Planning Commission continues Idyllwild item: Is it added motel units or apartments?

Wednesday, Feb. 2, the Riverside County Planning Commission unanimously decided to continue the proposal to expand the former Tahquitz Inn, currently the Pine Woods Resort.

The commissioners were confused whether the proposal, which owner Shane Stewart submitted, was intended to expand the existing motel usage or to create more long-term rentals in Idyllwild.

The confusion was evident from the beginning of this item's time before the commission. "This is a conditional use permit proposed by Shane Stewart to expand an existing apartment or motel complex in Idyllwild," said Commission Chair David Leonard, who represents the 2nd Supervisorial District.

After Project Planner Brett Dawson described the proposal and made the staff recommendations, Commissioner Guillermo "Bill" Sanchez (4th District) asked for clarification of the proposal's purpose. "The application and staff report say it's a motel, but some letters and correspondence seem to indicate it's long-term rentals?" Sanchez inquired.

"It's a proposal for a motel," Dawson replied. Other features of the design plan — such as the ur-

ban look of the buildings, the height of the building backing to Oakwood and adequate open space — also raised questions during the commission's hearing.

Commissioner Gary Thornhill (3rd District) expressed the strongest reservations about the plan. At See Planning Commission, page A2

Dr. Marshall Hawkins **Dr. Marshall Hawkins** of Idyllwild

Marshall Hawkins, popular and renowned in Idyllwild as jazz bass musician, teacher and human being, received an honorary doctor of music performance degree Friday night from California Baptist University (CBU) in Riverside where, with Director of Jazz Studies and professor Dan St. Marseille, he co-led the CBU Jazz Ensemble together with Hawkin's own Seahawk Modern Jazz Orchestra (MOJO) in concert.

The program recognized and featured numerous performing artists, including Sherry Williams, Yve Evans, Bob Boss, Charles Owens, Paul Carman, Nora Germain, Ross Garren, Clayton E. Powell Jr., Paul Kreibich, John Rodby and Traivon Williams.

Hawkins — well known to Hill folk from performances on upright bass at Café Aroma, Ferro restaurant and especially at Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA), where he founded and is head of the jazz program — has solid connections with CBU. His wife, Desiree, earned her masters there, and their daughter, Naomi, received her bachelor's from that university and is about to earn her masters there, as well.

Hawkins' personal connection to CBU includes a master class he gave there. The subject of his class was not "Bass" or "Piano" (at which he also excels), nor was it even "Jazz." He says it was simply "Music." It was highly praised and remembered.

When contacted Sunday night by the Town Crier, Hawkins was flush with the honor that had been awarded him, saying he felt he was floating, like one of those huge, inflated balloons.

As numerous sources have related: In years past, Hawkins toured and/or performed with Miles Davis, Wayne Shorter, Herbie Hancock, Tony Williams, Frank Sinatra, Eddie Jefferson, Richie Cole, Betty Gray, Shirley Horn, Daniel Jackson, Josh White, Joe Henderson, Freddie Hubbard and Pharoah Sanders, among others. Along with Gregory Robbins, Hawkins co-conducted a jazz Christmas program with the Redlands Symphony, and he is the bassist of the West Coast version of the Harry Pickens Trio, which has performed in Idyllwild with Pickens on piano and Harold Mason on drums. Hawkins has cut discs with musicians such as Shirley Horn, Roberta Flack, Donny Hathaway and The Manhattan Transfer.

In 1986, Hawkins founded the jazz program at Idyllwild Arts, which resulted in top honors at the prestigious Berklee School of Music High School Jazz Festival. He has mentored hundreds of young musicians, including jazz artists such as clarinetist Evan Christopher and trombonist Jason Jackson.

When you talk with Hawkins, you quickly learn that the young musicians he has taught are of primary importance to him. A former IAA student described Hawkins as a true humanitarian, saying that no one could be more deserving of an honorary doctorate. In 1994, Hawkins co-founded the hugely attended and beloved Jazz in the Pines fes-

tival at Idyllwild Arts and served as the festival's music director for more than 20 years. Idyllwild's Marshall Hawkins has a new title: Dr. Marshall Hawkins.

ly took a major step to change and to improve management of the county's short-term rental system (STR). At its Feb. 1 meeting, the board unanimously approved (4-0 with 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez absent) a contract with Deckard Technologies of San Diego to upgrade and manage STRs in the county.

