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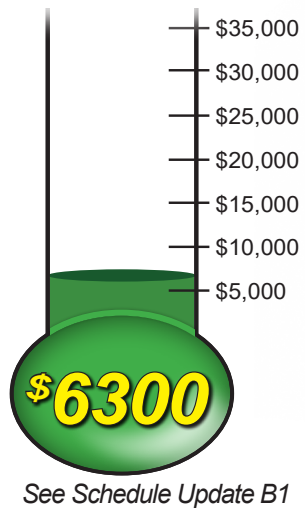

House fire on Sylvan Way Sunday

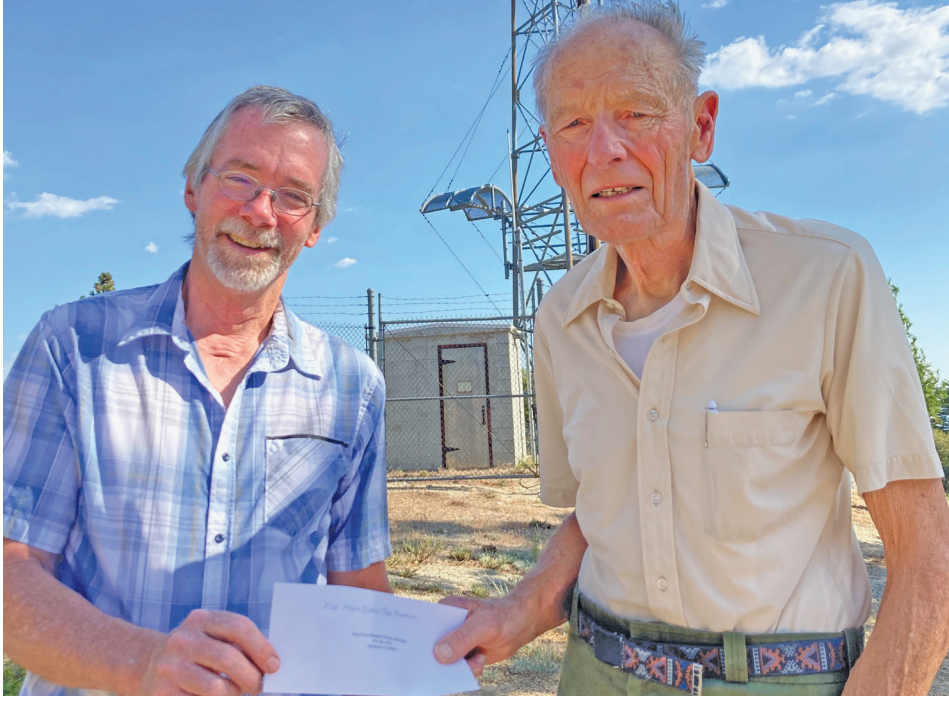
A structure fire on Sylvan Way in Pine Cove Sunday was initially reported as a vegetation fire. The fire was reported about 12:15 p.m.

Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department Station 23 was first on scene. A firefighter told the newspaper they could see the flames from the engine on the way to the scene once they reached Pine Cove Market and when they arrived on scene the flames were above the trees.

Before fire personnel arrived on scene, neighbors came out with hoses after hearing up to six explosions. Cheryl Rice was one of those neighbors. See *Sylvan Fire*, page A6

Forest fire restrictions increased

Officials with the San Bernardino National Forest raised fire restrictions June 23 due to the danger from current and anticipated worsening conditions, such as drying vegetation and continued hot temperatures. The restrictions prohibit the following:

- Campfires and wood/charcoal barbecues at unhosted campgrounds and picnic areas
- Discharging of a firearm
- Smoking
- Operating an internal combustion engine off paved, gravel or dirt National Forest System roads and trails
- Welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame

Gas-powered stoves and fire rings with a fuel shut-off will be allowed, including when dispersed camping, if used with a free California Campfire Permit, which can be obtained online.

FVWD director Jim Gates resigns, board passes FY 2021/22 budget

Fern Valley Water District (FVWD) Director Jim Gates verbally resigned from the board Tuesday, June 15 but submitted a letter of resignation June 27. He resigned for personal reasons. The district is still waiting to find out from the county how this will impact the August elections and what steps will need to be taken. Gates was up for election but resigned after the filing period.

The board passed its FY 2021/22 budget, approved the asphalt bid for the pipeline replacement project, discussed a proposal for general counsel services for Idyllwild Water District with Best, Best & Krieger (FVWD's legal counsel) and received an election update.

