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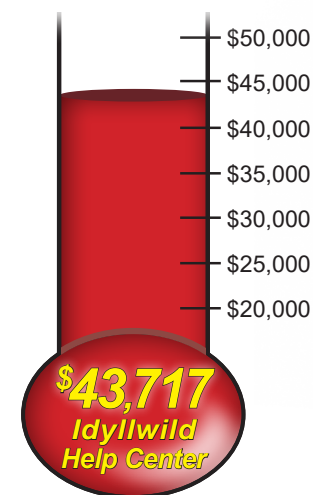

Four still missing

Backpacker.com published a story by Bill Donahue titled "Kidnapped on the Pacific Crest Trail" Dec. 17, 2019.

The introduction reads: "This is the story of an alleged kidnapping and rape on the Pacific Crest Trail. No charges have been filed against the alleged perpetrator [James William Parrillo]. The accuser [Kira Moon] died on February 7, 2019. Prior to the alleged crimes, the alleged perpetrator was accused of mistreating a number of other women, but was never criminally charged or convicted for such behavior. This story is based on statements the accuser made prior to her death, interviews with more than 20 witnesses, and a review of public records. The alleged perpetrator has not responded to requests for comments." Donahue reports "Moon died when an electrical failure caused the trailer to catch fire."

The newspaper has been covering missing persons in and around the area for over a year. Rosario Garcia's remains were located, giving her family closure. Her remains were located by two nonprofits, not the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RCSD).

'I'm here to help!'

Ronnie Imel, founder of the nonprofit Veterans Paying It Forward, accepted a \$10,000 donation from the Soboba Foundation Tuesday, May 25. Imel, a longtime resident of Mountain Center, is a Vietnam veteran.

After spending a few years working for the Richfield Company, Imel went into the U.S. Army. In his early twenties, he went back to work for the company after returning from Vietnam. He decided to try something new and worked in the automotive industry. He started out in sales, moving up to manager, then to general manager of Chevrolet and Toyota dealerships in the Torrance and Pomona areas. Imel decided he wanted to do something different. Different, he did!

He moved to Mountain Center in 1999. Why Mountain Center? As a veteran returning from Vietnam, he wanted a peaceful and rural environment. A few of his friends sought his help after returning from deployment. He met many who suffered with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

With the help of a friend, he developed the nonprofit Veterans Paying It Forward. In his research, he discovered there were more veterans per capita in Hemet than in any other city in the state. Despite the 20-mile drive from Mountain Center to Hemet, Imel makes the drive on a daily basis.

When asked what drives his passion to help veterans he said, "I believe we are born into our passion and we find it." Adding, he has a heart to serve. His father was a World War II veteran, and as children, they saluted the flag daily.



COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:
Cases continue to decline

Hospitalizations within Riverside County continue to decline. The county remains in the orange tier of the state’s tier system.
Gov. Gavin Newsom recently stated the state would

open up June 15 if “vaccine supply is sufficient for Californians 16 years and older who wish to be inoculated” and hospitalization numbers remain low. He also said the June 15 date would be revisited, if needed.
According to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 117 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and two deaths reported. One hundred and fourteen of the 117 people have recovered.
As of press time on June 2, Riverside County has

300,732 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,608 deaths related to COVID-19 and 295,290 people have recovered. Thirty-two individuals are being hospitalized, and of those, seven are in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate is 1.3%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 2.0. The county is reporting that 39.9% of its population has received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.
To date, 3,130,296 total tests have been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Riverside County has an estimated population of 2.47 million.