Beginning his presentation of the contract, Planning Director John Hildebrand said, "This represents the first phase of a comprehensive overhaul of our STR program countywide ... It will comprehensively change how we manage and relate with our customers and how property owners manage STR properties countywide.

The request for proposals (RFP) to provide this service was issued in July 2021. The RFP closed Aug. 13. Of the three submissions, the county's review team recommended Deckard Technologies. The total cost of the contract for the first three years is \$346,240 with two optional years for another \$297,000.

The first step will be developing and implementing an online system for registration and management of all STRs. All existing STR certificates, which Hildebrand estimated to be about 750, will be converted to comply with the new system.

Property owners will be able to access the online system to make payments for STR registration, certificate renewal and submitting the Transient Occupancy Tax

For the county, the system will include reporting tools such as details on STRs. It also will have the capability to identify and contact unpermitted, but operating, STRs. When Hildebrand mentioned this feature, the audience at the meeting broke into applause.

COVID-19 LOCAL UPDATE:

State lifts indoor mask mandate ... for those vaccinated

Effective Feb. 15, California will lift its indoor masking order for vaccinated persons only. The relaxed order will apply in Riverside County, which does not have its own mask mandate, but will not affect Los Angeles County's own more restrictive mandate. For the next seven days, however, California's mask mandate continues at indoor businesses, including restaurants where indoor patrons are mandated to wear masks "except when eating or drinking."

After Feb. 15, in Riverside County, unvaccinated persons will still be required by state mandate to wear masks in indoor settings such as restaurants, retail stores, theaters and government offices, but vaccinated persons will not. And all persons, vaccinated or not, will still be required to mask in certain indoor locations such as schools, airports and health care, longterm care and senior-care facilities.

It is not clear how the separate mandates for vaccinated versus unvaccinated persons will be enforced.

As of Tuesday morning, the Dashboard of the Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) reported active cases (last two weeks) of COVID at Idyllwild School as being four students and no staff members (eight students fewer than reported last week), which is 1.30% of its combined student/staff population, a 56% reduction from last week's report. At Hemet High, 30 students and nine staff members were reported as active cases (52 fewer students and the same number of staff members reported last week), which is 1.50% of its combined student/staff population, a 57% reduction from last week's report. Hamilton School reported four students and no staff members with active COVID, which is 0.89% of its student-staff population, a 64% reduction compared to last week.

The HUSD Dashboard states: "Positive cases will appear on the Dashboard for 14 days from the date they are reported and then will be removed after the 14th day." Consequently, HUSD's rolling Dashboard reports active cases confirmed during the previous two weeks.

As of Tuesday, Riverside County Public Health (RCPH) reported a total of 266 cases of COVID in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove community, with 244 recovered and six deaths, leaving 16 currently active cases — one fewer active case than reported last week.

County-wide, as of Tuesday, RCPH reported a total of 464,498 confirmed COVID cases (13,231 more than last week, but 224 fewer than last week's increase) with 5,957 total deaths (89 more than last week, but 33 fewer than last week's increase), and with 402,154 COVID cases having recovered, leaving 56,387 active cases in Riverside County, about a 28.5% increase over last week's active cases.

The county currently reports 686 hospitalized COVID patients (225 fewer than last week), 122 of which are in intensive care (41 fewer than last week). On Tuesday morning, the state's website reported 77 ICU beds available in Riverside County (11 more than last week). CDC continues to rate Riverside County as a "High" transmission area, saying "Everyone in Riverside County, California should wear a mask in public, indoor settings. Mask requirements might vary from place to place."

RCPH reports, as of Feb. 7 in Riverside County, 13.9% 15.4% of the population ages 5 to 11 are "fully vaccinated" while 49.7% of ages 12 to 15, about 55.6% of ages 16 to 24, 59.6% of ages 25 to 44, 72.8% of ages 45 to 64 and 75.7% of ages 65-plus have been fully vaccinated. Currently, the term "fully vaccinated" still does not include boosters.

As of Feb. 7, California reported 8,079,771 total confirmed COVID cases statewide (201,150 more than reported last week), with 80,539 total resulting deaths (1,255 more than last week).