FY 2021/22 budget
The budget will put the reserves at over \$1 million, income (water sales and installation: \$950,000, interest on reserves: \$6,000, tax income: \$750,000 and SM assessment charge: \$22,550) at \$1,728,550 and expenses (operating: \$1,081,929, capital: \$67,600, RECDs debt service: \$19,600) at \$1,169,129. The final emergency pipeline replacement project payments are coming out of the reserves. The final budget is included with the story.

Asphalt work
The asphalt work for the emergency pipeline replacement project will cost the district \$136,800 for a complete grind and overlay. El-Co Contractors, Inc. will be performing the work. General Manager Victor Jimenez told the board that was the best option due to the road damage from the water leak. The \$108,000 for the grind and overlay of the entire project area was budgeted but another \$28,800 will be coming "from the reserves to perform a complete overlay." See *FVWD*, page A5

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE: Last county health COVID-19 case update was June 22

The last COVID-19 update from Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS) was June 22. The county continues to update the numbers regarding the COVID-19 shot. As of June 28, 45.8% of the county’s population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

As of press time on June 22 (June 21 data), Riverside

County had 301,668 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,627 deaths related to COVID-19 and 296,367 people had recovered. Forty individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, seven were in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate was 1.1%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 1.5. The county was reporting that 44.4% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

The newspaper had to go to press prior to the June 22 update. Those numbers are as follows.

The area of Idyllwild-Pine Cove had a total of 118 reported COVID-19 cases since the outbreak and two deaths reported. One hundred and fifteen of the 118 people had recovered.

As of June 22, Riverside County had 301,799 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,627 deaths related to COVID-19 and 296,375 people had recovered. Thirty-nine individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, seven were in the ICU. The county’s positivity

rate was 1.1%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 1.5.

As of press time on June 15, Riverside County had 301,329 confirmed COVID-19 cases, 4,620 deaths related to COVID-19 and 296,001 people had recovered. Thirty-three individuals were being hospitalized, and of those, nine were in the ICU. The county’s positivity rate was 1.2%. The current adjusted case rate per 100,000 was 1.6. The county was reporting that 42.6% of its population had received the full dose of the COVID-19 shot.

As of June 22, 3,235,470 total tests had been given for COVID-19 in Riverside County, according to RUHS. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Riverside County has an estimated population of 2.47 million.

Lydia ‘Dia’ Abrams’ son speaks out

David Gottfredson, of News 8, interviewed Clinton Abrams, 31-year-old son of Lydia “Dia” Abrams, a few weeks ago.

“She woke up early, made cinnamon rolls and delivered them to her good neighbor,” Clinton says of his mother the day she went missing. He drove up Sunday night (the day after Abrams went missing) and met Abrams’ self-proclaimed fiancé Keith Harper for the first time.

“He was very shift, reluctantly speaking,” Clinton said. “He kept saying he had meetings and couldn’t be there. He left the following morning.”

Clinton also said, “It’s unsettling to me that on the morning that the search and rescue team arrived and the homicide unit arrived, Harper was not there. He fled.”

“It has been the most absolute, nightmarish, difficult, soul-draining experience of our entire lives. There’s no question about that.” Clinton said that Abrams always said the ranch was for the kids when talking about how Harper is the current trustee of the ranch. Clinton and his sister, Crisara, are challenging that. “I believe it was ill gotten and with malintention and my concerns are her stuff is being pilfered and taken and stolen,” Clinton said.

When asked about Harper being Abrams’ fiancé, Clinton responded, “That’s definitely not the case. I know my mother. She was not engaged. She would not remarry.”

“I want people to know that she was the kindest, gentlest, soft-hearted person that you can imagine,” Clinton told News 8 of his mother. “She was always giving of herself. She was a lover of animals. She was always taking in any animal or anybody or anything that really needed help.”

Clinton said in the segment, “I believe she was murdered and we need to find her for her soul to rest in peace.” Gottfredson said Clinton agreed to do the interview a year after she went missing because he believes the case was stalled and someone has information that can help.

Gottfredson said Harper is still living on the ranch and acting as trustee and that he reached out to Harper for comment but did not hear back.

Five people, including Abrams, to go missing in and around the Idyllwild area remain missing. The other four are David O’Sullivan, Roy Prifogle, Melissa Lane and Diana Perez Gonzalez.

O’Sullivan, who was last seen at the Idyllwild Inn April 7, 2017, was 25 years old when he went missing.

