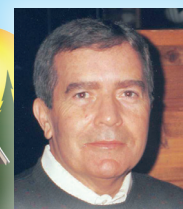

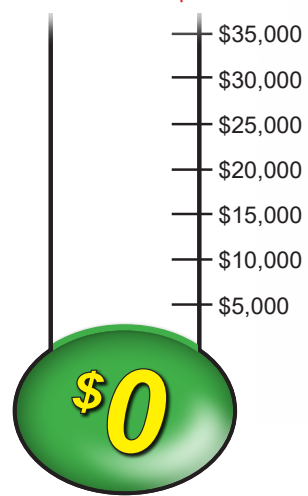

After 72 years,
Town Hall is
rededicated

Invited community and county representatives descended on Cedar Street Saturday morning for the formal Town Hall rededication ceremony where speakers included Riverside County Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington and Riverside County Executive Officer Jeff Van Wagenen. Washington said it was the first time he recalled a county executive officer appearing at an Idyllwild event.

Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) President Stephanie Yost emceed the event, which focused on the renovation of Town Hall. The American Legion Post 800 Honor Guard presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Status of investigation
unknown at this time

The newspaper contacted Pamela Jordan, president of Idyllwild Arts Foundation, asking the status of the investigation that resulted from allegations made in a student demands letter.

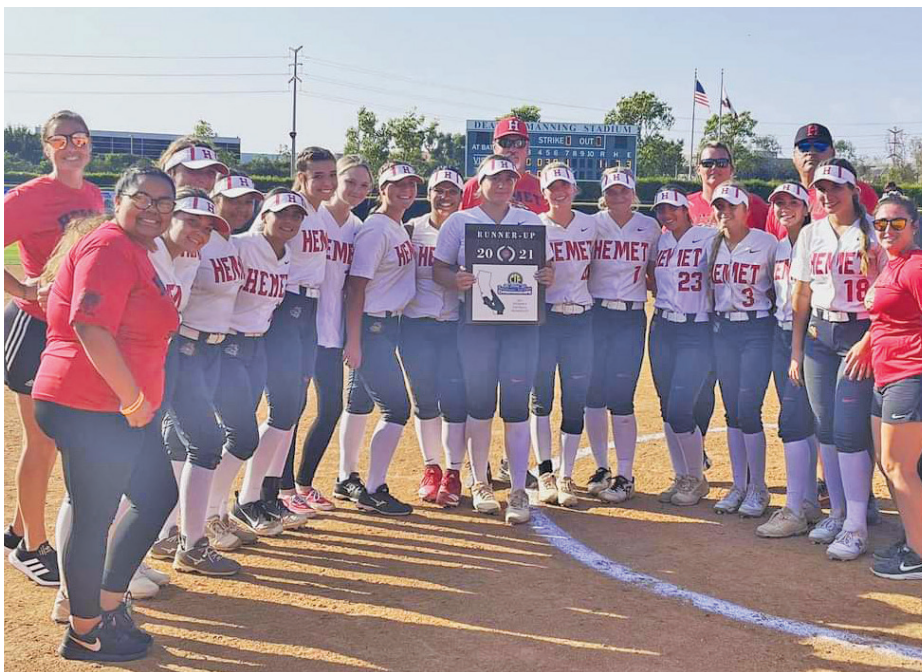
Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) students staged a protest regarding allegations of sexual assault, predatory behavior and racism before the end of the 2020/21 school year. The list of demands and allegations presented in the letter was read at the protest. According to Jordan, about 120 students participated in the protest outside of the academic administration building on campus. The student demands letter had been published on social media.

The newspaper published the story about the protest and the letter April 22.

"We, in partnership with an outside law firm, are looking into any clear complaints of misconduct that have been raised," Jordan wrote. "We cannot share specific details of those investigations at this time, but we will follow our established procedures for handling these matters."

"We cannot reveal the name of the law firm at this time. We can confirm, however, that it is a highly respected outside law firm experienced in precisely handling these types of situations whose primary goal is to use impartial fact-finding to learn the objective truth."

"Hiring an outside law firm to manage this process is the surest way possible to extend our support to anyone who comes forward, as well as to anyone who has been accused — to ensure the facts come to light."

IWD selects Steve Olson
to fill board vacancy

Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors met last week to select a replacement for the board vacancy left by Dave Hunt. General Manager Leo Havener discussed various items in his report and the board is reviewing its legal counsel.

Vacancy filled

Two Idyllwild Water District area residents, Rachel Teegarden and Steve Olson, applied to fill the board vacancy left by Dave Hunt, who resigned before the last meeting.

