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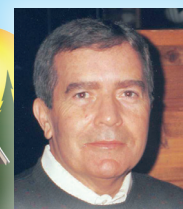

Short-term rental policy revisions moving ahead

Riverside County officials — Board of Supervisors, Planning and Code Enforcement, and the grand jury — have been grappling with revising the current policy for regulating short-term rentals (STRs).

The board formally initiated the effort to revise the STR policy (Ordinance 927) in February 2020 and has been overseeing the progress.

A grand jury report assessed the Planning Department's proposed revisions to Ordinance 927. Several findings and multiple recommendations in the report were described in the Sept. 2 issue of the Town Crier.

The latest action was the Transportation and Land Management Agency's (TLMA) response to the June grand jury report about the STR process. (TLMA is the executive agency in the middle. Both the Planning and Code Enforcement departments are components of TLMA.)

The response to the grand jury report that TLMA prepared and presented to the board on Aug. 24, and which the board adopted as part of its consent calendar, "represented the combined efforts of TLMA and the Board of Supervisors, synthesized into a single report," Brooke Federico, public information officer for

Pinyon murderers denied appeals and Supreme Court reviews

Editor's note: Some of this story is taken from past Town Crier news coverage of this crime.

The California Appeals Court, District 4, denied a rehearing and the Supreme Court denied a review of Robert Lars Pape, 33, and Cristin Conrad Smith, 32, who in 2018 were convicted and sentenced to life in prison in the 2006 triple-murder in Pinyon Pines of a man and two women.

The Appeals Court handed down its decision on Smith June 29 2021, and on Pape June 30. The California Supreme Court denied their reviews Aug. 25 2021.

The two filed their appeals Aug. 23 2018, just two months after a jury found both men guilty of first-degree murder in the deaths of Jon Hayward, 55, and Vicki Friedli, 53. Pape was found guilty of the second-degree murder of Becky Friedli, 18, Vicki's daughter.

The Riverside County Superior Court then handed down its sentencing of life in prison without parole Aug. 10 2018.

The murders occurred Sept. 17 2006. Becky's body was found burning in a wheelbarrow outside the house. The other bodies were found inside the burning home. Hayward died from a 12-gauge shotgun wound to the chest. Vicki's death was caused from a wound to the head, possibly from a Glock handgun. Pape was Becky's former boyfriend.

Both Pape and Smith had originally been arrested and charged for the murders in March 2014, but charges were dropped later that year. Smith was 17 and Pape was 18 at the time of the murders.

When Michael Hestrin took office as Riverside County district attorney in January 2015, he vowed to have the case reviewed again, which led to their re-arrests.

Edison to raise rates

On Thursday, Aug. 19, the California Public Utilities Commission authorized a 7.63% increase to Southern California Edison's revenue requirement for 2021. SCE had requested a 19.03% increase.

This results in \$12.41 (or 8.9 percent) more monthly for a typical residential customer's bill.

The CPUC excluded more than \$131 million of costs for executive compensation and employee bonus programs that do not benefit consumer interests.

It did include "SCE's investment in its distribution and transmission grids, substations, and energy storage and to modernize its grid and replace electrical poles to enhance safety and resiliency," according to the CPUC press release.

It also approved "\$3.29 billion in spending on SCE's Wildfire Mitigation Programs. This approval includes authorizing SCE to replace 4,500 miles of overhead wire with covered conductor in an effort to reduce ignitions from power lines in high fire threat areas.

"SCE will also have the opportunity to increase this covered conductor deployment if needed, subject to further review in conformance with its Wildfire Mitigation Plan."

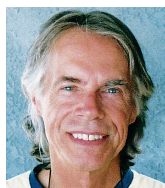
The CPUC authorized SCE to buy up to \$1 billion in liability insurance for third-party, wildfire-related claims. This will cost SCE about \$460 million. "SCE may use alternative risk transfer instruments such as catastrophe bonds or self-insurance if needed and must demonstrate the reasonableness of costs exceeding the approved amounts for cost recovery," according to the press release.

