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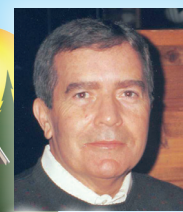

Cloud seeding planned for this area

Less rain, lack of precipitation, water shortage, drought and emergency are all familiar terms to Californians, especially in Southern California. The San Diego office of the National Weather Service reported that during the past water year, Idyllwild endured in eighth driest year since rainfall has been recorded.

Last week, Gov. Gavin Newsom extended his drought emergency to all of California, including Riverside County, with the intent that water conservation will mitigate the drought effects.

Solutions and fixes are not guaranteed and often beyond human control. Another "La Niña" weather pattern is forecast for Southern California this winter. This will likely result in the second consecutive dry and warm winter. So, the arrival of an "El Niño" in a year or two may be some salvation. But be careful what you wish for. The end of the last drought period was February 2019, when enough rain fell to flood the Hill and washed out several roads.

Humans have tried several techniques that can control weather. But rain dances have not proven to be consistently successful. Weather modification, such as cloud seeding, has a scientific basis. It began in the mid-1900s.

Last year, the Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority announced it was going to explore a weather modification program to augment rainfall in Southern California.

The intent of a weather modification program being

Governor declares statewide drought emergency

Early last week, Gov. Gavin Newsom issued a revised State Proclamation addressing the statewide drought emergency. The new proclamation includes Southern California counties, including Riverside County, in its application.

In July, the governor asked Californians to voluntarily reduce water consumption by 15%. This goal has not been met. With the anticipated arrival of a second La Niña weather pattern bringing less precipitation and warmer temperatures, the governor has extended his earlier executive order.

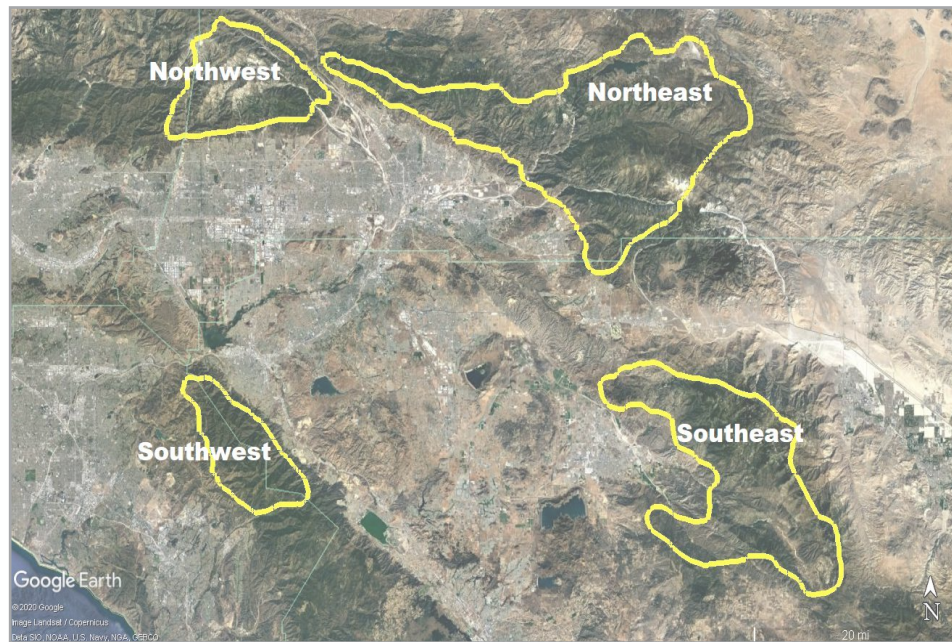
During the last drought, Californians reduced water use by 21% from 2013 to 2016. Since then, use has begun to increase. Today's use is about 16% less than the 2013 volume.

"As the western U.S. faces a potential third year of drought, it's critical that Californians across the state redouble our efforts to save water in every way possible," Newsom said in the press release announcing the actions.

The new order also gives the State Water Resources Control Board authority to adopt emergency regulations prohibiting using potable water for certain non-human consumption purposes. Examples would include washing a vehicle without using a hose with nozzle or using potable water to wash streets, driveways, patios and other outside areas.

The three local water districts are already in water conservation stages. None are in mandatory restriction.

Redistricting deadlines approach; more maps presented

On Tuesday, Oct. 19, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors held a special evening meeting to discuss realigning the supervisorial districts as a result of the 2020 census.

The board agreed to eliminate the four original staff-drawn maps.

The next step is more detailed analysis of the maps initially presented to the supervisors at this meeting. The new maps came from the Executive Office Technical Redistricting Committee and the public. EOTC created three new maps the board had not seen before. Public speakers commented on the process and also introduced and submitted four other maps.

EOTC will review these and any other public maps submitted by Nov. 1 and voting age demographic data will be analyzed for each.

On Wednesday, Nov. 3, the county's Advisory Redistricting Commission will hold a public meeting to also review each of these maps any new ones received by Nov. 1.

On the Tuesdays of Nov. 9 and 16, the supervisors will hold more public hearings on the various maps with intent to choose the new supervisorial district boundaries by Dec. 15.

One of the three new staff maps included Hill communities with the desert areas.

