Tree Lighting festivities announced

Idyllwild's Tree Lighting Ceremony, to be held Saturday, Nov. 27, will honor traditions old and new.

This year's traditional festivities include two live entertainment stages, numerous activities, snack and gift booths local nonprofit groups will manage, roaming costume characters, three food vendors and a sleigh for family photos. The booths will open at 2 p.m., live entertainment will begin at 4 p.m. and the trees will be lit around 5:15 p.m. by the lucky winner of the "Flip the Switch" raffle (tickets will be on sale that afternoon in Idypark from 2 to 5 p.m.).

Also, Santa and Mrs. Claus will arrive courtesy of an Idyllwild Fire Department fire truck at the Village Centre gazebo for free visits from 1 to 3 p.m. and from 4 to 6 p.m. Mayor Max and his dedicated staff also will be available to greet visitors at the event.

Following a newer tradition begun in 2019, the Idyllwild Community Center (ICC), which manages the event, will light all eight trees in Idypark rather than just a single tree, as was done previously. This year's tree donors, whose financial sponsorships primarily pay for the event, are Ferro Restaurant, Idyllwild Brewpub, Idyllwild Inn, Idyllwild Heating and Cooling, the Idyllwild Association of Realtors and Ground Floor Design Inc. (the local architect of ICC's pending new community center building that will be located next to the Idyllwild Community Playground). Piño Tree Service also will have a tree in appreciation for its efforts to put up and remove the lights.

The largest tree, however, will be designated this year in honor of Doug Austin, aka "Mr. Idyllwild," who sadly passed earlier this month. Austin, who was well known throughout the Hill communities for his many years of service, generosity, kindness and wit, also was a regular participant in the annual Tree Lighting program with his engaging rendition of "Twas the Night Before Christmas" with the Olde English Players.
Individual donations to ICC sponsored this tree,

with any added funds raised to be donated to local nonprofit organizations as directed by Austin's family. Funds may be donated throughout the holiday season via ICC's website (idyllwildcommunitycenter.org) or by mail (Idyllwild Community Center, P.O. Box 1770).

Hill may have two supervisors in two years

Depending upon the results of the county's supervisorial redistricting, Idyllwild, Pine Cove and the rest of the Hill communities may have two supervisors from 2023 to 2025.

In preparation for creating new boundaries for the supervisorial districts, the board of supervisors also had to repeal Ordinance 813 that officially set the current boundaries.

On Nov. 16, the board voted unanimously to repeal the current boundaries. This action will be effective in 30 days. Currently, the board plans to approve the new district boundaries at either its Dec. 7 or 14 meeting.

Even though the board will approve new boundaries either with a resolution or ordinance, they are not effective immediately. California Elections Code section 21506 states, "The term of office of any supervisor who has been elected and whose term of office has not expired shall not be affected by any change in the boundaries of the district from which the supervisor was elected."

The terms for implementing the new boundaries, according to the Elections Code, are: "At the first election for county supervisors in each county following adoption of the boundaries of supervisorial districts, ... a supervisor shall be elected for each district under the new district plan that has the same district number as a district whose incumbent's term is due to expire.

The Riverside County supervisorial elections are staggered. All five supervisors are not elected in the same election. For example, Supervisor Chuck Washington represents District 3 that includes all the Hill communities. He was reelected last November for a term that expires January 2025. The same is true for Supervisor Kevin Jeffries, who represents District 1.

However, the supervisors for districts 2, 4 and 5 will be elected in November 2022 and for full terms beginning January 2023. Voters in that election will be assigned according to the new district boundaries for those three districts. But supervisors Jeffries and Washington will continue to represent their current constituents within their current boundaries until January 2025.

For example, if the new district boundaries shift the Hill areas to District 4, for two years — from January 2023 until January 2025 — they would be represented by both Washington and the District 4 supervisor.

Or the opposite, the new district boundaries might shift some cities or communities into districts 1 or 3 from districts 2, 4 or 5. Since the supervisors elected in 2022 represent the constituents within the new district boundaries and supervisors Washington and Jeffries continue to represent their current constituents, these areas would technically have no representation, according to county Counsel Gregory Priamos.