The Fowler-O’Sullivan Foundation (FOF) website writes of O’Sullivan, “David [O’Sullivan] was thru-hiking NOBO on the Pacific Crest Trail [PCT] from Mexico to Canada. On April 6, 2017 he sent an email to his family from an Idyllwild library. O’Sullivan, who is from Ireland, intended to hike north into the San Jacinto Mountains the next day. He has not been seen since. There are several trails he could have taken to access the PCT from Idyllwild. We do not know which trail David took.”

Another search of the area where Prifogle went missing was conducted Sunday, April 18. “A search was completed on Sunday in the area where it was believed Roy [Prifogle] was last near,” the Riverside County Sheriff’s Department (RCSD) media information bureau wrote in an email response. “No evidence and or items were located during the search.” Before April 18, multiple searches had been conducted.

Prifogle was reported missing after going on a hike in the Pine Cove area Wednesday, March 4, 2020. He left home at about 1 p.m. and was last seen at the Pine Cove Market at 6:30 p.m. the same day. He was last seen wearing a red backpack and jeans.

“I wish we would get some kind of word about her. It’s nerve-racking. They [RCSD] have interviewed me once when she was reported missing and haven’t talked to me since. I was the last one to see her. You would think they’d want to go over it with me again.”

According to Lamont in December, the RCSD last searched in early September with cadaver dogs on Black Mountain Trail, north of Pine Cove, where Lane was last seen. The search came back with nothing.

Abrams was 65 years old at the time she went missing. She is 5’ 5” tall, 130 pounds with blonde hair and blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a black and turquoise jacket, yellow shirt and blue jeans.

On June 6, 2020, Abrams was last seen by Harper at her ranch in Apple Canyon (between Mountain Center and Garner Valley). Since the initial search efforts more than a year ago, the RCSD has not provided new information or updates regarding her disappearance.

Gottfredson previously reported that the San Juan County Sheriff in New Mexico obtained a search warrant and deputies impounded the RV Harper drove to New Mexico taking evidence from inside. However, the RCSD has not provided any persons of interest or suspects regarding Abrams or any of the other missing people.

Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit conducted searches on Abrams’ property before assigning the case to detectives.

The most recent woman to go missing from the Hemet/San Jacinto area is Gonzalez who was reported missing Dec. 11 and 27 years old at the time she went missing. According to family, Gonzalez visited the Idyllwild area regularly. She was last seen by her boyfriend.

Christy Rojas, Gonzalez’s sister, and her family are struggling with her sister missing.

Rojas said, “We’ve been terribly sad. We think about her every day and have dreams of her, waiting for any sign or a miracle because we miss her and love her a lot. But the most important, her baby needs her. We can see the sadness in her eyes. Although she can’t speak, we know she misses her mom.” Gonzalez was pregnant when she went missing.

IFPD board talks minutes, siren and transparency

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) Board of Commissioners met last week at its normal time: the fourth Tuesday of the month at 3 p.m. The frequency of meetings and the time has been brought up multiple times in the past as an agenda item.

The district presented Sturgeon Electric with a plaque for donating the emergency siren pole. The company also mounted the pole and the siren at no cost to the district. Both were done for the district in honor of Ross Bowlin, a power lineman for Sturgeon Electric, who was working in town and fell 30 feet from a platform July 6, 2020.

“Me and my crew of four guys and three other crews — a total of about 20 guys — were up here to reconductor a bunch of wire at the end of Tollgate,” Bowlin said.

One of the main things they are doing is changing out the overhead conductors in the area to an insulated aerial conductor which helps prevent fires. On July 6, he was replacing the crossarms that go horizontally across the pole and support the conductors with composite crossarms that won’t catch fire.

Bowlin said when he spoke at the district’s March meeting that was previously reported: “So, that’s my little accident. I can tell you guys from talking to other people and everyone else the decisions that were made that day on July 6 were the reason that I got to be there for my son’s 11th birthday. So, he read to me every night when I was in Desert Regional on the phone and I never said a word back to him. So, being able to be there with him now to get to read together is amazing. My wife and I celebrated our 10-year anniversary in November.”

Fire in Pinyon wildland

The Scenic Fire, a vegetation fire in Pinyon Pines, was reported about 4 p.m. Friday, June 25. The U.S. Forest Service (USFS) - San Bernardino National Forest and Cal Fire responded with ground and air resources.