"Thank you for the opportunity to serve my community that I love so much," wrote Hunt in his resignation letter. "It has been a privilege and honor to volunteer my time. Over the past three years, I have tried my very best to help improve our water district by making informed decisions and suggesting ideas for continuous improvement. Along that bumpy path, I have continually felt like I was fighting a headwind and swimming against the current. IWD's dismal response to the pandemic is just one example of that! So it is with a heavy heart, frustrated mind and weary soul that I am letting you know I am resigning from the Board of Directors effective immediately. I am sure that the Board will have no problem finding a replacement that will vote with the majority to keep the status quo and not think 'outside the box' for positive change. I wish you all the very best in protecting our precious water supply for our beautiful community in the difficult times ahead."

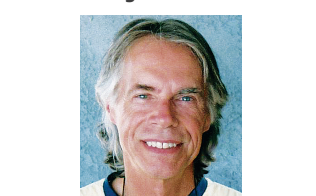
The board, in a 4-0 vote, selected Olson. "I wouldn't have recruited Steve [Olson] if I had known you were applying," Board President Dr. Charles Schelly told Teegarden.

Olson, who is a certified public accountant, was the "former chief accounting officer of a publicly traded company and understands the responsibilities associated with being a member of a board of directors. Those responsibilities include making decisions about IWD business in good faith, with integrity and reasonable care and in IWD and its customer's best interests. Ethical, independent behavior are hallmarks of being a certified public accountant."

Teegarden wrote in her letter to the board she has been a resident since 1999 and has been employed by Idyllwild Arts Academy (2000 to 2004, 2008 to 2016). She began working at Idyllwild Fire Protection District, where she is currently employed, as its administrative assistant in 2016. Her goals include ensuring that residents like her have a voice "and are fully informed about our local water agency, ensuring a safe and robust water supply, and ultimately keeping end user costs under control." In her role at IFFPD, she has obtained "knowledge of the Brown Act, CalPERS and the California Special Districts Association."

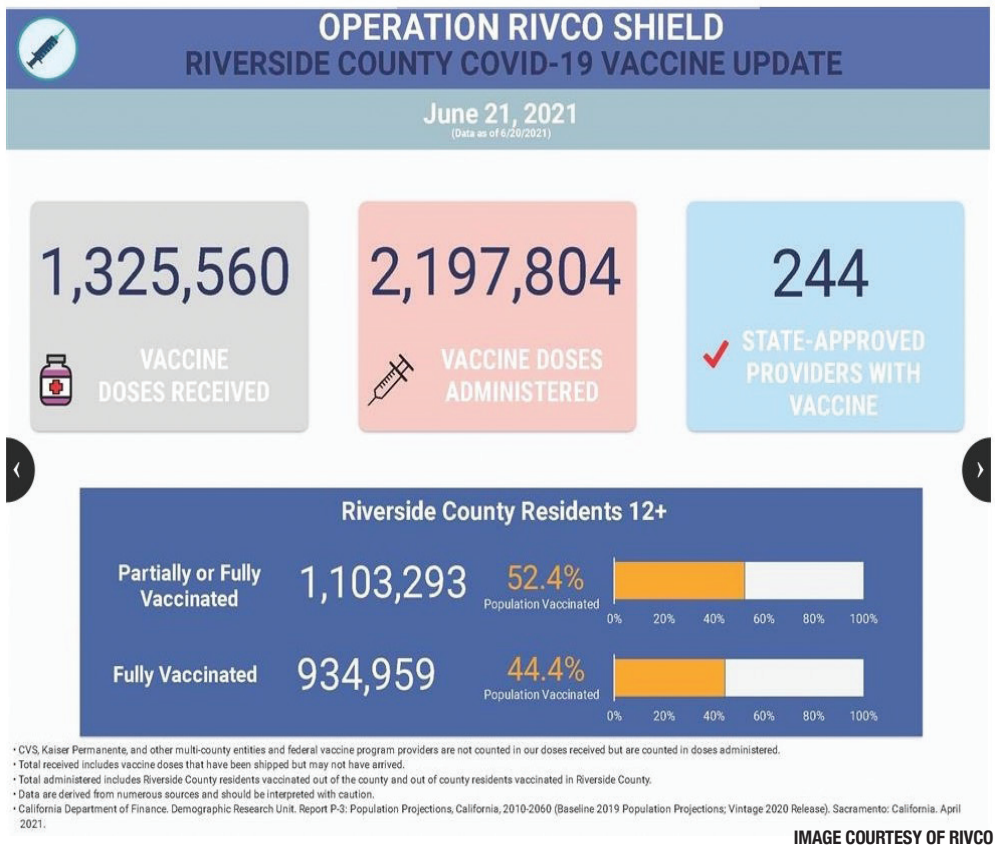

PCWD adopts FY 2021/22 budget and standby assessment fee

The Pine Cove Water District Board of Directors passed the FY 2021/22 budget in a 4-0 vote at its June meeting. Director Rose Venard was absent. Adjustments were made from the proposed budget that was presented at the May meeting.

