Sheriff Bianco acknowledges former membership in Oath Keepers

On Oct. 5, the Press-Enterprise broke the story that Riverside County Sheriff Chad Bianco admits to his former membership in the Oath Keepers, a far-right group some of whose members are being prosecuted for the January 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol building.

According to reports of the Southern California News Group, Press-Enterprise owner, Bianco stated that he had been a dues-paying member for one year only. "I found an email from 2014 where I joined for a year. I don't even remember it," he reportedly said.

The PE reported that Bianco also stated, "I'm not ashamed of what I did in 2014," adding that he had nothing to do with the breach of the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6. "I have been vocally against what happened there. What they did — the few that went into the building — was completely wrong and against the law and they should be held accountable for it."

The PE story stated that Bianco went on to dispute media portrayals of the Oath Keepers as an "anti-government militia." According to the PE, he said members of far-left organizations like antifa and Black Lives Matter have committed acts of violence and vandalism, with far less attention paid by the media and the FBI, regarding which the PE states he further commented: "I lost faith in the FBI a long time ago. The line workers are first rate. Their administration has no business carrying a badge. They strayed from nonbiased law enforcement a long time ago."

The PE further reported that Bianco said that, to him, the Oath Keepers support and stand by the same oath he, Bianco, took as a peace officer and sheriff: to defend the constitutions of the United States and California and to protect against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

"In today's politically toxic environment," the PE further quoted him as saying, "if you support the Constitution of the United States of America you are evil — you're branded as some evil, right-wing conspirator."

On Oct. 7, Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington issued the following statement regarding Sheriff Bianco: "I don't believe that it is appropriate for an elected sheriff to be defending and explaining the mission of an organization such as the Oath Keepers. His constituents expect him to focus on upholding the law and protecting and serving the people of Riverside County."

By email, the Town Crier asked for comment from Idyllwild Fire Chief Mark LaMont, who has worked with Sheriff Bianco, but we received nothing back by the TC's press deadline.

Commission begins redistricting process

Riverside County's redistricting effort is moving forward. On Oct. 6, the Executive Office Technical Committee presented four draft maps to the 2021 Advisory Redistricting Commission, that the five planning commissioners composed.

At the very beginning of the session, Deputy County Executive Officer and EOTC Co-Chair Rania Odenbaugh stressed that these maps were starting points for the redistricting process.

"They are a baseline, not necessarily where we're headed or our destination," she added.

While several commissioners offered comments on the draft maps, the issue which drew the most attention was what criterion is the highest priority as they formulate their recommendations to the board of supervisors.

County considering more restraints on temporary events

The board of supervisors will consider major changes to Riverside County's procedures for regulating temporary events (Ordinance 348, section XIX) at an upcoming meeting. A draft ordinance has been prepared and Planning Department staff intend to present it to the board at its Oct. 19 meeting.

Since the section for temporary events is three pages in the current ordinance and the draft ordinance is 13 pages, this appears to be a substantial revision.

Currently, for example, temporary events are classified as either "major," 2,000 or more people expected to attend, or "minor," between 200 and 2,000 expected attendees.

The proposed revision has six classes of temporary events. A Class I event expects fewer than 50 people attending. A Class VI temporary event would expect more than 1,000 people. Commercial temporary events are a separate classification. Annual and seasonal temporary events (such as Christmas, Halloween or other holidays) are another category.

After considering the number of people who may attend the event, the revised ordinance then considers the size of the property being used for the event. For example, an event expecting more than 100 people and being held on a lot of less than 10,000 square feet (about a quarter of an acre) is prohibited. If more than 1,000 people are expected to attend, the event must be on lots greater than 20 acres.


Commercial temporary events are specifically prohibited in several different land-use zones. Examples include rural residential, rural single family, rural multiple family lots and more.

The proposed ordinance provides many examples of possible temporary events. These include festivals, concerts, stage events, sports, equine, carnivals and art shows. Whether the event is inside or outdoors does not matter and neither does the designation of public or private matter.

