in August of 2017. The response from you all was wonderful, and it told us you felt our community needed a real newspaper as much as we felt it did.

Today, we continue to rely on you Members and readers who will join you. Town Crier Members truly are keeping our paper serving our Hill, so please join us, if you haven't already, and plan to renew your Memberships. You'll be keeping a real newspaper serving our community.

Our most sincere congratulations and thanks to you all.

Don't let job scams block your path forward

After more than a year of pandemic-related devastating losses — including job losses — you may be one of millions looking to get back on your feet with a new job. This Financial Literacy Month, as always, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) wants to help keep you on track with ways to avoid job scams.

Scammers post ads online or in print for a variety of jobs, including work-at-home jobs. They sometimes even pretend to represent well-known companies or the government. But these state's Career OneStop. ads are really just tricks to get your money or personal information. Here's how to protect yourself: Never respond to ads guaranteeing you'll get a job. ftc.gov.

Even if your qualifications are ideal,

it's never a sure thing that you'll get the job. Avoid work-at-home ads

- guaranteeing you'll make big money. No one can predict how much money you'll actually make working for yourself. Never pay to get a job.
- Scammers may say they have a job waiting if you just pay a fee for certification, training, equipment, or supplies. But, after you pay, you find out the job is fake — and you won't get your money back. Don't bank on a "cleared"
- check. No legitimate company will ever send you a check and then tell you to send in part of that money, or

gift cards. It's a scam: that check is a fake and you'll lose your money.

- Don't believe ads for "previously undisclosed" federal government jobs. Information about federal jobs is publicly available at usajobs.gov.
- Research potential employers. Search online for a company's name, email address, and phone number. If you've heard of the company, look on its website, call, or email to find out if the job is real.
- Find legitimate job listings. Try visiting sites like your

Learn more about spotting and avoiding job scams. And if you experience this or other scams, tell the FTC at ReportFraud.





are multiple people being investigated for Abrams' disappearance and upholds that Harper should take over as Abrams wished.

Healy said, "Dia did the trust. She knew what she was doing. The document speaks for itself and the document has not been set aside. So, we think that her wishes should be honored at this point."

Four people remain missing

Eight people have gone missing in the area since March of last year and four remain missing.

On Sept. 10, an RCSD SUV was spotted hauling an offroad vehicle near Highway 243 and Saunders Meadow Road.

The newspaper was told, "They were conducting follow-up searches for Melissa Lane."

While it was unclear exactly where on the mountain deputies were searching for Lane, it was also confirmed that the search didn't provide any further information or evidence of where Lane may have gone missing.

Lane, 41 at the time she went missing, was last seen June 15, according to a poster that was displayed in the Mountain Center area. The Town Crier spoke to Kathy Lamont, Lane's mother, right after she was reported missing.

"She was an avid hiker but didn't have a destination," Lamont said. "She was last seen in Pine Cove. I don't know if she's dead or alive."

In December 2020, Lane's cousin Todd Gilliland told the Town Crier, "I miss her a lot. I wish we would get some kind of word about her. It's nerve racking."

Outside of the search for Lane, the community has not received any updates on the other three missing people. Friends, family and the community have been left in the

Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4, 2020. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. the same day. He was last seen wearing

a red backpack and jeans. RCSD Deputy Jéremy Parsons said, "After six full days of searching in between inclement weather, searching 8 to 10 hours per day, Prifogle has not been located. The Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU), as well as search and rescue volunteers from San Bernardino County, Orange County and San Diego County, were assisting. In total, about 150 people have been searching during those six days." Also adding, "On the second or third day of the search, we found his backpack, but have found no other clues as to his whereabouts."

On Sunday, June 7 at approximately 8:24 a.m., Hemet Station deputies were dispatched to the 58000 block of Bonita Vista in reference to a missing person. Abrams was placed into the system as a missing person.

Abrams was 65 years old at the time she went missing. She is 5′ 5″ tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jack-



On June 6, Abrams was last seen by her self-proclaimed live-in boyfriend/fiancé Keith Harper at her ranch in Apple Canyon (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley). Since the initial search efforts eight months ago, the RCSD has not provided new information or updates regarding her disappearance despite weekly inquiries from the Town

Gotfredson has also been following the case since the beginning. In a previous broadcast, Gotfredson reported that News 8 and drone pilot Steve Jensen made their way out to Grand Wash Cliffs in Arizona to do some searching of

Gotfredson and Jensen spent multiple hours over a two-day period searching the cliffs and surrounding area for remains or clothing that match what Abrams was last reported wearing. Unfortunately, they didn't find anything.

According to Gotfredson's story, Harper was in the Grand Wash Cliffs area a few weeks before Abrams went missing. He owns about 85 acres of land. While Harper lived with Abrams at her ranch, two days after she went missing, Harper left the state, driving through Arizona to get to New Mexico.

Gotfredson reported that the San Juan County Sheriff in New Mexico obtained a search warrant and deputies impounded the RV Harper drove to New Mexico taking evidence from inside. However, the RCSD has not provided any persons of interest or suspects regarding Abrams or any of the other missing people.

According to RMRU, their team of volunteers was dispatched to Abrams' 160-acre ranch in the Apple Canyon area June 9. They conducted a search struggling with her sister missing.

from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no success of finding Abrams. RMRU went out again June 10 to search more difficult areas on the property including a creek bed and the hills overlooking her ranch. All assignments were completed by 6 p.m. At that point, detectives took over the investigation and called off the physical ground search.