As of Feb. 2, CDC reported cases and hospitalizations are beginning to decline in the United States, but community transmission remains high. CDC's COVID Data Tracker showed, in

December, unvaccinated adults ages 65 and older were 49 times more likely to be hospitalized than people in that age group who were up-to-date with their COVID vaccines, including boosters.

CDC reports, as of Feb. 2, the current seven-day national moving average of daily new COVID cases was 378,051, a 37.6% reduction from the previous week's seven-day moving average. As of Feb. 2, the Omicron variant now accounts for 99.9% of new cases in the U.S., with Delta variant accounting for the remaining 0.1%.

CDC continues to advise that vaccination, along with other important prevention strategies, continues to be the best defense against severe COVID disease. Everyone ages 5 and up is recommended to be vaccinated, with boosters for everyone ages 12 and older — specifically the Pfizer-BioNTech booster for persons ages 12 to 15.

CDC continues to urge everyone to 1) get vaccinated as soon as possible, with a booster shot just as soon as you are eligible for one; 2) wear a mask that covers both your nose and your mouth when in indoor public places; 3) whenever possible, stay 6 feet apart from people you don't live with; 4) avoid crowds and poorly ventilated indoor spaces; 5) continue to wash your hands often with soap and water, using hand sanitizer when soap and water are not available; and 6) consider self-testing before attending indoor gatherings, and if you test positive — or you are sick and have symptoms — don't go.

COVID vaccinations are available in Idyllwild by appointment at Idyllwild Pharmacy (1-951-659-2135). As of Tuesday, Riverside County still was not listing any place on the Hill as a future county vaccination location, but places in Hemet, San Jacinto, Banning, Beaumont, Moreno Valley, Desert Hot Springs and Palm Desert are listed. Staff also raised the question of whether current zoning restrictions were adequate for apartments. If not, a General Plan amendment might be necessary for approval.

When asked if another 30 days was sufficient for more staff review and consultation with Stewart, Hildebrande replied that was not sufficient time, especially for a full re-no-

Thornhill moved to continue the question off the commission's calendar and Leonard made the second. The motion was approved 5-0.

different times, he said, "It doesn't look right for Idyllwild." And "Nothing in site plan that is aesthetically pleasing."

Nevertheless, he also made it clear that Stewart has the right to propose some development of the two parcels. "[They] are entitled to have units on the property. [The Planning Commission] doesn't control the water use issues, we don't get into those. They are controlled by the district. We already have a letter that they're going to get served."

Following Dawson's presentation of the proposal to the ning staff and Stewart. commission, questions were asked of Stewart, and next public speakers were offered time to address the commission.

David Hunt, former Idyllwild Water District (IWD) director, argued that the added units, whether rental or motel, would ultimately endanger the district's water and sewer infrastructure. He recommended that any decision be postponed until IWD constructs a new sewage treatment plant.

However, he confirmed that IWD issued the "will-serve" letter years ago, but he described it as a "backroom" deal.

Sharon Baker was the speaker who initially raised the question of whether the project was apartments or a motel, and short-term rentals. She also briefly discussed the petition with nearly 500 signatures opposing the project. This had been in the commission's package.

One of the first questions Leonard asked Stewart was, "Why so many people were motivated to oppose the proj-

In response, Stewart said the petition makers were seen holding banners describing the proposal as a 140-unit condominium, six stories tall with a roof-top pool. "A lot of erroneous information was presented," Stewart said.

It appeared the plan would be approved after commissioners Bruce Shaffer and Sanchez seemed to indicate their concerns were minor and could be addressed between plan-

But ultimately, the question of whether more motel units or whether more apartments were being approved was the stumbling block.

Twice planning staff affirmed that the proposal was for motel or short-term rentals. Stewart also confirmed that he concurred with that direction because the staff said that's how it would be approved.

But Leonard noted, "It's a delicate balance between this facility being a destination motel versus an apartment complex.'

He referred to letters from local businesses — Ferro and the Idyllwild Brewpub. According to Leonard, their authors wrote, "... servers need additional housing and inexpensive housing for seasonal workers."

Stewart then confirmed that the original plan was for longer-term rentals, which explains why the floor plans indicate space for washers, dryers and stoves.

Since the public notice for hearing said it was motel units, Hildebrand then explained that if it were changed to apartments, the proposed action would need to be reviewed and re-noticed. He added that state building and the Planning Commission.