Wedding ceremonies and receptions are included in the list of possible temporary events. However, weddings, and birthday or graduation parties, or similar events will not require a permit if attendance is fewer than 100 people and the property is host to no more than four of these types of events within a 12-month period.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE: CDC weekly review and RivCo reports

As of Tuesday, Hemet Unified School District’s Dashboard reports 13 recently (last two weeks) confirmed cases of COVID at Idyllwild School — 10 students and three staff members, which is 4.23% of its combined student/staff population. At Hemet High, 43 students and one staff member are reported as confirmed cases, which is 1.70% of its student/staff population.

Hamilton High reports one student and no staff members as confirmed COVID cases, or 0.22% of its student/staff population. The HUSD Dashboard also states: “Positive cases will appear on the Dashboard for 14 days from the date they are reported and then will be removed after the 14th day.” So, HUSD’s Dashboard does not report cumulative confirmed cases throughout the district, but only those cases confirmed during the previous two weeks.

As of Monday, Riverside County Public Health still reported 189 total cases of COVID in the Idyllwild-Pine

Cove community, with 167 recovered and two deaths, leaving 20 cases currently active in our community.

County-wide, RCPH also reported a total of 351,248 confirmed COVID cases (2,655 more than last week) with 4,973 deaths (49 more than last week). The county now reports 333,308 hospitalized COVID patients (78 fewer than last week). ICU beds available in Riverside County number 62. The Centers for Disease Control rates Riverside County as a high-transmission area and is now reporting 58.8% of Riverside County’s eligible population, age 12 and up, has been fully vaccinated, but Riverside County Public Health reports 52.4%.

California reported 4,553,194 total confirmed COVID cases (37,479 more than last week), with 69,741 resulting deaths (702 more than last week).

The CDC website reports that nationally, 99% of current COVID cases are attributed to the Delta variant.

As of Oct. 8, CDC reports: “COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths are once again declining in many parts of the country.” CDC also advises, “It is important that all people, including people with disabilities and people who provide support to people with disabilities, get a COVID-19 vaccine. Many people with disabilities

face significant challenges accessing COVID-19 vaccination services and many need support ...

“CDC has resources to support people with disabilities and those who care for them. CDC’s Toolkit for People with Disabilities (www.cdc.gov/ncbddd/humandevelopment/covid-19/toolkit-for-people-with-disabilities.html) includes guides for increasing disabled persons’ access to vaccinations along with COVID-19 FAQs. To find a vaccine provider near you, visit Vaccines.gov or your state or local public health department website.”

The current national seven-day moving average of daily new U.S. COVID cases has decreased 11.6% compared with last week. From the CDC website: “As of October 7, 94.7% of people ages 65 or older have received at least one dose of vaccine and 83.8% are fully vaccinated. More than three-quarters (78%) of people ages 18 years or older have received at least one dose of vaccine and 67.6% are fully vaccinated. For people ages 12 years or older, 76.2% have received at least one dose of vaccine and 65.8% are fully vaccinated.”

All temporary events are limited to four days. But a seasonal temporary event may continue for 45 days.

All events are required to have approved access and parking plans, fire protection plans, security operation, emergency medical, sewage disposal, potable water, food service, noise dust and lighting mitigation plans.

Most temporary events may not operate between 2 and 7 a.m. For those in certain residential, citrus and wine country zones, their non-operation period extends from 10 p.m. to 7 a.m.

Further permit applications will be denied for properties that host up to four temporary events within a 12-month period if the county has received five separate and substantiated complaints related to noise, odors, outdoor illumination traffic, parking or rubbish about the use of this property.

The reason for the proposed restraints is not because of COVID-19, but according to the draft, “... these temporary events are increasing the need for county services and resources and intensifying adverse impacts to surrounding neighbors and properties. These adverse impacts include, but are not limited to, noise, trash, parking difficulties, and disruption to the normal flow of pedestrian and vehicular traffic.”

“Of all the information gathering and different elements of that to figure out where the lines go, what takes precedence? What are the most important criteria?” asked Commissioner Guillermo “Bill” Sanchez (4th District).

