pause in use of Johnson & Johnson’s single-dose coronavirus vaccine after six recipients in the United States developed a rare disorder involving blood clots within about two weeks of vaccination.

“All six recipients were women between the ages of 18 and 48. One woman died and a second woman in Nebraska has been hospitalized in critical condition.

“Nearly seven million people in the United States have received Johnson & Johnson shots so far, and roughly nine million more doses have been shipped out to the states, according to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

“‘We are recommending a pause in the use of this vaccine out of an abundance of caution,’ Dr. Peter Marks, director of the Food and Drug Administration’s Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, and Dr. Anne Schuchat, principal deputy director of the C.D.C., said in a joint statement. ‘Right now, these adverse events appear to be extremely rare.’

“While the move was framed as a recommendation to health practitioners in the states, the federal government is expected to pause administration of the vaccine at all federally run vaccination sites. Federal officials expect that state health officials will take that as a strong signal to do the same. Within two hours of the announcement, Gov. Mike DeWine of Ohio, a Republican, advised all health providers in his state to temporarily stop giving Johnson & Johnson shots. New York State and Connecticut quickly followed suit.

“Scientists with the F.D.A. and C.D.C. will jointly examine possible links between the vaccine and the disorder and determine whether the F.D.A. should continue to authorize use of the vaccine for all adults or limit the authorization. An emergency meeting of the C.D.C.’s outside advisory committee has been scheduled for Wednesday.”

Gov. Gavin Newsom announced last Tuesday “On June 15, California will fully open its economy if two criteria are met:

- If vaccine supply is sufficient for Californians

16 years and older who wish to be inoculated; and

- If hospitalization rates are stable and low.”

The entire state will move into the new phase and the state will revisit the June 15 date, if needed. Riverside County entered the orange tier last Tuesday.

The CDC defines vaccine as “A product that stimulates a person’s immune system to produce immunity to a specific disease, protecting the person from that disease. Vaccines are usually administered through needle injections, but can also be administered by mouth or sprayed into the nose.”

Supervisor Chuck Washington’s office let residents know “the program will provide one-time rental assistance support to cover up to 12 months of unpaid rent during the period between March 13, 2020, until the time of application, plus an additional three months of future rent. Eligibility is limited to renters in Riverside County with a current lease agreement who are earning 80% or below of the area’s median income and can document a loss of income due to COVID-19 economic impacts that leave them unable to make their rent. Assistance is provided without regard to immigration status.”

According to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 114 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and two deaths reported. One hundred and twelve of the 114 people have recovered.

As of press time on April 13, Riverside County has 296,801 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,504 deaths related to COVID-19 and 290,048 people have recovered. Ninety-five individuals are being hospitalized, and of those, 22 are in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate is 2.0%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 3.5. The county is reporting that 21.8% of its population has received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

As of press time on April 6, Riverside County had 295,631 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,417 deaths related to COVID-19 and 288,924 people had recovered. One hundred and two individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, 21 were in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate was 2.0%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 3.5. The county was reporting that 18.1% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

As of press time on March 30, Riverside County had 294,063 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,273 deaths related to COVID-19 and 286,949 people had recovered. One hundred and twenty individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, 31 were in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate was 2.7%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 4.8. The county was reporting that 16.2% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

To date, 2,813,729 total tests have been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Riverside County has an estimated population of 2.47 million.

Schools

HUSD provides mobile hot spots. However, it realized that was not always adequate in the areas of Anza and Idyllwild. In response, the district stationed two buses that distribute a Wi-Fi signal — one at Town Hall and the other at Lake Hemet — from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Wednesdays. HUSD partnered with the Anza Community Center to bring internet access to students.

