Code Enforcement staff increased for evenings/weekends

In September, supervisors Chuck Washington (3rd District) and Kevin Jeffries (1st District) asked the Riverside County's Executive Office to develop a strategy and then budget for increased Code Enforcement staffing on evenings and weekends. They requested a response within 60 days.

As part of the first quarter review of the county's 2021-22 budget, Executive Officer Jeff Van Wagenen presented the staff's proposal to expand enforcement of

county codes to evenings and weekends.
A June 2021 Riverside County grand jury report also recommended an increase in staffing to enforce a new short-term rental [STR] ordinance and to "adequately address noise complaints."

Van Wagenen asked the board of supervisors to approve another \$770,000 to hire 10 more Code Enforcement staff, including six more code enforcement officers. The proposal includes four other staff positions.

The added staffing will cost \$495,000 and the balance of the request is for equipment such as eight new vehi-

The first quarter budget plan including this increase was approved unanimously without any discussion.

The explanation of the added funding and staff stated, "This adjustment will fund the operation to mitigate violations by unpermitted vendors, unpermitted events, short-term rentals and noise during evenings and weekends, during the occurrence."

Washington feels the increased staffing will make a positive difference on the negative effects of STRs on the Hill. "The plan is undergoing final revisions, but we do know that the new enforcement team will assist in short-term rental compliance," he told the Town Cri-See Code Enforcement, page A4

Supervisors vote 4-1 to put Hill in District 4

Update: Supervisors voted 4-1 Tuesday to put the Hill in District 4, just before the Town Crier was set to go to print. Story in next week's paper.

The Advisory Redistricting Commission (ARC) as well as the Riverside County Planning Commission met Wednesday, Dec. 1. The commission reviewed the three maps for which the board of supervisors had requested further analysis, and agreed upon its priority ranking for the three.

(version 7.2) as their first priority and Map F as the second priority. All agreed that Community Map 1.3 was their last priority.

The majority of the public speakers favored Map H. However, three specifically opposed it without supporting Map F or the Community Map.

During the meeting, commissioners David Leonard (District 2) and Gary Thornhill (District 3) expressed concern and support for community comments about a proposed split of the Greater Lake Matthews area and Gavilan Hills in Map H.

"I'm concerned about breaking up Lake Matthews area. The comments I have heard need to be addressed," Thornhill said.

"This is really difficult. There are a lot of legal requirements. Not all of us will get what we want out of the process; compromises are needed." And he added, "I'm not happy with all three maps."

Consequently, the Executive Office Technical Committee staff has also submitted to the board a version 7.3 See Redistricting, page A4



Opal Hellweg to retire

Opal Hellweg, legislative assistant for Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington, will retire at the end of December. She has served district residents for nearly 20 years.

While she and husband, Dean, will travel and devote more time to their gardening, Opal also plans to continue to serve even with the advent of retirement. In typical Opal fashion, she intends to become an ombudsman for long-term care residents.

"I'll advocate for seniors in facilities," she said proudly.

Washington described Opal's determination to assist others. "Opal is a 3rd District institution, and she has served me and our community with commitment, compassion and care."

Even before beginning her 3rd District support, she was attending to residents as the director of the Kay Ceniceros Senior Center in Menitee. And before that effort, in 1987, Opal and Dean started and ran a restaurant in Hemet for years. But the urge to serve blossomed; she was a United Way volunteer and a retired senior volunteer before managing the Ceniceros Center.

Despite all of this devotion to central Riverside County, she cannot fully call herself a native Californian. In late 1957, almost 64 years ago, she was born in Detroit, Michigan. Her father was in the military, so Opal and her siblings moved around around the world.

One of her favorite temporary homes was Guam. Of course, a return visit is on her

During her Riverside County career, Hellweg has had the pleasure of working with the last three 3rd District supervisors — Jim Venable, Jeff Stone and now, Wash-

This path started during her time at the Kay Ceniceros Center in which she had several interactions with Venable. Within a year, his Chief of Staff Mary Moreland called Hellweg and invited her to join Venable's staff.