Or, as Commissioner Gary Thornhill (3rd District) posed it, “How are we balancing [our] intent to try to equitably balance all the racial and ethnic segments to balance out in every district?”

While Tom Mullen of the EOTC and the county’s

chief data officer replied that the EOTC’s intent was to follow the rule of law, they should try to address and to reflect all the components.

“All are equally important,” Mullen said. “Our task is to comply with all.”

But Odenbaugh emphatically stressed that “our number one goal is equal population.” The Voting Rights Act and other criteria, such as communities of interest and geographic contiguities, would be met to the “best practical extent ...


“It’s a juggling act,” she noted.

The next public hearing on the supervisorial redistricting will be a special board of supervisors meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 19.

At that meeting, Odenbaugh and Mullen expect to have more maps, as well as more data (such as voting age population), describing the individual districts and their differences.

Second District Commissioner David Leonard suggested that all five supervisors should have some county unincorporated constituents to represent.

Thornhill recommended including Hemet and San Jacinto in the same district. He suggested that district should be associated with the Pass area since he believes the San Jacinto Valley communities identify with it.

Idyllwild COVID

DEAR EDITOR:

As Jack contemplates a chicken-or-the-egg philosophy, I would like to offer a thought for the community to ponder.

Registered short-term rentals in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area account for nearly all of the total amount in all of unincorporated Riverside County. A conservative estimate probably adds two to three times that amount of illegally operated ones.

Even during last year's state lockdown, many continued to operate (some on a daily basis). It doesn't take a genius to know that this increases the opportunity for COVID spread.

There are far more serious problems with STRs than noise and parking. Disease, water supply, wastewater, fire, medical, law enforcement and mental sanity all are at stake.

I cannot for the life of me understand why the Idyllwild Association of Realtors would not recommend to the county that we limit the number of STRs allowed in our mountain community.

I also would love to see a public safety fee added to all STRs that would go to fire departments, water districts and law enforcement to help out with the added costs of the massive tourist load. It could be used for things like more emergency sirens and ambulances (for all of the additional traffic collisions caused by visitors).

I like Jack's idea of comparing what Alpine is doing in San Diego County, but instead of checking the school district, maybe the STR situation might provide more insight.

Editor: The Town Crier was not able to verify these statements without a California Public Records Act request. However, AirBnB, which requires its property listers to pay Transient Occupancy Tax to Riverside County, lists 300 properties in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area, which is more than half of the short-term rentals Riverside County reported on Feb. 1, 2021.

Short-term rentals are dangerous

DEAR EDITOR:

I don't think that short-term rentals should have barbecues available for use at their establishments. There is too much risk of a careless decision, or mistake being made that could burn down our town, our homes, our livelihoods. As it is, a permit must be obtained from the Fire Dept in order to have a barbecue. Regulations are



spelled out, but what if regulations are not completely followed? A small mistake and one errant ember could destroy our Hill.

Most people who visit here don't live in constant fear of a fire breaking out and destroying their home, their place of employment or even taking their life. Those who live here, and have been through fire threats and evacuations, know how quickly a fire can spread, especially in the drought situation California has been in for over a decade. When there is strong wind on a hot dry day, we start stacking valuables near the front door. We are glad the gas tank in the car is full. We call friends and family to keep in touch while we wait to find out if fire will rage here.

I have heard of people who want to know how pine needles or pine cones affect the flavor of barbecued food, a dangerous choice.

A friend told me of a situation where she saw smoke coming from a chimney in the heat of the summer. She inquired and was told the renters were pretending they had a campfire so they could roast marshmallows and hot dogs. They were burning wood they gathered on the property. Most was pine that is full of sap and often pops, sending embers flying, an indoor fire hazard.

STRs are destroying the character of Idyllwild, in many ways. We can't let them burn us down.



Trial in baby’s death may start Nov. 2

The trial of a man charged with murder and felony willful child cruelty in the death of a baby in the Pinyon area begins in Riverside County Superior Court, Indio, Nov. 2, if it is not continued again as it has been 17 times since May 2016.