"There may be a period of time where there is overlap and we will have individuals represented by both, under the old boundaries and the new boundaries," Priamos told the board. "And there may be a period of time where individuals may not be represented...

"An anomaly within the election code," Priamos opined.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

State coronavirus relief and county staff test positive

As of Monday morning, the Dashboard of the Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) reported recently confirmed cases (last two weeks) of COVID at Idyllwild School as being 1 student and no staff members, i.e., 0.33% of its combined student/staff population. At Hemet High, ten students and two staff members are reported as confirmed cases, which is 0.46% of its student/staff popula-

The HUSD Dashboard states: "Positive cases will appear on the Dashboard for 14 days from the date they are reported and then will be removed after the 14th day." So, HUSD's rolling Dashboard does not report the cumulative confirmed cases throughout the district, but rather those cases confirmed as being active during the previous

As of Monday, Riverside County Public Health (RCPH) reported 232 total cases of COVID in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove community (one more than last week), with 224 recovered and four deaths, leaving four cases currently active in our community (one fewer than last week).

County-wide, as of November 20, RCPH reported a total of 365,809 confirmed COVID cases (3,849 more than

last week) with 5,265 deaths (113 more than last week). The county reports 259 hospitalized COVID patients (18 fewer than last week). The number of available ICU beds in Riverside County is 104 (15 more than last week)

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has downgraded Riverside County from a "High" to a "Substantial" transmission area and is reporting that 62.1% of Riverside County's eligible population, age 12 and up, have been "fully vaccinated," i.e., not including boosters). RCPH is currently reporting that 63.9% of the population ages 18 and up and 79.9% of the population ages 65 and up have been fully vaccinated. Go to https:// rivcoph.org/COVID-19-Vaccine-with-Registration schedule vaccinations.

As of November 21, California reported 4,758,297 total confirmed COVID cases (51,119 more than last week), with 73,000 resulting deaths (1,021 more than last week).

On November 17, the CDC reported that current national 7-day moving average of daily new U.S. COVID cases is 88,482, up 16.1% from last week.

From the CDC website: A recent study of children under age 18 found that — of those actually hospitalized with COVID-45% had no underlying medical conditions, and one in three hospitalized children were admitted to ICU or placed on a ventilator. The CDC warns: "These results show that children can be severely affected

CDC urges: "Widespread vaccination for COVID-19 remains a critical tool to best protect everyone, especially those at highest risk, from severe illness and death.

CDC recommends everyone ages 5 years and older get a COVID-19 vaccine to help protect against COVID-19. Vaccinating children ages 5 years and older can help keep them in school and safely participate in sports, playdates, and other group activities. Vaccinating children can also help protect family members, including siblings who are not eligible for vaccination and family members who may be at increased risk of getting very sick if they are infected. ... To find a vaccination site near you, visit vaccines.gov; text your ZIP code to 438829 (GETVÁX); OR CALL 1-800-232-0233.

Nationwide, 99.5% of people aged 65 and older have received at least one dose of vaccine, and 86.2% are "fully vaccinated," i.e., have received both doses of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines or a single dose of the J&J vaccine. More than three-quarters (81.7%) of people aged 18 years and older have received at least one dose of vaccine and 70.7% are fully vaccinated. Regarding persons aged 12 years and older, 79.8% have received at least one dose of vaccine and 68.9% are fully vaccinated.

Additionally, as of last Friday, booster doses are now available for all adults 18 years of age and older beginning six months after becoming fully vaccinated. Those who received the J&J shot can receive a booster, as well, since the CDC has authorized boosters of a different manufacturer than the original vaccination. As of November 17, the CDC reports that nationwide more than 195.6 million persons are "fully vaccinated," while about 31.5 million have received the additional booster dose.

Supervisors narrowing down redistricting map

As the process for redistricting the Riverside County supervisorial districts approaches a conclusion next month, the board of supervisors agreed to three maps for consideration. The Executive Office's Technical Committee crafted two of these (F and H) and the third (Community Map 1.3) was a public submission.

During the review and analysis of the various maps, each has been modified slightly to improve various criteria such as population equality or protection of minority voting rights. The current version of each map is not the original presentation. One map has had six previous versions.