Directors Venard and Lou Padula, who were absent from the May meeting, met with General Manager Jerry Holldbber to discuss the budget between the May and June meetings.

Holldbber increased the training budget from \$1,000 to \$3,000 for the employees.

He decreased the main line replacement from \$30,000 to \$28,000. Holldbber increased the improvement reserves from \$200,000 to \$275,000, leaving the total reserves at \$550,000. The approved budget is included with this story.

Public hearing

The standby assessment fee passed as presented in a 4-0 vote. It is a \$30 fee for all unimproved lots.

Operations report

Holldbber noted that May water production was less than last year. In May 2020, the district produced 3,479,070 gallons and it produced 2,964,340 gallons this May.

The district did report a 10% water loss, contributing that to a leak. Static well 10 is up a foot and “shows water is still running through the ground at Well 10,” according to Holldbber.

District vehicles are all serviced.

Fire abatement at the facilities is ongoing and “spring cleaning of all the facilities continues.” The district started tying over services at Laurel Trail.

Holldbber said the district is in Stage 1 water conservation and could go to Stage 2 at any time. The price of water would not change.

Holldbber explained Stage 1 is voluntary compliance and that the district emphasizes conservation and offers rebate programs.

Water usage went up due to COVID-19 because people were home. Holldbber reported to the board that the wells are still doing well and the district is not going to Stage 2 at this point but that he doesn’t want to wait until the tanks are half full to go into Stage 2. Stage 2 is mandatory compliance.

Next board meeting

Board President Robert Hewitt notified the board a quorum would not be reached to hold a meeting next month. The district’s next Board of Director’s meeting is Aug. 11 and, as of now, will be held via Zoom.

Life Tribute

Patricia (Paddy) Wilson

January 23, 1949 - April 5, 2021

“She was the center of our little family” was the way granddaughter Danielle (Dani) Appleby described her Grandma Pat Wilson.

Paddy was born an Irish girl with red hair and blue eyes in coal country Pike County, Kentucky to Willard Charles and Julia Finnegan. She came to California with her mom and siblings at a young age.


Paddy was a mother to two daughters Michelle and Sandy and stepchildren Eddie and Maija Sanders. She was a second mom to Dani because Dani’s mom, Michelle, worked so much. Dani remembers Grandma making endless amounts of time to read and paint with her and taught her to be kind to all people. She also made Dani eat her veggies and encouraged her church attendance.

Paddy liked Chanel No. 5, lavender and vanilla, the color green and all types of music. She was especially fond of her dog Miss Boo Boo.

They took her to doctor’s appointments and helped with her homework.

Patricia Wilson was predeceased by her parents, her husband Ed Sanders and her daughter Michelle Giordani. Left to cherish her memory are her husband John Wilson; daughter Sandy (Jeremy) French and grandson Austin; stepson Eddie (Joy) Sanders and granddaughter Angela; stepdaughter Maija Sanders and daughter Veronica and her granddaughter Danielle Appleby (Cory) and great-grandsons Emery and Renlee Appleby.

A memorial was held Father’s Day at Lake Hemet.

General manager’s report

The district reported a 4% water loss for May. May’s revenues were \$204,988 and expenses were \$155,054.

The feasibility study for the wastewater treatment plant will be done this month.

Havener presented the cost for the various components of the Elk Lane Pipeline Project. Relining the existing pipeline is \$300,000. Relocating the existing pipeline is \$177,500 for the construction. Additional costs for relocating the pipeline is \$50,000 and includes permits and inspection fees, engineering and land surveys, easement and other. The approximate cost to relocating the existing pipeline is \$227,500 for the construction.

The district canceled its cleaning service for uniforms and purchased a washer and dryer. “Staff has been displeased with the cleaning service we have had for years,” said Havener.

The district is in search of seasonal employees.