In 2005, after Stone took office, Hellweg moved to the county's Economic Development Agency and worked for Suzanne Holland, now director. And again, her community work and efforts often overlapped Stone's. Within a year, his chief of staff, Verne Lauritzen, called and offered her a position on Stone's staff.

We will always remember Opal for the immeasurable knowledge and relation-RC members recommended by a 4-1 vote Map H ships she cultivated in the service of three different supervisors and, on a personal note, Opal will always occupy a special place in my heart," Washington said.

Among her many projects, one of her favorite memories is the creation, planning, building and opening of the Idyllwild Library. Nine years later, the Idyllwild Library remains one of the most active on a per-capita basis. But it took more than a decade to

finally construct and open the new facility and Opal was involved most of the way. "It was my first meeting in Idyllwild," she noted. "I met Pete Capparelli and the whole group. 
In describing her time on the district staffs, Hellweg said, "The most rewarding part of the work was the interaction with people, especially during the pandemic. She and Washington's staff spent one weekend making vaccine appointments for Idyllwild residents.

"The gratitude of those folk" was overwhelming, she added.

Opal participated in the county's involvement with the Idyllwild Community Center projects and assisting local businesses during the highways 74 and 243 closures in 2019.

Another example of Opal's devotion to helping people in need involved a recently widowed woman. She was in her 80s, but hard to understand. She was lonely, having lost her husband and living on \$850 per month, Opal began.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

Omicron is in California, but Delta still the top threat

As of Tuesday morning, the Dashboard of the Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) reported recently confirmed cases (last two weeks) of COVID at Idyllwild School as being no students and one staff member, meaning 0.33% of its combined student/staff population, the same as last week. At Hemet High, no students and two staff members are reported as confirmed cases, which is 0.08% of its student/staff population, less than half of last week's report.

The HUSD Dashboard states: "Positive cases will appear on the Dashboard for 14 days from the date they are reported and then will be removed after the 14th day." So, HUSD's rolling Dashboard does not report the cumulative confirmed cases throughout the district, but rather those cases confirmed as being active during the previous two weeks.

As of Tuesday, Riverside County Public Health (RCPH) reported 239 total cases of COVID in the İdyllwild-Pine Cove community, with 232 recovered and four deaths, leaving three cases currently active in the community.

County-wide, as of Dec. 6, RCPH reported a total of 379,590 confirmed COVID cases (7,822 more than last week) with 5,475 deaths (117 more than last week) and 370,005 recovered, leaving 9,585 active cases in Riverside County. The county reports 243 hospitalized Delta remains the variant of most concern within the

COVID patients, 63 of which are in intensive care. The U.S. The AP further notes we are now about two years state reports 98 intensive care unit beds available in Riverside County (19 more than last week).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has been alternating between rating Riverside County as a "Substantial" vs. "High" transmission area. Currently, the county is again downrated to "Substan-

The state reports that in Riverside County, 8.1% of ages 5 to 11, 49.0% of ages 12 to 17, 57.4% of ages 18 to 49, 71.5% of ages 50 to 64, and 72.2% of ages 65 and above have been fully vaccinated. You can visit https:// rivcoph.org/COVID-19-Vaccine-with-Registration schedule vaccinations.

As of Dec. 6, California has reported 4,845,295 total confirmed COVID cases statewide (43,452 more than last week), with 74,209 resulting deaths (553 more than

As of Dec. 1, the CDC reported the national seven-day moving average of daily new U.S. COVID cases as 86,413, down 8.5% from the previous week

The newest coronavirus variant, Omicron, has now spread to at least 45 countries worldwide, and has been identified in at least 16 U.S. states, including California, the New York Times reports. Still little is known about the Omicron variant. Early indications "suggest" Omicron, while being much more transmissible (meaning more highly contagious) than Delta, "may be" less dangerous in the sickness it causes, but scientists are cautioning more definitive information will not be known for some weeks, according to the Associated Press (AP).

into the outbreak of COVID-19 and it has killed more than 780,000 Americans, with deaths currently running at about 860 per day. CDC urges vaccination, including booster shots, to individuals ages 18 and above.