According to California Highway Patrol Officer **Mike Murawski**, at noon Sunday, May 30, a two-vehicle minor collision occurred on Highway 74 near the entrance to Hurkey Creek. Because vehicles were coming in and out of the campground area, traffic lanes in both Highway 74 directions were stopped. **Roy Heath**, 84, of Hemet was driving a black 2017 BMW X3 eastbound on Highway 74 when he came upon the scene, slammed on his brakes, swerved to miss the vehicle in front of him and then his left front tire clipped the rear left of a westbound silver 2015 Chevrolet Silverado. **Roy Torres**, 61, of Indio, was driving the pickup. No one was injured but Heath suffered medical issues. Idyllwild Fire transported him to Kaiser Permanente Medical Center in Moreno Valley. Adding to the conversation was Imel’s friend Gerry Chase, of Hemet. Chase, a Korean War veteran, explained what Ronnie is doing.
“Ronnie’s goal is to help vets,” Chase said. “He specifically helps veterans who have not gotten their ratings for disability for their service.”
A rating is the percentage of disability that resulted from a veteran’s service. If a veteran is 100% disabled, that’s pretty straightforward. If a veteran is 30% disabled, they might encounter problems obtaining disability.
According to Chase, “The government routinely underrates veterans. Ronnie has devoted his entire life to help vets get their disability. He does this free of charge.” Chase continued, “He absorbs all the costs involved and he is not a wealthy man. It’s the servicemen and women in the mountains he helps, the upper [Idyllwild and its immediate environs] and the lower mountains.” Chase described the forms that need to be completed as complicated and cumbersome and that most of the veterans are unable to complete the forms on their own. Imel does receive some donations and last Tuesday, he received that \$10,000 check from Soboba.
What Imel wants readers to know is that he is here to help.
He is spending his own money to build a secondary two-story building on his own property. The building will have an elevator and will be used for the sole purpose of servicing the veterans in the upper and lower mountain. In addition, he will be putting in two bedrooms for any veteran who has to travel, doesn’t have the means to get home at night and needs a place to stay for the night.
By doing that, he removes some of the stress involved with completing the required forms by not having to travel long distances to various veteran’s offices. Some veterans lack transportation and it can become a nearly impossible situation.
Chase added, “Many veterans suffer with post-traumatic stress syndrome. There is actually trauma involved with the stress of having to obtain help from the VA [U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs].”

Riverside County ignores North Circle Drive’s deplorable state

Neglected by our county for years, the surface of North Circle Drive — from Village Center Drive in downtown Idyllwild to South Circle Drive up at “Four Corners” — is in an appalling state of disrepair.

Vehicles continually jounce and bounce over cracks, crevices, gouges and mini-gorges. The clatter of vehicle suspensions being tested — especially of pickup trucks with loads and loose tools — can be conversation stopping, and a great many pickups travel North Circle Drive daily.

It’s been like this for years and it’s getting worse.

North Circle Drive is a main artery in Idyllwild. It stretches from Highway 243 in the west to South Circle Drive in the east, a distance of about a mile. Scores of businesses are located along the unsightly length of North Circle, many of them seeking to attract tourists — the lifeblood of so much of Idyllwild’s economy. The state of disrepair is a walking hazard to visitors and locals alike.

The Town Crier moved its office from Village Center Drive to the street-front office in Oakwood Plaza on North Circle Drive in June 2013. A year later the

TC moved 100 feet or so west to the old Ponderosa building, also on North Circle Drive, where it remained for six years. During that time, the paving and the clattering noise it creates, went from bad to worse. Only spot patches showed any attempt at repair, and the patches themselves have become old and in disrepair along with the rest of the street. The TC office is now in Strawberry Creek Plaza, after seven years on North Circle Drive.

“I do not recall any effort to repave the length of North Circle Drive during the entire time the Town Crier maintained its offices there — and it needed repair the whole time,” said Becky Clark, co-publisher of the Idyllwild Town Crier.

That patch of North Circle Drive where it meets Highway 243 in front of Village Hardware is in equally deplorable condition.

I recently walked North Circle Drive, from Village Center Drive to Four Corners, making a nonstop video recording the whole way. That video can be viewed at the Town Crier’s website. Some still photos, also from that walk, appear in this week’s paper.