USFS initially reported it as a 2-acre fire “in an extremely remote location on Sheep Mountain within the Santa Rosa Wilderness on Bureau of Land Management Land” and was in “light to medium fuels with slow rate of spread.”

Lisa Cox, a public information officer with USFS, told the newspaper shortly after the fire was reported Friday that a lot of air resources were initially used because the ground crew was still hiking in due to the location being inaccessible to engines.

At 6:45 p.m. Friday, the fire was holding at 3 acres with 20% containment. The agency tweeted, “The forward rate of spread was stopped at approximately 5:45 p.m.”

At 1:55 p.m. June 26, the agency tweeted, “After ground-truthing the perimeter, the fire is now 16 acres and at 45% containment.

“One hand and one engine crew will continue work today with a helicopter for water drops on interior heat and smoke.”

The fire was fully contained by Monday morning.

Cox told the newspaper Monday USFS thinks the cause of the fire is “most likely due to lightning strike hold over, just from the lightning activity that the incident commander was looking at.” Cox also said, “However, we did not get an investigator on it.”

mont), Indian Fire (Anza) and Mile Post Fire (Hoopa). According to Chief Mark LaMont’s report, the district has billed \$1,200,216.67 in mutual aid. It has received \$914,685.25 in reimbursement so far.

Round one of annual abatement inspections led to 551 failed properties. The district expects to have the second inspection completed by June 30.

Also included in the chief’s report is a breakdown of mileage per district vehicle to date with the cost to replace the vehicle (included with CIP and year). Grants awarded and trainings are also listed.

Life Tribute Margaret Wellman Jaenke 1924 to 2021

Margaret Wellman Jaenke passed away on Wednesday, June 2 at her home in Mountain Center, California. Margaret lived a very full life up until her passing at the age of 96.

Margaret was born on July 31, 1924, in Wineville, California, to parents James F. Wellman and Elma Grace Hall Wellman. Margaret was the sixth generation of her family to be born in California. Margaret’s great grandparents, Manual and Dolores Garduna Arnaiz, homesteaded in Kenworthy Valley in the 1800s. Her third great-grandfather, Jose Maximo Simon Valenzuela, was born at the San Diego Mission in 1791.

Margaret’s elementary schooling was at the local schools including Little Red School House in Anza (the original Hamilton School), Hamilton School, Kenworthy Indian Emergency School and Idyllwild School. She graduated eighth grade at Hamilton School in 1938 and from Hemet High School in 1942.

Margaret’s joy was being a cattle rancher’s daughter and she was happy to spend as much time as possible horseback riding, roping and branding the cattle. Margaret trained a young cow to be ridden and would sometimes ride the cow the 3 miles to get the mail at the post office! Nothing pleased Margaret more than to hear her dad say, “You are a better hand than most men!”

World War patriotism nudged Margaret into joining the war effort as a radio mechanic at Norton Air Force Base in San Bernardino and it was there that she met her future husband Adrian Jaenke. After their marriage, Adrian and Margaret went on to have seven children. The children kept Margaret very busy, as she was dedicated to teaching her children to horseback ride, sew, cook and to play musical instruments. Along with being a mother and a full-time homemaker, she was also a 4-H club leader and a PTA member.

After raising her children, Margaret focused on her pursuit of education and being an educator. She first earned an associate of arts in 1971 from San Bernardino Valley College followed by a bachelor of arts in anthropology and liberal arts in 1976 from California State College, San Bernardino. In 1985, Margaret received a master’s of education from Azusa Pacific University. After obtaining her teaching credential, she taught at Hamilton School until her retirement in 1995. Margaret was a dedicated and passionate teacher and brought much local historical information to her students.

After retirement, Margaret was kept very busy as the founder of the Hamilton Museum & Ranch Foundation, a museum which shares the history of Anza and the local mountain area. She wrote three books about the local history “In The Olden Day Revisited,” “Looking Back, Anza and Garner Valley” and “Images of America, Around Anza Valley.”

Margaret spent her retirement years with her grandchildren and great-grandchildren and gardening, wood carving, traveling and was an avid life-long learner

Margaret is survived by her seven children Art Jaenke (Irene), Margaret Teague (Dennis), Pauline Condrick (Daniel), Raini Cunningham (Bret), Adriana Taylor (Ron), Gini Spencer and Ruth Roman and her 13 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

No Vacancy: How a shortage of mental health beds keeps kids trapped inside ERs

One evening in late March, a mom called 911. Her daughter, she said, was threatening to kill herself. EMTs arrived at the home north of Boston, helped calm the 13-year-old, and took her to an emergency room.

