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

County releases recommended budget

The county of Riverside executive fice released a recommended budget (https:// www.rivco.org/ about-county/ budget-and-financial-information) for FY 2021/22 that includes nearly \$7 billion for vital regional and local services. The recommended

budget demonstrates the values that drive the im-

portant work of the county. These priorities are to improve the quality of life for residents, transform the delivery of services, seek systemic equity, as well as support pandemic relief and recovery.

"Aligning the county's budget to the values and priorities of the Board of Supervisors is a constant and disciplined effort," said County Executive Officer Jeff Van Wagenen. "This recommended budget starts the process for a strategic plan that will ultimately achieve just that. A budget is much more than numbers.'

The county's wide-ranging programs include social services, public works projects, community services, health care, and public safety services for Riverside County residents. Approximately \$950 million of the total budget is made up of general fund expenses. This year, \$3 million is specifically recommended for unincorporated areas, in response to a survey conducted earlier this year to prioritize projects in underserved, unincorporated communities.

The recommended budget also preserves roughly \$240 million in federal relief funding to address pandemic response and recovery needs.

"While we are optimistic for the future, we must recognize that challenges remain," said Van Wagenen. "Achieving fiscal stability is one of our priorities and working toward a balanced budget is a fundamental ob-

David O'Sullivan, of Ireland, was last seen at the Idyllwild Inn April 7, 2017. He was 25 years old when he went missing.

The Fowler-O'Sullivan Foundation OF) website writes of him, "David [O'Sullivan] was thru-hiking NOBO on the Pacific Crest Trail [PCT] from Mexico to Canada. On April 6, 2017 he sent an email to his family from an Idyllwild library. O'Sullivan, who is from Ireland, intended to hike north into the San Jacinto David O'Sullivan Mountains the next day. He has not been seen since. There are several trails he could have taken to access the PCT from

missing.org/posts/802717017119071." Backpacker.com published a story by Bill Donahue titled "Kidnapped on the Pacific Crest Trail" Dec. 17, 2019.


The introduction reads: "This is the story of an alleged kidnapping and rape on the Pacific Crest Trail. No charges have been filed against the alleged perpetrator [James William Parrillo]. The accuser [Kira Moon] died on February 7, 2019. Prior to the alleged crimes, the alleged perpetrator was accused of mistreating a number of other women, but was never criminally charged or convicted for such behavior. This story is based on statements the accuser made prior to her death, interviews with more than 20 witnesses, and a review of public records. The alleged perpetrator has not responded to requests for comments." Donahue reports "Moon died when an electrical failure caused the trailer to catch fire.'

An excerpt from Lankford's unpublished book was given to the newspaper by Tarr. Note: Parrillo is spelled differently from the above story.

"In Warner Springs, Medic [Parillo's trail name] lectured other hikers about the David O'Sullivan case as if he knew a lot about it. Search dogs had caught David's scent on Fuller Ridge, he told these hikers, but authorities failed to locate the body. (Later, in private, Medic told Steel a different story about what happened to O'Sulli-

"The day Parillo was released from his misdemeanor warrant, Sally Fowler and Andrea Lankford of the Fowler-O'Sullivan Foundation posted warnings on Facebook exposing his long history of violence and deception to the PCT hiking community. COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

State of emergency won't end June 15

Gov. Gavin Newsom recently stated the state would open up June 15 if "vaccine supply is sufficient for Californians 16 years and older who wish to be inoculated" and hospitalization numbers remain low. He also said the June 15 date would be revisited, if needed. He recently stated he would not be ending the state of emergency June 15.

According to the Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) website, the area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove has a total of 117 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and two deaths reported. One hundred and fourteen of the 117 people have recovered. Hospitalizations within Riverside County continue to decline. The county remains in the orange tier of the state's tier system.

As of press time on June 8, Riverside County has 301,128 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,618 deaths related to COVID-19 and 295,675 people have recovered. Thirty-two individuals are being hospitalized, and of those, five are in the ICU. The county's positivity rate is 1.3%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 is 2.0. The county is reporting that 41.1% of its population has received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

As of press time on June 2, Riverside County had 300,732 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,608 deaths related to COVID-19 and 295,290 people had recovered. Thirty-two individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, seven were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 1.3%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 2.0. The county was reporting that 41.1% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

As of press time on May 25, Riverside County had 300,476 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,608 deaths related to COVID-19 and 294,692 people had recovered. Thirty-seven individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, seven were in the ICU. The county's positivity rate was 1.5%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 2.5. The county was reporting that 38.4% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

To date, 3,166,504 total tests have been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Riverside County has an estimated population of 2.47 million.