Couple returns home to \$1,305 water bill

Nancy and Dan Swanson got a surprise when they read their March 2021 water bill. It was \$1,305. According to Nancy, they were not at their home one day in March. The couple reside in Idyllwild Water District’s territory. A typical water bill, according to Nancy, ranges from \$35 to \$40 and at times a little bit higher. April’s bill was \$43. The property has a septic tank.

The Swansons stayed off the mountain late February through early April. Before they left, they turned off the water inside the house and drained the pipes. They did not turn off the water at the street because it is on a slope, and at that time, was covered in ice.

They received a call from their neighbor at the beginning of April letting them know the district was turning off their water at the street.

The amount of the March bill was quite a surprise. Nancy said they monitored the meter four times a day for four consecutive days and determined there was no leak. Nancy said when they contacted the district, General Manager Leo Havener said he would be out to look at it. According to Nancy, he sent IWD’s Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman, who determined nothing was wrong

with the meter.

The district, according to Nancy, also determined there was no leak.

“We had to pay the bill,” Nancy said. “There was no forgiveness. Nothing!”

After doing some research, Nancy said the equivalent to the amount of the bill is 64,000-plus gallons of water. She said the average home uses about 3,000 gallons of water per person per month.

The district determined the water was stolen. However, Nancy told the newspaper that camera footage of the property did not reveal anyone trespassing and no sign of footprints or digging were found. Nancy also mentioned that neighbors, who are very alert, saw nothing. So, the Swansons called the sheriff’s department to report it and a deputy responded. According to Nancy, the deputy was going to talk to the district, but she has not heard back.

The newspaper contacted the sheriff’s department and left a message for the deputy to follow up. As of press time, no contact had been made by the deputy.

The newspaper also contacted Havener asking, “Was any forgiveness or investigation done regarding the Swansons’ \$1,305 March water bill? Was there an issue with the meter or the reading? Who from the district went out to the property to investigate? How many gallons of water does that equate to?” No response was received by press time.

Messina appointed IFPD commissioner, again

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) Board of Commissioners appointed Daniel Messina, in a 3-1 vote, to the board. Commissioner Christina Reitz voted to appoint Idyllwild Community Center Board President Stephanie Yost.

In addition to Messina, David Cutter and Yost applied for the vacancy. Messina was first appointed June 30, 2020 to fill the vacancy left by Larry Donahoo, whose seat was up for election in November 2020. Messina was one of three to run for two open board seats in November. Commissioners Christina Reitz (992 votes) and Dennis Fogle (688 votes) were elected. Messina received 671 votes. This current vacancy was left by Ralph Hoetger who sold his home and is moving out of the district.

Messina writes in his application he was a “volunteer firefighter and engineer with the Riverside County Fire Department (Garner Valley Fire Co. 53).” He writes that after the abolishment of the county’s volunteer program in 2011 he “worked with then Idyllwild Fire Chief Norm Walker and Fire Captain Mark LaMont to introduce an opportunity to form what is now known as the Idyllwild Volunteer Fire Company 621. I served as the Idyllwild Volunteer Fire Co. president from 2011 to 2016 and due to scheduling and business priorities, I took a leave of absence in 2017. In addition to the aforementioned and prior to my relocation to the community of Idyllwild, I spent nearly 40 years in the private fire sector providing such services as: water tenders, heavy equipment, communications, logistical support, and other specialty items required of the greater fire service community.”

The board elected Henry Sawicki (formerly the board’s vice president) as its president, Messina as its vice president and Rhonda Andrewson remains the board secretary.

A moment of silence was taken at the beginning of the meeting in honor of former Idyllwild Volunteer Fire Company board member Jim Kutsch, who died May 3.

Clerk of the board and Administrative Assistant Rachel Teegarden received her emergency medical technician certification.