The most recent woman to go missing from the Hemet/ San Jacinto area is Diana Perez Gonzalez who was reported missing Dec. 11 and 27 years old at the time she went missing. According to family, Gonzalez visited the Idyllwild area regularly. She was last seen by her boyfriend.

AAI opens new gallery

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild (AAI) has been supporting local artists for years, putting on some of the community's most popular art events, including the annual Art Walk & Wine Tasting, which features artists and wine makers from near and far.

In January 2018, the AAI opened its first art gallery in the Courtyard building on Ridgeview Drive. For almost two-and-a-half years, the gallery was successfully displaying artists' talents in the form of drawing, painting, photography, sculptures and much more. There were countless gallery receptions and themed shows.

The gallery also served as a visitors center for those looking for recommendations on where to shop, stay and dine. It shared information regarding events and helped promote local businesses by sharing their information to those passing through.

Unfortunately, the gallery had to close its doors in April 2020 due to the pandemic. As the world shut down and stayed home, it changed everyone in many different ways.

Artists have been busy creating new art in the comfort of their own homes. Now, they will once again be able to get back to displaying their art in a new gallery. Nam Joo Kim, the owner of the Mile High Cafe, offered the AAI a space to open a new gallery located at 26364 Saunders Meadow Road.

Donna Elliot said, "We signed a lease that commenced on Oct. 1, 2020. Because of the high numbers of COVID-19 cases in Riverside County, the AAI Board decided not to open the gallery until it was safer to do so. This period gave us a chance to create a gallery-worthy space within the building as well as a colorful exterior making it attractive to visitors to stop."

The gallery and visitors center will greet those visiting with a painted mural created by Rob Padilla, a sculpture garden that will feature one of the AAI deer from its painted herd and a metal sign designed by Dore

"Here and Now." Keeping with this annual event, the AAI will hold its grand opening from 3 to 6 p.m. Saturday, April 24. It will be AAI's third-annual "Here and Now" art show.

"Masks and social distancing are required with a controlled flow of visitors through the gallery," Elliot said. "Refreshments will be set up outside the gallery. We invite people to celebrate with the ribbon winners, meet the artists and purchase unique, original art."

Cyn Grady will continue to be the gallery manager, meeting and greeting visitors, and working with the artists, a role she held at the Courtyard location. The new gallery will be open Saturdays and Sundays from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. The gallery will allow pop-up events for artists to sell their work. AAI is also planning to hold art-

"This new gallery is an exciting opportunity for our talented artists to sell their art, meet and to learn from one another," Grady said. "We can also distribute marketing materials from local businesses. We are grateful to Nam at Mile High for her support."



Two horses travel the PCT

Hundreds of people travel the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) every year. Each year, it seems to be more popular as shown by how many hikers make their way through town.

While hikers tend to travel on their own or in groups, not many travel with horses. However, Jess Goodlett is not only traveling with one horse, she's traveling with two. She made her way through this section of the PCT last week, stopping by Mayor Max's house to meet

Goodlett's horses are both rescued bees one day." Mustangs from the Little Owyhee Herd Management Land located in Nevada. The land stretches hundreds of thousands of acres and is managed by the Bureau of Land Management. It is made up of descendants of ranch horses that were released or escaped to the area. Makani is an 11-year-old riding horse. Malana is an 8-year-old pack horse.

Goodlett's love for horses started at the young age of 10. Her love for horses quickly grew as she went from taking riding lessons to training them. Now she's taken on this new adventure of long-distance riding.

Much of the planning that goes into hiking the PCT with horses revolves around water sources. Because water is so heavy, Goodlett depends on natural water sources to plan out her trip. Each horse can drink 10 to 15 gallons of water per day, according to Goodlett.

Riding 20 to 25 miles per day, Goodlett and her Mustangs are taking the trail in 3 to 5 day increments before coming off the trail to rest. They have been enjoying their adventure so far.

"My riding horse loves it," Good-

lett said. "She loves getting out on trails. It's been going really well. The horses are doing great. I've seen a lot of beautiful trail already. I've already met some amazing people and Trail Angels."

While the trip has gone well so far, it hasn't been without some amusing issues. Goodlett added with a laugh, "We did get chased by

While Goodlett wants to ride the entire trail, she is only riding the areas of the trail her horses can travel through. Unfortunately, not all the areas of the PCT are manageable for the horses due to the unsafe conditions, including the Mount San Jacinto section.

"When you're hiking on your own, you can get a ride into town or camp anywhere," Goodlett explained. "But with the horses, I either need pens or trees to tie them up. Planning logistics is a lot more challenging. It takes a lot more thought when you're riding because you have two extra living beings to take care of. A lot of it is planned where the water is and where I'm allowed to camp."

Taking this adventure has been a dream for Goodlett for years. She first heard about the PCT from friends in 2013.

In 2015, she competed as a trainer in the Extreme Mustang Makeover in Fort Worth, Texas. Trainers have 100 days to take a completely untrained and untouched Mustang and turn them into a rideable, trusting Mustang.

It's here where she met four fellow

horse lovers and became friends. They decided to create a group that would support each other's love and dreams with their Mustang companions.

Goodlett said, "Our group is called 'Limitless' - five riders and six horses. We first rode the Colorado Trail, which is 500 miles, in 2017. We planned to ride the PCT in

2020 but that

was canceled for obvious reasons."

The ride along the Colorado Trail