Melinda, like a growing number of children (<https://www.kff.org/coronavirus-covid-19/issue-brief/mental-health-and-substance-use-considerations-among-children-during-the-covid-19-pandemic/>:text=Young%20children,-During%20the%20pandemic&text=During%20the%20pandemic,%20parents%20with,22%)%20(Figure%203)). during the covid-19 pandemic, had become increasingly anxious and depressed as she spent more time away from in-person contact at school, church and her singing lessons.

KHN and NPR have agreed to use only the first names of this teenager and her mother, Pam, to avoid having this story trail the family online. Right now in Massachusetts and in many parts of the U.S. (<https://www.nytimes.com/2021/02/17/well/mind/therapy-appointments-shortages-pandemic.html>) and the world (<https://www.who.int/news/item/05-10-2020-covid-19-disrupting-mental-health-services-in-most-countries-who-survey>), demand for mental health care overwhelms supply, creating bottlenecks like Melinda's 17-day saga.

Emergency rooms are not typically places you check in for the night. If you break an arm, it gets set, and you leave. If you have a heart attack, you won't wait long for a hospital bed. But sometimes if your brain is not well, and you end up in an ER, there's a good chance you will get stuck there. Parents and advocates for kids' mental health say that the ER can't provide appropriate care and that the warehousing of kids in crisis can become an emergency itself.

What's known as emergency room boarding (<https://www.healthaffairs.org/doi/abs/10.1377/hlthaff.2009.0336?journalCode=hlthaff>) of psychiatric patients has risen between 200% and 400% monthly in Massachusetts during the pandemic. The CDC says emergency room visits after suicide attempts among teen girls were up 51% earlier this year (https://www.cdc.gov/mmwr/volumes/70/wr/mm7024e1.htm?s_cid=mm7024e1_e&ACSTrackingID=USCDC_921-DM59253&ACSTrackingLabel=MMWR%20Early%20Release%20-%20Vol.1%2070%2C%20June%2011%2C%202021&deliveryName=USCDC_921-DM59253) as compared with 2019. There are no current nationwide mental health boarding numbers.

"This is really unlike anything we've ever seen before, and it doesn't show any signs of abating," said Lisa Lambert (<https://ppal.net/staff/>), executive director of Parent/Professional Advocacy League, which pushes for more mental health care for children.

Melinda spent her first 10 days in a hospital lecture hall with a dozen other children, on gurneys, separated by curtains because the emergency room had run out of space. At one point, Melinda, who was overwhelmed, tried to escape, was restrained, injected with drugs to calm her and moved to a small, windowless room.

Day 12: Cameras track her movements

I met Melinda in early April, on her 12th day in the ER. Doctors were keeping her there because they were concerned she would harm herself if she left. Many parents report spending weeks with their children in hospital hallways or overflow rooms, in various states of distress, because hospital psychiatric units are full. While demand is up, supply is down. Covid precautions turned double rooms into singles or psych units into covid units. While those precautions are beginning to ease, demand for beds is not.

Inside her small room, Melinda was disturbed by cameras that tracked her movement, and security guards in the hallways who were there, in part, for her safety.

"It's kinda like prison," she said. "It feels like I'm desperate for help."

"Desperate" is a word both Melinda and Pam use often to describe the prolonged wait for care in a place that feels alien.

"We occasionally hear screaming, yelling, monitors beeping," said Pam. "Even as the parent — it's very scary."

But this experience is not new. This was Melinda's fourth trip to a hospital emergency room since late November. Pam said Melinda spiraled downward after a falling out with a close family member last summer. She has therapists, but some of them changed during the pandemic, the visits were virtual, and she hasn't made good connections between crises.

"Each time, it's the same routine," Pam said. Melinda is rushed to an ER, where she waits. She's admitted to a psych hospital for a week to 10 days and goes home. "It's not enough time."

Pam said each facility has suggested a different diagnosis and adjusted Melinda's medication.

"We've never really gotten a good, true diagnosis as to what's going on with her," Pam said. "She's out of control; she feels out of control in her own skin."

Melinda waited six months for a neuropsychiatric exam to help clarify what she needs. She finally had the exam in May, after being discharged from the psychiatric hospital, but still doesn't have the results. Some psychiatrists say observing a patient's behavior is often a better way to reach a diagnosis.

Lambert, the mental health advocate, said there are delays for every type of psychiatric care — both residential and outpatient.