Siren

A change to the emergency siren alert system test was discussed. The test will now be a one 1-minute long alert. The test will still be conducted at 1 p.m. on the third Saturday of the month. The siren, in an actual emergency, will now be three 3-minute long alerts, instead of the three 30-second alerts.

Resolution 521

Unanimously approved by the board was the FY 2021/22 annual unit fee assessment. The resolution reads: “Whereas, the qualified voters of the Idyllwild Fire Protection District, at a special election on July 21, 1981, by two thirds (2/3) vote, established a standby charge not to exceed sixty-five dollars (\$65.00) per unit of benefit per year as authorized by Assembly Bill No. 630; and Whereas, a unit of measure has been established by a square footage for a structure and a half (1/2) unit of measure has been established for vacant property; Now therefore be it resolved that we, the Board of Fire Commissioners, do hereby set the standard per unit measure fee at sixty-five (\$65.00) for Fiscal Year 2021/22 (and other unit measure fees as adopted in the approved annual fee assessment).”

Last week the Town Crier published an opinion piece sent to our editor by Dr. David L. Greene, an obstetrician-gynecologist in Corona Del Mar, who expressed his strong opinions. Opinions — that’s what made it an op-ed piece, not a news report.

One way to fact check op-ed pieces — including this one, mine here — is to look to see what citations to what authority are relied upon in the piece and check them out yourself. You can also look to see if the claims made therein have been professionally fact checked by agencies that are expert at doing the research involved in fact checking.

For instance, Greene’s piece commented on a verbal interaction between Sen. Dr. Rand Paul and Dr. Anthony Fauci during Fauci’s testimony before Congress. As Greene related it, you would think Paul got the better of the exchange, but Newsweek’s fact-check on the Paul-Fauci back-and-forth leads to a very different conclusion. (See <https://newsweek.com/wuhan-lab-virus-dr-fauci-rand-paul-debate-fact-checked-explained-1591414>).

Greene also suggested that hydroxychloroquine products — which have been proven safe and effective for NON-Covid related conditions — should be granted Emergency Use Authorizations (EUs) for use in Covid treatment. But studies regarding the efficacy of hydroxychloroquine (HCQ) in treating Covid-19 patients have shown that it is not effective (e.g., University of Washington, <https://newsroom.uw.edu/post-script/end-hydroxychloroquine-treatment-covid-19>). Nor is HCQ effective in preventing Covid-19 in the first place (e.g., Case Western Reserve University, <https://thedaily.case.edu/new-study-hydroxychloroquine-in-effective-as-preventive-antiviral-against-covid-19>). But Greene wants hydroxychloroquine authorized by the CDC anyway. He points out that President Trump was given “non-approved” treatments. Greene does not mention that the president’s treatments did not include hydroxychloroquine.

At one point Greene suggested that an EUA (Emergency Use Authorization) should be granted for such Covid ineffective drugs so as to negate the need for the vaccines he describes as “poorly tested.” But the vaccines themselves were tested for efficacy and safety and authorized for use under the very EUA protocols that Greene wants to use to justify hydroxychloroquine use “off-label.” (Off label describes a physician’s use of a drug for a purpose other than as it was intended.)

Greene then followed with several paragraphs regarding the CDC’s VAERS system (Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System) and how 4,200 persons, out of more than 130 million persons fully vaccinated for Covid, died thereafter. He then asserts that the 4,200 deaths were “related to the Covid-19 vaccine program,”

which might lead you to believe that those deaths were caused by the vaccine. That’s certainly not true since under the VAERS system, all deaths following within a specified number of days or weeks after vaccination can be reported, whether the deaths had anything to do with the vaccine or not. Consequently, when Covid vaccine is given to a very elderly person who already is dying in a nursing home it could be reported in the VAERS system as a death following a Covid vaccination as long as that person died within the specified time after vaccination.