The difference between the largest potential district and the smallest is 0.59% for the Community Map and about 5% for maps F and H. However, county counsel stated that courts have typically allowed a spread of 10% between the largest and smallest district.

The committee's counsel, Ronak Patel, told the board that each map does create more than one district with a majority population composed of minorities. Potentially two districts are in maps F and H and possibly three districts if the Community Map is chosen.

However, the number of cities and communities that will be split between at least two districts are greatest for the Community Map.

Potential placement of Hill communities

In maps F and H, Pine Cove, Idyllwild, Mountain Center and a portion of Garner Valley to just south of Lake Hemet would be assigned to District 4. Anza, Sage and Aguanga would remain in District 3.

Supervisor V. Manuel Perez indicated his preference for these assignments given the breadth of District 4, east to the Colorado River.

The Community Map creates a geographically larger District 3. It would stretch from the county's southern border, Temecula and Menifee, all the way to the northern border, including Calimesa and Cherry Valley. In the middle of this district is Valle Vista and East Hemet, along with Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Mountain Center and south to the Anza line. While Sage remains in District 3, Anza and Aguanga are shifted to District 4.

Board discussion

Before agreeing on three maps, the Brown and Black Alliance pleaded to have its map reconsidered. The alliance acknowledged its problems that the board noted in the previous hearing, but the map's designee admitted she made the errors in its submission. A revised map had a smaller population spread and still two minority-majority districts.

While favoring priority for voting rights issues, the alliance's map split too many cities and communities to satisfy the board's priority for cohesiveness where pos-

"Somebody is going to be split, somewhere it's just going to happen," said Supervisor Kevin Jeffries (Disas we can while respecting the Voting Rights Act.

In agreement with his colleague, Supervisor Chuck Washington (District 3) urged that the board "tweak" each map "... to a point where we have the strongest case to make that we are being supportive of the Voting Rights Act as well as we're doing our best to keep as many communities together."

Slightly more pessimistic, Perez noted, "At the end of

the day, no one is going to be happy and we know that already. And at the end of the day, we're going to face litigation, no matter which way we go."

He then expressed his preference for the Community Map that keeps the Pass area together. It was then he commented on moving the Hill communities to Dis-

Jeffries stressed that this map splits a number of communities "... in an attempt to address a unique requirement in the Voting Rights Act." And he added, "I want to give it extra consideration if it can be massaged to meet most of objectives we have to con-

The vote was four in favor of maps F, H and Comtrict 1). "I favor we hold as many communities together munity Map 1.3 and Supervisor Jeff Hewitt (District 5) opposed. He voted "No" because of his preference for Map G rather than F.

Map F completely separates Moreno Valley and Perris, and we heard a lot from that community," he explained. "I think G is better than F."

IWD customer asks that districts meet on drought

Idyllwild Water District (IWD) directors have been meeting outside their office since August of this year while the board room has been gutted and remodeled following discovery of problems. Last Wednesday, Nov. 17, the board was back in the board room that is nearly complete. Eric Townsend Construction remodeled the room. Still to be completed includes more audio/visual equipment installation.

Zoom meetings, which the board approved again, along with teleconferencing, in compliance with a governor mandate during COVID-19, is challenging for anyone on the Zoom call as the sound is intermittent.

Director Peter Szabadi expressed concern about Gov. Gavin Newsom's recent drought emergency declaration to reduce usage. President Charles Schelly said, "The more water used uphill [in Fern Valley and Pine Cove], the less we have downhill.

IWD customer Sue Nash said she believed the order requires that all three water districts should get together. Schelly said he was in agreement and asked if the GM would approach the other districts.

IWD General Manager Leo Havener said in response to a question from former Director Dave Hunt, that Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority (SAWPA) will make a presentation to the board on its cloud-seeding project at its Dec. 8 meeting. SAWPA also is doing at the Lake Hemet Water District's Dec. 16 meeting.

In his GM report, Havener expressed concern about the governor's approval of AB 1346 that phases out new, small, off-road gas-powered vehicles by 2035 and new medium- to heavy-duty gas-powered vehicles by 2045. The goal is to seek 100% zero emission, "where feasible." He complained that this will be problematic for the district.