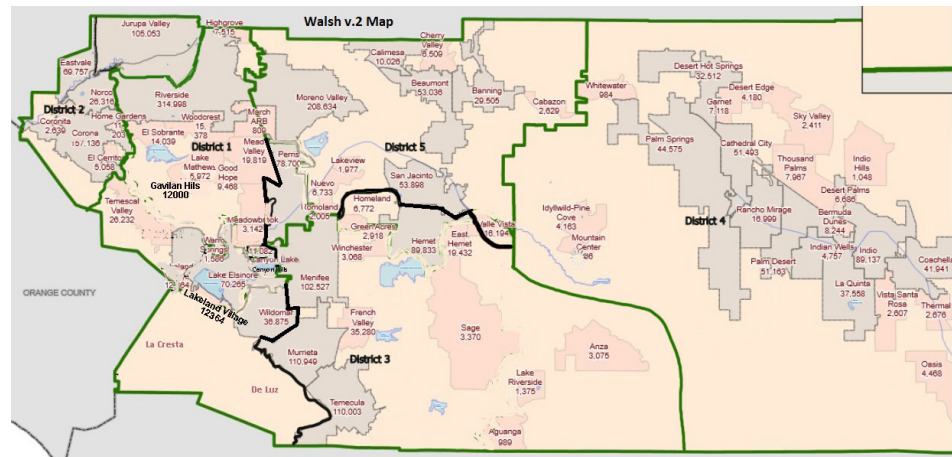
The other two EOTC options located the Hill with its western neighbors. In one, Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Mountain Center and Garner Valley, along with Valle Vista and East Hemet, remained in District 3. The Temecula to Menifee areas also are in District 3, but Hemet and San Jacinto have been shifted north to District 5.

In the third option, the Hill is split between two districts. The dividing line is in Garner Valley, just south of Lake Hemet. The northern communities – Mountain Center, Idyllwild, Pine Cove to Banning – are moved to District 5, which would include Hemet and San Jacinto. Banning, Beaumont and Moreno Valley also are part of District 5 in this option.

Garner Valley, from south of Lake Hemet, Anza and Aguanga, remain in District 3 with the Temecula to Menifee cities, and Valle Vista and East Hemet.

Supervisor Kevin Jeffries (District 1) requested the preparation of a fourth map, which will depict Temecula, Murrieta, Wildomar, Lake Elsinore, the wine country and Temescal Valley in one district.

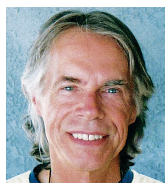
Three of the public-submitted maps assigned the Idyllwild, Pine Cove and Moun-

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COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE: CDC weekly review and RivCo reports

As of Tuesday, Hemet Unified School District’s Dashboard reports recently (last two weeks) confirmed cases of COVID at Idyllwild School as being zero students and zero staff members, which is, of course, 0.00% of its combined student/staff population. This is a marked reduction from Monday, the day before, when HUSD had reported three students and two staff members with COVID.

At Hemet High, 11 students and no staff members are reported as confirmed cases, which is 0.42% of its student/staff population. The previous day, HUSD had reported 23 students and one staff member with COVID at Hemet High.

The HUSD Dashboard states: “Positive cases will appear on the Dashboard for 14 days from the date they are reported and then will be removed after the 14th day.” So, HUSD’s rolling Dashboard does not report cumulative confirmed cases throughout the district, but only those cases confirmed as active during the previous two weeks.

tions. Eliminating washing down driveways or washing vehicles without a nozzle on the hose are some of the voluntary restrictions the local districts already asked of customers.

Last month, Newsom signed a budget bill providing more than \$5 billion for water resource and drought emergency projects and programs. This includes \$200 million for small community drought relief.

The local water district general managers were not

developed is to increase rain and snow fall, resulting in greater streamflow benefiting water consumers in Southern California. While weather modification has not been attempted in the Santa Ana Watershed, it has been used in Santa Barbara, San Luis Obispo and Sacramento, noted Jeff Mosher, SAWPA general manager.

“We want to make sure we have an adequate supply of water,” said Mark Norton, SAWPA Water Resources and Planning manager. “It’s not a drought buster.”

Cloud seeding is a chemical process intended to increase the amount of precipitation, including snow or rain, during the storm season. When a storm is approaching and over the target mountain range, silver iodide is fired. This process works through releasing particles of silver iodide into clouds, increasing moisture in the upper atmosphere.

This increases the chances of a cloud’s ability to produce rain or snow by providing a substance for the gaseous water molecules to adhere and to condense on. This aids in the forming snowflakes or raindrops.

SAWPA is a joint powers authority with five member agencies — Eastern Municipal Water District, Inland Empire Utilities Agency, Orange County Water District, San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District and Western Municipal Water District.

In 2020, the authority began studying the economic and technical feasibility of a weather modification program. Study results were positive and the board hopes to initiate a pilot program in late 2022.

Earlier this year, SAWPA authorized its consultant to identify locations for equipment to seed the prospective rain clouds. This week it approved a contract to conduct an environmental assessment of its proposed pilot program.

The Southern California mountains are the target area for increasing precipitation. The San Jacinto Mountains are one of the four areas identified. The

As of Tuesday, Riverside County Public Health still reported 222 total cases of COVID in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove community, with 210 recovered and four deaths, leaving eight cases currently active in the community.

County-wide, RCPH reported a total of 356,381 confirmed COVID cases (2,881 more than last week) with 5,056 deaths (15 more than last week). The county now reports 232 hospitalized COVID patients (59 fewer than last week). But ICU beds available in Riverside County have dropped from 105 to 93 during this past week. The CDC continues to rate Riverside County as a “substantial-transmission” area and is reporting that 60.1% of Riverside County’s eligible population, age 12 and up, have been fully vaccinated — but Riverside County Public Health continues to report only 52.4%.