Legal counsel

The board reviewed its legal counsel. Board Vice President Peter Szabadi told the newspaper the district received submittals from seven firms. The board will be reviewing them and holding a meeting in two weeks to discuss them and determine what the district will do.

County park campfires

For the past 14 months our top priority in life shifted 360 degrees. We were called to focus on personal, family and community health due to COVID-19. Most other concerns were put on hold. As life is settling into a new normal where we can pick up on issues that were in a to-do file, I found the letter to the editor on campfires in the TC, week June 17, 2021, very welcoming. I, too, became extremely concerned about the use of wood burning campfires in our county park campground shortly after Idyllwild’s 2018 Cranston Fire that came close to destroying our dear village. I couldn’t quite wrap my mind around how the County of Riverside could approve such ordinances allowing the use of wood firepits in such a volatile environment anytime of the year. And months after the Cranston Fire, I was appalled to see additional firepits and picnic tables installed merely feet away from the oldest and most sacred trees in

Idyllwild — where Native American tribes surrounded these trees holding council meetings. I found it unfathomable! I began my inquiry for answers and rationale with the county park employees who could not provide me with answers to my concerns. I made inquiries with homeowners on lower Pine Crest Avenue whose homes back up to the park. I spoke with residents of Royal Pines Trailer Park whose homes about the park. I made a trip over to our fire department inquiring of the department’s concern for the wood firepits great fire hazard to our community. I made several phone calls to Riverside County seeking the appropriate liaison to have a conversation, to no avail, after numerous phone transfers. Other concerned residents have also not been able to get county officials’ affirmative attention for this huge issue. Fast forward to today as we are experiencing extremely high temperature changes on our mountain top and summer is just beginning. We are at an even higher risk for forest fires. We haven’t had a rainfall

in many months and our Earth is parched, dry as a bone. As a result, I join the sentiments of the letter written by Eric Adams urging our officials to ban wood fires in our county park as mandated by the local U.S. Forest Service and state park. Continued from A4 For the past year, I have noticed more piles of dog poop. Some put the poop in a bag, then leave the bag! Also, careless smokers leave their cigarette butts on the ground. They might start a fire that could destroy our homes and town. I go out every couple of weeks and fill bags full of dog poop, cigarette butts and other trash. If I understand the regulations correctly, one short-term rental can have as many as 16 guests, provided there is sufficient off-street parking and living space on the property. The working people who rent up here could always find a way to get to work, some even walk if the roads are too bad to drive. It saddens me to think that those of us who love and cherish Idyllwild, and the surrounding area, will be overwhelmed by disrespectful people who feel they are entitled, and so they can come up here and destroy the personality of this precious place.

Continued from A1 spurred into action by Town Crier founders Betty and Ernie Maxwell. “On Dec. 5, 1946, all of Idyllwild’s businesses closed, and the entire business community and many residents came together as a volunteer construction crew to pour Town Hall’s foundation,” said Yost. “Thereafter, a volunteer crew led by local grocer Harold Sanborn worked every Friday for months to build the two-story, 4,000-square-foot building, complete with a beautiful large stone fireplace and chimney.” The first dedication occurred July 10, 1947. Town Hall was operated by various organizations over the years, the last being the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber’s dissolution several years ago meant the property reverted back to the Johnson family, who put it up for sale. Tom Hawthorne, and Loie and Dave Butterfield purchased Town Hall on Aug. 16, 2019, “with the intention of renovating the property and thereafter donating it to ICC to operate for the benefit of the mountain communities,” said Yost. That donation occurred in July 31, 2020.

The property needed major maintenance and upgrades after 72 years of continuous use, including asbestos removal, and bats and other wildlife living in the attic. Following Washington’s and Van Wagenen’s speeches, Yost commented that the county donated new chairs on which guests were sitting and new tables in storage. Hawthorne, 92, spoke after his daughter, ICC board member Chris Perrault, introduced him and gave a history of her family’s involvement in Idyllwild beginning in 1954 when her father’s church purchased property that became Buckhorn Camp. Though Loie could not be present, Dave Butterfield spoke about what it meant to him to see Town Hall, a “community house,” renovated. He read a letter Shane Stewart, renovation manager, wrote to him describing the building’s issues, including substandard electrical, heating and plumbing; worn-out flooring, back decking and cedar shingle siding; non-American Disabilities Act compliance; and cracked and crumbling parking and walkways. “But it has really good bones,” Butterfield said Stewart told him. “Many of our children have grown up in this building,” said Butterfield. He especially felt the basement, where many children attend afterschool and summer programs, was uninviting. Along with other improvements, downstairs now has windows instead of a dungeon look. The Butterfields and Hawthorne received standing ovations. “All work was done by local Hill vendors, including Terry Griner and his crews at Griner Construction, Keith Smith of Harold K. Smith Excavating and Materials, Steve Holldber of Idyllwild Heating and Cooling,