Following approval of the contract, Hildebrand estimated that it will be about 12 weeks before the full system can be "rolled out and

Supervisor Chuck Washington (3rd District) spoke strongly in favor of the proposed contract. He noted that his district and Perez's district were the ones "... most impacted by STRs, especially the mountain communities of Idyllwild, Pine Cove, as well as the wine country.'

He attributed this to the increasing availability of STRs since the original Ordinance 927 was approved in 2016 that "... didn't have teeth in

The result, he noted "... was an explosion in the industry and a number of bad actors," but he stressed that the majority of STR owners were not "bad actors."

But it was costing the county money to have sheriff's deputies enforcing the noise ordinance at night and weekends rather than Code Enforcement. "We need a very robust management system and I approve this item today," he concluded.

Ordinance 927 status

At the end of his description of the contract with Deckard, Hildebrand gave a summary of the next steps for a revision of Ordinance 927, which currently regulates STRs in Riverside

He stated that a draft might be brought to the board in about a month and then public hearings on the draft could be announced and held in March or April.







Kasaan Hammon fills new role at Idyllwild Arts

excuse to mention an appointment that may have flown under the radar last fall: Kasaan Hammon's promotion to assistant chair of IAA's Music Department.

Hammon has brought "exceptional efficiency and problem-solving skills" as well as "warmth and humor" to her new role, according to Music Chair Heather Netz. Netz adds that Hammon's "help has been indispensable and her energy seems tireless," and her "expertise in songwriting and popular music production has been fortuitous in rounding out our leadership," since Netz's own training is classical.

Because the Music Department teaches classical music, jazz, and, in the Songwriting Program, every major genre of contemporary popular music, it is vital that "all our music students feel represented and understood," Netz remarked. Hammon excels at giving the kind of attention that makes people feel represented, understood and valued. Idyllwild residents familiar with her volunteer efforts as a member of the Idyllwild School PTA and the School Site Council since $2\tilde{0}15$ and as leader of the music team at Idyllwild Community Church know

The care Hammon gives people also is familiar to students like 2016 IAA graduate Miguel Soto. He talked at length about Hammon recently, just before his upcoming move from New York to Miami for the purpose of involving himself more intimately in the Latin music scene. Warner Chappell Music Mexico, a division of Warner Chappell Music, Latin America, has signed Soto as a songwriter, and he gives Hammon much of the

credit for his musical development. Soto recalls Hammon as "one of the Music Department's most valuable teachers," partly because she was "so committed to us" and "always available outside of class." But Hammon also offered "criticism that was always direct and often tough, that always expressed what she really thought." He sees Hammon's directness as having "helped all of us in the Songwriting Program grow immensely" because "it's important to know what a hard career you're choosing if you want to be a professional musician — but also to be reminded that there are good career possibilities outside of becoming a famous pop star, which happens to very few of us."

sometimes painful honesty, Hammon smiled.

"Yes, music is a hard and extremely competitive business. But I feel optimistic about our students' prospects. As Miguel suggests, there are so many ways to succeed. One of the things that sets our Songwriting Program apart is that it's geared to help students understand this. Our goal is to help students graduate with a clear idea of their unique set of talents and possible avenues into a career in music."

Hammon is proud that the Songwriting Program gives its majors the option of a Music Technology concentration, with Michael Quick and Braden Diotte as

music production because of the quality of our teachers and our growing number of offerings in music technolo-

This Thursday's Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) gy," Hammon said. "But we don't teach just the technical Songwriting Concert, from 7:30 to 9 p.m., presents an or production side of music. We also teach about music business. The business changes fast, but we educate our students in how to keep up with it. Part of that education comes from our master classes, for which we're able to bring in top music executives. It doesn't hurt that we're close to Los Angeles. And meeting people like that gives our students a great head-start in networking."

None of this means the Songwriting Program neglects the beating heart of the music industry — the mu-

"Don Reed, Michael and I form the core of our Songwriting faculty," she added. "Every song that our students present gets feedback from all three of us. That's a tremendously broad range of perspectives because, collectively, we truly cover every type of contemporary popular music. Don's area is Americana rock and country. He loves '60s and '70s rock and folk. Punk too, for that matter.

'Michael's tastes are very different from that. They're broad and eclectic, but I'd say he's especially knowledgeable about experimental music, though he has a great ear for everything from alternative to maindance music, R&B and even country."