California reported 4,631,162 total confirmed COVID cases (24,563 more than last week), with 71,182 resulting deaths (298 more than last week).

The Centers for Disease Control website reports that in August, unvaccinated persons were 12 times more likely to be hospitalized for COVID-19 compared to fully vaccinated persons, while unvaccinated persons had 11 times greater risk of dying from COVID-19.

No vaccine is 100% effective. Recall that while the vaccines were still being researched, the CDC hoped for around 75% efficacy. Instead, both Pfizer and Moderna came it at about 95% effectiveness. But 95% is not 100%.

concerned about the proclamation and did not expect it to have much effect on their customers.

Both Victor Jimenez, Fern Valley Water District, and Jerry Holdber, Pine Cove Water District, strongly vouched for the efforts of their customers already reducing water use.

“I hope the [proclamation] will bring to light that we are in a drought,” Jimenez said. “Most people up here don’t waste water.”

FVWD moved to its Water Conservation Stage 3 in September, but Jimenez said it could go to Stage 4.

At Idyllwild Water District, General Manager Leo

The CDC reports that current national seven-day moving average of daily new U.S. COVID cases has decreased 15.1% compared with last week.

From the CDC website as of Oct. 21: Nationwide, 96.3% of people ages 65 or older have received at least one dose of vaccine and 84.7% are fully vaccinated. More than three-quarters (79.5%) of people ages 18 years or older have received at least one dose of vaccine and 68.9% are fully vaccinated. For people ages 12 years or older, 77.6% have received at least one dose of vaccine and 67.2% are fully vaccinated.

Havener said the district’s wells were all at good levels and “all but one are above the average; it’s wonderful.”

Consequently, he expects soon to recommend returning to a Stage 1 from the current Stage 2 Water Emergency.

PCWD has been in Water Conservation Stage 1 for a while, which asks for voluntary conservation. Holdber said he does not recommend reassessing that until spring after the winter precipitation; unless “... the state requires us to be in a mandatory conservation mode, we would comply.

“I believe the people of Pine Cove are cutting back and continue to conserve,” he added.

others include the San Bernardino, Santa Ana, and San Gabriel mountains. The higher elevations are more likely to produce more rainfall.

The focus also will be on winter storms, not summer rainfall, according to Garrett Cammons, of North American Weather Consultants of Utah, who performed the technical studies.

Based on the analysis of weather patterns, including dry years, cloud seeding would likely increase rainfall by 3.5% to 4.5%, the largest increase being in the San Jacinto Mountains.

The total resulting stream flow would likely increase by 8,200 acre feet (AF). The greatest projected percent increase was 13.7% and this was estimated to be in the San Jacinto watershed.

The annual cost is estimated to be slightly more than \$200,000 or \$25 per AF.

Residents upset over water flow

In a time of drought, one might not think a major bone of contention to be extra water but that was the concern among residents in a Tollgate Road area at Wednesday, Oct. 20's Idyllwild Water District meeting.

The topic became heated toward IWD directors when residents wanted answers to the source of water that travels from a property on Tollgate, down Lake Lane and then pools on Meadow Lane where they live. The residents attending the meeting through Zoom were the married couple Sue Nash and Tom Paulek and their neighbors Dianne Franco, Desiree Zimmerman and Trudy Levy.

No one at the meeting disagreed that the Tollgate property was the source of the water for the last six or seven months. The residents want documented proof about IWD's claim that the source of the water is a naturally occurring artesian spring and not an IWD leak.

The residents claim the water is contaminated with algae and bird feces, and that it is slick for vehicles using Meadow Drive, therefore it is a health and safety hazard. Paulek believes it may be contaminating Strawberry Creek.

Nash accused General Manager Leo Havener of not being cooperative in providing the documentation to the neighbors. Havener claims there is no documentation to provide even though he said a field test was done proving the water is not IWD's.

At one point, Vice President Peter Szabadi, meeting on Zoom from Europe at 3 a.m., exasperatedly asked, "What is it you want us to do?" He advised the group to sue the property owner if he was not cooperating with their requests to stop the water flow.

Nash asked the board to make the GM provide a field test in writing and to instruct him to work with county, regional and state agencies to ensure no laws have been violated. The board took a "straw poll" and unanimously agreed to the requests.

At the recommendation of Havener, the board also unanimously agreed to purchase Neptune radio water meters for \$378,211, and have a contractor remove old meters and install the new ones for an estimated \$170,000. This is about \$28,000 more than the capital improvement project (CIP) budget.

Ferguson Waterworks is the water meter provider and was the second-lowest bid of four. Staff recommended this and in Havener's report to the board, he wrote, "With radio meters, staff drives by the meter with a mobile data collector to receive meter readings via radio waves. After the radio meter readings are collected, the readings will be downloaded from the radio data collector and uploaded into the district's Tyler Billing System."

Installation is expected to begin in spring 2022. Havener

No injuries in four collisions

At 3:45 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 16, Matthew Johnson, 30, of Idyllwild was driving a white 2000 Dodge Ram pickup northbound on Highway 243 30 feet south of Riverside County Playground Road at about 30 mph when he came upon a stopped blue 2012 Toyota Prius driven by Gavin Toler, 45 of Idyllwild, waiting for traffic to clear to make a left-hand turn. Unable to slow in time because of his speed, Johnson collided with the rear of the Toyota. No injuries were reported

and Idyllwild Garage towed the Toyota.