Anyone can submit a VAERS report to the CDC, including family members and friends — anyone in the general public. The CDC website notes: “Remember, just because an adverse event or condition has been reported does not prove that the adverse event is caused by vaccination.” (<https://www.cdc.gov/vaccinesafety/monitoring/vaers/index.html>) and “Specifically, a report to VAERS does not mean that a vaccine caused an adverse event.” (<https://www.cdc.gov/vaccinesafety/ensuringsafety/monitoring/vaers/index.html>)

Greene cites the website of attorney Richard Jaffe regarding underreporting within the VAERS system. (<https://rickjaffeesq.com/2021/02/19/what-the-heck-is-the-harvard-pilgrim-study-and-did-it-really-say-that-about-the-underreporting-of-vaccine-adverse-events/>) But at that website, Jaffe reports that the Harvard Pilgrim Study does not support a sometimes-heard claim that less than 1% of post-vaccination adverse events are actually reported. Instead, Jaffe points out that the CDC’s VAERS program is a passive, voluntary program, then he says, “common sense might tell us that a passive, voluntary reporting system might well significantly underreport localized mild symptoms, i.e., a sore arm from a needle stick.” In other words, a sore arm is an adverse reaction to the Moderna vaccine, and we are all told to expect it — so why would we report it to the CDC?

Greene goes on to assert that the government’s vaccination program is a “crime against humanity” and that those responsible for it should be “brought to justice,” and, for some reason, he finishes with a pair of paragraphs referencing the Nuremberg Code — which does not apply to CDC authorized medical treatment programs at all, but rather to conducting experiments on human subjects without their informed consent, such as was done during the Nazi regime.

Whatever information you seek on any serious subject, you’d be well advised to fact check it yourself or see that it is fact checked by sources you justifiably can trust.

We were distressed and embarrassed as publishers to see the Town Crier printing the type of anti-vaccine misinformation that fringe websites and far-wing media spew.

We learned of the existence of Greene’s op-ed piece very shortly before press deadline. Better to have gone to press with a blank space there instead.

Missing persons

Abrams and Diana Perez Gonzalez) of eight people to go missing in and around the Idyllwild area remain missing.

Another search of the area where Prifogle went missing was conducted Sunday, April 18. “A search was completed on Sunday in the area where it was believed Roy [Prifogle] was last near,” the RCSD media information bureau wrote in an email response. “No evidence and or items were located during the search.” Prior to April 18, multiple searches had been conducted.

Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4, 2020. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

Lane was last seen June 15, 2020. “I love my daughter so much and I’ve been praying for the other three families,” Lane’s mother Kathy Lamont said. “My heart tells me there is foul play somewhere.”

Local and Lane’s cousin Todd Gilliland was the last person to see her before she went missing. “I miss her a lot,” Gilliland said. “I wish we would get some kind of word about her. It’s nerve-racking. They [RCSD] have interviewed me once when she was reported missing and haven’t talked to me since. I was the last one to see her. You would think they’d want to go over it with me again.”

According to Lamont in December, the RCSD last

searched in early September with cadaver dogs on Black Mountain Trail, north of Pine Cove, where Lane was last seen. The search came back with nothing.

Abrams was 65 years old at the time she went missing. She is 5’ 5” tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

On June 6, Abrams was last seen by her self-proclaimed live-in boyfriend/fiancé Keith Harper at her ranch in Apple Canyon (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley). Since the initial search efforts more than 11 months ago, the RCSD has not provided new information or updates regarding her disappearance.

David Gottfredson, News 8, previously reported that the San Juan County Sheriff in New Mexico obtained a search warrant and deputies impounded the RV Harper drove to New Mexico taking evidence from inside. However, the RCSD has not provided any persons of interest or suspects regarding Abrams or any of the other missing people.

Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit conducted searches on Abrams’ property before assigning the case to detectives.

The most recent woman to go missing from the Hemet/San Jacinto area is Diana Perez Gonzalez who was reported missing Dec. 11 and 27 years old at the time she went missing. According to family, Gonzalez visited the Idyllwild area regularly. She was last seen by her boyfriend.