The CDC defines vaccine as "A product that stimulates a person's immune system to produce immunity to a specific disease, protecting the person from that disease. Vaccines are usually administered through needle injections, but can also be administered by mouth or sprayed into the nose."

I'm proud of the work we did to begin to rectify these inequities — in 2021, 96% of PPP loans went to small businesses with fewer than 20 employees. Moving forward, we will continue to prioritize equity in all SBA's programs and services."










Coyote Fire

The Coyote Fire was reported at 6:35 p.m. Wednesday, June 2. The location of the fire was Old Banning Idyllwild Road south of Shirleon Drive.

Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department reported at 8 p.m. June 2, "The fire has burned approximately 60 acres with a moderate rate of spread. The fire is currently burning in medium fuels with wind out of the west. Cal Fire/Riverside County Firefighters, with assistance from USFS - San Bernardino, responded to reports of a vegetation fire in the area of Old Banning Idyllwild Road south of Shirleon Drive in Banning. Crews are on scene of approximately 50 acres of medium to light fuels burning on a northern slope. Ground and air resources are on scene. Updates will be posted as information becomes available."

The fire had been reported by Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department as 75 acres.

Full containment of the fire was reached by 2 p.m Friday with the agency reporting, "Fire resources have been released" on its incident website.

The agency tweeted at 5:25 p.m. Thursday, June 3, "Due to more accurate mapping, the fire is 43 acres and is now 90% contained."

The resources assigned to the incident were one helicopter, a helitender, 14 engine companies, five overhead personnel, a fire investigator, four air tankers, five fire crews, one water tender, two bulldozers and 140 firefighters.



I don't believe that an opinion should be viewed as a matter of trust, though. Hopefully it would be more a process of critical thinking. Wikipedia: "Critical thinking is self-directed, self-discipline, self-monitored, and self-corrective thinking."

Critical thinking allows us to hold disparate thoughts and ideas simultaneously while we determine what facts line up in a manner that suggests we're heading toward a truth. It's hubris to think we have THE answer, or THE truth.

Few of us will take the time to examine the "facts" or pursue a balanced approach to finding an answer. We like to rely on those "authority" figures to give us the answers. After all, we rationalize, they've already done all the research, so why should I? There may be, and usually is, missing needed data, on all fronts.

When there is no legal accountability, what incentive then do these drug companies and medical institutions have in creating "safe vaccines?"

Therein lies the problem. What's the background, education, affiliation, etc.? Any conflict-of-interests? How do they stand to benefit from this position?

Dr. David L. Greene's opinion, though not a popular one, is an equally justified one backed by many scientists, doctors, and educated people - those who take seriously the concept and practice of informed consent, "informing oneself" by researching many sides of an issue. Gain of function and VAERS

I have read the Op-ed "Information about the COVID-19 'vaccine' you may not be hearing," by obstetrics and gynecology doctor David L. Greene that was in the Idyllwild Town Crier, May 27, 2021. I was surprised that the Town Crier would publish such a deceptive Oped so I will address some of the deceptive comments.

declined approximately 70% to 80% from their peak. This reduction also means that the chances of variants developing are lower. Obviously, COVID-19 cases and deaths will continue to decline as more people are vaccinated and that is why there is a push to do this.

Greene cites the vaccine adverse event reporting system (VAERS) and falsely insinuates that 4,200 deaths have occurred due to the COVID-19 vaccines. Based on 285 million vaccinations, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports similar numbers for deaths after a COVID-19 vaccination, but with some very significant differences that Greene left out. Just a couple of lines down in the CDC's statement there are these sentences; "CDC and FDA physicians review each case report of death as soon as notified and CDC requests medical records to further assess reports. 

nue is primarily attributed to a net increase in property and sales taxes, redevelopment residual assets and motor vehicle revenue.

The recommended general fund discretionary spending, or net county cost (NCC), is \$957 million, an increase of \$39 million from last year. The increase in spend is primarily from increased labor, COVID-19 and unanticipated one-time costs. The NCC includes \$20 million in contingency reserved for emergency board action.

The executive office recommends a balanced general fund discretionary budget with the use of reserves. The projected balance for reserves is \$232 million, which is \$2 million above the 25% of the discretionary requirement based on Board Policy B-30.

It is important to note that this recommended budget was developed without relying heavily on COVID-19 fed-

Four people remain missing

Four (Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane, Lydia "Dia" Abrams and Diana Perez Gonzalez) of eight people to go missing in and around the Idyllwild area remain

Another search of the area where Prifogle went missing was conducted Sunday, April 18. "A search was completed on Sunday in the area where it was believed Roy [Prifogle] was last near," the RCSD media information bureau wrote in an email response. "No evidence and or items were located during the search." Prior to April 18, multiple searches had been conducted.

Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4, 2020. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

Lane was last seen June 15, 2020. "I love my daughter so much and I've been praying for the other three families," Lane's mother Kathy Lamont said. "My heart tells me there is foul play somewhere."

Local and Lane's cousin Todd Gilliland was the last person to see her before she went missing. "I miss her a lot," Gilliland said. "I wish we would get some kind of word about her. It's nerve-racking. They [RCSD] have interviewed me once when she was reported missing and haven't talked to me since. I was the last one to see her. You would think they'd want to go over it with me

According to Lamont in December, the RCSD last nant when she went missing.

searched in early September with cadaver dogs on Black Mountain Trail, north of Pine Cove, where Lane was last seen. The search came back with nothing.

Abrams was 65 years old at the time she went miss-

ing. She is 5' 5" tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, vellow shirt and blue jeans.

On June 6, 2020, Abrams was last seen by her self-proclaimed live-in boyfriend/fiancé Keith Harper at her ranch in Apple Canyon (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley). Since the initial search efforts more than 11 months ago, the RCSD has not provided new information or updates regarding her disappearance.

David Gotfredson, of News 8, previously reported that the San Juan County Sheriff in New Mexico obtained a search warrant and deputies impounded the RV Harper drove to New Mexico taking evidence from inside. However, the RCSD has not provided any persons of interest or suspects regarding Abrams or any of the other missing people.

Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit conducted searches on Abrams' property before assigning the case to detec-

The most recent woman to go missing from the Hemet/San Jacinto area is Diana Perez Gonzalez who was reported missing Dec. 11 and 27 years old at the time she went missing. According to family, Gonzalez visited the Idyllwild area regularly. She was last seen by her boyfriend.

Christy Rojas, Gonzalez's sister, and her family are struggling with her sister missing.

Rojas said, "We've been terribly sad. We think about her every day and have dreams of her, waiting for any sign or a miracle because we miss her and love her a lot. But the most important, her baby needs her. We can see the sadness in her eyes. Although she can't speak, we know she misses her mom." Gonzalez was also preg-

"At the end of this short exchange, Kira added, 'he threatened to throw me off a cliff.'

"There was no truth to Parillo's stories about David. The account about a dog catching David's scent on Fuller Ridge is false. Walker Pass (Mile 650) is too far north of Idyllwild for David to have hiked that far without being seen. I'm not sure why Parillo would tell one group of hikers that O'Sullivan's body was on Fuller Ridge and then tell Steel, in private, that David fell off Walker Pass. Parillo stories about David are unsettling. He may have been using them to intimidate Kira Moon. Or he may have been conflating other missing hikers cases into one, because, coincidentally, there is a missing hiker

This was WCA's second year of decathlon participation. Sophia also made the team last year, along with seven teammates.

When asked how she felt about the experience, she related how she was encouraged by her English teacher. Preparing for the decathlon required a lot of work. All participants studied 10 hours each week with the supervision of two coaches, both English teachers. She feels that participating in the decathlon has made her more confident and more motivated. In particular, she feels that working with her teammates really motivated her.

As for her time at WCA, and her participation in the decathlon, she graduated feeling "more passionate about education."

Sophia will be taking some time off after grad-uating last week, traveling with a group of other young people to Costa Rica, in a volunteer program operated by Raleigh International. According to Raleigh International's website, they are a "youth driven organization supporting a global movement of young people to take action.

Sophia hasn't decided on where she'll attend college or what her major will be. She is looking forward to "an opportunity to explore places outside of Idyllwild."

The first services were held in the new Idvllwild Community Presbyterian Church.

65 years ago - 1956 The Idyllwild County Water District took over the Idvllwild Water Company. Meanwhile, the election of the proposed Pine Cove County Water District was set by county supervisors.

60 years ago - 1961 Eleanor Park, also known as the Village Park, was undergoing a facelift with the addition of a fountain, a gift of the local business community and the Izaak Walton League.

55 years ago - 1966

A public hearing was scheduled on Idyllwild County Water District's plan to discharge effluent into Strawberry Creek.

50 years ago - 1971

County supervisors voted to rezone the 2,200-acre Lake Pine Meadows tract in Garner Valley. Hillside land would have a 20-acre minimum lot size and the valley floor would have a 5-acre minimum lot size. The developers, Great American Land Company, had intended to cut up the land into 3,911 lots.

45 years ago - 1976

Among the world-class faculty at ISOMATA's (now Idyllwild Arts) Summer Program were Ray Bradbury, teaching creative writing, and Bella Lewitzky, teaching modern dance.

40 years ago - 1981

20 years ago - 2001 All high-sugar drinks as well as snack foods having more than 15 grams of fat per serving were banned for sale or consumption during the school day at Hemet Unified School District campuses.