"We've heard of waits as long as five weeks or more for outpatient therapy," Lambert said. "If your child is saying they don't want to live or don't want to ever get out of bed again, you don't want to wait five weeks."

Day 13: 'The longer she's here, the more she's going to decline.'

As her stay dragged on, Melinda bounced from manic highs to deep emotional lows. The emergency room is a holding area; it isn't set up to offer treatment or psychiatric therapy.

On this day Melinda was agitated.

"I just really want to get out of here," she said in an audio diary she was keeping at the time for this story. "I feel kind of helpless. I miss my pets and my bed and real food." She'd had a panic attack the night before and had to be sedated. Her mom, Pam, wasn't there.

"The longer she's here, the more she's going to decline," Pam recorded in her own audio diary. "She has self-harmed three times since she's been here."

The hospital and its parent network, Beth Israel Lahey Health, declined requests to speak about Melinda's care. But Dr. Nalan Ward, the network's chief medical officer for behavioral health services, hosts a daily call to discuss the best place for inpatient psychiatric treatment for each patient. Some may have unique medical or insurance constraints, she said. Many insurers require prior approval before they'll agree to pay for a placement, and that, too, can add delays.

"It takes a case-by-case approach," said Ward. "It's really hands-on."

Day 14: Increasingly isolated from school and friends

For Melinda, the issue keeping her from moving out of the ER and into an effective treatment program could have been her behavior. Pam was told her daughter may be harder to place than children who don't act out. Hospitals equipped to provide inpatient mental health care say they look for patients who will be a good fit for their programs and participants. Melinda's chart included the attempted escape as well as some fights while she was housed in the lecture hall.

"She's having behaviors because she has a mental illness, which they're supposed to help her with," Pam said, "but yet they're saying no to her because she's having behaviors."

Secluding Melinda in the ER didn't help, Pam said. "She's, at times, unrecognizable to me. She just is so sure that she's never going to get better."

Melinda described feeling increasingly isolated. She lost touch with friends and most family members. She'd stopped doing schoolwork weeks earlier. The noise and commotion of a 24/7 ER was getting to Melinda.

"I'm not sleeping well," she noted in her diary. "It's tough here. I keep waking up in the middle of the night."

Day 15: Mom retreats to her car to cry

Boarding is difficult for parents as well. Pam works two jobs, but she visited Melinda every day, bringing a change of clothes, a new book or something special to eat.

"Some days I sit and cry before I get out of the car,

just to get it out of my system, so I don't cry in front of her," Pam said in her diary entry that day.

Some hospitals say they can't afford to care for patients with acute mental health problems because insurance reimbursements don't cover costs. Massachusetts is spending \$40 million this year on financial incentives to create more inpatient psychiatric care. But emergency rooms are still flooded with psychiatric patients who are in limbo, boarding there.

Day 16: 'I wish someone would just understand me.'

"I never thought we'd be here this long," said Pam. At the nurses' station, Pam was told it could be two more weeks before there would be an opening at an appropriate hospital.

In Massachusetts, Gov. Charlie Baker's administration says it has a plan that will keep children out of ERs and reduce the need for inpatient care by providing more preventive and community-based services. Parents and providers say they are hopeful but question whether there are enough counselors and psychiatrists to staff proposed community clinics, therapy programs and more psychiatric hospital beds.

Meanwhile, in the ER, Melinda was growing listless. "Life is really hard because things that should be easy for everyone are just hard for me," she said. "When I ask for help, sometimes I picture going to the hospital. Other times I wish someone would just understand me."

Then, in the late evening on Day 16, the family got word that Melinda's wait would soon end.

Day 17: Limbo ends and real treatment begins

On Day 17, Melinda was taken by ambulance to a Boston-area hospital that had added child psychiatric beds during the pandemic. She was lucky to get a spot. The day she arrived, there were 50 to 60 children on the waiting list.

"That's dramatically higher" than before the pandemic, said Dr. Linsey Koruthu, one of Melinda's doctors and a pediatric psychiatrist at Cambridge Health Alliance. "About double what we would have seen in 2019."

Doctors there adjusted Melinda's medications. She met with a psychiatrist and social worker daily and had group therapy and time for schoolwork, yoga and pet therapy. Hospital staff members met with Melinda and her family. She stayed two weeks, a bit longer than the average stay.

Doctors recommended that Melinda move from inpatient care to a community-based residential treatment program — a bridge between being in the hospital and returning home. But those programs were full and had weeks-long delays. So, Melinda went straight home.