"This proceeding created the opportunity for the CPUC to make strategic decisions on the future of Southern California Edison's capital investments, including grid modernization, responses to cybersecurity risks, and safety investments in response to climate change risks such as wildfires. Our decision keeps our communities safe and employed and also keeps Southern California Edison's wildfire mitigation strategy agile," said Commissioner Genevieve Shiroma, who is assigned to the proceeding.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE: CDC weekly review and Riverside County reports

As of Sept. 3, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports: The current seven-day moving average of daily new U.S. COVID cases has increased 4.9% compared with last week, and it is 123.6% higher compared to the peak observed 13 months ago on July 20 2020. It is 1,217.0% higher than the lowest value observed just three months ago in June of this year.

From the CDC: According to a recent CDC study, the Delta variant can spread rapidly in schools when unvaccinated teachers and staff have close, indoor contact with unvaccinated children. Children are less affected by COVID-19 than adults, but they can still get sick from it and can spread it to others. Another recent CDC study shows that COVID-19 hospitalizations among children

and adolescents is on the increase with the Delta variant. Further CDC resources are available at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/covid-data/covidview/.

As of Sept. 6, California reported 4,300,437 total confirmed cases of COVID, with 65,990 resulting deaths. That's about 102,000 more cases than were reported just last week.

As of Sept. 6, Riverside County reported a total of 332,604 confirmed COVID cases with 4,654 deaths. The current rolling seven-day averages are about 654 new cases per day with 0 new deaths per day. The county now reports 630 hospitalized COVID patients, with 128 of them being in an Intensive Care Unit. ICU beds available in Riverside County number 61. According to CDC figures, 52.4% of the Riverside County population 12 years and over is now fully vaccinated.

Riverside County Public Health reports 129 total cases of COVID in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove community, with 126 recovered and two deaths, leaving one case still active.

Marsha Kennedy: A resident for just nine years, Marsha has been active in making Idyllwild a better and safer place to live.

Kennedy founded the theater troupe Stratford Players in Hemet and brought it to the Hill with her when she relocated. Stratford has presented live theater, including the works of William Shakespeare, to hundreds of local residents and visitors. Its annual Christmas show has become a tradition that many look forward to.

Most of Kennedy's volunteer work revolves around the health and safety of the greater Idyllwild area. She began as a vice president of Mountain Disaster Preparedness but then moved on to address critical needs wherever she saw them.

Her most significant work has been as the founder and head of Idyllwild Snow Group, created in 2017 to address various issues presented by ever-increasing snowplay visitor activity. Kennedy gathered together a group of concerned residents to find solutions to traffic and safety problems. She held meetings with the heads of several state and county agencies, including State Park officials, the Riverside County Sheriff's office and the California Highway Patrol. The accomplishments and ongoing activities of the Snow Group are too many to list here but include the development of five formal snowplay areas on the Hill, establishing and enforcing a number of "no parking" zones, increasing law enforcement presence on the Hill during snow events, and educating locals and visitors on key safety issues via print (including the Town Crier) and online.

Kennedy designed and hosts the website Idyllwild Snow and the Facebook page Idyllwild Snow for Locals. The visitor-oriented Idyllwild Snow is particularly popular, receiving over a million hits in 2020.

Kennedy has been active online in other ways. Working mostly online, Kennedy, partnering with Shannon Ng, organized a Christmas event they called the Holiday Driveby Decorating Extravaganza, where residents were encouraged to dress up their homes in holiday glory and others were invited to come by in their cars for viewings. This brought some fun to an otherwise cele-

bration-free COVID Christmas.

Kennedy was instrumental in bringing the COVID vaccine to Idyllwild. Riverside County Mobile Vaccine units have now made four convoys up the Hill (a fifth and sixth are in the works), largely due to her urging and organizational efforts. Well over 400 Idyllwilders have already been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 through this program.

Kennedy does not make a penny for any of this and, so far, has received little recognition. I believe that a nomination for the Ernie Maxwell Community Spirit Award is more than appropriate.

Bob Romano: The person who nominated Romano wrote that he has been the driving force behind the local Forest Service Volunteer Association's growth and impact. Romano joined the FSVA as a wilderness ranger in 1998 and he became the FSVA wilderness coordinator in 2001. Under his leadership as the wilderness ranger coordinator, the FSVA has grown in the number of active volunteers from three active wilderness rangers to over 30 people.