Christy Rojas, Gonzalez’s sister, and her family are struggling with her sister missing.

The garden has its own mind

Spring! It never gets old. Stepping out into the garden each morning I feel the same degree of thrill I did when clutching that first packet of seeds at the age of 5. Of course, it can happen to you at any age. One day, you wake up helplessly enslaved by The Garden — a good thing — a love that follows you wherever you go, no matter how many gardens you left behind. And now, you are a mountain gardener.

Mountain gardeners are cautious, like deer. Knowing the capricious nature of our mountain we step out slowly each spring patient, observing this year’s weather and conditions.

Working in a wildland, we consider how best to allow the garden to become what it wants to be while creating something that also suits our needs for beauty, healing, rest and dreams. We make intentions rather than plans.

No hurry. We choose with care. With so many “high speed” things in our lives it is comforting to engage in an activity where “the slower the better” is a good motto. Our gardens require lots of patient listening to what the garden wants to be. Every spring, I delight in observing what changes my garden has decided to make for herself. Patches of Shasta Daisy migrate gradually into new territory, Aspens spring up, changing the flow of the path. Milkweed has its own mind, refusing to remain in the carefully tended central plot and raising children in areas I considered hopelessly rocky, full of gravel and weeds.

Patches of Violets appear like unexpected kindness all over the yard, while Toad Wort, unstoppable for years, resigns. Elecampane multiplies and conquers, and faithful Valerian, already 3 feet tall and beginning to send up its spectacular 5-foot flower spikes by mid-May populates anywhere it finds a bare spot and some moisture.

A great way to see which plants are successful near you is to do what we all enjoy so very much, walking around, gawking at our neighbors’ gardens in all seasons. I have never met a gardener yet who told me to get lost, or who refused to tell me the answer to “What is that gorgeous plant?” They may even give you a clipping.

In her book, “The Garden Awakening,” Mary Reynolds writes, “Working with rather than against your land is vital, your overall goal being to restore harmony and balance.” One way of achieving this (and saving a lot of time, energy and money) is in choosing which plants will thrive and survive with both our unique climate and with the native wildlife.

One of the greatest lessons the garden is teaching me is that I am not and never will be in charge. It’s taking me a long time to learn that. However, I do get to make some choices, and which new plants to try, is one of the most delicious!

Here is a short list of hardy perennials that with a bit of care seldom let you down. For a minimum of effort, they give a great and satisfying return of blooms and lush foliage. All of them are very critter resistant — not generally snacked upon by deer, rabbits, or squirrels. Of course, if animals get hungry enough, they will eat anything, but with these plants it is unusual, and if eaten, they usually bounce back.

All the perennials on this list are frost-hardy, most to 40 below zero. All can handle some or a lot of shade. Most will spread out and multiply, forming large clumps you can divide into the rest of your garden and/or share with your friends. There are many more perennials that fall into this category, but to avoid “nursery overwhelm,” here are just a few favorites that all complement one another.

Lamb’s Ears (*Stachys byzantina*): I don’t know where I would be without Lamb’s ears. Practically unkillable and almost zero-maintenance, they look good even in early spring, quickly producing clumps of soft, silvery foliage to accent early blooming Iris and Columbine. Mid-season, they send up stunning silver and pink flower spikes that look amazing interspersed with other perennials. And of course, you can pet them. They are easy to divide. Get some from a neighbor. Maintenance: Very low.

Shasta Daisy (*Leucanthemum* sp.): There are so many varieties of Shastas in all shapes and sizes: some are early spring bloomers and some wait until late July to start their show. You can have them almost all season long. They are tough as nails, spread nicely and clumps are easy to divide. They are hungry and appreciate some good organic fertilizer a couple of times a season. Maintenance: Low.