He reported that district revenues since July 1 (fiscal year)

are \$2,245,451 vs. \$2,048,642 in expenses. This breaks down as \$1,547,972 in water revenue and \$1,351,163 in water expenses; and \$697,479 in wastewater revenue and \$408,155 in waste-

He reported that water usage is at an average, showing a chart of usage in October 2021 of 21.5 acre feet (AF) vs. 20.2 AF average over a period of 2011 to 2021.

IWD has submitted all required documents to the state's COVID-19 Water Arrearages Payment Program. The program is designed to cover customers' inability to make water payments due to COVID but Havener said "... we don't know how much the state is going to give IWD."

He also told the board that a lien for non-payment on an Upper Pine Crest Avenue property that sold resulted in IWD being paid \$16,000.

Äfter his report, Scott Mano with Rogers, Anderson, Malody and Scott LLP, reported on the 2020-2021 fiscal year audit, saying the firm's financials were fairly presented, in all material respects, therefore giving the highest standard of an unmodified opinion.

Director Steve Olsen asked him if IWD was in violation of government code on going over how much money can be put into the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). Mano told him government code has no restrictions. IWD's own "investment policy would be more restrictive," he told Olsen.

Szabdi expressed concern about IWD's pension and health care increasing. "Is that concern for you?" he asked Mano. "Yes, you don't have a pension plan," said Mano. "I'm concerned you're not funding that liability in any way." He advised the board to consider a prefund under the Internal Revenue Code's Section 115 that is 100% restricted and increases the discount rate to reduce the liability. Pine Cove Water District also is considering this at the first of the year with a presentation about the California Employees Pension Prefunding Trust under California Public Employees' Retirement System.

The board unanimously approved the audit.

What was supposed to be a five-minute discussion on short-term rentals (STRs) and their impact on water turned into a long debate. Szabadi wanted the board to write to the county supervisors that IWD is concerned as the supervisors work through the revision of Ordinance 927 regarding STR

Olsen said he believes the district "should focus its efforts on having enough water than taking a position on STRs ... I set that aside when I put on this hat.'

Szabadi said we're "not taking a position." He argued that he's not against STRs but is concerned about their impact on water supplies.

Olsen pointed out that water usage is not climbing. The debate continued among the directors with the board and GM agreeing that IWD did not have enough data. Havener agreed with Schelly that the new meters that will begin being installed in March over the course of three to four months would provide better data.

The board eventually agreed to have the $G\!M$ send a letter to the supervisors say it supports conservation and enforcement of STR regulations. IWD General Counsel Joe Byrne cautioned the board about making that decision under a discussion vs. action item.

In another discussion item, next year, IWD will try to attain California Special District Association certifications of transparency. IWD staff and directors will need to go through much training and demonstrations before receiving the four certifications.

The board unanimously approved \$66,066 to purchase and install Renova Energy solar panels on the office. The payback is expected to take 11.9 years with a net revenue of \$147,228 over the 30-year life span of the panels.

A closed session was held with real property negotiators regarding 25201 and 25305 Fern Valley Road properties. Schelly later reported out that no action was taken.

Lake Hemet is at half its capacity

Lake Hemet Municipal Water District General Manager Mike Gow's report to the board of directors Thursday had

Lake Hemet, which supplies some water to East Hemet and Valle Vista areas, is at half its capacity. The district is buying Eastern Municipal Water District's raw, imported water and LHMWD's well 17 is being used. These sources are supplying irrigation water to those areas.

The lake's dam height is 135 feet and the lake level was 117.4 feet Nov. 10. The lake's full capacity is 12,775 acre-feet but was at 6,651 acre-feet Nov. 10.

Gow reported that July 2021's rainfall was 0.36 inches for a total of 6.94 inches between Oct. 1, 2020 and Sept. 30, 2021. August and September of this year saw no recordable rainfall.

The Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority will make a presentation to the board on its cloud-seeding project at its December meeting, as it is doing at the Idyllwild Water District's Dec. 8 meeting.

SAWPA is requesting \$10,000 from LHMWD for the project in fiscal year 2022-23.