She now has three therapists helping her make the transition and use what she's learned. And as Covid re-

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Riverside County launches multi-agency campaign to combat illegal fireworks

Following the excessive and hazardous display of illegal fireworks in 2020, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors launched a multi-agency fireworks education and enforcement campaign to curb the dangerous and illegal activity.

This effort to combat the sale, transportation and use of illegal fireworks will include public service announcements, bill-

boards, road signs, vehicle clings and social media messaging. County departments collaborating on this new initiative include the sheriff's department, fire department, code enforcement, animal services, Riverside University Health System and veterans services.

"This multi-agency effort provides the public with a clear message, 'If You Light it, We'll Write It,'" said Supervisor Kevin Jeffries, First District. "Sheriff's deputies, fire peace officers and code enforcement will write citations for those using illegal fireworks."

The campaign slogan will be highly visible in the campaign materials and references the steeper fines for those found with illegal fireworks.

In May, the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved elevating the county fire chief's authority to oversee the use and sale of licensed fireworks. This authority also increased the penalties associated for those who light illegal fireworks in the unincorporated areas. Under Riverside County Ordinance 858, higher fines will be issued between \$1,000 to \$5,000 depending on the number of violations a person has had over three years.

By local ordinance, the California approved "safe and sane" fireworks are only permitted within the city limits of Indio, Coachella, Blythe and Desert Hot Springs.

"Fireworks can cause serious, lifelong injuries and can even kill. Fireworks also spark structural and wildland fires that destroy property," said Riverside County Fire Chief Bill Weiser. "In addition to imposed fines, anyone who causes a wildland fire by using fireworks will be held responsible for all suppression costs and damages."

Residents can report illegal fireworks by downloading the Riverside County Sheriff's app, website, or calling their non-emergency toll-free number at 800-950-2444.

strictions have begun to ease, some sessions are in person — which Koruthu said should be more effective for Melinda.

Pam said the transition has been rough. Police came to the house once and suggested Melinda go to an ER, but she was able to calm down before it came to that. Melinda has developed an eating disorder.

The first available appointment with a specialist is in August. But, by mid-June, Melinda was able to graduate from middle school, after finishing a backlog of schoolwork.

"If you had asked me two months ago, I would have said I don't think she'll make it," Pam said. "We're getting there."

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Cause of Bonita Fire still unknown

The U.S. Forest Service – San Bernardino National Forest still has not released the cause of the Bonita Fire. The wildland fire was reported at 1:16 a.m. Friday, Jan. 15.

The newspaper previously reported the fire forced the evacuation of Mountain Center and road closures at Morris Ranch Road and Borco Street on Highway 74 and Highway 243 at Saunders Meadow Road. The road closures were lifted by 12:30 p.m. the same day with the exception of Highway 74 from Mountain Center to Lake Hemet, which had a one-lane law enforcement escort.

All evacuation orders and road closures were lifted by 6 p.m. the same day.

Idyllwild Fire responded to assist. The Riverside County Sheriff’s Department was also on scene doing traffic control.

Firefighters had the flames extinguished by about 12:40 p.m. but remained on scene continuing to spray down trees and other structures and items on the property. Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department Battalion Chief Mike Ballinger told the newspaper they were “ensuring the safety of the community and making sure the fire wasn’t going to rekindle.”

The male resident was transported by American Medical Response to San Geronio Memorial Hospital for possible second-degree burns.

Ballinger said of the cause, “It was likely to have started from the home resident igniting his barbecue.”

The resident was displaced and American Red Cross was contacted to assist him.

Michelle Loke of Singapore was staying with her friend at an Airbnb a couple of houses south of the fire.

“I was in the living room and I could hear something that sounded like gunshots or explosions,” she said, “like ‘bang, bang, bang’ and then it stopped.”

She and her friend went outside and noticed a lot of smoke. Neighbors came out, too, and then emergency vehicles arrived.

The two headed to Idyllwild to have lunch but grew concerned, so returned to the house to retrieve valuables in case the fire spread.

“It is very horrific, very sad and shocking,” Loke said.

Ballinger also told the newspaper that an oak tree did not need to be cut down, as initially thought. Firefighters were worried about it reigniting and flames going into the canopy.

Gidget's Game Room opens July 2

There is literally a new game in town! Longtime resident Jenny Kirchner and partner Nicole Smith-Merry will be opening Gidget's Game Room Friday, July 2. In the past, the space housed a video store.