At 9 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 17, Madison Martinez Hawkins, 19, of Idyllwild, was driving a silver 2015 Hyundai Elantra eastbound on Highway 371 at about 60 mph when she failed to stop at the intersection of Highway 74 stop sign, veered to the left and lost control heading into a northeasterly direction into the north should, colliding with the embankment.

The Elantra sustained damage and was towed by Idyllwild Garage. Hawkins was not injured.

At 6:25 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 21, Joseph Sabo, 62, of Idyllwild, was driving a blue 2008 Toyota Yaris at 50 to 60 mph westbound on Highway 74 a few miles west of Pinyon Drive when he came upon a silver 2015 Ford Escape driven by Steven Gu9illory, 55, of Anza. The Ford, also traveling westbound, was stopped because of traffic conditions ahead. Sabo approached a crest in the highway, applied his brakes but was unable to avoid a collision, colliding with the rear of the Ford.

No one was injured. Valley Auto towed the vehicles.

Two collisions occurring Friday, Oct. 22, will be reported next week when they are complete and reviewed.

Comments sought for Garner Allotment Cattle Grazing Program

San Bernardino National Forest officials draft proposal Friday for continuance of grazing, including developing and implementing an Allotment Management Plan (AMP), for the Garner Allotment. The proposal, called an Environmental Assessment, for the Garner Allotment Cattle Grazing Program covers about a 14,775-acres area on the San Jacinto Ranger District.

"We're pleased to release this draft proposal, which is needed to bring the allotment into compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act using the terms of the Rescission Act," said acting San Jacinto District Ranger Jason Collier. "The proposed AMP will authorize continued grazing activities with no increase in grazing intensity compared to current conditions."

The project analysis area is the Garner Allotment, south of Mountain Center, where grazing has occurred for over 100 years. Cattle grazing would be authorized using the forest's Land Management Plan (LMP) direction to meet or move toward desired conditions.

The desired condition of the allotment is to maintain grazing opportunities and management options while ensuring that grazing is sustainable and native species are in high proportion. The long-term monitoring plots and qualitative assessments of conditions on the allotment show that existing conditions on the allotment are meeting or moving toward desired condition with current grazing management, according to the U.S. Forest Service.

The proposed AMP would allow cattle grazing of up to 1,800 head months (150 head per year) on the Garner Allotment. Allowable grazing each year would be driven by forage availability in order not to exceed forage use standards in the LMP, using rotational grazing, flexible numbers and season of use, and monitoring/adaptive management to ensure adherence.

The proposed AMP will contain the terms under which permits to graze will be issued. There will be no increase in grazing intensity compared to current conditions.

Suspect identified in I-10 chase

The suspect in last week's officer-involved shooting who died following shooting at officers and deputies in an Interstate 10 chase has been identified as Russell Leggett, 30, of Idyllwild, according to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

Leggett had a history of criminal activity.

Leggett had been arrested and charged on Sept. 23, 2021, with a felony inflicting corporal injury on a spouse or cohabitant. He was released on \$50,000 bail the following day and scheduled to appear in Riverside County Superior Court Dec. 23, 2021.

Leggett and Brian Utley, also of Idyllwild, were both arrested by deputies for their involvement with four stolen vehicles in August 2020. Leggett's charges were reduced to misdemeanor purchasing

or receiving of a stolen vehicle, trailer or motorized vessel. He pleaded guilty and was convicted and sentenced Oct. 5, 2021.

Utley's charges were reduced to misdemeanor receiving stolen property. He pleaded not guilty and has a felony settlement conference scheduled for Nov. 16.

Highway 243 was closed for several hours from Twin Pines Road to Smith Creek in Banning Thursday, Oct. 14, 2021, after Leggett shot at a Banning Police officer during a traffic stop off the highway in Banning. The gunshot struck and disabled the vehicle, according to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

Banning Police Department requested assistance from surrounding law enforcement agencies. Beaumont Police Department officers pursued Leggett who fled the scene in an older-model green station wagon heading eastbound on Interstate 10.

Beaumont Police "officers attempted to stop Leggett who failed to yield," according to the press release. "The suspect fled at a high rate of speed and a pursuit was initiated."

Sheriff's deputies joined Beaumont officers in pursuing the suspect eastbound on I-10 toward the Palm Springs area. The suspect shot several times at Beaumont officers behind him. Palm Springs Police Department was then advised of the pursuit of an armed suspect heading toward their area.

"Upon entering the Palm Springs area, the suspect exited on North Indian Canyon Drive where he ultimately stopped his vehicle on the offramp," according to the press release. An officer-involved shooting then occurred.

The sheriff's department's Special Enforcement Bureau and the Palm Springs

tain Center communities with the desert cities, e.g., Palm Desert and Palm Springs, and the rest of the desert area to Blythe.

Anza, Sage and those communities remained part of the Temecula and Murrieta district.

The fourth public submission renumbered the districts. The new District 4 spanned the county from Cherry Valley in the north to Temecula and Sage in the south. In the middle were portions of Hemet and all of the Hill areas.

At the beginning of the session, Ronak Patel, EOTC deputy county counsel, discussed the criteria for redistricting. While nearly equal population is the major criterion, the U.S. Voting Rights Act and several court cases have established other important criteria. Among these, the voting age population within a district and prohibitions on minimizing the voting strength of racial or language minority groups will be critical.

It is this analysis the EOTC will be applying to the remaining maps before presenting them to the ARC.