As Omicron rises, public health experts continue to advise people to continue what has been working regarding the Delta variant, which remains the foremost COVID threat — masking, distancing, avoiding crowded locations and, of course, vaccination with boosters.

CDC urges widespread vaccination for COVID-19 remains a crucial tool to best protect everyone, especially those at highest risk, from severe illness and death. CDC experts recommend everyone ages 5 and older get vaccinated to help protect them and others. They urge that vaccinating children ages 5 and older helps keep them in school and enables them to more safely participate in sports, playdates and other group activities, and can also help protect their younger brothers and sisters who are not eligible for vaccination and other family members who may be at increased risk due to age or preexisting conditions.

CDC now urges booster doses for all adults ages 18 and older beginning six months after becoming fully vaccinated. About 43.0 million Americans have now received boosters. Those who received the J&J shot can get a Pfizer or Moderna booster, since CDC has authorized boosters of a different manufacturer than the original

Clinical trial starts for COVID oral therapeutics

Skymount Medical has partnered with Riverside University Health System (RUHS) Medical Center to hold the first U.S. clinical trial on the efficacy of COVID-19 oral therapeutics LSU researchers discovered using artificial intelligence (AI). The testing will be conducted through RUHS Medical Center's Comparative Effectiveness and Clinical Outcomes Research Center (CECORC) in Moreno Valley.

It will evaluate the combined effects of an already Federal Drug Administration (FDA)-approved cancer medication and an already FDA-approved anti-parasitic agent used on human adults and children in patients with mild to moderate COVID-19 symptoms who do not need hospitalization.

Similar studies are already underway in Europe. Although the outcomes for patients have yet to be revealed, predictive studies leveraged by LSU's AI technology and early cell and animal studies conducted by Illinois Institute of Technology have already shown the new drug combination up to 97% effective in reducing the amount of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes

Weng's team to facilitate a human clinical investigation to try to demonstrate the safety of the drug combination and efficacy in adult patients who have tested positive for COVID-19 and exhibit mild to moderate symptoms," said Dr. Kishor Wasan, Skymount Medical's chief medical and scientific officer, Distinguished University Scholar adjunct professor in the Faculty of Medi- into the human study phase," Mukhopadhyay said. cine at the University of British Columbia and co-inven-

tor of the therapeutic combination.

The study will be a double-blind intervention conducted in an outpatient setting, comparing the two-drug combination to a placebo. The goal of the study is to determine the impact this combination therapy will have on decreasing the length and severity of symptoms without negative side effects. The study also will evaluate if the combination drug can help decrease the need for hospitalizations.

Weng, an infectious disease physician at RUHS Medical Center, will inform patients diagnosed with COVID-19 about the study, and invite them to participate. Patients will be screened, enrolled and have subsequent follow up visits in the RUHS Emergency Depart-

"Unfortunately, California has its fair share of COVID-19 cases," Weng said. "The one silver lining in this is that the sample size at our hospital is substantial enough to produce valuable data when evaluating the safety and efficacy of this drug combination. This is a pilot study and 100% voluntary. The safety of our patients is paramount, and we will stay in constant contact with those choosing to participate to ensure their health and well-being."

The researchers are hopeful the new therapeutic also will prevent lingering symptoms, which some people experience following COVID-19.

"The drug combination may reduce long-haul syndrome, the long-term consequences some patients report even after recovering from COVID-19, such as mental health issues and damage to organs," Wasan



PCWD OKs \$1.657 million loan for improvements

The Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) Board of Directors, in a 15-minute special meeting last Wednesday, approved a \$1,657,330 agenda item as part of outgoing General Manager Jerry Holldber's 10/20/50-year plan.

John Egan of Engineering Resources of Southern California prepared the final draft of the Preliminary Engineering Report for water systems improvements the district plans to fund through a Ü.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Rural Utilities Service loan.

The main improvements are:

- Replace the 420,000-gallon Rocky Point Tank Reservoir No. 1.
- Recoat the interior of Rocky Point Tank Reservoir No. 3 and Highway 243 Tank Reser-
- Refurbish and rehabilitate four wells including a well near Buckhorn Camp "that hasn't been used in years," said Holldber.
 • Replace the 1,108 water meters with re-
- mote-read type meters.
- Purchase a 19-acre parcel that includes three district wells at a cost of \$170,000.