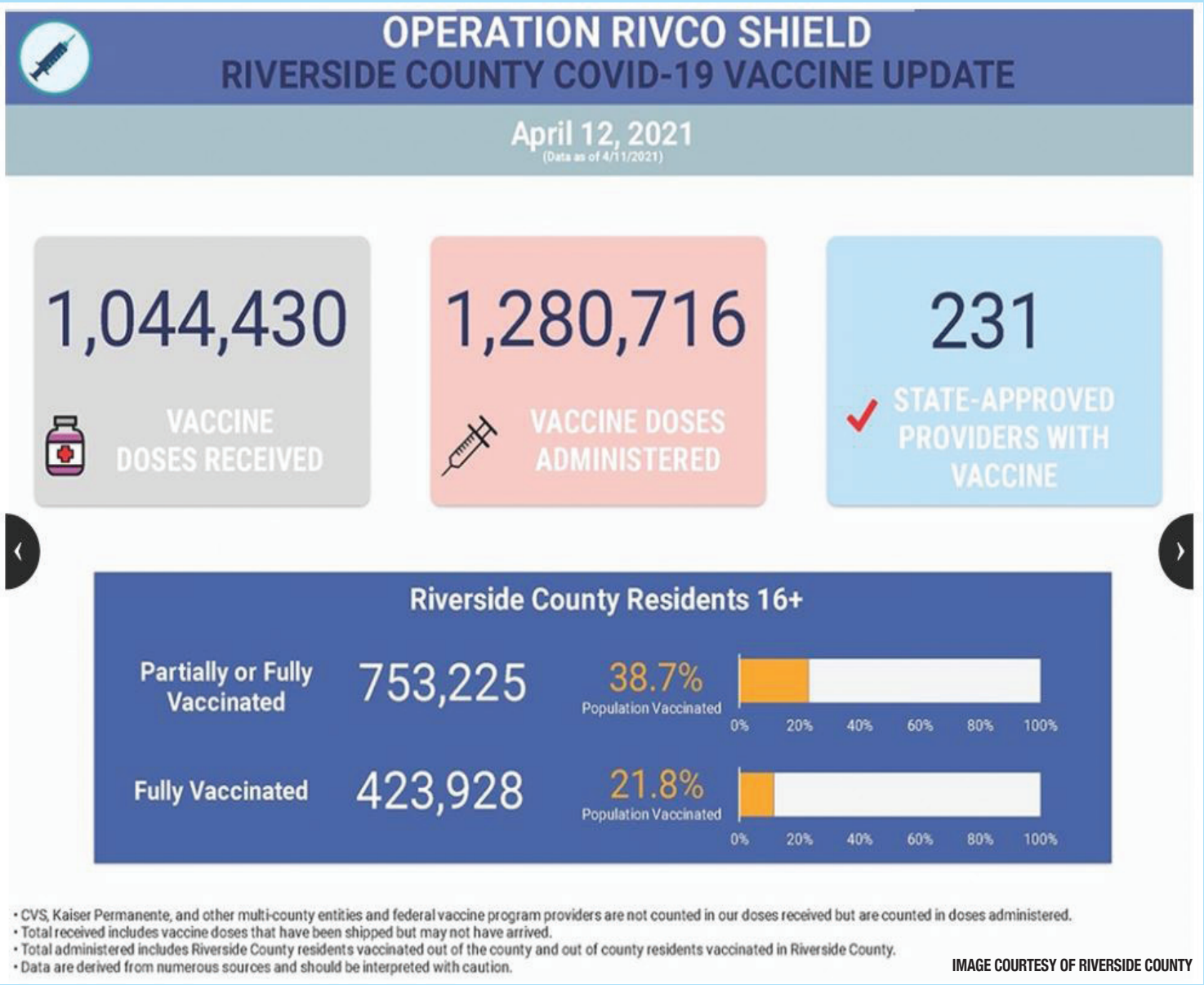
Reopening

Gov. Gavin Newsom outlined a color-coded, tiered system that will use two metrics to measure the coronavirus: spread rate and test positivity percentage.

The tiers are designated by four colors: purple (widespread), red (substantial), orange (moderate) and yellow (minimal with the lowest restrictions).

Counties must remain at each tier for a minimum of 21 days. Currently, the county is in the orange tier.