He has been a volunteer with the organization for 22 years and been involved with volunteer training, Leave No Trace ethics and education for volunteers and visitors, Tahquitz Peak volunteer and coordinator, preparing agreements between the Forest Service and FSVA, outreach and education programs for the local mountain communities, scheduling volunteer wilderness rangers, monitoring for illegal campfires and helping out at the fire call center in San Bernardino during numerous fire incidents.

In 2010, Romano became the president of FSVA's board of directors. He received a USDA Special Recognition award in 2005.

Mara Schoner and Mark Yardas: In 2017, longtime Idyllwild residents Mark Yardas and Mara Schoner launched the nonprofit Idyllwild Forest Health Project. IFHP's mission is to promote thriving forests in the San Jacinto Mountains through community education, advocacy and researching ecologically sound, financially sustainable forest management practices.

Following the economic shutdown from COVID-19, the two saw community members struggling to feed and care for themselves due to the financial impact of the virus and/or health concerns about safety when going shopping. In response to the growing crisis, they launched the Mountain Communities Mutual Aid group as a project under the IFHP nonprofit umbrella. MCMA provides healthy foods, essential goods and services to our mountain community members.

MCMA supplies about 100 boxes to community members each week. The group has grown to 450 members and distributed more than 1,600 food boxes.

the County Executive Office, said in an email.

“Approval of this item completes the response to the grand jury. This is the final report, collectively provided to the grand jury by the Board of Supervisors,” she added. Interestingly, the joint response did not object or dispute any the grand jury’s findings or recommendations. The nearest to a disagreement was the partial concurrence with the grand jury’s finding that the draft ordinance does not provide sufficient protection for the neighborhood, does not determine where an STR may be located, nor does not provide an adequate process for neighbors to register complaints about the local STR.

Not only does TLMA state that the proposed revision to Ordinance 927 “... includes a greater emphasis on enforcement and property owner management obligations,” but the agency informs the grand jury of a recent county Request for Proposal to solicit companies to manage and enforce services for the STR program.

As an example of improved services, TLMA states that one of the requirements for the new vendor will be provision of a “24/7 call center.” Its purpose is to provide neighbors of a registered STR the opportunity to “lodge an immediate complaint.” The county’s management company will then contact either the STR property owner or the designated local contact person who will have 60 minutes to address the neighbor’s complaint.

According to the county’s Purchasing and Fleet Department’s site, the RFP was issued July 22 and has had four subsequent modifications. Bids were due Sept. 2.

The grand jury, however, recommended the county develop and use a “Neighbor Complaint Form.” Ventura County uses this procedure. Without explicitly saying “No,” Federico stressed that the form was a suggestion.

The county’s response described the various ways a neighbor could initiate a complaint about an STR. Reporting the situation online through the Code Enforcement website, contacting the STR management compa-

ny, and in cases where public safety may be of concern, contacting the Sheriff’s Department were prominently stressed.

Also, the county will revise on-site posting requirements to include more ways to file complaints, including direct contact numbers and access to the management team, added Federico.

The TLMA response concurred with most of the other findings and recommendations in the report. For example, the agency agreed that more fiscal resources and personnel will be needed to improve the operation of the STR program.

TLMA also affirmed that its Planning and Code Enforcement staff will hold more joint meetings with the sheriff’s office to “evaluate the program and look for ways to reduce complaints.”

Regarding noise complaints, TLMA described escalating enforcement steps in the future. The first response to a noise complaint will rely on either the property owner or the local contact person to resolve the situation. An unsatisfactory action would result in Code Enforcement’s intervention. If inadequate resolution continues, the sheriff’s office would intercede.

TLMA also affirmed that it is reviewing options to assess a Notice of Violation fee. If administrative actions are not producing appropriate resolutions to the initial complaint, then financial actions, such as fees and fines, may be applied.

A commitment was made to assess the options (including a single database) for more closely coordinating the STR certificate data and the county treasurer’s Transient Occupancy Tax data.

In a separate response to the grand jury findings and recommendations regarding the two databases, the county treasurer-tax collector was adamant that a single database was inappropriate. This response indicated that separating the data for fiscal responsibilities, for instance, the TOT, and administration of the certificate issuance, required separate data. However, greater efforts to ensure reconciliation of the two databases would be implemented.