The total loan amount also includes \$111,570 in contingency costs.

Holldber gave the directors the good news that the interest rate given of 2.125% is actually 1.75% with a loan term over 40 years and an annual payment of \$59,450.

However, PCWD does qualify for USDA grant money up to \$500,000. "Being realistic, we will not get all of that.," Holldber said. He said the directors needed to approve the loan request and then he could apply for the grant. Regarding the grant, he said "It's not a matter of whether but of how much."

Director Lou Padula asked if the "1.75% is for the entire 40-year loan?"

Holldber said, yes, it's a fixed rate and not a variable. "I think it's a prudent thing to do," regarding the loan.

"2.15 wasn't bad but 1.75% is stellar," said Padula. "I agree," said President Robert Hewitt.

The board voted unanimously to approve the loan.

Planning Commission approves Living Free revisions

Living Free's request for a revised conditional use permit (CUP) and rezoning was unanimously approved by the Riverside County Planning Commission at its Dec. 1 meeting. After its approval, Commission Chair Carl Bruce Shaffer announced that the proposal still must garner approval from the board of supervi-

In 2016, Living Free went to the commission for approval to build a few new structures with a total square footage of about 14,000 based on its previously submitted master plan. The new buildings would include two quarantine facilities. — one for adult dogs and one for pups — a horse stable, a residence for the equine manager, a kennel and several smaller structures such a woodshed and equipment sheds.

The operational CUP was issued in 1995 and expired in March 2015. Consequently, Living Free needed to extend the CUP's life. However, since the 1995 permit was issued, the county has changed some of its zoning stipulations and permissions, which necessitated the request to change the current zoning classification.

In 1995, Class IV kennels and Class II catteries were permitted on property zoned Rural Residential, which is the current zoning classification in that area of Mountain Center. Those county permissions have changed. As an animal sanctuary, two of Living Free's main efforts include a kennel and a cattery. The Planning De-

Life Tribute **Kristine Louise Gorzny** 1952-2021

Kristine Louise Gorzny, 68, died at her home in Glenwood, Oregon Monday, Nov. 29, 2021. Born Dec. 20, 1952 in La Jolla, she was the youngest of Frank and Dorothea Gorzny's four children.

Kristine will be cremated, and no memorial services are planned.



Dear editor:

I would like to add another perspective on the current debate over short-term rentals (STRs).

The original ordinance regulating STRs was "introduced" Nov. 17, 2015, then passed, with changes, and without another reading, in January 2016. The revisions not read allowed street parking and waiving of occupancy limits, giving free rein to large groups using these homes. Our own Supervisor Chuck Washington signed the ordinance.

I find the justification the supervisors offered for the original 2016 Ordinance 927 questionable: "Regulation is more advantageous than an outright ban because short-term rentals support the tourism industry, promote economic activity and can generate transient occupancy tax (TOT) revenue." It continues with "a short term rental qualifies as a hotel," that the tax will go to the General Fund, and "cannot be earmarked and dedicated to enforcing the proposed ordinance." So, the county saw this as an opportunity to justify an illegal activity so that it could collect tax revenue for its own discretionary use.

The activity was illegal because our R-1A zoning (which covers all homes in Idyllwild outside the central village core of R3-A and C-P-S) does not permit hotels. Hotels are permitted with planning review in both R3-A and C-P-S zones, which is where currently most, if not all, of our motels, hotel rooms and cabins are appropri-

Éven the R3-A zone is protective of our tranquil environment. It was established, per the county, "to allow residents in mountainous resort areas... to combine limited commercial uses with a residential dwelling. It is the intent of the Board of Supervisors... that these limited commercial uses shall not alter or disturb the residential or resort nature of the premises or its surroundings."

It is shocking that the county, once concerned about R3-A mixed use "disturbing" the residential neighborhoods, now freely admits it is permissible to do so, by admitting in its proposed new STR ordinance that STRs have "adverse impacts to surrounding neighbors and properties including unpermitted large-scale events, excessive noise, disorderly conduct, traffic congestion, illegal vehicle parking and accumulation of refuse."