Hammon paused. "Maybe I shouldn't talk too much about my own specialty," she laughed. "But the topline curriculum that I teach goes into technical depth in a way that you won't find in other places."

Aware that non-musicians probably know nothing about topline, she explains that "Songwriting involves three main components. There's the music, or accompaniment, meaning chords, beats, and instrumentation. There's the melody, meaning the notes you sing, and the lyrics, or words. Most songwriters do a combination of these things, and some specialize in one or two. Topline writers specialize in writing melody and lyrics.

"For example, a music producer might have an exciting dance track with beats and lush instrumentation, but a good topline writer is needed to create the vocal melody and lyrics. If you start singing a song that you love out loud right now, you're singing the topline."

She paused again. "Anyway, that's what I do. And Don and Michael are wonderful, so I'm sure they don't really mind me talking about it.'

Hammon's IAA history dates back to 1988, when she Told that her former student had appreciated her started as a sophomore Musical Theatre major. "That was only the third year that there was a high school and not just the Summer Program," she recalls.

A campus production of "Little Shop of Horrors" in which she played a Doo-Wop Girl led to the creation of a her teaching excellence to contribute to the Music Degirl group called Perfect Fifth. "We went on a California tour as far north as Berkeley. Marshall Hawkins went

The range of Hammon's performing talent was such that she graduated from IAA as a Dance major in 1990. Yet by the mid-'90s, having studied at both Northwestern University and the California Institute of the Arts, she was living in Los Angeles, using RIGSI as her artist "We attract more and more students interested in name and focusing on writing and recording the songs for her debut album, Gift of All.

"Then, in 1997, I was signed by a major label, Elek-

stream. And I'm all about pop, including electronic tra. A number of my songs got radio and club play, and there was supposed to be an album. But because of changes at the record label, a full album was never released."

Hammon put her frustration with Elektra behind her to move to New York for success in writing topline, which now occupies such an important place in the IAA Songwriting Program.

While writing topline, Hammon continued to compose her own songs. But, realizing she didn't have a passion for being onstage and that she derived more satisfaction from composing and other kinds of behind-the-scenes work, she also went into management. She worked with talent in both New York and

After returning to Los Angeles in 2005, she worked in Chaka Khan's management team, and from 2008 to 2010 she managed Songwriters Hall of Fame member Albert Hammond.

It was through managing young artists and helping them build their careers that Hammon began to think about teaching. Back in Southern California, her 20-year reunion at IAA in 2010 led to a masterclass for the fledgling Songwriting Program, then to a series of masterclasses. She has taught regularly in the Songwriting Program since 2013.

Gradually, it became clear she had even more than partment. Music is IAA's biggest and most complex arts department, so the "exceptional efficiency and problem-solving skills" and other virtues Netz previously noted made her an irresistible choice to fill the need for an assistant chair.

With Hammon having given Netz all the help she was looking for, and more, Netz said, "We're truly lucky to have her." Of course, given the riches of the Music Department in general and the Songwriting Program in particular, it seems fair to say that Hammon is also lucky to have the role she does - and that the students are lucky to have such an education.

In March, the Idyllwild International Festival Cinema (IIFC) is about to have its 13th opening. And one month later, the inaugural Scotland International Festival of Cinema (SIFC) will showcase new films in Peebles, Scotland, south of Edinburgh.

Stephen Savage, IIFC founder, inspired the SIFC over a lunch meeting in London in 2019. Joining him at that lunch were Trinity Houston, IIFC producer, and Mhairi Calvey, director of the inaugural SIFC.

While enjoying the lunch and sharing film making stories, Calvey mentioned, "I saw you have a film festival in Idyllwild. I've always wanted to do one."

"Maybe we could have one in Scotland one day," Savage replied politely. While continuing to eat — this was not a business meeting — the trio speculated on what that might be.

"She always wanted to do something like this and the idea came up," Houston said. "It was time to do it."

Calvey left the lunch and began to think about the opportunity. Films have been and are her career. She began acting at age 5 as Young Murron in "Braveheart." After college she resumed her acting career and most recently finished "Fear the Invisible Man."

Managing a film festival has been one of Calvey's dreams. She said, "I love film. I love the media and the people behind it. Getting a film off the ground is an exciting opportunity. I love bringing people together."

Knowing that Savage and Houston have 13 years' experience producing IIFC was her deciding factor. "I wouldn't do it without their experience," she said.