Also, when a revised draft Ordinance 927 is next

available, TLMA is planning to have a study available to justify an increase in the initial fee and the annual renewal fee for STR certificates.

Finally, TLMA assured the grand jury that before the Board of Supervisors votes on the revised Ordinance 927, there will be public hearings for more public comment.

County Planning Steven Jones, who is heading this initiative, does not expect a revised ordinance or other changes until late fall. The ordinance will go first to the Planning Commission for its review and approval before being placed on the supervisors’ agenda.

Fallen tree disrupts power; causes small fires

Michelle Bowman, who lives in the Country Club Drive house where a tree fell Friday night, said they heard a loud explosion at about 9:20 p.m. At first they thought it was an earthquake, but there was no shaking. They went outside and saw sparks from all of their electrical lines. A very large and old tree had rotted from the inside, a tree, Bowman said, Southern California Edison had told them was OK last year. The tree not only fell on their power lines, taking out a pole, but also crushed

and totaled their Jeep. The sparks from the downed lines started a few small fires in the yard that she and her husband kept at bay with a garden hose, until Idyllwild Fire personnel arrived and put them out. She said SCE showed up, and restored power to two of the four neighbors' houses that also lost power but told Bowman she needed to get a new "weather head" in which to connect the power lines. She said that could take a week or so to find, according to an electrician who also came out to their house. She was uncertain when SCE would remove the tree and had no date for when power would be restored.



Idyllwild Fire personnel responded to a report of a tree down on Country Club Drive at about 9:20 p.m. Friday. Edison arrived to rectify the power pole and get the lines off the ground after a huge, hollowed-out tree fell and took out the line and pole. There were sparks and a small fire initially but it was put out quickly.

Pine Cove Property Owners briefed on firefighting improvements

The Pine Cove Property Owners Association's September meeting began with a timely presentation by Jerry Holldber, Pine Cove Water District general manager and Michael Franklin, Riverside County Business and Community Services. Holldber explained that the PCWD Dutch Flat facility has been used for many years as a filling station for firefighting helicopters. Foster Lake has been dry because of drought for many years, so the present filling station employs a decades-old canvas tank. Riverside County has recently purchased Black Hawk firefighting helicopters with a 1,000-gallon tank capacity. It is feared that the present canvas tank will be inadequate for servicing the new helicopters. PCWD's proposal with the approval of Cal Fire is to use County Service Area 38 funds to purchase two reinforced steel tanks: one 7,000-gallon tank to replace the old canvas tank at the Dutch Flats location,

and a 4,000-gallon steel tank to be trailer-mounted and stored at the PCWD yard. The trailer-mounted tank can be towed to a safe location near an active fire, filled from hydrants and serve as a helicopter fill-up point. A vendor has been found and the entire project, including the trailer, will cost \$93,000. Franklin explained the CSA 38 ad valorem funding process assuring PCPOA members that adequate money is available to cover the cost of these improvements. After a brief discussion, all members present moved to endorse this proposed expenditure. The Riverside County Board of Supervisors must give final approval for the project to go ahead. Other business during the meeting was Pine Cove Community Cleanup Day planned for Saturday, Sept. 25. A large trash bin will be located in the PCWD Dutch Flats yard off Franklin Drive. Pine Cove residents are encouraged to bring trash and clutter to the bin. Pine Cove residents may watch for details by email. PCPOA will run an ad in the Town Crier the week prior.

Serious injuries in two collisions

Serious injuries of two motorcyclists were suspected in two of three traffic collisions reported on Hill roads recently, according to California Highway Patrol Public Information Officer Matt Napier. At 9:50 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 29, Joshua Coven, 28, of Murrieta, was traveling northbound on Highway 243 at about 30 to 40 mph on a 2012 Harley Davidson when he failed to negotiate a right-hand curve, allowing the vehicle to cross over the double-yellow lines. This occurred about 194 feet south of Marion View Drive when Barbara Ann Ritche, 67, of Idyllwild, was traveling southbound on Highway 243 at about 30 mph in a 2007 Toyota FJ Cruiser.