Catmint (*Nepeta*): There are many gorgeous varieties here too, including the one that makes cats act even crazier than usual, (if that’s even possible,) and a tincture of which is the main ingredient in natural mosquito repellent. Blue Hill (*Blauhügel*) is a 2-3-foot-high gorgeous variety that makes great mounds of blue-gray foliage and sends up masses of purple-blue flower spikes in June. No plant is hardier. Cut it back after bloom and it will probably bloom again. Maintenance: Low.

Lady’s Mantle (*Alchemilla mollis*): A true English garden staple that works well in the mountains. Lady’s Mantle forms mounds of spectacular ruffled lily-pad like leaves that quickly spread to fill in those bald spots even in deep shade. I’ve seen it growing inside a rotten log. In late spring, it sends up chartreuse flower spikes, but the real appeal is that gorgeous foliage, soft green, inverted umbrellas that when wet, glisten with jewel-like beads of water.

Lady’s Mantle is beautiful as a border, for instance, around *Nepeta* and *Valerian rubra*, a pink-flowering variety of *Valerian*. Lady’s Mantle can live 25-plus years. Maintenance: Very low.

Iris. These bloom best in full sun but will take a little shade. The best part is you can get lots of them for free from anyone who grows them as they need to be divided often. Fertilize twice, once when the leaves come out of the ground in early spring and once again when the flower scapes first appear. When they are done blooming, they go dormant and need little water until near the end of the season when they start putting out new leaves. Maintenance: Medium. Needs division every other year for the best bloom.

Monarda (*Bee Balm*): This is a fabulous, tougher-than-it-looks perennial that is popular with all pollinators and loved by butterflies, bees and people. It is easy to transplant. Maintenance: Very low.

Common Milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*): Yes, these are the flowers that Monarch butterflies not only love to slurp nectar from, but also lay their eggs on. You can watch their colorful, stripy, caterpillars grow, then watch them make a chrysalis, and wave to them as they take off on their amazing migration to warmer climates for the winter.

Butterfly Milkweed (*Asclepias tuberosa*): This is the kind mostly sold in nurseries and has different needs from common milkweed, so check with your nursery person for details. Important: Always ask if their plants were ever treated with neonicotinoids as this chemical is very harmful to butterflies and birds. If it has, best to skip it as the plant may retain traces of this chemical.

Milkweed is mostly pest-free. If something is eating your milkweed, rejoice! It’s a Monarch caterpillar. Milkweed sap is poisonous to everything else. You will have to look hard to find her! Though they are brightly colored, they blend in and are hard to see.

Common milkweed is difficult to transplant or divide due to a long tap root, and this is probably the reason it is seldom seen in nurseries. You can collect some seeds from local wild specimens and plant barely covered on damp growing medium. Keep them moist and they should sprout within a month. The young plants will need protection over their first winter if planted in summer. Bring them inside and grow them under a light. They are worth the trouble. A milkweed plant can live for 25 years or more.

Stonecrop (*Sedum*): There are many types — tall, short and medium. Sedums are mostly grown for their lovely, colored foliage, but they also are a pollinator hero because they make beautiful flowers in early fall when nothing much else is blooming. This is a bumblebee favorite and is incredibly easy to propagate — just break a piece off and stick it in the ground. Maintenance: Low.

Hardy Geranium (*Cranesbill Geranium*): This is not the stuff your mom called Geraniums and put in pots and hanging baskets. Those are a plant called *Pelargo-*

nium which is not hardy and not actually a *Geranium*. *Cranesbill Geraniums* also do well in pots and half-barrels. They are incredibly tough and yet so delicate and graceful looking. All types of hardy geranium are show-stoppers and are also some of the first perennials to bloom in the spring. Maintenance: Low.

Salvia (*Sage*): There is perennial *salvia* and annual *salvia*. Both are great choices for the mountain garden. Low maintenance and not terribly picky about soil, they are a must-have. Note: Annual *salvia* will bloom all season, so don’t turn your nose up at this annual even if you prefer perennials.