Since the county wants to "facilitate economic growth", the supervisors have turned all of Idyllwild into an R3-A or commercial zone, so that investors from off the Hill can reap their financial rewards operating "hotels" absolutely anywhere, while local residents pay for that with their tranquility, as well as damaged prop-

Buyers are now asking if there are STRs adjacent to, or near, a home they are considering buying, and if so, they decline to buy. In appraisal, we call that external obsolescence, a decline in value caused by an outside influence over which one has no control.

I recommend rescission of the ordinance and demanding that the county maintain the relied-upon zoning protections which existed when we all bought our homes. Many nearby cities have done this, for example Cathedral City, La Quinta, Rancho Mirage and Palm

er in an email. "This initial funding will be helpful in stopping 'bad neighbor' short-term rentals that allow their guests to hold loud parties on the weekends ...

... and we are working toward directing additional funding to short-term rental enforcement in our revised short-term rental ordinance that is currently being draft-

Funding for more code enforcement will be evaluat- remains in District 3 in the Community Map. ed in the future, Washington stated. Next fiscal year, "The budget will be reviewed and can be adjusted based on the needs that we are seeing in the county," he confirmed.

Currently, the county sheriff's office is the principal agency responding to code complaints on weekends. While there is no increase for the sheriff, Washington noted, "With the new enforcement team in place, the sheriff's deputies can concentrate on responding to other, more time-sensitive situations."

Overall county fiscal position

The county's financial position has significantly improved since the budget was approved last summer. The projected deficit has fallen from \$53 million to \$18 million. The reserves are now projected to grow from \$231 million to more than \$350 million.

These changes resulted from a projected increase in revenue, including nearly \$6 million from the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT), and a nearly \$90 million increase in projected year-end revenue. This was largely attributed to the federal funding to reimburse local governments for the unexpected costs caused by the COVID 19 problems. (Hotels/ motels and county-registered STRs pay TOT.)

Code Enforcement was not the only program increased in this budget review. The county added nearly \$2 million to other programs such as the public defender and 25 other new positions.

of Map H to address these concerns.

The priority of these maps and the eventual choice will have little effect on most Hill communities. In all three, Pine Cove, Idyllwild and Mountain Center are moved to District 4.

Garner Valley, south of Lake Hemet, also is in District 4 in maps F and H. However, Garner Valley

The boundary between districts 3, 4 and 5 is Valle Vista for Maps F and H, but in the Community Map, it adheres much closer to Idyllwild and Pine Cove. The area west to Valle Vista is still in District 3.

In Maps F and H, Anza, Sage, Aguanga and Lake Riverside are part of District 3. But in the Commu-nity Map, only Sage remains in District 3; the other communities are shifted to District 4, which is the reason Commissioner "Bill" Sanchez (District 4) felt this was his least favored map.

'The communities of Anza, Lake Riverside and Aguanga wish to remain within District 3," he com-

In his comments, Leonard stated, "Community Map 1.4 is option 3 or less."

The alternative Map H (7.3) makes no changes to the assignment of Hill areas from Maps F and H

For the last redistricting in 2001, Temecula and Murrieta were shifted to District 3 and the cities of Banning and Beaumont were moved to District 5 from District 3.

Maps H (both) and F establish two districts with large Latino populations resulting in high possibility of the election of Latino candidates. The Community Map creates three of these districts.



Maintaining fire safety in the fall ...

As I write this article today, we are all still waiting for the first snow on the mountain. The rain we received in October has helped to reduce the number and severity of fires in the county but the forest is still capable of having a large fire burn in a wind event.

It's sometimes hard to get motivated to do fire abatement in the late fall and early winter but some of our most destructive fires in Southern California have occurred during this time of year. Public Resource Code (PRC) 4291 (State of California fire abatement standards) is a year-round California law, not just a law for summer.

After you have passed your inspection, the key is to keep your property in compliance. Most Hill Hall, 25925 Cedar St. residents know that this part is not easy and is even more difficult for part-time residents.