WHC seeks funding to build Camp Harris

War Horse Creek (WHC) at Living Free Animal Sanctuary just completed the pilot phase of its veteran transition program and is seeking an initial \$150,000 of funding to build out the facilities veterans stay at while they are in the program. Camp Harris, the facilities, will be named after the late Randall Harris, military veteran and former president of War Horse Creek.

The newspaper previously reported, “On the morning of March 2, Mike and Linda Rivkin, business managers from the Southern California Pipe Trades Administrative Corporation (SCPTAC) and active and retired military, met at Living Free for the groundbreaking of the semi-permanent structures that will be built between now and the middle of June.

“The Rivkins donated \$25,000 to the WHC. SCPTAC provided a matching \$25,000 grant.”

“War Horse Creek is effective for veterans at any stage of their transition, from newly released to veterans who have been out for decades, the results have been astounding,” says Executive Director of War Horse Creek Ray Barmore. “Our goal is to raise enough funding to build out fa-

cilities and infrastructure, in addition to offering scholarships for veterans to participate at no cost to them.”

“War Horse Creek is a veteran-led program which rescues wild mustangs from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and brings them together with military veterans in an innovative approach called Collaborative Horsemanship,” War Horse Creek writes of the program. “This approach gives veterans the opportunity to master skills that go dormant during their military tenure – empathy, patience, understanding, kindness and compassion. Once these skills are mastered with the Mustangs, they can be ingrained as adaptive habits and transferred to family, friends and society. The program combines Collaborative Horsemanship with life skills training, recreational activities, downtime and connection opportunities.”

“Mustangs are, in effect, highly sensitive 1,200-pound biofeedback mechanisms that sense and respond to a veteran’s intentions, physicality and emotions, mirroring back subconscious issues so that they may be identified and addressed,” Barmore said.

“I didn’t have to say a word to anybody,” Air Force veteran Itzel Barakat said about War Horse Creek. “I felt my heart healing and that’s what I needed. War Horse Creek provided a sense of relief and peace that I haven’t been able

to find.”

War Horse Creek wrote, “New research on the equine therapy modality from Columbia University has proven that equine therapy results in brain-based changes that can increase an individual’s capacity to enjoy life, despite facing traumas and war adversities.” Visit <https://www.thoroughbreddailynews.com/wp-content/uploads/2021/02/Neural-Changes-Study.pdf> for a link to the study.

“I have been teaching veteran transition courses for 10 years and have continually brought students up to War Horse Creek,” said Harold “Doc” Martin, 20-year military veteran and professor at Pasadena City College. “For those already moving forward with their lives, the time spent there deepened their commitment and fully cemented the connections they were creating with other veterans. For those suffering the most, the time spent with the Mustangs often resulted in a real breakthrough. I cannot imagine a better place to help veterans transform their military experience and readjust to civilian life.”

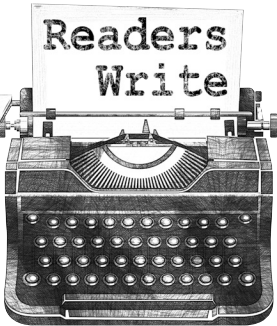
Five seasons?

In May of 2013, when Becky and I bought the Town Crier, our single goal was to keep it serving our community. At that time, there were nine local public agencies serving our Hill, and no media monitored and reported on them except the Town Crier. We felt our Hill community very much needed a real newspaper.
But we needed to find a way for the Town Crier to survive the severe economic downturn that had been slamming newspapers, especially local community newspapers. More than 2,000 newspapers have now folded throughout the United States.
The Town Crier could not afford a paid editor. It needed to be able to pay an editor a reasonable salary so the paper could carry on with new owners after we retired. We did not want the Town Crier to retire with us.
So, we tried 25% advertising discounts, additional bundling discounts and free color. We tried keeping the Town Crier open on weekends and serving as a Visitor’s Center, informing tourists as to inns, shops and restaurants.
In an effort to attract advertising, we tried making the Town Crier “free to the Hill,” with free copies in every local mailbox and at more than 40 locations around town, and for seven months our circulation jumped 130% — not 30% — 130%.
But nothing worked until we adopted our Membership model in August of 2017. The response from you all was wonderful, and it told us you felt our community needed a real newspaper as much as we felt it did.
Today, we continue to rely on you Members and readers who will join you. Town Crier Members truly are keeping our paper serving our Hill, so please join us, if you haven’t already, and plan to renew your Memberships. You’ll be keeping a real newspaper serving our community.
Our most sincere congratulations and thanks to you all.