Marcus Novell Green, now 57, of Thermal, was arrested on May 6, 2016 and has since remained in custody with no bail set at the Southwest Detention Center. He was the driver of a Porsche two-seater that crashed on the hillside May 1, 2016, with his 5-month-old daughter Armani Green in the lap of her mother, Kristen Leigh Lauer, now 27, of Rancho Mirage.

Both parents were buckled and survived. Armani was thrown from the vehicle and died at the scene.

Lauer also was charged with the same felonies May 4, 2017, and both cases were combined for an efficient


use of judicial resources. Her bail was set at \$100,000 and she was released.

Both parents pleaded not guilty to both charges until November 2019 when Lauer changed her plea to guilty. On Dec. 6, 2019, she was sentenced to 364 days in jail and life probation.


Some of the requirements of her probation include:

- not associating with any unrelated person she knows to be on either probation, parole, mandatory supervision or post-release community supervision;
- no contact with Green;
- wearing an ankle bracelet (electronic monitor);
- not operating a motor vehicle with any minors as passengers; and
- “must be willing to share Armani’s story in a manner deemed mutually appropriate by safekids.org and defendant to help others avoid the death of a child caused by failure to use car seats.”

How the Hill voted in the recall election

While Idyllwild, Pine Cove and residents to the north (south of Poppet Flats) all opposed the recall of Gov. Gavin Newsom, the communities to the south — Garner Valley and Anza — overwhelmingly supported his proposed recall. And in the middle, Mountain Center, by one vote, supported the recall.

Riverside County’s Registrar of Voters Office released the certified results of the Sept. 14 recall election of Newsom. Overall, county voters slightly supported his recall. While just 50.5% of Riverside County voters chose “Yes” for the recall, statewide, more than 60% opposed it.

Locally, 72% of Garner Valley voters and 66% of Anza voters wanted the governor replaced.

Mountain Center voters were split. Of 49 total votes cast in the election, 25 voted for the recall and 24 opposed it.

In contrast, the majority of voters in Idyllwild and Pine Cove supported the governor. About 58% of these voters were opposed compared to 49.5% in the whole county and 62% in the state.

In all six local precincts, Republican radio commentator Larry Elder received more than 78% of the votes for whom should replace Newsom if he were recalled from voters who had cast a “Yes” vote for the recall. The second choice in each precinct was Republican Kevin Faulconer, former San Diego mayor.

Turnout on the Hill was greater than the statewide and county totals, which were 58% and 56%, respectively. Locally turnout ranged from 62% in Anza to 78% in Garner Valley. The turnout exceeded 70% in both Idyllwild and Pine Cove.

The local turnout in the 2020 presidential election ranged from 86% to 94%.

Consistent with their choices nearly a year ago, the precincts that favored Trump supported the recall and those that favored Biden opposed Newsom’s recall. The

exception was Mountain Center, where Biden garnered 55% of the 65 ballots cast in 2020, while the majority (51%) this year supported the recall.

Actress finds home and new career on the Hill

Marisa Quintanilla has lived in Idyllwild for about 2 1/2 years. Her business here, Wildland Organics, is about to celebrate its anniversary Oct. 31.

An active vocalist, photographer and visual artist, she is best known as an actor. Her role as “Huilen” in “The Twilight Saga: Breaking Dawn Part 2” embedded her in the mythos of modern film vampires. Her recent guest starring appearance as the warrior “Sheila” in the TBS series “Miracle Workers: Oregon Trail” was, for her, a “dream role.”

Her life has taken her to many interesting places. Born in McAllen, Texas, and like many creatives, she felt the pull of the metropolises — first to the East Coast and Brown University, (with an interlude in St. Petersburg, Russia), then to the West Coast and Hollywood. Like all of us here, she finally found Idyllwild.

TC: How did you end up here?

“My husband and I were living in a van, ‘van life-ing’ across the country, then Canada, all the way to Cape Breton. We came back to the West Coast and went down to Baja. We had left LA to find a new place to live. We had a few places in mind we thought we wanted to live, but nowhere felt like home ... We thought, ‘Maybe closer to LA.’