Coven ejected himself from the bike and landed on the roadway as the two vehicles collided head-on. Mercy Air transported him to Riverside University Health System with suspected serious injuries. Idyllwild Garage towed the bike; the Cruiser was not towed and Ritche did not suffer injuries. At 2:30 a.m. Friday, Sept. 3, Vanessa Deleon, 22, of Idyllwild, was driving a 2001 Lexus IS300 northbound on Highway 243 at about 45 to 55 mph. Due to a suspected state of intoxication, she left the right edge roadway as she entered a left-hand curve 84 feet south of Cedar Glen Drive, overcorrected to the left, lost control and crossed over into a steep dirt embankment. The Lexus rolled over, landing on its left side. Deleon suffered minor injuries and was not transported to a hospital. After an investigation, she was placed under arrest for suspicion of driving while intoxicated. Idyllwild Garage towed the vehicle.

"We would like to thank our local community for their continued support of The Rustic Theatre and our future endeavors. We are blessed to be a part of this amazing community."

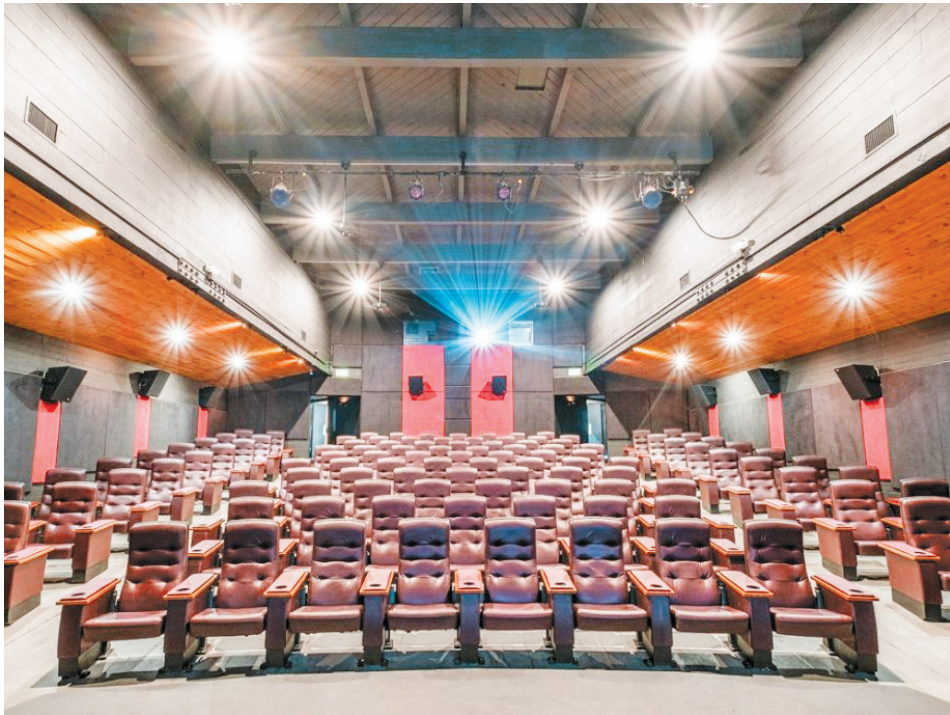

Over the last year-and-a-half the Hill has seen unprecedented circumstances and needs in these communities. Many people have experienced food insecurity, some for the first time.

Fortunately, the Hill is home to many dedicated volunteer groups working to make sure no one here goes hungry. Most of these groups distribute free grocery boxes. Some encourage anyone interested in low-cost, high-quality groceries to sign up and pay what they can, making a suggested donation to support the group's mission. To quote Mountain Communities Mutual Aid, "Not charity, solidarity."

Some of the groups offer other services, including fire abatement, household maintenance, errands and human connection. All run on volunteer labor and welcome contributions. They partner with a constellation of local businesses, nonprofits and government agencies.

Here are some ways to replenish the pantry, build community and have some fun: (Editor's note: Next week, the Jerome will volunteer and take a look inside a few of these groups.)