Most homes are destroyed in wildfires because of spot fires (caused by ember cast) finding a path to the structure. This "path" is usually pine needles or dry grass that leads up to the house. The fire creeps up to the structure, gets established in wood siding or a deck, then takes down the house very quickly. The roof and rain gutters are also places for needle cast to accumulate and become very receptive to hot embers.

After your property is abated, there are two recurring issues. The roof (including gutters) must be kept clean and the first 30 feet around all structures must be kept raked down to mineral soil. The problem is, you rake, the wind blows and it all comes back. Unfortunately, it's the price we pay for the lifestyle we choose to live up here.

Firefighters make decisions as to which homes they attempt to defend and which homes they drive by during a wildfire. This is because they have very little time to spend at each house. If five engines are assigned to protect 30 homes in an area, there is no time for them to do your abatement for you. Engine companies do what's called "structure triage." It means they check your house, determine its survivability, then either de- • American Legion Auxiliafend it or move on to the next house. The abated homes are the ones most easily protected.

Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council (MCFSC) stands ready to help families get their abatement done and comply with PRC 4291. We are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.

MCFSC has grant funds for dead and dying tree removal, fire abatement and education, as well as a grant for low-income assistance. Be sure to call to check on any of these services and your cost share amount (25 or 35 percent depending on the grant) or the qualification for low-income help.

The drought is continuing in most of California and it requires those of us who live in the Wildland Urban Interface to be vigilant all year long. If you would like MCFSC's assistance in protecting your home, give us a call at 951-659-6208.



partment recommended changing the zoning to Light Agricultural, which permits those activities.

The staff environmental assessment resulted in a mitigated negative declaration. Nevertheless, there are many conditions, such as a possible bird nesting survey, and the presence of an archeologist and a Native American monitor during the conduct of any ground-disturbing work in case any unidentified buried cultural or historic resources are uncovered.

"Yes, we agree to the staff conditions," Ray Barmore, Living Free executive director told the commission.

Commissioner David Leonard, 2nd District, asked Barmore about the proposed new camp site.

"It's a primitive camp site for veterans," he replied. "It's for recreation for veterans to get out of the city and around the horses. We've been doing one-day clinics and want to expand it to multi-day sessions. Without further discussion, the commission ap-

proved the changes and recommended that the board of supervisors approve also.



Freedom Writers founder spoke at Idyllwild School

On Friday, Nov. 19, Idyllwild School faculty and students welcomed noted educator and activist Erin Gruwell to their classrooms. Gruwell is the founder of The Freedom Writers Foundation and the author of several books, the first of which became the inspiration for a major Hollywood film starring Hilary Swank.

The book, "The Freedom Writers Diary," is a compilation of actual diary entries from her English classes at Woodrow Wilson Classical High School in Long Beach.

Gruwell began teaching there during the Rodney King riots.

Her students at Woodrow Wilson had been labeled "unteachable" and "at risk," and at first there was no trust between teacher and students. Gruwell began to develop a curriculum and exercises to address the real needs of her students while developing literacy.

Books like "The Diary of Anne Frank" inform not only historical awareness, but promote introspection and plant the seeds of empathy. By encouraging students to speak about their own experiences, they come to understand the universality of the adversities they live with. Students learn they are not alone in their challenges. All 150 of the students in her program graduated, and many went on to college.

The program was meant for both students and teachers, to inform and motivate. By the end of the day, Gruwell promised to return to Idyllwild with members of her original class of Freedom Writers, but only if the students write them letters.

Gruwell's visit was the culmination of efforts by Idyllwild School Resource Specialist Kristin Ross. Ross considers her a "hero" and has followed the work of the foundation for 20 years, drawing on its methods and materials to guide her own work.

She is a recent transplant to Idyllwild. "I love it. My mom had a place. I've been coming up for many years with my sisters. I've never lived in a small town before.

"The principal is forward thinking, wants to make changes. Inclusivity is a big part, making all students feel part of a community. With about 79 students in middle school, I can reach and know all of them. Phenomenal staff, very open to Erin coming up." About Gruwell's visit, she adds, "She was on my bucket list. This was truly and honor."