FVWD moves closer to rain capture rebates

At last Friday's meeting, the Fern Valley Water District (FVWD) board held a long discussion on the proposed rain capture rebate program directors Walt Bonneau Jr. and Jon Brown prepared since the last meeting.

Ultimately, the directors decided to send the program documents back for revision to make it clearer that the program is strictly designed for irrigation and not for potable water so the connections on customers' properties must be separate so FVWD's potable water does not become contaminated.

Bonneau said the program will become effective March 1 to give the board time to perfect the document.

Some of the discussion revolved around whether to allow pre-existing containers to be allowed. Director Robert Krieger said, "Every tank ought to be inspected," but Brown countered, "We don't do that out of risk of liability . Let's not be over strict about what kind of tank."

General Manager Victor Jimenez said, "We can go on site to inspect pipes for cross-connection problems." Eventually



the debate resulted in all directors agreeing to allow them.

One-time rebates in the proposed program are:

- \$200 for 1,000-5,000-gallon cisterns
- \$200 for 200-250-gallon containers • \$175 for 150-199-gallon containers
- \$100 for 100-149-gallon containers
- \$65 for 50-99-gallon containers

Shutting down STRs not the intent

Dear Editor:

I attended the information meeting on rapid shortterm rental growth organized by Idyllwild Neighbors 4 Neighborhoods with representatives from fire and sheriff as speakers.

Some takeaways ...

- is not looking to shut down STRs;
- wants to limit the number of STRs to preserve residential neighborhoods from being overwhelmed/transformed into commercial sites as is currently happening;
- supports Idyllwild full-time residents continuing to provide rental accommodations on their own proper-
- seeks increased enforcement of current regulations/strengthening of regulations to protect residents' peaceful inhabitation of their own homes, including in regard to noise, light, traffic, trash, emergency and fire-safety ordinances.

I appreciated hearing the sheriff and fire departments' concerns on the increase in STRs due to additional resources required to continue to provide adequate services to the community. I also appreciated the opportunity of two-minute questions/comments by any audience member, including those with different opinions. (Although the meeting was publicized in advance, no one had contacted the organizers asking to be included as speakers to offer their views.)

The organizers expected to share Riverside County's draft revision of the new STR code for public input, but the county had not met its own October deadline to complete it, so that was not available. Folk were encouraged to contact the county's website to get updated in-

Other facts/information presented:

- Over 1,000 residents have already signed the Idyllwild N4N's petition to the county;
- Idyllwild now has 63% of all STRs in Riverside County (documented by Riverside County grand jury
 - The county's very low fee to conduct business as an

STR does not directly benefit the Idyllwild community or enforcement;

- STRs owned by non-residents/investors from off the Hill (L.A., Hemet, San Diego and other areas), many who have multiple rental units, pose a particular concern as they may be more difficult to contact, may not have full knowledge of local fire/safety issues and often appear to be less interested in residents' basic quality of life concerns;
- Other nearby towns/counties have imposed limits on STRs in residential areas due to findings that too many STRs in residential areas decrease the quality of life for residents.

Overall, I found the information presented very useful.

Silver iodide is a heavy toxic metal, and is harmful to plants and aquatic life, as well as mammals. Wildlife drinking from creeks fed by the runoff from cloud-seeded rain and snow is also at risk.

Our wells and aquifers are replenished by natural water sources such as rain and the accumulation of snow. No one knows how silver iodide would affect our health if it was found in our drinking water.

A variety of rain capture containers can include barrels, tanks, drums, intermediate bulk containers (IBC) totes and cisterns.

A FVWD customer wrote to the board, "My experience with collecting and using rain water on our property has been small benefit ..." She asked FVWD to encourage customers to create rain gardens to direct water into natural, shallow basin areas to let it "drain back into the water table."

But directors Gary Erb, Bonneau and President Richard Schnetzer all said they have had beneficial experi-

ences with their capture programs.

Bonneau expressed concern that a shallow water basin could populate mosquitoes.

Schnetzer pointed out that the "water does go back into the ground when we water our plants."

In other discussion, Bonneau warned that propane prices are rising and that "it might be a good time to top off our tanks."

Schnetzer asked if FVWD was still making chlorine purchases with the other district.

Jimenez said he would need to meet with them again since Idyllwild Water District changed general managers and Pine Cove's GM Jerry Holldber is retiring at the end of the year.