Columbine (*Aquilegia*): This is that graceful flower we all fell in love with in the first place! Did you know that when your *Columbine* finishes blooming you can chop the whole plant off 6 inches from the ground, (Fertilize. It is a heavy feeder.) and it will immediately pop back out and rebloom? Amazing. Sometimes very hungry rabbits will do this chore for you. Don’t worry, *Columbine* will be right back! They will self-seed and you can move the babies around easily to where you want them. Older plants don’t transplant well. Maintenance: Low.

Are you a perennial snob? Don’t be! Annuals only live for one season, but they usually bloom their hearts out for months and sometimes self-seed and come back next year. A few hardy annuals that are extremely easy to grow from seed and fairly pest-free are:

Scabiosa (*Black Knight*): This or any other variety is stunning mixed in with your other flowers, especially *Shasta Daisies*, which also help to hold them upright as they tend to flop.

Ammi Majus (*Bishop’s Flower*, *False Queen Anne’s Lace*): This is a lovely, tall baby’s breath type flower wonderful in bouquets and not invasive, though they will self-seed. Every seed in the packet is going to come up. You will have a hundred of these, so spread the joy.

Except for *Ami Majus* (and I don’t know why), it is easy to find these annuals for sale at your local nursery, or a good way to end up with a lot of these annuals for very little money is to start them inside in a container a few weeks ahead of when you want to plant them out. Even if crowded, they are easy to separate and all transplant well. Each annual seed packet will produce many, many seedlings that you can stick in the gaps in your garden. These varieties will not mind freezing temperatures or being snowed on once you harden them off.

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Why the Bear has a Stumpy Tail

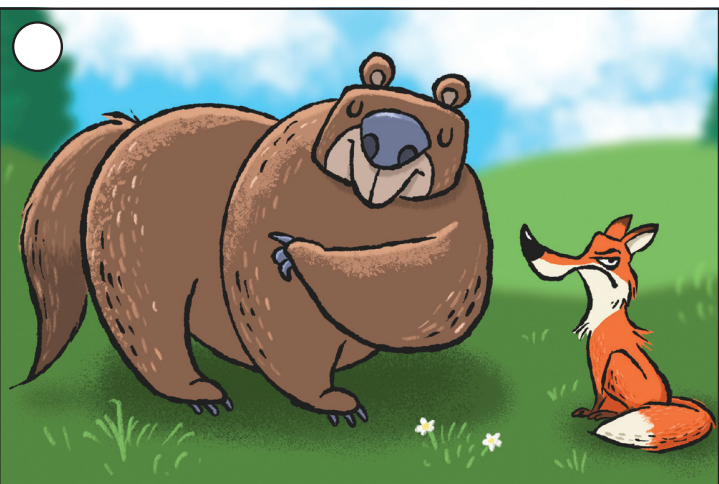

Bear saw the fish and asked Fox, “How did you get so many tasty fish? Can you teach me how to get fish like that?”



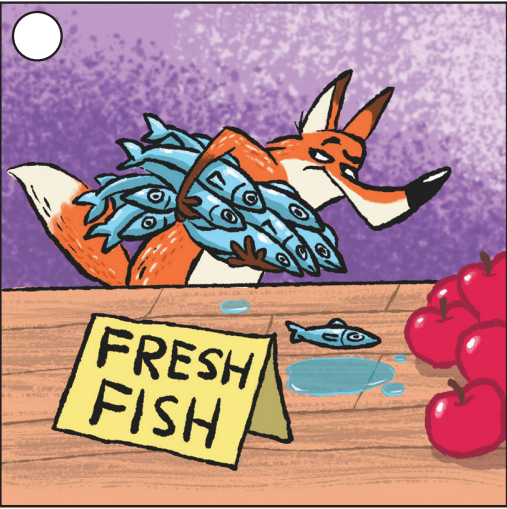