Throughout the board's discussion was concern about splitting cities. The most frequent occurrence of this was the location of Riverside and Jurupa, which were included in two districts.

"Almost every proposed map has three to five cities split," noted Jeffries. "How do you comply with the law and split cities?"

Supervisor Chuck Washington (District 3) raised the same question. Is complying with the Voting Rights Act a priority if it splits cities?

"If we comply with the law, I see no possibilities without splitting communities," replied Supervisor P. Manual Perez (District 5).

Phone calls require 10-digit dialing now

Effective Sunday, Oct. 24, the Federal Trade Commission is requiring a 10-digit dialed telephone call even if the area code is the same as your own.

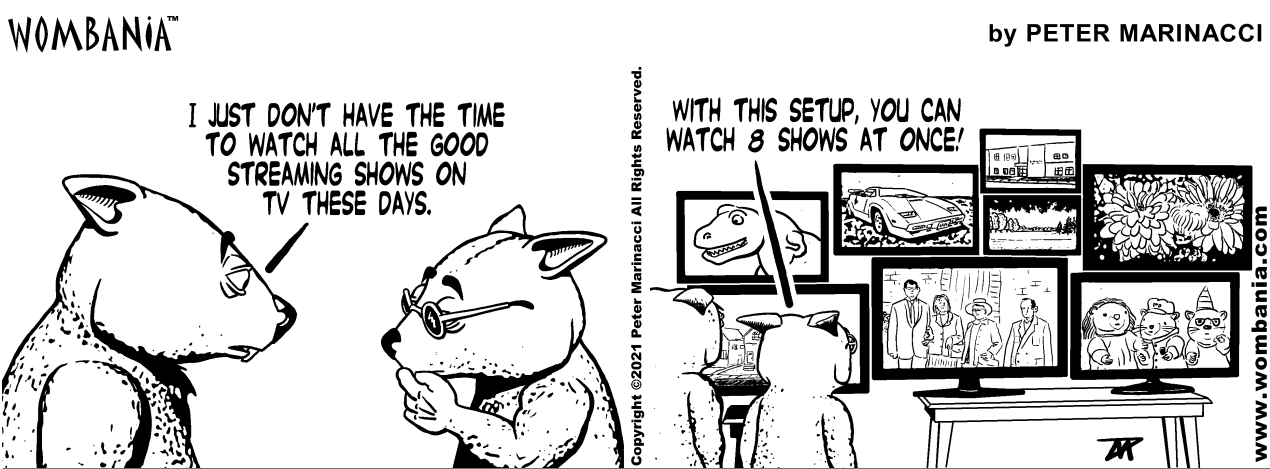
You must now enter both the three-digit area code and the seven-digit telephone number to complete the call. You will no longer be able to dial seven digits to make a local call.

In California and in Illinois area code 708, you also may be required to dial the number “1” before the area code and seven-digit phone number for local calls.

The area code 951 requires 10-digit dialing. The North American Numbering Plan Administrator has a list of the states and area codes that will be affected. Visit https://nationalnanpa.com/transition_to_10_digit_dialing_for_988/docs/NPAsRequiredtoTransitionto10DD.pdf to see which area codes are affected.\

On and after Oct. 24, local calls dialed with only seven digits may not connect, and a recording will inform you that your call cannot be completed as dialed. You must hang up and dial again using the area code and the seven-digit number.

Beginning in the early 1990s, to accommodate the growing need for more phone numbers, some areas began to add a second area code for local calls. Dialing both the area code and the seven-digit number was necessary to ensure the call reached the intended recipient. As more area codes begin to run out of new seven-digit numbers to assign, a second local area



code may be added, requiring that area to transition to 10-digit dialing.

In 2020, the FCC established “988” as the new, nationwide three-digit phone number for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. The new three-digit dialing code will be available nationwide by July 16, 2022 and will provide an easy to remember and easy to dial three-digit number to reach suicide prevention and mental health counselors, similar to “911” for emergencies and “311” for local government services.

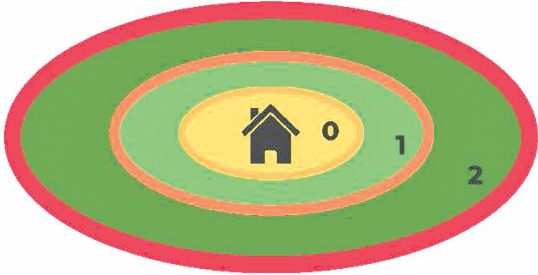

DEFENSIBLE SPACE

Keep your property lean and green to help protect your family and home.



Zone 0 – Ember-Resistant Zone

Zone 0 extends 5 feet from buildings, structures, decks, etc.

The ember-resistant zone is currently not required by law, but science has proven it to be the most important of all the defensible space zones. This zone includes the area under and around all attached decks, and requires the most stringent wildfire fuel reduction. The ember-resistant zone is designed to keep fire or embers from igniting materials that can spread the fire to your home.

- Use hardscape like gravel, pavers, concrete and other noncombustible mulch materials. No combustible bark or mulch
- Remove all dead and dying weeds, grass, plants, shrubs, trees, branches and vegetative debris (leaves, needles, cones, bark, etc.); Check your roofs, gutters, decks, porches, stairways, etc.
- Remove all branches within 10 feet of any chimney or stovepipe outlet
- Limit plants in this area to low growing, nonwoody, properly watered and maintained plants
- Limit combustible items (outdoor furniture, planters, etc.) on top of decks
- Relocate firewood and lumber to Zone 2
- Replace combustible fencing, gates, and arbors attach to the home with noncombustible alternatives
- Consider relocating garbage and recycling containers outside this zone
- Consider relocating boats, RVs, vehicles and other combustible items outside this zone

Zone 1 – Lean, Clean and Green Zone

Zone 1 extends 30 feet from buildings, structures, decks, etc. or to your property line, whichever is closer.