Don’t let job scams block your
path forward

After more than a year of pandemic-related devastating losses — including job losses — you may be one of millions looking to get back on your feet with a new job. This Financial Literacy Month, as always, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) wants to help keep you on track with ways to avoid job scams.
Scammers post ads online or in print for a variety of jobs, including work-at-home jobs. They sometimes even pretend to represent well-known companies or the government. But these ads are really just tricks to get your money or personal information. Here’s how to protect yourself:
• Never respond to ads guaranteeing you’ll get a job. Even if your qualifications are ideal, it’s never a sure thing that you’ll get the job.
• Avoid work-at-home ads guaranteeing you’ll make big money. No one can predict how much money you’ll actually make working for yourself.
• Never pay to get a job. Scammers may say they have a job waiting if you just pay a fee for certification, training, equipment, or supplies. But, after you pay, you find out the job is fake — and you won’t get your money back.
• Don’t bank on a “cleared” check. No legitimate company will ever send you a check and then tell you to send in part of that money, or

- gift cards. It’s a scam: that check is a fake and you’ll lose your money.
- Don’t believe ads for “previously undisclosed” federal government jobs. Information about federal jobs is publicly available at usajobs.gov.
 - Research potential employers. Search online for a company’s name, email address, and phone number. If you’ve heard of the company, look on its website, call, or email to find out if the job is real.
 - Find legitimate job listings. Try visiting sites like your state’s Career OneStop.
- Learn more about spotting and avoiding job scams. And if you experience this or other scams, tell the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.

AAI opens new gallery

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild (AAI) has been supporting local artists for years, putting on some of the community's most popular art events, including the annual Art Walk & Wine Tasting, which features artists and wine makers from near and far.

In January 2018, the AAI opened its first art gallery in the Courtyard building on Ridgeview Drive. For almost two-and-a-half years, the gallery was successfully displaying artists' talents in the form of drawing, painting, photography, sculptures and much more. There were countless gallery receptions and themed shows.

The gallery also served as a visitors center for those looking for recommendations on where to shop, stay and dine. It shared information regarding events and helped promote local businesses by sharing their information to those passing through.

Unfortunately, the gallery had to close its doors in April 2020 due to the pandemic. As the world shut down and stayed home, it changed everyone in many different ways.

Artists have been busy creating new art in the comfort of their own homes. Now, they will once again be able to get back to displaying their art in a new gallery. Nam Joo Kim, the owner of the Mile High Cafe, offered the AAI a space to open a new gallery located at 26364 Saunders Meadow Road.

Donna Elliot said, "We signed a lease that commenced on Oct. 1, 2020. Because of the high numbers of COVID-19 cases in Riverside County, the AAI Board decided not to open the gallery until it was safer to do so. This period gave us a chance to create a gallery-worthy space within the building as well as a colorful exterior making it attractive to visitors to stop."

The gallery and visitors center will greet those visiting with a painted mural created by Rob Padilla, a sculpture garden that will feature one of the AAI deer from its painted herd and a metal sign designed by Dore Capitani.

AAI's first show at its Courtyard location was called "Here and Now." Keeping with this annual event, the AAI will hold its grand opening from 3 to 6 p.m. Saturday, April 24. It will be AAI's third-annual "Here and Now" art show.

"Masks and social distancing are required with a controlled flow of visitors through the gallery," Elliot said. "Refreshments will be set up outside the gallery. We invite people to celebrate with the ribbon winners, meet the artists and purchase unique, original art."

Cyn Grady will continue to be the gallery manager, meeting and greeting visitors, and working with the artists, a role she held at the Courtyard location. The new gallery will be open Saturdays and Sundays from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. The gallery will allow pop-up events for artists to sell their work. AAI is also planning to hold artist workshops.