'Dreams' artist winners announced

Idyllwild Arts Academy presented its annual themed exhibition Friday, Nov. 12. The third of the year's eight planned art exhibitions, it is always the most popular with students. The students as a group decide upon a theme and collaborate in writing a statement. Only then can the individual artists begin work. All students taking visual art classes are invited to submit, and so members of all disciplines are represented in the works selected for the exhibit.

The theme statement speaks of the "isolation, pain and disconnect" of the pandemic and of their dreams, at once seemingly further from reach and inescapable. The works reflect this duality of dreams, at the same time profound and essential and evanescent and untouchable.

The works included painting, drawing, sculpture, electronic media, printmaking and photography. It is an old saw that some paintings "seem to reach out" of the frame to touch us, but here some of the works, incorporating elements of sculpture, really did that.

The show is juried, and this year, due to COVID restrictions, the jurist was a "virtual" judge, evaluating the works and artists' statements on-line. This year's jurist, Becky Alley, is a lecturer at the University of Kentucky, Lexington. An experienced artist, teacher and curator, she judged the works on their skill, conception and choice of materials.

The gallery was packed with students, faculty and parents as awards were announced for seven outstand-

Junior Yoohyun Marie Jeon's "Day Dream" was one of the honorable mentions. The giant fighting fish seem to hang in the air, unnerving in the detail of their diaphanous fins, as a smaller human figure haunts the back-

Fatima Guzman, a senior whose works have appeared in theme exhibits all four years, received an Honorable Mention for her linoeum print "Hey." Like many of the artists, she depicted a figure surrounded by watchful eves.

The third honorable mention went to senior Ela Bosworth for her series of gelatin silver print photographs evoking childhood fears.

Third place was awarded to Adrian Wang for "Pino," a whimsical and surreal essay in vertigo-inducing exaggerated perspective.

Second place went to sophomore Jiho Kim's "Reflection," praised by the jurist for its "gorgeous" rendering of a plastic bag. You have to see it in person to understand this. It hovers between painterly and photo-realistic.

First place went to sophomore Lucy Park for her "Conception" that mixes elements of traditional Korean art and folklore with a modern technique and sense of self. The work invokes the Korean idea of conception dreams that foretell a birth to a mother or other family

Brendan Steele fired under-par golf at The RSM Classic in Sea Island, Georgia last week, posting a 4-under-par 66-69-74-69 — 278 to finish in a tie for 51st place. Some 156 pro golfers had begun play on Thursday.

The Idyllwild native pounded drives averaging 301 yards into 75% of the fairways, allowing him to hit 73.6% of the greens in regulation. However, he averaged dropping about 1.26 strokes to the field per round with the putter.

Brendan now stands in 20th place on the PGA's FedEx-Cup points list, and he now is ranked 104th in the Official World Golf Rankings

Brendan is not playing this week, and Steele superfan, André Pilon of Montreal, reports that B has indicated he doesn't expect to play again until after the first of the year. We should especially look forward to him playing in January in the Sony Open in Hawaii, where he has finished second and tied for fourth during the last two years.



The characters each find something they need within themselves, and each other, although it is not always what they thought they were seeking. And we find out quite a bit about Shuroo as the process unfolds, or goes off the rails. In the end, there is the matter of a day of reckoning for the charlatan ... or is there?

These mountain highways have a "cameo" appearance in the film as a stand-in for the winding roads of upstate New York, a role they have played before. Having wrapped the filming on location and begun editing, they needed to interweave sweeping long shots of Schaeffer's voyage to the retreat. Drone "pick up" footage of Highway 243 saved the day, and the budget.

"The Shuroo Process" premiered in America at the Woodstock Film Festival in New York as an "Official Selection," meaning it was chosen by the judges for its artistic merits. (Some films are shown at festivals as marketing, so not all films "premiered at" big events are created equally.)

The UK Film Festival in London gave it the same distinction. Awards include Best Feature Film at New York's Big Apple Film Festival and Best Director in an International Feature at the Benaras Film Festival in India. It will be released in theaters in 10 cities and Video On Demand through Gravitas Ventures on Wednes-