- Remove all dead plants, grass and weeds (vegetation).
- Remove dead or dry leaves and pine needles from your yard, roof and rain gutters.
- Remove branches that hang over your roof and keep dead branches 10 feet away from your chimney.
- Trim trees regularly to keep branches a minimum of 10 feet from other trees.
- Relocate wood piles to Zone 2.
- Remove or prune flammable plants and shrubs near windows.
- Remove vegetation and items that could catch fire from around and under decks, balconies and stairs.
- Create a separation between trees, shrubs and items that could catch fire, such as patio furniture, wood piles, swing sets, etc.

Zone 2 – Reduce Fuel Zone

Zone 2 extends from 30 feet to 100 feet out from buildings, structures, decks, etc. or to your property line, whichever is closer.

- Cut or mow annual grass down to a maximum height of 4 inches.
- Create horizontal space between shrubs and trees. (See diagram)
- Create vertical space between grass, shrubs and trees. (See diagram)
- Remove fallen leaves, needles, twigs, bark, cones, and small branches. However, they may be permitted to a depth of 3 inches.
- All exposed wood piles must have a minimum of 10 feet of clearance, down to bare mineral soil, in all directions.

Plant and Tree Spacing

The spacing between grass, shrubs, and trees is crucial to reduce the spread of wildfires. The spacing needed is determined by the type and size of brush and trees, as well as the slope of the land. For example, a property on a steep slope with larger vegetation requires greater spacing between trees and shrubs than a level property that has small, sparse vegetation.

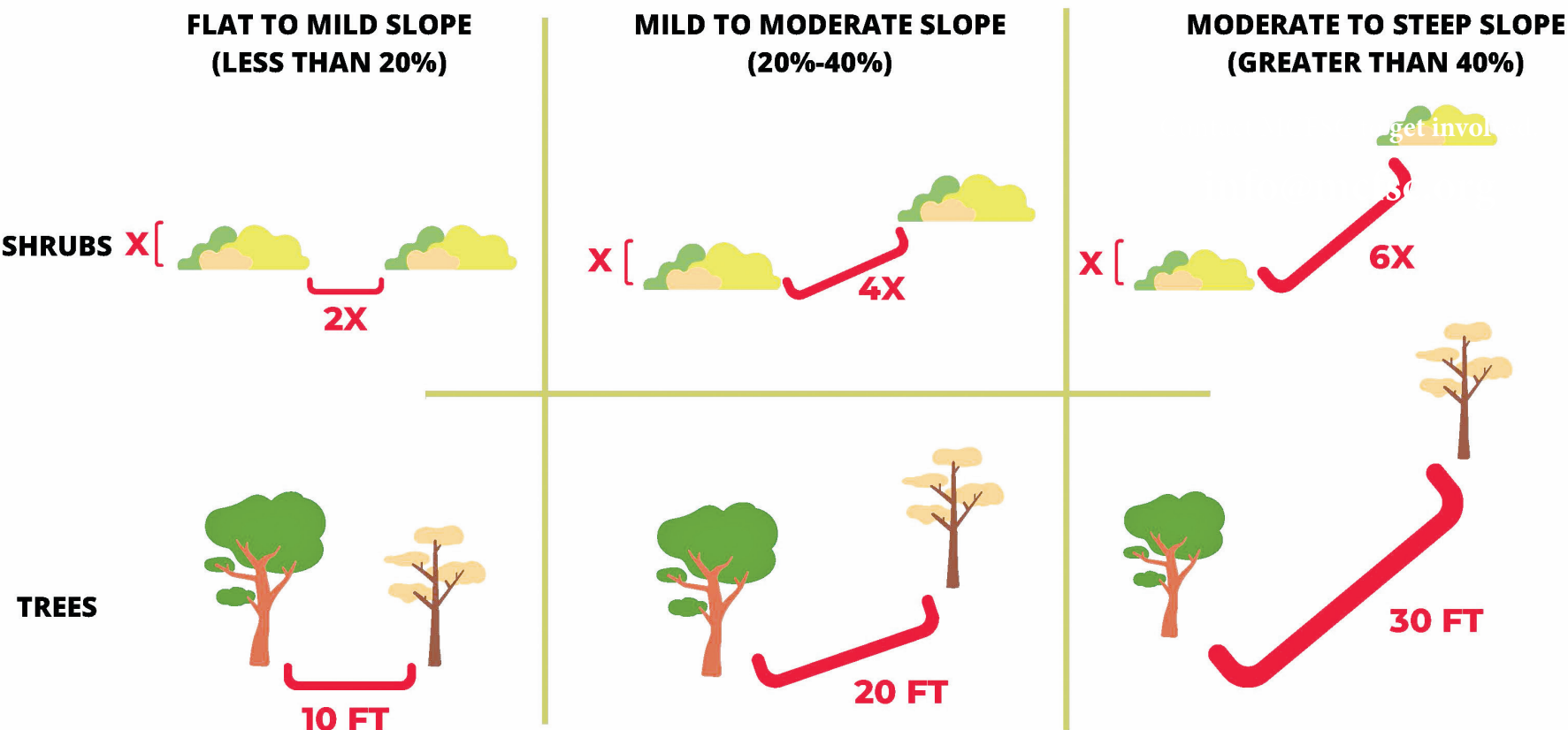
Vertical Spacing

Remove all tree branches at least 6 feet from the ground. Allow extra vertical space between shrubs and trees. Lack of vertical space can allow a fire to move from the ground to the brush to the treetops like a ladder. This leads to more intense fire closer to your home. To determine the proper vertical spacing between shrubs and the lowest branches of trees, use the formula below.