and Larry Donahoo of Village Hardware, to name just a few,” said Yost. “Additionally, Idyllwild Gardens (owned and operated by Eva and Kenny Gioeli) kindly donated many of the plants and the watering system to refresh the front garden.” She also said, “In this renovation, materials were used that are made to stand the test of time, including mountain weather. So long as Town Hall is properly cared for — which it will be by ICC — it should last for generations to come. Since 1947, Town Hall has been a staple in Idyllwild’s history, and with proper care and maintenance, it should continue to be a staple well into its future.” Guests then self-toured the building. Town Hall Director Will Steichen pointed out details, including that the original bit used for the tongue-and-groove that remains was found and put to use for new tongue-and-groove throughout. An open house for the entire community is scheduled for Saturday, July 31 with details to follow in the Town Crier. Renovation features:

- Fully upgraded electrical and plumbing

- New main floor restroom
- New under-stage storage area
- New larger double-door entrance foyer
- ADA-compliant inside and outside

Idyllwild Summer Concert Series is back!

Longtime Idyllwild resident and musician Ken Dahleen will open the 2021 season of the Idyllwild Summer Concert Series (ISCS) July 8.

As per a press release issued by Dahleen, concerts are scheduled for eight Thursdays in July and August from 6:15 to 8:30 p.m. and will be held at the Butterfield Amphitheater located at 54201 Ridgeview Dr. in Idyllwild.

He has owned property in the community since 1975. Marshall Smith previously reported, Dahleen and his board of directors have been providing free summer concerts since 2000 when Pete Capparelli and Vic Sirkin donated what is now the Village Centre shopping mall property for the first concert season. “We started with four concerts that year,” said Dahleen. “For our first concert we had about 200 people and over that summer

the number of attendees grew. We knew then, people were interested,” as quoted by Smith for the Town Crier, June 25, 2013.

According to an Aug. 6, 2013 Town Crier article by JP Crumrine, “In 2000, Ken met with some local people and secured funding to offer a summer concert series. Big Band highlighted the first year of the ISCS, when only four concerts were performed.”

The Big Band sound was welcomed by Idyllwild residents and the free concerts were well attended. The ISCS will be hosted at the Butterfield Amphitheater. With the state now out of full lock down from COVID-19, the summer concert series is sure to be a welcome reprieve from the isolation many have endured.

In addition to producing this festival, Dahleen has played saxophone professionally for decades, with his own Big Band, other bands throughout the area, and in

concerts and jazz ensembles.

On tap for this summer are Sherry Williams Quintet, Lisa and the Country Gents, Jennifer Singer (The Las Vegas show), The Topics, U.S. Marine Corps Band, The Big Band Staff, The Ghost Notes and Blue Breeze Band. ISCS is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, raising money as it goes. Fundraising is always a challenge, but the nonprofit has managed over the years to meet the goal by the end of each series.

This year’s budget is \$34,575. No funds had been raised as of press time.

Sponsorships and donations are a vital component to keeping this legacy going. Each year, Dahleen and board begin the season with insufficient cash to fund the series. They depend on the generosity of concert patrons to make up the budget deficit. Contributions to help fund the series can be sent to P.O. Box 1542, Idyllwild, CA 92549.

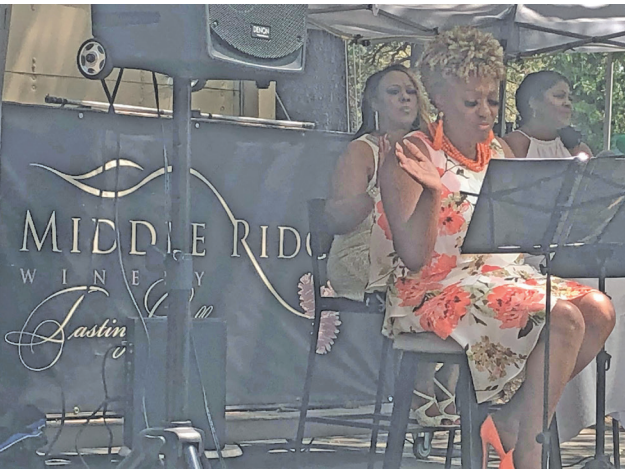