The Idyllwild Help Center

The Help Center Food Pantry provides weekly bags to qualified clients. Grocery vouchers, honored at Fairway Market, are available "when funding is available." Registration, including proof of residence and income is required. Recipients are asked to volunteer a half-hour to a Help Center project. Those needing assistance or wishing to volunteer may contact Skye Zambrana, client services administrator, at (951) 659-2110.

Mountain Communities Mutual Aid

Food Boxes for two and four people, and essential household/personal hygiene items are available. Also, food options like canned fish, dry beans and olive oil can be ordered. Donations are suggested, with about half of recipients paying \$15 for a small box and \$30 for the larger.

Distribution happens between 12:45 and 2 p.m. every Thursday, at Camp Maranatha, 54162 Maranatha Drive. Delivery is an option for those unable to pickup. Register online to order a food box, request help, donate or volunteer at <https://mountainaid.net>. The phone number is (951) 468-0110.

The Food Ministry

Calvary Chapel Mountain Center oversees distributions from 1 to 2 p.m. every Thursday. Lines form around 12:30 p.m. at the Mountain Center church, 29375 Highway 243. Contact Assistant Pastor Gary Sherman at (951) 659-0097 for more information.

Idyllwild Community Center/Feeding America

Grocery distribution happens from 10 a.m. to noon the first Tuesday of every month at Town Hall, 25925 Cedar Street. Suggested line-up time is 9 a.m. but some show up as early as 7:30 a.m.

In case of snow or heavy, the program moves to Friday. Just show up and sign up. For more information or to volunteer, call Marty Kreiger at (951) 538-1246.

Helping Hearts on the Hill

This group distributes meals to senior citizens on Mondays. These are apparently very nice meals, courtesy of Ferro's Restaurant. Donations of \$5 are gratefully accepted.

The group also provides volunteers to run local errands, and conducts wellness, family contact checks and a variety of services to create "intergenerational compassionate connections," according to member Caitlin Mathey. It is a Facebook group and can be reached to sign up for assistance or volunteering at (310) 567-5013.

10 years ago - 2011

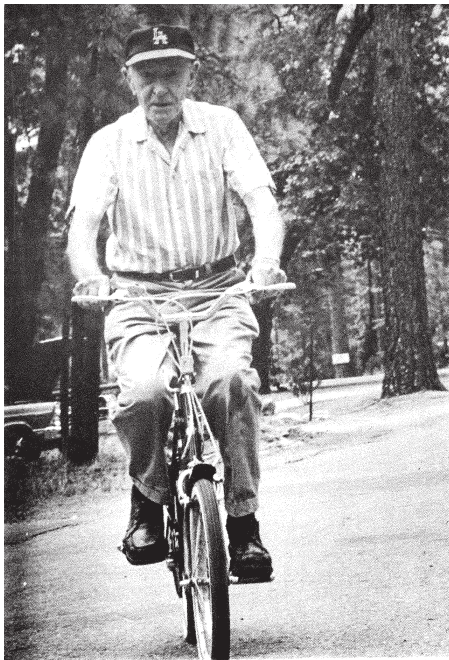
Jerry Buchanan and longtime resident Larry Donahoo easily won the fire commission seats up for election.

5 years ago - 2016

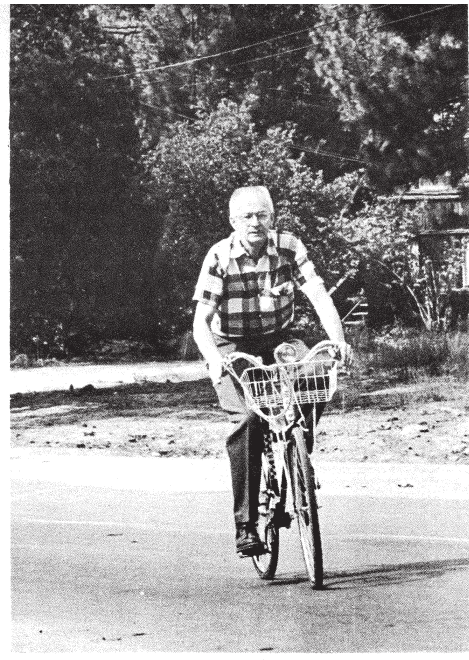
The San Jacinto Mountain Community Center board was being preliminarily considered to run the recreation programs in Idyllwild.