As it happens, Kirchner is a former journalist and photographer for the Idyllwild Town Crier. She learned much of her photography skill from her dad. He dated a woman who was a photographer and she introduced photography to them both.

The acquired skill followed Kirchner into adulthood, providing a livelihood. She has worked as a photojournalist and freelance photographer for close to a decade. Kirchner watched her mother Phyllis Brown operate the successful Prairie Dove boutique as a single mom, inspiring Jenny to forge her way in an independent lifestyle.

When asked why a game room Kirchner responded, "Three or four years ago, I was doing freelance work with a property management company. The people I was working for opened an arcade for kids. 



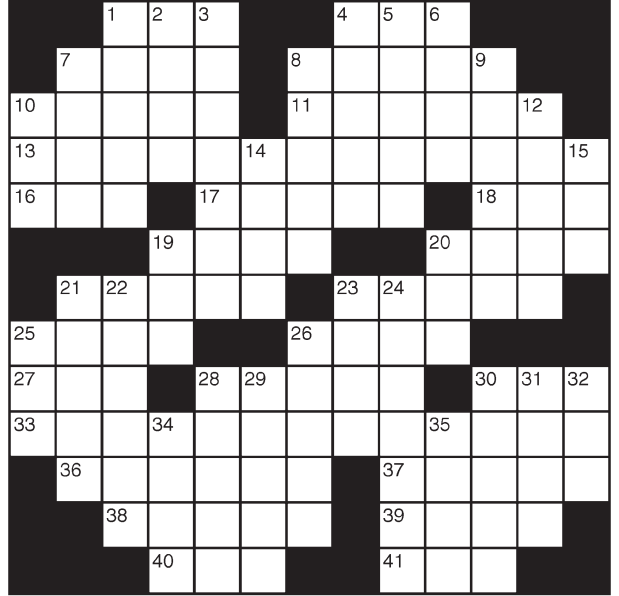

70 years ago - 1951
A county road crew installed sidewalks and curbs downtown.

65 years ago - 1956
Actress Marjorie Main, best known for her role as "Ma Kettle," bought a lot on Dickenson Road.

60 years ago - 1961
A touch of the Old West lived on the 4th of July weekend as ropers competed at the Idyllwild Stables Arena.

55 years ago - 1966
The first publicly funded street lights were installed at 18 locations in Idyllwild.

50 years ago - 1971
Four motorcyclists

went to Hemet Valley Hospital with injuries from a street scuffle between cycle gangs in the business district of Idyllwild.

45 years ago - 1976
In the face of strong objections from agricultural and mining interests, the Riverside County Planning Commission declined to approve a proposed tree-removal control ordinance.

40 years ago - 1981
Two Idyllwild long-timers, Maggie Dutton and Inie Wilson, were honored at the Idyllwild Soroptimist's Donors' Luncheon, where they told stories of their early years in Idyllwild. "In those days, people were not judged by what kind of car they drove or how big their house was; they were judged by the size of their wood pile," Maggie was quoted as saying.

35 years ago - 1986
Hill residents were jarred awake at 2:21 a.m. Tuesday, July 8, when a 6.0 magnitude earthquake hit. Although there were no injuries, some homes

and businesses sustained extensive damage.

30 years ago - 1991
Idyllwild handyman Tom Henderson, charged in May with solicitation to commit murder, was taken into custody when the district attorney's office presented evidence of new threats against Henderson's wife and her boyfriend.

25 years ago - 1996
There were two Independence Day Parades in Idyllwild that year. Having just returned to the Hill after being evacuated due to the Bee Canyon Fire, residents arranged a spontaneous parade made up of returning fire engines and firefighters. Spectators never stopped cheering. The "regular" parade took place two days later on July 6.

20 years ago - 2001
The results of a survey conducted by the Town Crier showed 77% of respondents were opposed to incorporation for Idyllwild.

15 years ago - 2006
Many Idyllwild res-

idents had acting roles in Steve Savage's feature film "Cosmic Radio," being shot in Idyllwild. The 4th of July Parade was filmed for inclusion in the movie.

10 years ago - 2011
The Riverside County Board of Supervisors declared July 4 to 10, 2011, to be Ernie Maxwell Week in honor of the founder of the Town Crier and conservationist. Maxwell was honored on what would have been his 100th birthday with several exhibits and a memorial hike of the Ernie Maxwell Scenic Trail.

5 years ago - 2016