"This new gallery is an exciting opportunity for our talented artists to sell their art, meet and to learn from one another," Grady said. "We can also distribute marketing materials from local businesses. We are grateful to Nam at Mile High for her support."

The AAI members and volunteers will take a spin around town during the month of April to pick up marketing and event materials from local businesses to have available in the gallery. They will also have a bulletin board posted outside the gallery to help spread the word about local events.

On May 15, the "Herd Gathering" will be growing. Student artists will be painting a new deer and a coyote to add to the ever-growing AAI's Painted Deer public art project. The event will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. at IdyPark and this will be the only time this new addition will be in the same location. After the event, the addition will be installed in its new locations in town.

"This project is funded by the Ruth & Joseph C. Reed Foundation for the Arts," Elliot said. "Three refurbished deer from the original 2013 project will also be on display."

The Holiday Art Faire that will be held this summer and the date will be announced in the near future.

Two horses travel the PCT

Hundreds of people travel the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) every year. Each year, it seems to be more popular as shown by how many hikers make their way through town.

While hikers tend to travel on their own or in groups, not many travel with horses. However, Jess Goodlett is not only traveling with one horse, she's traveling with two. She made her way through this section of the PCT last week, stopping by Mayor Max's house to meet him and talk with his staff.

Goodlett's horses are both rescued Mustangs from the Little Owyhee Herd Management Land located in Nevada. The land stretches hundreds of thousands of acres and is managed by the Bureau of Land Management. It is made up of descendants of ranch horses that were released or escaped to the area. Makani is an 11-year-old riding horse. Malana is an 8-year-old pack horse.

Goodlett's love for horses started at the young age of 10. Her love for horses quickly grew as she went from taking riding lessons to training them. Now she's taken on this new adventure of long-distance riding.

Much of the planning that goes into hiking the PCT with horses revolves around water sources. Because water is so heavy, Goodlett depends on natural water sources to plan out her trip. Each horse can drink 10 to 15 gallons of water per day, according to Goodlett.

Riding 20 to 25 miles per day, Goodlett and her Mustangs are taking the trail in 3 to 5 day increments before coming off the trail to rest. They have been enjoying their adventure so far.

"My riding horse loves it," Goodlett said. "She loves getting out on trails. It's been going really well. The horses are doing great. I've seen a lot of beautiful trail already. I've already met some amazing people and Trail Angels."

While the trip has gone well so far, it hasn't been without some amusing issues. Goodlett added with a laugh, "We did get chased by

bees one day."

While Goodlett wants to ride the entire trail, she is only riding the areas of the trail her horses can travel through. Unfortunately, not all the areas of the PCT are manageable for the horses due to the unsafe conditions, including the Mount San Jacinto section.

"When you're hiking on your own, you can get a ride into town or camp anywhere," Goodlett explained. "But with the horses, I either need pens or trees to tie them up. Planning logistics is a lot more challenging. It takes a lot more thought when you're riding because you have two extra living beings to take care of. A lot of it is planned where the water is and where I'm allowed to camp."

Taking this adventure has been a dream for Goodlett for years. She first heard about the PCT from friends in 2013.

In 2015, she competed as a trainer in the Extreme Mustang Makeover in Fort Worth, Texas. Trainers have 100 days to take a completely untrained and untouched Mustang and turn them into a rideable, trusting Mustang.

It's here where she met four fellow horse lovers and became friends. They decided to create a group that would support each other's love and dreams with their Mustang companions.

Goodlett said, "Our group is called 'Limitless' — five riders and six horses. We first rode the Colorado Trail, which is 500 miles, in 2017. We planned to ride the PCT in 2020 but that

was canceled for obvious reasons."

The ride along the Colorado Trail took them 30 days. From that point on, they were hooked and decided to set out to ride the PCT. Even though her group couldn't make it this year, they are still supporting Goodlett behind the scenes as she travels with her horses Makani and Malana.

"It's been since 2013 that I've been dreaming about riding the trail and now it's happening," Goodlett said.