Horizontal Spacing

Horizontal spacing depends on the slope of the land and the height of the shrubs or trees. Check the chart below to determine spacing distance.

‘The Birds’ will attack at the Rustic Theatre

“The Birds” are coming to the Rustic Theatre, in time for Halloween. Idyllwild Actors Theatre President and Founder Suzanne Avalon promises a “really fun, scary experience” when the group presents a stage adaptation of Daphne de Maurier’s famous tale of birds gone bad and the people they try to murder.

Since its inception in 2003, Avalon has produced over 75 IAT plays. She and Director Kathleen Walker were able to give the Town Crier a bit of background about their team and the work that went into “hatching” this production.

TC: “What led you to choose ‘The Birds’?”

Avalon: “I wanted to do something around Halloween. I’ve always loved the work of the playwright Conor McPherson. He is a wonderful wordsmith who can put an audience on the edge of their seats. Its post-apocalyptic; a cataclysmic event has happened and the birds have taken over, a few people are trying to survive, trapped inside. I think there’s a parallel with COVID.”

Walker: “It has an existential quality: Who is more threatening, the birds outside or the people inside? It is written by the great Irish playwright Conor McPherson (‘The Weir,’ ‘The Seafarer,’ ‘Shining City’) who writes terror very well. He is ever-intense.

“This play is the third attempt at ‘The Birds,’ [after De Maurier’s book and Hitchcock’s film] now set in New England. It’s a short play, 1-1/2 hours ... three characters trapped in a cabin while homicidal birds try to get at them.

“How do we act under intense pressure? Why do we start feeding on each other when the birds hit the fan? What is this inability to respond to disaster? Why can’t we just work together?”

“We have worked really hard on this show to make it vibrant, peppered with humanity and humor. It’s not just one note. There is laughter, suspense and terror.”

TC: “What is your role as producer?”

Avalon: “Choosing and acquiring [performance rights of the] play, marketing and fundraising — the nuts and bolts of getting the right people together to make the play what it should be. I always surround myself with people who know more than I do. Not just actors; director, designers, stage managers. A lot of the designers are members of the board. Luckily the company is comprised of very experienced talented people, professionals.”

TC: “Tell us about the team.”

Avalon: “We are fortunate to have Kathleen Walker as director of ‘The Birds.’ Her directing is pure magic. Jacob Teel is not only a talented actor but a great set designer.

Goldie Hoffman is a professional actress/comedian, and both Devin Price and Robert Norman have long histories in theater. The fifth character is the sound effects, the genius of Brian Parnell [Throw the Goat, Audiowild]. The lighting design by Kim Negrete is also compelling.”

Walker: “It’s going to be a knock-out show. One of IAT’s best — strong acting ensemble, it’s a psychological thriller.”

Walker has been with IAT for five years. She received a master’s degree in fine arts at Pennsylvania State, did a brief stint at Julliard, and also studied at the Neighborhood Playhouse in New York. She has worked as an actress off-Broadway and with a touring classical repertoire company across the country.

When asked about her work as a director, Walker said: “I know how to work with actors; that’s my strength. This production has been a wonderful collaborative production; the actors and I have worked together to find what works. Not just me barking out orders — brainstorming. As an actor myself, I know how important it is to get at what motivates the character. You have to have the humility to listen to your actors.”

In response to concerns from theater goers, a separate mask-only section will be available. The Rustic Theatre owners will continue to use [their] UV filtration and sanitize after every show and the high touch areas throughout the day. Plenty of seats are available.

“The Birds” will attack at 7 p.m. Friday, Oct. 29, and at 1 and 7 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 30. This is the first time in many years that IAT has offered a matinee.

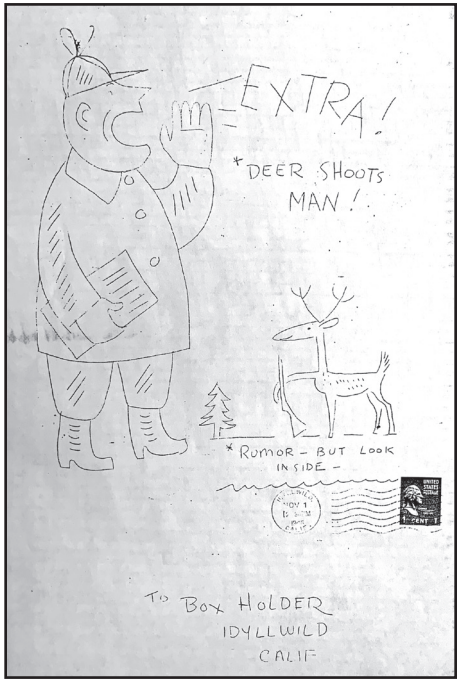

Idyllwild Town Crier celebrates 75 years of continuous publication

The Idyllwild Town Crier has been serving the San Jacinto Mountains (“the Hill”) continuously for 75 years — since its first issue was published on Nov. 1, 1946.