“We were on the 5 heading toward the 10, trying to get Realtors in Arrowhead or Big Bear, but no one was answering their phones. It was the best thing that ever happened to us. We asked, ‘What is south of the 10? What is all that green on the map? What is Idyllwild?’ We took a right instead of a left.

“What’s special, what ‘hit home,’ was when we stopped into Café Aroma for lunch. Everyone was so welcoming. We stayed from 2 p.m. until they closed ... It was the most wonderful night of people and music ... The band started playing my favorite song and I started to cry. I looked at my husband and we said, ‘We’re home.’”

TC: What inspired this business, Wildland Organics?

“Living simply, living in the van, before that in a tiny house, but still living luxuriously. I set my mind to make really beautiful multi-use products that are effective, organic and luxurious.”

Wildland Organics products aim to “simplify” and “de-clutter” daily life while satisfying the senses and the spir-

it. Their “Super Bar” is one product for bathing, hair and shaving. Everything is mindfully sourced and packaged (refills, anyone?), and their own products are made here in Idyllwild.

Having found her new home, Marissa made a transition from acting to the Wildland business. She stepped away from her former career, telling her manager and agent she had no intention of acting again.

“I had settled into my quiet mountain life. Until I got a phone call and was offered a guest-starring role opposite Steve Buscemi. I got offered my dream role; comedy, action, socially relevant and written by a native woman. I spent a week starring alongside Steve. Action, riding horses, a period piece, socially relevant themes handled in a comedic way, not heavy handed.

“At the end of the shoot everyone on the set knew a lot about Idyllwild and everyone had a Wildland Organics gift bag featuring my signature hand sanitizer, the same sanitizer I made batches of and gifted to local businesses that were open at the beginning of the pandemic.”

TC: When did you know you wanted to pursue acting as a career?

“In college, at Brown University. I fell in love with acting as a craft ... it could be a socially meaningful career because of the impact that film and television have on our community.”

TC: You got a formal acting education at Brown. What important lessons did you learn there?

“How important it is to be selective about the projects you are working on, because the characters you are playing mean something to the people who are watching. If the character you are playing is a stereotype, or is degrading to women or anything of that nature, then you are propagating that negative image. So it is important to choose your projects.

“The character I am playing in ‘Miracle Workers’ turns all stereotypes on their heads. She is a strong warrior, she is not

a ‘princess’ waiting for a man to rescue her, she is the opposite, and she is running the show.”

TC: What about your time in Russia. What did you gain as an actor there?

“They act from the heart and soul.”

TC: You seem to have been cast in “action” roles from the beginning. What’s that like?

“I love action roles.”

TC: Are your characters like you?

“Yes, I think that in every character there is a little bit of me that sparks authenticity. In theater they want to see you transform into something different. In these kinds of roles (film and TV) they cast what they call ‘an essence match,’ the essence of the character is also in the essence of your being. So it is an easy fit. Within your wheelhouse.”

TC: What were your most difficult and enjoyable moments on set?

“I think it was one and the same. In this role (Sheila in ‘Oregon Trails’) I had to learn that entire fight sequence in one day. And then I had to perform it the next day, multiple times, in the freezing rain and hail. The magic of the cinema makes it so you can’t even tell it was raining, but I sure felt it.

“All the cues were based on me. There were horses running and weapons flying and (prop) shot guns going off, and I had to hit my marks perfectly on every step in order for the scene to work. It was so hard; there was so much pressure. It was definitely the scariest moment of my career, at the beginning. At the end it was the absolute best.

“As soon as the director yelled ‘cut’ the entire crew started applauding for me and a sea of people came over to congratulate me. As they began to drift away I saw that Steve Buscemi was waiting for me, to give me a fist bump. And he had such pride in his eyes, and he said, ‘You done good, kid.’”

TC: Any hints about upcoming roles?

“If they offer me something as meaty as Sheila I will certainly show up.”

Pepper: But they cannot leave the litter before they are 8 weeks old.