Ross also underlined the involvement of other parts of the community in making Gruwell's visit special; Nam at Mile High Restaurant provided a breakfast for the guests, and Lori and Frank at Ferro's treated them to a special dinner. Also present at the workshop was local school board trustee Vic Scavarda.

Three seniors on their way to the Tiki Bowl

Three Anza Hamilton High seniors were selected for this year's Hawaiian Tiki Bowl. The invitation-only event selects young athletes with the potential to play in college or the National Football League (NFL).

Because of COVID-related travel restrictions, the event will be held in Orlando, Florida, as it was last year. The players will depart Dec. 16 and will spend four days preparing for the game, and being scouted by coaches and representatives from college and NFL teams. Each of eight teams (of up to 35 players) will be coached by two college coaches.

The three student athletes are Caleb Spier of Garner Valley, Aurelius Orozco of Anza and Zach Vollan, also from Anza.

This was the first time in 16 years the Hamilton Bobcats won their league, and made it to the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) finals where they won one game before being eliminated.

All three have been with the team for four years, now under an intergenerational coaching team; Coach Brian McGowan is supported by his sons, Head Coach Pat and Offensive Coordinator Joe. They are a family "all in" on Hamilton High athletics.

Heather Spier was team mom for three years. Her duties including feeding those enormous appetites. "Caleb has played wide receiver and as quarterback, led the team to the playoffs this year... He and Zach have been friends and teammates since second grade." His parents had hoped to join him on the trip, and even bought those non-refundable tickets ... but to Hawaii. It

is not a good time to pay for two family vacations at once so they will watch the game at home and then look forward to spring in Hawaii... but "[Caleb's] brother from Indiana will be there to root for him."

Caleb is not yet sure about next year. Law enforcement like his dad? Biology degree and a game warden's life? Military service?

Aurelius has played four years on the team, playing on both offensive and defensive line. "Being on the football team is one of the most fun/meaningful things that has ever happened to me... I'm very grateful for the memories I've had playing for Hamilton... an experience to remember for a lifetime." He's still weighing his options for the future. He's sorting through his options for college, hopes to keep playing football, but still has to sit down and sort it out.

His parents, Carmen and Ken Orozco, have been Anza residents for six years. Carmen: "The coaches were great, very supportive and encouraging... [The Mc Gowans] are amazing, a second family... When the team was eliminated in the CIF finals the players seemed almost more disappointed to

face the end of their time with their teammates and [coaches.]"

April Vollan also very proud and excited. "Zach has been on varsity since his freshman year, and has played all over, defensive end, center, offensive guard. He is [a] 4.0+ student, and has several offers from universities to play dual sports (wrestling is his other), and three other acceptances." He is looking forward to January and the decision. "In a small community, kids can play more than one sport.," he said. Zach also is active in the Boy Scouts. Now he's eyeing a a career as a lawyer, a prosecutor who can "bring justice to those who have been de-

The Crier asked Zach how Anza's Hamilton High, a small school with about 300 students, ended up sending three players to the Tiki Bowl;

"Hard work and determination to push through anything. We put in the hours and the blood sweat and tears, we gave 100% everyday. We came together as a brotherhood. You couldn't break our bond, we're a family... push and persevere... won't quit, can't quit."

In addition to wrestling and football, Zach has been on the track team and has held down jobs. During the COVID pandemic, he began working at the Pizza Factory. He has quit that to focus on scholarships and college, but still does side jobs.

The Hawaiian Tiki Bowl is one of several dozen organizations running invitation-only, all-star high school football games. Players (and family members who want the package, including recreational events and hotel) pay \$2,995 each to participate. Having your own hotel bed costs several hundred more. This will be the 20th year for the event.

The PEO requisitioned Denise Van Herpen of The Green Thing Nursery to create 40 ornaments with Idyllwild written on each. "We thought this would be a good representation of our town while supporting a local small business," said Cozens.

"These ornaments are now on display on the west lawn of the US Capitol, representing the USDA Forest Service and California."

Garver recently accepted two Life Time Achievement Awards from the Southern California Motion Picture Council. She has garnered critical acclaim in film, stage and voice over.