Ernie and Betty Maxwell founded the paper in the attic of their home, using a typewriter and a table-top mimeograph machine. The first issue, pictured here, was four pages long — two sheets of legal-sized paper mimeographed on both sides. Ernie’s artwork, including the “Town Crier” flag, embellished the first issue, and hand-drawn headlines became a staple of issues that followed. The Maxwells moved the



Town Crier into a small, stone building on upper Pine Crest at Four Corners. Ernie sometimes wrote of the trials and the tribulations of being the publisher-editor of a community newspaper.

In 1957, the Maxwells sold the paper to Mark Clevenger and Gersh Rosen, who introduced a tabloid size, Varityper printed headlines, and offset printing and photos, but who operated the Town Crier for only 15 months before selling it back to the Maxwells.

The Maxwells owned the newspaper for another 13 years, returning to hand-drawn headlines, before selling the paper again, this time in 1972 to Luther and Marilyn Weare, who owned it for six years before selling it in 1978 to L.B. and Dorothy Hunsaker. At that time the paper was still being assembled by hand using wax on camera-ready, pasteboard galleys that were driven off the Hill to a printer.

After Dorothy died in 1989, L.B. sold the Town Crier to the Chronicle Publishing Company in San Francisco, a California corporation that owned it for five years. The Chronicle installed Bostonian Carole Brennan as publisher-editor, and she introduced computer-generated pages and a modular layout. She also moved the Town Crier into a building that is now the Idyllwild Health Center, nearly across from Forest Lumber. Three years later, Brennan returned to Boston and was replaced as publisher-editor by another Bostonian, Gary Hutner, who edited the paper for the Chronicle for two more years.

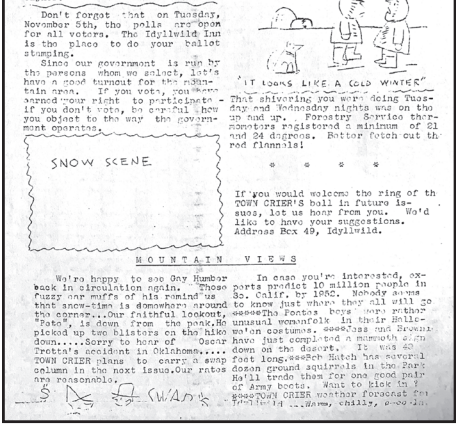
In 1994, the Chronicle sold the paper to Idyllwild Publications Inc., a California corporation that was wholly

owned by Tindle Newspapers Ltd. of Farnham, England. Sir Ray Tindle, who owned the controlling interest in that company, also operated hundreds of community newspapers and radio stations, but this was his only newspaper outside of the United Kingdom.

Tindle purchased the old U.S. Forest Service building, which is now the location of Shiloh Christian Ministries, and Hutner stayed on as Town Crier publisher-editor at that location for another two years.

In 1996, Becky Clark, who had started with the paper as night typesetter under L.B. Hunsaker, became publisher-editor of the Town Crier and held that post for 13 years, retiring in 2009.

In 2009, Grace Reed, former advertising sales manager, became publisher, and JP Crumrine, former reporter, became editor and they continued for the next three and a half years. In 2013, Idyllwild House Publishing Co. Ltd., a California corporation wholly owned by Jack and Becky Clark, purchased the Town Crier. Becky resumed as publisher-editor and the Town Crier was moved to a location in Oakwood Village for a year, then moved to the old Ponderosa building on North Circle Drive, where Miss Sunshine’s packaging/shipping location is now.



In 2015, Jack Clark became co-publisher with her, also serving as general counsel from 2016 to early 2021. The paper switched to a broadsheet size, for economy and for better quality and more consistent printing and photos. The entire newspaper industry had been hit hard by the stock market crashing in 2008 and real estate bottoming in 2009 — and the Town Crier was no exception. The Clarks introduced several changes to attract advertising, including a 25% cut in ad pricing, free color, bundling discounts, keeping open on weekends as a Visitors Center, and even more than doubling circulation by distributing “free to the Hill.”

In 2017, the Town Crier adopted a Membership model similar to that of National Public Radio, but without non-profit, tax-deductible benefits. Our Members have played a major role in keeping the Town Crier serving our Hill community.

When COVID hit in 2020, almost the entire TC staff began working from home, and the Town Crier down-

History came alive in Idyllwild with the first area historical reenactment camp that local resident Steve Woods organized.

20 years ago - 2001
Construction was underway on a sound stage for the new Idyllwild Arts Moving Pictures Department.

15 years ago - 2006
The community was

deeply mourning the deaths of five firefighters, members of Alandale Guard Station Crew 57, whose lives were lost while fighting the Esperanza Fire.

10 years ago - 2011
On Tahquitz Peak, a 21-year-old climber had fallen 60 feet and suffered an ankle injury.

5 years ago - 2016
Idyllwild honored the memory of the five Esperanza firefighters the deadly wildfire took on its 10-year anniversary at the site in Twin Pines.

1 year ago - 2020
Idyllwild Arts Academy students presented works they were unable to show last spring due to the COVID pandemic — the "Lost Works" — during a special Zoom session.

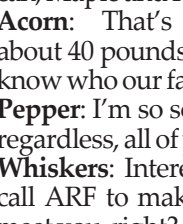

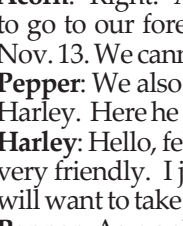
